## Reasons Why Northville Should Become A City

By Citizens Committee On City Incorporation

In our letter to the Northville Record last week we discussed the basic difference between a city and a village. It was pointed out that village residents are the only citizens in Michigan who support and are serviced by two overlapping units of local government.

In addition it was emphasized that it is proposed to incorporate as a city exactly the present area of the village.

In this letter we wish to review some of the basic advantages of changing the legal status of the Village of Northville to that of a city.

As residents of a city we would no longer be a part of two local units of government — the village and the township (s). From the standpoint of convenience and simplicity this in itself is an advantage. Residents of the city will be directly concerned with only one local government and will elect only one set of non-partisan local officials who will be responsible for all local government functions and services.

These include some functions which Northville township and Novi township now perform for Village residents. Let us review some of these functions, however, and see why they involve overlap and inefficiency.

- 1. Assessment of property for tax purposes.** The township (s) assesses property, including that within the Village, for township, county and school tax purposes. But the Village also is required to have an assessor who assesses property for the village tax. As a city, however, the assessment rolls prepared by our city assessor would be used for all taxes on property located within the city. The needless waste of two separate assessments (and two boards of review) for the same properties would be eliminated.
- 2. Tax collections.** We now pay our village taxes to the Village Treasurer and our township, county and school taxes to the Township Treasurer (s). As a city, however, our school and county taxes, as well as city taxes, would be paid to the office of the city treasurer. Any township taxes on property within the present Village will be eliminated forever when Northville becomes a city.
- 3. Registration and elections.** The township (s) maintains registration records and conducts township, county, state, and national elections. But the Village must also maintain registration records and conduct Village elections for its citizens. Therefore, in a city a voter needs to register only once for all elections. The preparation and maintenance of duplicate registration records of the same voters and the confusion that sometimes occurs is eliminated.
- 4. Representation on County Board of Supervisors.** The Village is not entitled to separate representation on the County Board of Supervisors. Township membership on the Board is meant to represent all residents of the township. However, as a city Northville would be entitled to have its own separate representatives on the County Boards of Supervisors for both Wayne and Oakland Counties. The township (s) would, of course, continue to have membership on the county boards.
- 5. Judicial system.** Finally, the townships provide the primary courts — that is, the Justices of the Peace are township officers who serve the entire township including the Village. As a city, Northville would have to provide for its local court — that is, elect a "justice" for the municipality. If desired, however, the charter could provide for a more modern local judicial system which could still be entirely self supporting.

The present village charter was adopted in 1927. The (Continued on Page 12)

## C. J. Casey & Co. Seeks Plant Facilities

An inquiry from a Highland Park firm employing up to 50 girls on the possibility of acquiring plant space in the Northville area has been received by Carl Johnson, president of the Northville Retail Merchants Assn.

C. J. Casey & Co., 60 Manchester St., Highland Park, states that it is contemplating moving its production plant from that city and desires quarters covering about 7,500 square feet. It is interested in a lease, with option to purchase the property later, according to C. J. Casey, president.

From at least 30 and up to 50 girls would be employed as press operators and for assembly work, Casey added in his letter to the association.

Included in the firm's products are dies, tools, gauges, jigs, small stampings, and short run precision production.

The golden anniversary of the founding of Rotary will be observed by the Northville Rotary club with a dance Saturday, April 16 at the Community Bldg. The WWJ-TV dance orchestra, featuring the vocals of Janie Palmer, will play for the event.

Extensive plans are being made to make the dance a highlight of the winter-spring social season. A committee headed by Dr. Walter Belasco, John Miller, Gary Niece and Roy Stone will decorate the quarters Saturday afternoon with an especially planned theme commemorating the club's half-century birthday.

Major objectives of the local group in sponsoring any event is to render benefit to the community through the affair itself and to use the proceeds in raising the standards of community progress, it states.

A portion of the proceeds will aid the Crippled Children's fund (Easter Seals) and other Rotary projects such as maintaining the Old Northville Spring, installation of signs with safety warnings at school crossings, the International Student Exchange program, and sponsorship of a group of student delegates to the United Nations Forum at Hillsdale college.

The sophomore class of Northville High school will assist in serving refreshments at the dance, manage the cloakroom and sell tickets. Profits to the class will be applied to funds for the students' trip to Washington next year, according to Janice Howarth, class president.

## Polio Injections Start At School Wednesday, Apr. 27

Vaccination of Northville public and parochial first and second grade pupils with the Salk injection for polio will start Wednesday, April 27 at 9 a.m. at the public grade school building, Miss Ruth Knapp, RN, school nurse, announced Wednesday. The second treatment will be given May 4; the third, June 7, both at 9 a.m. Of the 246 letters sent to parents of public school children and 75 to the homes of Our Lady of Victory pupils, 11 households had indicated that they did not wish to have their children inoculated, an analysis of the returned letters up to noon Wednesday showed.

There is no charge for the Salk treatment, which will be administered with the cooperation of all local physicians. The program at the schools will be in charge of Village Physician Dr. V. George Chabut and Miss Knapp.

Both school and village health officials emphasized Wednesday that if parents who refused the free offer for vaccination against polio last week, wish now to accept the treatment for their children, they may do so.

Miss Knapp will send another form for parent's signature approving the inoculation, if requested. Her office is at the public school, phone 1130.

It was announced Tuesday, after extensive tests, that the vaccine is 80 to 90 percent effective in preventing paralytic polio. Dr. Thomas Francis, Jr., who reported the results of the test in Ann Arbor, said the serum had little effect on non-paralytic polio.

Miss Knapp repeated her earlier statement that registered nurses who wish to aid in administering the protection at the school will be welcome.

## International Night Ends Coordinating Series April 21

The third and last of the Co-ordinating Council lecture series will be held in the Community Bldg. Thursday evening, April 21 at 8 o'clock. It is to be an International night when three foreign students from International Center of University of Michigan will tell of their country and customs. Countries represented will be India, Latin America and the Orient. Proceeds from the sale of the tickets is designed for the Community Bldg. improvement fund.

## All-League Choir To Appear Here

The 80-voice all-league choir composed of singers selected from the seven high schools in the league, will present a choral program in the meeting room of the Community Bldg. April 15 at 8 p.m.

Each school in the league selects 12 of its best singers who come together for two rehearsals after the music has been memorized. Each director selects and directs one number.

In addition to selections by the choir, there will be a flute solo, played by Mrs. David Jones from Brighton, a male quartet from Clarencville, a vocal solo from Milford, a girls' triple trio from Holly and the girls' glee club from Northville.

The following numbers will be sung by the choir: "A Song of Praise" by Pasquet, "God So Loved the World" by Stainer, "Glory to God" by Bach, "Listen to the Lambs" by Dett, "Sheep and Lambs" by Homer, "Ride the Chariot" (spiritual), and "Sourwood Mountain" (a folk song).

Admission fees of 25 and 50 cents will be charged.

## Mrs. Lettie Yerkes Rites Held Saturday

Mrs. Lettie Ann Yerkes, a resident of Northville for 49 years, died April 7 at the age of 91 at her home on 39040 E. Nine Mile Rd. She was born at Ray Center, Macomb county in 1864, the daughter of Henry and Jane Dove. In 1889, Lettie Ann Dove married Harmon Yerkes and their first home was on a farm on what is now the Meadowbrook Country club—a farm then owned by William Yerkes. After living in South Lyon for some years, they purchased the farm on Nine Mile Rd., where she lived until her death last Thursday. The property was a land grant from the United States government to Stephen Rogers and the farm home, a stately early American landmark, was built in 1834.

Harmon Yerkes died in 1932 and one son, Joe, was killed in World War I. Another son, Vine, died in 1939. Surviving are a son, Osmond, who lives on West Main St., and a daughter, Mrs. Alice Barber of 39040 E. Nine Mile Rd. There are three grandsons, Bob, Bill and David Barber, and one granddaughter, Mrs. David Hay, the daughter of Mrs. Vine Yerkes, and two great-grandsons, David and Joe Hay. One sister, Mrs. Hattie Reynolds of Royal Oak, also survives.

Funeral services were held last Saturday from the Casterline Funeral home with the Rev. John O. Taxis officiating. Burial was in Yerkes cemetery on Eight Mile Rd.

With only five weeks to explain to Northville residents the merits of changing to a city form of government, the Citizens Committee on City Incorporation is planning an intensive educational program to bring a favorable vote at the special election to be held Monday, May 23.

Although the committee has been in existence many months, and has spent a great amount of time analyzing

for itself whether city incorporation is the best means of getting much needed municipal improvements without increasing local taxes, its efforts up to now in telling the merits of city vs. village government have been at a very low pressure level.

Presently, the committee is preparing a series of articles on city government, for publication weekly in the Northville Record. The second such article appears on this page. The first one ran last week.

Topmost on the committee's coming educational program will be a public meeting later this month at which the benefits of a city charter will be evaluated.

**Date To Be Announced**  
In addition, time will be provided for questions on the proposed new type of government. Announcement of the date of this discussion meeting will be made soon, according to Lynn C. Sullivan, chairman of the committee.

To further spread understanding of the proposed new form of government, the group offers to furnish speakers to any organization that desires a representative to analyze the subject and answer inquiries on reasons why Northville should become a city.

The citizens group is also writing to other newly formed cities of comparable size and character to inquire how the change to city government has worked out. It is especially interested in shedding light on whether the simple act of adopting a city charter has, in itself, increased taxes in such cities. The local committee contends that the cost of governing a city and supply-

The Northville Exchange club will mark the 34th anniversary of its founding at a birthday celebration dinner at the Methodist church Wednesday evening, April 20.

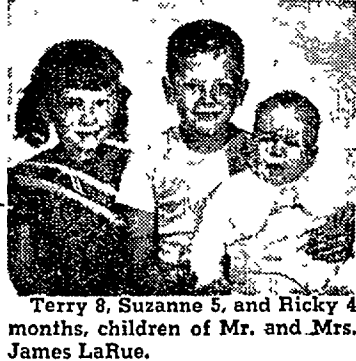
Rev. Keith Hayes of Three Rivers will address the group. He is known for his humorous presentations.

## Warning Issued On Fire Permits

A series of uncontrolled fires last week led Novi Township officials to issue a warning to residents regarding the burning of grass and brush in the township.

Before starting a fire for the purpose of burning off excess grass, brush or undergrowth, a resident must first obtain a fire permit, according to state law. The permit may be obtained at the Township hall, 25850 Novi Rd.

Failure to obtain a permit is a misdemeanor and violators are subject to a possible fine of \$100 or 90 days in jail, or both.

Residents were also warned to avoid burning on windy days and to have sufficient aid on hand when burning.

## Solution of School Problem Seen In Mutual Understanding

Dr. William J. Emerson, superintendent of schools for Oakland County, discussed Novi's future educational needs April 6 at an open meeting of the Novi board of commerce held in the Community building.

The meeting which took the place of the board's regular April meeting, was held on a Wednesday night instead of the usual Thursday night date and the confusion in dates led to an extremely light attendance. Only 47 members and guests attended the session.

Emerson discussed the problem of adequate schools in the five districts of Novi township and Northville. He said it was up to these five districts and Northville to get together and work out mutual problems.

If the people of Novi want their own school system and feel they can afford to build and maintain it, Emerson said he sees no reason why they should not have what they want.

Warning On Taxes  
However, he cautioned them to thoroughly investigate financing and possible tax levies which would have to be imposed on residents of the area. He warned that an excessively high tax rate might result because of the relatively low population in the Novi area at the present time.

In praising the work of the Area Study Group, Emerson said he thought these individuals, through unselfishly devoting their time, had come up with the best solution to a difficult problem.

According to Emerson, the best solution to the school problem lies in full and adequate understanding of the problem by Novi and Northville residents. The first step is to explain the problem and findings of the study group

1/3 cup boiling water  
1/2 cup chopped nutmeats  
1/2 cup seedless raisins  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
Cream oleo and sugar. Add egg, then dry ingredients, hot water and vanilla. Add the nuts and raisins last. Drop from a spoon onto a cookie sheet and bake 350 degrees about ten minutes until lightly browned. Do not over bake.

need for its revision and modernization has become increasingly apparent in recent years. If the residents of Northville decide to change to a city form of government, it will be necessary to adopt a new charter.

It is expected that the charter commission to be elected will recommend to the voters a modern charter designed to promote efficient local government. Thus by deciding to change to the status of a city the voters will also automatically require that a new charter be prepared. It should be noted, however, that the new charter will also have to be approved by the voters at a later election.

We plan to present more facts and information on this important question in additional letters to the Northville Record during the next several weeks.

ing municipal services on the same scale now provided by the village should be relatively the same as now. It realizes, however, that some villagers who are not entirely acquainted with the facts fear an increase in taxes should the vote be in favor of becoming a city. For this reason, it hopes to convince them that their thinking is in error by citing specific examples where adoption of a city charter has proven beneficial rather than expensive.

**Important Point**

Another point which will come high on the committee's stated plan to inform and clarify the issue is emphasis on the fact that the village is not bound to accept the first charter offered for Northville's new government. Village Attorney Philip A. Ogilvie points out that there is a two-year period in which to offer the electorate other charters, should the first model be voted down.

It is mandatory under state law that a new charter be adopted at an election within two years after the community has voted to become a city, Ogilvie said.
