During your leisure time travel on Michigan state highways this summer, don't be surprised if you encounter miles of worn-out roads.

In fact, be surprised if you don't.

The state 3-cent gasoline tax and other revenue sources afford about \$36-million in road money for the fiscal year ending this June 30. That seems like a lot of money, but it really isn't so much, as Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler readily proves.

From this amount \$700,000 are required for general administration, \$5 million for engineering and supervision, \$14 million for highway and bridge maintenance and operation, and \$500,000 to cover operating loss of state ferries at the Straits of Mackinac, says Commissioner Ziegler.

This leaves a balance of only \$15,750,000 of state funds for highway and bridge new construction.

struction and reconstruction, as well as to meet unforeseen emergencies not in our program such as the immediate replacement of three bridges which collapsed this year.

"The legislature has approved a budget item of \$2,500,000 to start construction of a double-ended ice-breaker ferry needed to handle adequately the increased traffic volume across the Straits of Mackinac both winter and summer. Money spent on construction of this ferry must also come out of the funds available for highway construction."

Lack of finances do not permit the state highway department to provide for normal depreciation of its trunkline system of 9,400 miles. "We should be spending \$25 millions each year in order to take care of depreciation only," said Ziegler. "We still have about \$160 million of high-deficiencies today. Finances have not been adequate."

"From 1942 through 1945 regular highway construction was impossible because of war restrictions, but depreciation was stepped up by unprecedented traffic made necessary by wartime emergencies. Government statistics show that 73 per cent of all war production transportation in Michigan moved over Michigan highways."

"In 1946, immediately after the war, we expected to get our post-war construction programs under way. We could not do so because of the impossibility of getting cement, steel, new equipment and other materials. Therefore, we had four years of war plus 1946 or five years when there was no new normal highway construction."

Cost of Michigan Highway work has risen steadily from 1941 through the war years to 1949. Today, our highway costs are 110% above the costs of 1941. One dollar today purchases less than one-half what it did in 1941.

"Two lane 22-foot pavements, which carried traffic satisfactorily in 1941, are inadequate to handle properly and safely the greatly increased volume. In 1941 we were building these normal two-lane pavements, including preliminary grading and drainage structures, for from \$40 to \$45 thousand dollars per mile. A mile of the same width of concrete pavement today, increased some in thickness and more heavily reinforced to stand the heavier industrial traffic, is costing about \$100 thousand dollars per mile."

"Ordinarily divided highways with a two-lane pavement in both directions cost about \$200 (one and a half million) per mile in a rural section. Because of the number of railroad and street grade separations and the high cost of necessary right-of-way in Detroit, the 10 1/2 mile section of the Ford and Lodge expressways we are now working on costs about 6 1/2 million dollars per mile. The state must pay \$2 to match \$1 of federal aid for right-of-way purchases."

There is inflation also in highway use. Passenger car traffic is up nearly 25 per cent compared with 1941, industrial traffic is up 50 per cent. More heavy trucks and buses pound the pavement.

Commissioner Ziegler has favored the Good Roads Federation program for an increase in the state gasoline tax. He points out that Michigan is one of three states which have a 3-cent gasoline tax; that the average tax of all states on Jan. 1, 1949 was 5 1/2 cents per gallon; that since Jan. 1, 1949 a total of 14 states increased the gas tax load so that the average is now approximately 6 1/2 cents a gallon—double that of Michigan.

If all state roads are not ideal, just remember this: Better roads and higher taxes go hand in hand.

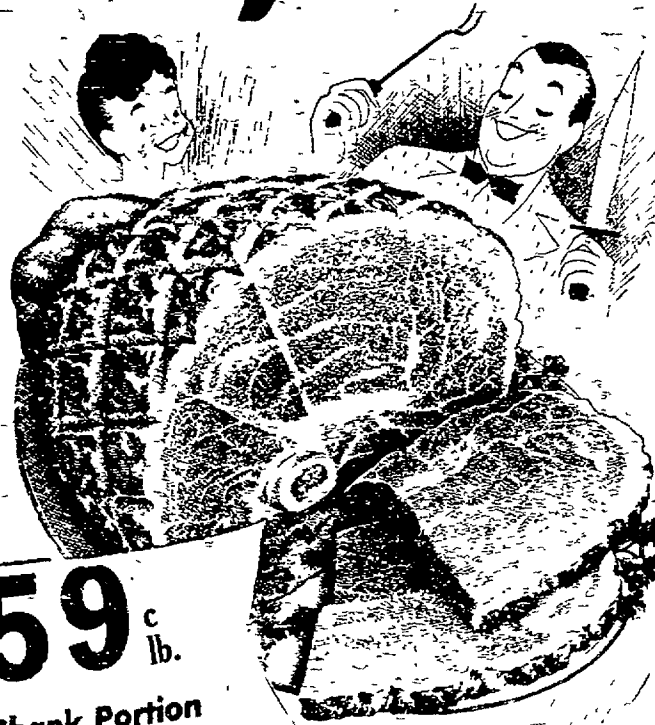

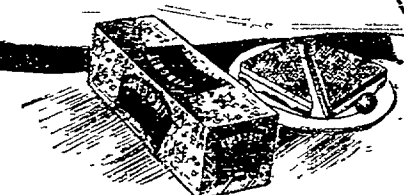

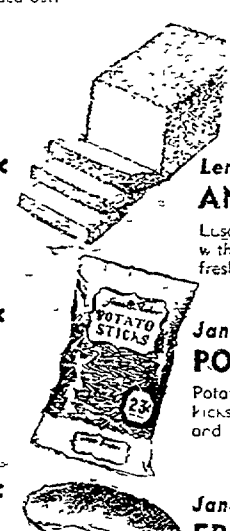

Good Clean Pasture Helps Poultry Men

Home Grown Feeds Cut Operating Cost

Good clean pasture and plenty of home grown feeds for your pullet crop pays dividends in more eggs, lower production costs and bigger poultry profits. The use of range shelters, range feeders and barrel waterers makes such a program easily possible.

Missouri university tests show that pullets on well-fertilized alfalfa pasture consumed 17 per cent less feed than birds on bare range. The pasture-fed pullets heeded less feed for each pound of gain. Birds on clean pasture were healthier

and more energetic. Mortality rate was lower and there were fewer culls. Out of 100 pullets at four weeks of age, 94 of the alfalfa-ranged birds later went into the laying house, compared to 70 of those raised on bare ground. Poultry university tests showed that ladino clover with corn and small grains provided a complete ration for laying flocks.

Getting good pasture and a cheap and plentiful supply of grain is a matter of putting farm soil in shape to produce bigger yields per acre. For this, you need a rotation in which deep rooted legumes and grasses are key stone. You need to build up the organic matter supply via plowed-under legumes, crop residues and manure. You need to feed the soil a good ration of plant nutrients, so it, in turn, can feed the crops. In such a program, fertilizer is an important member of the soil-building team.

At current prices, eggs will buy nearly twice as much fertilizer as 10 years ago. It takes only 80 dozen eggs to buy a ton of 3-12-12 fertilizer today, whereas it took 170 dozen back in 1939.

Check Work Stock



Owners of the 5,000 horses and rules on Maryland farms have been urged to check intake valves, remove carbon from the cylinder and adjust the carburetor.

These items are as needed as one might think. Joseph M. Tal, extension animal husbandman explained that a horse's mouth and teeth may be compared to intake valves on a tractor. The teeth need to be floated (just as the intake valve needs to be properly seated) if they are to meet evenly and let the horse chew his feed properly.

Just as tractors are troubled with carbon in the cylinders horses may have trouble with internal parasites. These may be removed by any competent veterinarian and the horse will be a better worker during the coming summer.

The carburetor on the tractor adjusts fuel supply to the work load. For horses, this is accomplished by getting them in proper condition before the heavy work load comes via recommendations this be done by "feeding the horse a handful of oil meal with his grain at this time of year to keep him in good condition and by giving him as many jobs to do as possible, such as spreading manure or hauling logs.

Other recommendations include: "Keep water in his cooling system, keep his tires in good condition by having him properly shod and see that his harness fits."

Farm Record Keepers Told of "Short Cut"

It's easier to keep up than to catch up," advises Clara Leopold, extension home management specialist at the University of Nebraska, to the home and farm account record keeper. Another hint, she says, is to keep a pencil attached to the account records.

According to Miss Leopold, a certain time each day should be set aside to jot down the daily transactions.

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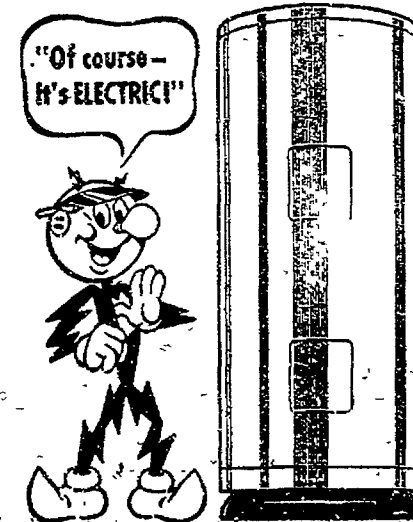

The controversial amendment provided that "not more than two-thirds of the number appointed to judgeships shall be members of the same political party. The other one-third may be chosen from any minority party available or an independent."

Precedent prevailed throughout many years of our history and a non-partisan balance was maintained—similar to the precedent of not more than two terms for a president. Tradition set the rule. At present, out of 163 Federal judgeships, 162 are Democrats, seven are Republicans. Today there is but one Republican Justice out of nine in the U. S. Supreme Court. The two great political parties in the U. S. are however, about evenly divided.

William Howard Taft, when President, elevated to the Chief Justiceship of the U. S. Supreme Court, Edward Douglas White, a Louisiana Democrat and a Confederate veteran. Chief Justice White was a brilliant and able judge. There were many learned Republican lawyers and judges whom President Taft could have appointed, but he chose to preserve the balance and non-partisanship of the Court.

"This policy had the confidence and respect of the American people, and preserved the integrity of our courts in the administration of justice."

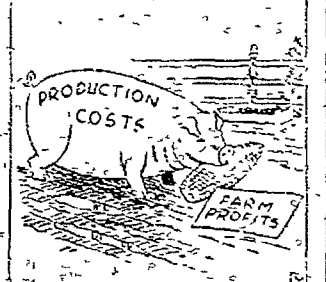

Improvement of Land Cuts Production Cost

Margin Between Return, Expenses Is Narrowing

Higher production costs now being experienced by farmers emphasize the need for farmers to get their land in shape to produce more bushels at lower unit costs per acre, the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee points out.

The reason between what a farmer gets for his crops and what it costs him to produce them is narrowing steadily. Commodities used



As farm production have more than doubled in price since 1939. Prices of grain and field crops have declined steadily since early 1948.

The committee declared that "greater crop production efficiency is the answer to lower farm prices and higher production costs." Crop production can be increased by "put back" soil management methods and "holding" operations. "Put back" methods include rebuilding the soil's organic matter supply by growing deep-rooted legumes in the rotation. They suggest replacing phosphate and potash dressing off by compost raw manure. They also recommend putting a barnyard manure bed on the field and plowing sugar corn soil, straw and other left.

Wire Recorder Check

When a purchased wire recorder falls into a net on the floor and Nelson breeding farm at Kelleys Ford, Mich., it is its own way, a long poultry story.

Belonging to the approximately 10,000 birds on the farm, the most modern wire recorder, could be expected to then every day. As far as the four partitions in the business, it is the first that so many chickens have become victims of a wire recorder.

Use of the recorder has resulted in a saving of time and money and records have never been so accurate, according to Art Heisler, who with his wife, Mary, and the Nelson brothers, Bert and Clifford, operate the farm.

It was Art's branch to use the recorder in "running traps" - checking up on the hens to find out which ones are laying and which ones are "lying."

It's done this way: Four days a week, the trap is set. When the hen crawls in a nest a trap door closes behind her. She can't get out until one of the partners lets her out. Each hen then is given a number which is on a metal tab placed around her leg. When anyone "runs the traps", he wears a small microphone, presses the small mike button and states the number of the bird's tag, and then gives the number of eggs laid and any other pertinent information about the bird.

Many Conditions Affect Poultry Flock Breeding

There are several conditions which can affect the fertility of a breeding poultry flock. Experts say it is a good plan to wait for a week or 10 days after males have been put with the flock before starting to save eggs that are to be used for hatching.

Weather conditions, vigor of males, size of flock, condition of layers, and number of males are some of the important factors.

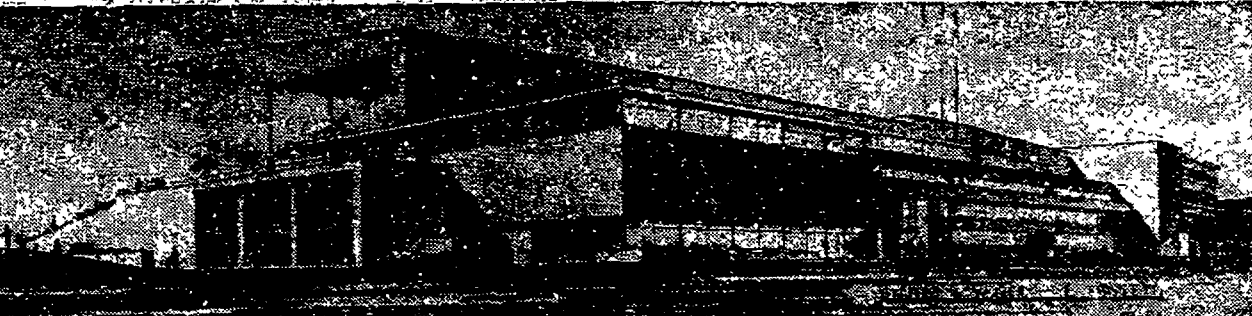

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Weed Sprays Not Sued to Garden

No substitute has yet been found for the hoe in controlling weeds in the backyard garden, says Jack Rose, extension specialist in horticulture at Michigan State College.

Though chemicals have been developed to control weeds in commercial plantings of beets,

which are not used in home gardens, they cannot be used in the small home garden where many varieties of crops grow close together.

One which will meet weeds in crops without injury to the crops, kills weeds and other crops. Salt solutions which may safely be used on beets will destroy most other vegetables which may be growing in the next row. The excellent lawn herbicide, 2,4-D, will destroy almost all vegetable crops except corn and will damage most ornamentals.

A sharp hoe is still the most effective means of weed control in small plots. Keeping a sharp edge on the tool reduces the effort needed to do a good job, Rose advises. In large gardens, wheel hoes on which are mounted sweeps will do an excellent job and save much time and labor.

Hold Special Courses in Poultry in July

Poultry flock selection and blood testing schools will be held at Michigan State College from July 7 through July 15. Howard Zindel, poultry extension specialist, says the advanced school will be July 7 and 8 and the basic school July 11 through July 15.

Schools are designed to train hatchery operators, flock owners and others in disease control, selection of better breeding flocks and good management practices.

Through such schools, and more hatcheries operating under the National Poultry Improvement Plan, Michigan has been able to reduce the pullorum disease rates. In 1947, tests showed nearly 3 per cent of the birds in nearly two thousand flocks reactors. The 1949 tests, recently completed, showed only 1.16 per cent of more than a half million birds as reactors.

Under the turkey breeding blood testing program a similar rate of progress was shown. In 1948 when only 89 flocks were tested there were 2.8 per cent reactors. During 1949 a total of 132 flocks were tested but the reactors amounted to only 1.06 per cent.

Michigan has made continued progress in its control of diseases and improvement of the type as well as health of baby chicks and points being sold to farmers and flock owners, Michigan State College poultrymen report.

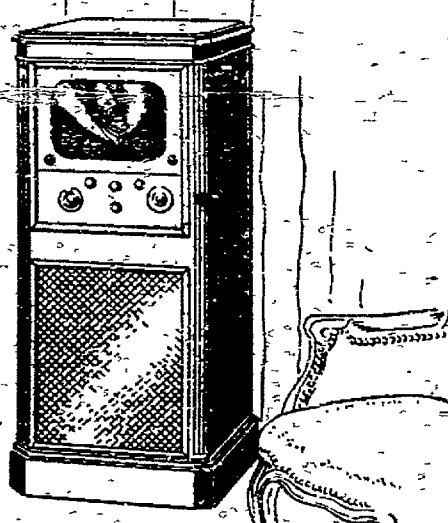
