Close License Office After Litsenberger Suffers Concussion

A concussion suffered last Thursday by John Litsenberger, manager of the Northville branch of the secretary of state's license bureau, has resulted in the temporary closing of the local office.

Litsenberger was found at approximately 10:45 a.m. lying face down in his office by Mrs. Ronald Bullard and Frank Heath, customers who had just entered the office.

Police were quickly summoned and Litsenberger was taken to Community General hospital.

Dr. L. W. Snow attended Litsenberger and reported that he had apparently suffered a concussion. Because Litsenberger was in a state of shock and could not give an account of what had happened, police considered the possibility of robbery.

This week, however, Gordon Trave, assistant secretary of state, reported that an audit had been completed and that the office records are in order. "As far as we are concerned, there is no shortage of money," Trave stated.

He also emphasized the fact that the office would be re-opened when Litsenberger is able to work. Meanwhile, persons wishing to obtain license plates have been instructed to use the Plymouth branch at 181 West Liberty.

Dr. Snow reported that Litsenberger had a bruise "high on the right side of his forehead". It appeared as though he might have been struck, the doctor stated, but it is also possible that he could have fainted and fell, striking his head.

Litsenberger, who is scheduled to be released this week, still cannot recall clearly what happened, Dr. Snow stated.

This Sunday at 8 p.m. baccalaureate services will be conducted in the auditorium with the address being given by the Rev. John O. Taxis, pastor of the First Presbyterian church. Invocation and the benediction will be offered by the Rev. Paul Cargo of the First Methodist church.

Seniors will take their final exams today and Friday, while undergraduate high school students will have final examinations Tuesday and Wednesday.

Classes will close for all public school students on Wednesday. Teachers will complete their records and mail out report cards Friday, the final day for faculty members.

The commencement address at next Thursday's graduation exercises will be made by Dr. John J. Lee, professor and chairman of the department of special education and vocational rehabilitation at Wayne State university.

Dr. Lee's topic will be "Great Discoveries".

The Wayne State university professor has a background in education which includes experience at every school level. He attended Western Michigan college, received an AB and MA from the University of Michigan and his PhD from Ohio State university. He also holds honorary LL.D. degrees from Eastern Michigan and Western Michigan universities.

Dr. Lee began his career in education as a teacher in a rural school in Van Buren county. Later he served as a high school principal, superintendent of schools, inspector for the state department of public instruction, state supervisor for special education and civilian vocational rehabilitation, dean of the graduate school for Wayne State university and finally, his present position.

A longtime friend of Northville's Superintendent of Schools Russell Amerman, Dr. Lee will be introduced by the local superintendent.

Dr. Lee's address will be preceded by speeches from Edward Proctor, valedictorian, and Raymond Dahl, salutatorian.

Principal E. V. Ellison will present each graduate to Superintendent Amerman for diplomas. The presentation of diplomas will conclude the program which is scheduled to conclude at approximately 9:45.

The invocation and benediction will be given by the Rev. B. J. Pankow, pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran church.

From 7:30 p.m. until 8 p.m. the high school band will provide music. Principal Ellison stated that there will be no tickets or reserved seats for the exercises and that the public is invited to attend.

Expect Record School Vote Monday

Community Building Sale 13 Candidates on Ballot

Northville school district voters will go to the polls Monday to elect four board of education members and decide what governmental unit will own the Community Building.

Thirteen candidates — the biggest field ever to run in a local school election — are competing for the four seats. Seven are seeking the two three-year terms, while six hopefuls are running for two four-year terms.

A change in the state law making it necessary for all fourth class school districts with a full 12 grade system to have seven members on the board of education is responsible for the number of openings.

The four successful candidates will join William Crump, Donald Lawrence and Robert Shafer on the board. President Nelson C. Schrader is not seeking re-election.

Dr. Waldo Johnson, board treasurer, is the only incumbent candidate. He is running for a four year term.

The candidates are:

Three Year Term
Edward F. Angove, Wilfred C. Becker, John P. Callaghan, Dr. J. K. Eastland, Charles A. Smith, Wilson D. Tyler and Mrs. George W. Weiss.

Four Year Term
Francis P. Gazlay, George F. Hollinger, Paul R. Hunt, Dr. Waldo T. Johnson, James F. Kipfer and Mrs. Edmund Yerkes.

Only registered voters of the school district who are taxpayers, or their husband or wife, can vote on the proposal to purchase the Community Building.

The proposition will ask the voter for permission to use proceeds remaining from the 1956 bond issue to purchase the Community Building and land from the city for \$145,000.

Both city council and school board members have unanimously endorsed the proposal and have urged voters in public meetings and in articles appearing in The Record to support the measure.

Currently the building, built in 1954, is owned by the city but leased for \$1.00 per year to the school district.

School administrators and board members have declared that the school system needs the building

for its education program. The city council, facing the realization that new city hall facilities are needed, has looked upon the present lease arrangement as unfavorable.

Rather than take over the building for the city use, the school board and council reached a joint agreement on the sale plan. The building, they reasoned, was better suited by design and location to be a part of the school system.

While the city council has the authority to sell the building without voter permission, the school board must obtain approval of the taxpayers voters within the district to purchase the building.

All school district voters will cast their ballots at the Community Building.

Expecting a record turn-out at the polls school administrators have made arrangements to use city voting machines for the election.

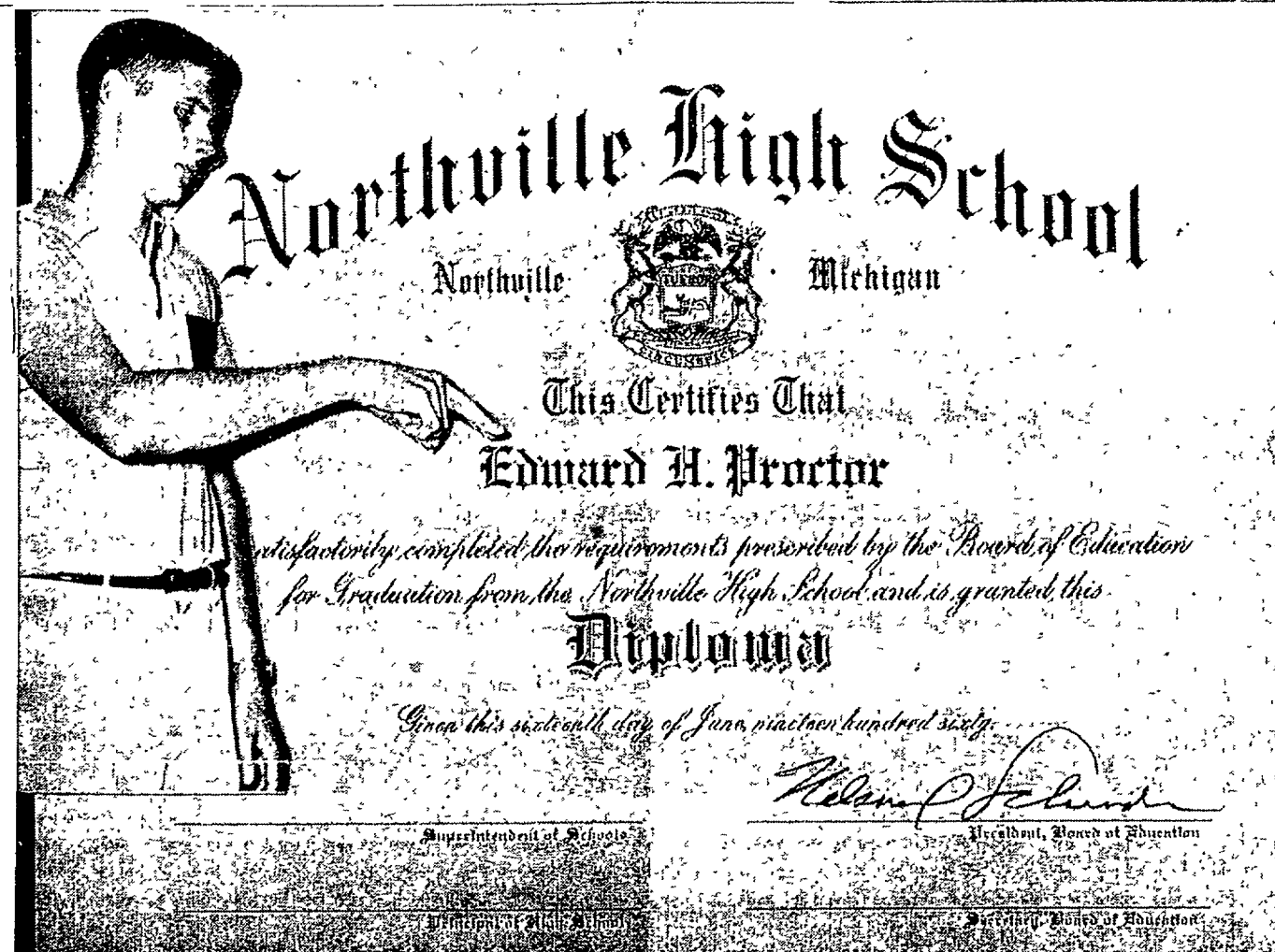
While an exact count of the number of registered voters within the school district is not available, the total exceeds 3,500. In 1959 a four-man race for three board seats drew only 234 ballots.

Polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 8 p.m.

In Novi five candidates will seek two school board vacancies. Two of the five candidates running for the three-year terms are presently members of the Novi board.

The incumbents are Jack Crawford and Dr. Harold Morris. The other candidates are Walter Ambinder, William Dean and John MacBride.

The election will be held Monday at the Novi community building.

City Settles Half of its Zoning

Monday night's public hearing to zone four parcels of land in newly annexed Oakland county areas of the city was 50 percent completed.

Two of the parcels were zoned as residential, while the other two were rejected and another public hearing will be needed to consider new suggestions.

The hearing drew a full house crowd. Interest in the zoning of three parcels of land between Yerkes Estates subdivision (Village Green) and Novi road just north of Baseline has run high with residents of the area and local merchants.

The fourth parcel, located at the northwest corner of Baseline and Taft road where Gerald Taft's construction firm is located, caused less controversy. M-1 zoning as advertised was rejected, however, in a compromise between Taft and the planning commission.

Specifically, the planners are interested in having the corner eventually become residential to blend with the surrounding area. Taft sought to have the corner made manufacturing, rather than "non-conforming" residential. He feared that under non-conforming classification he could not expand or rebuild his business in case of fire, etc.

But M-1 was rejected, just as residential zoning had been at an earlier hearing, when planners suggested a "permissive" residential zoning that allows Taft to continue his operations without limitations within the boundaries of the present site as long as he continues in business. Planners were directed by the city council to prepare this new classification for another public hearing.

In the matter of the parcels next to the subdivision the council had already rejected the planning commission proposal that two of the parcels be zoned M-1 and the third, C-1.

Monday night the hearing was called to zone all three parcels C-2. This is the classification sought by the developers of the subdivision, but opposed by merchants and planners because more commercial area would detract from the central business district.

At the outset it appeared that C-2 zoning would win. A resident of the subdivision, Art Adams, presented a petition signed by 22 homeowners asking that commercial zoning be upheld. In his presentation, Adams said the residents preferred commercial to industrial, but admitted that they would rather have residential (R-3) zoning.

Councilman John Canterbury quickly seized upon Adams' remarks to oppose commercial zoning. He pointed out that the planners had originally suggested R-3 (multiple dwellings) zoning, but that the developers had opposed the recommendation because financing is not available for residential use of the property due to its proximity to the railroad.

Canterbury and Planning Chairman George Zerbel pointed out that they were not convinced the land was not suitable for R-3 development (which also includes clinics, hospitals, professional centers, etc.). Therefore, Canterbury argued, the residents and the planners would be satisfied if the land was zoned residential. He also pointed out that R-3 zoning could be changed if the developers had "something specific, either commercial or industrial for the land."

His arguments won the audience, but not the developers or the entire council. When Canterbury moved to reject all three parcels for C-2, he failed to gain a second to his motion.

Councilman Earl Reed then moved to uphold the C-2 zoning for all three parcels. Councilman Ed Welch quickly seconded this motion, but, somewhat surprisingly, Mayor A.M. Allen joined Councilman Canterbury and Richard Juday in opposition. R-3 Canterbury and Juday have expressed opposition to commercial zoning in the past.

Failing by a 3-2 vote, the mayor then moved to approve C-2 zoning for the southern-most parcel and the measure passed, 4-1 with Canterbury opposing. Canterbury joined the unanimous vote on the middle parcels for C-2, but then moved that the largest parcel, 3.75 acres at the northern end of the property along Novi road) be zoned R-3.

She Takes All Class Honors

St. Paul's Lutheran school will graduate its first, and most certainly smallest, "class" Sunday when Judy Hellwege receives her eighth grade diploma.

Judy, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Hellwege of 23777 Novi road, is the only eighth grader in the year-old parochial school. She will receive her diploma at the 10:30 church service from Martin Strassen, chairman of the board of education.

Closing services will be held for the children of the Lutheran school at 8:30 a.m. tomorrow (Friday) and classrooms will be dismissed for the summer at 10:30 a.m. The school, which had a first-year enrollment of 30 children, held a picnic last Friday.

Harry C. Duerson, Local Businessman, Dies Suddenly

Harry C. Duerson, well known Northville real estate salesman, died suddenly Friday morning after being admitted to St. Mary hospital Thursday.

Duerson, 60, was admitted to the hospital suffering from a kidney ailment, but death was attributed to myocardial infarction, a spasm of the heart muscle.

Funeral services were held at the Dempsey Ebert Funeral home Monday afternoon with the Rev. John O. Taxis officiating. Pallbearers were George Bulterman, Garrett Barry, Orlov Owen, Stanley Schaefer, Ernest Schave and Donald Yerkes. Burial was at Rural Hill cemetery.

Duerson was born on July 20, 1899 in Charlottesville, Virginia to Henry and Adelaide Coleman Duerson. He was married in 1932 to Lillian Roy and moved to Northville in 1937. The Duerson home is at 312 West Main street.

In addition to his wife he is survived by a daughter, Gay Elizabeth Bulterman, who with her husband and infant son had just recently visited Northville. The Bultermans make their home in The Hague, Netherlands but had not yet left the United States when notified of the death. The family returned to Northville for the funeral.

Other survivors include two sisters, Mrs. Arthur S. Crawford of Ashland, Virginia and Mrs. George D. Hudnutt of San Francisco, California.

Owner of Plymouth Furniture Firm, Irving Blunk, Dies

Irving E. Blunk, co-founder of Blunk's, Inc., Plymouth furniture dealers, died Tuesday at the age of 64. He passed away at his home late Tuesday afternoon.

Founded 38 years ago, Blunk's is the oldest furniture outlet in Plymouth. The firm only this week announced that it was closing out its furniture department.

Mr. Blunk was born in Salem on September 29, 1895. He attended Hough school in Canton township and the Plymouth schools.

Before going into the furniture business, Mr. Blunk was a retail milk dealer and a building and cement contractor.

He is survived by his wife, Edna M. Blunk; a brother, Arthur E. Blunk, and several nieces and nephews.

Masonic funeral services will be held at 1 p.m. Friday from the Schrader Funeral home in Plymouth.

Busy 10 Years End for Schrader

Ten years ago this week Nelson C. Schrader received 99 votes for the Northville board of education and led the ticket in a three-man race for the school board.

The same week 68 seniors received their diplomas from Northville high school; a new operating budget of slightly more than \$200,000 was anticipated for the year; there were

308 pupils in the Northville school district; school buses were unheard of, and 33 classrooms served the entire system.

Last Monday evening school board members and administrators interrupted their meeting to express their appreciation to Schrader, now president of the board, for the work he has done during the greatest period of growth in the history of the local school system.

Today Northville has 1,827 students. Five school districts have been annexed during the past 10 years and 49 classrooms added. And next week a class of 130 seniors will be graduated.

A fleet of 10 buses carry students to and from the outlying areas. A modern high school has been constructed along with an elementary and an addition to the new elementary. The old high school has been remodeled and converted into a junior high school.

Meanwhile, the operating budget has been more than tripled to provide the services and facilities for the community's biggest business.

A further comparison that indicates the importance and expanded interest in the school system is the fact that Monday, 13 candidates will compete for four openings on the school board.

But Schrader's name will not be on the ballot.

"Ten years is long for anyone on the school board. It's a job for all citizens and now I believe it's someone else's turn," he stated.

Schrader said that being a member of the school board "has been an education". In looking back he

points to the cooperation and hard work of lay committees as probably of his outstanding recollection.

"Their efforts made our board work easier. I'd say about 300 people have worked very hard to help the board and administrators improve our school facilities and curriculum," Schrader pointed out.

Schrader points out that the entire program that his board organized has been completed — with but one exception.

"I had hoped the purchase of the Community Building would have been completed by now. It would be a serious set-back to our school system if the voters didn't approve its purchase Monday," he added.

During his 10-year board membership Schrader has been both president and vice president. He is an acknowledged advocate of physical education, having been a varsity tackle at Michigan State and a participant in the Orange Bowl.

"I can't imagine not developing a sound body to go with a sound mind," the six-foot, 200-pound Schrader emphasized. "What kind of people will we have if we don't provide adequate physical education for our children — they won't have the energy to walk."

The owner of Schrader's Home Furnishings, the retiring board president is married and lives at 116 Orchard drive. The Schraders have two children, Sarah — about to become a high school senior — and Nelson, a freshman at Michigan State university. And like his father, young Nelson is a towering tackle who seems likely to become a member of the varsity football squad as a sophomore.

The City Council believes that there is a present and future need of the school system for the community building and the school should be given an opportunity to purchase this structure.

11. Have the City Council and the School Board made any recommendations?

The two elected bodies made up of ten elected officials from our community have unanimously gone on record in favor of the sale of the Community Building to the School District. This is not a hasty decision since the school and the City have had this subject under discussion for over three years.

If Northville city and township residents don't turn out for the August 2 primary election in record numbers there will be some mighty unhappy seventh graders.

But right now, Northville seventh graders have room only for optimism in their campaign to get an "idealistic 100 percent registration" of Northville voters.

Under the guidance of their teacher, Michael Abbott, and with the cooperation of both the Democratic and Republican clubs, the students, who call themselves the "Voters of Tomorrow Encourage Registration" committee, have launched a drive to spur citizens to register.

Every resident in the Northville area with a Feldbrook telephone exchange will be called before the July 5 registration deadline.

In addition to telephoning all area residents, the students have:

- given stacks of pamphlets to both the A&P and Kroger stores for distribution to all customers.
- had newsboys place pamphlets in their newspapers
- placed pamphlets in many

downtown stores under signs labeled "Juicy Gossip" to ensure readership.

— promoted an elementary grade contest to determine which class has the most registered parents, with the winning class to receive a box of candy.

In connection with the campaign, Manufacturers National Bank has donated its facilities to the township for registration purposes on Friday, June 17. The students expect many township residents to register on that day since the bank facilities make a more convenient central location. On all other days, township registration will be handled at the township hall, 1-5 p.m., and after hours by appointment.

City residents may register daily at the city hall, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. The V.O.T.E.R. student committee, which meets nightly after school to coordinate and analyze its activities, was organized at the suggestion of Mrs. C. E. Woodruff, president of the Northville Democratic club. Mrs. Rita Northup, president of the Greater Northville Republican

club; Mrs. William Milne and Mrs. George Bennett, also have given their enthusiastic support and encouragement.

Jerry LaRoque is chairman of the student group.

In summing up the project, Abbott said:

"Even if the students don't get one new registration, their efforts will have been worthwhile. It will be a vivid lesson in citizenship and its responsibilities.

It also will be helpful in such things as reading and speech (the students practiced their telephone speeches on a tape recorder for two days and wrote their message to make the greatest impact.)"

Hungry Borer Becomes Nuisance

A hungry leaf borer is attacking area maple trees in "serious proportions this spring," according to John Miller, owner of Green Ridge Nursery.

The "maple leaf borer" has been eating away in the Northville area for four years, but this is the first year he has become a nuisance. The nursery owner has received numerous calls this spring.

According to Miller, the tiny borer drills into the stem, chews off the leaf and then, his hunger satisfied, drops to the ground. The insect then bores into the ground where he waits until next spring for another meal. He does not stay around in the summer months.

The most effective method of eliminating him is to treat the soil beneath the tree with an insecticide. However, in heavily wooded areas, spraying is necessary, Miller said.

Want a Summer Vacation Home? Build Your Own for Only \$1500

If you have a lot at the beach, up a lazy stream, or in the mountains, you can build a vacation home for as little as \$1,500.

Last year 75,000 American families built second houses, and, in 1960, housing experts say 100,000 will be built. They'll range from a modest shanty to a \$100,000 second home mansion.

But for the ordinary U.S. family, the second home or vacation spot must be inexpensive but attractive. It must be big enough to shelter both family and guests. It needs only minimum plumbing and such conveniences. It must be livable so all the family will look forward to spending week ends, vacations and summers there.

What is the basic minimum structure recommended for a second home? Floor space of 24 by 30 feet is adequate for a starter summer home. The simple A-frame design is probably one of the least expensive to build.

The A-frame is low cost because the roof and side walls are one. Sturdy timbers either 2x8 or 2x10 inches and 24 feet long and spaced at four-foot intervals form the frame of this style house. Doubling permits nailing shorter pieces to get desired length. The timbers are bolted at the top to form an A and the lower ends are nailed or bolted to the floor platform, which should be constructed as any joist floor system is built. Joists can be at four-foot intervals with two-inch decking for floor.

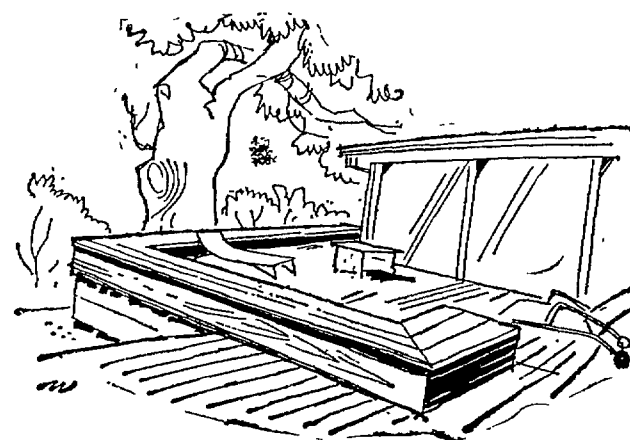
End frames can also be 2x8 and four-foot spacing is adequate. To insure a sturdy structure which will withstand wind and stress, ordinary fir shiplap should be nailed to the frame for sheathing. Shingles or shakes can be nailed directly to the sheathing, or fir or western red cedar bevel siding can be used. The slope is sufficient to permit adequate runoff of rain water.

This simple A-frame design allows for wide variation. You can have one or both ends of the house open, using large areas of glass. You can install windows between the framing members of the roof-wall to face the best view of ocean, stream or mountain.

To get added mileage, you can add a simple sleeping deck inside the cabin seven feet high, reached by a retractable ladder. This will give you full use of the main floor for living, cooking, eating and lounging. The sleeping deck also serves as extra bracing for the cabin.

The floor space can be greatly expanded by extending it to make an outdoor deck. These are easy to build. On a sturdy frame you can apply deck boards of 2x4 fir spaced to allow rain runoff. These need not be stained or painted for they weather to a lovely silvery grey

color. This is an easy summer home to build and one which any family handy man can handle with no trouble. It might be smart to have a carpenter frame the house, and the family could do all the nailing of flooring, sheathing, shingles or siding. Care should be taken to properly flash the roof peak to prevent leaks. Shower and bath can be installed in a small adjoining room. There need not be any partitions in this type of cabin, excepting possibly a curtain which could be drawn to provide a dressing room.



Place in the Sun

Family can literally move outdoors during warm summer months when the living room has been extended outside in the form of a lovely sun deck. 2x4s used for the decking here, are set on stout framework of 2x12 fir beams and 4x4 posts. Deck railing, designed in the form of a low, wide seating bench, is attractive. No stain or paint is needed for deck boards, which should be spaced slightly to allow rain drainage.

House Going Up In Single Day!

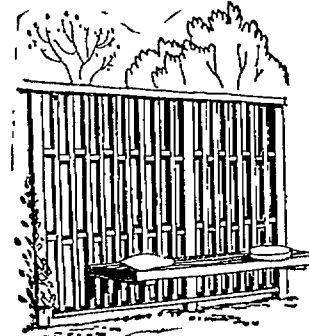
Builders and interested residents are invited to watch the operation which will get underway at 8 a.m.

The designs for the component parts were developed by the Lumber Dealers Research Council of Washington, D.C., and come in a variety of home plans.

The system has approval of the Federal Housing Administration, Novels' officials point out.

The Lu-Re-Co system differs from prefabrication in that it can be used to build any number of house designs, while in prefabrication one buys a particular "packaged house" from a manufacturer.

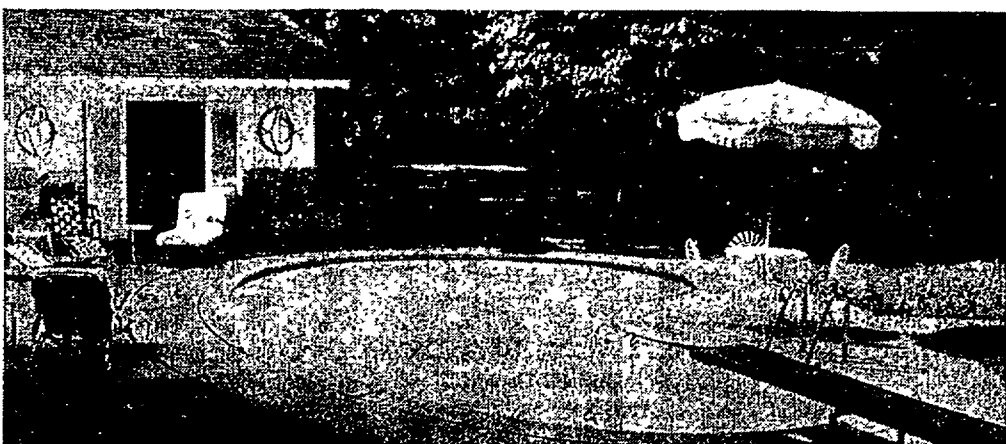

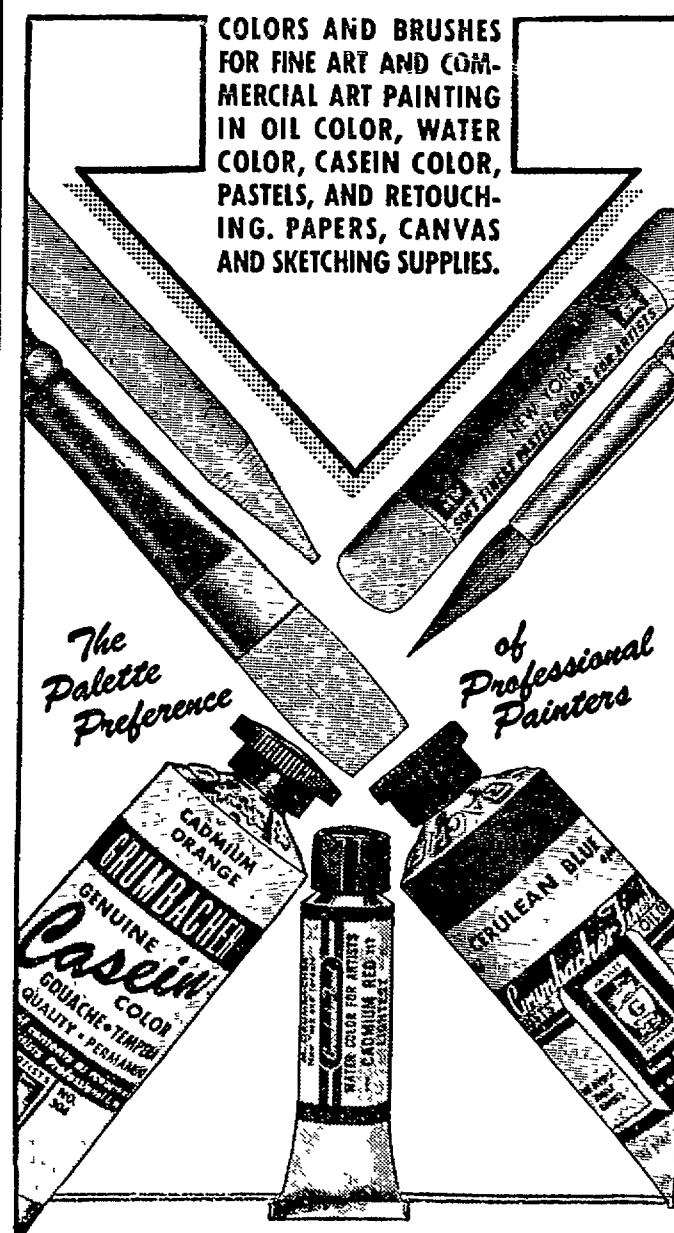

Bass Season Calls Fishermen Next

Michigan's 1960 fishing season moves into full gear June 18 when black bass — the largemouth and smallmouth — join other game fish on the state's legal catch list.

These latecomers to the state's fishing scene are cinches to give anglers their share of boasting-sized trophies and sporting thrills through September 11 on trout lakes and streams and December 31 on all other waters, including the Great Lakes. They rank among the top ten species of fish taken from Michigan's inland non-trout waters.

Much of their popularity stems from dogged scrappiness, a true challenge for the best of fishermen. The smallmouth has been hailed as "inch for inch and pound for pound", the gamest fish that swims. The largemouth is also a plucky fighter when hooked.

The latter is abundant in lakes throughout the lower peninsula, in many lakes above the Straits and in weedy bays of the Great Lakes. Locally, Walled Lake and Kent lake are popular waters for bass. It favors shallow, weedy and mud-bottom lakes and quiet rivers. Casting with artificial plugs, spinners and live bait in shallow lake waters where lily pads and other aquatic plants grow usually brings the best results in catching this fellow.

Its look-alike, the smallmouth, is found throughout the state. It is most plentiful in larger lakes with open shoals and gravel or boulder bottoms, in larger non-trout rivers with fast currents and rocky bottoms, and along rocky shores of the Great Lakes.

Fishermen generally find that casting by plugs, spinners or live bait, or trolling with a spinner and live bait in moderately deep water to be most effective for taking smallmouths. Night bass fishing is often highly rewarding later in the season.

There are several ways to tell whether you've landed a largemouth or smallmouth. Check the upper jaw of your fish. If it extends behind the eye, it's a largemouth.

The largemouth also has a deep notch between the two parts of its dorsal fin. There also is a marked difference in the color pattern of these two fish. The smallmouth is brown to greenish-brown and may have a series of dark vertical bars along its side. The largemouth is greenish with a broad black band running the length of its body.

Fishing Fees Remain Unchanged

Confusion over an earlier proposed hike in Michigan's fishing fees is causing some resistance to license sales this spring.

A number of dealers have reported that many fishermen are not buying licenses because they think fees have been raised. The Conservation Department's six-point proposal to upgrade the state's fishing license fee structure failed to rally support and was never introduced in the legislature. It was aimed at alleviating a critical situation, in Michigan's Game and Fish Protection Fund.

The annual resident license remains at \$2 while the annual non-resident fee is still \$5. Also unchanged is the state's \$2 trout stamp, and the \$4 non-resident 15-day license.

As was the case last year, no license is required for taking perch, catfish, bullheads, blue pike, sand pike, ciscoes and carp by hook and line from state waters of lakes Superior, Michigan, Huron, St. Clair and Erie and the St. Marys, St. Clair and Detroit rivers.

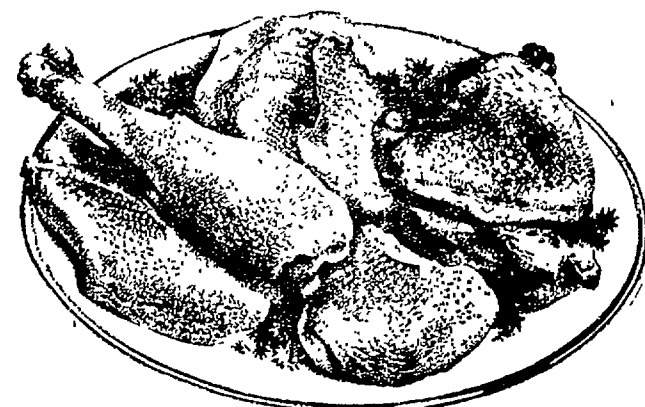

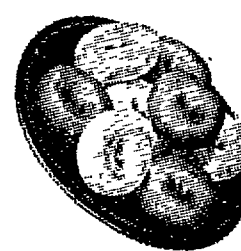
