SPEAKING for The Record

In the first edition of 1962 we asked area officials in Northville to answer the same question: "What would you like to see undertaken or accomplished in our area during 1962?"

Now with the year more than half past we thought it might be interesting to review these statements and tally the results

Let's look at the proposals and their progress:

MAYOR ALLEN called for a definite street improvement program with a specific schedule for paving.

RESULTS - Practically none, although the council has (pushed through a special assessment plan under which a series of streets have been paved.

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS AMERMAN pointed out two matters, one the creation of an economic development committee and the second, a study to consider formation of an area hospital authority.

RESULTS - The first has been done and is progressing nicely: but the second is dormant.

COUNCILMAN CANTERBURY - He also cited the need for an economic development committee and presently serves as the group's first president.

REVEREND PAUL CARGO suggested an improved library facility perhaps in conjunction with the proposed new city hall.

RESULTS - This project, like the city hall, seems presently lost in the shuffle.

TOWNSHIP SUPERVISOR CLARK aimed for formation , of sewer and water ordinances, plus revision of building codes and sign ordinance.

RESULTS - The former was passed last week and the , latter now under consideration.

A. R. CLARKE, vice president of Manufacturers National Bank, appealed for an expanded recreation program, including 'swimming pool and new headquarters facilities

RESULTS - Nothing on the swimming pool, but a new building with additional facilities is now on the drawing board.

NELSON C. SCHRADER, owner of Schrader's Home Furnishings, called for initiative by local merchants to help develop a more complete shopping center

RESULTS - No definite program in this regard has been

SIDNEY FRID, city reprece 'ative on the Oakland county board of supervisors, called for reorganization of the public

RESULTS - Nothing along the line that Frid suggested, but acquisition of sewer rodding equipment has all but eliminated the department's biggest headache, the city manager

CITY MANAGER BRUCE POTTHOFF was more general in his aims, but in calling for establishment of goals believes the city has shown progress in its street paving program and previously mentioned sewer problems.

ROBERT SHAFER, former school board president, looked forward to satisfactory accomplishment of the teacher's sal-, ary plan in this, its first year; he also hoped for completion of lighting and seating at the new high school athletic field, ' a proect awaiting approval of revenue bond sale.

Of course, progress in other un-mentioned areas has been made, but it's easy to see that the last 51/2 months of 1962 will be mighty busy, indeed, if all these ambitions are to be


