Consumers Power Notes Growth

A growth of 33 per cent in the number of natural gas customers of Consumers Power Company in western Wayne County was reported today by George L. Mayhew, district manager of the company's new West Wayne District. This district includes Plymouth, Wayne, Northville, Farmington, Nankin and Livonia.

"At the end of the War there were 7,900 natural gas customers in this area," said Mr. Mayhew. "By the end of 1950 the number will be about 10,500, a gain of 33 per cent. It was this rapid growth that led to the establishment of the West Wayne District. With a district office and staff in Plymouth we will be in a better position to meet the needs of our customers as western Wayne County continues to grow."

The West Wayne District is one of four districts just established in the former Pontiac Division, now the Southeast Division.

James P. Thomas, Jr., formerly gas distribution assistant of the Flint Division, has been appointed district gas distribution superintendent of the district.

Mr. Mayhew joined Consumers as a storeroom clerk in Charlotte in 1937 and later became office clerk and senior clerk. Since 1946 he has been local manager at Howell. During World War II he served in both the European and the Pacific theaters, winning four battle stars and other decorations.

Mr. Thomas, a graduate of Michigan State College, joined the Consumers graduate student training program in 1947 in Jackson. In April 1949 he went to the Lansing Division as a gas distribution assistant and three months later he was transferred to the Flint Division.

Social Security Law To Change on Domestic Help

"Do you have a maid?"

Not so very many households these days can answer yes, but those who do have a maid or any other household worker will need a copy of a brief booklet bearing that question as a title. Harry Baltuck, Manager of the Detroit-Northwest social security office, began distributing this booklet today. This colorful leaflet sets out, in a few sentences, just how the lady of the

house, or any employer of domestic help in or around the home, may tell whether or not the worker is brought under the new social security law which becomes effective on January 1. The work of those regularly employed in private homes will be credited to social security and the employer will be responsible for reporting wages, along with social security taxes, to the collector of internal revenue.

The title of the pamphlet does not stop with "Do You Have a Maid?" but continues "— or a laundress? — a cook? — chauffeur? — gardener?" Any of these, or any other persons employed regularly for work in or around a private household many come under the new law, and Baltuck urges their employers to request a free copy of the booklet.

A simple test in the booklet, in terms of amount of wages paid and regularity of employment, will tell whether a maid or cook or laundress will get the protection of social security — and whether the housewife should start making reports next year. If so, there's a postage-paid postal card in the government-issued booklet which the housewife should mail in for instructions.

Copies of the booklet are available at all post offices, or may be secured at offices of the collector of internal revenue. "Here in Northwest Detroit," said Baltuck, "if you'll just call the social security office, telephone TE 4-4750, or drop us a post card, asking for the booklet, 'Do You Have a Maid?' we'll send it to you by return mail." Address of the office is Social Security Administration, 12065 Wyoming Avenue, Detroit 4, Michigan.

The social security manager said he is arranging with women's groups to furnish supplies of the booklet for their members.

For the domestic worker's own information about her new social security protection, a special leaflet is available at the social security office. Baltuck pointed out that regularly employed domestic workers will need a social security account number card after January 1, 1951.

The "Do You Have a Maid?" booklet does not apply to domestic work on farms operated for profit. Such work is covered by other provisions in the new social security law.

Mustangs Roll Over South Lyon, 70-6, End Season With Unbeaten Record
 Northville's Mustangs climbed on a touchdown merry-go-round last Friday night and swamped the South Lyon high school football squad 70 to 6. The victory bracketed the Mustangs in the record books as unbeaten in the 1950 season.

Team captain Dick Gray paced the Mustangs with four TD's. Fullback Leon Holman added three more, Halfback Tom Shrake scored twice and Quarterback Don Maclean pushed over a marker. Even Guard Del Black got into the act. He joined the backfield temporarily to score on two plays from the 19-yard line.

The lone Lions score was contributed by Fullback Dick Comiskey on an 85-yard runback of a kickoff in the fourth quarter. But Shrake whipped 72 yards down the sideline with the return kickoff to tally for Northville.

The evening was officially named "Dad's Night," honoring fathers of Northville gridders. They sat on a bench with the players and wore numbers corresponding to their sons' numbers. They saw the Mustangs lead South Lyon in just about every department in the books, including penalties. One hundred sixty yards were assessed against Northville for rule infractions.

The fast-charging Northville line, playing against a lighter forward wall for the first time this year, held the Lions to 44 yards by rushing and passing while rolling up a total yardage of 379 yards, exclusive of kick returns and pass interceptions.

Northville took to the air eight times and completed three passes. Gray connected with End Don Graham, Holman (for a TD), and Ratliff.

The Lions tried the air route 23 times and completed three, but Northville intercepted eight of the passes. Shrake intercepted four (one for a TD), and Chuck Dickinson, Ken Rowe, Bob Prom and Gray each stole one, Gray's interception resulting in a score.

The Mustangs struck twice in the first quarter: Holman kept the ball on a spinner play and rammed over from the three-yard line. Bob Cole's conversion missed. Dick Gussell broke through to block a Lions punt on the fourteen and recovered on the one-yard mark midway in the quarter. Don Maclean carried the ball over on a quarterback sneak. Cole's conversion kick from placement was good.

Northville added two more tallies in the second period, one of them a two-yard smash by Gray and the other from the three, by Holman, after Gray's pass to Graham netted 37 yards.

Opening the third period, Holman took a 32 yard pass from Gray and raced 14 more yards to score, making the count 31 to 0. Cole added a point with a successful kick. Minutes later, Gray crashed over from the two-yard line after a 23-yard pass to Ratliff and a three-yard plunge by Oakley Shoemaker.

Black switched from guard to back for two plays and scored the next TD and Cole added the point. The score soared to 51 to 0 when Gray tallied from the sixteen-yard line.

Comiskey then put the Lions in the scoring column by running a kickoff back 85 yards to the end zone and Shrake returned the favor with a 72-yard sprint. Gray boosted the score another
