### \$16,600 Grant Given To Sessions

Sessions hospital will receive a \$6,600 grant from the Ford Foundation as their share of an approved appropriation of 500 million dollars for privately supported institutions in communities all over the land.

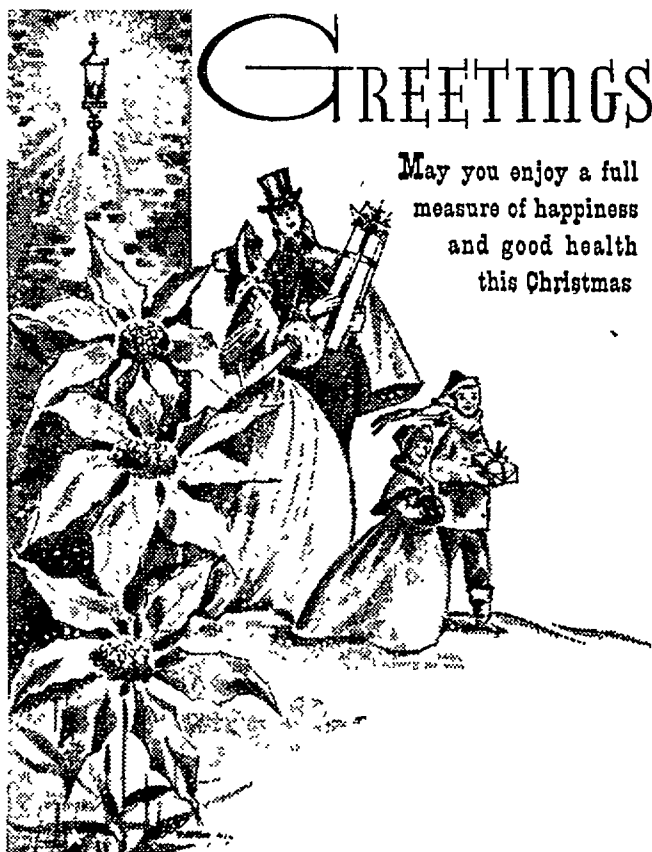

# from the PASTOR'S STUDY

## 'Thy Kingdom Come On Earth'

There is a very fascinating theme found in both the Old Testament and the New Testament concerning the personal, visible reign of Jesus Christ over this present earth. To those who are not the children of faith this theme may sound like a fairy tale. But to those who believe the Bible the reign of Jesus Christ over this earth is the only ray of hope for the future. Let us just trace this reign of Christ and see what we can learn about it in the space we have before us. Christ Promised David's Throne! In Luke 1:32 we read, "And He

shall be great, and shall be called the Son of the Highest; and the Lord God shall give unto Him the throne of his father David." The throne of King David was an earthly throne. He ruled his domain from the City of Jerusalem. The angels have stated God's promise that Jesus Christ would be given that throne. Since Christ has not as yet occupied that throne, it must of necessity still be fulfilled in the future. Christ was never crowned and seated upon the throne of David. His only crown was a crown of thorns pressed upon His blessed brow by those who refused Him as their king. Did this rejection of men change God's plan for His Son? A careful reading of Psalm 2 will show that God's unchangeable decree has declared that He shall reign upon His holy hill of Zion.

Revelation Reveals This Reign of Christ  
Some people believe that the Book of Revelation is a closed

book of mysterious symbols about which man can know very little. The very title based upon the first verse of the Book shows that this is a mistake. In fact it is a Book written for the purpose of revealing the yet future reign of Jesus Christ. Let me give you a quick outline of the Book. Chapter 1—Introduction (Key verse—vs. 19) Chapters 2-3 the History of the Church Age from Pentecost until the end of the Age. (The present Church Age will end when Jesus Christ comes to secretly take away all true believers of—1 Thess. 4; 13-18) The Revelation 4:1 to 19:16 we have described a period of unprecedented world turmoil and awful judgments of God. In Rev. 19:11-16 we see Christ coming as the King of Kings to establish His kingdom over all the earth. In Chapter 20:1-6 we note that we are informed that his reign on the earth will cover a period of 1,000 years. Some have imagined that this measurement of time should be taken symbolically of His eternal reign. This could not be true since vs. 5 and 7 speak of the "end of the 1,000 yrs." and obviously could not represent eternity which has no end. Jesus Christ must reign over this present earth or a period of 1,000 years.

## Diary Reveals Fun On Christmas Day 100 Years Ago

Ann Arbor — Ever wonder whether kids had as much fun at Christmas-time a hundred years ago as they do now?

There may have been fewer tinsel trappings but the fun was all there from the gift-giving to the hilarity of the sleigh ride after the big dinner with friends, according to a diary kept by Elizabeth Gurney (Taylor) and now in the possession of The University of Michigan Historical Collections.

Elizabeth, who lived on a farm in St. Joseph County, near Constantine and Three Rivers, kept a journal which filled 13 large volumes and covered 33 years of her life.

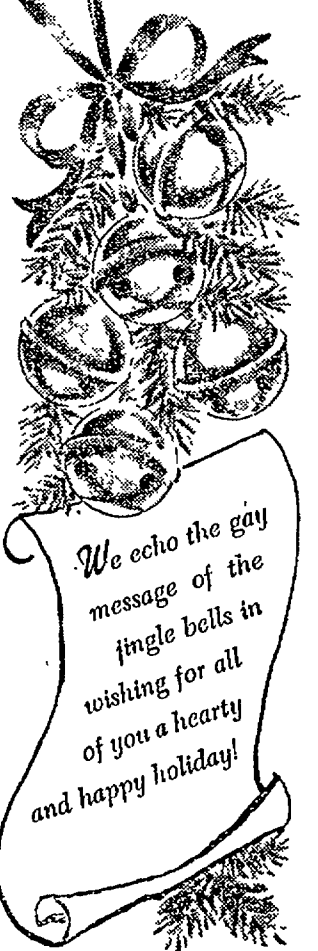
"Snowing again," she wrote the day before Christmas, 1855, when she was 15. "Just the right kind of weather to suit me. When I got to school this morning, although the last bell had rung, not a girl was there, but they came in soon. Tonight after school, Clara and I went down to the store and got a penholder and string of beads for Ma, and a cigar stick of candy and stick of gum for Pa. Very extensive shopping. Tomorrow is Christmas. Clara (her sister) says we must all hang out our stockings, if we get nothing but whips."

Lizzie's entry for Christmas Day reads: "This morning when I got up I found a bundle on my clothes, looked in it and found a looking glass, cakes and candies. The looking glass was nothing new to me, as Saturday last, while I was writing, Clara opened the cupboard to see if she could not find a parcel pertaining to Christmas. She opened and found the looking glass, a transparent slate, and candy. I doubted not but that the former was for me as Clara had been in a great tease for the latter."

"Soon after breakfast," Lizzie continues, "Clara and I went over to the McCormicks after the milk. They had a turkey cooking for dinner and invited us to eat with them. So about eleven we went over and had an excellent dinner. Stayed till about two when I saw a sleigh drive up to our door and went home. It was William Reece, Carrie Brown, Lydia Smith, Amanda Sampson and Emma Brackman. I got in and we went after Suzy Clapp. Just as we got to the Talbots store the axeltree came off and the horses started to leave us behind. There was a crowd of men on the stoops who had a good deal of fun about it. On the whole, Christmas passed very pleasantly and would have been more so if Ma had not had the ague. But, "Lizzie philosophizes, "we must take the bitter with the sweet."

¼ teaspoon soda  
½ cup dark corn syrup  
½ cup milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
½ cup butter or margarine

Combine cereal and cherries in large greased bowl. Combine sugar, salt, soda, corn syrup, and milk in saucepan. Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring to dissolve sugar. Continue boiling, stirring constantly, until a small amount of mixture forms a firm ball in cold water (or to a temperature of 246°F.). Remove from heat and cool 1 minute.

Add vanilla and butter and beat until thick. Pour over cereal and mix well. Let stand until mixture is cold. Butter hands lightly and shape mixture into 2-inch balls. Makes about 12 balls. To make Christmas tree decorations, tie balls with red and green ribbon.

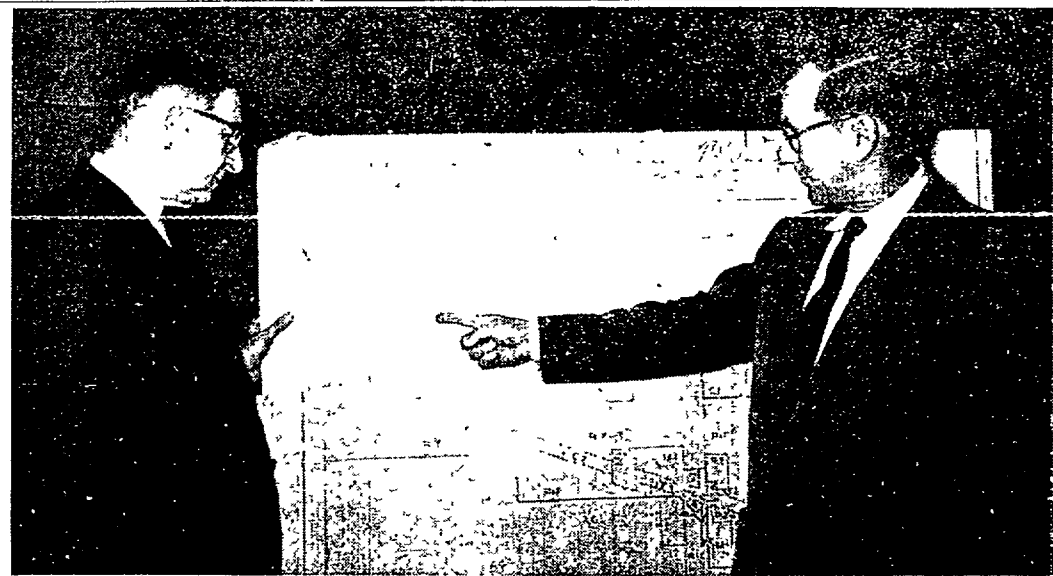

## SPEAKING of CARDS

### A TIME-HONORED GAME

Most of us regard Solitaire as a game for grown-ups—particularly those elderly folk, convalescents, and shut-ins who have ample leisure time. It may come as a surprise, therefore, to learn that Solitaire games are also favorites with children. Several are especially recommended for keeping youngsters occupied on rainy days or when illness keeps them home from school.

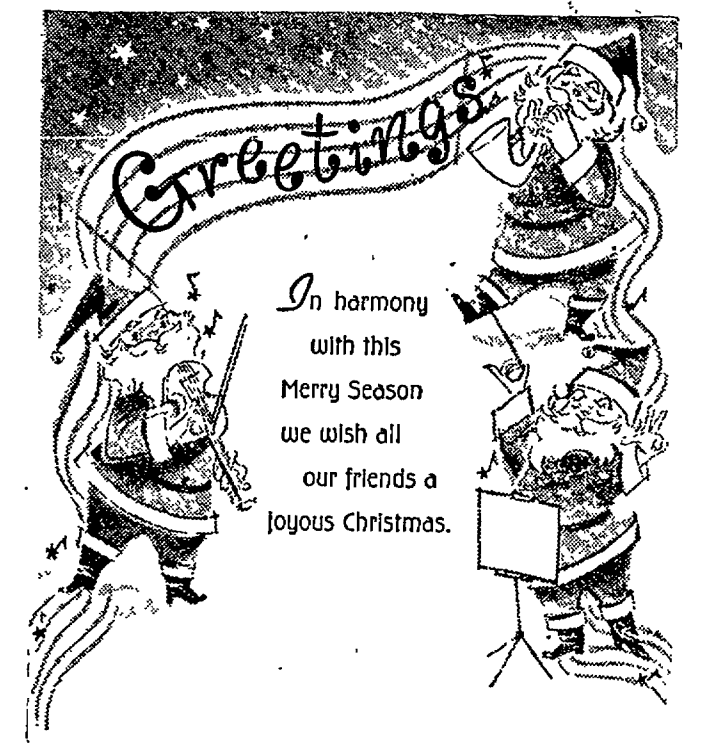
One such Solitaire variation, which in addition to its therapeutic value teaches youngsters how to tell time, is called, appropriately, "Round the Clock." To play this game, deal in a circle twelve stacks of four cards each, face down, and another stack of four cards face down in the center of the circle.

The twelve stacks represent the figures on a clockface (I, II, III, and on around) and they also represent the numbers on the cards (Ace, 2, 3, Jack, XI, and Queen, XII). The four cards in the center are the King pile. Object of the game is to have all the cards of the clock in their correct places, face-up, before the King

pile is completed. That is, the four aces, face up in the I pile, the four deuces in the II pile, the threes in the III pile, and so on. Starting with the Ace pile (I on the clock face), turn over the top card and place it, face-up, at the bottom of its correct pile. If it is a 6, put it face-up under the VI pile. Then take the top card of the VI pile and put it where it belongs. If it should be a Queen put it face up beneath the XII pile, and take the top card of the XII (Queen) pile and put it in its right place. Any King goes face up beneath the pile in the center of the clock.

If the game works out, you will have at the end all the cards in their correct positions, from the four Aces on the one o'clock pile to the four Queens at high noon.

If, before the other piles are completed, four Kings should be turned up, the game ends and you lose. Other juvenile Solitaires similar to Round the Clock, along with scores of other variations for grown-ups to be played with one, two or even four packs of cards, can be found in the book, "150 Ways to Play Solitaire." Recently presented to President Eisenhower as a birthday gift by his granddaughter, the book has pointed up the increased interest in Solitaire. In response to demand, manufacturers have just brought on the market a special gift package containing this 132-page illustrated book plus two packs of playing cards.
