#### **State Park Campers** Must Obtain Permits

Solitude-loving campers who pitch tents or park trailers in remote spots of state parks and recreation areas must obtain pernits and pay the regular 50-centa-day camping fee, conservation department parks officials ad-

Electricity at campgrounds where it is available is an additional 20 cents a day. Fees for campground and other camping spots are collected in advance for the number of days campers will be in the park.

Campers who must leave before they've used up the time paid for can be credited for renaining days and spend them at any state park. All days must be used at one park or recreation area. Refunds will be made only for emergencies such as death or illness in the family.

No fee is charged for admittance to state parks or recreation areas or for use of beaches picnic grounds or park facilities other than camping locations.

An outstanding achievement was carried out by the sixth grade and junior high school teachers in preparing the sixth grade for high school next fall. 6. Our school staff, teaching aids, buildings, philosophy, etc., have recently been thoroughly inspected by a team from the University of Michigan and upon the basis of their findings our school has again been accredited for a three year period by the University.

7. THE NEXT STEP.

In continuation of plans for improvement of the school curriculum laid down several years ago, the industrial arts department is now receiving attention. Several thousand dollars is being spent for lathes, shapers, and other machines so that in the fall a new course in Machine Shop skills will be introduced. When completed this program will accommodate from 15 to 30 boys per year in learning machine trades.

# **Against Violating**

. Home builders and contractors were warned today against inadvertently violating National Production: Authority rules restricting residential housing construction to 2,500 square feet of calculated floor space.

William T. Hunt, Detroit disfrict manager of the U.S. Department of Commerce and NPA, said investigations reveal several instances, especially in some of the more exclusive residential areas; of construction being started on homes which exceed the limit.

"This is not so, NPA approval 2,500 square-foot limitation," he emphasized.

"The 2,500-square-foot regulation has replaced the former \$35,000 limit on residential construction. Apparently some builders are not yet aware of this new ruling, which went into effect July 3," Hunt added.

Heavy fines and imprisonment are listed in the Defense Production Act for any violations of NPA regulations.


