## Record, E. J. Willis Aid **House of Correction Program**

Through the Northville Record column, "Record Ramblings," the rehabilitation program of the Detroit House of Correction on Six Mile road has gained publicity. The collection for neckties and stockings for use in the women's division in making rugs and draperies is aided by the Record and E. J. Willis.

The institution, where the ties are sent, at the present time houses 880 men and 361 women, states A. Blake Gillis, warden for 31 years. Mrs. Dorothy Leuty is the director of the women's division.

"Rehabilitation of society's weak is the work of the Detroit House of Correction farm, which is located just outside Northville on the Phoenix road on the Plymouth-Northville township line There, under the superintendency of 'Captain' Edward Denniston, a population of 700 men and 380 women is guided to social health and to ways of benefit to themselves and society as a whole.

"The House of Correction farm branch was first opened August 18, 1920, when on the site there were only tenant farms. Captain Denniston then came to the farm with five men prisoners.

"A building 35 by 120 feet was erected in 1920 and a little later a 20-foot addition made. This was used first as kitchen, dining room and sleeping quarters for the prisoners, and later as a dining room for the officers and men. The population increased to 27 men prisoners by January 1, 1921; today there are over 100 men

"In the beginning it was planned to have a main prison in one year, and authorization was given to build shacks for 50 prison-

The original plan for the the corrective prison field' prison called for 1,200 cells with no dormitories, but this was modified to the present cell home containing only 102 cells, with provisions made for adding 102 nore cells without altering the building.

"The prison farm now consists

of 56 buildings on 1,228 acres of land, with a total of 170 employes, 57 of them guards The buildings include 17 dormitories, ten old and seven new; kitchen, dining rooms recreation and visiting quarters, greenhouse, horse and dany barns, chicken house, depot, eight cottages, superintendent's residence, canning and laundry buildings, and administration building. About 150,000 pieces are laundered monthly for the municipal departments of Detroit by the laundry division and in the canning factory fruits and vegetables are put up for the farm, and other city and state institutions as well Last year a total of 4,000 cases of peas alone were sold in addition to the amount used on the farm. Mrs. K. H. Campbell, assistant superintendent, in charge of the women's division, supervises the model laundry and canning plants

"All food used on the farm is raised there. A dairy herd of 27 cows was bought from Harry Clark and Charles Young of Northville when the farm was started. The herd has now increased to 150, all registered Holsteins. At present 70 are available for milking, All butchering is done at the farm, 400 head of hogs being prepared per year. MOTORS Cold storage facilities are now provided for 100 head of hogs at a time, and 256 chunks of beef. Prison labor is also used for road ers until that time. "A total of 12,000 prisoners are now received at the farm each year including those sentenced anywhere from one day to life. 




