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# **Mustangs Tie for League Lead With** Win Over Keego

The Northville High School Mustangs grabbed a share of first place in the Wayne-Oakland County League basketball race Tuesday night by trouncing Keego Harbor, 74-49, on the N.H.S. floor.

The Mustangs put on their best offensive show of the year and it couldn't have come at a more opportune time.

The Mustang win, coupled with a Milford loss to Clarkston the same evening, gives each team a Dr. John Rogers 5-1 league record and a share of top spot in the standings.

### TAKE EARLY LEAD

Keego was no match for Coach Dick Kay's cagers. The Mustangs, again paced by Glenn Howarth and Ed Nash, took an early lead and were well in front for the rest of the evening.

They led 18-7 at the end of the first quarter and enjoyed a 39-18 edge at half-time.

Howarth connected for 11 field goals and two foul shots for 24 points. It was his best night of the season.. Nash had 18 points on eight field goals and two counters from the foul line.

Al Ifversen and Darwin Teschka each had eight pòints while the other -- Northville, starter; freshman Buddy Bell, scored six.

federal budget to Congress this Last Wednesday was the first week, the President declared: anniversary of the Eisenhower Administration and the President received a fitting gift from the Senate in the form of a 51-33 favorable vote on the St. Lawrence Seaway Bill. This was the first point in the Chief Executive's dynamic and progressive legislative program to win Senate approval. The tally showed 25 Republicans, 25 Democrats and one Independent voting for the Seaway; 15 Republicans and 13 Democrats against. Michigan Senators Ferguson and Potter were in the forefront on the fight to push through authorization for the vital project. From then on, the opposition crumbled fast. The victory was a well-earned present for President Eisenhower, who has worked diligently for its success. The President's spadework hasn't always made the headlines, but, the high prestige of his office has always een available when needed.

In evidence of this, I can report that the House Public Works Committee, where the Seaway bill is now pending, shortly will be invited to the White House. 





### FIRE DEPARTMENT

According to Glen Salow, Novi Township fire chief, the fire de-partment is stafted by 13 volun-teer firemen who live and work in the Grand River-Novi Rd. area. In the event of a fire call these men are summoned by an alarm system in the fire house. Should the call come at night the men are summoned by telephone and the calls are relayed by those called by personnel in the fire-

Salow pointed out that two firemen are now needed to replace two who are retiring after 25 years service. A volunteer fireman gets \$3.00 per completed run. The fire chief further indicated that a plan is being formulated whereby unpaid volunteers will act as trainees to provide re-placements for those retiring or otherwise leaving the department

The department has one fire truck and one tank-wagon-the latter with a capacity of 500 gal-

To be prepared in the event of

fires reaching catastrophic proportions, a reciprocal fire service plan has been worked out with surrounding communities whereby the fire departments of those ommunities will lend aid to Novi Township. In the same manner township equipment is dispatched to assist those other communities in similar circumstances. This does not mean that, in such cases, the township is left without fire protection because there are always adjacent communities on a stand-by basis ready to take care of calls in the area. monies for Michigan's legislature. First session is usually brief, informal. A little like opening day of school after summer vacation. organization gets under way. Its "house" in order, the governor is "called in" for his address. This speech bears the same relationhip to state government as the United State President's "State of the Nation" address does to ederal government.

Special chairs are crowded into the House of Representative chamber so that Senators, members of the Supreme Court in their official robes, and other high officials can be present to hear the governor speak his opinions on what laws and appropriations should be made.

In following sessions, the legisature is expected to consider subjects set forth in the governor's message and propose measures to deal with the problems ie outlined.

Before the session begins cerain key dates are agreed upon. These include the closing date, final date for submitting bills and a day by which committees can recommend action on all bills under its jurisdiction or permit hem t odie.

Closing dates of this session is set for April 9.

Legislators have until Feb. 10 to introduce bills. After that date whatever business is submitted will go through the legislative machinery.

this would be a short session. But now predictions are that 1,000 bills will be submitted. This is more than can be properly considered in the time alotted. The more important ones will be acted upon; many must drop from sight, not to become issues this
