Men's Night Speaker **Cost of Living Adjustment Granted School Employees**

All full time employees, including school teachers, secretarcustodians, principals and he school superintendent, were granted a \$200 cost of living adustment by the Board of Eduation, at their regular meeting,

last Monday evening. One-half of the cost of living increase will be paid on February 15 with the balance to come at he close of the school year in The living adjustment totals about \$10,500 and comes rom surplus state aid, over and above the school's regular allotment. Total surplus state aid is expected to be about \$15,000.

The school board also voted to repair the old portion of the grade school building. 





In contrast to last year's dismal season, conservation department ski areas in southern Michigan are getting a big play especially on weekends.

The Holly recreation area, drawing primarily Flint and Pontiac skiers, is reporting record attendance of nearly 900 weekly. An above average number of skaters, ice fishermen and fox hunters are part of this visitor total. Excellent snow is attracting

good crowds at the Highland recreation area near Pontiac and the Ortonville area near Flint Other locations getting more attention this season are Muskegon park and the Pontiac Lake, Rochester-Utica and Bald Mountain recreation areas in Oakland and Macomb counties.

None of these ski spots are elaborate, according to the department's parks division, but they are all open to public use when snow permits.

Notables To Speak at Michigan State

Dr. Ralph J. Bunche, director of United Nations trusteeships, and Max Lerner, widely-known author and editor, will discuss "The Amèrican Way" in a special symposium at Michigan State College February 28.

The one-day symposium will consist of morning and afternoon lectures by the principal speakers followed by general discussions by MSC faculty members.

In asking Drs. Bunche and Lerner to speak at MSC, Pres. John A. Hannah said, "It is our feeling that a real responsibility rest with publicly-supported colleges \... to exercise some leadership in awakening a greater appreciation on the part of Americans that the American system provides not only -the highest standard of living but the greatest opportunity for individual development of any system yet devised."



Hot Cross Buns Have Greek Origin

Almost as ancient as worship itself is the hot cross bun.

Although the stories of the origin of these spicy, sugar-coated buns are varied, their association with religious customs has never faltered ,according to the American Bakers Association.

Records claim that Cecrops, egendary Greek hero said to have been the founder of Attica known today as Greece, offered sweet bun to the gods as far back as 1,000 B. C Petrified and perfectly shaped buns were discovered at Herculaneum, destroyed by Mt. Vesuvius in 79 A. D.

The early Egyptians offered ouns, bearing two horns, to their Moon Goddess. The early Greeks changed the horn mark to a cross. The Saxons marked their buns with the cross in honor of Eastre their Goddess of Light. Romans too, ate crossed bread, buying it at the temple doors when they vent to offer public sacrifice.

The Christian fathers adapted the Greek and Roman custom of eating crossed buns as a religious factor in Lenten observance Some reports state this custom stems from the bun's universal religious observance, while other reports say the bun was something the people felt they could eat during the Lenten period to replace pastries, cakes, and other Rev. William A. Johnson of the rich foods which they may have decided to forego.

In England, which most people consider the native land of the modern hot cross bun, they were designed to be eaten on Good Friday, a fast day. Today, however, hot cross buns are eaten during the entire Lenten period.

Hot cross buns are most popular today in England and in the United States, where the custom was brought by the early English settlers.

The religious significance of the hot cross bun has been lost! today, and it is no longer emblematical.

Quaint traditions and superstitions still cling to the hot cross bun. In England, it is believed if a hot cross bun is hung in the chimney place on Good Friday.


Northville will be represented in the South-Eastern Michigan solo and ensemble festival to be held in Ypsılantı, Saturday, February 17 by Marlene Weiss
