

## City-Wide Property Re-Appraisal Asked by Council

### Council Handles Routine Matters In Short Order

The city council handled an agenda of routine business in brief manner Monday night.

In quick order they: approved the final reading of an amendment to the zoning ordinance; voted to buy a fifth voting machine; purchased a new gas conversion unit for the city hall, and set Saturday, November 2 as the night to study a proposed subdivision contract with the K & G Building company.

The council also heard a report from John Canterbury on the city's tax equalization problem. (See story, column eight).

Sideyard and lot size requirements were reduced to come in line with neighboring communities in the zoning amendment. The change had been recommended by the planning commission. Details of the change are published on page five.

The city added another voting machine that previously had been used on a rental basis. A one year lease plan had expired and councilmen voted to take up the option to buy at a cost of \$1573.20.

A contract to install a new gas conversion unit in the city hall was awarded to A. P. Mitchell of Northville. Bids were also received from Alex Lyke of Northville and Porter-George of Detroit.

The council will probably enter into a contractual agreement with the K & G Building company, subdividers of the proposed Northville Heights, at the next regular council meeting, November 4. Mayor Claude Ely asked members to study the contract and meeting Saturday night, November 2 to review its contents. The 122-home subdivision will be built just north of the American elementary school on the west side of North Center street. Company spokesmen have indicated that models will be built this year.

### Coleman Suffers Attack After Queen Knights Him

John S. Coleman, one of Northville's most prominent figures, was stricken by a heart attack Monday less than two days after he was knighted by Queen Elizabeth.

Coleman, president of Burroughs Corporation and a week end resident of Northville, was dubbed a Knight of the British Empire Saturday by the Queen in ceremonies at the British Embassy in Washington.

## Collections Lag in Drive To Give 'Once for All'

Northville's first United Foundation drive was reported lagging behind schedule this week.

Chairman Ed Welch stated that his residential and small business campaign had netted \$707.20 to date. Scheduled to close Friday after a 10-day drive, the goal of the campaign is \$2100.

Welch stated that he is certain the drive will go "over the top".

"Northville residents have always supported worthy projects, wholeheartedly and I know that we'll be successful in this drive to give 'once for all,'" Welch added.

Not yet reported is the solicitation of small businesses. Welch reported that Leland Smith, president of the Northville Retail Merchants association, had volunteered to lead this drive. Smith was expected to complete a door-to-door campaign this week.

Welch stated that a complete canvass of every home in the community is being made. Chairmen of this residential door-to-door drive are Mrs. Philip N. Brown, Ruth M. Knapp and Mrs. George Ramshaw.

There was little to report in other phases of the campaign locally. The commercial and professional drive was not scheduled to make its first financial report until next Monday.

The goal in this classification is \$1600. Chairman A. Russell Clarke stated that early contributions indicated that the goal would be reached. R. T. Martin heads the local industrial drive for funds. Like the commercial drive, it will continue until November 7 and solicitations have not yet been reported. Northville's total goal is \$3950.

## Adopts Plan to End Local Tax Inequities

Northville councilmen Monday night instructed John Roberson, in his capacity as city assessor, to increase a program for re-appraisal of every piece of property in the city.

The motion was hailed by Councilman John Canterbury as "the most meaningful thing that the city can do in the interest of good government."

The development occurred as the result of a combined meeting between officials of the city and tax heads of Wayne and Oakland counties. The program promises to resolve tax inequities that have existed between residents of the two counties within the city and to assure just and equitable assessments on land, building and personal property.

The proposed re-appraisal plan was conceived last week. The meeting was arranged by City Manager Robertson and brought together Albert E. Champney, director of the Wayne county Board of Taxation, and William B. Grabendike, Oakland county Equalization Committee director. Councilmen Earl Reed and Canterbury along with Sidney Frid, Northville representative on the Oakland county Board of Supervisors, completed the committee group.

Champney announced that a re-appraisal of the Wayne county section of the city had already been completed. It marks the first time since 1938 that such a re-assessment has been undertaken.

Specifically, the plan calls for Robertson to conduct a similar re-appraisal in the Oakland county section of the city. Tax heads of the two counties have agreed to cooperate in the program using the accepted state schedule for appraisal thus arriving at a fair and equitable apportionment among all the residents in the community.

The new appraisals will be entered on the tax rolls for 1958, thereby curtailling the sharp difference between the city's Wayne and Oakland sections that will exist this year. This difference will show up on the school and county tax bills where equalization factors between the two sections vary greatly.

Tax authorities emphasize that re-appraisal does not mean higher taxes. It will undoubtedly raise the assessed valuation of the community but the millage rate applied to the valuation determines the tax. Actually, it spreads the tax burden fairly and equitably and avoids tax relief for some poorly appraised properties at the expense of others.

To Northville the plan comes at a highly opportune time. The tax inequities between Wayne and Oakland county have been challenged by Warren Products as a major reason for that firm's resistance to joining the city. An annexation of 200 acres of Novi township that includes the Warren plant is scheduled for November 19.

Re-appraisal of Northville township, Plymouth and Flat Rock also has been recently completed by Wayne county. Champney stated that he would recommend to Mrs. Mollie Lawrence, Northville township supervisor, that a revision of the township roll be undertaken. He pointed out that re-appraisals should be conducted frequently, particularly in areas of rapid expansion.

When Northville completes its re-appraisal in Oakland county, the city will have a complete, modern assessment roll. The millage that must be applied to derive county, school and city taxes can then be determined with assurance that the tax burden is equitable.

The plan brought wholehearted endorsement from all councilmen and Mayor Claude Ely, who called the action "long overdue."

## P-TA to Hear Accountant, Meet Exchange Students

Northville parents and teachers will meet two exchange students from Germany and England tonight and hear one of the nation's leading accountants discuss his recent stay in Turkey.

The three will highlight an "International Night" program sponsored by the Northville Parent-Teachers association. The program will begin at 8 p.m. in the Northville community building.

Two exchange students — Susan Clarke, from England, and Jurgen Hamacher, from West Germany — who arrived in Northville last week to begin a year at Northville high school, will be introduced to the gathering by NHS teacher Charles Valne. (See page 9).

Dr. George R. Husband, chairman of the Wayne State university accounting department, then will show slides and discuss a year which he spent as a visiting professor at the University of Istanbul.

Dr. Husband, who taught in Istanbul during the 1955-56 school year, will discuss the people of Turkey, their customs, school system, and other facets of their lives. He will answer questions from the floor of the close of his address.

A past president of the American Accounting association, Dr. Husband was born in England, attended and taught at the University of Michigan, and has written several books and a number of articles on accounting.

**AMENDMENT TO THE  
ZONING ORDINANCE**

The City of Northville ordains that the following articles of the Zoning Ordinance shall be amended as follows:

**Article IV**

Sec. 404 Lot Area. Each one family dwelling, together with its accessory buildings, hereafter erected, shall be located on a lot of not less than seven thousand five hundred (7500) square feet, and an average width of not less than sixty (60) feet.

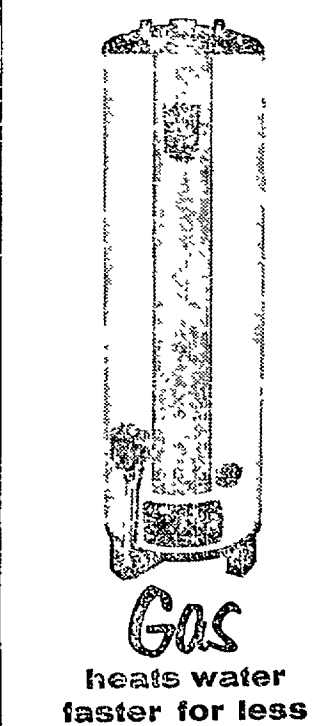
Sec. 407 Side Yards. Each lot shall have two side yards, the aggregate width of not less than twenty (20) feet. The minimum side yard width shall be eight (8) feet. In new subdivisions the minimum distance between houses shall be twenty (20) feet.

**Article V**

Sec. 504 Lot Area. Each one or two family dwelling together with its accessory buildings, hereafter erected, shall be located on a lot of not less than seven thousand five hundred (7500) square feet and an average width of not less than sixty (60) feet; provided, however, this requirement shall not apply to a piece or parcel of land identified as a single unit on a plot officially approved and recorded prior to the effective date of this ordinance.

Sec. 507 Side Yard. Each lot shall have two side yards, the aggregate width to be not less than twenty (20) feet. The minimum side yard width shall be eight (8) feet. In new subdivisions the minimum distance between houses shall be twenty (20) feet.

The foregoing amendment shall become effective ten days after the passage thereof.

**Desert 'Noisemaker' Highlights Trip West**

"If you stood at the big end of the horn when they blew it, it would take every stitch of clothing off you."

So said F. W. Hamill of Northville this week, after he and his wife returned from their annual trip to Hollywood to visit Mrs. Hamill's sister, Mrs. J. D. Stoakes.

Hamill was referring to a giant "noisemaker" some 25 miles out in the desert, a 60-foot horn used in experiments to muffle the noise of airplane motors.

The Hamill's brother-in-law, J.D. Stoakes, is senior member of a group of scientists working on such projects for industry and the government.

Hamill said the group has also

found a way to pull miles of oil pipe across the desert, to change a drill point in one-and-a-half hours instead of 24, and to cure sheets of plastic in six minutes rather than the former hour and a half.

The smog is Los Angeles' worst

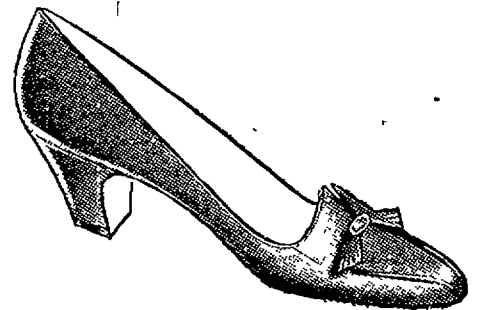
problem, he said. Scientists are now trying to control the eye-smarting problem by devising a special car muffler to check exhaust.

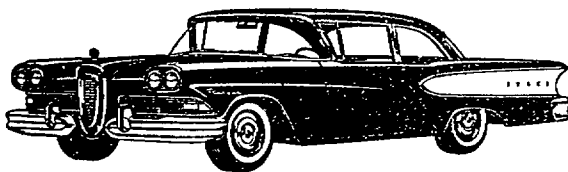

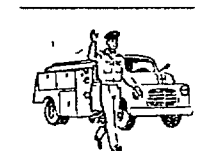

In ill health for several months, Mr. Leonard died October 13 at Pontiac General hospital.

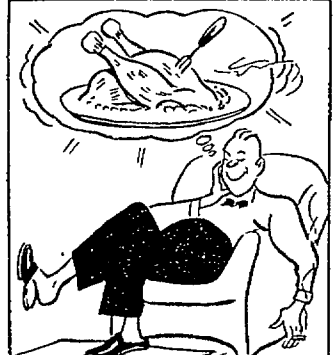

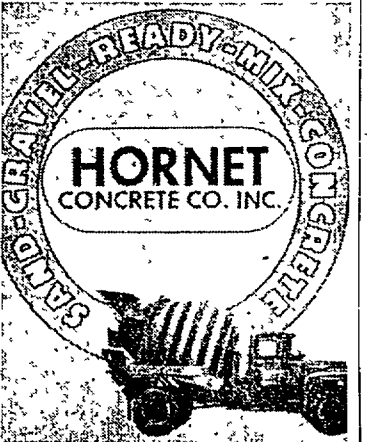

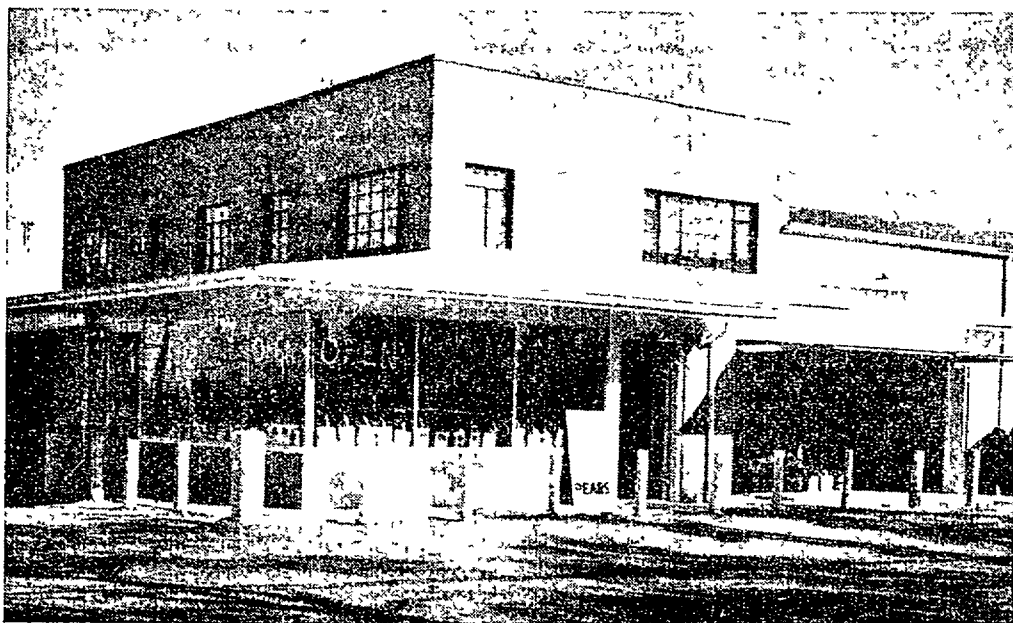

## City Grows Little, Township a Lot

Northville's population has remained almost constant since 1950, but Northville township has registered a healthy 80 percent increase in the same period.

Figures released last week by the Detroit Metropolitan Area Planning Commission put the city's population last July at 3,590, and the township's at 7,500.

That meant, for the city, an 11 percent gain of 319 from the 1950 population of 3,240. Northville township jumped 3,316 from its 1950 record of 4,184.

In other nearby communities, Novi township gained 73 percent (from 3,827 to 6,600), Plymouth grew 30 percent (from 6,637 to 8,600), Plymouth township rose 27 percent (from 4,945 to 6,300) and Livonia jumped 162 percent (from 17,534 to 46,000).

The largest percentage gain in Wayne county were Riverview (259 percent) and Garden City (248 percent), while Redford township led the out-Wayne county numerical increases with 39,060, followed by Livonia (28,466) and Dearborn township (27,765).

The entire Detroit metropolitan area increased by 25 percent — from 3,016,197 to 3,770,000. The gain of 753,803 is equal to the entire 1950 population of such cities as Pittsburgh and San Francisco.

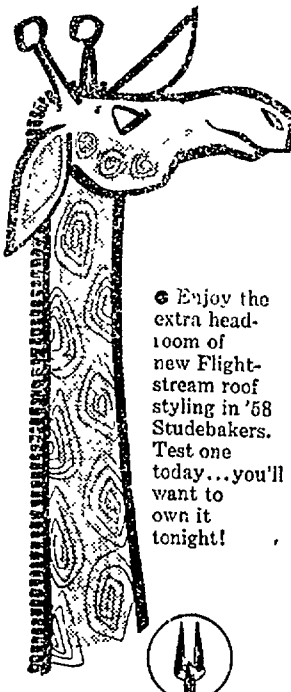

"It was interesting, but they seemed to stand around a great deal."

It was last Friday night, and Jurgan and a pretty British girl named Susan Clarke had just embarked on a year's stay in Northville by witnessing their new classmates doing battle on the gridiron.

Jurgan and Susan arrived in Northville only the day before, after a two-week journey across the Atlantic and into Canada. They and several hundred other young Europeans were about to find out for themselves what the life of an American teen-ager is all about.

Like Hedi Tritthart, the young Austrian girl who left Northville two months ago after a year's stay, Susan and Jurgan are sponsored by the Northville Rotary club through the Ann Arbor Council of Churches.

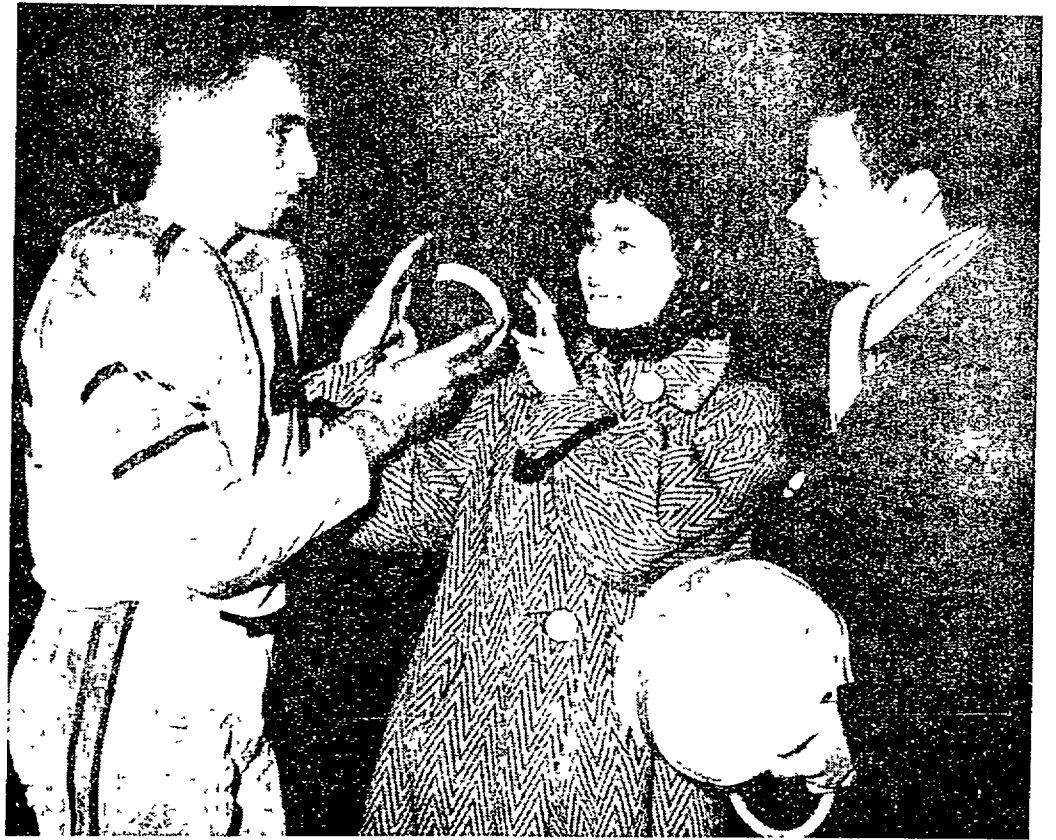
Susan, 16, hails from Tumbridge Wells, a suburb of London, and is staying with Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Skow, 659 Horton.

Jurgan, 18, is from the industrial German city of Dusseldorf and now lives with Mr. and Mrs. Walter Couse, 45875 West Seven Mile.

Jurgan already knew a great deal about Northville even before he touched shore. His sister, Ursula, spent a year with postmaster Leland Smith and his family in 1952.

Both students will get a good sampling of American education while they are here. Susan's program, for example, includes American history, driver education, sociology, government and — almost paradoxically — English.

Through it all, both they and Northville will realize more clearly that despite an ocean, a language, or the way you play football, people are pretty much the same all over the world.

### The Coach's Corner

by RON SCHIPPER

Northville High School Football Coach

Question: When Northville was using the fast huddle Friday night the officials were not keeping up with the play and holding up the game at the time expense of Northville. In cases where the officials are actually holding up the game, why shouldn't the officials call time out so as not to penalize the team using the fast huddle? What do the rules provide in this situation? Ted Donithorne

I wish I could answer this question with an exact answer.

However, I have not been able to find any two officials who will agree on what is the exact procedure for them to follow. The rule book does not provide any specific method of handling this situation.

Since we had practiced the "quick" huddle during the week I spoke to the officials preceding the game Friday night concerning the possibility of our using it and how they would handle it if certain situations had arisen. They all had a different idea on what should be done but finally settled on the one which they thought was best.

If you watched carefully last Friday night I think you would have discovered that the "chain gang" held us up more than anything else. Many times after we made a first down they were not ready to go when our team was up at the line of scrimmage ready for the next play.

As the rules are now written it is the responsibility of the officials to have the ball ready when the offensive team is set to go, and should not be penalized for inefficient handling of the chains or any other mechanized procedure connected with the smooth operation of a football game.

We plan to use this "hurry up" football some more this season and it should be very interesting to see how each group of officials works to have the ball when we are set to go.

# Mustangs Reel Off 597 Yards

## Hills Scores But Bows In 39-6 Rout

Bloomfield Hills managed to score against Northville Friday night, but otherwise it was a dismal evening for the new entrant in the Wayne-Oakland league.

After breaking Northville's two game whitewash streak with a sparkling touchdown play, Bloomfield ran into the most devastating Northville attack in years and was buried, 39-6.

Even with second and third stringers playing much of the second half, Northville racked up a total of 597 yards on offense. Of that figure, 483 came from 54 rushes — an average of 8.9 yards per carry.

The Mustang backfield, called "the fastest in the six years I've been here" by coach Ron Schipper, ate up great chunks of yardage in burying Bloomfield.

Halfback Dick Biery, who led the scoring parade with four touchdowns of 3, 62, 11 and 70 yards, had the best night of his high school career. Biery picked up 187 yards in 14 carries, for a 13-yard average, and added 76 yards on two passes for a total of 263 yards on offense.

Other Mustang backs were almost as effective. Fullback Spike Walker rumbled for 122 yards in 10 carries. Halfback Bob Starnes averaged 14 yards at a crack, going for 89 yards in seven carries. And Gary Morgan, seeing sustained action for the first time, went 61 yards in eight carries.

The Mustangs punted not once during the game, as they moved for a touchdown the first five times they had the ball.

Walker broke the ice with a 32-yard sweep to culminate a 55-yard drive after the opening kickoff. Biery added a second score when he plunged three yards after Walker and Starnes had moved the ball 62 yards.

Biery again brought the crowd to its feet when he gathered in a pass

from quarterback Pete Gross and dashed 62 yards.

Bloomfield then had its moment. In a razzle-dazzle triple handoff a la Michigan, a Bloomfield halfback passed 38 yards to the Northville 5 and the receiver scurried across untouched.

The lapse cost Northville its first score since the Plymouth game September 20.

Moments later, after Starnes had picked up 56 yards in three carries, Biery again plunged across from the 11.

Quarterback Ed Wittenberg picked up another score when he sneaked across from the 1 after a 72-yard drive which saw Biery pick up 55 yards.

The second team took over for much of the remaining time, but the first stringers went in late in the fourth quarter. Four plays later, Biery streaked 70 yards for the final counter.

The Mustangs were nearly as thorough on defense. Led by Bob Niemi and little Fred Schwarze, who was toying ball carriers twice his size, the Mustangs allowed only 41 yards and one first down by rushing in the first three quarters.

## Walled Lake Wins First League Game

Walled Lake, defending champions of the Inter-Lakes league, won its first conference victory of the season Friday night when the Vikings smothered Van Dyke, 37-0.

Bill Hovel passed for three touchdowns—two to Larry Vandervelde and one to Don Rounds. Rounds scored again when he went 30 yards after recovering a fumble.

Mike Wurst and Frank Fink also tallied for Walled Lake. The Vikings had a 12-0 halftime lead.

## Novi Eyes Hunting Ban; Police Give Safety Tips

An army of khaki-clad hunters went after King Pheasant in Novi and Northville Monday as the 1957 small game season opened across the state.

The opening day turnout brought pleas for safety from police chiefs and a possibility that Novi may act to close its borders against hunting next year.

Northville and Novi police chiefs Joseph Denton and Lee BeGole joined in issuing these words of advice for hunters:

- get a license.
- be sober when you hunt.
- load your guns only when you are ready to hunt.
- don't carry a loaded weapon in your car.

—don't carry your gun across a fence; shove it through but first, then crawl through yourself.

—get permission to hunt from property owners; you can be prosecuted for trespassing whether "no hunting" signs are posted or not.

In Novi, opening day incidents prompted supervisor Frazer Staman to suggest to the board Monday night that Novi take action to close the township to hunting, possibly next year.

Several homes have been hit by pellets, at least one car was shot up, and many instances of trespassing were reported.

"It's getting so that we can't control it," Staman said.

Staman said the state legislature would have the final voice in leaving Novi open or closed, but that township residents would have a chance to vote on the question if it comes up.

## 'Any Deer' Permits Sought by 112,000

More than 112,000 persons applied for the 59,030 special "any deer" permits for the 1957 season.

Drawings were scheduled yesterday to determine distribution of permits.

In some areas, quotas were not exceeded and all applicants will receive permits.

Most popular with hunters were the 17 units where deer of either sex, any age may be taken by permit holders during the regular November 15-30 "buck" season.

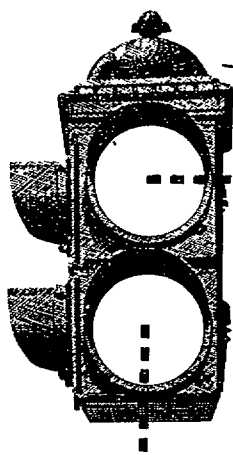

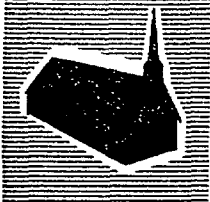

## Jehovah's Witnesses Hear Peace Prospects

Jehovah's Witnesses from this area recently attended a 3-day assembly in Ypsilanti at which the discourse, "What Are the Prospects for Lasting Peace?" was given by Peter D'Mura, New York minister in charge of Jehovah's Witnesses' activities in Michigan, Ohio and Indiana.

## Industry Likes it Here

MICHIGAN'S INDUSTRIAL climate, which has been kicked around often and hard between Democrats and Republicans when discussing the state tax structure, finally felt the warming glow of favorable light.

The state of Oklahoma, which is carrying on an active campaign to interest new industry to locate there, wrote 10,000 letters to plants all over the country. Don C. Weeks, director of the Michigan Department of Economic Development, recently heard from an Oklahoma official that Michigan industrialists show "outstanding loyalty to their state." This loyalty was so marked in replies from 400 Michigan industries contacted, that it became a subject for general discussion in Oklahoma.

Oklahoma businessmen will soon be following up the letters with personal visits to offices which received the letters. This, of course, includes Michigan.

Important aspect about this display of loyalty is that it can overcome some of the undeserved poor publicity which resulted from political fighting when Democrats were charging that industry should be taxed more and Republicans were charging the present tax structure is "driving industry out" of the state.

THE UNINSURED driver and related problems are receiving careful study. A commission appointed by the governor is examining him as a cause of financial hardship to others when he becomes involved in an accident.

Commission members are weighing pros and cons of several plans which deal with this problem in other states. A report, or probably a majority and several minority reports, will be submitted about Christmas.

Two basic philosophies from which commission members must choose involve plans which will set up funds within state government so that people suffering loss from uninsured drivers can be paid, or plans which will force uninsured drivers to become insured at the risk of losing the right to drive.

The first approach attempts to spread the cost damages caused by uninsured drivers over all drivers; the second attempts to reduce loss by fixing responsibility on the individual driver and forcing those who are not insured off the road.

Neither approach is as simple as it sounds, but the commission is working in the hopes that it can recommend some plan which will be an improvement over existing conditions.

POLITICIANS are sprinting toward next year's election like men in gray flannel suits wearing track shoes.

Party finances for years have been shunted into the background with partisans pushing policies and personalities, leaving the dollars and cents work in the precincts.

Now both sides have discovered that it takes money to elect a state in November.

It has always been this way, but the parties liked to pretend that money was a convenience. Not really necessary, but handy.

Democrats conducted a door-bell and front porch campaign this fall. It was well-publicized and the yield was satisfactory.

State Chairman Neil Staebler said the program was designed to raise money, but also to make the precinct workers feel they had a key role in the Democratic party.

Republicans took up the same sort of program.

Don E. Ahrens, former vice president of General Motors (Cadillac division) was named party finance chief. He has experience with a number of local campaign drives.

His first move was to start a "Republican United Fund" campaign, and suggested that party members contribute \$1 a month, or year, to provide a continuing fund to pay expenses.

Ahrens is interested in "business-like concepts, budgeting of necessary expenditures, thorough audits, and the utmost in establishing financial responsibility to party leaders."

MICHIGAN'S PRISONS are still overcrowded. This has been an annual complaint since the 1952 riots at Southern Michigan Prison at Jackson.

There have been a number of building and remodeling projects, but still there are more prisoners than cells.

The latest problem is the state's women prisoners, now stationed at the Detroit House of Correction, itself overcrowded.

Last month, the state corrections commission urged quick action to take over the Detroit House of Correction, at least it's women's division.

The theory was that, if the commission was charged with the responsibility of caring for and rehabilitating all state prisoners, it should have jurisdiction over the facilities. In addition, an investigating group hired by Detroit concluded that the institution was ill-fitted and ill-administered to care for prisoners.

The state commission then said it should either make the Detroit prison a state institution or build a women's prison of its own.

That led up to a proposal by Senator Elmer R. Porter, of Blissfield, that the state take over one of its less-occupied tuberculosis hospitals as a women's prison.

## Antiques Offer Opportunity for Profits

Babson Park, Mass. — Of course, antique furniture cannot be bought today and sold next year at a profit. It has a very poor "over-the-counter" market. The dealers in such furniture are keen and hard to beat. Therefore, you must buy it right — below the market — in order to sell it at a profit. It is usually best to buy it from families whom you know, and sell it to others whom you know — making your own market.

Beating Inflation and Making Profits  
We talk about "growth stocks" and "inflation hedges", but the very best of this group is good antique furniture. A friend of mine in Gloucester bought a highboy for fifty dollars. He spent another fifty dollars getting it refinished, as it was very shabby. He sold it to me for eighteen hundred dollars. I have since been offered three thousand dollars. Very few "growth stocks" or "inflation hedges" can equal this investment.

When buying such furniture it is very important to get a "genealogy" of the chair, table, highboy or bed which you buy. Insist upon a written statement as to the family who owned it and how old it is; in other words, a history of the piece. Then, when wishing to sell, look up some member of the same family who has become well off. He may live in a distant city, but this makes no difference. Write him about his "heirloom". Send him a snapshot picture and quote him a price double what you paid! The chances are that he will purchase it. Furthermore, it will be a good investment for his family. He will surely get more pleasure from it than from any other possible investment he could make with that same money.

Men Retiring From Business

I sometimes have letters from men who have been very successful executives, retiring from active business, asking what to do to "keep busy". They may have been retired on account of age or may have had a nervous breakdown, or their retirement may have been due to other reasons. I tell such persons, that under the same circumstances, I would go into the antique business. It is dignified, one cannot lose much money in such a business, and it gives one a place to loaf, to read the newspapers, and to meet a few people each day.

Psychologists tell me it would be unwise for me to remain home most of the day. I should have some place to go every morning and remain for the day. This will give me a different environment, enable me to make new acquaintances and meet with these new friends. I am told that, such a change will do more good than pills or any other device for keeping young. The antique business is an interesting business, and the inventory always increases in value. Of course, one should not depend upon such a business for a living, but rather for a life.

Where To Locate

I would like to locate in some city of about 25,000 where the men are engaged in local industries. I would join the Chamber of Commerce, and some luncheon club. Probably the Rotary or Kiwanis clubs would now have no "Antique Dealer" as a member. I would subscribe to the leading "Antique" monthly magazines and — in a year — know more about antiques than any one else in the locality.

At first, I would have no employee but would watch for someone who — as a hobby — likes to "putter", fixing up old things. I would try to help him or her. I surely could polish up the furniture myself. I would soon learn that many other retired executives have a similar hobby

and making an entirely new circle of friends. I feel it might be very difficult for me to make a success in the antique business or restore my health or "keep young" by staying with old friends where I now live.

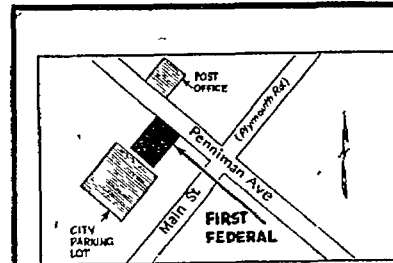
