
The bride wore a white silk gown with crystal trim and a corsage of pink carnations with blue bows.

WCTS Cow Sets New Production Record

The Wayne County Training School, Northville, is the owner of a registered Holstein cow which has further added to her outstanding lifetime production of more than 100,000 pounds of milk. Her name is Wacots Princess Ina and her production records are officially recorded by the Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

In 10 yearly milking periods this animal has produced a total of 158,855 pounds of milk and 5314 pounds of butterfat. Her highest single record was made at the age of 6 years 5 months when she produced 28,781 pounds of milk and 695 pounds of butterfat.

All her records were made under supervision of Michigan State College of Agriculture in cooperation with the national Holstein organization.

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
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

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The spread of anthrax in farm animals is favored when there are heavy rains followed by dry periods and extreme heat, along with an abundance of flies.
State game farms in 22 states raise or buy pheasants for stocking programs according to a survey made by the Massachusetts conservation department.

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Farmington—One of the lightest votes in the history of the Farmington and Clarenceville School Districts was recorded last Monday in the Annual Election of Board members. Grand Ledge—More than \$2500 in prizes, cash and commissions, including a new 1949 Chevrolet two-door Styleline Sedan, will be awarded by the Grand Ledge Independent, in a mammoth subscription contest which opens Friday for the enrollment of contestants.

Grand Ledge—The city council at its regular meeting Monday night, found the matter of curbs and gutters taking up most of the business. After much discussion, the council decided to employ an engineer to prepare the plans for the construction of the curbs and gutters for which they have received petitions.

Plymouth—Members of the city commission met last Tuesday night to certify the results of the city election on Monday, and were presented with a petition demanding the immediate removal of Manager Harold Check. The petition was presented to the commission by Clifford Tiltonson who acted on behalf of the Plymouth Citizens League, chaired by Kenneth Gust.

Plymouth—The largest class in

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the history of Plymouth High school was presented with diplomas at commencement exercises in the auditorium Thursday, June 16. Two hundred and sixteen pupils received diplomas.

Howell—Eighty-four seniors received diplomas at the first annual commencement exercises of Howell high school at the auditorium, Thursday evening, June 16, at 8:15. The speaker was Stephen S. Nisbet, president of the State Board of Education, whose topic was "Which Way?" Superintendent John S. Page presented the diplomas.

Howell—The season's first crowning in Livingston county occurred at 1:45 p. m. Sunday at the state park bathing beach at Island Lake. William Dombrowski, Jr. 23, of Detroit was the victor.

Ithaca—Pertinent facts on why they believe the Gratiot county veterans counseling center should be maintained on a permanent basis will be presented to the county board of supervisors at their regular June meeting, opening Monday, June 27. This decision was reached at a meeting of interested veterans and taxpayers held last Monday evening at the counseling center in Alma.

Ithaca—About 300 persons crowded in the Ithaca high school gymnasium last Monday night, June 13, to eat and enjoy the Mexican dinner that was sponsored by the Gratiot County Council of Chu ches on behalf of the Mexican migrant school.

Chick—Graduation week activities closed Wednesday night, June 8, when diplomas were awarded to 52 seniors and to three young servicemen who completed tests under the Veterans General Education Development plan. The latter three are Raymond J. McHenry, James H. Bailey, and Alvin A. Geer.

Birmingham—Dr. Kenneth I. Brown, president of Denison University in Granville, Ohio, will address the 145 members of the Baldwin high school graduating class Thursday morning at 10:00 in the Birmingham Theatre. His topic will be "You spell Education with Two I's."

Birmingham—School electors

returned Board of Education President Ernest W. Seaholm to his fifth term in last Monday's annual school election. Seaholm defeated Merrill C. Miner, 438 to 158.

Ann Arbor—Only 828 persons—about 17 per cent of Ann Arbor's registered voters—cast their ballots in last Monday's school board election in which incumbent Prof. Ford led the field with 620 votes.

South Lyon—South Lyon and community was shocked and grieved last week to learn of the sudden death of one of its prominent, respected citizens—Mrs. L. W. Stanbro, who suffered a severe stroke in her home on Wednesday morning, June 8, and passed away early the next morning, June 9, without having gained consciousness. She was 73 years of age.

South Lyon—In the annual election of the Township School District of Lyon Township held last Monday, one hundred and eighteen ballots were cast. Both members of the Board of Education whose terms expire July 1 were re-elected to office. Robert F. McCrory polling 95 votes, O. R. McGary 80 votes, and Rolland M. Bringle, the third candidate, received 37 votes. The annual business meeting of qualified electors of the district convened at 8:30 in the high school building. About fifty people were present.

Ann Arbor—A gift of \$100,000 to establish a course of study leading to a master's degree in conservation was accepted Friday by the University of Michigan Board of Regents. The gift, from the Charles Lathrop Park Forestry Foundation, will be made in grants of \$10,000 a year for ten years.

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
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

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Loading in attendance was the Holland State park. It is estimated that 1,800,000 people enjoyed its facilities. Forty-four thousand permits to camp (tent and trailers) were issued by all parks. Camping is free, too. A small charge is made for electricity.

These parks are administered by the parks and recreation division of the state conservation department. Arthur C. Elmer is division chief.

Because of their popularity with Michigan residents and

out-of-state tourists, the park system has plenty of headaches. For one thing, the parks range in size from 11 acres to the 60,000-acre Porcupine Mountains State Park at Ontonagon and Geogebic counties. They include bathing beaches at Grand Haven, Holland and Warren Dunes; historic sites such as Fort Wilkins in the Copper County's scenic Keweenaw peninsula, natural phenomena such as the Kitch-i-ki-pi Spring in the Palms Book State Park.

Michigan's state park system has grown like Topsy. A 2-acre tract of timber and dunes in Leelanau County near Glen Arbor, the gift of David H. Day (then chairman of the state conservation commission) started the ball rolling in 1920. Other picnic and camping spots were added from time to time. Michigan now has 60 parks — all sizes, some good, some poor.

The conservation department would like to return 20 to counties for local recreational use. But local legislators howl to the heavens whenever the suggestion is made. And so the department spreads the legislative appropriation around the best it can.

The state park division, now with 144,000 acres of park and recreational land to administer, asked the legislature for \$2,344,000 to make possible long-planned capital improvements. Much of this money was to be used to develop the southeastern Michigan recreational program in Metropolitan Detroit area.

The legislature was on the spot twice the voters had voted to return 78 per cent of the state sales tax revenue back to local governments. With insufficient money in the state treasury to meet even the growing needs of the university and colleges, the legislature sliced the \$23 million request down to \$50,000—almost nothing!

On paper the state park system has a development program which would put Michigan well into the lead nationally. The parks would attract more tourists to Michigan the \$16 million cost would be more than repaid by additional out-of-state dollars received by businessmen everywhere. Yet to date, the legislature has appropriated only \$175 million in the past four years.

The state treasury squeeze caused by curbing of state funds for local government spending, is working the state park plan. The \$991,000 maintenance budget cut from an original \$1,170,000 request must be spread over 60 parks.

Enhanced and hunter contributions to development of special facilities through purchase of licenses. Yet the state park system, maintaining the fishermen and hunters six to one in total attendance has no revenue of its own derived from those who enjoy it.

The state department was again rebuffed by the legislature in 1949 when it asked discretionary authority to charge admission and use fees, if and when and where needed. Legislators were skeptical, hesitant and reluctant. The bill died in committee. The department is about convinced that broad discretionary power is not the answer to the park financing problem. Perhaps use fees, limited to specified facilities, would be more acceptable.

The Straits of Mackinac-state park, administered by the Mackinac Island park commission, is self-supporting through small use fees for camping and electricity. No charge is made for parking or for admission. Here is perhaps a partial answer to the lack of money to develop the state park system as the legislature originally planned.

"We have the lands and waters, the physical features and the climate," said Elmer, state park chief. "We need funds to develop

the facilities needed for public recreation and for the proper maintenance and operation of these facilities."

When you visit the state parks this summer, don't be too critical. There are 60 parks, good and poor, large and small, to be maintained. Everything is free—admission, camping, bathing, and automobile parking. You shouldn't have much trouble getting your money's worth!

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
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
