## Father of Four Crushed to Death

A 28-year-old man, working in a drainage ditch on Haggerty south of Seven Mile road, was crushed to death Wednesday afternoon when a 4000-pound crane bucket fell on him.

Richard McCue of Goodells, was pronounced dead two hours after the accident at St. Mary hospital in Livonia.

According to co-workers for the Telischak construction firm, McCue was laying drainage tile in a ditch near the company's gravel pit when the cable holding the bucket snapped.

Leonard Hawk of Taylor Center, the crane operator, and Howard Duty of Carlton, rehooked the bucket and quickly removed it, but McCue was fatally injured.

The men were laying tile to drain off excess water from the pit property. The crane was used to lift the tile into the ditch.

McCue, father of four children, had worked for the Telischak firm since it was incorporated last April. Michael Telischak, 41238 Llewellyn, Novi, is the owner.

She decided to do something to help.

She called the convalescent hospital in Farmington and asked if she could give the children presents at Christmastime.

Since that day, Mrs. Chabut has been a busy woman. This Christmas she will have directed a project that will provide presents and clothes for 150 children at Maybury sanatorium.

The job isn't hers alone, however. "I have generous 'Santas' from all over the area," she points out.

It works like this. Mrs. Chabut collects the Santa Claus letters from all the children at Maybury sanatorium and distributes the letters to persons who want to help.

"I never urge people to give — I don't have to. Actually, I have a waiting list of Santas now and most of the time they want to remain anonymous. They enjoy this very much and they constantly ask if there isn't something 'special' they can give," Mrs. Chabut said.

One of her 'standby Santas' who wanted to give something extra contributed a television set several years ago. Since then two more TV sets have been given.

"I have to watch my Santas — they are too generous." Many of the packages will be jammed full of extras." She admitted that sometimes she and Nurse Ida Blucher, supervisor of the children's hospital, save these extras for birthdays and new arrivals at the hospital to cheer them up.

Right now Mrs. Chabut has Santas answering letters from Detroit, Plymouth, Holly, Grosse Pointe, Farmington and Northville. The Northville Rotary club takes 40 letters as an annual project for the club.

All the packages have now been collected and will be distributed by the real Santa Claus Christmas morning. Santa will visit each child in their beds, leave the present they want most and probably see to it that a new set or two of pajamas is included.

In 13 years Mrs. Chabut and her Santas have made more than a thousand youngsters happy and helped them to forget their loneliness and confinement.

Tuesday, Dr. W. L. Howard, superintendent of Maybury, expressed appreciation for her volunteer efforts by presenting her with a pin naming her "Volunteer of the Week". The award was made at the Rotary club meeting.



## Area Churches To Celebrate Birth of Christ

The Christmas story will be heard again in Northville and Novi churches is week, as local congregations take part in programs of worship and song.

Christmas week activities began Sunday at Northville First United Presbyterian church with performance of a Christmas pageant with the Harmony and children's choirs.

Christmas Eve a candlelight service, accompanied by the Presbyterian Chancel choir and English bellringers, will be held from 11 p.m. to midnight, Rev. John O. Taxis announced.

Sunday, Christmastide vespers and a Christmas cantata will be held at 4 p.m. The cantata, "The Story of Bethlehem", written and arranged by the late Robert Williams, will be directed by his son, the church choir director, William Williams, and sung by the combined choirs of the Palmer Park Presbyterian church and Chancel choir with the English bellringers.

A Christmas Eve service will also be held from 7-8 p.m. at the Northville First Methodist church.

Christmas carols will be sung by the congregation, said Pastor Paul Cargo, and a special musical program, including performance by the children's choirs, will be presented.

The offering will go to the Methodist Children's Village in Redford.

Last Sunday, Christmas programs were held by the junior department of the Sunday school and the junior church. At worship the Sanctuary choir performed the Bach cantata, "For Us a Child is Born".

Tuesday, the Northville First Baptist Sunday school presented a Christmas musical program. Pastor Peter Nieuwkoop delivered his annual Christmas message Sunday.

Although no Christmas day or Christmas Eve services are being planned by Salem Federated church, Rev. Richard Burgess announced the annual Christmas worship program, accompanied by the youth and adult choirs, was held Sunday evening.

Young people of Congrega-

tional Christian church, assisted by Rev. Gerald Shearon, presented a Christmas program Sunday evening.

A Christmas Eve service will be held at 6:30 Thursday evening at St. Paul's Lutheran church. The program will be presented by the Sunday school children.

## Officials Welcome News of State Funds

City, school and township officials were breathing easier this week after learning that past due payments from the state were, in part at least, on their way.

Sale of the Veterans Trust Fund bonds brought assurance that some 24.6 million dollars would be allotted to schools, two million dollars to local governments and \$900,000 in race track revenues would be returned.

In dollars and cents the city will benefit most from the break in the state's financial log-jam.

Announcement that \$900,000 in race track revenues means that Northville will be paid the full \$71,000 due for harness racing at Northville Downs last season. Livonia and Hazel Park have approximately \$400,000 each in race revenue coming from the state.

While the city's financial situation has not been "critical", City Manager John Robertson told the council Monday night that by February it might be necessary to borrow money.

The delinquent funds also made budget planning for next year difficult. The council had decided Monday night, if race revenues were not paid out of the Veterans Trust bonds, to make a direct appeal to the governor for the earmarked money.

## Police Apprehend DeHoCo Escapee

A 20-year-old escapee from the Detroit House of Correction is back in jail today because his clothes looked peculiar to Novi police.

Walter H. Dzielski of Hamtramck was apprehended late Monday night while hitch hiking along Grand River near the drug store.

Police Chief Lee BeGole and Patrolman Richard Noble noticed Dzielski while they were checking store doors. The policemen stopped to question the hitchhiker after BeGole saw the man's clothing. "They looked like something out of DeHoCo," the chief said.

Dzielski had no identification and could give no satisfactory explanation as to where he had been and where he was going so the officers took him to the station.

BeGole then telephoned DeHoCo and learned Dzielski, convicted of breaking and entering, had turned up missing at a head count a few hours before he was picked up. Apparently, he simply walked away from the prison, police said.

Presbyterian students will also attend the fifth annual college brunch originated by the Rev. and Mrs. John O. Taxis, to be held Tuesday at the Manse.

## Series of Costly Pranks Committed by Vandals

Teenage vandals are thought responsible for a number of costly pranks reported here recently said Northville Police Chief Eugene King.

Saturday night vandals scrawled "PHS" with blue paint and ink on three outside doors of Northville high school. Hinge pins were pulled from a fourth door, King said.

Fire hydrants have also been found turned on by pranksters, King said, and complaints received from residents whose outside Christmas home decorations have been stolen or destroyed.

King declared that persons caught in acts of vandalism will be prosecuted.

## Plan Joint Meeting To Study Zoning

A joint meeting between the city council, planning commission and board of appeals was requested Monday night by Mayor A. Malcolm Allen to study the newly proposed zoning ordinance.

The meeting will be held January 12.

The ordinance, drafted by the planners, provides numerous revisions to the city's present 10-year-old ordinance. Many revisions have been questioned by the council and area developers.

## Nowicki Appeals Dismissal Action

A hearing to air the circumstances surrounding the dismissal of Police Officer Roman Nowicki was called for Tuesday night by the city council at its regular meeting Monday evening.

(Because The Record went to press early this week results of the hearing cannot be published until next week's edition).

Nowicki requested the hearing in a letter to the council as provided under regulations governing dismissal of city employees.

Action dismissing the six-year veteran of the Northville force came about as a result of a series of incidents involving Nowicki and Police Chief Eugene King (reported in last week's Record) in which King charged Nowicki with insubordination. King's recommendation of dismissal was upheld by the city manager.

Officer Nowicki will be permitted to state his position before the five-member city council, while Chief King and City Manager John Robertson will be asked to give reasons for their action. Presumably, some witnesses will also be called.

## Running Dog Pack Kills 25 Chickens And Two Turkeys

A dog pack is suspected of killing 25 chickens and two turkeys early Saturday morning in a coop at 23777 Novi road near Ten Mile road.

The owner of the chickens, Herbert Hellwege, told Novi police he discovered the dead chickens when he went to the coop to feed them Saturday.

He said he did not see the dogs enter the coop, but said his wife saw a pack of dogs running near their home the previous day.

Oakland County Dog Warden Al Cornell shot two dogs running in a pack near the area Sunday after attempts to trap them proved futile. Another dog, also running in a pack, was shot in the Walled Lake area of the village.

The dogs apparently entered the coop through a small entrance hole in the rear of the building and killed the chickens and turkeys inside. Several escaped injury. Three which were badly mutilated had to be destroyed.

Justice of the Peace Robert K. Anderson must investigate the premises to verify the destruction and fix the financial loss. Under the law the county must then reimburse Hellwege for his loss.

## Try These Holiday Treats!

### Bourbon Cheese Balls

- 2 packages (3 ounces) cream cheese
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons bourbon
- Finely crushed cheese crackers

Cream cheese until fluffy. Blend in salt and bourbon. Chill at least 1 hour. Shape into tiny balls with butter paddles. (If using hands, cool by plunging them into ice water to avoid softening cheese while shaping). Roll balls in crushed crackers. Chill until serving time. Yield: 24 balls.

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### Broiled Stuffed Mushrooms

- 1 pint fresh mushrooms
- 1 package (3 ounces) cream cheese
- 1 tablespoon mayonnaise
- 2 tbs. finely chopped dried beef
- 1 tbs. minced green onion tops
- ¼ tsp. hot pepper sauce

Wash and remove stems of mushrooms. Set on absorbent paper to drain. Cream cheese until fluffy. Blend in mayonnaise, dried beef, onion and pepper sauce. Fill caps of mushrooms with cheese mixture and broil until bubbly. Serve immediately.

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### Mushroom Dip

- 1 package (3 ounce) cream cheese
- 1-4-ounce can mushroom pieces and stems, minced
- 1 teaspoon scraped onion
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- 4 drops Tabasco
- 1 cup dairy sour cream
- 2 tablespoons mayonnaise
- 3 tablespoons dry sherry

Mash cream cheese with mushroom pieces. Blend in next six ingredients until thoroughly mixed. Gradually add 1 cup dairy sour cream. Yield: about 2 cups.

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### Turkey Supreme

- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1 cup milk
- 1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup
- 2 tablespoons sherry
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- 2 cups coarsely diced cooked turkey
- 1 4-ounce can mushrooms

Melt butter in saucepan. Stir in flour. Add milk at once. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until thick and smooth. Blend in soup, sherry, salt and pepper. Then add turkey and mushrooms and heat thoroughly. Serve over hot buttered noodles. Yield: 4-6 servings.

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### Ways with Green Vegetables

- Serve with lemon butter.
- Serve with Hollandaise sauce.
- Sprinkle with butter and chop ped toasted almonds.
- Toss with melted butter combined with mustard sauce for meat.
- Top with cheese sauce and buttered crumbs.
- Toss with butter seasoned with slivers of sauteed garlic.
- Serve chilled in a salad, topped with a tart dressing.
- Cook with chopped onion, bay leaf and a few whole cloves.
- Serve with a rich celery sauce and sprinkle with grated nutmeg.
- Top with butter or a sauce and sprinkle with crisp chopped bacon.
- Top with chili sauce, sprinkle generously with grated cheese and brown under the broiler.
- Top with sour cream and sautéed fresh mushrooms.

### Cinnamon Applesauce Salad

- 2 packages lemon-flavored gelatin
- ½ cup red cinnamon candies
- 2 cups boiling water
- 2 cups unsweetened applesauce
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- ½ cup broken walnuts
- 2 packages (3 ounces) cream cheese, softened
- ¼ cup milk or light cream
- 2 tablespoons salad dressing

Dissolve gelatin and candy in boiling water. Stir in applesauce, lemon juice. Chill till partially set. Stir in nuts. Pour into 8x8x2 inch pan. Blend remaining ingredients. Spoon on gelatin; swirl through salad to marble. Chill firm. Cut in 9 squares.

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### Quick Tricks with Eggnog

- Freeze cubes of dairy eggnog on sticks in the ice cube tray.
- Serve dairy eggnog as a sauce over holiday puddings.
- Top stewed prunes, peaches or apricots with creamy eggnog.
- Serve scoops of frozen dairy eggnog in a punch bowl or eggnog.

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### Tapioca Eggnog Cream

- 1 egg white
- 1 egg yolk
- 2 cups commercially prepared eggnog
- 2 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon rum or brandy flavoring

Beat egg white until stiff. Combine and beat yolk and eggnog. Add tapioca and salt. Stir to blend and cook over moderate heat, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to a boil. Remove from heat and stir in flavoring. Pour a little of the hot mixture over the beaten egg white and blend well with beater. Add rest of hot mixture and beat for about 15 seconds to blend. Pour into serving dishes. Chill. Yield: 4 servings.

## Our Lady of Providence, A Home for Exceptional Girls

What is Our Lady of Providence school?

The modern colonial style main building and dormitory set among the farms and wooded fields of Beck road — residence for 110 mentally retarded children — is, in the words of their teachers, "a school for exceptional girls."

To the girls themselves who range in ages from 6 to 16, it is also a small world where they are made to feel at home as they cannot in the world of "usual" people.

Here under the trained direction of Sisters of the Congregation of Daughters of St. Mary of Providence, they are helped to develop their abilities to the fullest.

Sisters of this congregation, now numbering 1,500 in Europe and the United States, have been engaged in the care and training of mentally handicapped girls for over 70 years. Director of the Northville home is Sister Valentine.

The school, a relative newcomer to Northville, opened in 1957 under the Detroit Archdiocesan leadership of the late Edward Cardinal Mooney, in answer to a great need in this area in Michigan and throughout the country.

Demand has always far exceeded supply.

As a result, applicants are chosen on the basis of pressing economic or psychological need, and admission is not limited to Catholic children, says school principal, Sister Mary Catherine.

Most of the students reside at the school, but a few day school pupils also attend.

The education program is designed for both the educable and trainable, Sister said.

Seven classroom groups and one older girls' vocational training group provide for educational and habit training according to levels of ability.


Class loads average between 12 and 15.

The school groups are divided into a readiness group, primary groups, intermediate groups, and vocational training groups.


Through association with other children, and learning of a daily routine, children between six and ten are taught to overcome some of their hyperactivity and in the readiness group are prepared for more formal instruction.

Lessons at this level include development of good health habits, feeding and dressing, simple household tasks, coloring, cutting, working with clay, paints and pegs, listening to music, learning songs, and learning rhythmic dances. # All-Stars Host Professionals Here Monday

Plenty of laughs and sizzling cage tactics will be on tap here Monday night when the hilarious Harlem Magicians invade the new high school gymnasium. The Magicians, led by player-coach Marques Haynes, basketball's greatest dribbler, will be in town to play Northville's own All-Star cagers beginning at 8 p.m.

An added attraction is planned for fans who attend the Monday night game. "Oldtimers" from the north and south sides of town will clash in a red hot cage tilt beginning at 7 p.m. Dick Kay, American school principal, and Al Jones, athletic director, will captain the two teams. Jones, confident of his team's victory, has challenged opponents at a free-throwing contest at the half.

Now in their seventh year of operation, the Magicians are noted for their finesse on the cage floor, for their shooting accuracy, and for their showmanship. Playing all corners in 44 states, Mexico and Canada last season, they won 216 games and lost three.

Also included in the lineup are 6' 6" Eugene Johnson from Wiley college; 6' 7 1/2" Paul Martin; 6' 8" Arthur Smith from Paul Quinn college, and 6' 6" James Satterwhite from Tennessee State university.

The Magicians were formed following a contract dispute between Haynes and the Harlem Globetrotters. Haynes decided to form a team of his own. Since that time several of the Globetrotters have followed him.

The Magicians are everything the name implies; they are court jesters. In everyone of their games they have had fans in stitches with screwball antics, broad comedy bits, and superb ball handling.

Haynes dazzles audiences and opponents, too, as he dribbles sitting, kneeling, lying and crawling on the floor. He is no clown, though, when it comes to pouring points through the hoop. He is among the most prolific point makers in professional ball.

Sam Josh and Marques are probably the number one box office attractions in professional basketball today. Last year they attracted more than 750,000 fans to a schedule of 219 games.

Tickets for the game cost \$1 for adults, 75-cents for students. They may be purchased from boy scouts or at the door. Proceeds from the game will be used by the city-township recreation department to repair the scout hall, which is used by the department.

# Barons Chip Icy Mustangs In 51-38 Tilt

Some days you can't make a nickle — or a basket.

Northville's varsity quintet found this the case last Friday night as the Barons of Bloomfield Hills clamped a lid over the Mustangs' net and walked away with an easy 51-38 victory.

The loss dropped the Mustangs to a three-way tie for third place and pushed the Barons into a three-way tie for second in the Wayne-Oakland county league. Northville now has won one game in three league starts.

The humiliating defeat at Bloomfield Hills was tempered somewhat the following night as Northville came back to whip Farmington, 47-41, in a non-league contest.

Nevertheless, even this weekend bright spot could not completely erase the memory of Friday's game which was of far more importance to the Mustangs.

After taking an early lead, Northville found it next to impossible to push the ball through the net. The local cagers failed to reach double figures until midway in the second stanza — and then failed to score again before the half.

The Mustangs flipped in 7 points in the first quarter, added only 4 more in the second quarter.

Meanwhile, the Barons melted the ice with 10 points in the first quarter and 18 in the second frame.

Bloomfield Hills was not, although the score might indicate it, particularly outstanding at defense. The Mustangs had little difficulty working the ball to within shooting distance but could not connect on the "long ones or easy ones". They hit only 9 percent of their shots in the first half, 20 percent of their shots throughout the game.

Altogether the Mustangs fired the ball toward the net 70 times, which according to Coach Dutch Van Ingen is pretty good for any high school team. "But you have to make some baskets to win," the coach said.

"Keep on shooting," Van Ingen told his players at the half, "the law of averages says we've got to score on some of them."

The Mustangs came back in the third stanza in a full-court press and completely baffled the Barons in the opening minutes.

Right Guard Roger Atchinson fired four quick two-pointers — and for awhile it looked like the "average law" was on Northville's side. But the Barons called time, reorganized, and then managed to slow up the Northville guns.

Even so, the Mustangs outscored Bloomfield Hills in the final two frames, 15-13 and 12-10. But the first half damage was too great.

The Barons made 19 field goals, 13 free shots, while the Mustangs connected 10 times at the charity line and hit 14 field goals.

Atchinson — the only Northville player to hit double figures — scored 15 points. Fourteen of these points were scored in the last half. Bloomfield Hills players could not match Atchinson's scoring peak, but three of them hit double figures.

As was the case in the victory here over defending champion Brighton, Northville swept to victory over Farmington via the free throw line.

When the game ended, Northville had scored 25 charity shots and 11 field goals.

The two teams were tied at the end of the first stanza 13-13. Farmington was out front 25-24 at the half. Northville grabbed a 38-31 lead at the three-quarter mark and then hung on to the lead as Farmington edged the Mustangs in the final quarter, 10-9.

Center Wade Deal captured scoring laurels for Northville with 15 points. Teammate Jim Patterson scored 14 points.

With the next game two weeks away (West Bloomfield on January 8), Coach Van Ingen promises plenty of practice for his cagers. "If the fellows continue to work," he said, "we should be able to win at West Bloomfield."

In other league action last week end, league leading Clarenceville topped Holly 56-45, Brighton swamped West Bloomfield 73-54, and Clarkston beat Milford, 38-32.







The old school building at Novi is now known as the community hall. Some of the partitions have been removed and it soon will be ready for games and good times.



### Vets Reminded To Pay Insurance Premiums on Time

Veterans — not the Veterans Administration — are responsible for paying their insurance premiums on time, Lloyd H. Jameson, manager of the VA Regional Office in Detroit, warned today.

However, Jameson explained that the VA does try to assist the policyholders paying monthly premiums by sending them a packet of 12 cards annually. Veterans paying quarterly or semi-annually also receive notices which should be submitted with their payments.

Changes of address should be reported to the VA but even then, it is the veteran's responsibility to make any payments which is due, Jameson said.

Likewise, if the veteran fails to receive his premium notice, he should make any payment which is due, furnishing his name, address and policy number.

VA said that many veterans mark their calendars a year ahead to remind them to make payments on time.

Somewhere in Michigan there are 20 or 30 families who will suffer tragedy instead of joy on Christmas.

A member of their family will die in a traffic accident during the course of the 78 hours from midnight Christmas Eve until midnight Sunday.

Police departments throughout the state are conducting an all-out campaign to give the residents of Michigan the best Christmas present possible — the gift of life itself.

So far there have been 51 more traffic deaths in Michigan in the first 11 months of 1959 than in the same period in 1958. Last year there were 1,375 deaths — and December is the most deadly month on the traffic death calendar!

Police traffic experts know that traffic law violations are the cause of many unnecessary accidents. They are certain that if drivers will obey all traffic laws throughout the Christmas holidays, the state can wrap up the biggest, safest Christmas on record.

Last year — during the holiday period — Michigan averaged one death every three hours. Averages have a way of going up — unless we earnestly try to bring them down.

And when you can consider that one of the figures making up these averages might be the life of a loved one, or even yourself, you realize how worthwhile your efforts can be.

## Citizens Take Action

VOICES OF an aroused citizenry are echoing Michigan's perils as state government ends a year of crisis.

The Michigan Chamber of Commerce, the Citizens for Michigan movement, the League of Women Voters, the Junior Chamber of Commerce, and organized labor have mobilized to attack Michigan's problems on varied fronts.

This linking of citizens to fill the gap of voter apathy may be the best thing that has happened to Michigan since the Mackinac Bridge filled a seven-mile gap by linking the state's two peninsulas.

The Michigan Chamber of Commerce hopes to give businessmen a vehicle for political expression in 1960 and years to come. But of more importance to the rest of the state, the chamber aims to become an organization that can tell businessmen in other states — in a language they understand — that it's great to live and work in Michigan.

Labor and business are in a joint nonpartisan campaign for better government through the Citizens for Michigan movement. Spurred to action by blunders of government in 1959, this movement will come up with recommendations for corrective effort in 1960.

The enthusiasm of active men and women is sparking a drive by the League of Women Voters and the Junior Chamber of Commerce for a new constitution. Even if they fail to get the 300,000 signatures needed to call for a referendum on holding of a Constitutional Convention, they will be stirring up citizen interest in government.

Supreme Court action started by the AFL-CIO to force reapportionment of senate districts has encouraged citizens in urban areas and aroused those in rural areas.

Time is needed before impact of the Chamber of Commerce and Citizens for Michigan will be felt.

It will be 1962 before a new constitution will be ready for ratification by voters if the Junior Chamber and the League succeed.

Developments could come fast, however, in the reapportionment drive started by state AFL-CIO President August Scholle. He wants the court to ban state senatorial elections based on present districts "until equal voting rights are restored to all citizens."

REAPPORTIONMENT has been painted as something favored by Democrats and opposed by Republicans.

It's a complicated political question. In some cases it crosses party lines.

The struggle for legislative power is between big cities and suburbs on one side and rural areas and isolated population centers on the other.

Republicans opposing reapportionment will be at odds with their colleagues in Oakland county, which in 1960 would elect one senator to represent 700,000 people. One senator from the 32nd district in the western Upper Peninsula would represent 49,000 under the present apportionment.

Democrats in that U.P. cannot be counted upon to support a drive that would give them less of a voice in Lansing. They can be expected to join outstate Republicans in contending geographical interests, as well as population interests, must be considered in Lansing as they are in Washington.

Struggles for reapportionment are not unique with Michigan.

Florida, California, Maryland, Missouri, Minnesota and Tennessee are among the states where the issue is under heated discussion.

The arguments are the same everywhere: Cities claim they are hamstrung. Outstate areas say they need the same protections granted smaller states in the U.S. Senate.

CONSTITUTIONAL revision, per se, provokes less argument than reapportionment. The rub comes on how delegates should be selected. Who gets the biggest voice at the constitutional convention — the cities or the rural areas?

Both parties say there is a need for constitutional revision. But Democrats generally are opposed to the present method of selecting delegates by senate districts, at last under the present apportionment.

Candidates for governor in 1960 will be in the thick of the constitutional revision issue.

If, as expected, Paul D. Bagwell is the Republican candidate again, he won't have to hire a speech writer. He can pull out the same speeches he used during the 1958 campaign when there wasn't too much interest in the issue.

Bagwell campaigned in a 1908 model car to dramatize the need for revision of the document that had its major overhaul in 1908.

A cumbersome and outworn constitution has been blamed by leaders of both parties for much of Michigan's financial troubles today.

"We could probably have managed our cash shortage with a fraction of the damage actually suffered, except for the shackles placed on us by the constitution in handling the state's funds," said Governor Williams.

## Going into Business?

Babson Park, Mass. — Young people often ask me whether they should start a business of their own. Of course, not everyone is suited to running a business. But success can be attained by those who will first learn the know-how of the type of business they would like to start, or else have as partners those who do.

## Nations Depend on Independently Owned Business

In today's rapidly changing world, many young people are scared away from starting or buying a business by the risks involved. Inflation, high taxes, and necessarily small initial returns lead them to choose the so-called "security" offered by a supposed permanent position with some large company. Unfortunately, we have made a fetish of such "security" in this country. Many of our young people think it is smarter to achieve "job security" than to forego this for the opportunity to own their own business.

So great has become our preoccupation with big business that we have lost sight of the self-controlled business's contribution to the growth and prosperity of our nation. Before World War I, we were a land of small property and business owners believing in property rights as well as human rights. Small business, though not popular in recent years, is still one of the bulwarks of our nation which we should strive to strengthen and encourage.

## Need for Training

Don't go directly from school or college to start or buy a new business. Few of those who act so rashly achieve success. Some fail, losing not only their money and effort, but also, often, their confidence in themselves. Young people — either men or women — who feel they should like to start a small business of their own should first work for at least two years in a line similar to the one which they wish to enter or else buy control of an established business.

One should be well prepared to take the risks involved in business ownership. Study the market for your product or service by subscribing to a trade magazine in the line which you wish to enter. Competition during the next few years may be sharper than it is now for every business. I even predict that there will be a large number of new small business failures during the 60's. But remember that usually only the inefficient and the inept are crowded out. Better buy control of

some existing successful business. Spur to Incentive


I believe in small businesses, not because I think the future for them will be an easy one, but because I realize we need small business if our nation is to grow and prosper in the American tradition. Business ownership spurs incentive and develops character. It will also help make our people more conscious of our heritage of liberty. Therefore, when buying control of a business it may be well always to have a number of small minority stockholders.

The encouragement of small business enterprise is one of the best ways to check the growing trend toward more government control. As the number of self-owned businessmen increases and as they assume more responsibility in civic and government affairs, the spread of the federal bureaucracy will be slowed.

## Government Aid to Small Business

The Federal Department of Commerce and many state and local government agencies offer help to the small businessman. Not long ago three major bills favoring small business passed Congress and were signed by the President. These provided long-needed tax relief for small business. Another suggestion is to join the National Small Business Men's association, 163 North Union street, Akron, Ohio.

Under the Small Business Investment Act, the federal government also sponsors investment companies whose primary purpose is to provide venture capital for small and expanding businesses. I strongly urge those who start or buy their own businesses to make good use of these government helps.
