Another year has passed and again we celebrate the birthday of the God-man. Again He is the host at this birthday party and we are the guests. We greet the host with the angelic messenger's words "Glory to God in the highest" and we listen to the response "Peace on earth to men of good will."

How happy you make the Host feel and how happy you must be, my dear readers, when you as a guest are a person of good will, which you are as long as four spiritual elements are present in your life, namely, possessing, receiving, giving, and through the Blessed Mother of Jesus.

Possessing grace or friendship with God is the richest treasure that you have. You may not have good health nor earthly wealth, nor physical beauty, but if you constantly stay in the state of soul free from serious sin you are among the richest people in the world.

Secondly, you are a person of good will when there exists the spiritual element of receiving, receiving the Body and Blood of Christ in Holy Communion — not just Christmas day but often, in order to keep your soul alive, for, Christ the Host says to you "Unless you eat my Flesh and drink my Blood, you shall not have life in you." The Bible tells us that some people who heard the words of Christ, took him literally and found it a hard saying and walked no more with Him. Christ let them go; He did not call them back nor did he say that He wanted these words to be taken figuratively. Therefore, you are a person of goodwill so long as you nourish your soul with this heavenly food.

Thirdly, you are a person of good will when there exists the spiritual element of giving — giving to God the greatest gift that can be given — namely, Christ in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. Catholics believe this. For others of different faiths it is still giving — giving to God the worship that is due Him. Just as God was pleased with the sacrifice of good people in the Old Law, so he is pleased with you when you give yourself to adoration, thanksgiving, and reparation to God.

Fourthly, there is a conviction on the part of many Christians that all graces come through Mary from God, for Jesus comes to us through the Virgin Mother. God could have chosen another way to come amongst us, but He did not. There would be no Incarnation — Jesus made Flesh — if it had not been for Mary. There would be no Holy Babe without the mother. What a tremendous honor and dignity God gave Mary to choose her out of all of the billions of people to be His own Mother. What a great power over sin he endowed her with when He promised the Devil that "I will put enmity between you and the woman, and she shall crush your head — and you shall lie in wait for her heel."

As you visit the crib in meditation, look upon the Nativity scene humbly — for you the stable is a classroom — where you learn the truths of your faith so well — as you worship you hear the lesson —

"For this I was born and for this cause came I into the world, that I should give testimony to the truth."

Hold fast to these truths and you will persevere as men of good-will.

Funeral Services Conducted For Brain Tumor Victim, 6

Little David Rochon will not be plagued by pain again.

It left as the young brain tumor victim slipped into death last Friday — just three days after his sixth birthday.

David was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Rochon, 729 Horton. He had been a normal five-year-old until last April when suddenly walking and seeing became difficult. His parents learned that a nasty fall down the basement stairs in February was probably the cause of a brain tumor.

Living became a painful chore for David. His head, stomach and legs ached; his bowels and kidneys didn't perform properly; he could eat only liquids. Medicine became his steady diet and temporary relief.

During the past three weeks he became so numbed by pain that medicine was no longer necessary. His sight was lost and he recognized no one. David became six without knowing it.

Last summer the Rochon's plight became known to area residents and help poured in. Mr. Rochon was temporarily unemployed and the assistance was badly needed to pay mounting medical costs. The VFW sponsored a benefit dinner and the American Legion contributed heavily to that event. Others gave toys as well as money.

Funeral services were held Monday at Our Lady of Victory church with the Reverend Father John Wittstock conducting. Burial was at Rural Hill cemetery.

Besides his parents David is sur-

vived by a sister, Mrs. Donna Lafreniere of Manistique, and a brother, Henry, 11; and grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Cusson of Northville.

His body was at the Casterline Funeral Home prior to services.

Churches to Hold Special Services

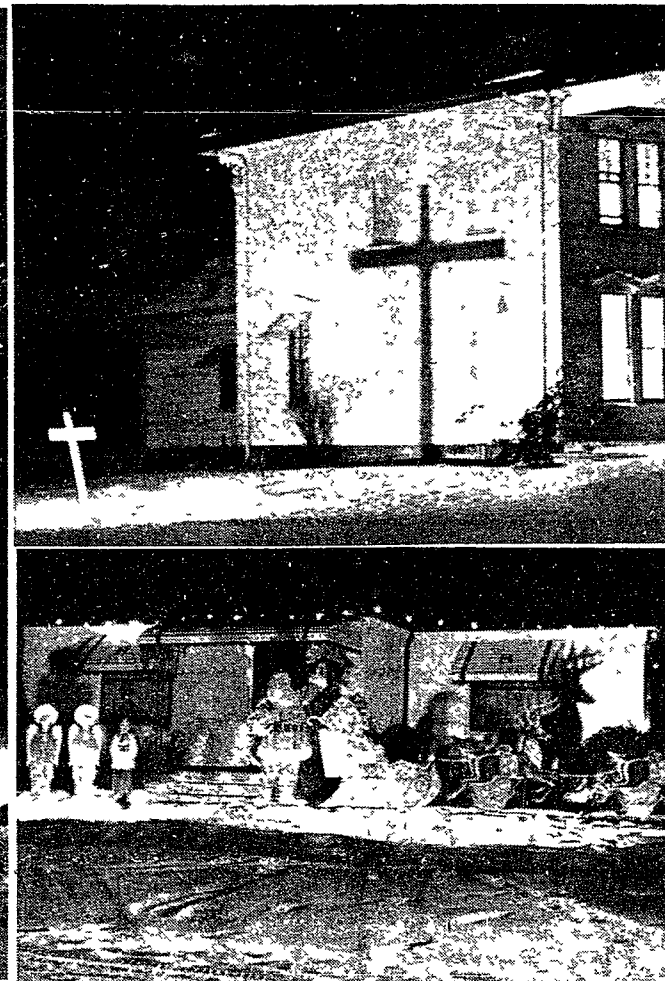
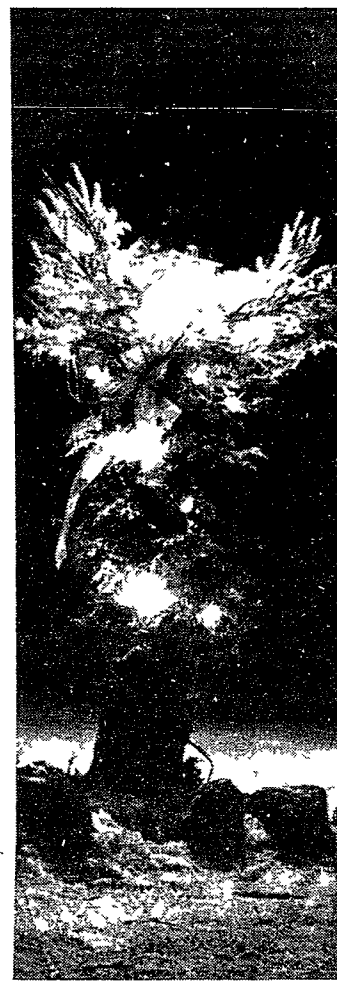

The 'gifts for Maybury' project is one long-sponsored by Mrs. George Chabut, 18585 Sheldon road. She employs the help of countless "Santas" who each year ask to receive one of the letters written by the Maybury children.

The requests are then filled — toys, clothes, dolls, etc. — and delivered Christmas morning. Mrs. Chabut has "Santas" in Northville, Plymouth, Livonia, Detroit, Farmington and Holly. The Northville Rotarians always take all the letters Mrs. Chabut can spare and then deliver the packages to her before Christmas.

Candidate 'Rumor' List Grows As Filing Deadline Nears

Reluctant city candidates can't hold off much longer! Next Monday all the hats must be in the ring as the curtain falls on submitting petitions at 5:00 p.m. at the city hall.

Unofficial reports persist that this will be one of the biggest fields of candidates in recent years. And it appears almost certain that Mayor Malcolm Allen will also have competition in his bid for re-election.

At this date three candidates have announced their intentions to run for the two council openings, while only Mayor Malcolm Allen has indicated interest in the mayor's post.

But it is generally known that at least two, and probably more candidates will file for the council. One new mayor candidate appears to be a certainty, also.

Incumbent Councilman John Canterbury, David G. Cameron and Harvey Ritchie have announced themselves as council candidates. Councilman John Stubenvoll, now holding the remaining seat up for election in April, has stated he will not run again.

The city does not hold a primary election. All candidates who file before the Monday deadline will run in the April general election.

A "new" party filed for a spot on the April ballot in Northville township last Friday evening.

A full slate of Democrats — complete with a party petition as well as personal petitions — filed for the seven offices up for election next April. Because the Democrats had no candidates in the 1957 election, it was necessary that petitions be submitted to reinstate the party.

Heading the list of Democrats is George N. Bennett, teacher and veterinarian, who will seek the position of supervisor.

Others are: Mrs. Walter Gothe, 15790 Marilyn, clerk; Joseph Miles, 41271 East Eight Mile road, treasurer; Chester Robertson, 16515 Bradner, trustee; Leon Gagner, 41810 Seven Mile road, board of review; Edward M. Cassel, 47191 West Main street, justice of the peace, and Manuel D. Perez, 19321 Gerald, constable.

Township Democrats ran five candidates in 1955, but none were elected. Records show that it has been nearly 40 years since Democrats held office in the township.

Bennett, who lives at 46950 Six Mile road, is not new to politics. This year he was an unsuccessful Democratic primary candidate for the house of representatives. He also once served as a member of the Woodburn, Indiana city council.

Bennett is 38 years old and a graduate of Plymouth high school, Michigan State and Wayne State universities. He is an instructor at the Highland Park community college in sciences and is also a veterinarian, but has no general practice. Bennett is married and has three children.

Mrs. Gothe has shown interest in government affairs as a member of the election board and a party precinct delegate for two years. Treasurer candidate, Joseph Miles, is an accountant with General Motors and was formerly associated with the Shell Oil and Ford Motor companies.

Robertson, candidate for trustee, is employed at Burroughs corporation in Plymouth. Gagner, candidate for board of review, is now retired but is active in veterans' affairs having been past commander and organizer of the Benton-Parkway World War I post. Constable candidate Perez is employed at Detroit Edison.

Cassel, candidate for justice of the peace, is an attorney who serves as consultant to the Wayne county tax allocation board and also for Wayne County Treasurer Harold E. Stoll. He has been active as a precinct supervisor in Detroit and member of the election commission.

Township Republicans who filed earlier for office are: George L. Clark, supervisor; Mrs. Marguerite (Rita) Northrup, clerk; R. D. Merriam, incumbent trustee; Roy M. Terrill, incumbent treasurer; Lawrence Massell, incumbent justice of the peace, and Donald E. Robinson, board of review. No Republican has filed for constable.

Creche Brings Family Together At Christmas

Years ago in St. Paul, Minnesota, room was made every Christmas in the window of a little neighborhood grocery store for a Nativity creche. The grocery belonged to the parents of Mrs. Arthur Carlson of Fairbrook avenue.

Now, memories of the young girl who waited eagerly for the appearance of the straw manger and plaster figures of brightly-robed wise-men, shepherds, sheep and the Holy Family, have made the creche a beloved keepsake of Mrs. Carlson, that same girl, who received it 17 years ago after her mother's death.

Since she was the eldest, and had the largest family among her brothers and sisters, Mrs. Carlson's mother, Mrs. Charles Steel, bequeathed the figurines to her, knowing that her own children would enjoy it as she had.

The creche is now placed on the Carlsons' fireplace mantle each year and their grandchildren have already begun to look for it on their holiday visits.

This Christmas eve Mrs. Carlson will use the figurines when she reads the children a story about the gifts of the wise-men.

The creche symbolizes a link between four generations of Mrs. Carlson's family today.

"We like to think we'll all be together on Christmas," she says.

Mustangs Lose, 60-56

Clarkston Maintains W-O Lead

Knowing the path through a mine field is a sure road to courage . . .

And the Clarkston Wolves knew every inch of the battlefield as they eked out a 60-56 thriller over the Northville cagers at Clarkston last week.

The win hoisted Clarkston into a first place tie with Brighton and dropped Northville into a three-way second place tie with Holly and Milford.

Playing one of their best games of the infant season, the Mustangs chased the Wolves into the closing seconds of play before the 1957 champions clinched their second league game.

With only a minute to play, Clarkston held a three-point edge when the Wolves switched to a stalling maneuver. Northville scrapped for possession, fouled Bob Porritt, who pumped in two points from the free throw line to put Clarkston out in front by five points.

Then Northville's Left Guard Fred Schwarze drove down the court, dropped a layup and then added a charity toss. The score was 56-58 with 15 seconds to play.

In a desperation move to get possession, Northville fouled and Clarkston added two insurance points before the buzzer sounded.

Clarkston's championship squad took advantage of their familiarity with the small gym and rained in a salvo of two pointers from backcourt. Northville peppered the basket from under the boards but the Mustangs couldn't match the Wolves' deadly backcourt accuracy.

Actually, the game was won at the free throw line since Northville pumped in 23 baskets to Clarkston's 22 floor shots. The Wolves dropped 16 charity tosses out of 26 attempts for a 62 percent average, while Northville sank 10 of 18 for a 55 percent record.

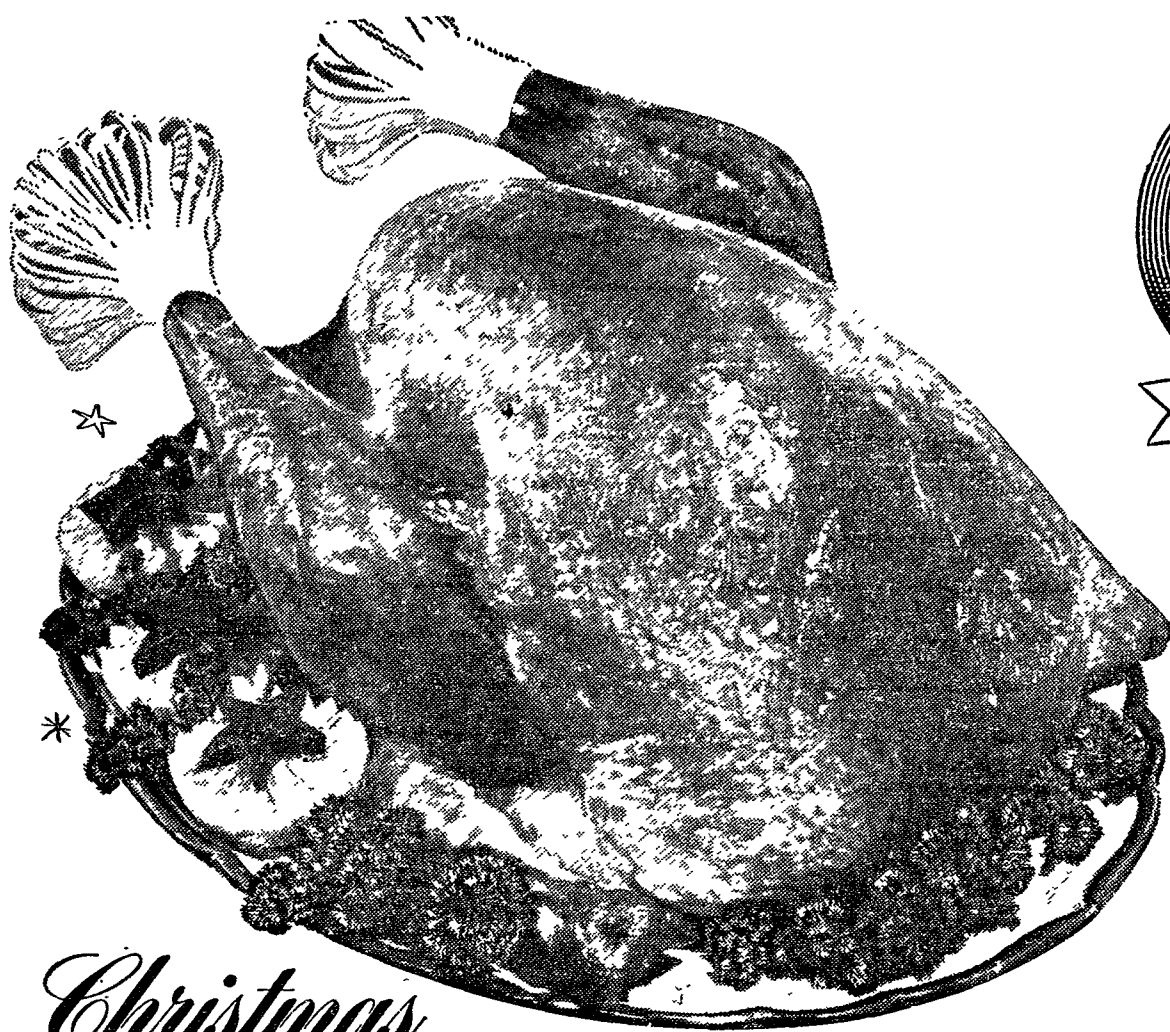
Coach Don Van Ingen, who would welcome that "first win", promises some exciting action in the upcoming contest with Holly.

Virginia, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe except they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's, are little. In this great universe of ours man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole truth and knowledge.

Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. Alas! how dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus! It would be as dreary as if there were no Virginias. G.O.P. Fans Spark

REPUBLICANS have come alive in Michigan after a decade of defeat and despair.

There are new traces of liberalism in the party and a sense of what psychologists and social workers call "togetherness" that has been absent in recent years.

They hopefully figure 1960 to be the breaking point in the regime of Gov. Williams, the year when they will have their first open shot at the executive office in 12 years.

Right now, Republicans hold power only in the state senate, 22 to 12. This gives a perilous and uncertain dominance in the legislature since they lost their majority in the House which is now split 55 to 55.

* * *

Political experts see three signs of life in the party.

1. Chairman Lawrence Lindemer drew the applause of Democratic Chairman Neil Staebler at one point in the 1958 campaign for reviving the organization of the party.

This is the field where Democrats, behind master-strategist Staebler, swept the field away from Republicans after close elections in 1950 and 1952.

2. For the first time in years, Republicans refused to criticize their defeated candidate for governor, Paul D. Bagwell, and he responded by hinting he would again lead the party in 1960.

Bagwell is a campaigner, the likes of whom Republicans have not seen in years. For the first time, Gov. Williams did not lead his slate after carrying them into office originally.

3. Republicans have dropped the panic approach to politics. They also reduced the ancient attack on Williams which calls him a "tool of UAW President Walter P. Reuther".

* * *

Other signs of health show the party is out of debt following the November 4 election, even after paying for a testimonial dinner for Bagwell and other party leaders.

For the first time, the party demanded that its legislators be held accountable to the party organization. Legislators are elected from district where their names and records are better known than their

party affiliation. They have at times turned down proposals solidly backed by party leaders.

Republicans in the Senate, realizing their role as the last bastion of the party in Michigan, are looking for ways to become the voice of the party.

* * *

MOMENTUM is developing quickly behind a safety program for public schools in Michigan to prevent disasters such as hit Our Lady of the Angels school in Chicago.

Dr. Lynn M. Bartlett and Gov. Williams already have started campaigning for higher building standards.

Included in the plan will be regular inspections and failure to comply with orders will eventually close the schools. Bartlett said some of the state's schools are "combustible".

* * *

LINKED with controversial tax proposals certain to set fire to the legislature in 1959 will be a campaign against waste in state government.

The special committee on waste which studied the problem during the summer and fall will make its report in the first weeks of the session, which starts January 14.

* * *

Members have said it will include reports on the misuse of state-owned automobiles, printing contracts and other areas where they say it is possible to get more economy.

"Sure, we can continue this plus era of our government, but we won't be doing our duty to the taxpayer," said Senator L. Harvey Lodge (R-Drayton Plains), committee chairman.

* * *

LOCAL controversies over the routes of Michigan's new expressways can only serve to delay the construction program, according to Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie.

The U. S. Bureau of Public Roads, however, requires that public hearings be conducted on the routes before Federal matching funds are available to pay up to 90 percent of the total cost.

These hearings, while possibly a handicap to efficiency of the highway's program, do permit the people to express their views and get answers to questions which concern them.

The most damaging controversies from a time standpoint have taken place in the Detroit area, where Mackie already has withdrawn his promise to have a major artery under contract by 1961.
