





Don't use a gas or kerosene oven to take the chill off your house these cold mornings, nor the burners on the top of the

stove to heat a cold kitchen. Remember that that snug drowsy feeling you get when you sit in front of the gas or coal fireplace or over the register may be due to carbon mon-

oxide, too. Carbon monoxide is formed wherever fuel is burned. Greater quantities of the gas are formed when the fuel is burned in a cold room or when the flame hits a cold surface. Proper ventilation of all heating units to get rid of the poison gas is of utmost importance.

While 2 parts of carbon monoxide per 10,000 parts of air can make you dangerously sleepy and 8 parts per 10,000 of air during a two-hour period can kill you, even smaller amounts can poison you - make you groggy or nauseated and make your head ache and your heart pound The amount it takes to make you just a little sick, can kill your baby or your aged mother. Open all the doors of a house abin or car thought to have carbon monoxide contaminated ir. If you suspect carbon mon oxide poisoning get the victim nto the open air, apply artificial espiration and call a doctor at

Water-repellent finishes may be durable or non-durable. The durable finish will withstand numerous launderings or dry cleanings. The non-durable finish has to be replaced after each aundering or cleaning.

For a death-to-moths prescription for storing woolens, wash or clean them before storing. Brush them well—pockets inside out, cuffs down, collars up-and hang
