



## Magazine Names G. Taft "Morgan Man of the Year"

The Morgan Horse magazine for December, 1950 has on its frontispiece a picture of Gerald F. Taft astride one of his Morgan horses. It also contains a two page spread captioned, "Morgan Man of the Year."

Mr. Taft, who is owner of Springbrook Farm on West Eight Mile Road, gained this laurel because of his interest in trying to further the cause of the Morgan horse.

The story relates the background and history of Taft and Springbrook Farms, so named because of the water system which is flowing and spring fed. The farm consists of some 35 acres of orchard and is managed by Floyd Appaling and his son, Jack. The Appalings along with Taft combine in training the horses.

Taft is ever interested in youth and last year opened his farm to the 4-H youth for a Field Day, to which 350 boys and girls attended. As a reward for outstanding 4-H club work, Taft presented a girl with a Morgan colt.

Gerald Taft first became interested in Morgans when after riding "just horses" he decided that the Morgan because of its gentleness, endurance, easy keeping quality and versatility was the one which would best fit his needs. Since 1943 he has acquired several Morgan mares and has produced some of the finest Morgan horses now being shown. "Mr. Taft expects that by combining breeding light to heavy, medium to medium, large to small etc., he will gain what is to be his idea of the perfect Morgan horse."

Taft is in the road construction business and leaves the feeding and care of the animals up to his farm manager. However, when colts arrive, he can be found in the barn helping in whatever way he can.

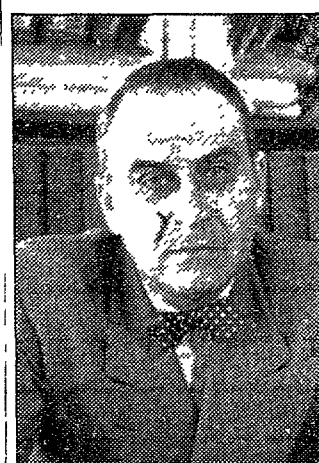

## Doren To Head Civilian Defense

At the Village Commission Monday evening, a communication was read from the housing expeditor, Tighé Woods, stating that Federal rent control had been lifted in the Village.

The control was removed following a certification by the Village Council that a shortage of rental housing no longer existed.

Forrest Doren was appointed by the Council to serve Northville as civilian defense director. Representatives from the American Legion Post No. 147 and Auxiliary, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Eagles and Northville Citizen's League were present to pledge their support to the civilian defense program.

## Seal Sale Deemed Community Project

The wide-spread support of the 1950 double-barred cross Christmas Seal Sale by Wayne County residents made this year's Seal Sale a "true community project," according to Mrs. W. L. Howard, Northville Chairman for the 1950 Seal Sale, who reported on the progress of the sale to this date.

According to Mrs. Howard's report, the 1950 Seal Sale totals \$75,000 with Seal Sale returns still coming into the TB and Health Society at its headquarters 153 E. Elizabeth Street. The sum to date is \$65,000 short of the county's quota, but society officers are hopeful that the difference will be made up before the end of the sale which is December 25 and thereby make possible the needed expansion of the Society's services during 1951.

Mrs. Howard pointed out that the Society hopes to increase its participation in the Detroit and Wayne County chest X-ray surveys.

"Through these services in the past year many cases of unsuspected TB have been discovered," Mrs. Howard reported.

Mrs. Howard also advised that much more work needs to be done in the Rehabilitation service to tuberculous patients. Services are now available at Herman Kiefer and Maybury Sanatorium. But that is not enough.

"It is still not too late to mail in contributions," Mrs. Howard emphasized. "We know the people of Detroit and Wayne County will come through."

The apple storage house measures 40 by 60 feet and stands 14 feet high. It is refrigerated by two five-horsepower sealed electric units. Apples are sorted by an electric grader at the rate of 150 bushels an hour.

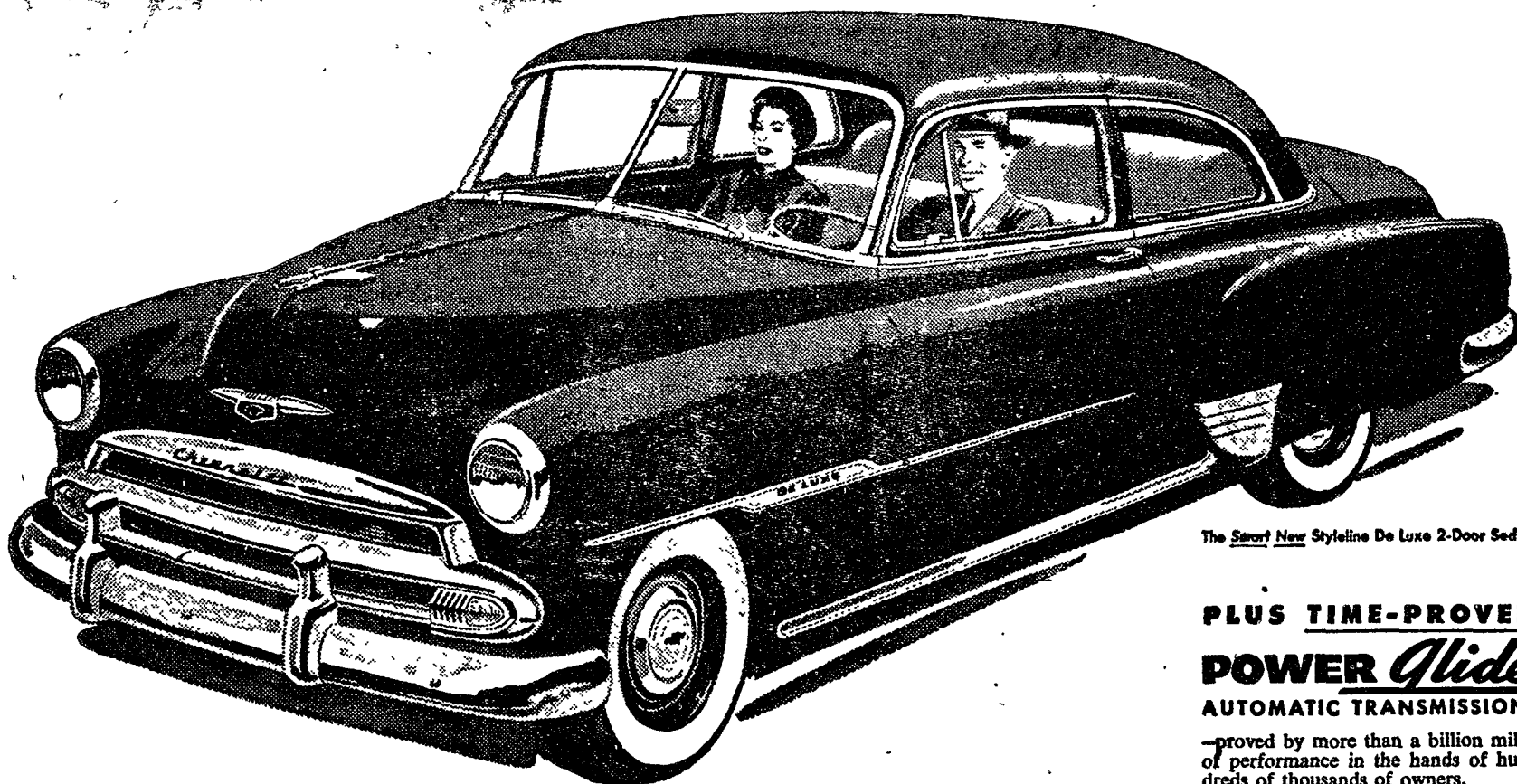

Christmas vacation starts Friday evening, December 22, for the 18,561 resident students at the University of Michigan.

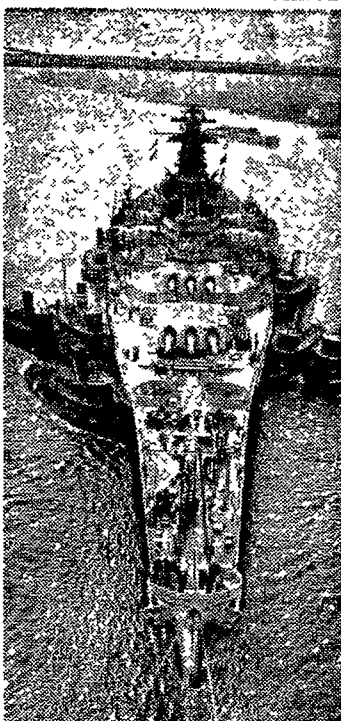

## Tips On Household Budget Are Given by U-M Economist

If you get buried in dollar signs and details while keeping a household or personal budget you're on the wrong track.

Keeping it simple and using labor-saving methods are very important in home budgeting, says Z. Clark Dickinson, professor of economics at the University of Michigan.

"You're not keeping records for a business concern so don't try to account for every penny," he says.

The economist suggests three kinds of records to make the budgeting process simple but complete enough to see where your money is going and to know just where you stand.

These are: (1) a budget to forecast income and outlay for a period of time - preferably on a monthly basis; (2) a receipts and expenditure statement of the actual financial transactions during the budget period; (3) periodic balance sheets, which act as "snapshots" of the family's net worth.

The budget should be a plan, Professor Dickinson says, rather than a strait-jacket. No great weight should be given the guides which list percentages to be spent for food, clothing, rents and so forth. These don't necessarily reflect your particular situation, he points out.

Daily expenses should be recorded in a receipts and expenditure statement. Such a record of one month's expenses should precede the setting-up of a budget. Professor Dickinson recommends one receipts classification column and ten expenditure columns. The expenditure headings are: food, home maintenance, clothing, personal allowances, transportation, medical care, gifts and personal taxes, education and recreation, business expense, investments and life insurance.

tion and recreation, business expense, investments and life insurance.

"Beware of the temptations of a column headed 'miscellaneous' - if no such column is at hand, you will analyze your expenditures day by day, and not be saddled with a meaningless jumble at the end of the month," the Michigan professor states.

A net worth statement or balance sheet lists all the family property and assets, including life insurance, as well as any liabilities, Professor Dickinson says. Account should be taken of depreciation, for instance of house and car. The balance sheet will show you the family wealth at a particular time. A comparison one year later will indicate any gain or loss in the family's position.

"Good management of one's own small affairs is an achievement likely to advance one's ability to make money," Professor Dickinson tells his students in Economic and Financial Problems of the Family, one of a program of courses in "Family Living" at the University.

"Skill in budgeting and skill in buying go hand in hand. Budgeting can be very helpful to you in figuring income taxes, and a thorough understanding of personal budgeting will help you in interpreting governmental financial statements as well as those of corporations," according to Professor Dickinson.

Wheat straw, oat straw and rye straw have all been successfully used as strawberry mulches. Fairly heavy coverings are suggested in order to avoid heaving from frost and consequent root damage. Ordinary leaves give good results on home plantings.

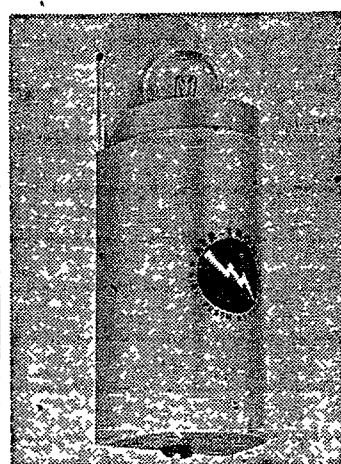

## Electronic Purifier • Kills Offensive Odors Farmers Using Purifier To Clear Up Farm Odors

The old problem of odors on a farm, caused by live stock or poultry, by dampness or mustiness, can now be solved. And for less than a half cent a day.

A powerful air purifier, called Air-Tron, uses ozone, nature's own "air freshener" to create outdoor freshness in foul-smelling places by killing odor-producing bacteria in the air and on the surfaces. Farm-

ers in many areas are reported taking advantage of the purifier and are turning their farms into more pleasant places in which to live and work.

The Air-Tron is a compact unit which generates short wave ultraviolet rays destroying unpleasant odors electronically. It is produced by Roy C. Stove and Company of Chicago.

A single-lamp unit provides air freshening protection for an area up to 600 cubic feet—the size of the average milk house. For areas up to 1,200 cubic feet, the double lamp has been developed.

## Herd Numbers Decrease, But Milk Supply Grows

In the past two decades, milk production on United States farms has increased by 20 billion pounds, or one-fifth while the number of milking herds has declined. In some of the individual dairy states, changes have been even more spectacular. In New York, for instance, one-half more milk is marketed by 15 per cent fewer farmers than in 1929.

Milk is produced on about 4 1/2 million of the six million farms in the United States. On about two million of these, the milk is produced solely for home use. Most of these farms have only one or two cows, but their milk provides an important part of the food of some nine million farm people.

On the other 2 1/2 million farms that have milk cows, some milk, cream, or farm-churned butter is sold. These sales range from a few pounds of farm-churned butter per year up to thousands of pounds of milk per day.

# Holiday Drivers Warned by Chief

The best way of being sure to spend Christmas at home this year is to drive carefully between now and the holidays, Chief of Police Joe Denton advised Northville motorists yesterday.

Everybody is busier just before Christmas, and as a rule, the roads are more dangerous, Chief Denton pointed out.

"Sleet, ice, snow, rain, all present extra hazards when driving, and we should take extra precautions to avoid costly accidents and injuries," he said.

"Two out of three winter accidents occur on snow or ice, according to studies in typical snowbelt states, the National Safety Council has discovered. The winter accident death rate is 24 to 53 per cent above the summer figure in snowbelt states."

What to do about it? "Drive according to conditions and have winter safety equipment ready," Chief Denton said. "Tire chains are needed at times to counteract severe snow and ice conditions. Use your anti-skid chains when needed, and avoid an accidental missing link in your family circle at Christmas."

"And to insure good visibility,

be sure your windshield wiper blades, defroster, and headlights are in good condition."

Careless or negligent driving is not only hazardous, Chief Denton observed. It's also against the law. He said that every accident will be thoroughly investigated to determine the cause, and that drivers guilty of law violations will be prosecuted.

NEWS and COMMENT  
FROM CONGRESSMAN  
GEORGE A. DONDERO



Capitol gossip has it that British Prime Minister Attlee went home, after his conference with Harry S. Truman, filled with glee over the concessions and promises he obtained from the President. Also, that British diplomats in Washington find it hard to repress their open elation over the results of the conference.

All of this may well be true; I have no means of knowing and would not assert it as a fact. Nevertheless, we all know the truth of the threadbare old saying that "Where there is smoke, there is fire." Reason exists for anxiety over just what did happen at the conference between the Prime Minister and the President.

My own misgivings in this connection arise from the fact

that once more a President of the United States has engaged in secret discussions, and probably has made secret commitments, involving the future safety of the American people, without consulting the United States Senate.

It should be remembered that the President is constitutionally empowered to direct the foreign relations of the nation, only "with the advice and consent of the Senate."

The whole thing smacked too much of the circumstances surrounding the ill-fated Yalta Conference, when the then dying President Roosevelt, on the advice of the infamous Alger Hiss, betrayed Manchuria into the hands of Soviet Russia. This was the real beginning of our military debacle in Korea, because it saved the Chinese Communist movement from extinction at the hands of Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalist armies.

A careful reading of the public statement following the conference between the Prime Minister and the President reveals almost nothing. They piously agreed not to give up in Korea, when all the world knows that American troops are getting out of that country.

The President consented to refrain from using the atom bomb without consulting the British government, and to further increase military aid to Britain. One can read between the lines here, and see that Britain's first thought is of herself and her own special interests at home and in China.

I do not like these things, especially when it is considered that Great Britain has been selling war materials to the Chinese Communists through the Crown Colony of Hong Kong; that Britain sent only a few thousand men to help in Korea, and that Britain now is moving to force the United Nations into replacing Nationalist China with Communist China on the Security Council.

It is time that Americans began to think of their own interests first. On this score, the stoppage of ECA funds to Britain is good. But it must be borne in mind that apparently this stoppage is to be only temporary. The Truman administration has pointed out that British rearmament is certain to hatch a new brood of British economic troubles.

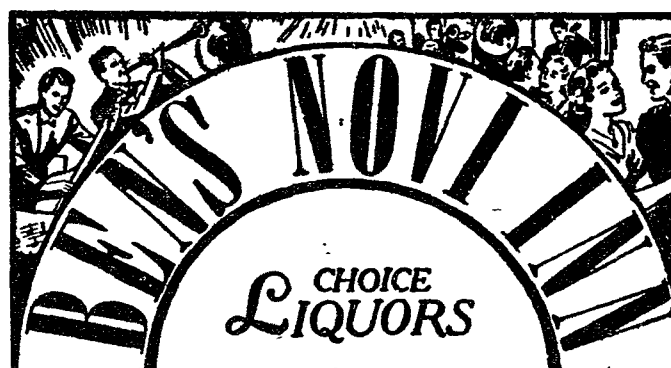

## A&P Buyer Tells of Crop Markets

Michigan vegetable growers who seek additional markets might do well to consider raising broccoli and spinach, according to one of the state's largest produce buyers.

Vice President G. H. Lumpkin of the Atlantic Commission Co., A & P Food Stores' produce-buying affiliate, said he believed there would be a good market in Michigan for state-grown broccoli and spinach that was properly packed, iced and pre-cooled.

As an example of how icing has improved the demand for sweet corn, Lumpkin said A & P "could not get enough" to supply its consumer demand in Michigan this past season.

Lumpkin spoke in a panel discussion during a two-day conference of the Michigan Vegetable Growers here this week. In discussing "Michigan Produce From The Buyer's Viewpoint," he praised state growers for their efforts in improving the quality and distribution of Michigan vegetables.

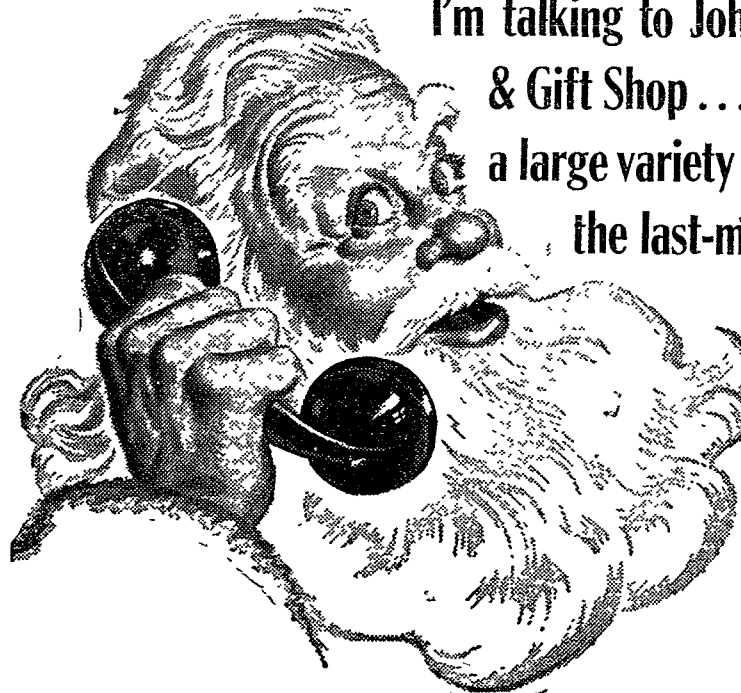





## Home Ec' Courses Invaded by Males

Picking the man "most likely to succeed" was simple for fall graduates of Michigan State College's School of Home Economics. He had to be Kenneth W. Goodrich of Lansing, first male in the school's history to graduate with a major in home furnishing and the only man who graduated in home economics last term.

Goodrich thus joins a select group of 10 men to receive B. S. degrees from the MSC School of Home Economics. He also expects to become a member of a group not quite so select. He is now awaiting a call to military service.

Though one of few male home economics graduates, Goodrich has not lacked masculine company in the classrooms during the past year. More than 200 men are now enrolled in home economics courses, 12 of them pointing toward degrees from the school.

Most popular home economics course for men is institution administration. They study this to prepare for careers in some phases of commercial food service, such as college dormitory or restaurant food personnel.

Primarily a women's field, home economics is steadily being invaded by men, according to Dean Marie Dye of the School of Home Economics.

So far, MSC coeds have offered no objections to the invasion, Dean Dye said.

## Sheriff Baird Warns Drinking Drivers

Week Ends - The Gay Holiday Spirit - Traffic Accidents.

That combination, Sheriff Andrew C. Baird, said, is particularly disastrous where drinking and driving are concerned.

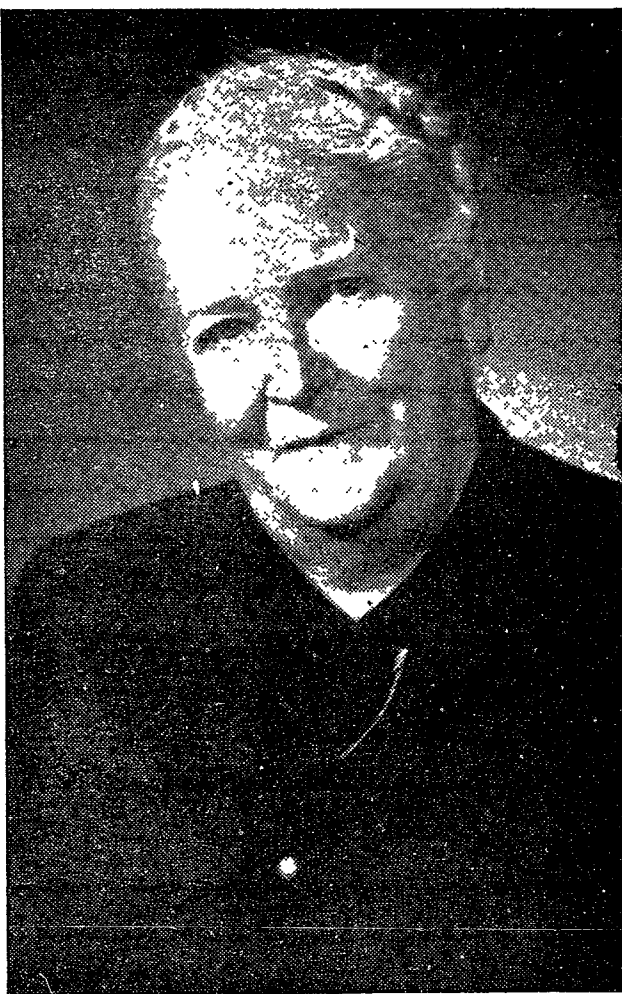

## MICHIGAN'S FOREMOST FAMILY PHYSICIAN FOR 1950



Lunette I. Powers, 75 year old woman doctor from Muskegon who has been named "Michigan's Foremost Family Physician" for 1950 by the members of the Michigan State Medical Society. Dr. Powers is still actively practicing medicine after more than fifty-three years service in the Muskegon area.

## Muskegon Woman Physician Chosen as Michigan's Doctor of The Year

Grandmother of Medicine—this aptly describes Muskegon's seventy-five year old doctor of medicine, Lunette I. Powers, who today, after a period of service which began the year before the Spanish-American War, was named by the Michigan State Medical Society as "Michigan's Foremost Family Physician" for 1950.

A true "family doctor," she is a personification of all that the medical profession stands for. When notified of her newest honor, she unselfishly said, "That I do not deserve this great honor is fully felt by myself, with the full realization that were it not for the considerate, courteous and kindly helpfulness of all my associates and friends, this great joy would not be mine today."

With a smile of reminiscence in her eyes, Dr. Powers told of the trials and tribulations that were hers in the struggle to complete her studies in the "no woman's land" of her day. Her interest in medicine however, was deep rooted, having been born of an ancestry which included a grandfather and great-grandfather who were doctors of medicine. Her ambitions were furthered still by parents who were lifelong pharmacists and close friends of the medical profession.

In 1900, Muskegon's first woman doctor hung out her shingle in competition with the male practitioners of that area and since that day has been closely associated with the growth and life of this Michigan community.

Her life has been one of complete sacrifice and devotion to duty and today, after more than 53 years of active service, this kindly, benign doctor answers calls for help whether it be day or night. Her younger associates, however, in deference to her seniority and years, insist on caring for the majority of her night calls although Dr. Powers has no trouble recalling the "times in years gone by when I would be returning from a round of night calls, just as the sun was coming up."

A great, consuming love for her profession has always taken the time necessary for marriage

but the friendly doctor has many times experienced the thrill of family life, for by her own estimate, she had delivered more than 5,000 Muskegon residents into the world.

A close friend of famed Dr. Bertha Van Hoosen, Chicago surgeon and author of the best seller "Petticoat Fever," Dr. Powers has traveled in many foreign lands searching for additional knowledge of her art. Both women physicians toured England, Scotland and Ireland in 1937 making a careful study of the hospitals and clinics in these lands, while Dr. Powers went south of the border in 1947 to attend a meeting of the Woman's International Medical Association in Mexico City.

Doctor Powers, who served as the first Chief of Obstetrics at Muskegon Hackley Hospital still carries on there as a staff member as well as nearby Mercy Hospital.

Typical of the hurried and busy life she leads after three-quarters of a century was Dr. Powers' acknowledgment of her most recent honor. Hastily penned on a dinner napkin as she rode between her hospitals in Muskegon she wrote, "I wish it were possible to tell you in a more forceful manner how very appreciative, grateful and happy I am. How could this award ever come to me?" and while the good doctor wonders, many thousands of her friends and patients in Muskegon and throughout the land truly know why she was singled out to be the selection of Michigan's medical profession as "Michigan's Foremost Family Physician" for 1950.

## CIO-Michigan Bell Reach Agreement

The Michigan Bell Telephone Company today announced that it had reached an agreement with Division 15, Communications Workers of America-CIO, covering leaves of absence and pay treatment for employees entering military service.

All employees who have re-employment rights under the Selective Service Act of 1948, or who become eligible in the future due to changes in the Act, are covered by the new agreement. This includes draftees, enlisted personnel, and reservists.

Under the agreement, telephone people will receive the difference, for varying periods, between their company and government pay when the former is higher. For an employee with less than one year's service, the difference will be paid for two weeks; for one year or more of service, three months. If the serviceman or woman has a dependent wife, or a child under 18, he or she will receive the difference for an additional three months.

Full re-employment rights under the Act are included in the agreement, provided the employee applies within the legal time limit.

When he returns to the job, the serviceman will be given full credit on his company service for the term of his military absence.

After discharge from service, employees who are reinstated but are unable to return to work because of illness or injury, will be eligible for sickness benefits. They are also eligible for death benefits during their absence.

The new agreement covers all Michigan Bell employees entering the Armed Forces after July 1, of this year.

## Bell Co. Announces Personnel Changes

The Michigan Bell Telephone Company today announced that James A. Rhea, Central division plant superintendent, with headquarters in Saginaw, would be transferred to Detroit to head up the company's Eastern division plant forces on January 1.

Rhea succeeds Kenneth W. Thompson, who will be promoted to general plant personnel supervisor. Included in Thompson's new duties will be to assist in union contract negotiations.

A native of Indiana, Rhea has been with Michigan Bell since 1927. He holds a degree in mechanical engineering from Purdue University.

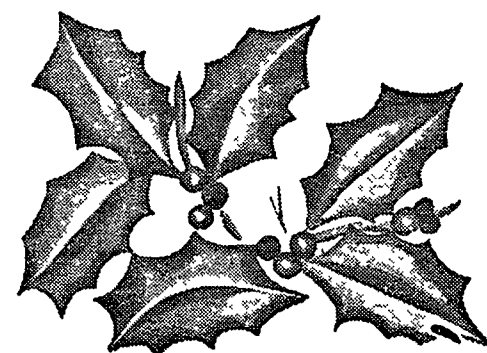

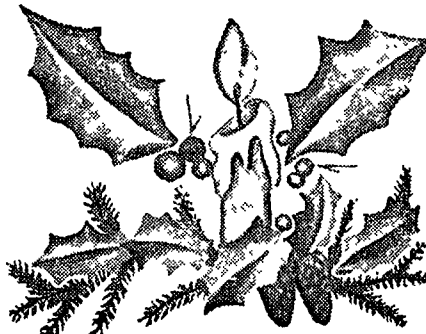
