## What's Become Of Ex-Operators?

What's become of Northville's 26 switchboard operators? Until Sunday, the operators handled all Northville calls. But the old switchboard is now completely shut down.

John Kamego, manager for Michigan Bell, said all operators were offered a job with the same status in nearby offices. But they were given a choice between the new job or severance pay.

Of the 26, 10 girls transferred to the Plymouth office, which now serves as the long distance toll center for this area.

One went to the Michigan Bell accounting department, and one to the Webster exchange switchboard.

Northville's chief operator, Mrs. Walter Timm, chose to retire after 28 years with Michigan Bell.

The remaining 13 girls took termination pay.

## Out With the Old, Ring in the New!

Mrs. Otto Schoch of 416 Yerkes street, whose phone number "416" has matched her address for 22 years, says she won't change houses just because her new Fieldbrook number is a cryptic 9-2132.

"It doesn't bother me," Mrs. Schoch says. "It's the same old phone."

Mrs. Schoch says the old number was just a coincidence.

But a 22-year-old coincidence isn't really much of a coincidence any more, and the Schoch's aren't sentimental at all about ringing in the new generation.

Kamego said no failures were caused by equipment failures. Most resulted from cable trouble.

One person kept getting the same party regardless of the number dialed. Several got no dial tone.

Northville Mayor Malcolm Allen, who placed the first call over a special hook-up, had trouble with his own phone. His business phone worked, but his home extension didn't.

"It's conceivable that something might still happen," said Kamego, "but at present it looks as if we're in business."

Phone users had a lot of fun experimenting with the new system Sunday. More than 18,000 calls were made on the first day, compared with 6,144 on an average Sunday.

Of the 18,000, some 379 were full-dialing long distance calls (not including those to Detroit, Ann Arbor and other nearby points).

Kamego said users made 175 dialing errors the first day. The figure is high for an exchange this size, but is probably due to general unfamiliarity with the system, he said.

# Northville Wins Annexation Suit

## Residents Say Dump Is Nuisance

Gerald avenue area residents sought relief from the nuisance of the city's dumping area in a petition read Monday night at the city council meeting.

The petition asked the city to "abate the nuisance" caused by smoldering fires in the dump.

Councilmen were sympathetic to the request and directed the city manager and city attorney to answer the petition. Mayor Malcolm Allen pointed out that the city is currently completing arrangements to purchase all the property in the dumping area. "We intend to fence the area and provide better controls to eliminate the burning," he added.

The City has been working for two years to acquire necessary lots to improve dumping procedure and provide a public works depot. City Attorney Philip Ogilvie began condemnation activity recently to complete the acquisitions.

In other matters the council directed the city attorney to issue a nuisance warrant against Paul Palmer "if definite work has not begun by Wednesday" to clean up debris on a lot owned by Palmer at 141 East Cady street.

The house, target of complaints by residents of the area, has been torn down since fire gutted the inside last winter. Councilmen pointed to the danger, as well as the appearance, of the open basement and lumber piles.

A request by Postmaster Leland Smith to place a drive-in "snorkel-type" mailbox in front of the post office was granted on a trial basis by the council. They decided to move two 15-minute parking meters now in front of the post office to each side of a two-car "no parking" area that will be provided for the new box. Drivers may then drive into the no parking area to deposit mail and immediately drive out.

Smith stated that two more of the drive-up boxes would be placed in town in the near future.

In final business the council approved new electrical inspection fees corresponding with Northville township and Plymouth. All three communities use the same electrical inspector. A new connection fee of \$100 for adding one inch water connections to users already receiving service was also approved.

## Council Makes Appointments

Annual appointments to the Northville planning commission and board of appeals were completed this week by the city council.

Planning Commissioners Ernest Ebert, Jr., Lynn Sullivan and George Zerbe were re-appointed to three-year terms. Earlier Donald Hannabarger was named to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Maxwell Austin.

Three members of the board of appeals were renamed to three year terms. They are Art Schmutz, Fred Gots and Ernest Wilsner. T. R. Carrington is chairman of the planners, while Elmer DeKay heads the board of appeals.

## Northville Marine in Lebanon

The wife of a Northville marine received a letter from her husband last Friday, saying he would soon be on his way home.

But almost at the same moment his wife was reading it, Corporal Harry W. Council, Jr. was landing on the beach at Beirut, Lebanon.

Council, 21, was with the third increment of Marines to land on the Lebanese shore under the recent U.S. decision to give military support to the Beirut government.

With 1,800 other combat-ready marines of the eighth regiment's first battalion, Council stepped ashore and immediately dug in on the narrow beachhead. The landing passed without incident.

It was the second disappointment in two months for his wife, Mettie, and sons, Robin, 2, and Rickie, 1, of 21849 Novi road.

Council, a marine reservist, was to have come home first on May

26. But the orders were suddenly changed.

Then, in the letter which reached home last Friday, he again said he would be leaving any day. The letter was postmarked July 5, only nine days before the current Middle East crisis began.

"But Harry's been on active duty for almost three years, and is due to get out on September 21," said his wife. "Maybe he'll make it this time."

Mrs. Council and her two children have been living with her husband's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Council of the same address, since leaving Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, recently.

The senior Council's have lived here for four years, after moving from Bloomington, near Kalamazoo, where their son went to high school.

## Novi Board Re-Affirms Decision on Connemara

The Novi township board and developers of Connemara Hills subdivision were still at odds this week, but approval of lots went ahead just the same.

The board Monday night re-affirmed its stand that all lots in the subdivision would have to undergo new percolation tests before building permits would be issued.

The initial decision was made by Building Inspector Harold Ackley after a number of septic failures at existing homes had been reported.

Monday night, the board rejected two proposed resolutions by Robert Goodwin, of the Howard T. Keating company, developer of Connemara. The resolutions called for the board to state that all new sanitary tests would be honored in the future and that building permits would be issued once the tests were taken.

The board agreed to inform Goodwin that the resolutions are not necessary and that the previous decision will stand.

This still leaves the situation somewhat cloudy, however. Presumably, the board means that building permits will be issued if new sanitary tests prove successful. Goodwin, however, wants this in writing.

Goodwin, not present at the meeting, said Tuesday he was "disappointed" at the board's action but would wait until receiving an official reply.

Voters wishing them must make application at the Northville city hall or Northville township hall no later than Saturday, August 2, at 2 p. m.

## No Word On Appeal Possibility

A controversial 220 acres, which has bounced back and forth between Northville and Novi twice, seems to have finally and permanently landed in Northville.

Oakland County Circuit Judge Clark J. Adams made it official this week when he ruled against Warren Products in a suit brought by the company challenging the November 19 election.

In a previous suit involving annexation of the same area in 1956 Warren won reversal of the election by claiming vote fraud.

The company's latest claim that the law had been misinterpreted in conducting the last election did not hold water with the court, however.

Specifically, the area is bounded by Novi road and a line 1,000 feet west of Taft road. It extends northward to the 8 1/2-mile line and includes Yerkes Estates subdivision, Northville Lumber and Coal, and several other residences in addition to the Warren Products plant.

Judge Adams rendered his decision Friday after hearing the case Tuesday, July 15. In his opinion the judge took exception to the contention by Warren attorneys that section 9 of act 279 governing such annexations did not apply. This section holds that cities under 15,000 population, by a majority vote of the city and of the territory to be attached, may annex.

Warren attorneys had contended that all residents of Novi township as well as of the city, should have been allowed to vote.

City Attorney Philip Ogilvie had argued that all the sections of the annexation act had to be considered and that the general procedure is subject to the limitations provided in the various sections. Ogilvie drew special praise from the council Monday night for his presentation of the city's position.

There was "no comment" this week from R. T. Martin, partner in Warren Products, who said that he would confer with his legal advisors before deciding whether to carry the case to a higher court. Martin has consistently held that the annexation act is not just and has also been critical of the differences in taxes paid by Oakland and Wayne county residents of the city.

This rate differential, which was considerably higher in Oakland county than in Wayne last year, has been practically eliminated by the city's reassessment program conducted last winter.

Denton offered to give red reflector tape to any bike owners who come to his office.

Susan Clarke and Jurgen Hamacher left Northville today after welcoming two new foreign students who will make their homes here for the coming year.

Accompanying Sue and Jurgen were 51 other Detroit area exchange students who came to Northville last night for an annual farewell banquet sponsored by the Northville Rotary club and Ann Arbor Council of Churches.

After final goodbyes this morning, the students entrained for Montreal, where they'll board ship for their homes in Europe.

Sue, 17, will return to high school in England after visiting the Brussels World Fair. Coincidentally, a French exchange student will stay

with her family during the coming year. Next year, Sue hopes to begin studies in social work at London University.

Jurgen, from Germany, will also complete high school and then hopes to study medicine in Berlin. But at 19, he is nearing draft age and may have to postpone his college plans.

Reflecting on their year in Northville, the two students had warm words for their scores of friends, their teachers, and especially for their foster parents. Sue stayed with Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Skow, while Jurgen lived with Mr. and Mrs. Walter Couse.

Living the life of an American teen-ager held surprises for Sue

and Jurgen, even though they were well-informed on Americana before arriving.

"Americans are really more friendly than most Europeans realize," said Sue. "And the teen-agers, at least in Northville, are far less 'wild' than people back home think," she added. "They do dress casually, though, but I like it."

Jurgen became reflective for a moment and noted that American students, though well-behaved and attentive to schoolwork, do not have the ardor for education usually found in Europe.

Nor do Americans generally have the European's interest in things cultural, he said. One possible reason (Continued on Page 6)

## A Sunny Stay in Venezuela

When you say Bolivar to Mrs. Bertha L. Kerr of West Cady street, watch out! Just back from her third trip to Venezuela since 1948, Mrs. Kerr finds that the name of Simon Bolivar, the George Washington of South America, is often mispronounced by English speakers. Like the Venezuelan coin of the same name, she insists that it's Bol-I-var and not BOL-I-var, and this well-travelled lady, who's visited the country three times, must be right. During these years, Mrs. Kerr

has returned each time to see growing improvements in standards of living among the Venezuelans with whom she's become acquainted. Visiting her son, Frederick, a chemical engineer for the Creole Oil company near Caracas, his wife, Sybil, and daughter, Sarah Jane, Mrs. Kerr says that the company has provided several housing and sanitation improvements for workers. When she first visited, Mrs. Kerr says, natives were living in mud huts.

On her second trip in 1952, houses had been built but she was greeted by rows of bathtubs rusting outside. Still unaccustomed to the tubs, families wouldn't welcome them in.

Now, she says proudly, the little girl she first met riding a burro in 1948 became a jeep-driving nurse, and workers are buying the company houses. A few even have cars and refrigerators.

Education, she notes, has since become compulsory for all children up to the eighth grade. Previously there were some 2,000,000 illiterates in the small country.

But having developed a personal interest in Venezuelan people, she is as appreciative of their traditions and differences as their material advances.

"I always enjoy going to a foreign country to see the ways people live," she says.

She recalls "the attractive Spanish-Indian people . . . beautiful women and handsome men," and the pre-school Venezuelan children who wear nothing at all during the week, and dress up for church on Sunday in shoes and little round hats.

She was not in the capital when Vice President Richard Nixon ran into hostile demonstrators last spring. But Mrs. Kerr says that many Venezuelans are friendly toward Americans, and many were embarrassed by the outbreak.

"Caracas is a beautiful city," she says.

New buildings and lately, several new hospitals are being constructed. Yet the charm of the old seasons the new. Mrs. Kerr mentions the beautiful old churches and the colorful unique markets.

She especially likes to watch ships arrive at this port city, from all over the world.

"I like to stand on the hill above the harbor and watch them come in."

She describes tug boats pulling in the great ships, then chugging away leaving them to their own wits to maneuver a parking space, "as if they were saying, 'Goodbye, I've done all I can for you.'"

There's a beautiful and famous big statue of Simon Bolivar in Caracas, Mrs. Kerr says, and Bol-I-var is right.

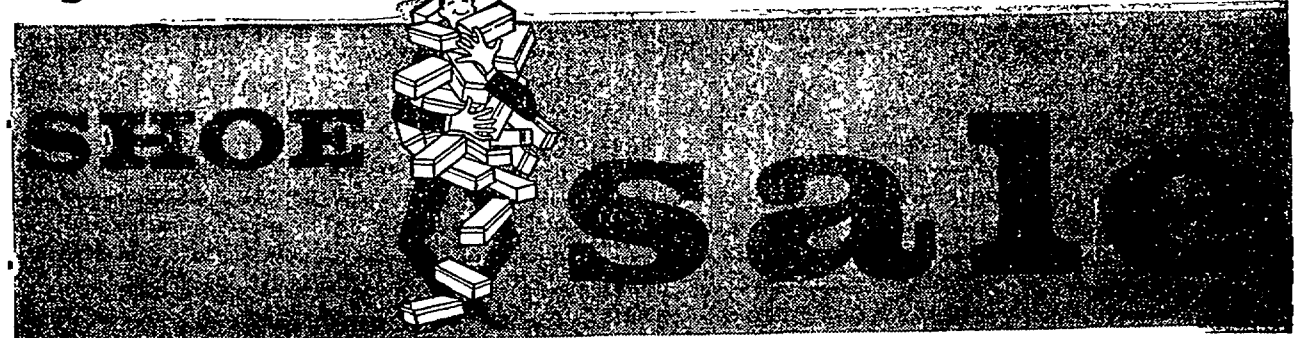
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# Novi Scouts Take to the Woods

Camp Mindockwin, located under the towering trees of Bassett's Woods off 12 Mile near Novi road, has been home for the girls for the past two weeks.

Going out daily, they learned nature lore, practiced cooking, worked on handicraft, and played games and sang songs together.

The girls were divided into four

groups, each named after a wildflower. Jack-in-the-Pulpit, Bittersweet, Rambling Wild Rose, and Trailing Arbutus.

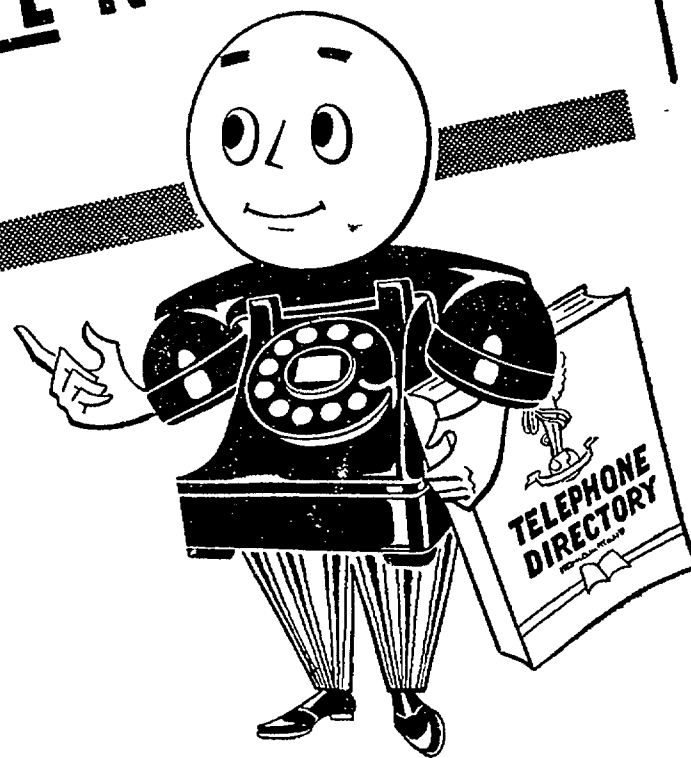

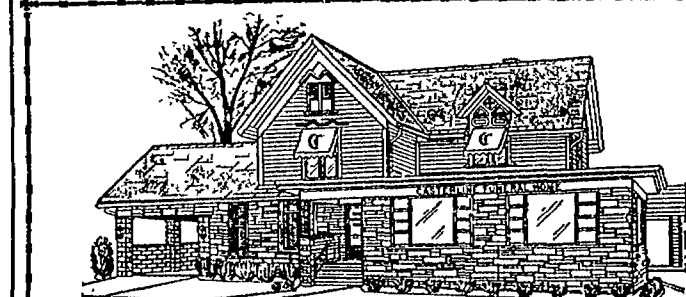

## SOME IMPORTANT STATISTICS

For many years I have filed important statistics  
on a variety of subjects. This week I would like  
to pass on to you a few of them.

The Gallup poll reports that 96% of the  
people in the U.S. believe in God. 3% have no  
opinion on the matter. 1% do not have an  
opinion.

A business executive said not long ago that  
85% of the people in this world do not have  
enough to eat, but because of the abundance  
here in America not one of us can be said to be  
in the 85%.

According to a survey, 35 Million Americans  
go to Church every week; 38 Million go to Church  
sometimes, 35 Million Americans have never  
darkened a Church door.

As a nation We spend 30 Billion on Gambling;  
9 Billion on liquor; 5 1/2 Billion on Tobacco; 175

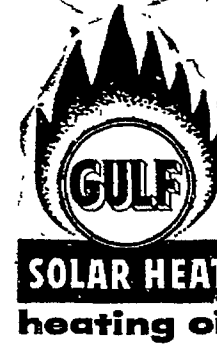

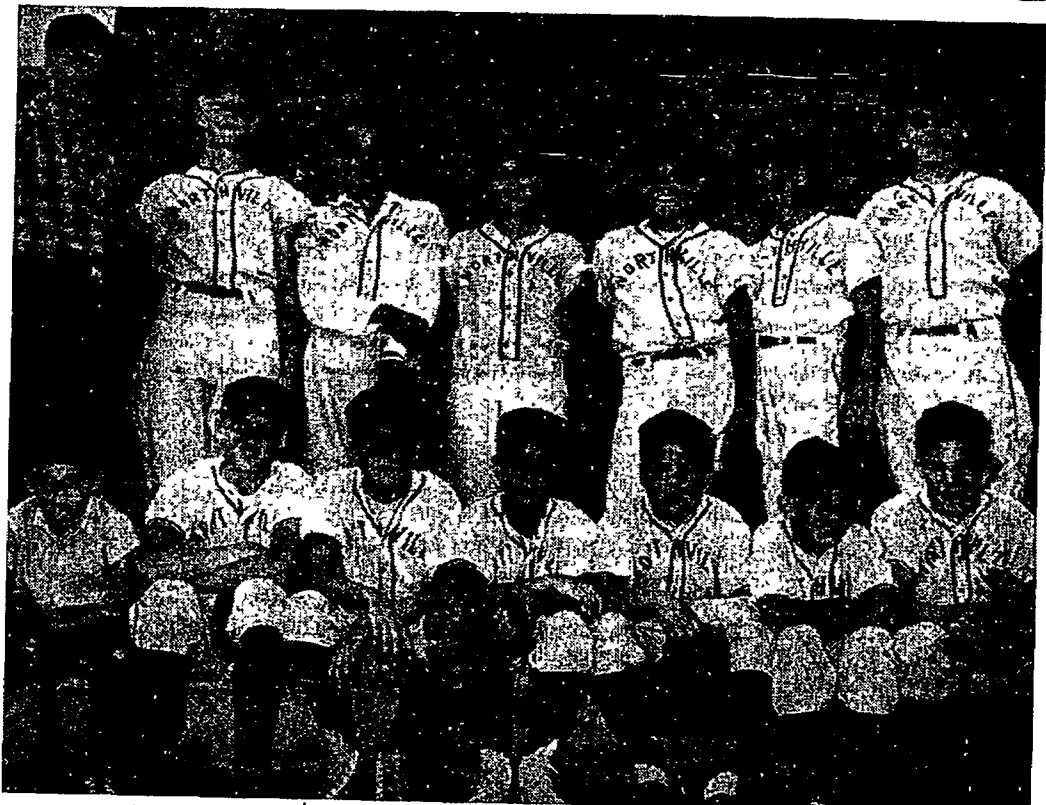
Playoffs and exhibition games will hold the spotlight in midget league play this weekend and next week.

## Minutes of the Board of Education

The meeting was called to order by President Schrader at 7:30 p.m.

Others Present: Acting Superintendent E. V. Ellison; Dr. MacLeod, Administrative Assistant to the Superintendent; Mr. James E. Littell, School attorney; Mr. A. E. Jones, Athletic Director; Mr. Jack Swain, of the Addendum Committee; the Junior High Curriculum Committee; Mr. Don MacKenzie, of Marr Taylor Ford Sales; and Mr. Kowalski and Mr. Wiegand, student teachers from Wayne University, here to observe the Board meeting.

Mr. Schrader appointed Mr. Lawrence to act as Secretary pro tem in the absence of Mr. Schafer.

The minutes of the four June meetings were read by the Secretary pro tem. Following a correction to the minutes of the special meeting of June 23rd, the minutes of all four were approved.

Communications:

1. Twelve communications from the architect regarding construction matters on the new high school.

2. Three letters from contractors concerning routine construction matters on the new high school.

3. Several letters from local people concerning routine business matters were read and entered on the record.

4. Two letters from area business concerns, advising the school of services available.

5. Municipal Finance Commission, granting permission to borrow \$50,000 against 1958-59 State School Aid.

6. Receipts totalling \$18,671.44 in taxes, transportation fees, etcetera.

7. Dr. Brake, Wayne County Superintendent of Schools, advising of transfer of 7.59 acres of property belonging to a Mr. Don Robinson, on Six Mile Road, from Plymouth School District to Northville District.

8. Mr. and Mrs. Charles Klocke, commending the School and Miss Grace Pollock, kindergarten teacher, for the attention given to their daughter, Pamela, a handicapped child. Mr. and Mrs. Klocke feel that Miss Pollock's efforts were responsible for Pamela's successful year in kindergarten.

Report of Acting Superintendent:

1. Finances: Acting Superintendent Ellison reported on his attendance at two meetings of Wayne County Superintendents held in Dr. Brake's office to review possible improvements in school financing. Our own financial status shows a need for another loan of \$50,000 in July, against 1958-59 State Aid. A resolution to borrow this \$50,000 was offered by Mr. Lawrence and supported by Mr. Willis. Motion carried.

2. Amerman School Break-in: Acting Superintendent Ellison read a brief report from Richard Kay, principal of the Amerman building, concerning the break-in at that building. Upon the recommendation of the Acting Superintendent the school board passed a motion, proposed by Dr. Johnson and supported by Mr. Willis, to the effect that all school offices must use the bank night depository for disposal of moneys received after banking hours. Motion passed.

3. High School Construction: is, in general, on schedule. Several problems need attention, including the storm sewer which allows water to run down Center Street, grading of Center Street, payment for storm sewer and construction of an additional manhole, etcetera.

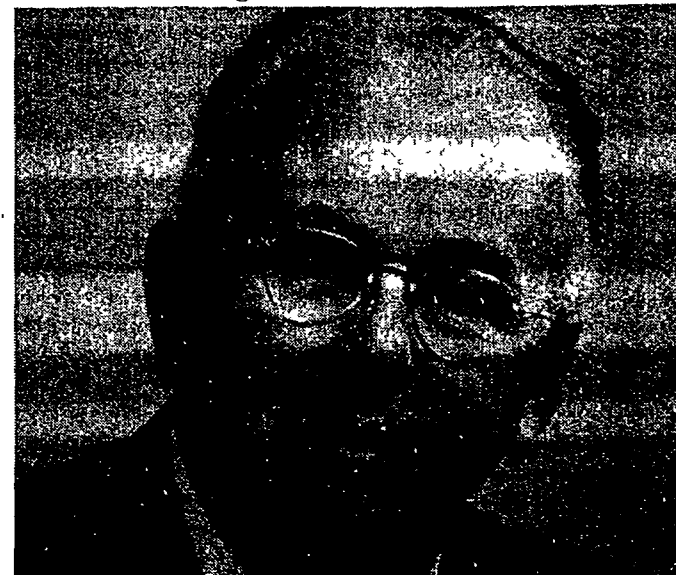

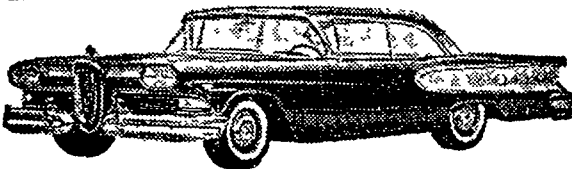

## Nucleonics School Offered by Navy

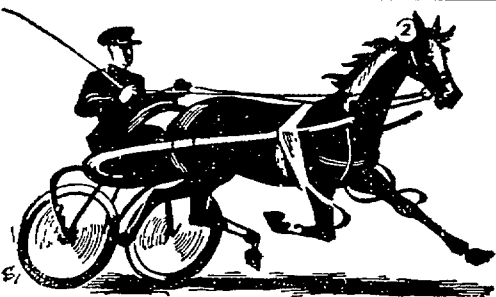
