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The Editor

Dear Sir:

I think most people in the Northville area are aware that there has been a lot of interest shown against horse racing in the State of Michigan and particularly at Northville and thousands of names are being signed on petitions to the legislature to prohibit pari-mutuel betting.

There are tremendous objections to horse racing and what it means to a community where race tracks are located. This is not only true in this State but in other States where racing is permitted. The State of Florida is now in the midst of a fight against race tracks, where the situation has become almost intolerable.

Regardless of what the present legislature does at this time, I am confident that this question will continue to be agitated until our governing body realizes that horse racing must stop in the State of Michigan.

I live three miles from the Northville tracks and on a main highway which probably 90% of the people use in going to and from the tracks. This is a terrible nuisance, hundreds and hundreds of cars driving almost bumper to bumper and three and four abreast. This is what happens the morning following each race meet. We have to go out with a cart and collect bags full of garbage, papers, whiskey bottles, beer cans and all kinds of debris, and this is a daily must in order to keep the front of our property presentable.

I shall not attempt to set forth all the objections and evils of race tracks, feeling that the public has a pretty clear knowledge of what is happening. So far as the Northville races are concerned the men running them have subsidized many people in Northville, as well as the churches. Some of these churches have accepted the voluntary gift but I believe there are two that have refused to accept money. The race track people give large sums of money to the Northville school and I am told furnish band instruments and uniforms to the school children. This is only part of the subsidizing being done.

The race track people are endeavoring to secure a plot on 100 acres of land near the intersection of Cass and Benton Park and I understand they have their matter up now before the proper State authority. Their idea being to start a trailer camp in close proximity to the race track. Last fall the Township of Northville, in most meetings, killed a movement to create two trailer camps outside of the Northville limits but without a bulk of the race track people are trying to secure a trailer camp of their own.

I am told that a petition was gotten up among the business

men of Northville and sent to the legislature the early part of this week, the purport of this petition being to prove that a majority of people in Northville were in favor of the race track. Naturally, there were some who signed this petition who were enjoying a financial gain from the track meets, but I am sure that many of them signed under duress.

If this situation is allowed to continue, conditions will gradually get worse until the community of Northville will be faced with exactly the same situation as exists in Florida.


There is a tremendous amount of money involved. Take the track at Northville; in 59 racing nights last year their take was approximately \$11,500,000; the profits to the owners of Northville Downs were over a million dollars and the revenue to the State was approximately \$230,000. Is it any wonder that people, schools and churches are being subsidized in order to get their approval to hold race meets?

I understand that people back of the racing are interested in a chain of tracks in other parts of the country and are planning on building tracks in other cities in this State.

This race track subject has reached a point of where it is extremely serious and will do great damage to the community. Whatever action is taken by the present legislature, if racing is to be allowed to continue in this State, I can say very definitely that the fight will continue and increase in strength and it will probably end in placing it on the next State election.

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Work Progresses On New Wayne Hospital

The Oakwood Hospital Board of Trustees continues to make steady progress toward the construction of the new hospital for western Wayne County, to be located in Dearborn on Southfield and Oakwood Road.

The Board is now holding conference with Henry V. Herrick of the Peoples Community Hospital Authority of western Wayne County. This authority is from Ypsilanti and have plans for the hospital needs for the County. Last week the Oakwood Hospital Board met with representatives of the Dearborn Municipal Hospital Board and listened to their plans for hospital needs. The Dearborn Municipal Hospital Board is expected to turn over to the Oakwood Board the architectural plans and other vital data that had been drawn up for the city hospital. Dr. Dwight Barnett, medical consultant for the Oakwood Board, is now studying the Dearborn municipal plans to determine whether or not they are applicable to the Oakwood Hospital. Dr. Barnett will make his report in the near future. The school debating team was defeated at Durand.

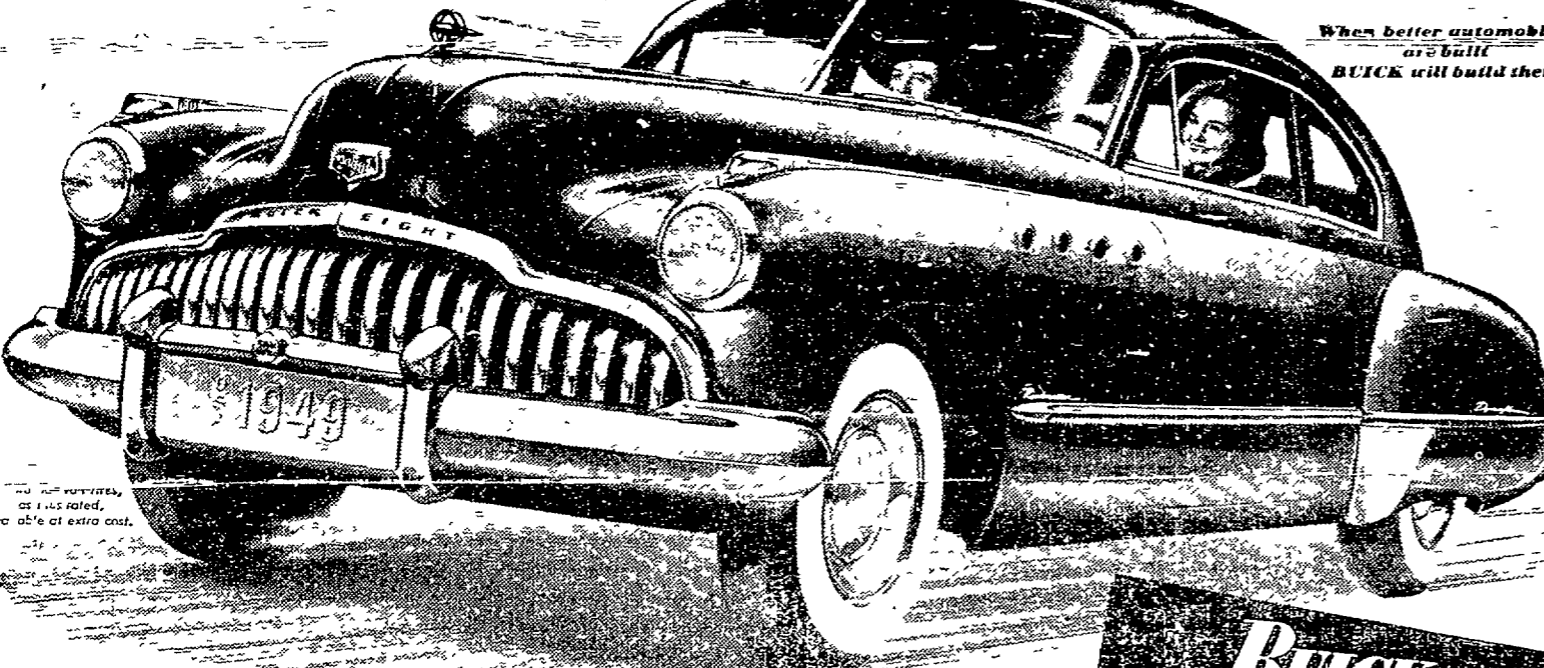

Fewer Wormy Apples

Faithful adherents of the "apple a day" maxim, if they can think back to war experience, will realize that nowadays they are not nearly so likely as they used to be to find a worm, or half a worm, in their apple.

The apple worm—or codling moth—problem appears to be on its way out as a major concern in apple growing. DDT has proved an effective spray. In fact, in some isolated orchards that do not draw moths from unsprayed or poorly sprayed trees nearby, a good early spray program with DDT may so reduce codling moths that there is no need to spray against a second brood.

But DDT has not proved a full solution to the apple insect problem. It does not make a clean sweep of all the pests. Thus DDT sprays permit a buildup of some pests that it does not control—the apple mites, for instance. The problem shifts, but a problem remains. The mites do not cause wormy apples, but the apples are smaller and of a poorer color.

However, the new insecticide parathion is making an impressive showing against nearly all the apple pests. Federal entomologists say that it can not yet be recommended for general use, that considerable more controlled and expert testing is needed. This is because the insecticide is an extremely poisonous material and may hold public health hazards.

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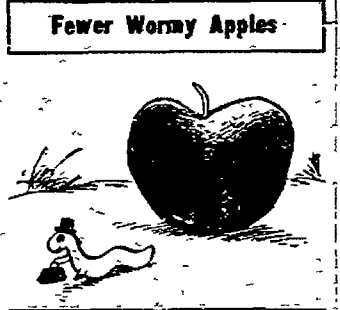
