## American Pianist To Perform Here

William Schatzkammer, a young American pianist, will appear here February 13 at the First Presbyterian church house. The concert is the second in the series of concerts sponsored by the Northville Community Concert Association.

Schatzkammer has the distinction of being one of the few native New Yorkers in the concert field. Although musicians come from all over America to study in New York, the city itself has contributed comparatively few native sons of the artistic caliber of Schatzkammer. He was born in the heart of Manhattan and received all of his education there.

His mother began giving him piano lessons when he was seven and he was a star pupil in music classes of Public School No. 19 and later at DeWitt Clinton High School, he shone equally well as an athlete.

A scholarship at the Juillard School of Music solved his quandary of whether he should go on in athletics or music. He studied under the aging, but still famous Alexander Siloti, the renowned teacher who had once studied with Liszt and Tchaikowsky. Little wonder today that Schatzkammer excels in the music of Tchaikowsky. Recently when he played the Tchaikowsky Second Piano Concerto with the Cleveland Orchestra, the critic for the Cleveland Plain Dealer reported that he "swept the keyboard with impassioned eloquence."

This personable young musician is married to Mary Bray who is also a pianist. Their New York home is just off Gramercy Park, a few blocks from his birthplace.

Arduous hours of practice keep William Schatzkammer trim and slim, although he has had to forego rugged athletics. He is still a fast swimmer, however and a fancy diver. One of his favorite hobbies is railroad riding. He knows the name of every crack train in the country. He is one of the few concert artists who can make out his own railroad schedule and it won't be his fault if he does not show up at a performance on schedule.

## Women To Join in Day of Prayer

Sponsored by the United Council of Church Women, the observance will be held in 92 countries by millions of people, praying in sixty different languages.

Last year a quarter million dollars was collected and used in this work.

All churches, fraternal, youth, charitable, civic and social groups are invited to join with the women of the church to make this day a community-wide as well as a world-wide symbol of fellowship. Bryan and Mrs. L. M. Eaton. A short playlet is being presented by Mrs. William B. Crump, Mrs. Joseph R. Plunkett, Mrs. George W. Weiss, Mrs. Gael L. Downer, Mrs. G. Long and Mrs. A. H. Gallagher.

The 1951 theme for the observance is "Perfect Love Casts Out Fear". I John 4:18. Following the sun, the chain of prayer will be started in the Fiji Islands at dawn and continue westward from the crowded ports of Singapore and Shanghai into isolated villages of China and Pakistan; from the African jungles to the Arctic wilderness. The United Council of Church Women is an organization representing 10,000,000 women.

## Novi Twp. Approves Community Bldg.

Novi electors went to the polls Monday and voted in favor of constructing a community building adjacent to the school property. The voting was as follows: yes, 167; no, 68.

On Friday evening, the Novi Board of Education held a special meeting and approved the dealing of the northwest corner of the school property to Novi Township with the provision that a community building be constructed on this site.

Present plans call for the proposed construction of the community building to be under the jurisdiction of a three man board. One will be appointed by the Board of Education, one by the Township Board and one to be appointed by both boards to represent the Township at large. The member representing the Township at large is not to be a resident of the school district.

Due to government restrictions on certain buildings, this was thought to be the most feasible solution. In addition to the community hall, four additional classrooms will be built. Last June, the school district voted by over eighty-percent majority to bond for \$80,000. The addition should be ready for occupancy November 1, 1951.

Forrest Doren, Northville Civilian Defense Director, received the reports from the chairmen of the fire, police, housing, medical and transportation committees. A new work division was added, that of a canteen committee, to lighten the work of the housing committee and to facilitate the preparation of food in case of an emergency. Women of various church, fraternal and veteran organizations, familiar with the problem of preparing food in large amounts are being contacted this week to establish a functional canteen committee.

## Osteopaths Buy Hospital Building

The Garden City Maternity Hospital, a non-profit corporation, formed by a group of osteopathic physicians, has made arrangements to purchase the building it now occupies.

This building, a two story brick structure, located at 30548 Ford Road, Garden City, is being remodeled to include services for surgical and medical as well as maternity patients. The alterations, when completed, will increase adult bed capacity to 38, the number of bassinets (15) remaining the same. Further, the facilities of a complete diagnostic X-ray department and clinical laboratory will be offered to the people of the vicinity, on or about March 15, 1951.

The project is made possible by the efforts of these several osteopathic physicians of surrounding communities: Cecil B. Jackson, Northville; Howard Rohleder, Charles A. Kruse, Garden City; A. C. Williams, William Herbold, Plymouth; John Baker, Raymond Eilenfeldt, Dearborn; Robert S. Gardner, B. Robert Crandell, Wayne; Robert P. Ogden, Samuel Wotring, Inkster.

The estimated cost for the building is \$150,000. Original plans for construction of a new Osteopathic Hospital at Middle Belt and Beechwood have been temporarily shelved due to present economic conditions.

Four hundred and fifty beds have already been reported available for invalids and refugees in case of an emergency and many hundred more are expected to be added to the final count.

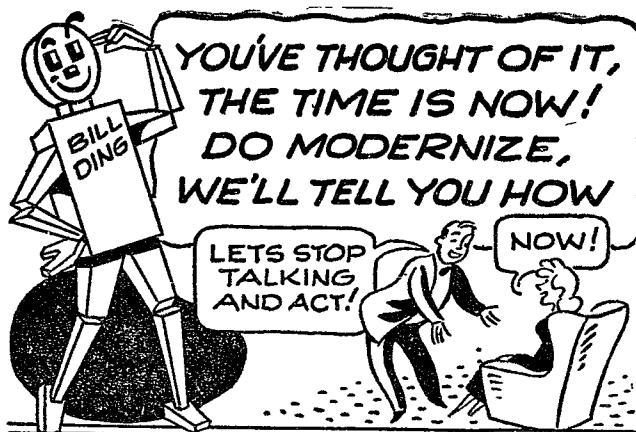

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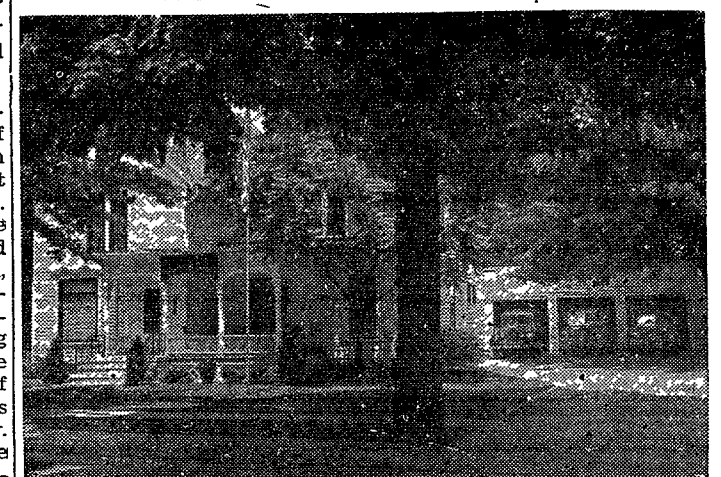
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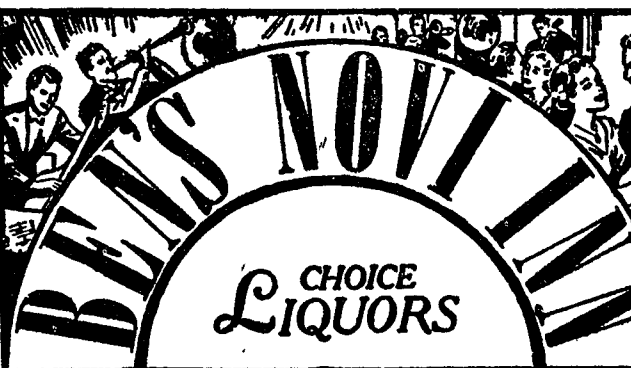

**Real Estate Managers Plan Strategy in Defense Programs**  
The Institute of Real Estate Management is organizing a committee to marshal its members to help the Civilian Defense authorities in protecting property from atomic bomb damage and to aid in plans for protecting people trapped in buildings and providing for their evacuation. Ormonde A. Kieb, Newark, N. J., president of the Institute, announced today.  
Mr. Kieb, who was installed as president of the Institute during the meetings of the National Association of Real Estate Boards now underway in Washington, D. C., announced the formation of three other committees also to meet the demands made upon the Institute in this defense preparation period. They are:  
1. A committee to offer the services of its 1,100 Certified Property Managers in 41 states and the District of Columbia for the management of government-owned buildings in order to free much-needed manpower for war work.  
2. A Defense Housing Advisory Committee to aid and advise Congress in studying new proposed defense housing legislation.  
3. A committee, as part of its research division, to study objectively the effect of rent control and the possible effect of proposed federal legislation relating to real property.  
Personnel comprising the committees will be announced in a few days, Mr. Kieb said.  
Plans for conducting three lecture courses on "The Field of Real Estate Management" were also reported. They will be in Detroit in February, in Oakland, California, in May, and in Baltimore or Washington in September. A fourth school on maintenance for supervisory employees is scheduled for Chicago in July.

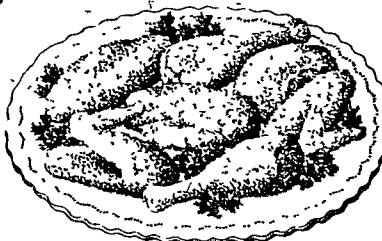

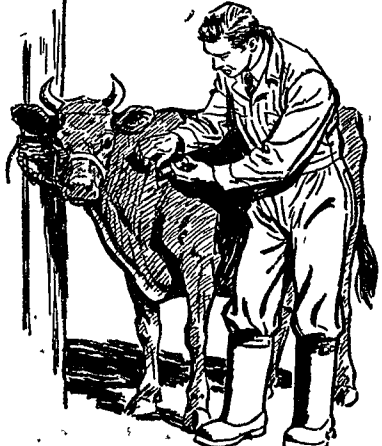

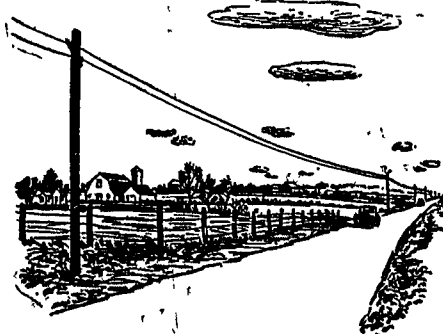

Radio-TV Meeting at MSC March 3

Frieda Hennock of the Federal Communications Commission will be the main speaker at the sixth annual Michigan Radio-Television Conference Saturday, March 3, at Michigan State College.

MICHIGAN MIRROR NON-PARTISAN NEWS LETTER

Information has seeped down through channels that Governor G. Mennen Williams has taken the first step to shortstop any loss to small businesses in war contracts. Larry Farrell recently made a hurried trip to Washington to investigate what can be done to help the smaller plants during the conversion period and to seek aid in limiting any temporary unemployment crisis. The results, of Farrell's mission thus far have not been divulged, nor has the governor made quite clear just what measures can be taken.

Republicans are confident of passing a two-cent gasoline tax. Williams has said he will veto such a levy if it is considered before general budget measures. Rep. Robert M. Montgomery (R-Lansing) says the legislature can pass it over the governor's veto - despite the shortage of G.O.P. seats. A two-thirds vote is required.

Michigan's defense orders have soared past the \$2,000,000,000 mark. Bulk of the contracts were issued from the army ordnance tank-automotive center.

Michigan draft boards are feeling the press again. With 4,218 men demanded for service in March, the boards are groping for eligible men while Washington officials reiterate that our army cannot be kept up to strength by present draft methods.

School teachers will get short deferrals in the selective service system. This would apply to those instructors who are "momentarily irreplaceable." With the present teacher shortage that applies to most of the occupation.

Michigan's governor has a house. He bought it himself. Despite action again this year to provide state living quarters to the first citizen, Williams settled on a home near the capitol. His former residence had been listed for sale. It had rented for \$275 per month.

The long-discussed Mackinac Straits bridge may be dropped again. Legislators, most of whom already are pessimistic about the project, now are dragging possible material shortages out of the bag to kill the issue. And they all gasp at the cost.

Michigan has 32,162 persons on federal civilian payrolls. It may be frightening to realize so many are supported here by taxes, but California has six times as many federal employees. In Michigan the postoffice leads the pack with 15,190 employees listed.

The conservation department again will ask for discretionary power over Michigan's deer herd. Efforts in the past have failed. Will the legislature give up its authority over the department this year?

Michigan is receiving recognition for pioneering with its mobile hearing trailer units.

Health workers of 15 other states as well as the federal security administration, the veterans administration and the United Nations health headquarters are asking for copies of the plans.

Due to increased volume of sales tax collections, now shared with schools and municipalities, Michigan public school teacher salaries have advanced from ninth to fourth place in the nation.

But Dr. Lee M. Thurston, superintendent of public instruction, fears that trend toward increasing reliance of localities upon state-collected funds for schools support is lessening the local sense of possession—and, consequently, the sense of responsibility toward the community institutions.

The superintendent also advocates more community colleges to bring at least junior colleges within reach of students living in areas remote from the existing colleges and universities.

This year is expected to be a good one for all-out farm production. Even with ceilings, prices will be high, economists say, and farmers can expect a good net income.

But farm labor will be scarce. Military drafts and high wages in war plants will drain labor resources in agriculture.
