In Review:

## Triumph

An encounter with Philip Wylie via the pages of Triumph is something of a shock, though most certainly not an unpleasant one.

Wylie has created in Triumph an elaborate scheme, a story, to take a whack at human foibles.

His underlying theme is a prophecy or perhaps a plea to sidestep World War III.

Published just this year, Triumph includes a quite vivid — and reasonably scientific — description of how an atomic war would affect the face of the earth and its people. Indeed, the author is at his best as he tells of the mobs scratching for shelter when Americans and Soviets square off for atomic battle.

As bombs cease to fall, only 14 people on this side of the Iron Curtain, hidden from fallout in one of Connecticut's have a chance to live.

Among these survivors in the 500-foot black hole are a millionaire and his family, a Jewish physicist, a playboy, a Negro servant and his daughter, a Chinese girl, a meter reader, a Japanese engineer and two children.

The mountain shelter, constructed by millionaire Vance Farr in anticipation of just such an attack, is the center of life for these 14 Americans for over two years.

There, they eat, sleep, roller skate, swim, read, watch television programs broadcast by unharmed people in South America, learn of the last ditch attack by the Soviets and love — all courtesy of Farr's foresightedness in building a \$150 million-plus shelter.

There, even, Wylie mocks prejudices against color and nationality, concluding through one of his characters that "Environment and the attitudes of other people to anyone, or to any minority group, regarded as different — and, of course, in consequence, as inferior — make the only important difference that exists. And all of that ... illusion."

Inevitably, like the Greek-legend soldiers, Jason's men, the small band of Americans "Triumph."

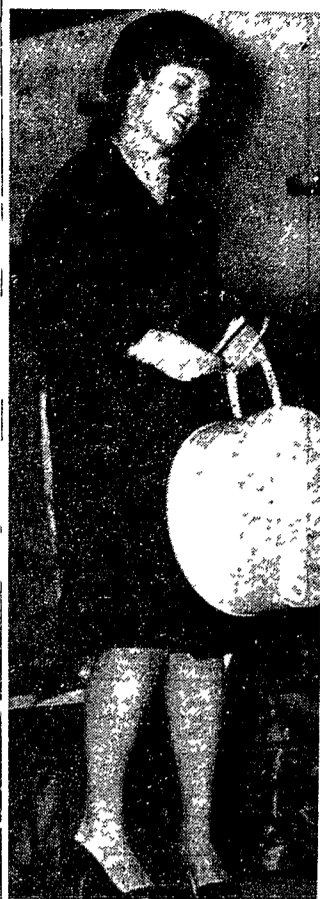
Not, however, without leaving some questions in the reader's mind. It's hard to understand why a man such as Farr would build a shelter in the first place. It's even harder to understand communist reasoning as presented by Wylie and still harder to figure out just where it is the Soviets obtained the financial resources to deliver the last blow.

Nonetheless, Triumph with its unanswered questions and Wylie's tendency to overstate the case, is still one of the better books released this year.

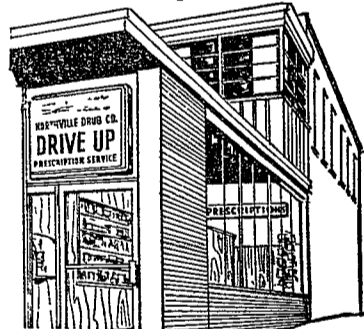

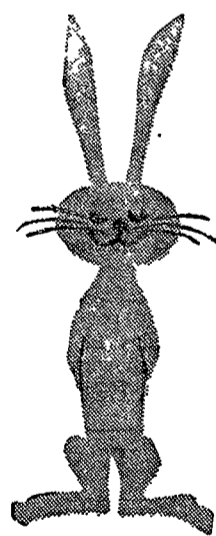

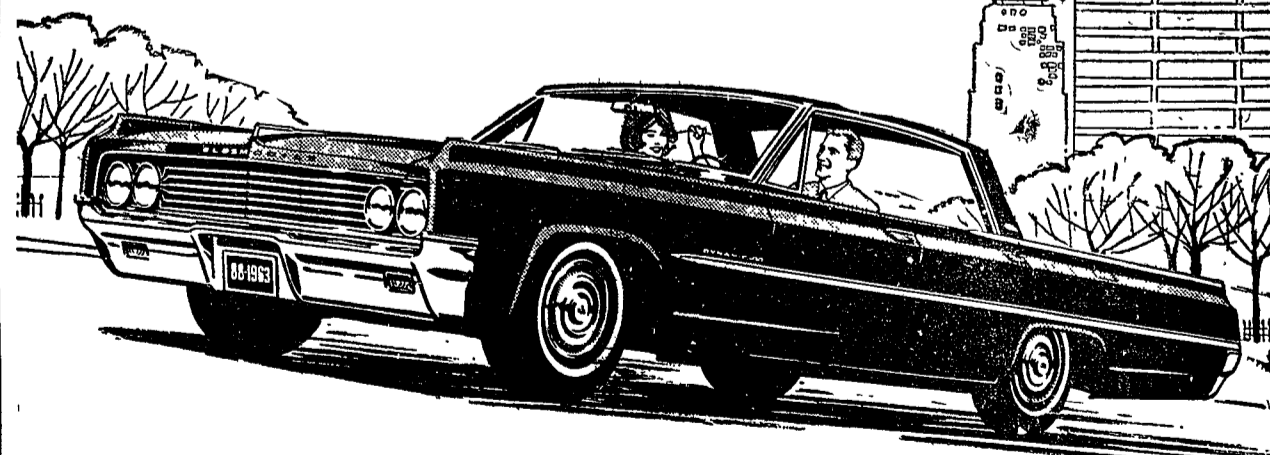

L. C. Horton of Detroit, guilty of making a prohibited U turn on Main street on March 5, paid a \$5 fine.

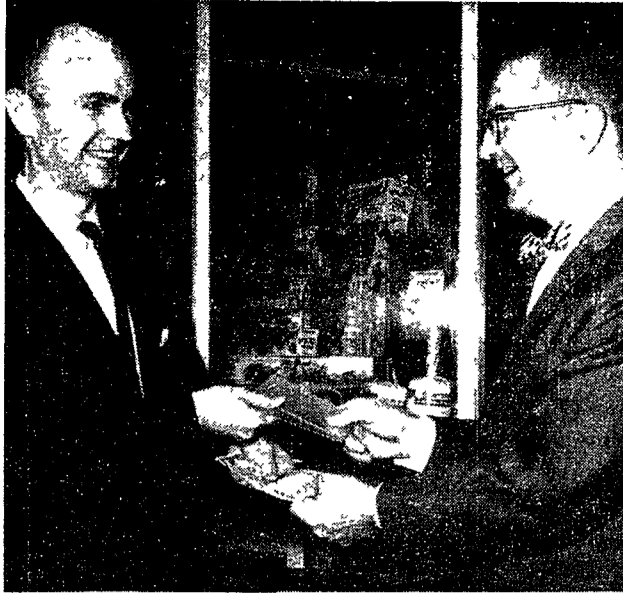

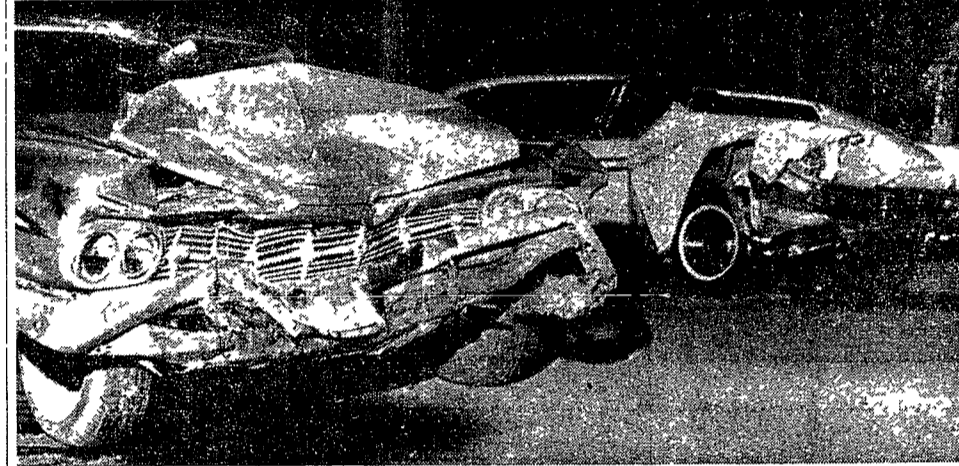

### Readers Speak: Offers Correct Voter List

To the Editor:  
Northville Township Clerk Young has advised that the voter registration lists are not mailing lists. Since these lists contain voters' legal addresses, Mrs. Young would be well advised to explain to prospective purchasers their worthlessness for mailing purposes. Mrs. Young has seen fit to include Plymouth as part of the address in sixty instances and exclude it in a couple of hundred other instances, where it was equally applicable. The confusion resulting from this kind of record keeping would confound anyone including Mrs. Young's eventual successor. Had Mrs. Young checked this material before requesting an apology, she might have reconsidered and offered an apology to any previous users. The possibility exists, of course, that other individuals were informed of the uselessness of these lists for mailing purposes, and that Mrs. Young found it politically expedient to make an exception. Needless to say, I made the necessary corrections prior to using them, and I would gladly make my corrections available to Mrs. Young at her request, in the interest of consistent and complete records. No reference to voters lists would have been made at the Northville Township Annual meeting had not Mrs. Young elected to substitute a rehearsal of her duties, pleading a case for a salary increase, in lieu of the Clerk's Annual Report which the occasion required.

Mrs. Young has in the past, requested my presence & support of her thinking at public meetings. I don't flatter myself that such invitations were exclusive. The collecting of warm bodies who think in unison is known as "having a few friends down to support the cause." If the same tactic is employed by those in opposition, it is called "packing a meeting." Generally speaking, this process is akin to employment as a bull fighter; the rewards are handsome but you'd better be good at it. It makes considerable difference who gets gored. Let's explore this packing business a little further. Anyone can contact citizens, submit a line of thought and suggest a method of action, but without the power of hypnosis no one can force individuals to vote a prescribed way. The actions of the majority at the Northville Township Annual Meeting clearly indicated an attitude of general discontent with either policies or individuals of the township board. This was particularly true in the realm of water and sewer activity. In my opinion, the citizens of our township appreciate the necessity of planning for sewer and water for future residents but deplore the lack of attention to water problems affecting longtime township residents.

In closing, I would like to comment on the suggestion in last week's Record that some individuals at the annual meeting questioned the aye and nay vote on the resolution rejecting salary increases. The expressions on the faces of the board members directly affected left no doubt that they heard the vote exactly as the chairman called it.

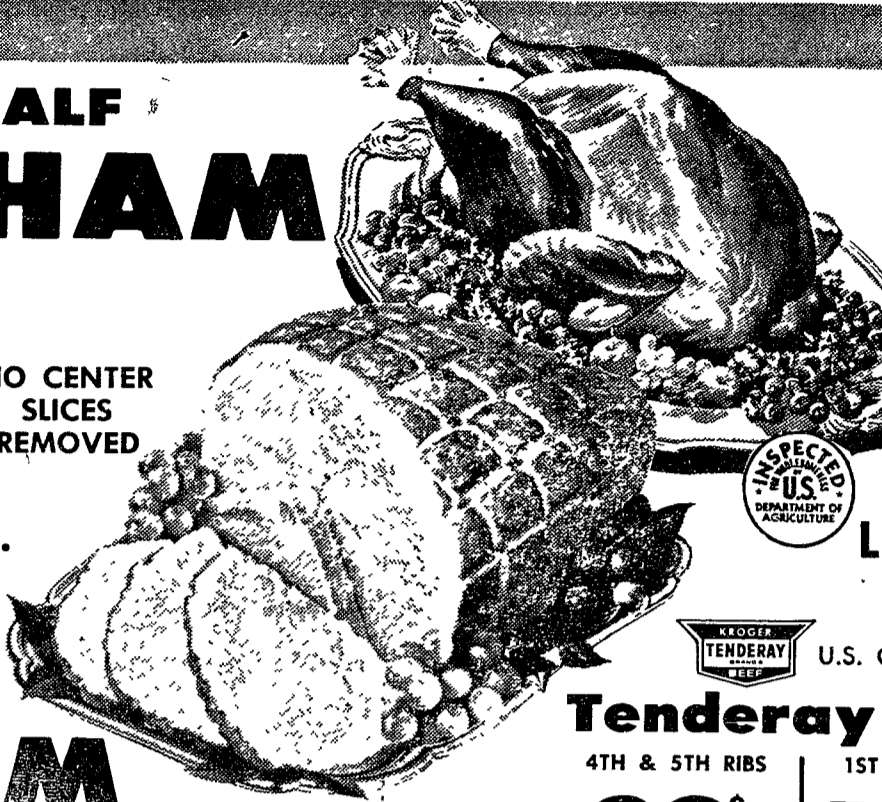
