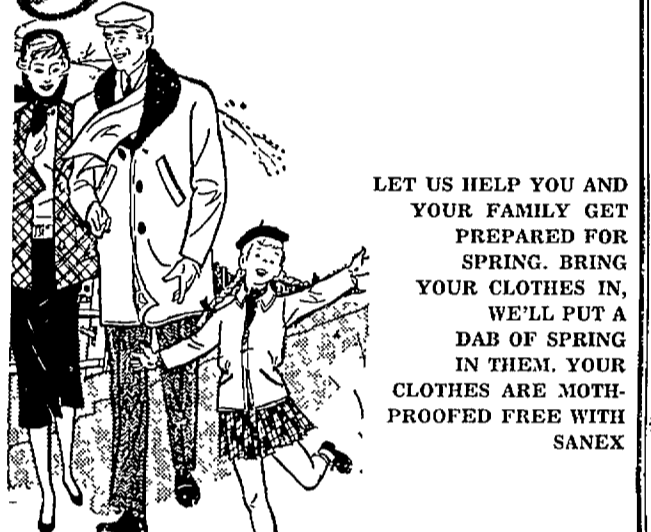

Soda Cracker Pie? It's The Berries, Even Better

Say your family's getting tired of pies with routine fillings? Are they turning forks down to apple, cherry and the berry varieties? Whether your answer's yes or no, Mrs. John Begle, 41700 Nine Mile road, has a recipe for you to try out on pie eaters at your house. She calls it Soda Cracker Pie, and here's how she makes it.

SODA CRACKER PIE
Mrs. John Begle
3 egg whites
1 cup sugar
1/4 t salt
1 t vanilla
16 soda crackers
1/2 cup chopped walnuts
Beat egg whites until stiff; add sugar gradually then salt, vanilla, soda crackers (crumbled) and walnuts. Bake 30 minutes (no longer) in well greased pan in 350-degree oven. Cool and serve with whipped cream.

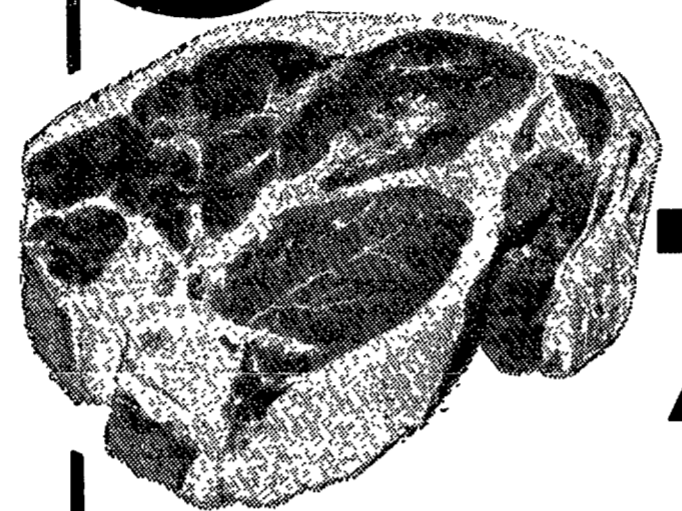

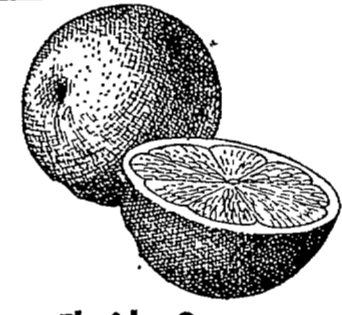

Conservation Notes

Foxes accounted for less than two percent of the damage complaints registered with the farmers and other landowners in 1960.

A year-end summary of the Department's predatory or nuisance animal control program shows that these animals figured in only 48 of 2,650 crop, livestock, and poultry damage cases handled by conservation officers and trapper-instructors.

Department records indicate that foxes are at least as abundant now as in 1947 when they were added to the State's bounty system.

Coyotes prompted but six complaints during the year while no damage cases were recorded for bobcats. Both animals are bountied in Michigan, the latter only in the upper peninsula.

Raccoons, beavers, and squirrels were the most common culprits on last year's complaint list. Together, they were involved in 1,630 damage cases reported by farmers and landowners.

Michigan's whitetails fared poorly on the highways in 1960 as 3,150 were killed by automobiles, the Conservation Department reports.

Last year's toll is the highest registered since the department started keeping records of highway deer kill in 1954.

Since then, more deer have been killed each year on the highways than in the woods by archers. Although a final tally is still being made on the archery kill, it appears that Michigan bowmen took less than 2,000 deer in 1960.

City Council Minutes

A regular meeting of the Northville City Council was held at the City Hall, Monday evening Feb. 20, 1961 at 8 p.m. Present: Councilmen Canterbury, Juday and Welch. Absent: Allen and Reed.

Minutes of last regular meeting and a special meeting were read and approved. Bills amounting to \$9,363.87 from the General Fund and \$2,702.36 from the Water Fund were presented for payment.

The Public Hearing was held on the amendment to the Zoning Ordinance regarding the \$25 fee to be charged and collected to cover cost of expenses incurred by the City in connection with processing a petition for rezoning.

As there were no objections it was moved by Welch, supported by Juday that the amendment to the Zoning Ordinance be adopted. Carried unanimously.

Letter from School Board attorney, James Littell, advised that schools are exempt from special assessments. However, the school had indicated that they would like to participate in the cost of improving N. Center street in front of the Amerman school if they can legally do so.

The Codification committee reported they have had several meetings and Attorney Ogilvie presented a listing of Ordinances which included: 1. Ordinances no longer required. 2. Ordinances that should be retained and codified. 3. Ordinances that should be adopted.

Additional reports will be forthcoming from time to time. Manager Robertson explained the Trust Deed which was proposed to be used at the Board of Review, pending approval of the City Attorney.

Welch requested copies of this Deed so members of the Council can go over it before the next meeting and recommended that the council have an opinion on this from the Board of Review along with one from the City Attorney.

Juday and Welch and Chief King were instructed to investigate the need of a street light on Scott Avenue as Councilman Welch had had requests for such a light.

It was agreed by members of the Council that the City share annually in street Christmas Lighting with the Retail Merchants Association.

It was moved by Welch, supported by Juday that the sum of \$150 be paid to the Retail Merchants Association for Christmas lighting for 1960 and that this amount be established as an annual contribution, plus power expense for lighting.

Carried unanimously. Dates and time for the Board of Review meeting in March were presented by Manager Robertson as follows: 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Tuesday, March 14, 1961. 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. on Wednesday, March 15, 1961. 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Tuesday, March 28, 1961.

It was moved by Juday, supported by Canterbury that the Board of Review meet on the days and at the time specified above. Carried unanimously.

On the addendum to Police Rules presented by Chief King, it was the opinion of the Council that Attorney Ogilvie should review these rules as to the legality of each item and report to the council at the next meeting. Manager Robertson requested permission to make application to attend the Advanced Management course to be held in Chicago May 7 to 12.

It was moved by Canterbury, supported by Welch that the City Manager, in the best interest of the City, be encouraged to make application to attend the training course to be held in Chicago May 7 to 12 and, if accepted, the City to pay his out-of-pocket expenses for attending this course. Carried unanimously.

It was moved by Welch, supported by Canterbury that the foregoing resolution be adopted. Carried Unanimously.

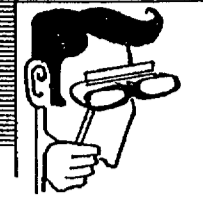

Teacher Profile

Mrs. Pat Quinlan

To the students and faculty of the junior high school, the periods of fragrant baking activity in the homemaking department stand out in welcome relief to the work of the science lab, where students seem to conduct all experiments using either burnt rubber or rotten eggs. It takes soft-spoken Pat Quinlan, the proprietor of the homemaking department, and her lady chefs only a short time to fumigate the school with the more pleasant smells of pies, cakes and cookies replacing, or at least neutralizing, the odors of the scientific attack.

Although there is much more to the homemaking department than what first meets the nose, food is still the main course, taking up the whole first semester, with clothing and other assorted goodies served up in the second.

Mrs. Quinlan acquaints her young charges with the culinary arts by helping the girls to "learn how to plan and prepare a complete meal, how to make party foods, how to correctly set a table and generally learn to work more efficiently in a kitchen." Her fledgling hostesses have often planned and presented teas for appreciative faculty, parent and PTA groups.

But there can't be teas all the time, so Pat Quinlan has found other means of disposing of her academically-created food. The appetite for which young teenagers are so justly famous comes to the rescue of the homemaking department. In one vast gastronomic extravaganza, two or three teenagers can gobble up the entire lesson quicker than you can drop a dish towel at bell time.

But man does not live by bread alone, so Mrs. Quinlan's plans, among other things, include a semester of clothing study. Here the girls learn to use patterns, practice sewing

skills (including machine adjustments), and learn to put the garments together. Last year these efforts resulted in a fashion show, where the girls proudly displayed their pretty skirt and blouse creations before an enthusiastic junior-high audience. The show, with its interludes of humor, was so highly successful that everyone in the school will be happy to learn that Pat is planning another one for around the end of May.

Other nick-nacks Mrs. Quinlan pulls out of the cupboard shelf include lessons in good grooming, baby sitting, family living, textiles and nutrition. Her classes are currently dusting off nutrition and plan a survey of teenage eating habits to discover how this affects health. The results should be interesting.

The girl responsible for all this activity calls Plymouth her hometown. She still lives there with her accountant husband, Charles, and 21-month-old daughter, Debbie. Her B.S. degree is from Western Michigan university in Kalamazoo, and she's now working toward her Master's. She taught junior high homemaking for three years at Bellville, Michigan and has had additional experience with children as a Girl Scout counselor during several summers.

This teacher's years as Girl Scout counselor indicate that she's a lover of the out-of-doors. When they can get away, the Quinlan cian piles into its little compact car and points it northward to the wilds of the Upper Peninsula, where hunting, fishing and swimming give relaxing variation to their chosen careers.

As for Pat's plans for the future? She'd like to buy a bread alone, but other than that she's the picture of contentment. "Homemaking and housewife are two harmonious careers," she says.

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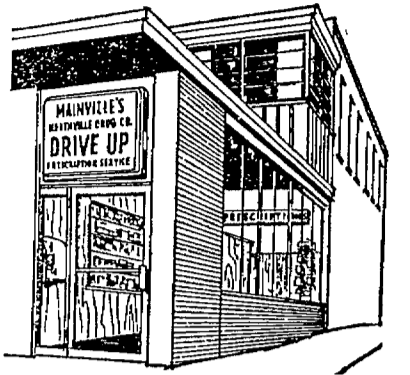

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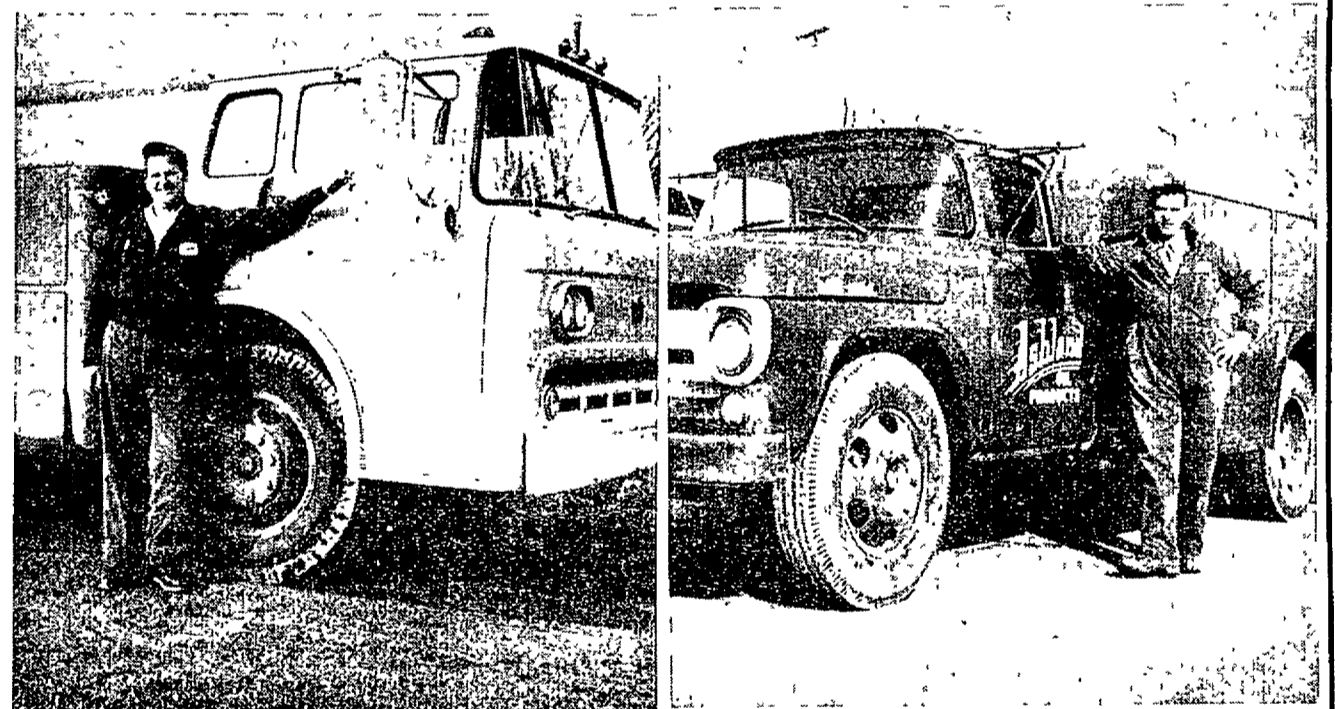
