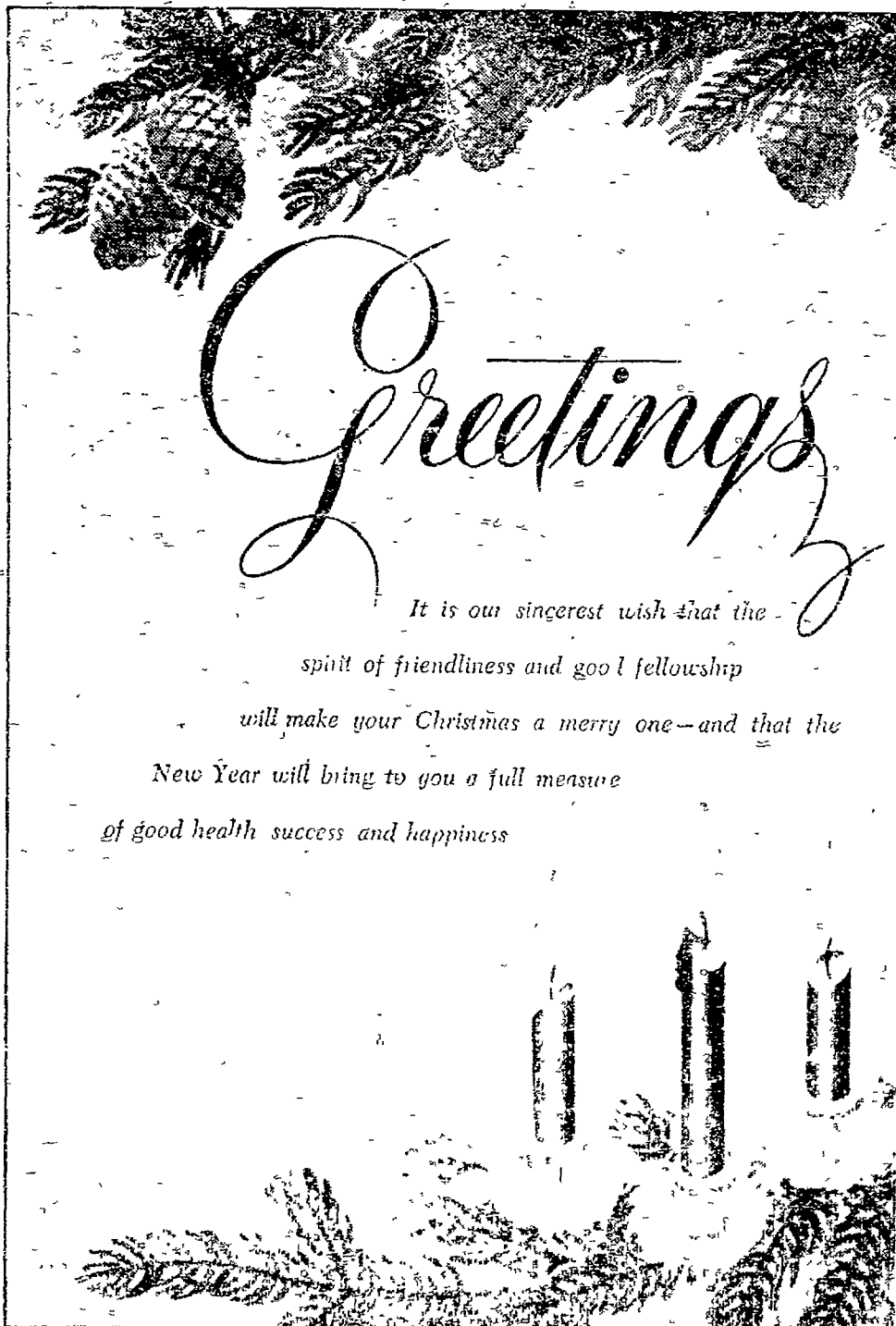

The chorus, under the direction of Leslie G. Lee, was made up of about 90 persons from the community. The "Messiah" is an oratorio by George Frideric Handel, an English composer, and the first part of it was performed in 1741. It is a dramatic oratorio, and is one of the most popular of all oratorios. It is a story of the life and death of Jesus Christ, and is set to music by Handel. It is a masterpiece of the oratorio form, and is one of the greatest works of the baroque period.

Kroger Gives 500 German Orphans American Breakfast



Five hundred German children from three Frankfurt, Germany, orphanages were served breakfast last week by the Kroger company. For many of the children, ranging in age from two to 12, it was their first fresh-egg and bacon breakfast. Nat'l Guard Gives Training Dates

Field training dates for both army and air units of the Michigan National Guard during 1950 have been announced by the Adjutant General's office.

Michigan's 4th Infantry Division and attached units commanded by Major General Ralph A. Loveland of Ann Arbor will train at Camp Grayling from August 12 to 26, according to plans approved by Fifth Army Headquarters, Detroit's 146th AAA Battalion and the Upper Peninsula's 593rd AAA Battalion will train from August 5 to 19 on the anti-aircraft ranges at Camp Haven, Wisconsin.

Most of Michigan's Air Guard units are scheduled to take their field training at the Grayling Air Base from July 22 to August 3. This will include Detroit's 171st and Battle Creek's 172nd Fighter Squadrons, commanded by Lt. Colonel Donald W. Armstrong. The 107th Bomb Squadron and supporting units from Detroit will train from July 23 to August 6 at Camp Williams, Wisconsin.

Ten other states in the Tenth Air Force area are expected to send Air Guard units to train in Michigan during June, July and August of 1950. Michigan's air bases to be used in addition to Grayling include Selfridge and Oscoda.

Inflation, such as this country has experienced over the past decade, is not prosperity, even though a man has more than twice as many dollars, to jingle in his pocket.
 It looks, in fact, as if now the fifty-cent dollar has caught up with the American consumer, employers and wage-earners alike. Proof of this may be found in facts and figures recently made public by the Labor Department's Bureau of Labor Statistics.
 Statistics issued by the bureau covering wages as related to taxes and living costs show that in July, 1939, average weekly

earnings of industrial employees stood at \$23.86 and in July, 1949, at \$53.66.
 Thus in 1939 average annual wages totaled \$1,240.72 with \$124.11 withheld for the one percent social security tax, leaving take home pay of \$1,116.61. No income tax was levied then at this income level. In 1949 the annual average was \$2,790.32 with \$334.20 withheld for federal social security and income taxes, leaving \$2,456.12 in take-home pay.
 But the dollar today has only about half the buying power it had in 1939. Therefore the effective, take-home pay, in terms of food, clothing, shelter, and other goods today is approximately \$1,228.06. All other things being equal, the average wage earner can buy no more than he did in 1939.

While serious water shortages plague New York and other areas in the nation there is no cause for present alarm in Michigan.

State conservation department hydrologists make this reassuring statement through Michigan ground water levels are not unusually low for this time of year.

The November average stage of 93 of a foot was the lowest recorded by the department's geological survey division since it started regular checking of ground water levels 16 years ago.
