'We Goofed' Admits Council — Tosses Out 42 Sidewalk Bills

Criticism of elected officials by taxpayers is hardly news. It happens all the time at city, state and national levels.

But Monday night the Northville city council made news by pulling the "man bites dog" switch.

The council turned on itself, describing its method of procedure in handling sidewalk assessments as "confusing and inept".

So strong was the council's feeling that it had "goofed" that some 42 sidewalk assessment bills were cancelled "until a thorough review and analysis of costs can be made".

Councilmen were well primed for Monday's action. Statements received last week by residents — mostly on High, Elm, East and Walnut streets — resulted in a rash of telephone calls.

Mayor A. M. Allen and Councilman John Canterbury were especially upset by the size of the bills.

County Issues Hepatitis Warning

The Wayne County Health Department is making an epidemiological study of hepatitis outbreaks in the County outside of Detroit, Dr. Joseph G. Molner, Wayne County Health Commissioner said Tuesday.

County Issues Hepatitis Warning

Hepatitis is a disease that affects the liver, and is usually associated with insanitary living habits. Epidemiologists from the State Health Department feel the record number of cases reported in Michigan last year could have been due to the excessive moisture which causes the overflow of septic tanks in various parts of Michigan, with the consequent pollution of well water.

County Issues Hepatitis Warning

Thirteen new cases of hepatitis in Out-Wayne County were reported to the Health Department during the week ending December 18. This brings the total number of cases in Out-Wayne County to 332 for the year, compared with only 139 cases reported during all of 1960.



County Issues Hepatitis Warning

Three cases of hepatitis have been reported in Northville this year — two in the township and one in the city. The latest report of a local case was made December 11.

County Issues Hepatitis Warning

Since the disease is easily spread by person to person contact, good personal hygiene would also do very much to bring the disease under control, the Health Commissioner added.

County Issues Hepatitis Warning

Because of the possible relation between insanitary food service and hepatitis outbreaks, Dr. Molner reminded managers of mass feeding establishments that training in sanitary food service practices for their supervisory personnel is available from the Health Department on request.

County Issues Hepatitis Warning

Dr. Molner also stated that maintenance of good health is one of the best defenses against becoming seriously ill with hepatitis. Normally healthy adults usually have little trouble with a hepatitis infection, while those in poor physical condition suffer more serious disabilities.

Six famous paintings of women will live, and breathe and speak tonight (Thursday) when the American Association of University Women presents a novel Christmas program entitled "Art Comes to Life" at 7:45 p.m. in Plymouth junior high school.

The women — daVinci's "Mona Lisa", Whistler's "Mother", Van Gogh's "Woman of Arles", Rubens' "Le Chapeau de Paille", Picasso's "Girl in a Mirror" and "Angel of the Annunciation", a Fifteenth century work — will be portrayed by members of the association. Embodying the central figure in each masterpiece will be: Mrs. Sidney Cady, Mrs. John Haas, Mrs. John Barnes, Mrs. A. R. Basel, Mrs. T. F. Devereaux and Mrs. C. C. Wittse.

Co-chairmen for this tableau of famous masterpieces are Miss Helen Gilbert and Mrs. Donald Sober. Miss Gilbert has been engaged in research on the paintings and their artists since September. She has written the script in the first person to create an illusion of "thinking aloud" by the subjects of the canvasses. To Brighten Your Holiday Menus

Cranberry Punch (3 quarts)

1 pound cranberries
1 quart water
1 1/3 cups sugar
1 1/3 cups orange juice
2/3 cup lemon juice
1 cup pineapple juice
3 1/2 cups chilled sparkling water (1 pint, 12 oz. bottle)
Wash cranberries and cook in one quart water until skins pop. Strain carefully so seeds do not get into juice. Add sugar and remaining juices to cranberry juice. Mix well. Chill. Just before serving, add sparkling water. Punch may be served with scoops of lime sherbet floating on top.

NOTE: For hot Cranberry Punch, follow recipe above and heat to boiling point instead of chilling. Add 3 1/2 cups boiling water instead of sparkling water and serve hot.

Avocado Dip

1 large ripe avocado
1/3 cup cream cheese
1 teaspoon salad dressing
1 teaspoon lemon juice
1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
2 drops Tabasco (optional)
1/4 teaspoon salt
Peel and mash avocado. Combine with rest of ingredients. Beat until light and fluffy. Chill.

Pick-A-Dills

Put a slice of dill pickle on a round of buttered bread. Sprinkle with shredded cheddar cheese. Slip under broiler until cheese is melted and brown. Large stuffed olive sliced may be used in the same way.

Poinsettia Cucumber Mold

1 package lime-flavored gelatin
1 1/2 cups hot water
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 teaspoon scraped onion (optional)
1/2 teaspoon salt
dash of pepper
1 cup grated cucumber
Olive and pimiento for making poinsettia

Dissolve gelatin in one cup hot water. Add salt. Add one-half cup cold water and lemon juice. Stir. Put one teaspoon in individual salad mold. In this place one slice of olive and thin strips of pimiento to make poinsettia. Carefully place in refrigerator to thicken. Chill rest of gelatin mixture also. When slightly thickened, fold in cucumber and onion, if used. Fill individual molds and chill until firm. Serves five to six.

Roast Rock Cornish Hen with Cornbread Stuffing

ROCK CORNISH HEN
Can be cut in half and roasted inside down or prepared whole, depending on size of hen. Roast according to directions on wrapping.

CORNBREAD DRESSING

1 pkg. (12 oz.) cornbread mix
1/2 cup butter or margarine, melted
1 1/2 cups chopped celery
1 cup chopped onion
1/4 cup chopped parsley
1/2 teaspoon rubbed sage
1/2 teaspoon dried thyme leaves
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 egg
1/2 cup canned clear chicken broth undiluted
(for moist dressing, add broth to make mixture quite thin)

Make and bake cornbread as package label directs. Cool in pan, on wire rack, 25 minutes; then crumble into medium mixing bowl. Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Heat one-quarter cup butter on medium skillet. Add celery, onion, and parsley, saute, stirring, until celery and onion are tender — about 5 minutes. Add to crumbled cornbread, along with seasonings, egg and chicken broth; mix well. Stuff into bird.

Green Bean Casserole

2 1/2-lb. cans cut green beans
1 5-oz. tin water chestnuts
1/2 lb. cheddar cheese
Drain beans and reserve liquid. Put half of beans in unbuttered casserole. Slice water chestnuts on top. Slice half of cheddar cheese on top of this. Put rest of beans on next layer and remaining cheese over them. Pour one-third cup bean liquid over top. Heat through in a 350-degree oven. Over top, add one can French fried onions last few minutes. (Slivered almonds may be used instead of water chestnuts).

Christmas Parfait

1 1/2 cups chocolate sauce
1/2 cup whipping cream
1 quart pistachio ice cream
8 red maraschino cherries (halves)
Place chocolate sauce in parfait dish first, then alternate with pistachio ice cream. Put whipped cream on top; add cherries. Store in refrigerator 24 hours.

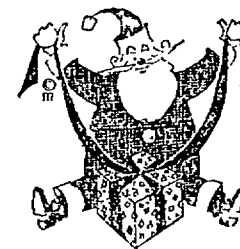

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Babson Forecast on Tap

Roger Babson's annual "Business and Financial Forecast" for the coming year will be published in next week's edition.

Previous predictions of the internationally-known commentator and investment adviser reveal an average of 83 per cent correct over the past 20 years.

Born and reared in an old-fashioned atmosphere of hard work and hustle on a farm in Gloucester, Mr. Babson went to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Upon graduating, he turned to financial and business activities in which his father was engaged.

His exertions, however, undermined his health; he contracted tuberculosis and he was sent West "as good as dead"! It was while he was convalescing from this dread malady that he worked out some of the possibilities and problems of business forecasting. His weekly releases are used by over 400 newspapers and his financial reports by 20,000 corporations and estates. His research work is carried on by a large staff of experts.

Mr. Babson founded Babson Institute for Men, and, in cooperation with the late Mrs. Babson, developed Webber College for Women — both nationally-known educational institutions. Here young men and women may concentrate on the fundamentals of honest and efficient business administration. Later, he founded a Midwest Institute of Business Administration, located in Eureka, Kansas, the center of the United States. He has been active also in the establishment of other mediums of service to the public, such as the Gravity Research Foundation, located at New Boston, New Hampshire.

Mr. Babson has probably done more than any other man to create among his millions of newspaper readers an interest in simple business problems, and to install a broader vision in businessmen, enabling them to meet the ups-and-downs of the business cycle.

It would be helpful to know your wife's age. There has been a good deal written about the reactions women are supposed to have at the time of the menopause.

There is considerable question as to how much of this reaction is psychological and how much physiological.
Some women, and perhaps your wife is one of them, build their lives around their children. When the children grow up and leave home, they suddenly find their lives empty and, to them, meaningless.

The same kind of thing happens to men who retire from work without having prepared themselves for this change in their circumstances.
Although turning to religion is certainly a normal response for many people when facing great difficulty, the vigor with which your wife has sought for help in this direction sounds out of character with her. I agree with you that she is a sick woman and needs assistance. That she does not want assistance is another matter.
As laws stand on the book in the State of Michigan, it is virtually impossible to provide help for someone who is not so

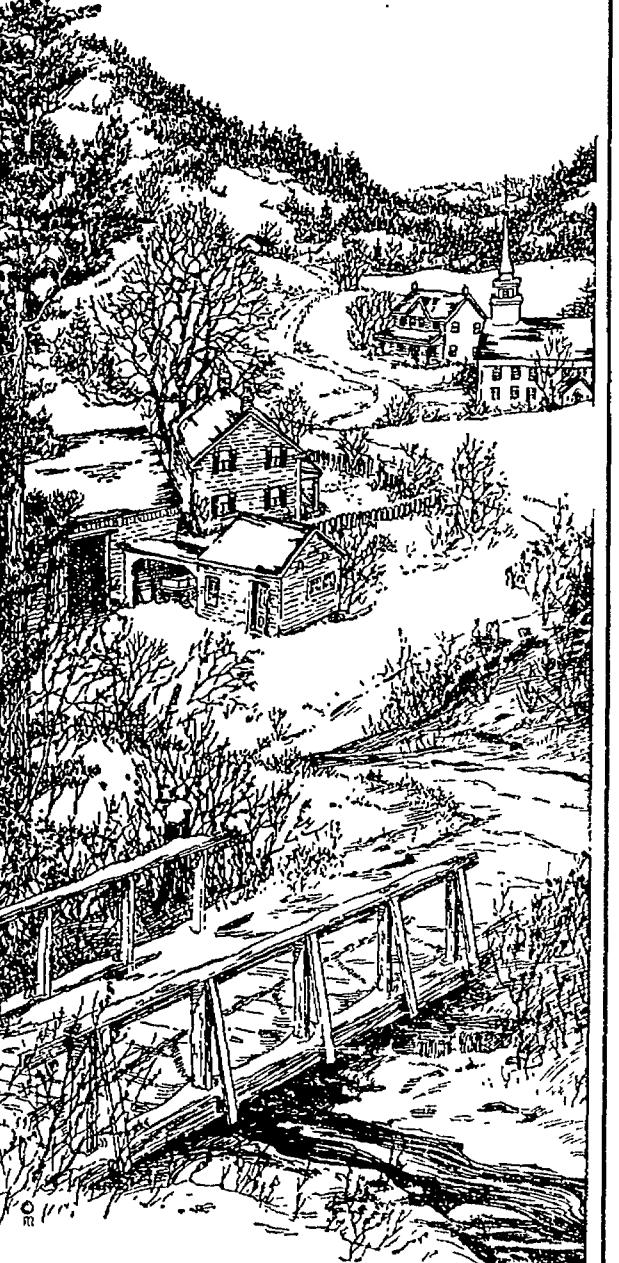

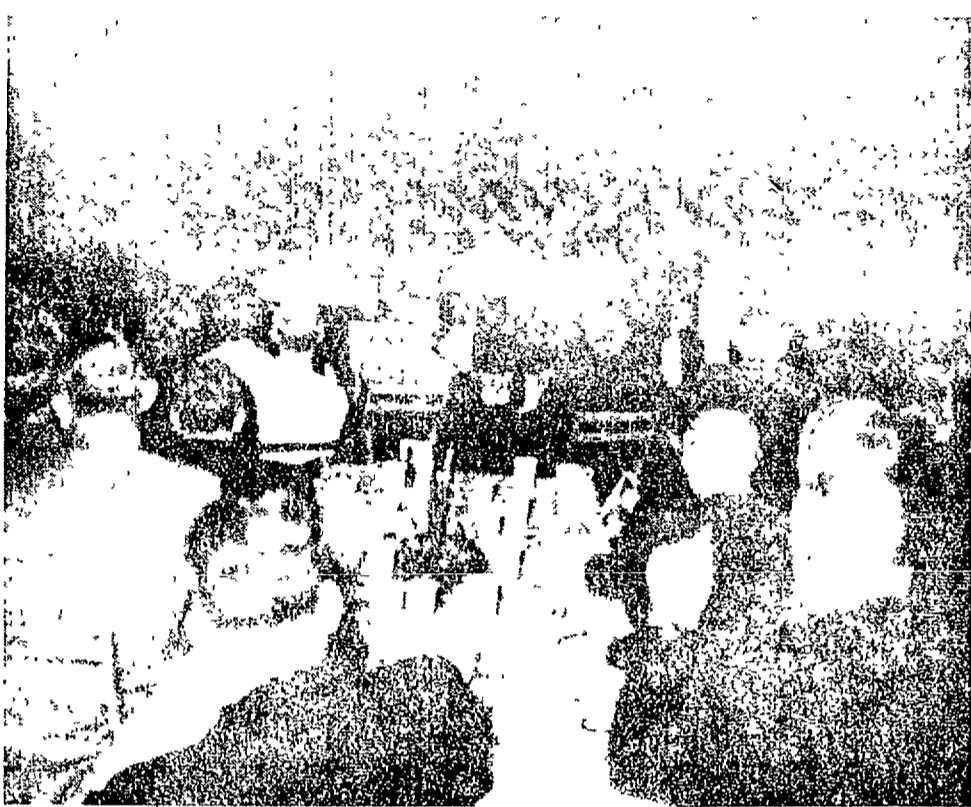
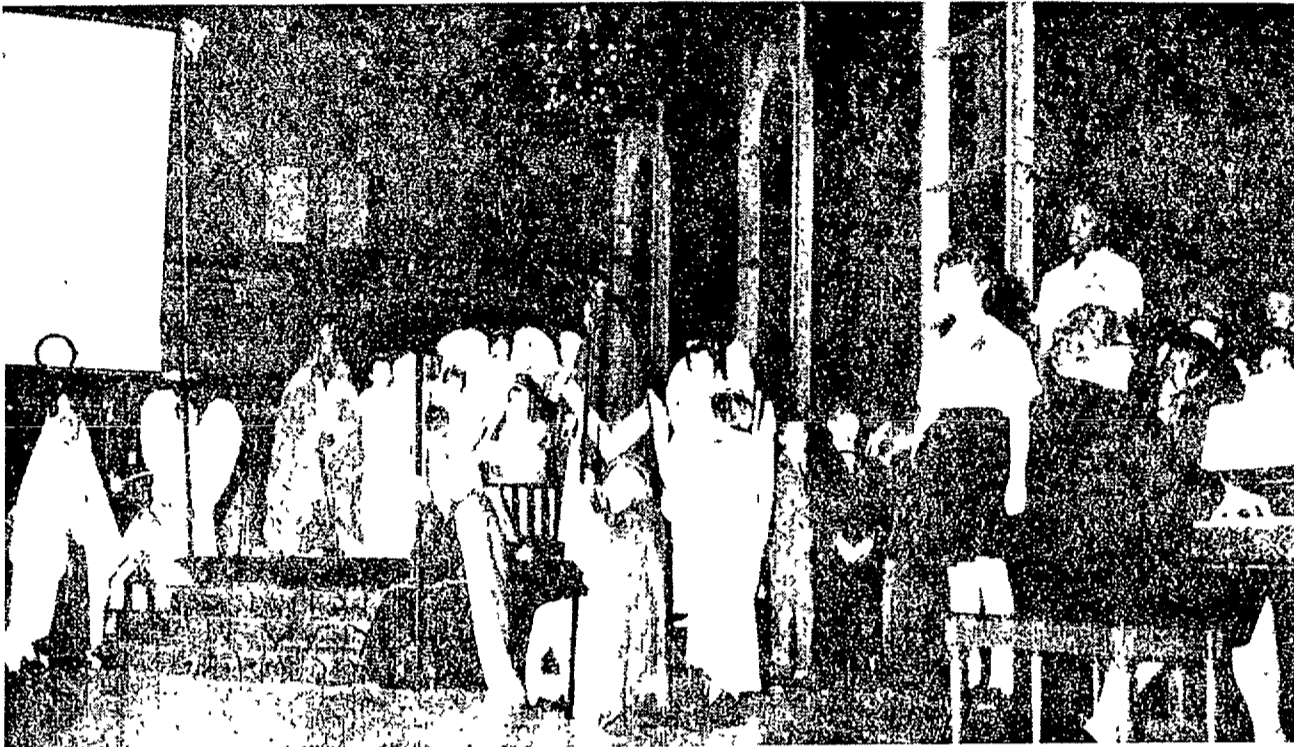
WCTS Children Entertain Area Rotary Clubs

It was moved by Mr. Heslop and seconded by Mr. MacBride that the All-Risk Ins. be awarded to Auto Owners Ins. The motion carried.

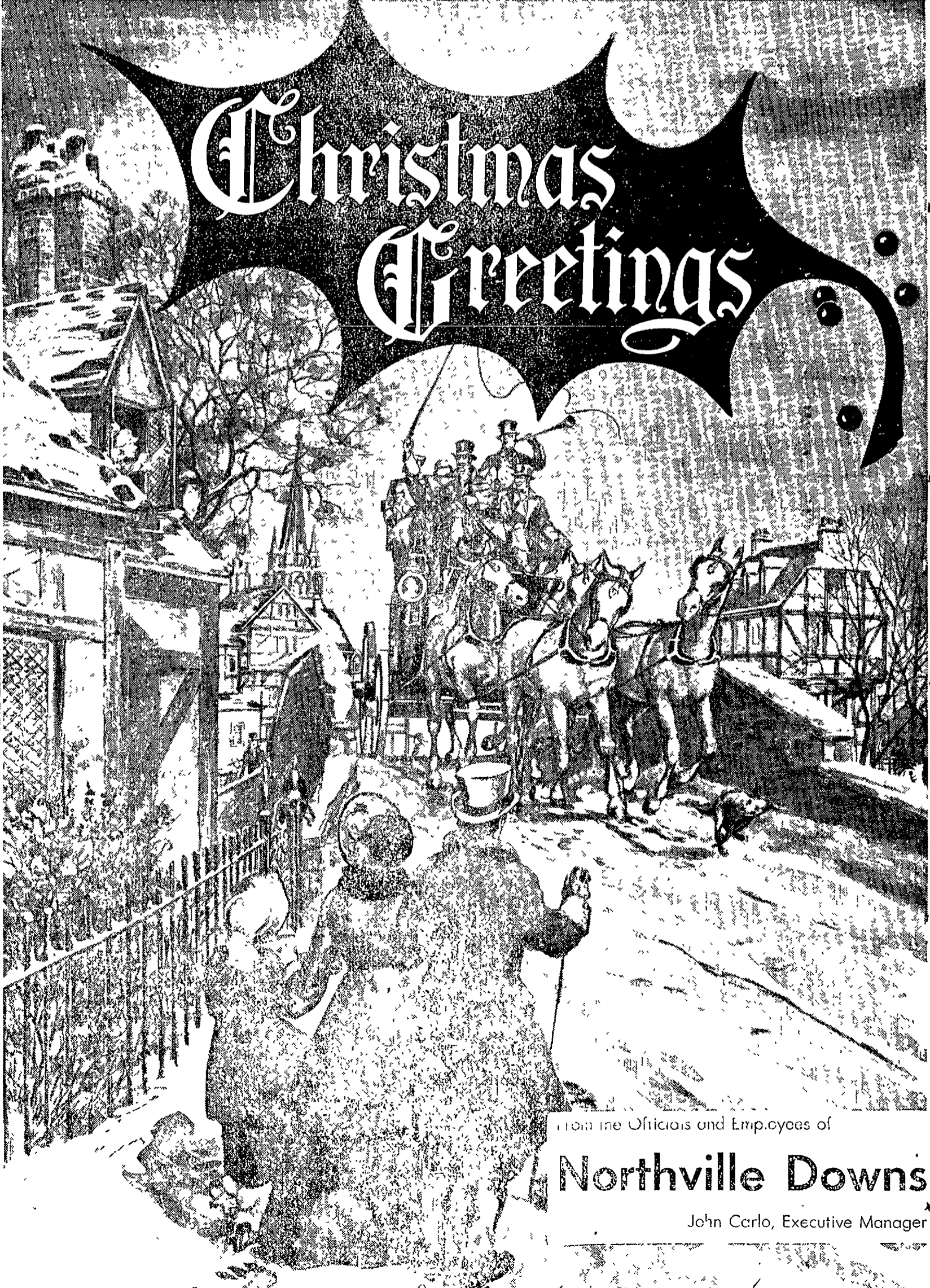
