#### Littell Opinion

The portion of Mr. Littell's opinion which sums up which signatures are necessary follows: "It is our opinion that any petition for the initial incorporation of the Village of Northville, to-

gether with additional areas from Northville and Novi Townships, as a home rule city, must be signed by qualified electors who are freeholders residing in the whole area to a number not less than 1 percent of the total population of the two townships and the village. We are further of the opinion that such petition should contain not less than twenty-five (25) signa tures of qualified signers residing within the Township of Northville, exclusive of the Village, not less than twenty-five (25) signatures of qualified signers residing in the Township of Novi, exclusive of the Village, and not less than twenty-five (25) signatures of qualified signers residing deficiency in the necessary numing after the above minimum number of required signatures has been obtained may come from qualified signers residing anywhere in the three affected areas.

"The foregoing procedure appears to us to be the result of a literal interpretation of the statute. However, because of the very apparent\ambiguities existing throughout the entire statute, possibility of an attack upon the proceedings to incorporate, we believe that the better practice would be to restrict the signaures on the petition to those qualified electors who are freeholders residing in the territory to be included in the proposed home rule city. We believe that a petition containing only the signatures of qualified electors who are freenolders residing within the areas of the proposed city could not bethe subject of valid attack, assuming that all other statutory requirements are complied with."

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

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






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#### **Labor Day Holiday** Legalized in 1894

er J. McGuire, who first proposed a national labor holiday in 1882, and fought for it con-tinuously until it was legalized by Act of Congress in 1894.

McGuire, who died in 1906, founded the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners, was a leader in organizing the American Federation of Labor and later led the fight for an eight-hour working day.

M. A. Hutcheson, of Indianaoolis, president of the Carpenters' union, was largely responsible for initiating the imposing memorial to McGuire in Arlington Cemetery, Camden, N. J.
