

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

State Fire Law Now Has Strong Backing

Persons who give little heed to soil scientists' warnings about the damage spring burning does to soil fertility are asked by the conservation department to consider more obvious consequences

of setting fire to ground cover. First is substantial damage to fences. Charred posts and wire from which the galvanizing has been burned become useless long before their normal utility is ended.

Second is the liability of the man who starts the fire if the fire gets out of hand. If it gets into his neighbor's woodlot or outbuildings the cost may be greater. and less convenient to meet, than if it damaged his own property.

Pheasant and other wildlife nests also are destroyed if burning is carried on during the spring hatching season.


CAN DO

When Varnish **Gets Sticky**

SO OFTEN when a plain or garden variety home handyman undertakes the refinishing of a piece of furniture he winds up literally stuck with his work. That is to say, the varnish remains sticky, or tacky, so that, if the article happens to be a chair, clothing will adhere to it whenever anyone sits down.

By the time a guest or two has thus sat, and has arisen to the accompaniment of a sound that makes you believe the shirt is being ripped from his back, you will decided to do something about this condition.

Occasionally a wiping with cold water will take out the stickiness. At least the process is easy enough to be well worth a try before you go on to more difficult methods.



By the same token, you may be able to eliminate the trouble by wiping with turpentine. If that does not do the trick, you probably will have to remove the offending varnish with a commercial varnish remover preparation which you can obtain at your hardware store.


A word of caution. When you use varnish remover be verv sure to clean every bit of it off with turpentine before applying another coat of varnish or you'll find yourself with a sticky finish again. Varnish remover usually contains a waxy or paraffine ingredient that will check the hardening of new varnish on a surface, leaving the finish tacky.

There are, however, some newer types of varnish remover on the market which do not require a turpentire wash-off after use. Ask your hardware dealer about this in order to avoid any costly

EVEN a small hole in a window or door screen means that you have virtually no screen at all, in terms of its effectiveness in

keeping out flies and other insects. Probably, with screen-installing time only a few weeks away, you already have paid an inspection visit to the place where you have them stored. If so, you have rediscovered those few small holes that you had forgotten about you put the screens away last fall.

Although the best long range emedy here is to get new screening to replace the deteriorating sections, there is a handy patching trick that will fix the small holes temporarily.



From another piece of screen cut a patch a little larger than the hole to be mended. Now pull two strands from each of the four sides of the patch and bend the projecting wires at right angles to the patch. Place the patch over the hole, push the bent wire ends through the screen and fold them inwards to secure the patch. In order to make a tight seam all around, tap the wire folds lightly with a hammer, using a

wooden block as a support. Remember, however, that once screen wire begins to break down, causing small holes in one or two places, you can expect the same thing to happen in other spots because the screen wire probably is old and the metal has become "fatigued."





Chicken Top Prey **To Wild Animals**

Steady decline in predator damage complaints recorded by conservation department since 1946 halted last year with predatory animal control officers nvestigating 512 cases. Officers checked 459 cases in 1948, 546 in 1947 and 669 in 1946.

For the first time since 1944, the red fox lost out as chief domestic predator --- to the raccoon. The red fox was responsible for only 120 or 23 per cent of the damage complaints in 1949 while the raccoon was the culprit in 262 or more than 52 per cent of the cases.

The dog caught the blame in 4.7 per cent of the cases reported, badger 3.5, skunk 3.1 and bear 2.5. Others involved to a still lesser degree were mink, opossum, owl, weasel, housecat and Again the chicken was top



Desert rats that gather reserve feed, store it in shallow caches, and leave many of these undisturbed, are practically planters of the stored seed. This is one of the important causes of the rapid invasion of grassy range lands by mesquite shrub.

Mesquite, says the U.S. departagriculture, displaces forage grasses and reduces the beef and wool production. In areas in Arizona the number of mesquite shrubs to the acre have increased about 50 per cent in the past 15 years, according to a U.S. forest service report.

The Merriam kangaroo rat is a small rodent that lives in the arid areas of the southwest. The mesquite is one of its favorite foods.

The only known way to eliminate undulant fever in man is to eradicate the disease in domestic animals, according to W. W. Spink, professor of veterinary medicine at the University of Minnesota,

Prevention of undulant fever, or brucellosis, in man requires the pasteurization of all milk used for human consumption, Spink says. There is no way, he says, of prevention by immunizing.

Beef Herd Decision Problem in Corn Belt

DWhether or not to have a beef ities are anxious to sponsor teams herd is a long-time decision for the corn belt farmer. Under average corn belt condi-

tions, a cow can be credited for D. Nitzel a 450 pound calf at weaning time. For instance, if you had a 30-cow beef herd on a corn belt farm and a 90 per cent calf crop, you'd have 27 calves worth around \$135 each. Or, at 30 cents per pound, a four replacement heifers were kept Powerhouse 67 back, there'd be 23 calves worth \$3,100 and four cull cows, worth about \$1,000, to sell.

There would be a gross income of \$4,100 to cover the cost of maintaining a herd of 35 mature animals, including 30 cows, four heifers and one bull, or about \$117 per animal per year. 

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


