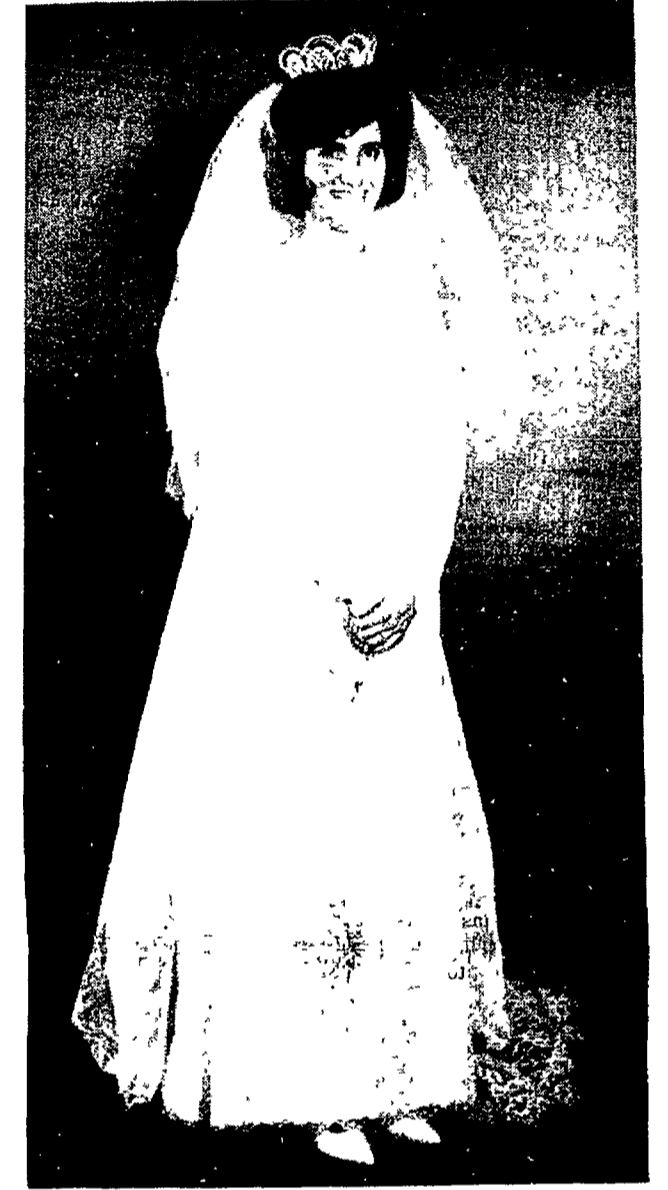

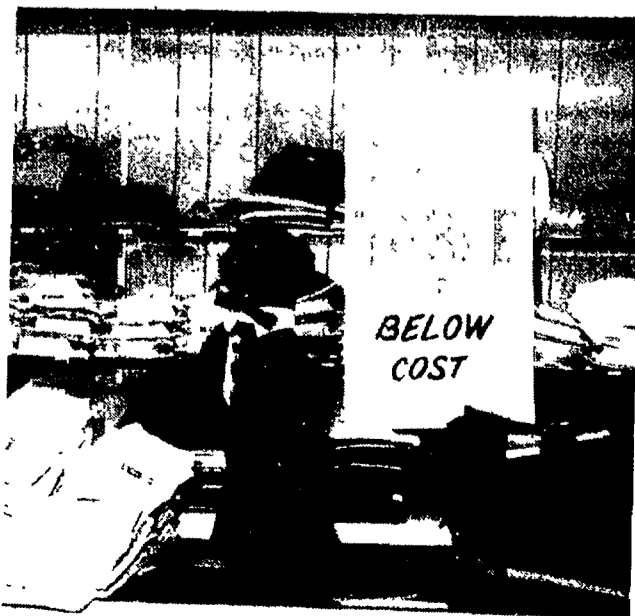

the Alabama juggernaut.

The 25-year-old white frame house with its spacious grounds is just to the Gilmer's liking. It's the former Ed Addis' residence. There is comfort, quiet and room for all to roam, especially the two horses and a pony.

The horses, as well as the cowboy boots and hat that the Lions' coach wears, are becoming his trademark. In truth his love of horses is the very reason for the lat and boots. Gilmer stressed that the apparel is appropriate, rather than an attempt at eccentricity.

Although her husband rides, Mrs. Gilmer said he "likes to fool around with horses more."

Besides this, Gilmer finds solace in talking to the animals. It's been his habit ever since he first bought some horses 12 years ago, his first real acquaintance with them.

Whenever he is able — that's during the off-season — Gilmer rises at six o'clock to feed and care for the animals. Then it's off to work for the day to plan for the upcoming season.

They became his oldest daughter, Connie's charges when practice began at Cranbrook last Tuesday, a 17-year-old and a senior at Northville high school. Connie also has a penchant for jangling.

In her chores around the barn, she gets some help from her two sisters, 16-year-old Fran and Dale, who is 13. Dale will attend eighth grade at Novi junior high school come fall.

Fran, a sophomore next year at the high school, also dances and swims. "I like to go to the dances in Plymouth," she said, "and I swim at the Meadowbrook Country club pool."

Drew, a freckle faced nine-year-old who will be a fifth grader at Novi school, has his work cut out for him, too. In the seat of a lawnmower cart, he cuts the Gilmer's and two neighbors' lawns.

"He fools around with anything mechanical," said Mrs. Gilmer, and he's a real good swimmer. She pointed out that Drew has no football or basketball aspirations.

Mrs. Gilmer, a modest, laconic woman with the same droll southern humor of her husband, plainly states that she doesn't ride the horses. "I like to bowl," she said, "but I kept getting worse rather than better. I'm also a very amateur bridge player," she added.

Although Gilmer and his wife have lived in the country much of their lives and call themselves "small town people," they are originally from Birmingham, Alabama. They knew each other in high school, where Gilmer starred in the city school system.

When the then college neophyte moved to Tuscaloosa, Alabama, the site of the university, Mrs. Gilmer accompanied her future husband as a student. During their freshman year in 1944, they were married.

And it was during the same time that Harry Gilmer led the Crimson Tide to an undefeated season and a trip to the Rose Bowl New Year's day.

He was a tailback in Alabama's version of the single wing. As such, he ran as much as he passed — and he did both with a flare. On defense (there was no platooning then) Gilmer was also a standout.

With his performance in Alabama's 34-14 victory over Southern California in the Rose Bowl, he gained national prominence — thanks to Grantland Rice.

It was Rice, the great sports mogul, who wrote the words of praise. But as Gilmer tells it, his coach pulled Rice aside before the game, telling him to watch Gilmer, the freshman quarterback.

"He told Rice he had a passer," Gilmer said. Pass he did, completing all eight to spearhead

throwing a bullet," he said. What advice was the rookie quarterback given? "There's the greatest passer in the world — just watch him. That's what he told me — heck of a thing for a coach to say — and that's what I did."

Those were the last five years of Baugh's career, Gilmer said, and the first five for him. "Marshall (owner George Marshall) gave up on me in the third year, and I was switched to defense."

Who is the greatest quarterback — field general, passer and runner — of all time? That's one that even Gilmer, who associated with most of the greats, declined to answer. "There are so many," he said.

And he had the misfortune to play behind two of them. Baugh, then Layne when Gilmer was traded to Detroit after the 1954 season. A knee operation ruined his career as a defensive man, so Lion Coach Buddy Parker, who "remembered me as a passer," obtained Gilmer as a relief man.

Two years later, it was Parker again who gave him another chance; he recommended Gilmer as a coach to the Pittsburgh staff. The following year, he joined Gilmer, Parker assuming the head coaching job, while Gilmer became coach in charge of defense.

With the creation of a new franchise at Minnesota, Gilmer took on a new challenge in 1960. He joined Van Brocklin as a defensive coach, bringing his Pittsburgh association to an end. "I called Van Brocklin and asked him for a job," Gilmer said with enthusiasm. "He asked me why would I want to come to Minnesota, which had nothing. I told him that I liked the idea of starting from scratch. It appealed to me. He said, 'Why damn, if I don't feel the same way. Come on over.'"

Working with a young and eager team, the coaching staff took the Minnesota Vikings from "dead last" to a second place tie last year. "I worked with four new defensive men each year," Gilmer said with pride, "and it was really rewarding."

Then came the challenge of Gilmer's life, one that he is facing now — making a championship team. That's the problem for Harry Gilmer, head coach of the Detroit Lions.

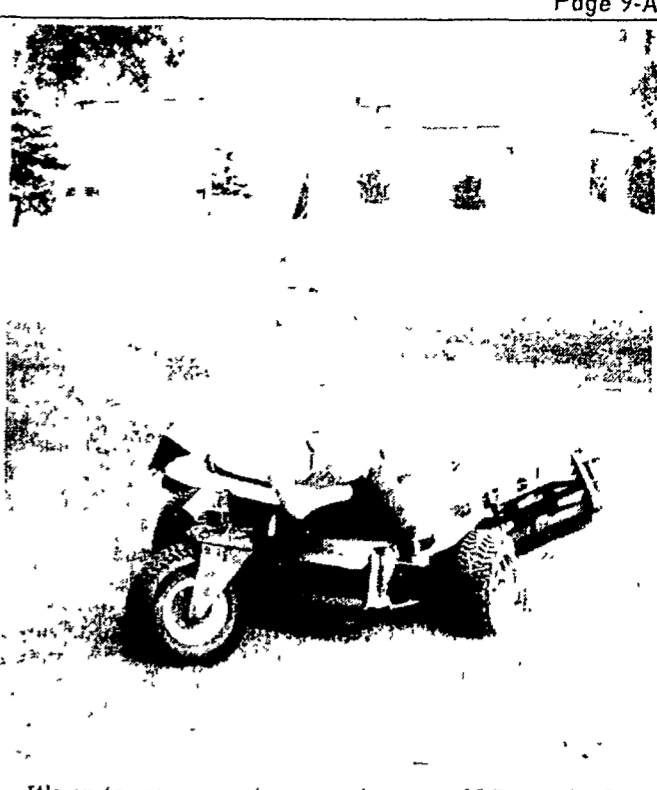

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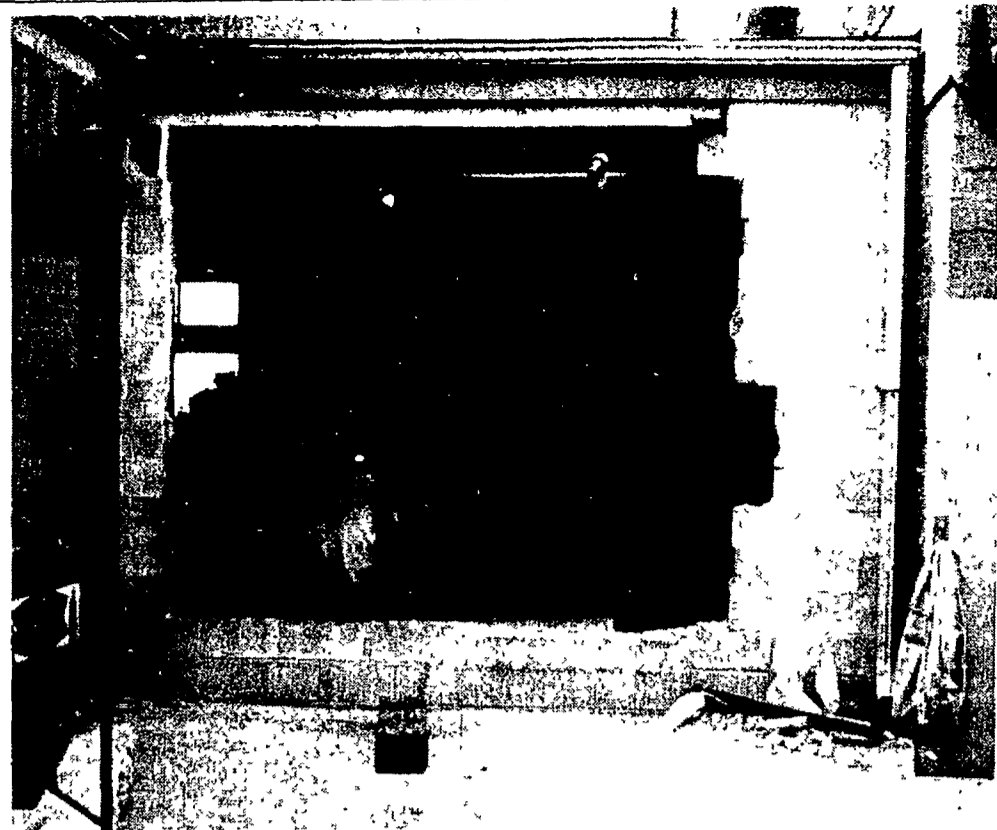
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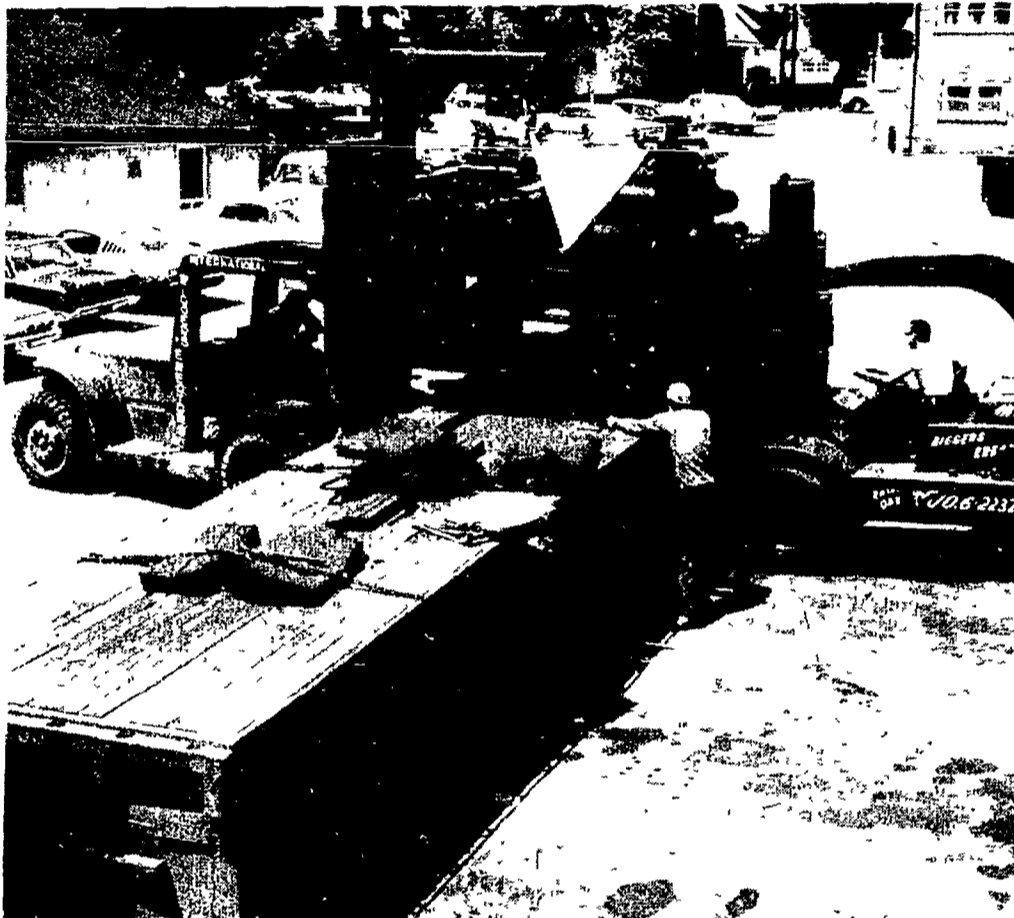

Justice Court

Defective vehicles are not only a road hazard, they also cost money, as do vehicles which make excessive noise.

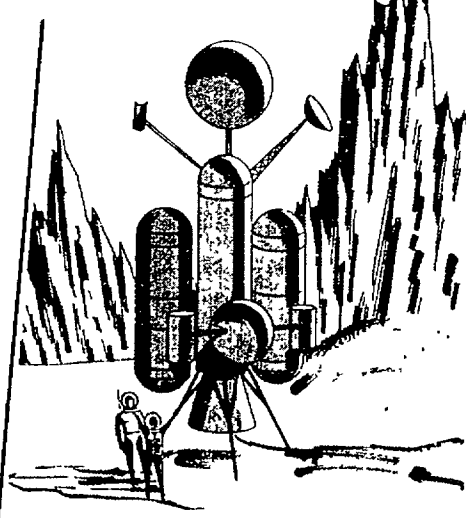

State has Many Nicknames

LANSING - Michigan now has five officially designated "trade-marks." About all now lacking is a state song and this has been attempted but there is no agreement on it.

The state has long been known as the "Wolverine State" although recently "Water Wonderland" or "Water - Winter Wonderland" have provided some competition for the nickname.

Official sanction has been placed on a bird, flower, tree, fish and stone. The latter two were added this year designating the trout and Petoskey stone.

Legislative action is required to dub something official. The action on the apple blossom as Michigan's official flower came first in 1897. Then followed in 1931 the robin and in 1955 recognition fell to the white pine tree.

All except the stone are generally found throughout the state although the flower is most abundant in the fruit growing regions.

The Petoskey stone, named in honor of an Ottawa Indian leader in the Harbor Springs area, is found only in the vicinity of Grand Traverse Bay.

MOST FAMILIAR of state officers to the public is the Secretary of State, a post held during the past 10-plus years by James M. Hare.

He is ranked No. 3 in the state, behind only the Governor and Lieutenant Governor. Public familiarity with this officer is caused by the fact that his name appears on every driver's license and motor registration issued in Michigan.

As a constitutionally created officer, the Secretary of State is named as keeper of the Great Seal and all records and archives of state government. He also establishes the rules and regulations for the conduct of elections in the state.

SOME 250 branch offices of the Secretary of State provide him with public contact in the issue of motor vehicle and watercraft registration and other departmental services.

Compilation, publication and distribution of Michigan's laws and administrative rules also come within his jurisdiction.

The legislature has designated to the Secretary of State the ad-

ditional job of licensing private detectives and detective agencies. Legislative lobbyists, savings and loan associations, notary public commissions, patents, warrants, trade marks, and many land transactions involving both individuals and governmental units also fall to the various divisions of his office.

Finally, as a member of the executive branch of government, the Secretary of State serves on the Board of Escheats, Administrative Board, Highway Reciprocity Board and Safety Commission.

Youths Face Draft

BABSON PARK, Mass., Millions of young men are wondering what the continuing escalation of war in South Vietnam is going to mean to them personally - what is the likelihood that they may be drafted. So are their parents, relatives and friends, and in many instances their employers. Hence, we indicate for our readers the probabilities as well as they can be weighed at this point of crisis in South East Asia.

U.S. forces are now actively involved in the fighting in addition to their earlier role as trainers and consultants and there will be a steady build-up of both material and manpower in Vietnam for an indefinite period. Almost certainly there will be no slowdown in our shipment of troops for at least several months, even if unexpected progress should be made toward a negotiated truce and a potential cease-fire. Readers can be sure of one thing: President Johnson does not want to settle for anything short of complete independence and freedom for South Vietnam like that achieved in South Korea.

While there are reported to be about 75,000 of our men in Vietnam at this time, more will be needed. The Pentagon has implied that as many as 250,000 men could be sent to Southeast Asia without our having to increase our over-all armed forces strength of 2.6 million. But the government knows well that further escalation in Vietnam could prompt the Communist world strategists to complicate matters. They could rekindle trouble in Korea; and they could inflame any number of festering sores in Africa, Malaysia, Cuba, and Central and South America.

So it is wisest for all concerned to prepare for the worst and count on heavier draft calls for some time to come. Up to now, the military has expressed no intention of drafting married men. Nor is there any expectation that students deferments will be revoked; boys already in college can still hope to complete their education and get their degrees. Little has yet been said officially about business deferments; but if we should go on any sort of emergency basis, the pattern of World War II would probably be followed. This would mean by-passing those younger industrial workers considered essential to the war effort and not easily replaceable by older men. Specialists in the space program would surely be added to the list for deferment.

All inducted men are put through a regular basic and advanced training program of 12 weeks, at minimum, before they can be sent overseas. Until the

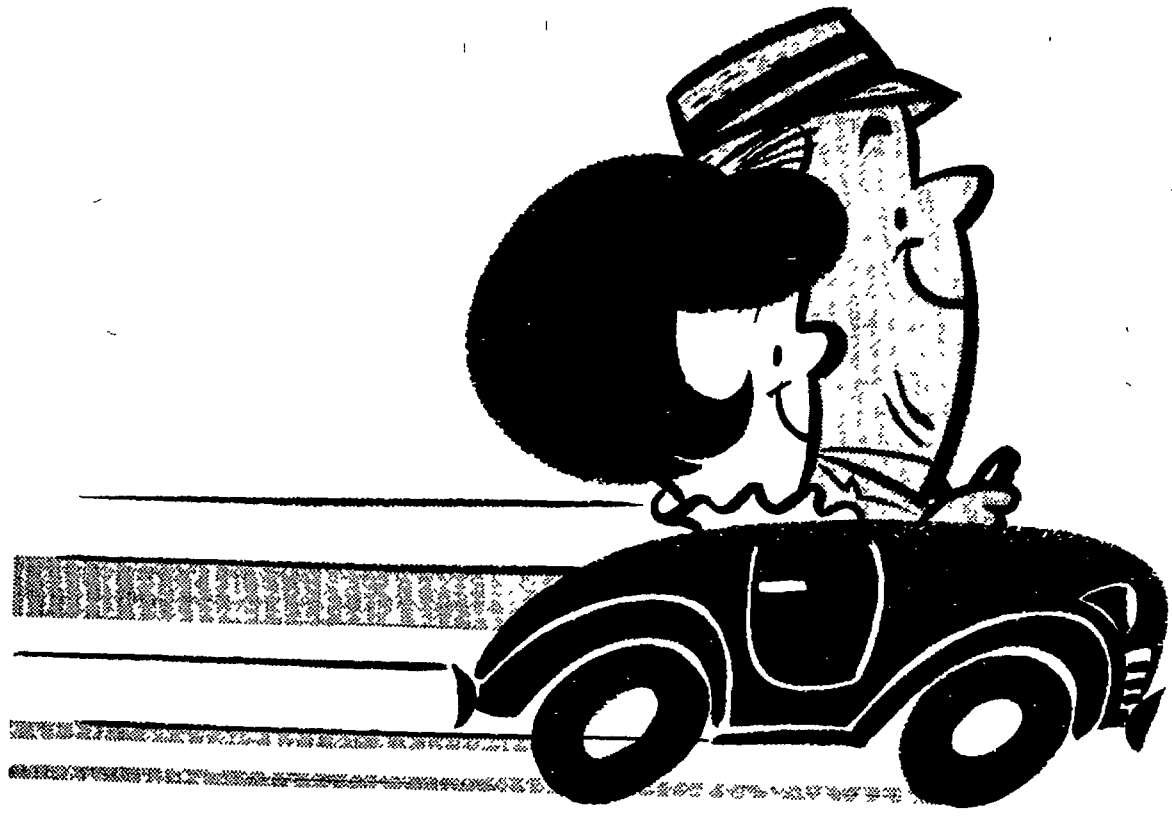

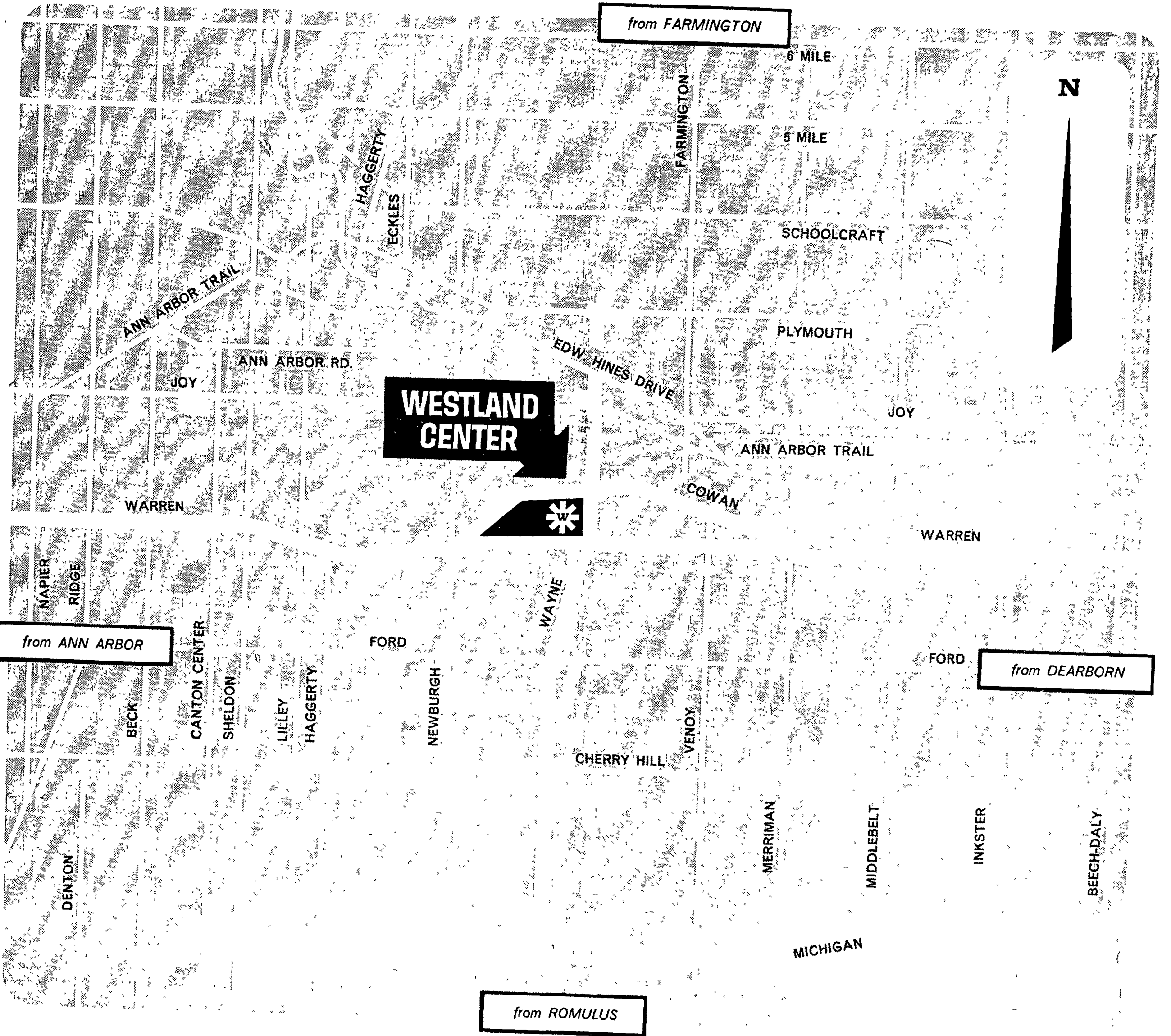

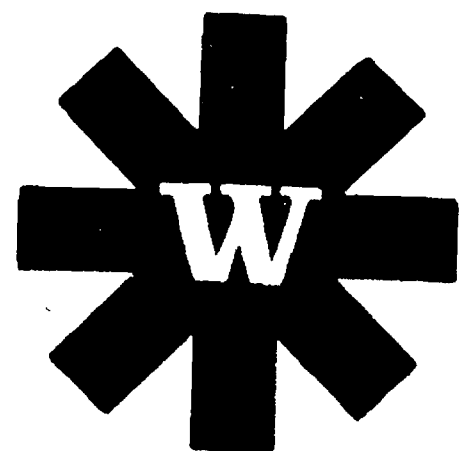

It turns out that winning passage of the \$500,000 bond issue for a new swimming pool was far easier than deciding where to build the facility.

Northville school board members must be convinced of this by now.

For more than two hours Monday night they listened to experts, read an advisory report from their architect and tossed around observations of their own.

At the outset there seemed to be two possibilities: either build the pool at the present high school or the new junior high school.

When the evening was over, neither proposal had won a clear-cut decision. What's more, two other suggestions were born... and by that time no one could say whether the advocates were serious or just grasping for alternatives.

One of the experts said "if I were a member of the Northville board of education, I'd vote to take the \$500,000 and build three smaller pools, one in each of the elementary schools."

Trustee Bob Shafer, obviously not enchanted by that thought, said he was ready to build the pool on a track and "move it back and forth between the junior and senior high".

The board was reminded by the expert on school plant planning that the board's decision would have long-range implications.

"Put on your big hat for this one", he urged the board.

It was his contention that this was a "system" decision that would attract and reject certain people to the area. He suggested that a pool in the junior high school might mean that when a second, or third, junior high school is needed a pool must be included.

He placed great emphasis on its importance to the system. And he pointed out that in Ann Arbor, where planning for a third high school is underway, no thought is being given to dropping the swimming pool, although space proposed for the building must be cut back sharply to keep within finances.

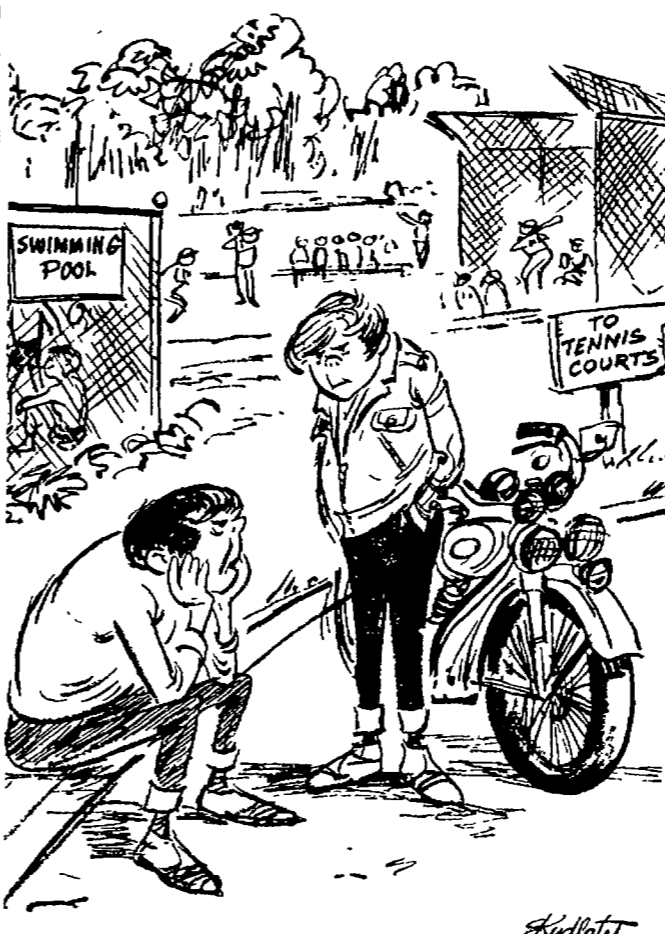

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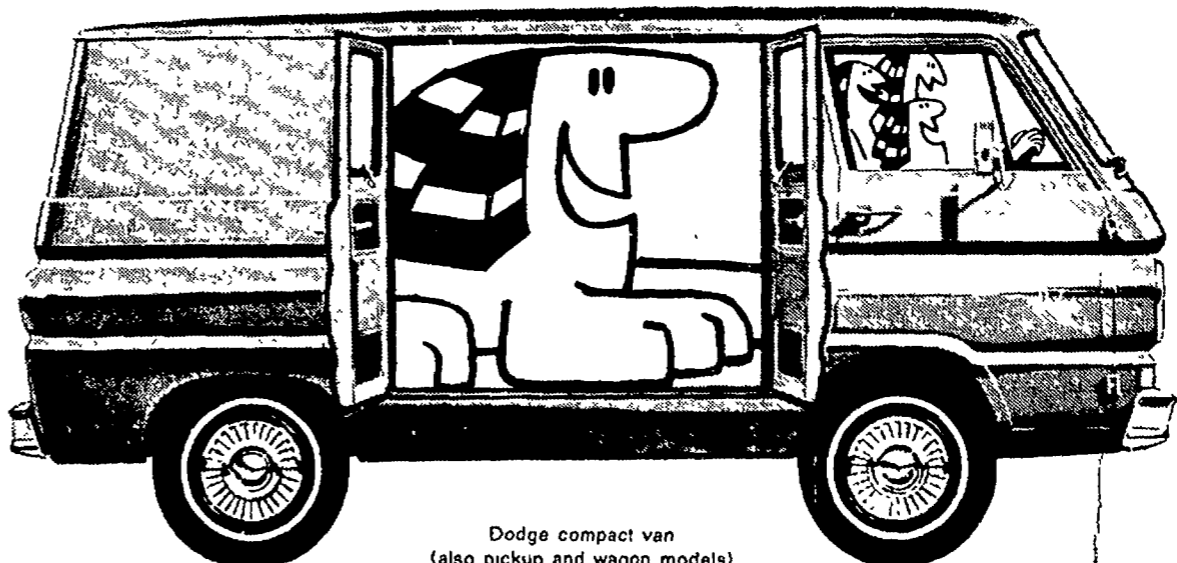
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
