"To save lives and money, these pillars must be reversed," Dr. Howard said. "This means accelerating efforts to uncover TB among apparently healthy people, since early tuberculosis usually has no symptoms." The meeting was held at Michigan-Tuberculosis Association headquarters in Lansing.

## Proposed Community Building Will Not Solve School Needs

Editors Note: (This is the third in a series of articles dealing with the problem of sufficient classrooms for the Grade building and the solution being worked out by the Board of Education. Next week's article will discuss the proposed plans for the nine room addition to the present Grade school building.)

The Grade school is in serious need of additional class room space. Would the proposed Community Building offer a solution to this space problem and avoid the necessity of a building program by the school district? The answer, of course, depends upon the facilities to be offered by such a building, and its availability in the near future.

When the possibility of the village receiving annually a fairly substantial sum from harness racing became a reality, plans were made for the use of the funds in a manner that would be of lasting benefit to the entire community. A building for the use of the community seemed the best solution and a planning commission was appointed to select an architect and work out the plans. The needs of the village, the school, the recreation program etc. were considered.

The plans made at that time have borne fruit in two respects.

First of all, the village has acquired the property between the fire hall and the high school. Secondly, there are blue prints prepared for community building when the village is ready to build. This building is to be erected on Main street next to the high school and is designed to provide the following: a combination gymnasium — auditorium, shower and locker facilities, cafeteria and kitchen for serving lunches to pupils or other groups and diners in the gym, rooms with folding doors for use by the music department of the high school and other groups with a large room for a "teen age" canteen.

It is the general understanding that the village will build such a building when the funds are available and permit the school to use it in return for furnishing heat and providing janitor service. The school board has planned to remove the old furnaces in the high school as a safety as well as an efficiency measure and heat that building along with the new one from a heating plant to be erected at the rear.

These plans are all very fine as long range plans but the Grade school has been facing a room shortage for a number of years which becomes acute this fall when all available space in the three houses on Main street will be filled. The need for class rooms is in the Grade school and construction of the community building this summer, if that was possible, would not directly or indirectly fill that need.

Sufficient rooms would not be provided with a new building of this type, the present gym in the high school could be converted to class rooms and various schemes to shuffle classes around have been devised but none offer a good, practical solution. This should not be taken to mean that the school board and school administration do not favor the proposed community building. On the contrary, they endorse the program but are of the opinion that any action by the village at this time will not solve their own problem of grade school class space.

As a practical matter there has not yet been accumulated by the village, sufficient funds for such a building. It will be a number of years before construction can be started. The present village commission is favorably inclined toward the project but wants to make certain that there is enough money on hand or in sight to pay for it. The school board does not criticize this attitude but feels that under all circumstances it should formulate and proceed with its own plans which are to construct an addition to the present Grade building.

## Authorities Cite Holiday Hazards

Take it easy on the long Memorial Day weekend.

The very things you enjoy the most may be the greatest hazards to your health and life during the holiday, unless you use some caution, the Michigan Department of Health warned.

Dive with care and avoid excess in eating, drinking, swimming, fishing, golfing, and any other form of exercise, it advised.

Roads will be flooded with traffic. Have your car checked if you plan to do any driving — brakes, horns, lights, tires, windshield wipers, and steering mechanism. Obey traffic laws and signs and give the other fellow your right of way.

Do not plan to drive if you are going to do any drinking. Safety experts say that drinking is involved in more than half of traffic accidents.

Good restaurants which are open during the holiday will be filled to capacity. Be careful that any perishable foods, such as salads and sandwich fillings, in your picnic lunch are carefully and cleanly prepared, and are kept cold. You can get food poisoning from your picnic basket as well as in an unclean restaurant. Drink water only from a municipal or other approved supply and use only pasteurized milk and milk products.

Take your sunning in short intervals, you can burn under a cloudy sky on a cool day and you burn more quickly on, in or near water. Lake water will be cold, go in slowly. Stay out of swift water; do not swim alone or show off. Do not swim alone or stand up in your small boat, or go out on a lake when a storm threatens.

Remember that a little golfing, softball, tennis, swimming or rowing is a considerable strain on even the middle-aged heart at the beginning of the season. Ride only a horse you can handle, and fly only with a competent pilot in a fully serviced aircraft.

Memorial Day is a time to remember the dead, not to join them.

## Annual Poppy Day To Be Observed

Saturday will be Poppy Day in Northville and throughout the nation.

They are crepe-paper replicas of the wild poppies which grew on the battlefields in Europe where so many Americans gave their lives in both world wars. Making them has provided a gainful employment and valuable occupational therapy for thousands of veterans in hospitals and convalescent workshops in all parts of the country during the past winter and spring.

Snow-white against the green rolling hills of Arlington the headstones mark the resting places of men of three wars who died to make men free. Not far away, in Alexandria, lies another—marking the Unknown Soldier of the American Revolution. All over America, all over the world, there are others. Some gleam white; some are gray, worn with time.

The park facing the White Horse memorializes the Frenchman, Lafayette. In the park stands a statue to the Pole, Pulaski; another for the German, Von Steuben. "Let us die to make men free."

Why are men willing to die for freedom in war but unwilling to pay the smaller price to keep their freedom in peace? Why do they march, gun on shoulder, to battle but fail to march, pen in hand, to the polls? Why do they fight through the flame and steel of the foreigners' guns and bombs but cringe before the anticipated blast of the embattled politician in their home town?

As we honor the Frenchman Lafayette, the Pole, Pulaski, the German Von Steuben, do we forget that their countrymen, too, have often died for freedom, and as often seen it snatched from them by enemies from within?

Freedom lost must be again won by the courage of these willing to die. Freedom won must be retained by the courage of those willing to live by the ideals for which the others died. Freedom rests not on guns, money or modern plumbing. Its foundation is no stronger than the hearts of the men who would be free. Wars end. The battle for freedom never ends.

It is right to pause on Memorial Day to honor our dead and the families who gave them to the cause of freedom. But, my friend, you cannot pay your debt to them with a garland of flowers, a moment of silent prayer, a parade and a firing squad. Look in the mirror into your own eyes. Ask yourself, "What am I doing, today, in my town, to hold safe the freedom they held so dear?"

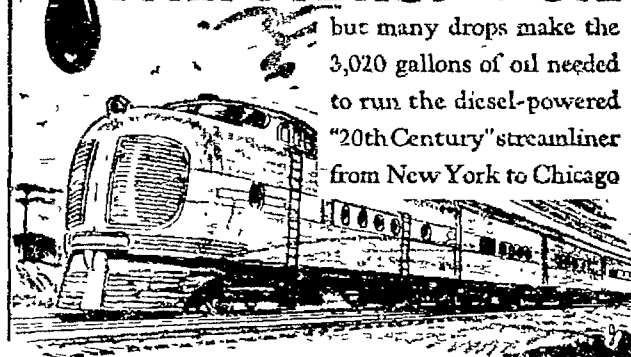

## Cite Danger of Shoe Fitting Machines

Indiscriminate and too frequent use of fluoroscopic shoe-fitting machines is dangerous to health of the shoe store employee and customer alike, the Division of Industrial Health, Michigan Department of Health warned today.

Fluoroscopic shoe-fitting machines should not be used as playthings, nor be operated by customers.

No individual should have fluoroscopic fittings more than 12 times a year, and each exposure should be limited to five seconds.

The Division of Industrial Health has investigated the potential hazards of fluoroscopic shoe-fitting machines and is now in the process of checking all the machines in use in the state.

Some machines, particularly of the older type which are not properly shielded or leak stray radiation into the area around them. This is particularly hazardous for employees who are exposed to the rays eight hours a day. Older machines are the most apt to be faulty. The Division hopes to check these machines first. To protect the health of their employees and their customers, owners of these older machines should immediately request the services of the Division of Industrial Health by writing to the Michigan Department of Health, Lansing 4, Michigan.
