Sulphur Mineral Making **Current Medical History**

From the sulphur 'n' nolasses of Grandma's day to the sulfapyridine of modern médicine, sulphur has played the role of healer.

The startling performance of the sulfa drugs in combating some of our most dreaded diseases points up the importance to our daily lives of the magic mineral from which they are derived. Actually, sulphur's use as a medicine goes all the way back to prehistoric times, according to Freeport Sulphur Company. The cavemen ate sulphur to cleanse their blood—long before Grandma ever thought of compounding it with molasses to make her cure-all spring tonic easier to take. The historian Pliny, writing around 50 A.D., when the Roman Empire was at its height, told of four kinds of sulphur and attributed 14 medicinal virtues to the strange substance.

Sulphur plays a key role in many fields other than medicine. In some form or other it goes into the manufacture of almost everything we eat, wear or use—notably steel. fertilizers, rubber, paper, paints, plastics, explosives. That is why a current weeld-wide shortage is causing deep concern in industry and agriculture and has spurred a global search for new sources. One recent result was the discovery of a large new sulphur deposit near the mouth of the Mississippi river, where Freeport will build a plant expected to bring up a half-million tons a year of the yellow element.



out that the first page of the new directory-the one which customarily lists "emergency numbers"-has been revamped so that each subscriber can write in the telephone numbers of the police and fire department of his own community

"In the past, mistakes have been made, with customers hurrying to complete calls for help by looking at the heading on the page for the service wented, and then calling the wrong number," Hartrick said.

If subscribers do their pait in listing their own fire number on the top of that page, there'll be fewer lives endangered, and less property lost," Hartrick said, in an appeal to reduce the number of mistakes made in reporting the outbreak of fire The manager emphasized Mich-

igan Bell's desire to assist fire departments in combating "very real and human mistakes when disaster strikes and panicky calls for help must be made under considerable stress.

"We hope this is a partial solution to the problem, and of real assistance when it's needed most.'

The new directory also contains the listings of Farmington, Plymouth, South Lyon and Walled Lake.

This year the new directory is three-column, buff-covered book. Over 3,600 copies will be used during the ensuing year.



Incidentally, it should be said that various members of Congress have demanded of Federal Security Administrator Oscar Ewing that he cancel all these projects. But it is understood that he will not do so unless Congress takes specific action next year requiring him to act

Six months ago the Federal government declared Ean Diego, California, a defense housing area, and moved in with a widely publicized program to solve the area's housing shortage. Builders were authorized to construct 6000 dwellings under the federal program. To date, seven houses are under construction.

The program calls for 2000 houses for sale and 4000 for rental purposes. Builders say the federal authorities have set sale prices of \$8,500 for two-bedroom houses and \$9,500 for three-bedroom houses. One builder in San Diego has said that inflationary prices of building materials are such that it would be impossible to build anything at those prices even if building regulations were waived and cracker-box houses were built


None of the 4000 rental housing units has been started. Home builders say unanimously that the federal authorities have set rent ceilings so low that it is utterly impossible to get any fi nancing at all for such construct-

To point to all this, of course. lies in the threat of the federal bureaucrats to construct public housing on a large scale, if private builders refuse to build and sell or rent at prices which would result only in substantial financial loss on each house One might conclude that the federal authorities are trying to force through a public housing project
