

After the first few people donated blood, the doctor stopped the bank completely because the floor was too highly waxed. Mrs. Carlson had to find runners to place between the tables and the aisle as a safety precaution. Nelson Schrader loaned the bank yards of felt paper.

This interruption put the bank ehind a half hour and because of the time element, Mrs. Carlson said that certain persons came from the Ford plant and made some of the men go back to vork without giving blood.

Later in the afternoon cyclone warnings were broadcast over radio and television which may have attributed to the fact that at least 50 evening volunteers did not show up; however, 124 pints of blood were accepted and 52 people were rejected.
