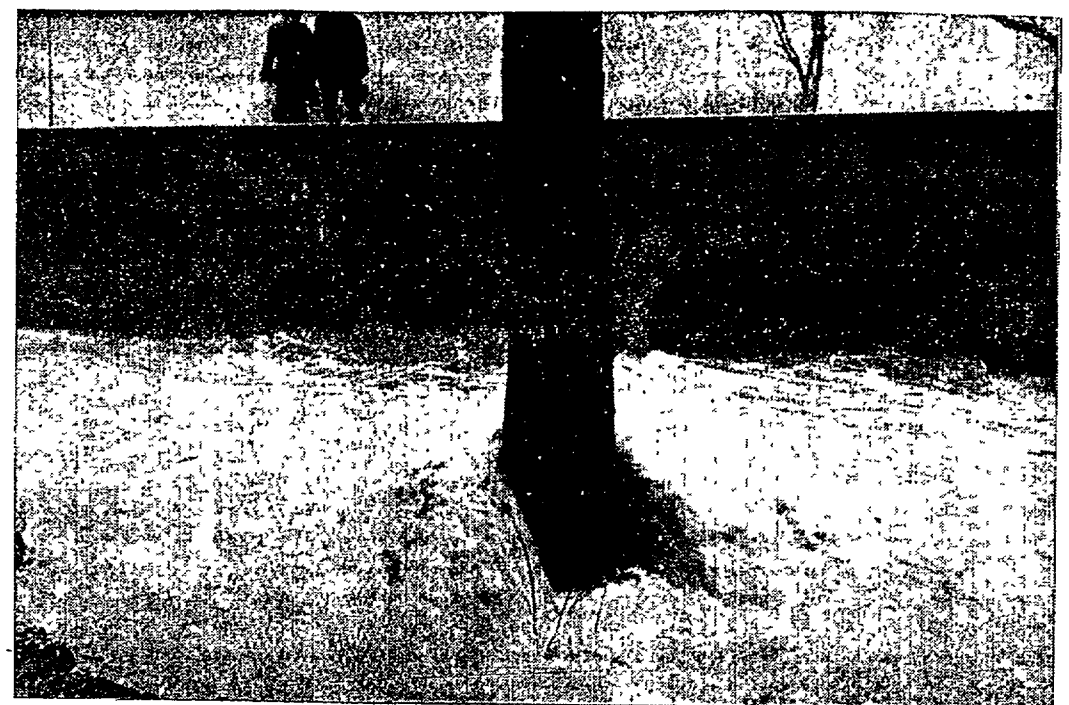




STREETS and basements in the north section of town were flooded Sunday morning. Whatever traffic there was along Griswold St. moved along at a slow pace.

## CAN'T LEGALLY HOLD ELECTION, NOVI SAYS

### Water, Water Everywhere

### Flash Flood Washes Out Main Street Sewer

According to the weather report Sunday morning only three and a half inches of rain fell in the local area, but the rain came down within such a short time that a flash flood resulted in Northville and surrounding areas.

Mike Allen, superintendent of Northville public works, said that the most serious of all damages was the washing out of a Main St. sewer.

The 12-inch sewer pipe was on the Ford property west of Griswold St. and extended to the interceptor sewer. According to Allen, logs floated down the river, hit the pipe and broke it. "Where the logs came from we don't know," he said.

The sewer is now emptying into the river. Allen said that the public works crew has to wait until the water recedes before the pipe can be replaced.

**Ford Crew Worked**  
Austin Stecker, plant manager at the Ford valve plant, had a complete crew working Sunday to relieve the pressure on the dam.

"We barricaded the basement windows," Stecker said, "and opened up the flume. (The flume is the canal that leads the water from the lake and underpasses the water here.)"

"The crew had to watch the water constantly because we couldn't afford to have any water enter our basements," Stecker said, "we're putting in some new boilers for our addition."

The opened flume relieved some of the pressure on the dam and according to Stecker, benefited the people upstream.

Stecker also mentioned that the water at the Ford water

wheel was five and a half feet above normal Sunday morning.

**Other Damages**  
Many residents, on the north side of town reported that their basements were flooded and their lawns and flowers completely covered by water.

In nearby Edward Hines park, the drive was barricaded at several points. Those motorists who ignored the barricades had to turn back since the water deep at the road was several feet across at certain stretches.

Picnic benches were overturned and miniature lakes were in the place of the ball diamonds. Youngsters happily waded in their new "pools" and more than one person brought out his fishing pole.

As of Tuesday morning there were still acres of park land that resembled swamps. Northville residents were still cleaning up debris and the city had finished their general clean up of streets and catch basins.

As the saying goes—now all is well.

### State Police Will Have Display At P-TA Carnival

Police Chief Joseph Denton said this week that the state police will have a weapon and narcotic display at the P-TA Carnival May 4.

Northville police will assist in explaining the different weapons which will include a tommy gun, gas gun, rifle, gas grenade, gas mask and other riot weapons.

Literature regarding narcotics such as heroin and opium will be available and samples might also be exhibited.

### Meeting Change

A change in the regular meeting day of the board of education was announced this week by R. H. Amerman.

The next regular meeting will be held May 9 in the board of education office at 8 p.m.

### Township Approves Dust Program and Part 1 of New Sub.

The Northville Township board approved the dust lane program at their regular meeting Tuesday evening.

The program will include two treatments for approximately 26 miles of auxiliary township roads and will cost \$1,900.

**Sub Approved**  
The proposed plat of Part 1, Hidden Valley subdivision, submitted by John Northup, was given final approval and accepted by the board.

Part 1 includes five 20,000 square foot lots on Clement Rd. between 7-Mile Rd. and Main St. The lots border the western boundary of the City of Northville.

**Asks Rezoning**  
Another builder, Al Smith, told the board that he would like to subdivide 26 acres of land on 7-Mile Rd. west of Beck Rd. The land would be divided into 60 lots.

Smith mentioned that the area is now zoned for small farms and would need to be rezoned one family residential.

There was also the problem of water supply and Smith mentioned that he and his partner were contemplating drilling one water well to serve the entire area.

The board referred Smith to the zoning board.

**Cemetery Appropriations**  
The board voted \$300 for the maintenance of local cemeteries. The money is to be divided as follows: Thayer cemetery, \$125; Yerkes cemetery, \$125; and Waterford cemetery, \$50.

**May Buy Lawnmower**  
Supervisor M. Lawrence appointed D. J. Stark and A. Lawrence to investigate the possibility of purchasing a rotary lawnmower to cut the lawn surrounding the township hall.

At the request of Supervisor Lawrence the board also voted some money to purchase a few plants of petunias which will be planted in front of the township hall.

### Officers Elected At P-TA Meeting

Northville P-TA members re-elected Harold Hartley as president for the 1956-57 term.

Other officers elected were Robert Yoder, vice-president; Mrs. Elizabeth DeLaGardie, secretary, and Mrs. William Secord, treasurer.

Installation is scheduled for the May 24 meeting.

### Durfee School District

### Consolidation To Be Decided At Amerman School May 16

What portion of the Novi No. 6 (Durfee) school district is to join the Northville school district and what portion is to enter into a consolidation with three other Novi township districts will be decided at a special meeting of all Durfee residents in the Amerman elementary school at 7:30 p.m., May 16.

A letter signed by the Durfee school board, Paul M. Beard, Richard E. Davis and Edmund P. Yerkes, is being sent to all resident property owners and school electors concerning "a most important special meeting... to acquaint all people with the latest information regarding school district problems, to inform all residents of a proposed consolidation of four districts within Novi township into a new primary school district, and to take a vote of all resident property owners... regarding shifting part of the southern area of the Durfee district to the Northville school district." (The part proposed for annexation to Northville lies entirely south of 8-Mile Rd. in Wayne county).

The letter refers to a recent act of the state legislature, effective July 1, 1955, giving all closed

school districts (of which Durfee is one) two years in which to open a school and operate as a functioning school district or join with another school district in some manner. "One of these two choices must be made by July 1, 1957 or our district will be placed wherever higher school authorities so desire," the letter states.

Pointing out that annexation of Durfee district with the Northville district was defeated at the annual school meeting last July, the letter says the Durfee board of education "feels it is impossible for a school district as small as ours to build a school building and operate even the first six grades. We have neither sufficient money nor pupils to make such a school practical."

"The latest proposal is a combining of Durfee District, East Novi District, Novi No. 8 and Putnam District into a new primary district."

"There are many people residing in the southern part of the district, particularly those living in Wayne county, Northville township, who feel they would rather become part of the Northville school district than

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### Amerman School Burglarized Sat.

Northville police are searching for a burglar who broke and entered Amerman school Saturday night. According to Police Chief Joseph Denton the same person attempted to burglarize the Warrenton Products Bldg. earlier Saturday evening, but escaped when an alarm was sounded.

R. H. Amerman reported the burglary and Chief Denton and Sgt. Glasson investigated.

Evidence at the scene showed that the burglar made several attempts to gain entrance and finally entered through a broken window. The door to the principal's office was jammed and the lock broken. Desk drawers were shaken and it is believed that the burglar was frightened away before he could open them. Police were cruising the school area that evening in response to a prowler call.

State police detectives were called to assist in finding clues.

### High Mark Hit In Township Building

The month of April topped any month in any year for valuation of building permits in Northville township, according to the building inspector Don Nutton.

During the month permits were issued for eight new houses, three alterations, one greenhouse and one garage. The total valuation amounted to \$200,000.

Nutton said that within the next few months there will be a lot of building in the township. "Three subdivisions are being considered now," he said, "and they include over a 100 houses."

### Insufficient Notice, Twp. Attorney Advises

### Novi Evidently Overlooked In Confusion On Setting Date of Annexation Election

"Well, what's the City of Northville going to do now?" While, not the exact words used, the question typifies the slightly amused attitude of Novi officials as they sit back this week and wait for further developments south of the border.

Thanks to an apparent oversight by the City of Northville and the Secretary of State, Novi officials advised the Secretary of State's office Tuesday, May 1 that they have insufficient time to legally prepare for the proposed special annexation election June 5.

### -Need 40 Days

"Our attorney says we must have written notice from the Secretary of State's office informing us of any election and that, to comply with Michigan law, we must then have 40 days to legally advertise and prepare for the election," Novi Township Supervisor Frazer Staman said. "We had less than 40 days," he added.

Novi's attorney, Archie Leonard, delivered the opinion at a special meeting of the township board held Monday night to discuss the annexation of the 70-acre "Yerkes Farm" plus additional Novi land to the city of Northville.

Leonard told the board, that to insure proper publication of "notices of registration" and "notices of election" on the required dates, the law requires 40 days elapse between the time notice of registration is first published and the date of the election.

### Northville Requests

Some time ago, Northville requested the special election to annex the Yerkes property, site of a proposed 250-home subdivision.

On April 23 city officials and Novi township officials received notice that the Secretary of State had called a special election on the question for May 10.

Realizing they had only 16 days to prepare for the election, Northville officials phoned Lansing and the Secretary of State's office agreed by phone to change the date to June 10, allowing sufficient time for publication of

registration and election notices.

**Ensuing Confusion**  
In the ensuing confusion, however, nobody thought to officially notify Novi of the new dates so they, too, might publish the duly required notices. The handful of residents in the area to be annexed favor annexation but live in Novi and are required to vote in Novi. And if they don't vote, they can't be annexed.

A letter from the Secretary of State officially notifying Novi of the change in dates finally arrived late Thursday, April 26, one day too late for publication in this paper, the official publication for both the City of Northville and Novi township.

### "Jumped the Gun"

Commenting on the fact that Northville had placed a registration notice in last week's paper, Staman said, "Evidently the City of Northville must not have had a written notice (of election) either before publishing last week's Notice of Registration. But in their eagerness to grab this land, they must have jumped the gun a little bit."

Northville City Attorney Philip Ogilvie, when asked what the city's next move would be, said, "It's up to the (city) council what action they want to take."

Mayor Claude Ely, when informed of the latest developments, was apparently taken aback.

Asked if he had any comment, Ely said, "Yeah, but I don't want to make it."

### Nat'l A.L. Commander To Be Guest Of Honor At Banquet

J. Addington Wagner, national commander of the American Legion and an attorney-at-law in Battle Creek, will be the guest of honor at a Testimonial banquet sponsored by the 17th District Assn. of the American Legion Thursday, May 10 at Bentley high school auditorium, Livonia.

Commander Wagner attended Hillsdale college for three years and graduated from law school at Washington and Lee. He was commissioned as an Ensign in the U.S. Navy in 1942 and after serving in the Pacific was discharged as a lieutenant.

Earlier this year, he was elevated to the rank of commander. Commander Wagner has held

many offices and chairmanships in the American Legion, chiefly post commander of Custer Post in Battle Creek in 1947-48, department commander in 1950-51 and National Americanism chairman in 1954.

Commander Wagner is married and has one son. During March, while visiting the Central Americas, his wife, Virginia, was swept overboard from a raft and by her husband.

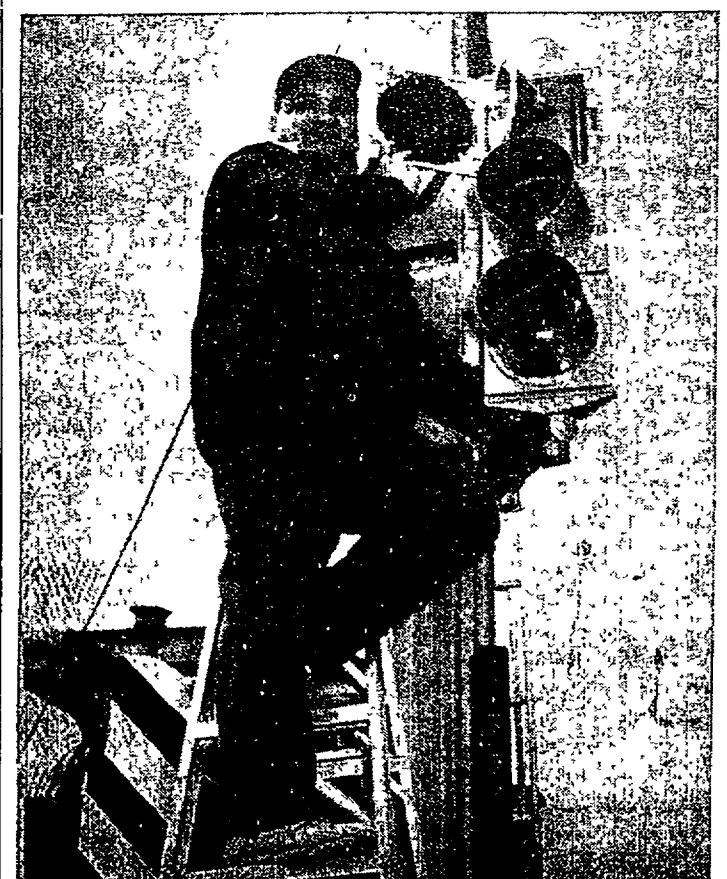

## What's Cooking?

With few exceptions, everyone likes chocolate in almost any form—pies, cakes, cookies, candy or drinks, and, as in this case, in pudding. Our recipe this week is called "Hot Fudge Pudding", and although the pure hot fudge sauce is not an ingredient, the method of preparing it and results achieved, give the flavor and consistency of hot fudge.

Mrs. George Ames, 41008 Mooringside Dr., Willowbrook Village, gave us the recipe as one of her family's favorites. David 8, Rolf 7, George and Marilyn 2, are the four active little Ames who keep their mother busy fixing such good things as this pudding. The Ames were Detroiters before moving to Willowbrook.

### HOT FUDGE PUDDING

1 cup flour  
¼ teaspoon salt  
¾ cup sugar  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
6 tablespoons cocoa  
½ cup milk  
2 tablespoons salad oil  
1 cup chopped walnuts  
1 cup brown sugar  
1½ cups hot water

Sift flour, salt, sugar, baking powder and 2 tablespoons of the cocoa together. Add milk and salad oil. Mix and add nutmeats to this and spread in a nine inch square pan.

SEE COPY .....  
Mix brown sugar and rest of cocoa (4 T.) and sprinkle over the top of batter. Then pour the hot water over the top of the entire mixture.

During the baking process the pudding will rise to the top and there will be chocolate sauce on the bottom. Bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees.

To serve, cut in squares and pour sauce from bottom of the pan.

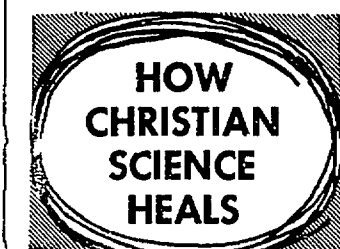

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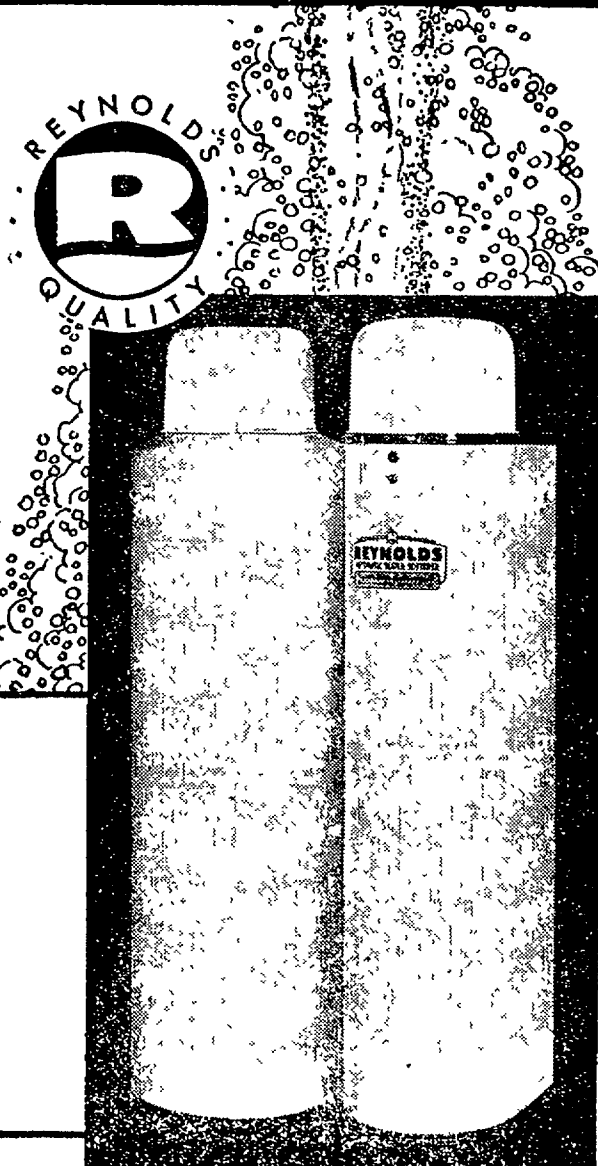

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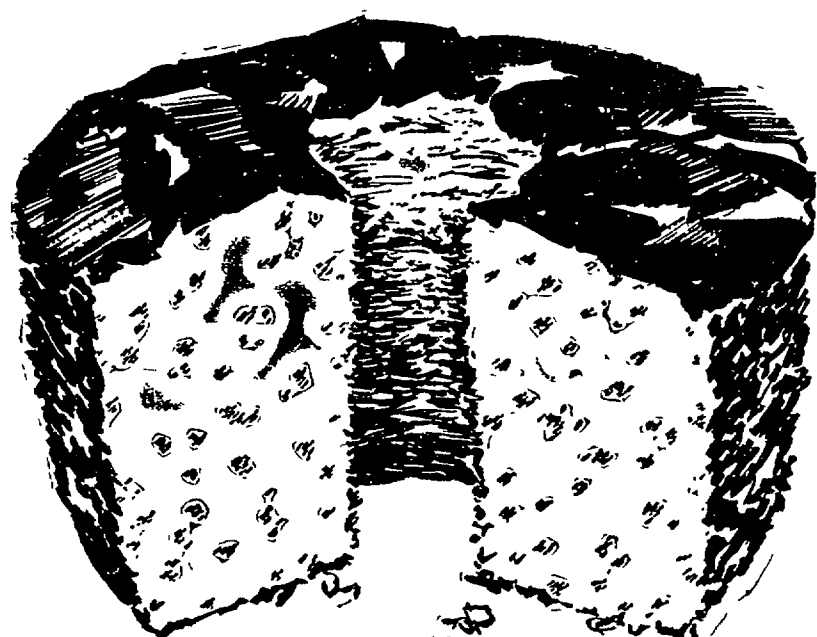

## from the PASTOR'S STUDY

The Rev. John O. Taxis, Pastor  
First Presbyterian Church, Northville

I want to use the opportunity  
of this week's "Pastor's Study"  
to make some passing comments  
on a few "sidelights" of the now  
famous "Miss Lucy Affair", that  
have some overtones of religious  
significance.

Having studied in the South  
for my Theological training, and

being a "born and bred" Yan-

kee and in addition having served

several pastorate among the people of the

South, I felt the power of this

"affair" as it might affect some of my

Youth Fellowship members. When this

news "broke" into the papers, I

wrote to one of my former West-

minster Youth Fellowship mem-

bers, a Southerner studying at

the University of Alabama, and

asked for some "on-the-spot"

comments of actions and re-  
actions. Well, I received a fine re-

sponse, too lengthy to make a com-

plete point by point comment,

but one that when I had read it

left me with two distinctive pic-

tures. The first was, that the

mob-scene was as typically a

mob-scene as you would read in

a book on psychology. This had

all the marks of a typical event—  
emotional leader, histrionic ap-

peals and all the rest.

The second was that the gen-  
eral student body considered the

preliminary events as nothing  
out of the ordinary in fact, to

quote the letter: "most of us in  
the . . . house didn't even get out

of bed . . . it didn't strike anyone

as being particularly mean-  
ingful." Then the spark of mis-  
guided leadership set off the whole  
affair into different channels.

Now out of these few things we

can draw the "overtones" of our

faith and practice. I was remind-

ed of this particular passage:

"...that we may no longer be

children, tossed to and fro and

carried about with every wind

of doctrine, by the cunning of

men, by their craftiness in de-

ceitful wiles; rather speaking the

truth in love, we are to grow up

in every way unto Him who is

the Head, even Christ . . ." This

is not a plea to compromise, or

to stick our heads in the sand of

escapement from reality; but

rather direction to sober think-

ing and emotional control govern-

ed by His Spirit. This obviously

is the Christian's sterling posses-

sion and approach to the vital

cross-currents of conflicting ideas

so common around us today. Here

too, we find the God-directed

wisdom that produces the re-

sults of peace and harmony we

all strive for as we accomplish

that petition "Thy Will be done,  
on earth . . ." It becomes more

and more evident that our Bible

speaks to us clearly, not on the

details of solutions, but on the

spirit that governs our hearts

and minds that enables us to

overcome the problems of our

lives.

I was personally proud of this

student's approach to a very

present problem . . . (not that I

agree with everything that was

reported in the letter) for there

was ample evidence of prayerful

discussions in the Youth Fel-

lowships that night, and of Pastoral

guidance from the adult leaders

## Doc Cavell To Celebrate 50th Year As Veterinarian

May 1 will mark the 50th anniversary of Dr. Edwin Brooks Cavell, who has been practicing veterinarian medicine in Northville for these many years.

Northville was a small farming community when "Doc" first came here and things are much easier now than when he made the rounds to visit sick farm animals in a buggy drawn by horses.

The first 40 years of his practice, "Doc" recalls, dealt mostly with large animals, horses, cows, hogs, etc. But with the use of farm machinery on a large scale, the amount of stock has been reduced and now his practice centers mainly on dogs, cats and other small animals.

"Doc" Cavell was the first veterinarian in Michigan to administer saliva tests on winning horses at race tracks and he still works under the racing commission at Northville Downs and also at the MRA track in Livonia.

A well-known figure in Northville, Doc was born in Livingston county. After graduating from Howell high school he went to Medicine Bow, Wyo. to dig dinosaur bones with a Carnegie museum expedition. He also spent five years in Laramie, Wyo. training and shipping horses to the East and attended night classes in dry farming at the University of Wyoming. He then enrolled in the Ontario Veterinary

college in Toronto and was graduated in 1906.

"Doc" was once president of the Michigan Veterinary Ass'n. and is now the oldest living member of the club.

He has no immediate plans for retiring and wishes he could practice 50 more years.

### Job Possibilities Good, Lincoln Man Tells Group

"Securing an adequate labor force is the biggest single headache we have," James Crow, industrial relations manager for the Lincoln Division of the Ford Motor Co. told Wixom residents April 26 at a P-T-A meeting.

Crow, who will have the job of securing much of the office and factory personnel for Novi's new multi-million dollar Lincoln plant, spoke before a crowd of approximately 75 people at the Wixom school.

#### "If I Knew..."

"If I knew where we'd get our people (for the new plant) I'd sleep better nights," he exclaimed.

Lincoln has been a separate division for one year, Crow said, having split from Mercury in April, 1955. Since that time he said most of the new company's personnel has come from other divisions within the Ford organization. Lincoln intends to continue this process inasmuch as possible, he told the group.

Clerical and Technical "However, in the clerical and technical areas, we have not satisfied our (personnel) requirements," he added.

"We would like to transfer all of our salaried people (when we move to our new Novi plant)..." he continued, "but we would be naive to think we could...some will move with us...many won't...we will seek personnel from this whole area...a sizeable undertaking."

#### Plans In June

Regarding hourly workers, Crow said plans for securing them would not be finalized until June.

"We will utilize the services of other Ford division employees... transfer some (of our present workers) if they desire. But we'll have to supplement whatever force we get extensively from the local area," Crow said.

Eighteen months from now I'll know where the labor is coming from," he confided.

part of the proposed Novi district. If a shifting of territory is to be accomplished it is advisable that it be done before, rather than after a new district is formed.

"Specifically, resident property owners will be asked to vote on three proposals:

"a. Shall the area lying south of the Eight Mile Rd. be shifted from Durfee District to Northville School District?

"b. Shall the area lying between Eight Mile Rd. and a line known as the Eight and One-half Mile Line be shifted from Durfee District to the Northville School District?

"c. Shall an 8.6 acre parcel belonging to D. M. Morris lying between the C&O. railroad and Nine Mile Rd. be shifted from Durfee District to Northville School District?

"All pertinent questions such as tax differences will be explored and answered by competent invited experts.

"While all residents and school electors are cordially invited to attend, only resident property owners are eligible to vote on this shifting of property from one district to another.

"This meeting is very important to the future education of your children and all people who may move into our District."

# 124 Donate To Blood Bank

Mrs. A. C. Carlson, Red Cross chairman of the Northville branch said, "Just about everything happened at the blood bank Friday except the tornado that was predicted. The unit arrived late and to add to the confusion, more Ford men came than were scheduled."

After the first few people donated blood, the doctor stopped the bank completely because the floor was too highly waxed. Mrs. Carlson had to find runners to place between the tables and the aisle as a safety precaution. Nelson Schrader loaned the bank yards of felt paper.

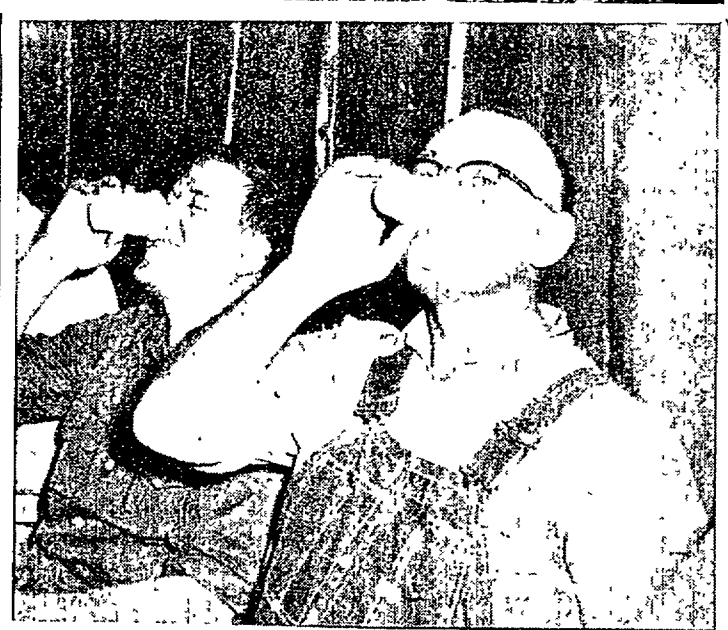
This interruption put the bank behind a half hour and because of the time element, Mrs. Carlson said that certain persons came from the Ford plant and made some of the men go back to work without giving blood.

Later in the afternoon cyclone warnings were broadcast over radio and television which may have attributed to the fact that at least 50 evening volunteers did not show up; however, 124 pints of blood were accepted and 52 people were rejected.

Mrs. Carlson would like to thank the churches who announced the bank from their pulpits; the merchants who put posters in their windows; the mailmen who delivered donor appointment cards on time; the volunteers who solicited blood donors, and the American Legion Auxiliary who served a hot supper to the staff of the Detroit unit and Northville volunteer personnel.
