## **Drillers Search** for Oil on Farm West of Village

Continuing progress in the drilling of a well on the R. V. LeMaster farm at 8245 Napier Rd. has spurred further speculation that there may be extensive natural gas and oil deposits in the area west of Northville.

At least two other paying gas wells have been brought in on properties almost immediately adjacent to the LeMaster farm. In addition, several homes in the vicinity are heated by gas from nearby wells. A crew from the W. C. Taggart

Co. of Big Rapids is drilling on the LeMaster farm. SHOULD KNOW SOON

By last Friday, they had reach ed 2,800 feet and expected to know within a week or two whether their efforts are to be suc-

cessful. "We plan to go down to at least 3,000 feet and we should know by members said.

Since drillers were at a depth of 2,800 feet, however, it was presumed they were looking primarily for oil. Ordinarily gas is found at a higher level.
