





# Highway Dept. **Judged Outstanding**

For the third consecutive year, the Michigan State Highway Department has been judged the outstanding highway department in the nation in traffic engineering, Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler has been advised by Robert S. Holmes, executive secretary of the international Institute of Traffic Engineers. A plaque denoting Michigan's leadership in the field of traffic engineering will be presented later to Commissioner Ziegler by a representative of

the Institute

California was selected as runner-up to Michigan. These two states were judged in a group made up of the larger states in the country. Smaller states were judged in other groups. The udging was based on traffic engineering performance for the rear 1949.

Michigan won the same award for the year 1947, first year it was made and tied for first place with Minnesota for the year 1948.

In making the award, the Institute, which is composed of leading traffic engineers of the leading traffic engineers of the country, takes into consideration all engineering functions of the competing state highway departments, including control devices, surveys and studies, lighting, intersectional design, planning and administration. 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

"lost" among 21,000 students on the University of Michigan campus, according to the president of the senior class in the University's School of Business Administration.

Jack R. Edman feels he is qualfied to speak objectively about the over-all size of the University since he came to the campus from Oxford, Mich., a town of 2,144 in the northern portion of Oakland County.

"Each student quickly fits into his own segment of the University insofar as the educational process is concerned and becomes more or less unaware of the throngs of students around the campus," Edman contends.
