U-M Graduation Set for June 11

Thousands of proud parents, former students, and graduates will take part in University of Michigan Commencement, Alumni Reunions, and Alumni University activities, June 9-17.

Commencement on Saturday, June 11, will be the principal event for the graduates and their parents. The exercises will be held in the open on Ferry Field at 5 o'clock in the afternoon, weather permitting. In case of rain, the program will be held in Yost Field House.

Justice Bruce Dittus Bromley, of the New York State Court of Appeals, will be the commencement speaker. His topic will be "The Conservative's Role in America." The graduating class will be the largest in history, with 3,882 tentatively scheduled to receive degrees.

Alumni reunions will begin on Thursday, June 9. Members of the 50-year class of 1899, will be honored by induction into the Eminent Club, while the "youngest" class to hold a reunion will be that of 1944.

Highlights of the alumni festivities will be an All-Class Dinner at the Michigan Union Thursday night, with Dean of Students Erich A. Walter as speaker; an Alumni Luncheon at the Michigan League Friday noon; alumni reception at the home of President and Mrs. Alexander G. Ruthven Friday afternoon; Alumni Sing on the steps of the General Library and an All-Class Dance at the Barton Hills Country Club Friday night; and the Alumni Luncheon Saturday noon with President Ruthven as speaker. Alumni Distinguished Service Awards will also be announced at the final luncheon.
