The \$3,000,000 bond issue will be spread over 25-30 years, and carries a provision that assessments from it and all other school construction bond issues may not total more than 13 mills per \$1,000. The actual increase in school taxes next year, however, will be only 8.5 mills because Northville districts already are paying on another bond issue.

"In light of this decision to go ahead with a new high school construction program, we pledge ourselves to be careful and discriminating in carrying out the public's wishes.

"Above all, we assure the public that the money voted for the new school program will be used only if necessary."

Against Milford, the Colts play-ed on even terms throughout the game except for a second period lapse in which their opponents built up an 11-point lead. Halftime score was 32-21.


For Northville, Fred Schwarze led with 18 points, while Dennis Fallon and Bob Starnes were close behind with 15.
