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You Can't Cheat An Honest Man!

Out of the hundreds of pieces of mail that come to the desk of even a small town editor, there occasionally is one that is so striking that it cannot be forgotten. Such was an editorial which we received three months ago, carrying the title: "You Can't Cheat An Honest Man". It was written by Fred G. Clark and Richard Stanton Rimanoczy, of the American Economic Foundation, who, in our opinion are among the country's top down-to-earth economists.

Because it so aptly described the attitude of a great many individuals who over the past twenty years have come to look to the government in Washington to do for them what they should be anxious to do for themselves, we reprint it, in part, as a contribution to straight thinking that may be desirable when the major political parties start leveling a barrage of election year promises at the American public. It read:

"The greatest asset of swindlers and confidence men is the desire of their victims to benefit themselves by taking advantage of opportunities such as, 'The owner must sell this valuable diamond immediately for whatever he can get for it'."

"Most of the victims of swindlers do not consider themselves dishonest: they are simply being smart and not slamming the door on Lady Luck.

"But when they find that they have been cheated, they howl to high heaven for justice.

"Similarly, the greatest asset of the political leaders who would swindle the citizens out of their constitutional freedoms is the desire of most citizens to benefit themselves by taking advantage of an opportunity to be one of a privileged group that receives special financial help from the Government.

"Most of these citizens do not consider themselves dishonest, even though they know in their hearts that they are getting something for nothing at the expense of somebody else: the spark of larceny that lurks in most hearts tells them they rightly deserve the special privilege which the political swindler assured them should be theirs.

"And once this special privilege is gained, it tends to become in the minds of those enjoying it something that they cannot get along without.

"They will, therefore, support politically the people who promise to keep it coming.

"The real test of a citizen's character comes later when he has to choose between giving up this privilege or giving up some of his freedom in order to keep the special privilege."

From now until election day next November, the American public will be deluged by campaign promises made by leaders of both political parties. Many of these promises will be made either directly or indirectly in terms of security for the individual, or special privilege for selected groups.

Unfortunately, millions of younger voters have grown to maturity during an era in which the powers of our national government have grown to unprecedented proportions at the expense of individual freedom and initiative. Most of them have been educated to believe that security is something that can be achieved by Congressional action. The same is true of a great many older men and women who, in their hearts, must know that the security promised by politicians is only a mirage without substance.

Let the party platforms have been adopted, there is, of course, no way of separating the wheat from the chaff. Let us hope, however, that they will be worded clearly enough so voters who think for themselves will be able to distinguish their own and the country's best interests.

How the Mighty Have Fallen

Inflation which robs the people and saps the life blood of the nation, to most Americans, has always been a catastrophe occurring only in backward and distant lands foredoomed by a paucity of natural wealth. We have prided ourselves on the supremacy of the mighty U.S. dollar; entitled to its regal position by vast resources in raw materials and skills, a guaranteed inoculation against the disease of inflation which has toppled the greatest states in history.

Thus, the steady decline during the past 36 months of the U.S. dollar in terms of Canadian currency has come as a profound shock to history. We are now confronted with the innate truths of history and economics—an individual with a high income can spend himself into bankruptcy as quickly as the man with a low income. The only difference is, the more important the individual or nation, the greater the consequences.

In January of 1950 you could purchase Canadian dollars at your bank for 87½ cents per dollar. Ten thousand dollars would have commanded over \$11,425 in Canadian money. Today your ten thousand U.S. dollars would buy only \$9,950 in Canadian dollars. And, if the present trend continues, you may soon have to pay a ten cent premium for every Canadian dollar you purchase.

What has happened? There are several answers. Canada has a balanced budget. In fact she has enjoyed a surplus every year since the end of the war. Canadian taxes are lower than those in the United States in spite of the fact that Canada is spending as much on a per capita basis on foreign aid and defense as is this country. Thus, due to wise fiscal policies, Canadian money has stability.

Fear of the U.S. dollar and high taxes has encouraged a serious flight of capital from the United States to Canada and other nations in the Western Hemisphere. (Also a sign of approaching inflation and insolvency). The flight of capital combined with sound Canadian fiscal policies and unsound government financing in the United States has for the first time toppled the mighty U.S. dollar. It can happen here!

Green Thumb

by Paul Newton

Spring is the time to think of plantings which will bring the maximum of enjoyment with a minimum of work. Flowering shrubs are excellent for this purpose. With a little thought and some advice from your nurseryman they will give you color throughout the spring, summer and early fall.

Forsythia is one of the shrubs that blooms earliest. Its yellow flowers come in April and are familiar to everyone. Lynwood Gold is an excellent variety with deep yellow blossoms which go well with the paler yellow Spring Glory. The latter is excellent for indoor forcing.

Flowering quince (Cydonia) is another early bloomer whose newer varieties have a color range from soft pink to deep scarlet.

Flowering Almond in May Flowering almond blooms in early May. It is low-growing and no border is complete without it. The double pink flowering Prunus Amygdalus is one of the choicest varieties.

Prunus Pissardi is a small tree which flowers profusely in early May. Its deep purple foliage lends beauty throughout the summer and fall. For best effect it should be planted with the gray green Russian olive for background.

Lilacs have no equal for fragrance and range in color from soft to deep purple. For a picture in your border, plant blue or pink iris in front of your lilac; face this with blue flax, with your foreground of alyssum saxatile.

Viburnum For Fragrance Viburnum Carlecephalum planted in front of a window which will be open in late May and early June will fill your house with fragrance. Its gray-green foliage will contrast well with the deeper greens of your plantings near the house.

The flowering dogwood (Cornus Florida) needs partial shade and an alkaline soil.

The flowering crab family offers an endless variety of color. Its fruits attract birds in the fall.

The beauty bush (Kalkwizia Amabilis) has shell-pink blossoms and makes a delightful background for blue-purple iris. It has an upright growth with arching branches which come to the ground and cover so no facer planting is needed.

Weigela (Bristol Ruby) flowers in the spring and again in the fall. Few shrubs have as long a blooming season. The Eva Rathke variety is also hardy and an early bloomer.

Hypericums are low-growing shrubs which are often used as facers and for ground cover in front of house plantings. The flowers are bright yellow. The bark is shiny, exfoliated and ornamental in winter.

Hydrangeas For Show Hydrangea Quercifolia has very showy flowers with conical heads and foliage resembling the oak leaf. It does well in shady locations.

Blueberry (Vaccinium) has small bell-like creamy flowers. Its foliage turns a beautiful scarlet in the fall. It requires an acid soil.

For July, when the border becomes to fade, Potentilla Fruticosa will stand out. It grows about two to two and one-half feet high, has brilliant golden-yellow flowers from June to early October, and can be used in front of taller shrubs.

Butterfly bush (Buddleia) blossoms throughout the summer and is easy to grow. Its color range is from pink through violet-purple to deep red. A new white-flowering variety which grows to a height of six feet is now on the market.

Although there are many more flowering shrubs, those mentioned above will lend some interest to your border through the entire season. Your local nurseryman can give you advice and information on your soil conditions and those varieties which will bring you the best results.

AMENDMENT TO THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF NOVI ORDINANCE NO. 7



THE TOWNSHIP OF NOVI ORDAINS: Part I. That Ordinance No. 2 of the Township of Novi is hereby amended by the amending of the title to read as follows:

An Ordinance, enacted under Act 184, Public Acts of 1943 of the State of Michigan, to provide for the establishment of zoning districts lying wholly within the unincorporated parts of the Township of Novi, Oakland County, Michigan, within which zoning districts the use land, natural resources and structures, the height, the area, the size and the location of buildings hereafter erected, the light and ventilation of such buildings, the area of yards, courts, and other open spaces, and the density of population shall be regulated; to provide further for a method of administration and to prescribe penalties for the violation of its provisions.

Part II. That Ordinance No. 2 of the Township of Novi is hereby amended by the amending of Sections 3.01, 3.03, 18.02, 18.03 by the deletion of the phrase "INCLUDING TENTS AND TRAILER COACHES" from these sections.

Part III. That Ordinance No. 2 of the Township of Novi is hereby amended by the amending of Section 9.01 (b) by the deletion of the phrase "AUTO COURT" from this section.

Part IV. That Ordinance No. 2 of the Township of Novi is hereby amended by the amending of Section 9.01 (d) of Article IX and Section 12.05 (h) of Article XII, respectively to read as follows: Section 9.01 (d) Motels and motor courts subject to the requirements of Article XII, Section 12.05 (h) and the regulations of the State, and shall not be detrimental either by odor, noise, smoke or vibration to the zoning district in which they are located or to the adjacent zoning district.

Section 12.05 (h) Permit a public garage or a gasoline filling station in a district permitting such use provided that before the Building Inspector issues a permit there is on file with the Board of Appeals the written consent of the owners of sixty percent of the frontage of all property within four hundred (400) feet of any part of the premises whereon such public garage or gasoline filling station is to be established, erected or enlarged, and not separated therefrom by more than one street or alley, and the written consent of all the owners of the frontage of the property immediately abutting or opposite any part of the premises whereon such public garage or filling station is to be established, erected or enlarged and separated therefrom by not more than one street or alley.

Part V. That Ordinance No. 2 of the Township of Novi is hereby amended by the addition of new sections to appear and become a part of said Ordinance as Sections 12.05 (n) and 18.06 as follows:

Section 12.05 (n) Permit motels and motor courts in C-2 Districts and subject to the requirements of the laws of the State of Michigan, provided that lot area equal to that required for a residence shall be provided for management, provided that each unit provides a lot area of one thousand (1,000) square feet for the first room of eighty (80) or more square feet and an additional area equal to twice the room area for each additional room of eighty (80) square feet or more and provided that each unit or group of units shall have two (2) side yards of not less than ten (10) feet each for interior lot side yards; however, when side yards abut a side street then such street side yard shall be not less than twenty-five (25) feet; a front yard of not less than twenty-five (25) feet; a rear yard of not less than ten (10) feet and separate buildings shall be not less than ten (10) feet apart; and further provided, that each unit shall have one (1) room with not less than one hundred fifty (150) square feet of floor area; a bathroom of not less than twenty-five (25) square feet of floor area; and not less than fifty (50) square feet of floor area for a kitchenette, if provided; and further provided, that the building height of a motel shall not exceed one (1) story or fifteen (15) feet; and further provided, that no guest shall occupy such accommodations of any motel or motor court for a period of more than one (1) month within any calendar year.

Section 18.06-RELIEF FROM PERSONAL RESPONSIBILITY-The Building Inspector shall not be personally liable while acting for the Township and he is hereby relieved from all personal liability from any damage that may accrue to persons or property as a result of any act required or permitted in the discharge of his official duties.

Part VI. That Ordinance No. 2 of the Township of Novi is hereby amended by amending the Zoning Map as indicated on said Zoning Map attached hereto and made a part of this Ordinance.

Part VII. CONFLICTING PROVISIONS REPEALED. Any ordinance or parts of any ordinance in conflict with any of the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

Part VIII. WHEN EFFECTIVE. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the public peace, health and safety and are hereby ordered to take effect thirty (30) days after final enactment and publication.

Part IX. VALIDITY. Should any section, clause or provision of this Ordinance be declared by the courts to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole, or any part thereof other than the part so declared to be invalid.

Supervisor, Frank D. Clark Clerk, Earl Banks I, Earl Banks, Clerk of the Township of Novi do hereby certify that the above Ordinance was approved, and adopted by the Novi Township Board at a regular meeting thereof duly called and held on this 7th day of April, A.D. 1952, and was ordered to be given publication in the manner prescribed by law.

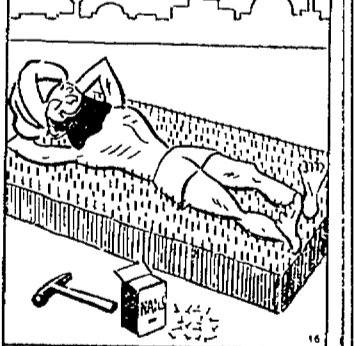

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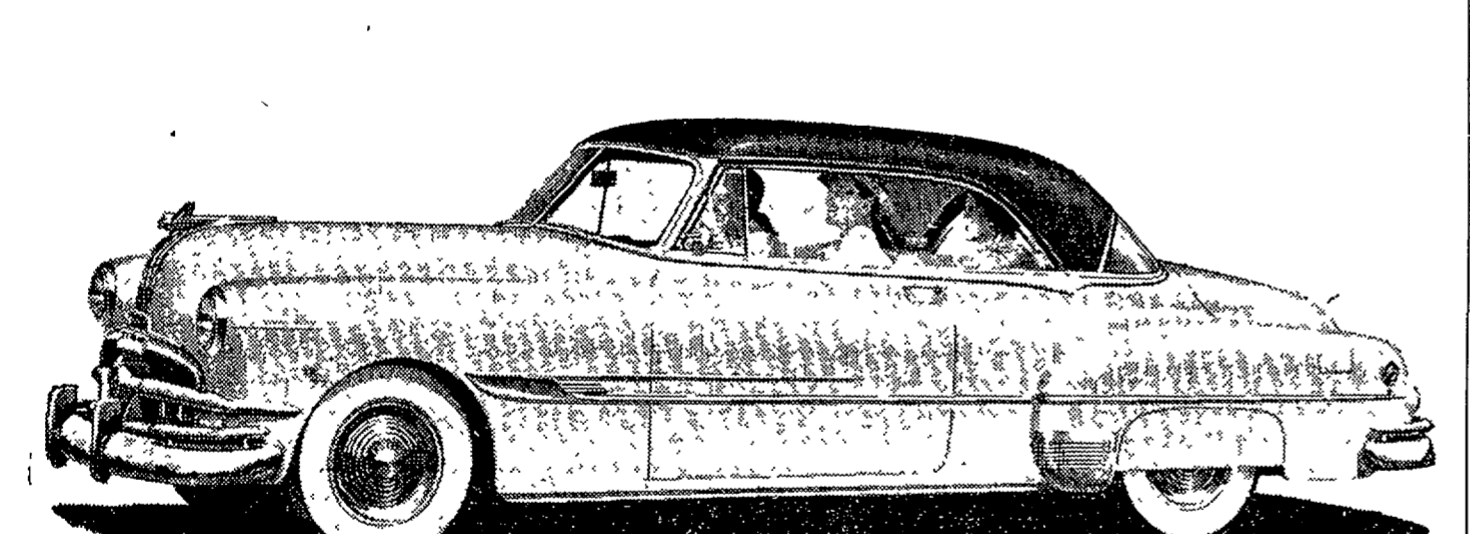
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Cub Scout Pack Exhibits Handicraft

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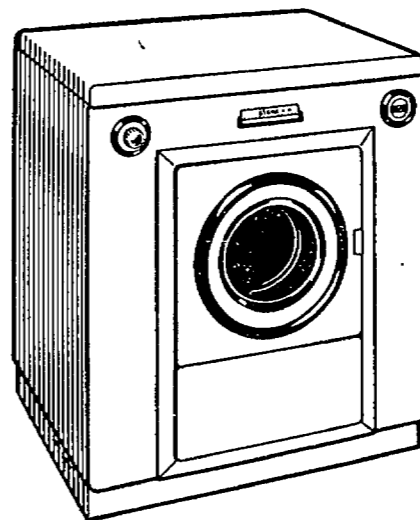

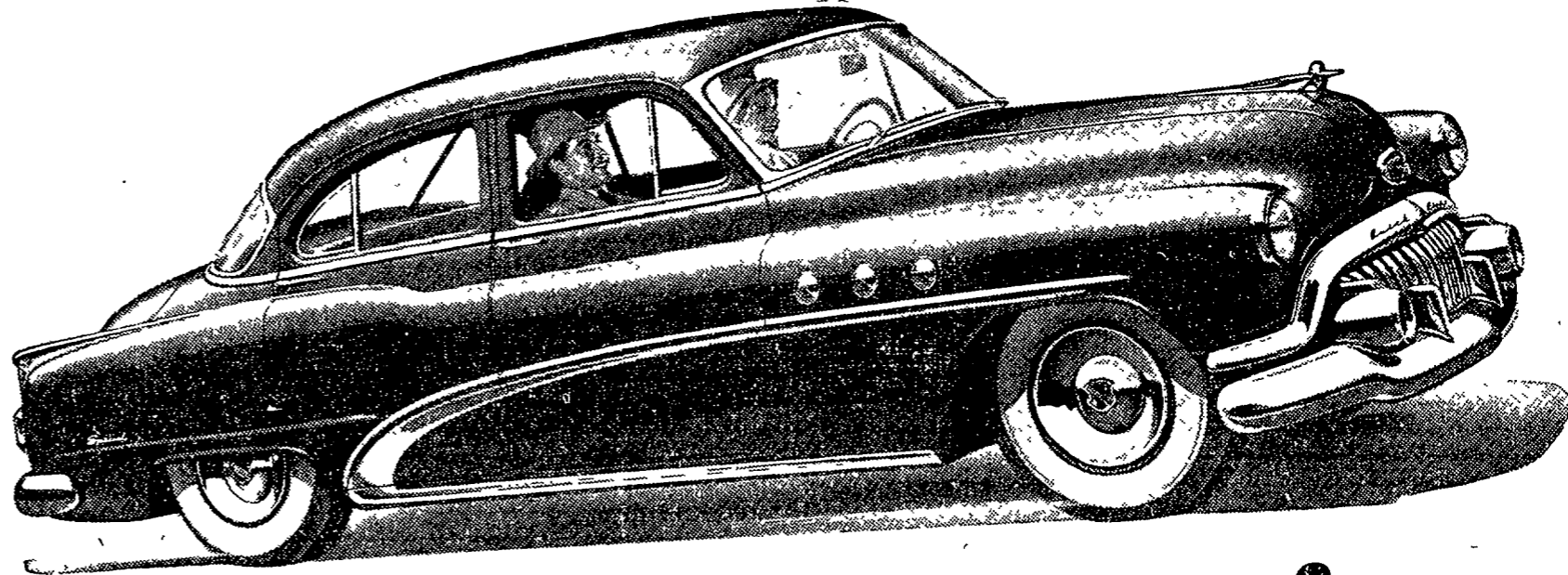

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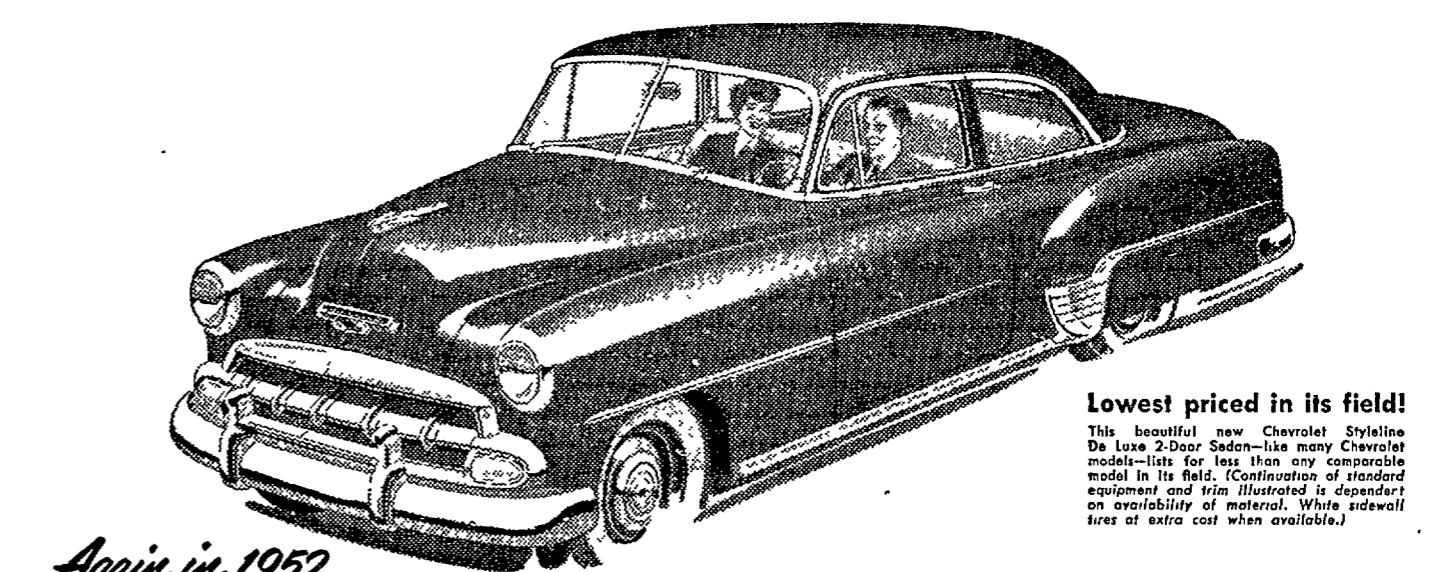
