WW II veterans are given a redit of \$160.00 for each month nonth of active military or naval service in addition to any wages ployment covered by Social Security. These credits are allowable regardless of whether (a) the veteran is alive or deceased: (b) he died in active service or out; (c) death occurred more than three years after discharge or separation, or (d) pension or compensation is payable by the Veterans Administration

In the event of the Veteran's death before retirement, WW II wage credits will be used in determining the amount of survivor benefits.

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




