

See Ely Fund Goal As Deadline Nears

As the final day for contributions to the Claude N. Ely Memorial fund approached this week the goal set by the committee establishing the fund appeared safely in sight.

Although final tabulations cannot be made until after Friday's deadline, the number of contributors who have already responded

with voluntary donations make establishment of the fund a certainty.

Originally, the committee set \$1000 as the minimum goal for the fund. The memorial to Northville's late mayor is being created to offer incentive to others to contribute to the improvement of the community. Interest from the fund will be used as a cash award annually to the person judged most deserving by the fund committee.

John Canterbury, chairman of the fund establishment committee, emphasized that all contributions have been made voluntarily. Names of all contributors will be published in next week's Record although the amount of each individual contribution will not be revealed.

"Actually, the large number of contributions will be responsible for putting the fund over the top," Canterbury emphasized. Although several organizations have given larger amounts to the fund, the committee has stressed participation by as many citizens as possible with contributions of any size.

Working with Canterbury on the fund have been Russell Amerman, A. Russell Clarke, Malcolm Allen, Nelson Schrader and William Sliger. A committee composed of the mayor, president of the school board, superintendent of schools and two appointed members will determine the winner each year.

Because of the late Mayor Ely's long association with Detroit Edison company, it was decided to invest fund monies in Edison stock.

The board elected Adrian Willis to serve as vice president and named Robert Shafer to continue as secretary. Dr. Waldo Johnson was elected treasurer, filling the post held by Eural Clark, retiring board member.

Plan Improvements of Northville Road

To Straighten Out Curve And Build Wider Bridge

A half-mile section of Northville road will be relocated later this summer to straighten out a dangerous curve that has taken a number of lives in the past.

The \$175,000 project will include a new bridge over the Middle Rouge river, according to Wayne county road commission officials.

The new road will be only slightly wider than the present Northville road, but will be engineered for future expansion into a four-lane highway. The bridge itself will be four lanes wide.

Sol Lifszit, design engineer for the commission, said the bridge will be located 100 feet east of the present road-level bridge.

The road will veer easterly off the existing road about 400 feet south of Seven Mile, pass over the bridge, and finally hook up again with the present road.

Its total length will be roughly 2,200 feet, Lifszit said. Work on the project is due to begin later this summer, but Lifszit did not indicate how long it would take.

Work will begin on the bridge first, he said, and traffic will not be disturbed until it is completed. But there will be a short period when traffic is detoured around the project.

The road will be 22 feet wide, compared to 20 feet now. But it will be graded and designed so that two more lanes can be added.

Stanley Davis, director of real estate for the commission, said right-of-way will be purchased in the near future.

Most of the property owners have been contacted already, and commission agents will soon be making purchase offers. Davis said he expects negotiations to go smoothly but added that condemnation action will be taken if necessary.

The treacherous S-curve has been the scene of many accidents in the past, including a number of fatalities.

The last death occurred in October, 1955 when a Ferndale man lost control of his convertible going around the curve and smashed into a car driven by Clarence Stratton of Northville. He was killed and Stratton was injured.

New Postal Rates In Effect August 1

Postal rates on some types of mail will be going up within a few months, Postmaster Leland Smith reports.

The following will go into effect August 1:

Regular letter rates will be raised from 3 to 4 cents.

Post cards will cost three cents.

Air mail card rates increase from four to five cents.

Air mail letter rates go up from six to seven cents.

Other rates will be increased at different times in coming months, Smith says.

Printed matter rates (special Christmas card mailing is included in this classification) will be raised to three cents.

Bulk printed matter rates will increase from one and one-half cents to two cents apiece.

The bulk mailing fee will go up from \$10 to \$20 a year (sometime in 1959).

Rates on second class matter (not affecting the general public) including newspapers and magazines will go up.

Some classification and fees, however, remain the same. These are parcel post, special delivery, registered mail, insurance fees, and special handling fees.

Installation Of Phones Goes Ahead

Work is progressing on schedule for Northville's \$1,500,000 conversion from manual to dial telephone service, according to John Kamego, Michigan Bell Telephone manager here.

The new Northville Fieldbrook dial system will begin operation at 2:01 a.m. on Sunday, July 20.

Following the conversion Northville telephone users will dial F1 followed by the appropriate five numerals to reach any local telephone number.

Much of Novi already is converted to the Fieldbrook exchange.

The new electronic dialing equipment is housed in Michigan Bell's new office building at 1045 North Center. It will enable one and two party users to dial direct to 31 states from coast to coast and to Washington, D.C. and several Ontario, Canada communities.

Northville's local zone includes Walled Lake, South Lyon, Plymouth, Livonia, Garden City and Farmington.

New telephone directories will be distributed shortly before the July 20 cutover, Kamego said. In addition, local users will be provided with a booklet of dialing instructions and the nationwide toll (DDD) dialing. The booklet lists cities alphabetically by state.

For example, if a Northville customer wishes to call Drexel 1-2345 in Chicago, he will first dial 312 to reach the Chicago area, followed by the DR for the Drexel exchange, and the 1-2345 to reach the telephone number of the party he is calling.

Kamego said users who now have Fieldbrook numbers will be served from the new office instead of a mobile trailer which served on a temporary basis. The trailer will be removed from service following the changeover.

Western Electric and Michigan Bell personnel have been busy for several months installing Northville's intricate new dial equipment.

Kamego said the new dial system will afford Northville users the most up-to-date telephone equipment available anywhere in the world.

Scouts Rummage Sale Moved to New Location

Northville Hosts Detroit Presbytery

Over 200 representatives to the Detroit Presbytery met in Northville Tuesday in their first meeting since the merger last May of the two large Presbyterian bodies.

The theme throughout the agenda was "Youth".

Young candidates wishing to prepare for ordination and commission were received under the care of the Presbytery, and examinations were held for those ready for ordination. Also, the summer staff of college students for the church's Dodge Community House in Detroit, were introduced at dinner.

Emphasis was on the dedication of young people to their religious calling and training. Rev. John O. Taxis says, "on the commitment of youth."

The program of discussion covered: stewardship and promotion; ministerial relations, Christian education, church extension, sessional records, Presbyterian community services, and the Presbyterian village.

Commissioners and visitors representing over 80 churches from the Detroit area convened at 4 p.m., adjourning at 9:30 p.m.

The First Presbyterian church of Northville was host by invitation of the session. Rev. Taxis was chairman of the committee on arrangements and A. A. Redderring of Redford was moderator.

The women's association prepared the dinner which was served by members of the Presbyterian men's fellowship and the church's explorer post.

Merchants Plan Dollar Days

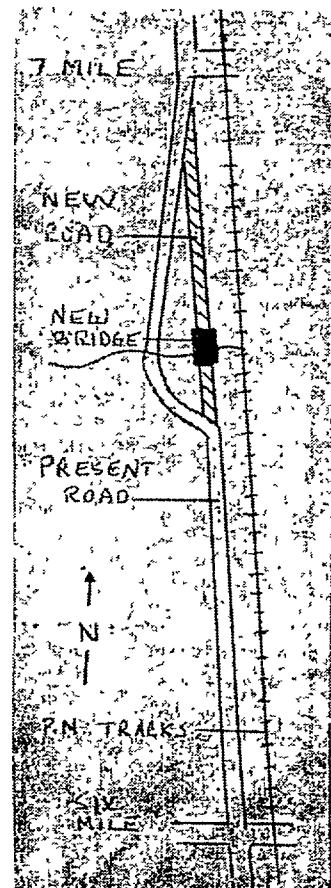
Northville merchants were making final plans this week for one of the biggest sale events ever staged locally.

Backed by the Retail Merchants association, every retailer in the city is being urged to join in the special Dollar Days event June 27 and 28.

Chairman Fred Kester emphasized that the sale would offer no "gimmicks", but that every merchant was expected to promote genuine savings on current merchandise.

"We believe that an outstanding sale with prices cut as low as possible will attract more customers than a give-away or drawing," Kester pointed out. "And the shopper will find more value," he added.

The event marks the first project of the retail association under its new president, Bruce Turnbull. The retailers have indicated that they will attempt to promote city-wide sale events more frequently and with greater participation during the coming year.

Business Piles Up On City Council

Routine business, many matters of which were postponed, kept city councilmen in session for nearly four hours Monday night.

At the conclusion they decided to meet again next Monday to award a dirt removal contract and discuss several other pressing issues that require attention.

Specifically, the council has decisions to make on salaries and wages for city employees, annual appointments to city committees, electrical permit fees, and what constitutes a fair price for a piece of Gerald avenue property facing condemnation.

The Gerald avenue lot price was questioned by Ivan and Charles Ely, owners. The city has sent the owners notice of condemnation intentions to acquire the 1.16 acres in the dump area for public works storage.

Ivan Ely asked councilmen Monday night to make an offer. He reported that a price had been set by the owners last year and the city had not replied. Councilmen indicated that the price was considerably above the appraisal of the land. Ely pointed out that cost of condemnation might be prevented by negotiation.

The council heard a report from the city manager on enforcement of the dog ordinance by policemen. The department, on the recommendation of the council, has checked all dogs within the city for licenses. Owners are also warned that dogs must be kept under leash or on the owner's property.

In other business the council decided to make no exceptions in water charges. All organizations including churches, lodges, etc., will pay standard water rates. The move is part of the city's effort to make the water department self sufficient. Until meters can be installed a flat rate will be used. To establish the department on a completely separate business basis, city buildings will also be charged and money will be appropriated in the budget for payment to the water department. This procedure is followed in many communities.

The city joined Northville township in naming Glenn Salow, Jr. as electrical inspector. Salow will work on a salary of 75 percent of fees collected. He was formerly employed by Novi township in the same capacity. The city presumably will raise its electrical fees to coincide with the township and other surrounding communities.

A Flag Expresses Her Thanks

One year ago on June 14, 1957, Mrs. Samuel Geraci returned to her Clement road home from Wayne County General hospital. A passenger victim of an automobile accident three months before, Mrs. Geraci was unable to move. Her body was literally smashed with injuries that included six broken ribs, a broken leg and hip, a broken right hand and facial injuries that required plastic surgery.

Last Saturday, June 14, 1958 Mrs. Geraci stood and awarded an American flag to the Easter Seal Society of Western Wayne county. The

gift, given on Flag Day, was her expression of gratitude to the Society and the Rotary club of Northville for their help in her recovery.

One would have to know Mrs. Geraci to realize the significance of the gift. Americanism and citizenship have been her greatest interests for many years. Confinement to bed with badly broken bones that heal slowly did not dim this inspirational light.

Before her accident she had organized and chaired Northville's annual Citizenship banquet. Last year from her bed she phoned all

the new citizens who reached voting age to help with arrangements for the banquet. For two years she served as president of the Coordinating Council.

During the past year her efforts were doubled. Not only did she continue her work for others, but she combined these interests with her own recovery.

For the Rotary club and Business and Professional Women's organization she made rugs on a hand loom. This was not easy for one working with a broken right hand and a left hand that is partially paralyzed.

The rugs were given to the local clubs for their annual rummage sales so that the funds might be used for charitable activities. The business women's group donated the funds raised from the sale of the rug to the Crippled Children's Center.

Mrs. Geraci has had help with her rehabilitation. That is why she awarded the flag to the Crippled Children's Center in Inkster in the name of the Rotary club.

Local Rotary members have driven Mrs. Geraci to the Center and to the hospital for her treatments. "You can't say thank you and forget it," she said.

Mrs. Geraci confesses that the hours of confinement have been "long and lonesome," but she quickly points out that they have been made productive and rehabilitative through work at home and at the Center.

She has taken a course in "housework by wheelchair" at the Center from Dr. Francis Sanderson of Wayne State university. Now she washes dishes, cooks and does the other normal housewife duties. She is also a member of the "Friendly Circle" club of the Easter Seal Society. The club is composed of others crippled by injuries or disease who meet regularly for social activity.

"You can't feel sorry for yourself because you can always find someone worse off," Mrs. Geraci says in explaining the psychological purpose of the club.

At Saturday's program at the Center in Inkster Mrs. Geraci presented the flag to Mrs. Jane Devereaux, executive secretary of the society. A luncheon, hosted by Mrs. John Stenson of Northville, followed the program.

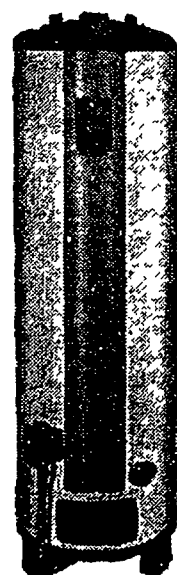

Mary Byrne, David Biery Wed

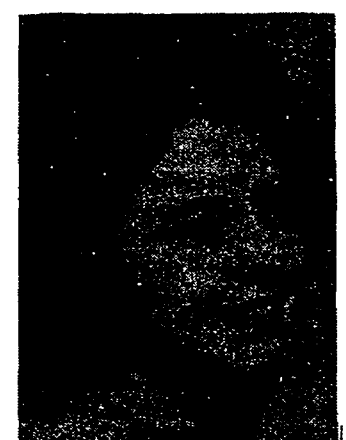

from the PASTOR'S STUDY

HAVE YOU FOUND CHRIST?

When one reflects upon the conversion of St. Paul one will find an answer to a question which, at some time or other, has occurred to the mind of everybody. What is the difference that exists, even within the unity of the church, between saints and sinners. It cannot be denied, for instance, that Christians themselves are divided into those whose real ambition in life is sanctity and those who content themselves with less. Compare with the heroism of the lives of the saints the apathy, or worse of the vast mass of Christians yesterday and today. There is a difference. In what does it consist? May we not say that the real difference lies precisely in the discovery of Christ. Or to put the matter in another way. There are many who merely try to observe the law of God; there are others who have found the Person of Jesus. The difference may not, at first, seem great. But it is, in effect, the real chasm that separates men and women whose lives are ordinary from those whose lives are heroic. In the latter case, there is an intimacy with Christ whose Presence is the atmosphere they breathe. It is one thing to bend one's energies toward the observance of a law; it is quite another to love the lawgiver. Those who endeavor merely to ob-

serve a law, who content not to violate it radically, sooner or later make the sad discovery that law is a frail barrier between a man and sin. What is needed is the Spirit of Christ, the instinct of perfection, and that intimacy with Jesus which gives undivided loyalty to the heart of a man or woman. When, indeed, do men sin? When they lose sight of Jesus. When are men converted? When the light of Christ's countenance falls upon the soul. For it is one thing to break a law; another to offend a Person.

What is needed now, as in the days of Saul, is the discovery of Christ who meets men at every cross-road in the journey of life. That is why the conversion of St. Paul is of such significance. It is true that Paul observed the ancient law rigorously. He took his place regularly in the Temple; he kept the Sabbath; he was full of zeal for Judaism. But converted he became. And it happened simply because he was given a sight of Christ. In that vision a man usually discovers what an imperfect thing his life has been. No sooner had Saul surrendered to Christ than he found within him the soul of an Apostle, the soul of a man who would lay down his life for the cause of Christ. Have you, my good friend, discovered Christ?

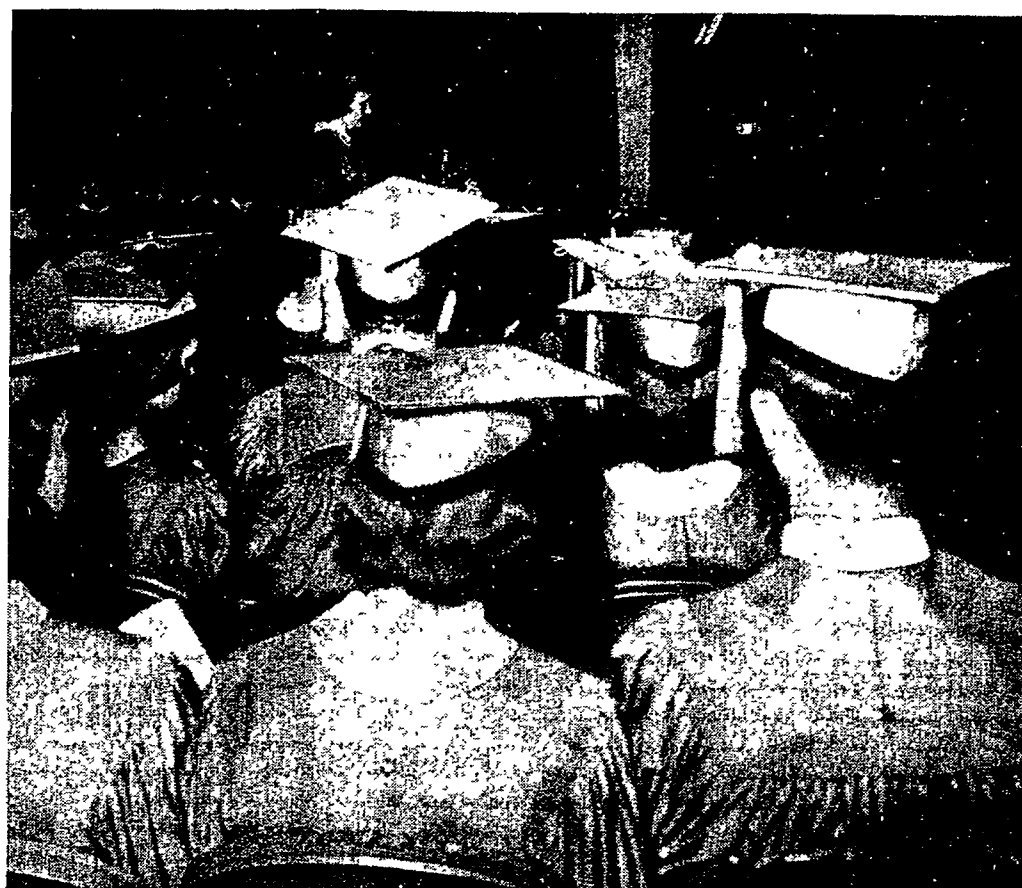

Readers Speak Up:

TAXPAYERS CAN'T AFFORD INCREASE

To the Editor:
 The editorial policy of your paper must be written with a fore-knowledge that the basic economic laws are about to be repealed. The unwavering theme of each editorial is as follows:

1. New city hall or new streets or new improvements.
 2. Taxpayers will not hesitate to pay increased taxes.
 3. The improvements will attract new industry.

Improvements are needed in the Northville business district as your editorial states. Lead the way Northville Record. Buy the building you occupy and provide the spark you say the town needs by remodeling the structure inside and out. Lead the way and share the tax load.

The taxpayers cannot pay increased taxes every year. Taxpayers are caught between slowly increasing wages or layoffs on the one hand and an increasing cost of living on the other. Some of the taxpayers are living on a fixed income or pension and the plight of these people cannot be stressed too heavily since increased taxes can mean the difference between living a full life or living on an austerity budget. Fixed incomes and increased taxes mean less sales for the businessmen of the community.

Civic improvements will not attract new industry if taxes are raised. New industry can only be enticed into an area by low taxes and a proper attitude toward industrial growth by the people and their local representatives. Industry is not fighting to get into Detroit despite the beautiful new civic center, but their downtown business firms are fighting for their lives. Drive to the East across 9, 10, 11 and 12 Mile Roads to their terminus and see where small industry locates in large numbers, but you will not see

lush civic improvements. Don't put the cart before the horse. Industrial and business growth must come first. Civic improvements can then be made with the new tax revenues without increasing the tax rate. Private citizens and a few small industries cannot support an ever growing tax budget. If taxes are forced higher the industries can and will leave, and they will also leave a larger tax bill for each of the private citizens. Remember, the continuing inflationary spiral of products and services will increase taxes without any help from unnecessary new expenditures.

The writer feels that the future can be good for our area if we adopt and work toward the following goals:

1. New industrial taxes are out of the question since industrial expansion will be dormant for the next year or two. Therefore, civic improvement and increased indebtedness should be scrutinized from the standpoint of vital necessity.
 2. Industry is not interested in our area. City and township officials should meet and prepare a common plan for industrial and business growth. After formulation the plan will have to be sold to industry when expansion and new business become available.
 3. A firm attitude against all non-taxable institutions being located in our area.

Each taxpayer in the community should ask himself the following questions:

1. Do we want tax increases larger than those forced upon us by inflationary trends?
 2. Do we want to decrease the spending power of our citizens and business firms thru increased taxes?
 3. Do we want to lose our industries and business firms thru high tax rates?
 4. Do we want business and industry to look elsewhere when new facilities are required?
 5. Do we want our future dedicated to paying off huge indebtedness?

The answer to these questions must be an unqualified — NO! Therefore, intelligent, price-conscious planning must be the watchword of the future if we are to steer clear of the tax abyss.

I'M NOT CONCERNED!

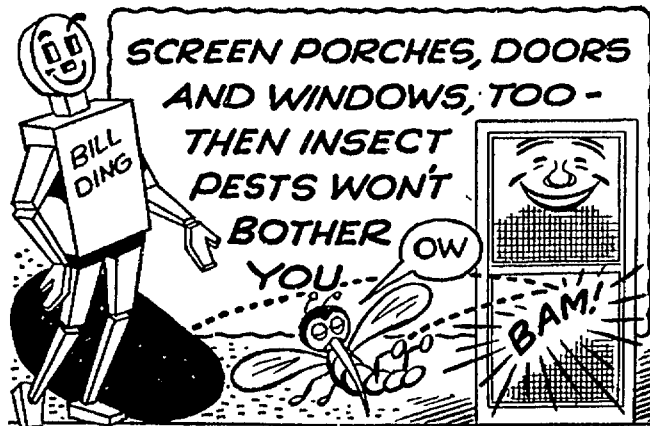
