## Brotherhood Theme Is Rotary Topic

To celebrate the annual observance of Brotherhood Week, the Northville Rotary Club heard Rev. Harold F. Fredsell speak. His subject was "Detroit Pioneers of Brotherhood, Father Gabriel Richard and the Reverend John Montith." The speaker was presented by Attorney Philip R. Ogilvie, program chairman of the Club.

An interesting account was given by Rev. Fredsell of these two early clergymen and their unique and beautiful friendship as they established the first Roman Catholic and the first Protestant churches in the City of Detroit. Three outstanding contributions were listed: one, they were both, dedicated to the church of which they were a part and their primary responsibility was their religious leadership. Their second contribution was their leadership in public education. As the moving spirits of the University of Michigan in its Detroit days, the Rev. John Montith was the first President and Father Gabriel Richard was the first Vice President of the new institution of higher learning. But, the outstanding contribution to give to the city in its formative years, was the living testimony of brotherhood.

Mr. Fredsell closed his address by quoting the familiar statement of James Russell Lowell that our American republic will endure "as long as the ideas of men who founded it continue dominant." The address was very timely due to the present observance of the 250th anniversary of the founding of the City of Detroit. For the excellent materials available, Rev. Fredsell paid tribute to George W. Stark, his biographer of the City of Detroit and editor of the "Town Talk" column of The Detroit News.

Each year the Rotary Club observes Brotherhood Week which is sponsored by The National Conference of Christians and Jews founded by the late Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes in 1928. Speakers before the Northville Club have been Rabbi Benedict Glazer, the co-chairman of the Michigan region; Edgar A. Guest, and Dr. Joseph Q. Mayne, director of the Detroit Round Table.

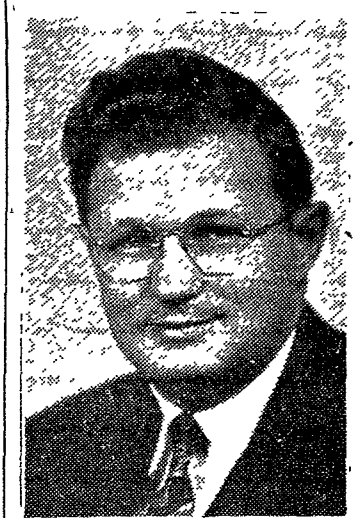

## Fifield To Speak On Far East Trends

Husbands of members of the Northville Woman's Club will be entertained at a dinner meeting Friday evening, February 16 at 6:30 p. m. at the First Presbyterian Church House. Professor Russell H. Fifield, of the department of political science, University of Michigan, will be the guest speaker and his topic will be "Recent Trends in the Far East."

Professor Fifield, who has specialized in international relations in the Far East, was a specialist in historical research, Division of Research and Publications, Department of State, in 1944-45, where he worked on Far Eastern aspects of papers relating to foreign relations of the United States. After passing his oral examinations for the Foreign Service, he was appointed Vice Consul of Career and Secretary in the Diplomatic Service of the United States, December 1945, and assigned to the Consulate General at Hankow, China. There he was occupied with economic reporting on conditions in Central China, entailing travel to the principal cities in that area.

In 1947, he spent two months in Formosa shortly after the Formosa revolt against the Chinese and was able to observe effects of the Japanese regime and program of Chinese government. Dr. Fifield spent the summer of 1949 in western Europe, traveling and studying in Italy, France and England. This past summer, he has spent in the Philippines, Malay and India.

## Red Cross Seeks 200 Pints of Blood

The American Red Cross blood bank will visit Northville on March 22. Lloyd H. Green Post No. 147, American Legion, is making plans to recruit donors and assist the Red Cross officials.

Since medical research has increased the many uses of blood and since the facilities for obtaining blood to meet all these needs are not adequate the Red Cross has undertaken the national blood program. The goal of this program is to provide blood and blood derivatives for medical use, without charge for the products, to all the people of the country who may need them. More than ever blood is needed to be sent overseas to the wounded soldiers in Korea.

Charles Carrington, Legion commander, stated that he hopes Northville citizens will donate at least 200 pints of blood so that it will be worthwhile bringing the mobile unit to the Village.

## Cost of Living Adjustment Granted School Employees

All full time employees, including school teachers, secretaries, custodians, principals and the school superintendent, were granted a \$200 cost of living adjustment by the Board of Education, at their regular meeting last Monday evening.

One-half of the cost of living increase will be paid on February 15 with the balance to come at the close of the school year in June. The living adjustment totals about \$10,500 and comes from surplus state aid, over and above the school's regular allotment. Total surplus state aid is expected to be about \$15,000.

The school board also voted to repair the old portion of the grade school building. Chamberlin and Company, the lowest bidder, was awarded the contract to calk and waterproof the building this spring at an estimated cost of \$3,180.00. The contract of Superintendent Russell H. Amerman was also voted upon to be renewed. Supt. Amerman reported that the furniture for the Grade school, costing \$1068.00 had arrived and was being installed.

The repair of the furnace in the High school was discussed and was tabled for further action at the next meeting until additional information could be secured. Supt. Amerman told the Board about the difficulties arising in securing school supplies. He said that he is ordering supplies for the fall term now.

## Robert Lyke Buys Service Station

Announcement was made this week that Robert Lyke of Thayer Blvd. had purchased the Gulf Service Station on West Main Street from Orson Atchinson. The change was made effective February 11.

Atchinson will devote full time to his Plymouth-Chrysler car dealership and the Northville Taxi Service.

The filling station will now be known as "Lyke's Gulf Service." Bob Lyke, who resides on Thayer Blvd. is well known to Villagers as he has lived here all of his life, attending the local schools. He announced that all former employees of the service station will be retained.

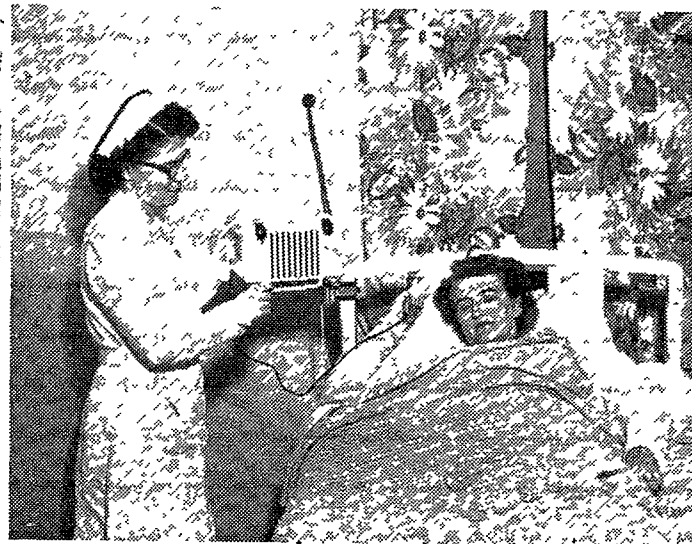
## Ottwell Heating Co. To Have Open House

## "Pillow Radios" Installed for Patient Entertainment

Radio programs without noise. That's the system now at Sessions Hospital in Northville. The installation of 25 bedside radios will permit patients to listen to radio programs of their choice, yet create no sound audible to a patient in the next bed.

The radios feature receivers which are placed under the patient's pillow, eliminating reception of the program by other patients. The coin operated radios, mounted on a swivel at the side of the bed, swing in to eliminate stretching or straining to operate, and swing back out of the way to permit full freedom of medical care.

## John Rackov Named Science Winner

John Rackov, son of William Rackov of Novi is the 1951 winner of the Bausch and Lomb Honorary Science Award Medal for achieving the highest scholastic record in science subjects during his high school course.

Only winners of this award are eligible to compete for three scholarships sponsored by Bausch and Lomb Optical Company at the University of Rochester.

The Science Award Medal will be presented at the Honors Assembly to be held June 5 at Northville High school. The winner must be selected at an early date in order to allow the winner to file an application for Scholarship.

John was selected on the basis of scholastic achievement in biology, chemistry and physics, with incidental consideration of records in other subjects, qualities of leadership, and extra-curricular activities.

The Honorary Science Award Medal was instituted in 1932. It is presented in thousands of high schools throughout the country. The Bausch and Lomb Science Scholarships were established in 1944. The three scholarship have a value of \$3,200 each.

These awards are recognized as significant evidence of scientific aptitude and have proved the means of encouraging countless young people to the consideration of scientific careers.

John has not selected the college he will attend next year as yet, but he does plan to study electrical engineering.

## Lenten Message --

By Rev. Lorenzo E. Wood, Pastor of Our Lady of Victory Church

Holiness or sanctity consists in charity. During the holy season of Lent, we strive with greater fervor than at other times to show our deep love of God, of our neighbor and of the Cross. Love is the fulfilling of the Law.

Our Lord said: "If any man loves Me, he will keep My Commandments." And, "Whoever shall do the will of My Father who is in heaven, he is My brother and sister and mother," that is to say, to him am I attached by the closest bonds of goodwill and love. We love God because of His infinite perfections, because He shares His perfections with us, His only rational creatures, because He created us; redeemed us; is striving to sanctify us; because every good gift comes to us from Him; because He is to be our everlasting reward in Heaven. Hence, during these forty days of penance, with greater effort, we practice the virtues opposed to pride, avarice, lust, anger, gluttony and sloth. We earnestly try to overcome our waywardness and defects.

Charity demands that we love our neighbor even our enemies. Many times our neighbor appears very unlovable. He is distasteful to us naturally; we may find him a bore or a bore. But God does not command us to love our

neighbor's shortcomings but to love him in spite of them. Charity does not hold up our neighbor to us as merely the man with a loud voice, or the man with poor taste in clothes or conversation. Charity shows us that God made this person, has died for him, and wants to bring him to heaven just as truly as He wants to bring us there, and that in heaven all His disagreeable characteristics, as well as our own, will disappear. Charity makes us think and act kindly to our neighbor because God truly loves him.

Christ, the sinless Son of God, came to earth in humility, talked and pleaded with and loved men, lived thirty years in solitude, worked magnificent miracles to help the sick and afflicted, suffered unspeakable tortures and finally died to atone for our sins. He came to raise us to His stature, not to lower Himself to ours; He came not to reduce God to man's level, but to raise man up to the level of God. The way of Christ is the way of love, and the way of love on this earth will necessarily demand self-denial. The way of Christ is not the way of an armchair but of a cross. Truth itself has said: "If any man will come after Me, let him deny himself" and "unless you do penance, you shall all likewise perish." No cross, no crown.

## Hot Cross Buns Have Greek Origin

Almost as ancient as worship itself is the hot cross bun.

Although the stories of the origin of these spicy, sugar-coated buns are varied, their association with religious customs has never faltered, according to the American Bakers Association.

Records claim that Cecrops, legendary Greek hero said to have been the founder of Attica, known today as Greece, offered a sweet bun to the gods as far back as 1,000 B. C. Petrified and perfectly shaped buns were discovered at Herculaneum, destroyed by Mt. Vesuvius in 79 A. D.

The early Egyptians offered buns, bearing two horns, to their Moon Goddess. The early Greeks changed the horn mark to a cross.

The Saxons marked their buns with the cross in honor of Easte, their Goddess of Light. Romans too, ate crossed bread, buying it at the temple doors when they went to offer public sacrifice.

The Christian fathers adapted the Greek and Roman custom of eating crossed buns as a religious factor in Lenten observance.

Some reports state this custom stems from the bun's universal religious observance, while other reports say the bun was something the people felt they could eat during the Lenten period to replace pastries, cakes, and other rich foods which they may have decided to forego.

In England, which most people consider the native land of the modern hot cross bun, they were designed to be eaten on Good Friday, a fast day. Today, however, hot cross buns are eaten during the entire Lenten period.

Hot cross buns are most popular today in England and in the United States, where the custom was brought by the early English settlers.

The religious significance of the hot cross bun has been lost today, and it is no longer emblematical.

Quaint traditions and superstitions still cling to the hot cross bun. In England, it is believed if a hot cross bun is hung in the chimney place on Good Friday,

and left there during the entire year, it will bring good luck.

Another old superstition calls for the preservation of hot cross bun crumbs in strong boxes to be dissolved in water and taken as a cure-all when needed during the year.

So popular were these buns that a poem was written about them. This Mother Goose rhyme is a familiar to everyone:

"Hot cross buns! Hot cross buns! One a penny, two a penny, hot cross buns!

If you have no daughters, give them to your sons,  
One a penny, two a penny, hot cross buns!

If you have none of these elves, Then you may eat them for yourself."

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## 20,000 Cancer Dressings Made In Village In 1950

The annual report for the work of the Cancer Patient's Aid of this area was announced this week by Mrs. E. J. Willis, chairman.

Twenty thousand dressings have been completed in this district. They have been furnished to all cancer victims, in their homes, hospitals and also in the convalescent places. Since this project was organized in February 1947 in Northville, over 100,000 dressings have been completed. This has been accomplished through the interest shown by the citizens' cooperation in this worthwhile work for cancer patients.

To give you a more complete idea of the great need in this work, during the year 1950 in the metropolitan area of Detroit over 2,350,000 dressings were furnished from headquarters. In cases of emergency the loan closet furnishes the following equipment: hospital beds, stryker bed, bedside table, wheelchairs, bed vessels, rubber sheets, afghans, back rests, rubbing alcohol, vaseline, soap, adhesive tape, absorbent cotton, hypodermic needles, bed jackets, hospital gowns, zinc stearate powder.

To all the church circles, organizations, societies, homemakers, office workers, Girl Scouts and every citizen who has contributed so much to this project in Northville, the American Cancer Society is so very grateful.

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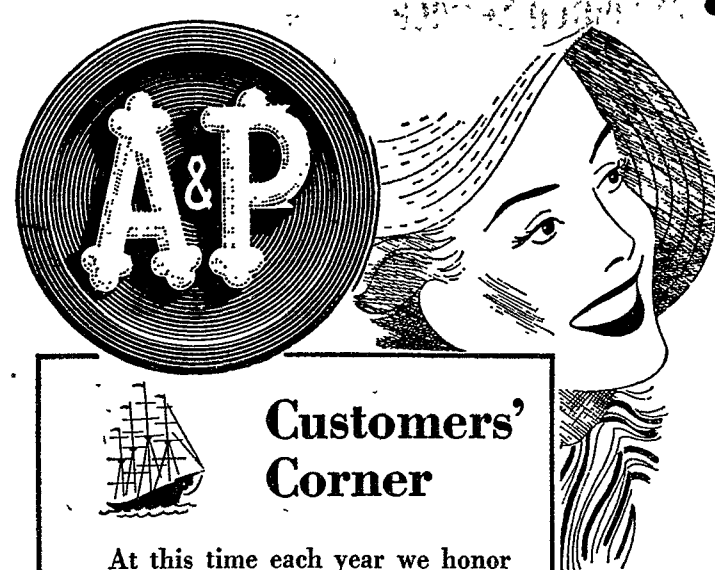

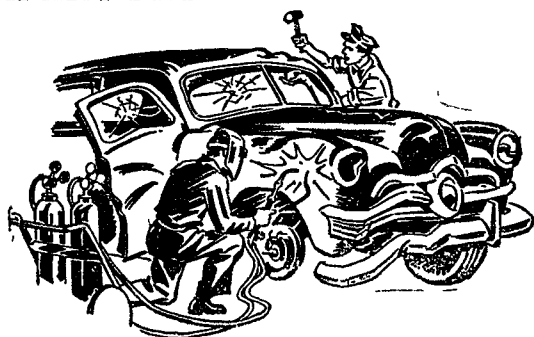

## MICHIGAN MIRROR NON-PARTISAN NEWS LETTER

Following a series of visits to Washington by Governor Williams and his executive secretary, Larry Farrell, a State Defense Production Council has been formed in theory it will do for production what the Defense Council does for defense preparation.

Actually this new organization is designed to help channel defense contracts into Michigan, to keep everyone working during conversion—and to take care of the little industry. It's too young to predict its success.

But Williams' attempts to bring production to Michigan has gained a bit of attention in Washington. Observers there feel he is taking a bold (and commendable) step in overtly campaigning for national business.

This doesn't mean he is looked upon with any more favor so far as the vice-presidency is concerned. Our national politicians still look upon Williams' campaigning as "juvenile and childish". But they also look right in the teeth of his reelection—with a Republican cabinet.

Michigan's deer herds have been fortunate this year. While the annual kill is expected to be up this year because of deep snow (and the subsequent loss of forage) periodical snows have kept the toll below the danger point. In 1947-48 more than 100,000 of the animals starved.

Michigan produced minerals valued at \$207,608,000 in 1949—second highest production year recorded. It was three percent less than the 1948 all-time high. Iron and copper accounted for

more than 31 percent of the production valuation.

Newspapers all over the state have been shocked recently by series of juvenile crimes. It is popularly thought that during periods of war and stress this type of crime increases. But what can be done to prevent such outbreaks? The pendulum now is on the upswing.

Michigan budget parers, looking frantically about, have seized on one bone on which they can chew—the state colleges. Michigan State College and the University of Michigan have asked a total of \$18,000,000. Conservative estimates figure at least \$3,000,000 will be lopped off

But the U. of M. will get its new medical center and possibly M.S.C. will be given a library since that money comes under capital outlay and not the general appropriation.

With defense orders tightening the automobile market, officials are predicting car shortages in six months. That is, of course, if the present trend toward defense production continues.

Michigan's 114 bureaus, long the target for pungent remarks, have been referred to lately as the "boards, bureaus and complications".

The State Department of Labor has listed the increase in living costs at 3.7 per cent while the National Conference Board places the figure at 4.4 percent. They agree that the trend is up.

State defense questions may be answered this month. Brig. Gen. Lester C. Maitland state civil defense director, has called a Feb. 19 conference in Lansing of all local defense directors. He has asked the atomic energy commission and federal civil defense authorities to send teams of experts to answer queries.

No matter how remote your home community in Michigan, a bombing attack at any place in the State is likely to seriously affect your way of life. That fact became evident last Saturday when Gen. Lester C. Maitland, Michigan Civil Defense director, met with about two score Civil Defense directors in the metropolitan area for an emergency feeding demonstration.

The demonstration followed the stockpiling of some 2,000,000 paper cups and containers for disaster use only by the Paper Cup & Container Institute. The paper service is being stockpiled without cost to the State by 16 paper manufacturing companies in the Institute.

Use of paper service is essential, when bombs knock out water and gas supplies for dishwashing, hospitals, restaurants, and hotels are left helpless in such emergencies after their dishes have been used once.

## Ship Reactivation

The enlarged activity in the building and reactivation of both naval and merchant vessels has increased the demand for cupronickel alloys where they are employed extensively for condenser tubing and salt water lines to withstand the corrosive effects of sea water.

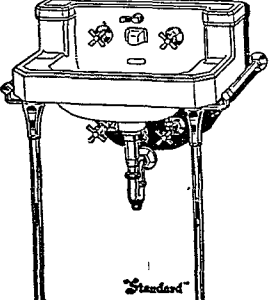
## NHS Pupils To Play at Music Festival
