Kroger Gives 500 German Orphans American Breakfast



Five hundred German children from three Frankfurt, Germany, orphanages were served breakfast last week by the Kroger company. For many of the children, ranging in age from two to 12, it was their first fresh-egg and bacon breakfast. Kroger shipped 60 dozen eggs and 60 pounds of bacon to Frankfurt on the inaugural flight of American Airlines strato-ruler to that city. Nat'l Guard Gives Training Dates

Field training dates for both army and air units of the Michigan National Guard during 1950 have been announced by the Adjutant General's office.

Michigan's 4th Infantry Division and attached units commanded by Major General Ralph A. Loveland of Ann Arbor will train at Camp Grayling from August 12 to 26, according to plans approved by Fifth Army Headquarters, Detroit's 146th AAA Battalion and the Upper Peninsula's 593d AAA Battalion will train from August 5 to 19 on the anti-aircraft ranges at Camp Haven, Wisconsin.

Most of Michigan's Air Guard units are scheduled to take their field training at the Grayling Air Base from July 22 to August 3. This will include Detroit's 171st and Battle Creek's 172nd Fighter Squadrons, commanded by Lt. Colonel Donald W. Armstrong. The 107th Bomb Squadron and supporting units from Detroit will train from July 23 to August 6 at Camp Williams, Wisconsin.

Ten other states in the Tenth Air Force area are expected to send Air Guard units to train in Michigan during June, July and August of 1950. Michigan's air bases to be used in addition to Grayling include Selfridge and Oscoda.

December Named Most Deadly Month

With Christmas at hand, Sgt. Henry P. Kozowicz, of the Detroit post of the Michigan State Police, is urging drivers and pedestrians alike to be unusually careful and not let death take their holiday.

Pointing out that last year 21 persons were killed in traffic accidents in Michigan on the day before Christmas, Sgt. Henry Kozowicz said that "December, the merriest month of the year, is also the most deadly."

"We are now in the most dangerous period of the month," he continued. "Last December there was an average of more than six traffic deaths a day or a total of 195 for the month. But of this total, 117 were killed during the last 15 days, an average of eight each day, and 76 of these lost their lives during the last eight days, an average of nearly 10 each day. The peak was reached with the tragic toll of 21 on the day before Christmas."


Sgt. Kozowicz said State Police records show that last winter the accident rate increased nearly 45 per cent and the death rate 50 per cent. These increases were due largely to added hazards such as slippery streets and highways, many hours of darkness, driving too fast for conditions, and vehicles with defective equipment.

Three-fourths of last winter's traffic fatalities occurred after dark, nearly half when roads were wet, snowy or icy, and 20 per cent when vision was obscured by sleet. More than half of the drivers were violating a traffic law.

One-third of all those killed were pedestrians.

"The accident rate goes up during the holidays because there is more traffic, people are in a hurry and become careless, and sometimes they celebrate too much," he stated. "With a little extra care and caution December, instead of being the most deadly month, could be more the safest and then indeed, it would be a merry Christmas."




earnings of industrial employees stood at \$23.86 and in July, 1949, at \$53.66.
 Thus in 1939 average annual wages totaled \$1,240.72 with \$12.41 withheld for the one percent social security tax, leaving take home pay of \$1,228.31. No income tax was levied then at this income level. In 1949 the annual average was \$2,790.32 with \$334.20 withheld for federal social security and income taxes, leaving \$2,456.12 in take-home pay.
 But the dollar today has only about half the buying power it had in 1939. Therefore the effective, take-home pay, in terms of food, clothing, shelter, and other goods today is approximately \$1,228.06. All other things being equal, the average wage earner can buy no more than he did in 1939.

Other things are not equal, however, having changed as much as wages have changed. For example, the Bureau of Labor Statistics maintains an index of wholesale prices, with 1926 prices used as a medium of 100. In July, 1939, the index stood at 75, and in July, 1949, it stood at 152.5. Wholesale prices more than doubled.

Over the decade from 1939 to 1949, retail prices of food and other living necessities have increased tremendously. For example, 41 pounds of food, comprising 10 pounds of sugar, 25 pounds of white flour and a pound each of coffee, butter, pork loin round steak, white bread and corn meal, cost \$2.68 in 1939 and \$5.88 in 1949. The increase is 19 per cent.

The width of your cornice may vary in relation to the height and width of the window—the idea being to obtain a pleasing appearance of proportion. The cornice should be wide enough so that when draperies are pulled back they can hang without covering any glass.

If your window is 30 inches wide, for instance, the top board of the cornice ought to be about 42 inches long. The end pieces, 6 inches wide, should be 7 1/2 inches long. The face board should be as long as the top board, plus 1 1/2 inches to show them to cover the end boards on each end.

So—You Know How To Roast A Turkey!

If you have roasted a turkey you are either convinced that you know all about it or nothing about it. Depending on your results.

To prepare the turkey for the oven, rub the inside cavity with salt. Stuff the neck and body cavity with your favorite dressing being careful not to pack the dressing in too tightly.

For a juicy tender bird do to a turn but not overcooked use a meat thermometer placed between the thigh and the body.



Another secret to tender, moist, roast turkey is the use of a slow oven (325° F). The following time table will help you to know when to put the bird in the oven.

Table with 2 columns: Weight of Bird - Min. Per Pound, Time. Rows: 8 to 10 pounds (25 to 30), 10 to 14 pounds (25 to 30), 14 to 18 pounds (25 to 30).

You will know that the turkey is done when the meat thermometer reads 185° F. or when the meat on the drumstick feels soft when pressed with the thumb and forefinger.

Arrange the turkey on a large platter so that the one who carves has plenty of space to work. For an attractive garnish sprinkle poultry or ground nutmeg with brown sugar and a little butter or margarine - lip them in the oven when you are roasting the turkey.


