## Motorists Urged to Obey Stop Signs

Chief Joe Denton today announced that the Northville Police Department is participating with the Michigan State Highway Department and the Michigan State Safety Commission in a program to save lives and prevent accidents by emphasizing the dangers resulting from failure to obey stop signs. The special importance of this problem is illustrated by State Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler's statement that "Every day millions of motorists travelling on the 107,000 miles comprising Michigan's highway system are dependent for their safety on stop sign protection, and that this situation has been made much more critical because since 1941 there has been an increase of 1/3 more traffic which has badly overloaded many of these highways."

According to Chief Denton several thousand of the most serious accidents in Michigan last year were due to a failure of motorists to obey stop signs.

Chief Denton urges all local organizations to cooperate in the campaign by stressing the importance of observing stop signs to their members.

In commenting on how to avoid stop sign accidents he said "The driver of a car approaching a stop sign has a responsibility to come to a full stop, look carefully to the right and left, and wait for a gap in traffic wide enough to permit safe entry". If all motorists will cooperate on this safety campaign by obeying stop signs, many lives can be saved, the Chief stated.

## L. Crusoe on Ford's Board of Directors

L. D. Crusoe of Nine Mile Road was one of five who were elected to the board of directors of the Ford Motor Company, it was announced by Henry Ford II, president of the company.

## Lt. Scott W. Cole Injured in Korea

The Korean war was brought home to Northville this week when the war department listed Lt. Scott W. Cole as slightly wounded in action.

Scott's mother, Mrs. Jean A. Cole of West Cady street Monday received a telegram from the war department stating that he was slightly injured in Korea.

Lt. Cole is in the 1st Cavalry Division and is the aide to General Hobart Gay. He recently accompanied the General on his goodwill tour to Formosa, Siam, Guam and Korea. Scott has been in Japan about three years and was recently moved to Korea. He is a World War II veteran.

## Plaxico Rated High at Detroit Track

Bob Plaxico, who has been bringing harness horses home in front for the last 35 years, is up to his old tricks in the current meeting at the Detroit Race Track.

In his first 18 starts at the Motor City oval, Plaxico had five winners, four seconds and four thirds, far and away the best percentage at the track. At 58 years of age, Plaxico is still indexed as one of the most daring and resourceful reinsmen in the business.

His long career is studded with achievements that few drivers have approached. He was the first pilot to score more than 60 victories in one season, and he believes he has driven more races and won oftener than any other reinsman in the history of the sport. He is proudest of his feat of winning five times and coming in second twice in seven starts one afternoon in 1927.

During the first World War, Plaxico was a sergeant in the Army's Animal Transportation Service where he was responsible for the welfare of 3,500 mules and 600 riding horses.

His ability as a trainer attracted the attention of J. R. McKenzie, New Zealand dime store tycoon who hired him to oversee his huge ranch and train his stable of almost 100 harness race horses. Later he served as trainer for W. N. Reynolds, the tobacco magnate, who also maintained a stable of trotters and pacers.

Plaxico got his biggest thrill in a race at Toledo, Ohio, in 1927 when he drove Clay Worthy to a startling upset victory over Hazelton, one of the great harness racers at that era. That was the only race Hazelton lost in 21 trips to the post that year. The triumph was worth \$20,000, and Clay Worthy's time of 2:05.1 established a new mark for harness racing in May.

With the track fast becoming one of the country's fastest, the present meeting at the Detroit Track is being hailed by horsemen as the finest ever staged in the Midwest. Races are held nightly, except Sunday, beginning at 8:15 each night.

## Gravel Pit Issue Taken to Court

A suit is being tried in Wayne County Circuit Court before Judge Vincent Brennan which involves the Northville Sand and Gravel Company versus the Township of Northville and City of Plymouth.

The Northville Sand and Gravel Company in 1948 started suit against the Village alleging the Township was capricious in zoning the property at Seven Mile and Beck Roads which the Company owns, "small farms", thus refusing them the right to dig gravel.

The City of Plymouth which owns 60 acres south of the Northville Sand and Gravel Company which holds Plymouth's entire water supply filed a petition to intervene asking to be joined as parties defendant. They allege that the digging of gravel would destroy the wells both by taking the water and by contaminating it. The case is now adjourned until the month of September.

The history of the case dates back to 1944 when the Northville Sand and Gravel Company purchased 47 acres of land at the southeast corner of Beck and Seven Mile Road from the Stage estate. In March 1946, the Township ordinance was passed and a month later the gravel company began extracting gravel on the 47 acre plot which has been zoned as small farms. The Township notified them to cease and desist the operation and the shovel was moved out until 1948.

The Sand and Gravel Company then began negotiations with the Township asking that they be allowed to dig gravel on a portion of the 47 acres. The negotiations were unsuccessful and the suit was begun with the gravel company declaring that digging was no detriment to the general welfare of the community.

The company has alleged that the property was bought in 1944 for the express purpose of digging gravel and they allege that by zoning it "small farms" the township is depriving them of their rights without due process of law.

James Littell and Harry Deyo of Plymouth are the attorneys for the Township of Northville and the City of Plymouth and Thomas LoCicero of Detroit is the attorney for the Northville Sand and Gravel Company.

## Lisle Students To Visit Village

A unit of The Lisle Fellowship, which comprises a total of 205 outstanding students from various countries and college campuses of America will visit Northville during three weeks in August. A team of five students will undertake some service project on behalf of the community. The three service clubs, Rotary, Exchange and the Optimists will be asked to entertain these students. Northville has been designated as a typical American Community, by Dr. Howard McCluskie of the University of Michigan and as such has been recommended for study by The Lisle Fellowship.

Last summer nine students of The Lisle Fellowship visited Northville for a two weeks period and both the community and the team enjoyed the program. Discussions were presented by the various service clubs, the group being sponsored by the Young Adult Group of The Presbyterian Church. Those who would like to entertain any of the students in their homes during the nine day period starting August 8th are asked to contact Rev. Harold F. Fredsell.

## Driver Renewal Tests Shortened

Licensed drivers in Michigan will hereafter not be required to submit to written and oral examinations when renewing their operator or chauffeur permits, under a change in procedure authorized by State Police Commissioner Donald S. Leonard.

The change will enable driver license examiners to devote more time to beginner drivers as well as eliminate the provision under which licensed drivers repeated tests which they had once passed successfully. Drivers renewing licenses, however, will still have to pass vision, color and hearing tests.

Persons seeking their first license will, of course, have to pass all of the tests as in the past.

When initiated the purpose of the present system was to make certain that no driver was licensed who did not have the necessary knowledge and skill to drive properly.

"We feel now that the benefits from that procedure have been accomplished to the point where we can simplify renewals," Leonard said. "This will also permit giving more time to beginners to see that they got off to a good start as safe drivers."

Of the 847,886 persons who took driver license examinations in Michigan last year more than 90 per cent were renewing their applications. The total also represents an average of more than 4,000 examinations for each driver license examiner. There is an equivalent of 187 full time examiners in the state.

Only six of 43 states reporting to the National Safety Council in a special poll have any form of examination for renewing driver licenses. In addition, with the exception of Michigan the six states have required only partial examinations.

The abbreviation of renewal tests in Michigan will not affect the suspension, revocation or restriction of licenses of drivers who accumulate bad driving records. This will follow the same procedure as in the past.

Ninety-two men registered at the local draft board will be notified within two weeks to report for physical examinations prior to induction into the army.

Plymouth draft board No. 102, located at 328 North Main street, serves a number of towns in the area including Northville, Inkster, Wayne, Garden City, Belleville, Romulus, Flat Rock, Rockwood, Trenton, Grosse Ile, Riverview, Redford township and Dearborn township.

The exact date for physical examinations has not been announced. They will be conducted by a group of army doctors and those called will be given their draft classification.

Local army, navy, and marine recruiters report that no volunteers from the Plymouth area have signed up for military service.

Wright, who was formerly associated with the Northville Clinic, has announced that he has purchased the Demel office building where he is now located and will enlarge and modernize his present facilities. In addition to this announcement he made public the fact that Dr. Donald J. Largo, a graduate of the University of Michigan and a resident surgeon at the Wayne County General Hospital will join him in his practice.

In addition to increased facilities for their patients the doctors expect to have one of them on hand 24 hours a day for the purpose of caring for their patients.

The dial settings of all principal radio stations along the routes are listed and a complete quick-reference mileage chart is included.

This latest Michigan Guide is a very useful travel booklet and is distributed as a public service through the Auto Owners Travel Bureau in Lansing.

All Explorers attending must be approved by the local Council, pass physicals, and be immunized against Small Pox. Total cost for each participant is only \$12.00 which covers actual cost of food.
