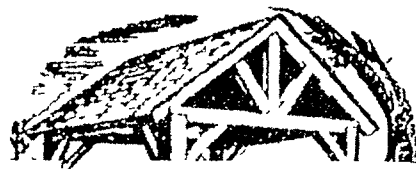


Autumn morning

Master plan lauded, ripped

Criticized as "a developer's dream and a taxpayer's nightmare," the proposed Master Plan of Land Use in Northville Township took its knocks October 17.

But the plan, which was developed by the planning commission over the past two years, received an equal amount of praise from the some 45 people attending the public hearing.

The planning commission listened attentively to all that was said, occasionally responding to statements made by audience members.

William Bohan, chairman of the planning commission, gave an interview of the plan and explained how it differed from the current plan, adopted in 1973.

"During our two years of review, various elements of the community and surrounding communities were studied in relationship to their effect upon Northville Township," he explained. "In addition, a policy statement which reflects overall guidelines for present and future development was established by the planning commission."

The statement says, in part: "... it is the intent of the township, through its land use plan, to limit office and business uses primarily for the convenience needs of its residents and to limit industrial use patterns to those geographical areas of the township wherein conflict with adjacent residential development areas will be minimized."

"These nonresidential uses, where established by plan, should be developed in such a way as to prevent negative impact upon abutting streets, adjacent residential areas and the general environment. It is the intent of the township to encourage the provision of recreational opportunities for present and future residents of the township..."

Following the chairman's remarks, the meeting was opened to the audience for comments.

Janchick quits as administrator

The Northville school district is seeking a new administrative assistant for maintenance and operations to replace Michael Janchick, who requested a transfer from that post to a teaching position last week.

Superintendent of Schools Larry Nichols told the board of education Monday night that the post would be advertised within the school district, in other districts and in the industrial sector.

School maintenance and operations have been plagued with problems and have been a sore spot with both board members and the community.

Nichols said an acting administrative assistant will be named next week while a new person is being sought for the job.

Janchick has been with the Northville

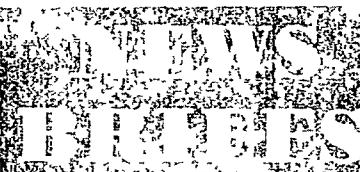

OPENING NIGHT for Jackson-at-Northville downs didn't keep pace with last year's harness racing start, but it didn't do badly. Betting was off \$50,000 with a total mutuel handle of \$432,996, while attendance was only slightly off at 3,204 fans. But the track was proclaimed in "never better" shape despite rain that fell midway through the cards. Times were fast.

A PUBLIC FORUM for Northville City Council candidates will be held Monday instead of tomorrow night, The League of Women Voters has announced. The change in the meeting was made because of a conflict with Thursday's annual Northville Chamber of Commerce dinner program. Monday's forum, which will give voters an opportunity to see and hear council candidates, will get underway at 7:30 p.m. in the city hall.

ROPE used by a firm to pull TV instruments through city sewers for inspection purposes was responsible for a sewer back-up that caused several hundred dollars damage to the carpeting in a Northville house. The rope, according to DPW Superintendent Ted Mapes, apparently broke off and was never retrieved. It clogged the line, causing the blockage. A bill is being sent the firm by the city for reimbursement of the damage.

DeHoCo renovation gets underway here

Extensive renovation of the former Detroit House of Correction (DeHoCo) on Five Mile in Northville Township will begin in early November, state officials said this week.

Contract for the project was awarded October 19 to Schiller Construction of Detroit, whose representatives were on the site Monday.

The former women's prison will be converted into a facility housing some 320 inmates—50 minimum security prisoners and some 270 medium security prisoners.

The project, which will cost in the area of \$3.8 million, should be completed by May, 1980, officials said.

The 50-year-old prison, formerly owned by the City of Detroit, was closed in August, 1977 after the state terminated its two-year lease with Detroit and the Huron Valley Women's facility near Ypsilanti was opened.

The state purchased the prison buildings and 159.4 acres of land for \$1.6 million.

State officials explained that the renovated facility will house a "special kind of prisoner" who will be at the prison for only a short period of time.

The minimum security prisoners will participate in the work pass program run by the state and the medium security inmates will be mostly parole violators awaiting revocation hearings, officials said.

The majority of the prisoners, officials said, will be at the prison for only six months to a year.

Educational programming will be offered to the inmates. It will consist of short courses in high school composition, job-seeking skills and job placement.

There has been some discussion of locating a prison industry on the site in the future.

Prison security will be greatly increased, according to officials, and will include two chain-link fences separated by concertina wiring and an electric detection system.

A superintendent is expected to be named soon.

The state also has chosen Northville Township as the site for its first

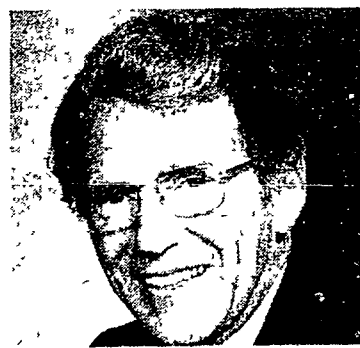
To air county problem

It's no trick, M-14 will open Halloween

The new M-14 Freeway connecting Plymouth and Ann Arbor will "Open All the Way" with public dedication ceremonies next Wednesday, October 31, the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) announced.

MDOT Director John P. Woodford and Michigan Transportation Commissioner Weston E. Vivian of Ann Arbor will join children representing Plymouth, Ann Arbor and Northville to cut the ribbon at noon. The freeway will be opened to traffic about two hours later when barricades along the route have been removed.

The public is invited to the ceremonies, which will be conducted in the eastbound lanes of M-14 at the Beck interchange.

The final 12-mile leg of the freeway was built by the Holloway Construction Company, C. A. Hull Company, Walter Toebe & Company, M & B Contracting

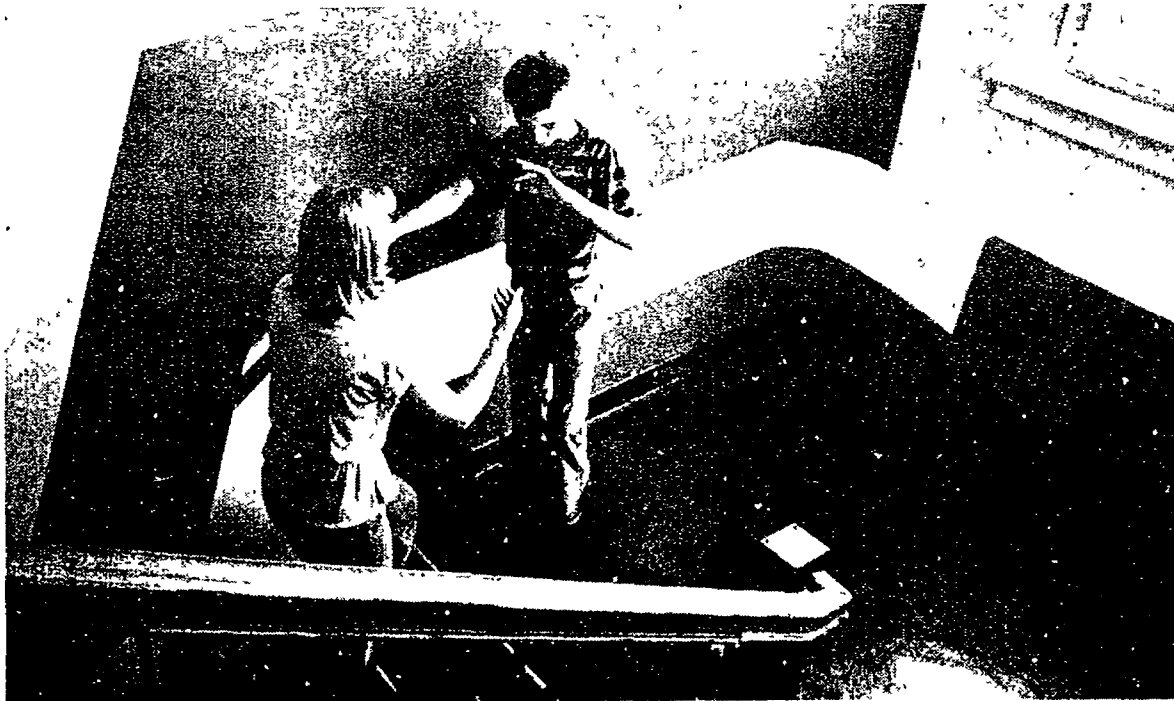
Corp., and Eisenhour Construction Company, at a cost of \$34,624,409.

The new freeway is located just north of the existing M-14. It extends six miles on either side of the Washtenaw-Wayne County Line, connecting with existing M-14 at Griswold Road on the west and I-275 northeast of Plymouth on the east.

The freeway is six lanes between I-275 and the Beck interchange and four lanes along the remainder of the route. It includes 23 bridge structures and interchanges at Voorheis, Gotfredson, Beck and Sheldon roads.

Work on the final segment began in 1976. Its completion will relieve traffic on Eight Mile and Ford and on I-94, including fans traveling to Ann Arbor for University of Michigan football games.

The Plymouth Chamber of Commerce will sponsor the October 31 ribbon-cutting ceremony. Federal, state and local officials have been invited.

What now for ISEP?

At the very worst, ISEP would be cut back drastically. At best, ISEP could survive as it is.

But what is definite is that Northville's Institutions' Special Education Program, a sterling example of education for the handicapped in Michigan, will be affected by a recent court settlement which is scheduled to move all but

100 residents out of Plymouth Center by 1983.

ISEP Director Leonard Resmierski criticized the recent decree issued by United States District Judge Charles Joiner, saying that the community aid system is not yet prepared for such quick movement.

"Community placements are right, at the right time," Resmierski said. But he worries that the judge's decree has

been made without full regard for the consequences.

Basically, the judge's decree was the result of a suit brought by The Michigan Association for Retarded Citizens against the State of Michigan and officials of Plymouth Center. The decree calls for moving, in stages, 480 of the 580 patients at Plymouth Center to

Among school goals

Educational audit a district goal

Northville school district will develop the concept of an "educational audit" to determine the quality of the educational program here, Superintendent Larry Nichols told the Northville Board of Education Monday night.

The concept was among 28 goals announced by Nichols for the 1979-80 school year.

The goals were developed by Nichols and the Board of Education. All of the goals have definite completion dates. Nichols will be evaluated by the board on their accomplishment.

Among the major goals besides the "educational audit" will be completing the reorganization of district administration, K-12 and ISEP fiscal consolidation and exploring alternatives to the open campus at the high school.

Nichols also said he hopes to survey parents who have taken their children out of the school district to find out the reasons, and to develop and implement a long-range equipment repair/replacement plan for the district.

Nichols outlined the following goals in the area of instructional improvement:

- Reinforce the recently implemented process of program analysis
- "curriculum mapping" in language arts, science, social studies, health, and mathematics which will identify strong and weak areas in curriculum. A report with recommendations will be made by May, 1980, Nichols said;
- Examine time allocations for each subject taught in the elementary programs;
- Pursue an "educational audit" idea, to inform community, board, students and staff about the level of quality in the Northville program. The audit might include overall program expectations of the district, district demographic data, program test results and community socio-economic data, Nichols said.

In the area of safety and health of students, Nichols' goals include:

- Complete the implementation of the health education program;
- Implement a district-wide safety inspection program of all equipment used in the school district;
- Develop and implement a K-12 anti-smoking campaign.

Nichols hopes to develop and recommend a way of keeping an equipment inventory and begin to replace and maintain equipment in home

economics and industrial arts, business machines and band instruments. He also said he will make a formal examination of the long-range facility needs of the district and implement a plan for beautification of school sites.

Nichols said the survey of parents who have taken their children out of the district will be completed by February.

He said he will be examining the high school "open campus" and will develop alternatives and recommendations for board consideration by April.

He plans to develop and implement a graduate follow-up survey for the district to trace what happens to NHS graduates.

He also will be reviewing the high school attendance policy during the school year and will have a report and recommendations to the board during the summer of 1980.

Goals dealing with management and organization include:

- Complete and implement the district administrative reorganization plan with a report to the board by November (Nichols got the go-ahead from the board in September to reorganize the top-level district administration.)
- Provide additional opportunities for staff involvement in the decision-making processes;
- Work with staff and board to develop a different base for a compensation program for the central office administrators.

Nichols had several goals dealing with financial responsibility. He plans to:

- Clarify fiscal authority control of building administrators, giving them more autonomy;
- Blend the ISE and K-12 fiscal operations;
- Examine potential of a computer financial forecasting system;
- Seek ways of maintaining district cost-efficiency by joint purchases with other districts and submission of applications for federal funding;
- Develop recommendations for the district's investment policy.

Board approves ISEP budget

A 1979-80 Institutions' Special Education Program (ISEP) budget of six million dollars was approved by the Northville Board of Education Monday night.

ISEP expenditures this year are estimated at \$6,773,385, up \$759,150 from the 1978-79 actual expenditures of \$6,014,235.

ISEP spent almost \$400,000 less last year than it was budgeted. The 1978-79 approved budget was \$6,402,981.

All ISEP money comes from the state. No ISEP money is taken from local school funds. The ISEP program is independent of the regular special education program in Northville's K-12 schools.

This year there are only 434 ISEP students, down from 616 last year. The 12½ percent increase in this year's budget is due to several causes.

The Annex building on Main is being renovated. The district consolidated students from two ISEP schools in Dearborn Heights into one school, Bryant, in Livonia.

Though the numbers of students are down, the teacher/student ratio remains low. This year the ratio will be one teacher to six and a half students, compared with last year's ratio of one teacher to eight students, Superintendent Larry Nichols told the board.

The teacher/student ratio depends on the type of handicapped students in the program. Those ratios are set by the state, Nichols said. ISEP takes all kinds of students from the severely and profoundly retarded with multiple handicaps to those with mental impairments.

ISEP serves residents of the Plymouth Center for Human Development and the Northville Residential Training Center. Northville has conducted the program since 1975.

This year ISEP will employ 72 special education teachers and 132 special education aides.

ISEP will spend \$604,480 this year on occupational and physical therapists, nurses, psychologists, speech, language and computer specialists.

ISEP will spend \$555,298 on operating outside facilities at the three ISEP schools: Bryant, the Annex, and Burger in Garden City.

Utilities and custodian costs are estimated at \$80,000 this year as compared with \$34,384 in actual expenditures last year.


ISEP transportation costs will increase. The budget estimates gas, oil and grease for ISEP buses will cost \$35,000, an \$18,000 increase over last year.

The total cost of food service will be \$143,000, the budget estimates, up \$19,108 from last year.

The ISEP budget does not include the regular special education program conducted within the Northville schools K-12 program.

In addition to the six million dollar ISEP budget, a severely mentally impaired program run at Wayne County Center and administered by the Northville School District has been budgeted at \$235,300, up \$31,386 from last year's actual expense of \$203,914.

The Wayne County program employs five teachers and ten teacher aides.

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
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
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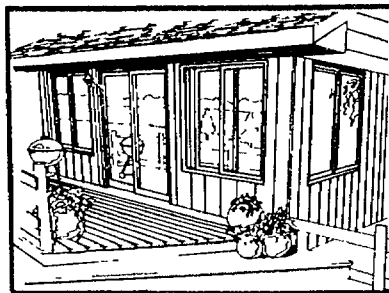
Spooky spiders

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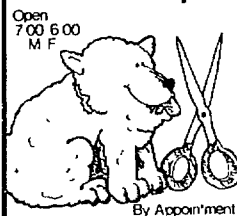


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Meet Your Firemen

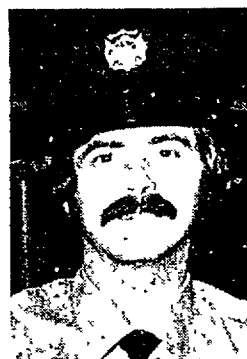

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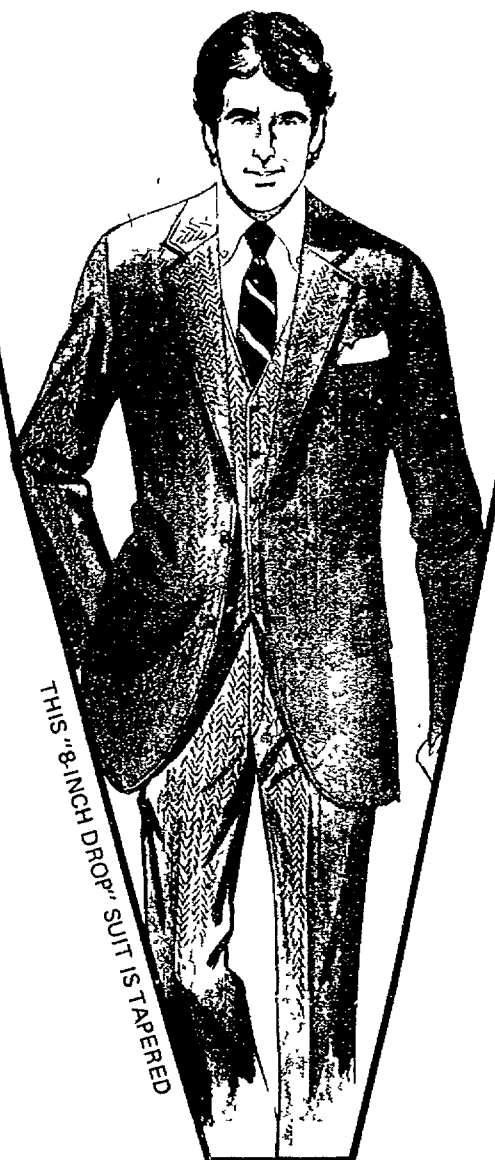

Fine arts music series opens

audience will hear several forms of music and through commentary discover those features that have sustained the music through history. Narration for the first concert will be given by Charles Greenwell.

Jazz performed by the Brookside Jazz Ensemble, with commentary by Gary Laehn, will be featured on December 1 followed by another group of Detroit Symphony members performing music for the chamber orchestra on March 1.

Choral music will be featured in the concluding concert set on the stage of Novi High School on May 3.

The four-concert series is priced at \$16 for adults, \$10 for senior citizens and students. Individual concert tickets are priced at \$5 for adults, \$3 for seniors and students.

If individual concert tickets are requested, the choice should be indicated by the date of the concert. Tickets will also be available at the door on the night of the concert.

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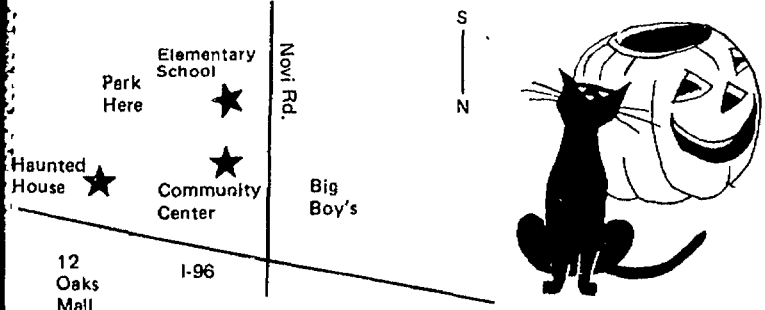
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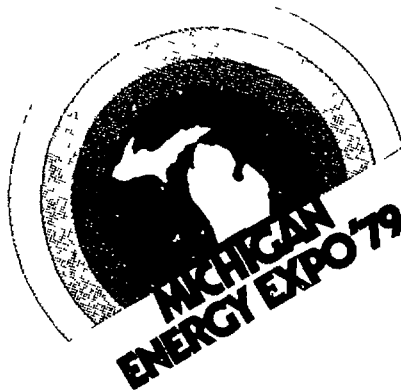
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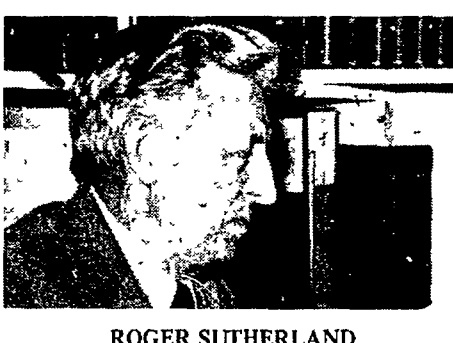
Payless pay days rack Wayne

Wayne County is broke and today cannot meet a regular scheduled payday for the first time in its history.
 Attention focuses on steps taken this week.
 Yesterday afternoon (Tuesday) the board of commissioners was to consider a plan approved Thursday by the Ways and Means Committee which would layoff all 5,300 employees at once and recall only a skeleton work force to maintain a "caretaker" operation except for the most vital departments.
 Also on Thursday, Council 25 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME) filed a lawsuit against the board of commissioners, treasurer and board of auditors which was to be heard yesterday by Circuit Court Judge Irwin H. Burdick.
 When the suit was filed, Judge Burdick immediately ordered against paying employees with scrip, a suggestion also rejected by the Ways and Means Committee.
 Between 3,100 and 3,300 employees were not paid and about 2,300 to 2,400 others face a payless payday Friday,

with pay on time dubious for either group until sometime after the beginning of the new fiscal year, December 1.
 About half the county payroll is due each week, part for the county general hospital and sheriff's department one week, and the next week for the rest paid from the general fund.
 Sheriff's department and hospital employees are due for pay again on October 26.
 Eugene Guido, regional director of Council 25 and a former resident of Northville Township, said the union is urging employees to continue working without pay until the matter is resolved in court. Even if most are willing, however, there remains the question of how long a court decision might take, and whether the county is financially able to meet court orders.
 Part of the AFSCME suit would prohibit the expenditure of "any monies whatsoever until wages are paid," but this would contradict a writ of mandamus already issued by Circuit Court Judge Richard D. Dunn ordering all revenue impounded until after \$1.5 million is collected for continuation of

the courts.
 The county office of corporation counsel plans to appeal Dunn's order which, along with other expected legal complexities, will add further to the delay.
 A section of the plan the board was to consider yesterday would waive the two-week notice of layoff required by union contract. According to Board Chairman Richard E. Manning, layoff notices could be sent within two days after such a waiver is negotiated. Employees are ineligible for unemployment compensation until a formal layoff notice is received.
 Also according to the plan and as far as funds or contract agreements will allow, operations will continue as-is at the county jail, county youth home, D. J. Healy Center, and the office of the medical examiner. Staff at the general hospital would be reduced sufficiently to care for only the emergency room and 100 inpatients.
 The only other units that would be excluded from layoffs are the "enterprise funded" operations — meaning those that are self-funding — such as the

department of public works and others funded from state or federal sources. These employees, about 350, were also the only ones paid.
 In its suit the union, in addition, asked for the county to pay interest incurred by employees from borrowing as a result of the payless payday, and in a separate appeal to the State Department of Labor asked for "full penalties of the law" which would require the county to:
 — Pay all wages due.
 — Pay a 10 percent penalty on wages and fringe benefits due.
 — Pay "exemplary damages" equal to twice the amount of wages and fringes due.
 — Pay a \$1,000 civil penalty for each violation for each employee.
 The union also asked State Attorney General Frank J. Kelly to bring criminal charges against the board of commissioners and to begin an investigation of Governor Milliken.
 In a letter to Kelly, Guido called Milliken "equally responsible" and on Thursday he urged the board to sue the state for monies owed the county.

Schoolcraft gets Audubon books

The Michigan Audubon Society's official reference library was moved to Schoolcraft College this fall where it is now located in the biology department.
 The collection, which had been housed at Central Michigan University, includes periodicals dating to the early 1900s, many books, pamphlets and files covering a large range of natural history and conservation studies.
 While there are no regular hours, the library is open to society members, educators and students, and to other persons on a contact basis.
 Persons interested may contact Roger Sutherland, its librarian, or his colleague, Grover Niergarth. Both are directors of the Michigan Audubon Society. Sutherland is currently state chairman of its education committee and Niergarth chairs its activities committee.
 The agreement bringing the collection to Schoolcraft was signed by President C. Nelson Grote on September 30. It provides for the library to be at the college for at least five years.

The meeting will be held at the Board of Education offices at Main Street Elementary school at 7:30 p.m. Copies of the proposed budget will be available late Friday afternoon or Monday morning at the school board offices. Copies will also be available Monday night. This will be the fourth and final reading of this year's budget.

NORTHVILLE'S DAN Conder, 21, also finished the Free Press International Marathon October 14 but was overlooked in last week's Record list of Northville finishers. Dan placed 2,076th in the 26-mile race with a time of 4:02:32.

GOOD TIME FOR WINE

Traditionally, wine has been named by the kind of grape that goes into it. It does not matter where the grape originally came from, as long as the grape goes into that wine. Another way that wines are named are from their place of origin. So we have the Burgundy, Chablis, Moselle, Bordeaux, etc. But what is confusing is that wines bearing a similarity in taste to these may be named the same though not come from the same region. So we have Chilean Burgundy, California Chablis, and Australian Moselle.

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Another taxing scheme appears to have met a quick death in Michigan's Legislature. And well it should.

House Bill 4712 would impose a 10 cent tax on all checks cashed in Michigan. Specifically, the measure would levy the tax on any check, draft, cashier check, travellers check, money order, share draft, certificate of deposit or electronic fund transfer when it is presented to a bank, credit union or savings and loan with those financial institutions acting — in effect — as the state's tax collector.

The tax would be collected when the negotiable item is presented to the financial institution for collection or payment.

However, since retail stores would be taxed as individuals when cashing checks written to them by customers, those stores would be allowed to pass along the tax to their shoppers.

Representative George Montgomery (D-Democrat), the bill's sponsor, said the measure would help fund the Home Heating Program.

While I share Representative Montgomery's concern over providing home heating assistance to some 200,000 senior citizens and 80,000 low income families, I don't agree with his method.

House Bill 4712 is another means of taxing the citizens of Michigan. There are many things wrong with the bill.

— The 10 cents fee would be imposed on those not incurring any profit or transferring anything of value to another party.

— It would lessen the consumers' purchasing power by forcing businesses which receive large numbers of checks to raise their prices to cover the 10 cent tax.

— It would endanger the safety of senior citizens by forcing them to carry larger amounts of money to buy merchandise in stores which no longer would accept checks. This would make the senior citizens more susceptible to robberies.

— Business would be forced to raise the price of goods and services to cover the overhead costs of acting as a collection agency for the state.

— It would place another unnecessary state revenue collecting function on business operators.

— It would be another in a long line of "deterrents" to attracting business to Michigan.

At a time when Michigan's economy is already faltering and our business is subject to costs not borne by business in other states, we can hardly afford to place additional burdens on it.

Likewise, individual consumers like you and I already pay taxes on nearly every aspect of life. This latest idea attempts to bring one of the few untouched areas under the big taxing umbrella.

If my colleagues in the Legislature were more careful on how they spent existing revenues, not only would this additional tax not be needed, but taxes imposed on other aspects of daily life could also be lifted.

Obviously, I don't feel this tax is necessary. I feel it would be better for the citizens of Michigan to work within our already existing budget to fund this and other programs rather than always raising taxes or adding new ones.

However, if a tax increase should be needed to fund home heating assistance, it would be better to utilize the present tax structure instead of imposing a new "nuisance" tax which would demand additional costs for implementation.

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

Group forms

"We Care"

A community group called "We Care" has been formed by a dozen Northville residents to work for improvement in the school system here.

"We feel there is a problem in our educational system in Northville," said Nick Serkaian, chairman of the newly-formed committee. "We are concerned about the curriculum, the maintenance and the discipline in our schools and the waste of taxpayers' money."

Serkaian said a letter to the editor which was published recently in the Record criticizing the school system's progress elicited immediate responses from parents, teachers, students and administrators. The committee was formed Friday.

The group's members attended the Board of Education meeting Monday and plan to meet every week and attend every board meeting, Serkaian said.

"We are not forming to create problems," he said. "We are here to make suggestions and give ideas as to how we feel about problems in the school district. We want to know where this district's priorities lie."

Specifically, Serkaian said that his group feels the school system is low on morale.

"Nothing has changed. In fact it has gotten worse (since Ray Spear resigned as superintendent)," Serkaian said. He worked to oust Spear in 1977.

"The maintenance is worse. The curriculum—there is not enough in the sciences, engineering or medicine. And the discipline—two of seven hours at the high school, the kids have free time. Our concern is that our children have good learning in a safe environment."

Serkaian said the group's ultimate goal is to have "the community back up the schools. We have only one high school and two junior highs. They should be our pride and glory, not our shame," he said.

He said many parents have turned their backs on the schools and that his group will take a "real interest" in the goings-on in the school district.

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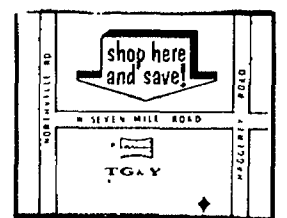

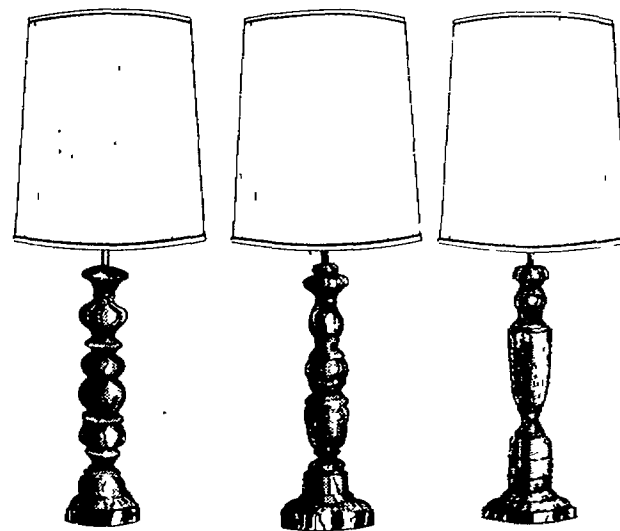

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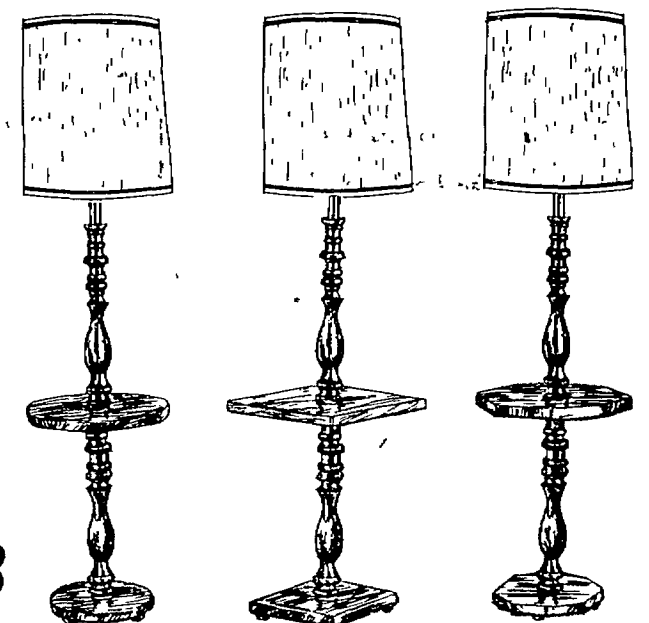

(c) VIOLATIONS — Any person that brings any child within the fenced area or any other area owned or leased by the owners and lessees of Northville Downs Raceway (Barn Area and Paddock excepted) in violation of the foregoing provisions of this Ordinance or who aids or abets any child in the violation of said provisions shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this Ordinance.

regional prison.

The proposed 550-bed facility is scheduled to be built in three to five years near the renovated prison.

The former Wayne County Child Development Center was the site originally chosen for the regional prison, but after experiencing substantial citizen protest, the state decided against that location.

Preparation for the renovation of the DeHoCo buildings is being done by work crews from Camp Waterloo in Jackson County.

The minimum security prisoners are paid \$1.75 a day for their work.

By allowing the prisoners to do the prep work—cleaning out the old cottages and stripping chipped paint from the walls—the state estimates it will save some \$30,000 in labor costs.

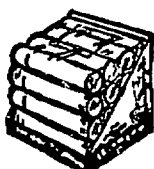
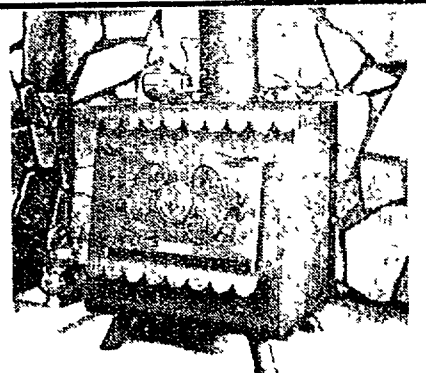

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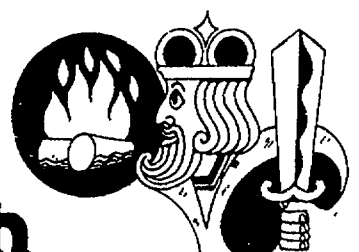


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SPEAKING for *The Record*

You can expect one of these days to be able to press a button in your home and call for whatever section of the newspaper you would like to view on your in-house terminal. Or, if you'd like something to hang onto, you will be able to simply call for a hard copy reproduction.

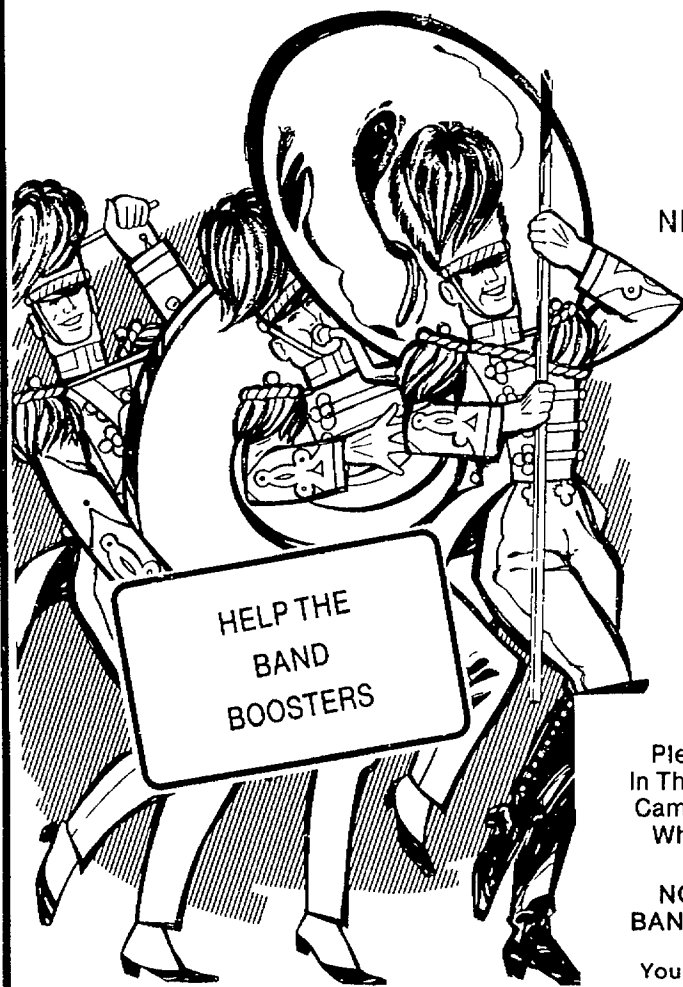
Just like its media brothers — radio and TV — newspapers will have solved the home delivery problem.

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Speaking for Myself

Is Susan B. worth it?

YES

When the Susan B. Anthony dollar first came out in July there was interest in it strictly from a curiosity standpoint. People wanted to see what it looked like.

Since then we have found transactions of the new silver dollar are just about nil. From businesses we might get two a day. People won't take them from the tellers.

But the Treasury Department has asked banks to distribute them for economic reasons.

It is estimated that producing Anthony dollars rather than the old, large Eisenhower dollar will generate a savings of at least \$4.5 million annually.

Additional savings will be realized since the dollar bill costs nearly two cents to produce and lasts only 18 months in circulation.

The new dollar coin will cost three cents to produce and will last 15 or more years in good condition. In the long run the cost of minting the coins is less than printing dollar bills.

Anthony dollars have benefits for the retail, finan-

cial communities, and the consumer.

For the retailer they can save time and reduce error at the cash register. Anthony dollars eliminate the need for removal of worn and torn bills from circulation for the banker. And for the consumer the coin is easy to carry with other coins since it allows them to avoid fumbling in both sections of the wallet or purse. Unlike bills, coins will not stick together when new and will not tear when old.

Like most U.S. coins the Anthony dollar is a copper-nickel clad coin, a composition which has many advantages such as superior surface wear and appearance.

So far our patrons have largely shunned the coin, but spending an Anthony dollar could save the country money in the long run.

According to A & P policy the dollar coin is to be accepted as legal tender, and employees have been encouraged to become familiar with it.

To facilitate this they were made aware of the July release of the Anthony dollar, the coin which bears the image of Susan B. Anthony, an early pioneer for women's suffrage. All employees were notified of the coin's unique features which included an 11-sided inner border designed to distinguish it from other coins.

We have been told the federal reserve is encouraging acceptance and use of the coins as it implements plans to eliminate the dollar bill from circulation.

Our cashiers watch for them carefully because the coins so closely resemble quarters. If there is a problem with the coins it is that they are too easily confused with the quarter. The new dollar is too small.

But as a retailer the dollar does not present a lot of problems, primarily because people simply are not using it.

The coins just don't show up in our daily transactions. We don't give them out because people don't want them. Many customers don't like to handle them, some just want to save them.

A lot of people come in and when they are cashing a check will ask for the Anthony dollar. But they are mainly collectors.

Some people come in and ask to buy a couple of the coins either for birthday gifts or to give them to grandchildren.

We have heard some complaints from older people who can't see well who don't like the smaller coin. But for the most part there haven't been complaints because nobody is using them.

The Susan B. Anthony dollar is just the wrong size.

Since its inception, "Speaking for Myself," our editorial page feature, has been most reading for many of our subscribers.

The wide-ranging mini debates, however, are not always powerful or persuasive. Sometimes even topics offering great potential turn out to be flops. (See Letter to the Editor.)

Generally, here is how Speaking for Myself is produced:

Suggestions by staffers and readers (we encourage suggested topics by readers) are assigned to each editorial staffer employed by the Sliger Home Newspapers, with a specific publication date for each.

Assignments are made well in advance of publication so sometimes a topic is no longer "timely" by the time it reaches publication.

Sometimes finding someone who has a firm position and who is willing to take that position in print is not so easy. Sometimes it is an impossibility and a substitute topic or substitute debaters must be found.

And sometimes the search for willing and capable writers of equal stature is more interesting than the topic itself. Take next week's topic, for example. Finding debaters was my assignment. The topic: "Is nuclear energy necessary?"

"This topic's a snap," I thought as I rang up Senator Ted Kennedy's office to request the negative side. Trying for the positive side, I contacted Senator John Glenn's office. Certainly, I thought, an astronaut will boost nuclear energy. But his office declined. "The senator is not willing to do that at this time," I was advised by an aide, who apologized and referred me to the Nuclear Energy Proliferation Committee in Washington, D.C.

Back to the negative side. Senator Don Riegle's Flint office referred me to the senator's Livonia office where the manager said she would contact Washington and that one of Riegle's aides would get back to me that same day.

The Nuclear Energy Proliferation Committee said it was willing to write but only on behalf of a specific senator whose consent I would have

Calls township multi-ring circus

To the Editor:
When the circus came to town a few days ago, P.T. Barnum stayed in Northville Township, and with the assistance of many of his performers, began to play the tune about the merits of tax increases. In one ring we have the township attorney, claiming the Headlee Amendment will protect us from an immediate millage increase, if the township board adopts a charter township incorporation by resolution. This is sheer speculation and opinion on his part, because the amendment is vague about this subject. No court decisions have emerged to provide mandatory authority for substantiating such a claim.

As we have seen, the township board sits in the middle ring, behind closed doors, secretly seeking to vote, by resolution, incorporation as a charter township. I have a copy of the form re-

quired for the resolution of intent to become a charter township. Why didn't the board publish this form prior to the meeting?

In the third ring, township employees should be jumping with joy, about the implications of a charter township, because it will be easier for them to receive group insurance and retirement benefits under the proposal. To secure these benefits, the board, in a charter township, may enact the appropriate ordinance or amend the charter. (Op. Atty. Gen. 1974, No. 4818, p. 155)

On the far right, we have the township planning commissioners pondering about a definition of public interest vs. private interest, in the hearing about the proposed master plan. This group of merry men have developed a reverse Robin Hood Plan, whereby the poor taxpayers of the township will eventually be forced to pay additional taxes to support necessary services demanded by escalating commercial growth. Two Daniels were caught in the lion's den, but someday the wisdom of our position will be realized. Clearly, the proposed master plan is a vital part of the charade leading to pressure for a charter township or incorporation as a city.

The cumulative effect of observing this circus would be very amusing, if the scenario would serve the needs of taxpayers. However, the opposite conclusion must be reached, because the price of admission continues to escalate, when we allow the clowns to entertain us, while the politicians pick our pockets. Fortunately, the circus comes to town only once a year, but we need to get our boots on in Northville Township to protect ourselves from the quack and increased taxes.

to obtain. They gave me the names of three "pro" senators: Senators James A. McClure and Frank Church of Idaho and H. John Heinz, III of Pennsylvania.

"If you had to guess which of the three would be willing to take a public position, who would you pick?" I asked. "Well McClure and Church are up for re-election so I'd guess Heinz," came the reply.

Back to the negative side.

"Listen, I was promised a call from Senator Riegle's office last week," I said. "I'm still waiting."

"We're sorry, but the office manager got sick and we had a little mix-up. We'll get back to you," the senator's staff said.

Back to the positive side.

"I'm sorry, but in view of the Three Mile Island incident in his home state, Senator Heinz is in the process of reassessing his position on nuclear energy," an aide said.

"But he was a strong proponent of nuclear energy wasn't he?" I pressed.

"I would say that isn't an unfair characterization," was the aide's reply.

Returning to Senator Riegle's office, I was told, "I'm sorry, Mr. Hoffman, the guy in Washington was to have called you yesterday. I don't know what happened. I do know the senator's been very busy with the Chrysler thing (request for loan). I'll do all I can."

"I'm sorry, this one we're going to have to beg off on," the aide of Senator Church said. "He's just too busy right now to even get him to sit down at a typewriter."

Church's aide suggested two "good alternatives": Senator Scoop Jackson and U.S. Representative Mike McCormack.

Scoop's Office transferred me four times (honest) before I finally landed his energy expert. "I'm afraid he and his staff are too bogged down to write anything. We just don't have the time."

Admittedly a little testy at this point, I persisted: "Look I'm not asking for a major policy paper, just 200 words in defense of nuclear energy. For goodness sake, you can sneeze that many words over the phone."

"That's the point," said Jackson's energy aide, 200 words just isn't enough to do justice to the topic. If it were longer..."

Sometimes, like Contact 10 or Action Line or other ombudsmen, a Slinger staffer gets desperate and turns to old reliable friends to get the job done. So I called Congressman Carl Pursell.

"I understand Mike McCormack is one of the strongest proponents of nuclear energy in Washington. Is he a friend? Okay, can you get him to take the positive side of this Speaking question?"

Later, "Hello, this is Senator Riegle's office. Sorry we didn't get back to you sooner. He can't do it today, but you can count on a statement by your deadline."

And that same day: "We're in luck; McCormack, the only scientist in Congress and probably the most knowledgeable elected official on the subject of nuclear energy, has agreed to write it," said Pursell's office.

So there you have it. Two heavyweights will square off on this page. Tune in next week to see if it's a hit or a flop.

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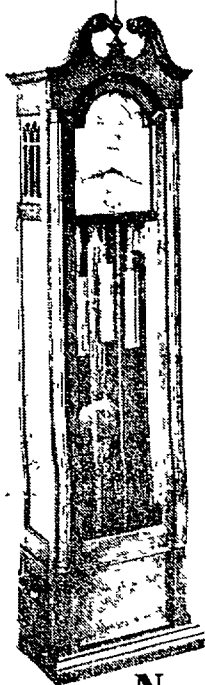

"We applaud your plan," said Mrs. Marge Riker, a resident of Northville Commons Subdivision.

She and others from the subdivision are concerned that a piece of property on Six Mile between Haggerty and Northville, which is currently zoned commercial, would end up with that use.

The group of residents has petitioned for a zoning change.

"We are happy to see that you have proposed the use of the property at that location as single family residential and we hope that is the way it will end up."

A resident opposed to the total plan was Larry VanderMolen.

"I plan to prove that this plan is a developer's dream and a taxpayer's nightmare," he said. "I don't really believe that this is a plan the commission is serious about."

"You are promoting huge growth which calls for increased taxes," he continued. "Any time you build more homes you need to provide more services and as time goes on we (the taxpayers) will be the ones who end up paying for it."

"I would like to see you abandon this plan and come up with one that is not so ambitious," he concluded.

Representing the League of Women Voters, Patricia Wright praised the planning commission for its efforts.

"We support efforts by local government to provide for citizen participation in its earliest possible planning and regulation stages and throughout the

planning process," she said. "We commend the planning commission."

J. J. Fiorilli questioned a number of items in the plan including sewer capacity and how it would affect future development.

"Is there enough cfs (cubic feet per second) in this community to handle development and when we reach 42,000 total population will the sewers be able to handle it?"

Chairman Bohan responded to the resident's inquiry as did Township Engineer William Mosher.

Bohan said it is obvious that the township does not currently have the capacity necessary to handle the future growth projected in the plan.

Engineer Mosher added, "Anyone who would stop long enough to think would realize that if the facilities are not there the growth is not going to occur."

"There are plans in the making which would make additional capacity available to us," he said. "If these plans materialize we will be in a position to acquire the capacity we need at about 20 percent of the total cost."

"Some 75 percent will be paid by the federal government and five percent by the state," he said. "But anyone with any sense knows that if you don't have facilities you don't get the population."

The planning commission will discuss all the comments made about the plan at its next regular meeting October 29. The commissioners may recommend it for adoption at that time or discuss it further at another meeting before coming to a decision.

small community homes by 1983.

Michigan law requires that all handicapped individuals must receive education until age 26. Each school district is required to provide education for special education students. Northville supplies the program for residents of Plymouth Center and the Northville Residential Training Center (on the grounds of Northville State Hospital.)

Resmierski is worried that residents are being hurried out of Plymouth Center into communities which as of yet have no adequate education for them. He worries that students moved to foster homes will lose their status as institutional residents and therefore the communities will not be able to get 100 percent funding for their education, placing 55 percent of the cost burden on the local community.

Resmierski is also concerned that there will not be adequate personnel to staff the many duplicate centers special education; and that moving too quickly may result in students being sent to foster parents who really do not want the responsibility but only the extra money.

He is worried that Northville's ISEP program will shrink and not be able to continue with programs such as an experimental age-26 educational program and other research programs.

Resmierski is particularly concerned that if communities are psychologically unprepared and have to have the financial burden of handicapped persons who are not normally residents of those communities that the communities may reject both the kids and the program.

Finally, he is worried that if the 11 ISEP programs across the state suddenly lose students to other communities, that money will be wasted by abandoning old facilities and having to duplicate the facilities elsewhere.

"We seem to be reacting to community pressure," Resmierski said. "We are reacting rather than acting...we are moving the kids like processed beef. Those kids belong with all of us; in our communities. But not overnight."

Resmierski said he hopes that students in the ISEP program will be placed in areas near their schools in Livonia, Garden City, Crestwood, Northville and Dearborn Heights where ISEP programs exist in Wayne County. He said, though, that many kids are being moved to Detroit.

Resmierski hopes that eventually the handicapped may be able to remain, if not in their real homes, at least within their own communities.

"Maybe we will learn to live with all the citizens in society because our community will be equipped to handle them," Resmierski said. "We have an obligation to service the least and lowest people in our civilization. And we are finally doing it. If we can help the least advanced, imagine what we can do for the most advanced," Resmierski said.

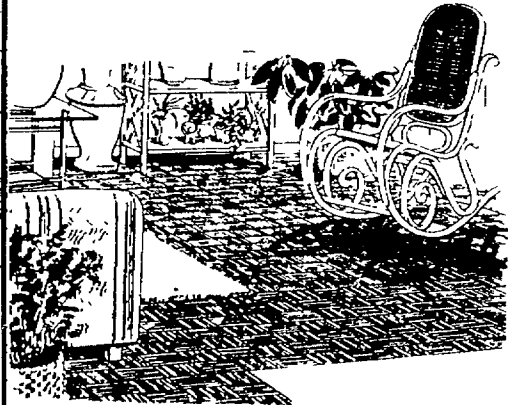

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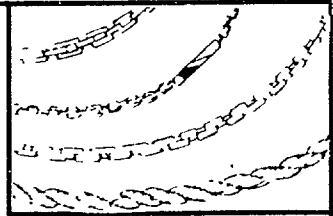
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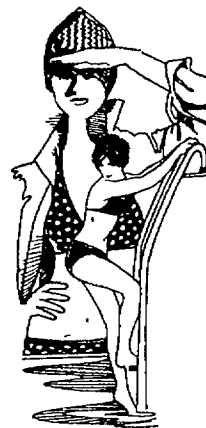
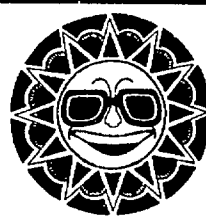
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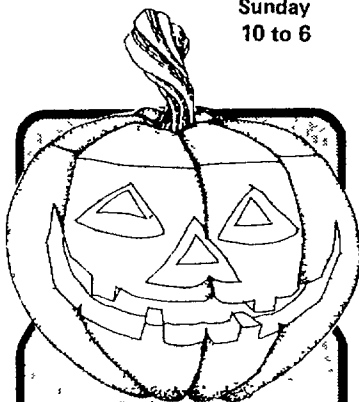
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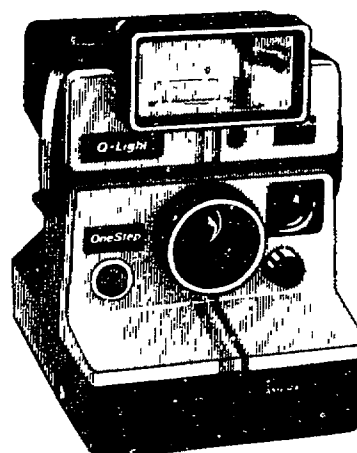
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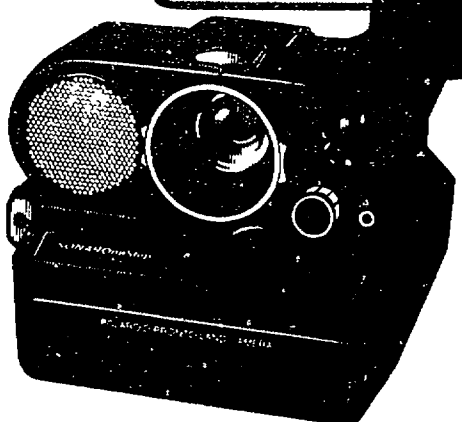
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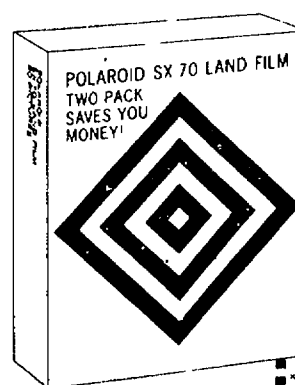
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Digging up the past

Workmen discover buried remains of 1865 school

In Northville old schools never die, they just get buried. Workers were digging behind the Annex building on Main last week to install new pipes. About six feet down, their bulldozers struck brick.

They kept digging and uncovered an old foundation and a basement. According to the construction supervisor, the basement is filled with desks and school memorabilia from the old Union School, built in 1865, which burned down in 1916.

That fire is too old for former superintendent of schools Russell Amerman to remember. He arrived in time to see another Northville school burn down in 1936.

But Amerman identified the current archeological bricks as the old Union school and explained that it was common practice to bury whatever was left after a fire and build something new on top.

"When the school burned down, they just swept everything into the

basement and built a new school above," Amerman said.

He said the same thing happened in another school fire in 1936 when workers threw everything they did not want into the basement and put a parking lot on top.

The Union school was Northville's first real brick school. It was built just behind and east of the present Annex building in 1865 for \$11,000. In 1907 when the population of Northville grew the district built another school perpendicular to and south of the Union school, on what was then West Street between Main and Cady.

In February of 1916 the Union School caught fire and burned down. In 1917 the Annex school was built. In January of 1936 the school on West Street burned down and in 1937 the Main Street Elementary school, which now houses the school district offices, was built.

This week workers will dig deeper behind the Annex to excavate the

remains of the Union School. They have to replace the junk with approved land fill so they can build a wheelchair ramp from the Annex door to the parking lot.

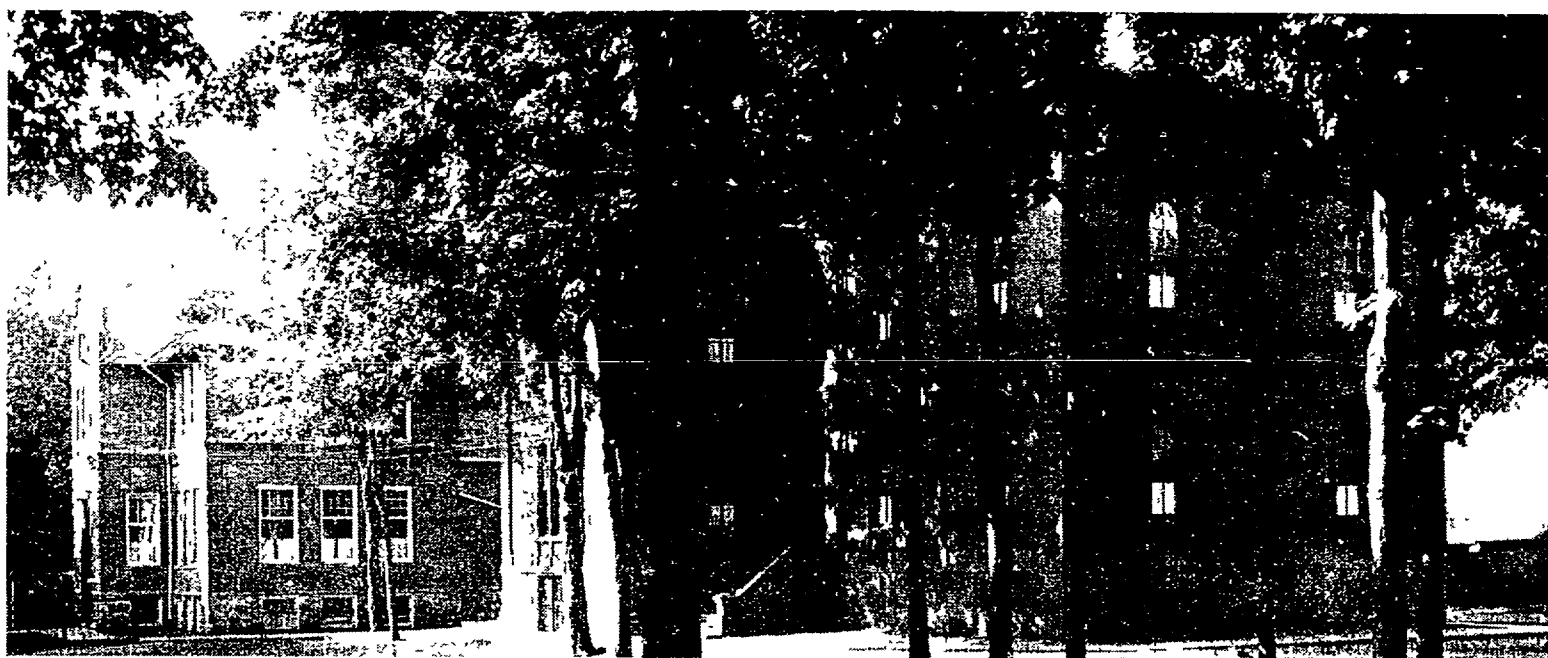
Construction company owner Dan Thomas said the digging they did revealed the brick foundation of the Union School, as well as charred remains of desks and heat pipes. He said nothing they had dug up was really salvageable.

The district is doing a million dollar renovation on the Annex, which had \$200,000 worth of renovation done on it in 1959. The Annex was originally built for just \$75,000.

Thomas said the intricate brick work which was done on the Annex cannot be duplicated because of the prohibitive cost. In the 1930s a company could send a bricklayer on the scene for 25 cents an hour. To send a bricklayer now, Thomas said, costs about 22 dollars an hour.

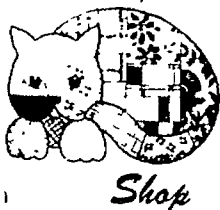

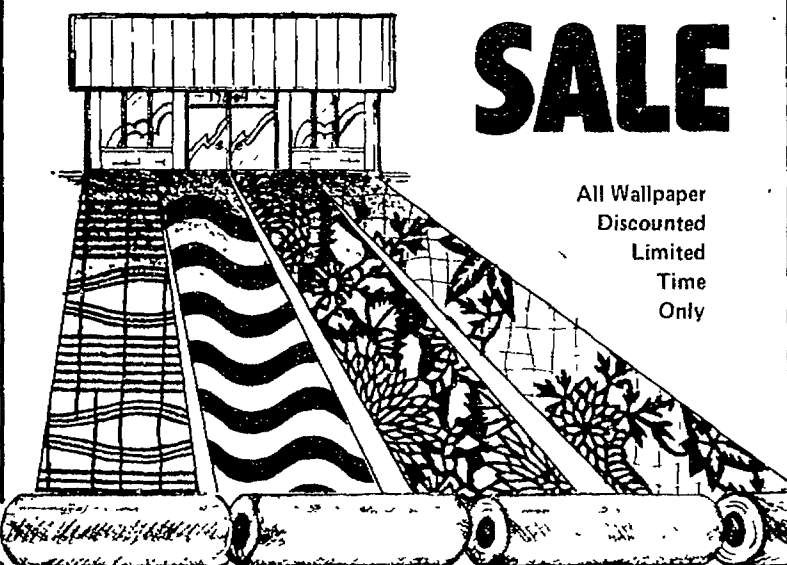

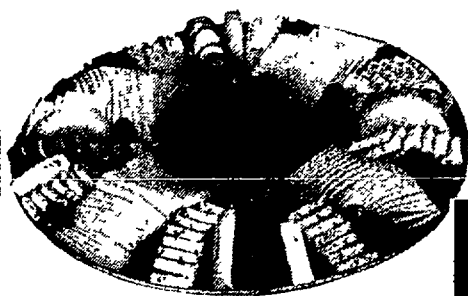

Church to dedicate sanctuary

A public dedication service will be held Sunday at the Christian Community Church at 41355 Six Mile.

Focus of the service is the dedication of the new sanctuary, which represents the second phase of a five-year building program of the church. Services have been held in the sanctuary since early summer.

The special service will be held at 3 p.m., with the Reverend Ivar Frick, district superintendent of the Assembly of God churches, delivering the guest address.

Special musical selections will be presented.

Following the service refreshments will be served.

Residents of the community, a spokesman for the community stressed,

are invited to attend the service and/or visit the church during the day to inspect the new sanctuary.

For old members of the church, the day will be an extra special one because a former pastor, the Reverend Arie Robinson, will be speaking at the two regular Sunday services at 11 a.m. and 6:30 p.m. Mr. Robinson, who is now a pastor in Santa

Ana, California, was the pastor of the church here when its name was Revival Tabernacle.

Besides Mr. Frick and Mr. Robinson, other pastors of Assembly of God churches in the area will be present. And, of course, the Christian Community's own pastor, the Reverend Irving Mitchell will be present.

The sanctuary is part of a building expansion program representing an outlay of \$1.2 million. Previously a fellowship hall was completed.

The new sanctuary has a seating capacity of 650 and was designed in beige and brown earth tones. A rainbow of color is provided in two columns of stained glass windows that reach from floor to ceiling. There are blue carpet inlays on the platform.

Provision has been made for a balcony which, in future expansion, will seat 250.

Mr. Mitchell has been pastor of the church since February, 1958. Under his ministry the church purchased the 15-acre parcel of land October, 1969 on Six Mile near Haggerty at a price of \$75,000. Also in 1969 a parsonage was acquired on Portis.

Until the Christian education building was constructed on the site in 1975, the congregation held services at Holmes Junior High in Livonia.

Revival Tabernacle, as it was originally called, was begun in January of 1943 in rented quarters on Grand River. The following summer property was purchased at 17617 Plymouth Road near Southfield. In 1945 the congregation moved into a new building on the site.

In 1949 Revival Tabernacle became affiliated with the General Council of the Assemblies of God in Springfield, Missouri. In 1951 the congregation of Highland Park Em-

manual Church merged with the greater Revival Tabernacle.

And in 1973 the church name was officially changed to Christian Community Church.

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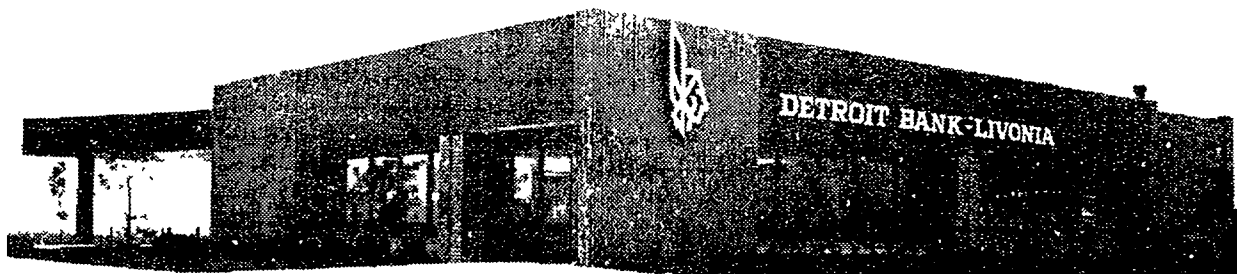


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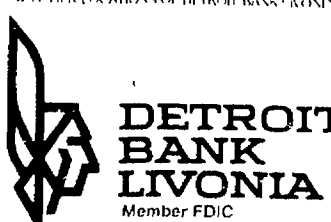
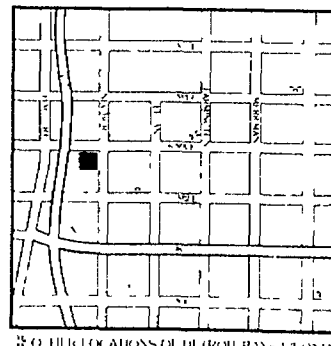


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Slippery slopes

How will gas crunch affect Michigan's ski resorts this winter?

If you are going to live in Michigan during the winter, you may as well find one way to enjoy the snow and cold.

For several hundred thousand downwardly mobile skiing enthusiasts, winter is to be enjoyed, not merely endured.

Last year, nearly 400,000 skiers attacked, mastered, glided down, fell down, or otherwise negotiated the downhill slopes at 57 Michigan resorts, according to the Automobile Club of Michigan.

And this year — gas prices and rising fuel crisis notwithstanding — ski resorts will be going all out to approach that level.

The reason is simple. Besides making nifty parallel turns, performing hot-dog stunts, schussing steep vertical drops and relaxing at half-way houses, skiers also find time to spend money.

Lots of money. Last year, they spent \$145 million, according to the Auto Club.

And, nothing that 1979 Michigan tourism is down about six percent from a year ago, resorts are taking great pains to see that they will not suffer from reduced skiing.

Actually, the cost of gas could help some resorts — namely those in southeastern Michigan which, while smaller than their up-north cousins, are also closer to most people.

In addition, the eight lodges in this region boast the state's best snow-making systems, they usually open earlier in the season and, with one exception — Teeple Hill in Milford — they offer night skiing.

Mt. Brighton, traditionally the most

popular resort in the state, is a leader of this trend.

Officials there say season pass requests are up 24 percent from last season.

They also say that for the last six years, they have opened earlier than any other resort east of the Mississippi River.

This year, they are shooting for a November 10 starting date. If not then, November 17, for sure.

Mt. Brighton has also completed a new membership building.

Other improvements in the southeast have been made at Alpine Valley, larger beginner and intermediate slopes, a 1,000-foot-long beginner run served by a two-place chairlift and greater snowmaking ability.

Weekend tickets are: Mt. Brighton, \$10 days, \$9 nights; Alpine Valley, \$9.50, days, \$8.50 nights; and Pine Knob, \$9.50 days and nights.

The lift tickets become a little steeper as you get further north, but then so do the slopes.

The costliest ski ticket in the state can be purchased for \$15 at Sugar Loaf, north of Traverse City.

Sugar Loaf also had the largest pre-winter expansion in the state — a \$3.5 million project that added 100 lodge rooms to triple at-slope sleeping capacity to 1,000 persons.

The ski resort's dining room and cafeteria have also doubled.

Other northern ticket prices include \$13 for Boyne Mountain and Boyne Highland and Schuss Mountain; \$12 for Hilton Shanty Creek, Nub's Nob and Timberlee; \$10 for Caberfae.

Some, but not all, northern Michigan resorts offer night skiing. Among them are Caberfae, (for \$7), Hilton Shanty Creek (\$5), Nub's Nob (\$6) and Timberlee (\$6).

Although gas has increased more

than 50 percent since last ski season, the major resorts don't appear to be quaking at the thought of 400-to-500-mile round trips scaring away skiers.

Boyne Highlands near Harbor Springs has booked nearly all its room for the Christmas holidays. The pre-winter booking pace at Boyne Mountain near Boyne Falls equals last year's. Bookings are up 17 per cent at Crystal Mountain near Thompsonville and 40 percent at Sugar Loaf.

Whether such optimistic figures holds up after the holiday seasons will probably be the big test.

For those who don't want to use up gasoline, the trial Snow Train may be the answer. It will run from Owosso to Cadillac on January 4-6 for \$189 per person.

Broken bones rather than gas prices may be weighing most heavily on the minds of ski resort owners.

Brochures from nine of 13 major ski lodges polled have warnings about the "inherent risks of injury," said Joseph Ratke, Auto Club Touring Manager.

"Two of the areas which do not include such notices will post similar warnings at lifts and on runs."

This new approach is the result of a landmark Vermont court ruling that resorts could be held liable for damages stemming from skiing accidents.

"It also has spawned a bill backed by the Michigan ski industry which will be introduced in the legislature this fall," Ratke added.

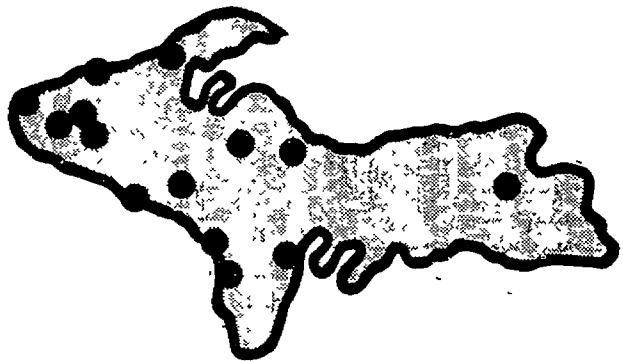
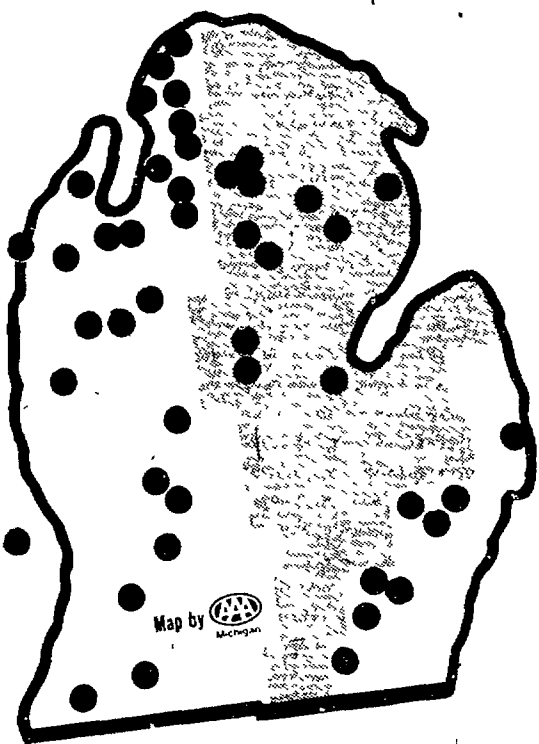
Michigan's proposed law would grant immunity to resorts from skier lawsuits as long as certain requirements are met.

These include marking open and closed areas and all man-made obstacles, showing degrees of difficulty on all runs and placing trail maps in the ski area.

The bill also calls for fining skiers for recklessness on slopes or lifts or for leaving an accident scene.

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FACED with record high interest rates, local home buyers are increasingly turning from conventional mortgages to alternate methods of home financing.

A report of September existing home sales from the Western Wayne Oakland County Board of Realtors (WWOCBR) indicates a strong shift to VA mortgages and land contracts.

In September, 1978, VA mortgages were used by only 2.9 percent of

buyers and land contracts by 5.6 percent. A year later, sales by WWOCBR members indicate 12.1 percent of buyers used VA mortgages and 10.7 percent land contracts.

"More significantly, these types of financing are being used increasingly to purchase higher priced suburban homes," said John Cole, WWOCBR president.

"Last year, it was highly unusual to help process a VA loan on a property above \$40,000. This September, 12.1 percent of homes sold by our members in the \$50,000 to \$60,000 had VA backed financing as did 11.3 percent in the \$70,000 to \$90,000 range."

Cole said the increased use of VA loans first showed in June and has climbed from a 4.5 percent figure then to the 12.1 percent of last month.

"We also have seen similar patterns emerging with sales by land contract," he added. "They also climbed steadily since May and their percentage of use has about doubled in the higher priced home ranges since that time."

Eligible VA home buyers like such mortgages because it allows them to move in with payment of little more than closing costs and a government set interest rate, currently 10.5 percent. Sellers, on the other hand, dislike the financing instrument because it requires them to pay the lender a certain amount (points) to make the loan compatible with conventional terms.

"Last year when the market was stong and mortgage funds in good supply, we had no difficulty finding qualified buyers ready to accept conventional mortgage terms," Cole said.

"This year, with less mortgage money available and a softened market for homes, sellers who must, or want to, move their property may have to accept alternate forms of financing, even if it means payment of points to the lender."

"However, we find that, knowing they will have to pay points in accepting VA backed financing, such sellers are remaining fairly firm on the price asked."

He noted that VA home sales also may have been aided by the fact that city certification of the home is no longer required, except where it is demanded by local ordinance.

Cole said that he expected an increase in the use of FHA loans, although a growth pattern for this type of financing hasn't yet become apparent. It is anticipated that Congress will shortly approve an increase on the loan limit for FHA purchased single-family homes from \$60,000 to \$67,000.

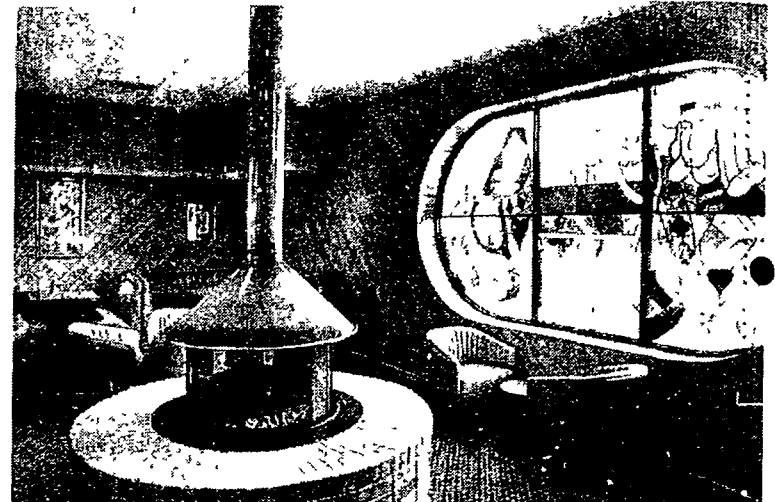

A **GROWING** number of listings combined with a slackened sales pace to bring a reduction of average prices for existing homes in the metropolitan area during the third quarter of 1979.

A report from the Western Wayne Oakland County Board of Realtors (WWOCBR) shows that, compared to the same period last year, residential listings grew 13.6 percent in the first nine months of 1979. At the same time, sales declined 12.4 percent.

Average prices, which reflected a 9.3 percent increase in the first six months of 1979, dropped 1.7 percent since the end of June and 3.7 percent from a July high.

The average home price in the 1,600 square mile territory covered by WWOCBR was \$48,762 last December and climbed to \$54,460 in July. In September, it dipped to \$52,378.

"Given current record mortgage interest rates and the uncertainty of economic conditions, the housing market is holding up remarkably well," said John Cole, WWOCBR president.

"A drop, instead of a continuing rise in prices such as we have seen through the past few years, should be welcome news for buyers ready to move into the market. Not only will it help offset the increased interest rates, but it signals a good supply of homes, many of which offer reduced prices."

"Unfortunately, we see this price leveling as a temporary phenomenon with new building costs and inflation forcing prices back up in a very short time."

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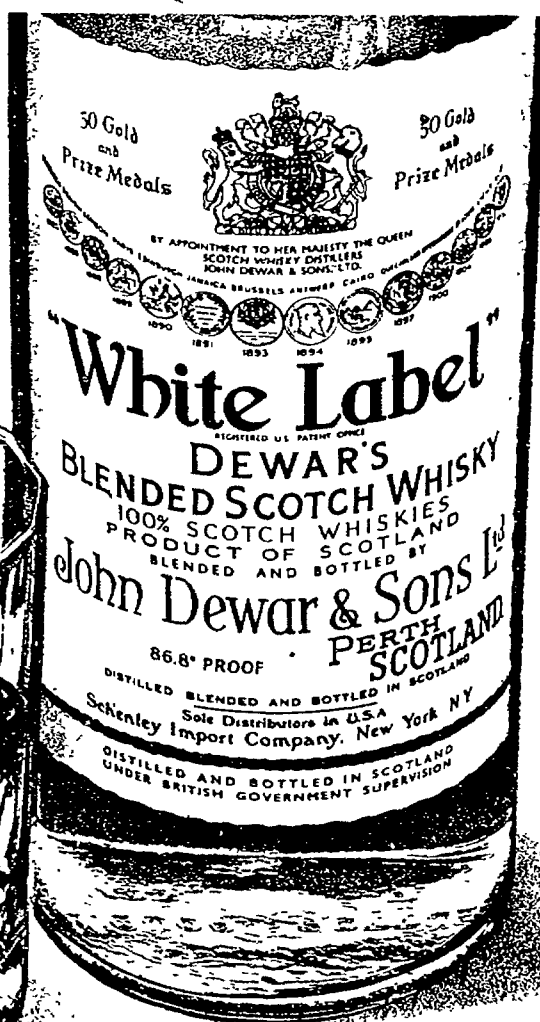

Nuclear plant accident assessed

A legislative committee investigating the nuclear power industry in Michigan has found that stress, shown as concerns over health, local economy and safety, was the single greatest impact the nuclear accident in Pennsylvania has had on local residents.

At the first meeting of the committee, testimony describing the effects the accident had on those living near the facility was presented by Joyce Freeman, executive director of a special Pennsylvania state commission investigating the accident and Michigan State University professor Stanley D. Brunn.

The special committee was formed after the accident occurred at the Three Mile Island nuclear plant. Its purpose is to investigate the nuclear industry in Michigan, the state's capabilities to deal with a possible emergency and the possibilities of reverting to alternate forms of power.

It is still uncertain how the accident occurred but there was a breakdown in the cooling system which led to a partial meltdown causing the emission of radiation.

Freeman said though radiation was leaking, it never reached dangerously high levels.

Human health studies are still continuing and will include pregnancy studies, chromosome studies and mental health studies.

The single most important social issue that the accident has had is stress, according to Freeman. She said people face concerns about their health, about the local economy, about the willingness of people to move into the area and whether they should leave the area.

"There is still a very high level of tension in the community because we can still make the national news at the drop of a hat," she said.

Brunn said the accident had a significant impact on how people felt about

nuclear power.

He noted before the accident, some 41 percent of the local residents favored nuclear power against 23 percent who opposed it with the rest uncertain.

After the accident, there was a dramatic shift with only 34 percent in favor and 48 percent opposed.

The committee held the hearing on the effects of the Three Mile Island accident as a way of setting background for its future work.

Annual safety inspections for the state's 6.1 million cars and trucks have been proposed by Rep. Jack Kirksey (R-Livonia).

In announcing the introduction of legislation to require the inspections, Kirksey said although several other states already require such inspections, he was getting little support for the idea in Michigan.

The State Police do random safety inspections and use the occasion to also check the driver for possible warrants

or alcoholic influence.

Kirksey's bill would set up a state-licensed inspection station at private garages.

The garages could charge \$7.50 for the inspection and would be prohibited from making repairs, costing more than \$20 within 10 days of the inspection.

The Livonia Republican said such a prohibition was an attempt to reduce any chances of fraud.

He also said the safety inspections could be done in conjunction with a proposed auto exhaust emissions testing program.

With the uncertainty of the economy, Governor William G. Milliken has ordered directors of the state's principal departments to make plans to trim expenditures in fiscal year 1979-80.

Each director must submit a plan to reach certain goals but each director has total discretion on how to reach individual goals.

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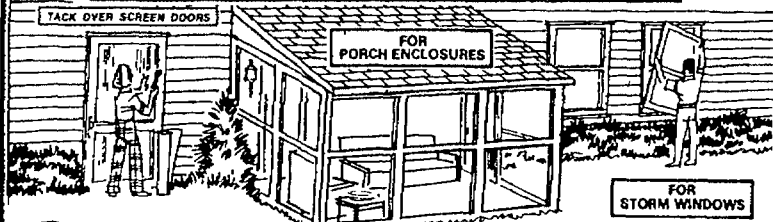

Sixt is a winner

The cross country team may go further in state competition, and the girls' swim team may also reach loftier heights, but the girls' tennis team has just as much to be proud of with its 13-0 regular season mark and its second consecutive Western Six league title as either of these two teams will have. And although the Mustang netters won the title as a team, as they had won their 13 previous matches, one girl stands above the rest. She is the only member of the team to have gone through the regular season and the league meet undefeated. She is Holly Sixt.

The only loss the number one Mustang singles player had was in Regional competition.

As the number one singles player for the Mustang netters, Sixt has had to deal with pressure situations a number of times this season. But none were so pressurized as the spot Sixt found herself in as the Mustangs fought with Canton for the Western Six title at the league meet last week.

After the first six matches were finished, Canton and Northville were tied 3-3. The only match left to play was first singles, between Sixt and Canton's Joan Keiser. If Keiser won, then the two teams would have to play again to decide the league champion. If Sixt won, Northville would win the crown.

The first set went smoothly for Sixt. She downed Keiser 6-2. But trouble popped up in the second set.

"I won the first set and was leading the second 5-2," Sixt said. "I was beating her but she came back to win 7-6. I knew going into the match that either first doubles or I would have to win to take the crown. After the second set I saw them lose and I got really nervous."

So nervous that she polished Keiser off 6-3. "I was nervous because the match was 3-3 and I knew she could come back to win. It was 5-2 in the second set and she came back to win."

Sixt began playing tennis eight years ago. The eight-year old started by taking lessons from Jim Saucedo, a member of the Argentine Davis Traveling Cup squad. Saucedo worked with Sixt's father at the time.

When she was 11, Sixt began playing in summer tournaments and in the Winter Excellence courses at the Farmington Racquet Club. While she runs track as a secondary sport, Sixt is a tennis person all the way. "I like tennis because I started when I was real young. My parents got me started playing and I really enjoy it," she said. "My plans at this moment are to go to Western Michigan University on a tennis scholarship and later, teach as a pro at a racquet club. I don't think I started early enough or have had enough training to compete on the professional circuit."

Sixt has been first singles for the Mustang team for two years. She is only a junior. "I don't look at myself as a leader. The whole team gets along well. Mrs. Filkin (the team's coach) says that there's a lot of responsibility at first singles, but I disagree. It's more a team effort. "I think this has been a good year for us. We all stuck together as a team, we were all concerned about each other and how we did competitively. We played as a team this year. Last year we lost one game and this year we were undefeated so I guess we did really well."

For a coach, a player of Sixt's ability is a crucial key to a team's success. "She played a lot during the winter and summer. It played off," Filkin said. "She's steady and really hangs in there. She is a very nice person to work with also, as most of the girls on the team." Another nice aspect to Holly Sixt, especially as far as the Northville tennis hopes for next year go, is that she's going to be back.

Gridders lose to Churchill 21 - 6

For all but three minutes of last Friday's football contest between league-leading Livonia Churchill and fourth place Northville, the Mustangs more than held their own. But in a three-minute span early in the third quarter, everything that could have possibly gone wrong for Northville did. The result: three Churchill touchdowns and a 21-6 win.

Northville took the lead in the first quarter when Joe Hamp carried the ball into the end zone on a three-yard plunge. His score was set up by a 17-yard run by Bob Crisan. "We had a lot of success running the ball in the first half," Northville coach Dennis Colligan said. "Crisan was on his way to a very good game but then he got hurt." Crisan broke a finger and didn't play at all in the second half. He gained 62 yards on 12 carries in the first half. The teams retired to the locker rooms at half-time with the score 6-0 in Northville's favor.

Northville took the second half kickoff and started to drive. But then their world fell apart. On the first set of plays quarterback David Greer bobbled a snap from center. The call was an option pitch play and Greer fired it out towards Hamp. Except the ball never got to him. A Churchill defensive tackle, running in to cut the play off, took the pitch from Greer without breaking stride and ran 33 yards for the score. Livonia kicked the extra point and led 7-6.

Livonia set the ball up for the kickoff to Northville. The boot was a little squibber that Northville had trouble holding. Churchill and Northville fought to cover the ball and when the pileup of players was unwrapped, Livonia had the ball. Two plays later the Churchill quarterback ran 24 yards for the score. The point-after kick was good and Northville was on the bottom end of a 14-6 score.

Northville took the kickoff and started to move the ball. But on a third-down pass attempt, Livonia picked the ball off. After a short series, Churchill scored on a five-yard dive play. The kick was good and Northville was down 21-6. That, in affect, was the game.

"We got shelled and that was it," Colligan said. "We played exceptional football in the first

half. Then Livonia got that freak play. I thought we were in good shape. I've never heard of a defensive tackle picking a pitch-out off like that and scoring. It was disheartening.

"When we lost Crisan we seemed to lose momentum. We couldn't run wide like we did in the first half. In the second

half our offensive line broke down. Up until then it was a very, very even ball game."

The Northville defense did a fine job of limiting Churchill's offense. Livonia earned only six first downs the entire contest. Northville didn't do much better as the Mustangs managed just nine first downs. Northville gained 152 yards

total offense to Livonia's 146.

"It was disappointing to be up at the half and then have a defensive tackle intercept a pitch. It's unheard of," Colligan said. "Obviously David Greer didn't see him. I think the Churchill player was just as surprised as anyone. But he didn't break stride and there was no way any of our

kids could catch him.

"The kick, well, we thought we had it. If the whistle had sounded at the stoppage of action, we would have had the ball, but it didn't. The kids just kept fighting for it, and by the time the referees had stopped the play, a Churchill player had the ball. That hurt us."

As has been true throughout the season,

the Mustang defense kept the Northville team in the ball game throughout. "Our defense played a real good ball game," Colligan said. "We came up with some big plays. For example, Bob Boshoven sacked their quarterback for a 17-yard loss once."

With the loss, Northville's season ended. Continued on 8-E

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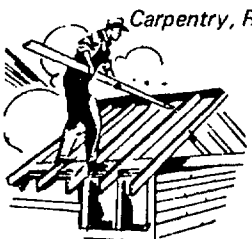
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Soccer tournament in full swing

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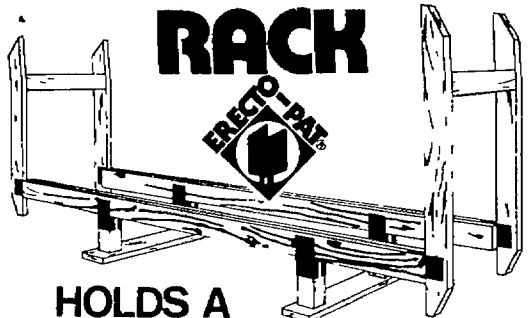


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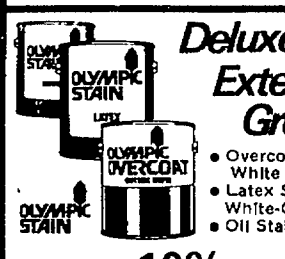


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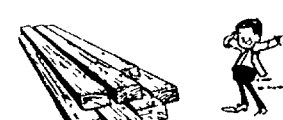
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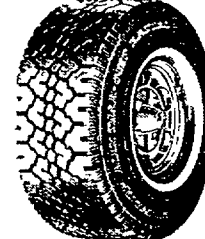
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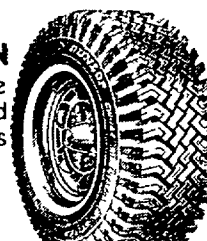
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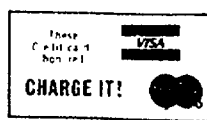
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Northville swimmers splash for two wins

"It was the first state tournament play for Seltz and McMann," Northville coach Joe Blake said. "I was pleased with Seltz' play. His 81 was respectable. Terry did okay at 86. Todd seems to always shoot well in tournaments."

"Not to take anything away from Bob Stevens, because he has been an all-league selection twice, lettered three years, and has been one of the top performers on the team, but he just had an off day Saturday. It was one of those days you have in any sport. He was under par for the first six holes but then he just started hitting bad shots."

Now that the golf season has finished for Northville, what does Blake think about the past campaign? "Naturally, having not been able to retain the league championships I'm somewhat disappointed. But I do think that the Western Six league is a lot closer as a whole. This made for a more interesting season."

"I'm not totally disappointed. Some of our younger players like Mark

Denhoff and Ted Seltz will be able to play and contribute to our team next year. It was a good year for Mack and Stevens in that they both did so well in regionals and then qualified to go to state. We were able to give some underclassmen experience in matches and that will put them in good standing for next year."

Earlier in the week, the Mustangs competed in the Western Six league tournament. Northville finished third. Waterford Mott took the 18-hole tourney with a team score of 422. Farmington Harrison was second with 424 while Northville came in with a tally of 444.

The league standings paralleled the tourney finish as Mott finished in first place with 12 points, Harrison was second with 10, Northville third with 7.5, Plymouth Canton was fourth with 6.5, and Walled Lake Western and Livonia Churchill tied for fifth place with 3 points each.

At the league meet, Stevens shot a 78, Mack hit an 84, Brian Shake scored an 89 and Ted Seltz recorded a 94. Stevens was voted to the all-league team for the second time in his high school career. The all-league team is composed of the top six golfers in the league based on a best nine-hole average. Stevens' average was 38.2. Mack just missed being selected for his second time as he finished with the seventh-best average in the league.

Harriers blitz Western runners

The regular season is finished and its on to the regional and hopefully, state cross-country tournaments for coach Dave Gram's Northville High School harriers. The Mustangs finished their regular season schedule last week with a 19-46 win over Walled Lake Western. Northville closed out its dual meet schedule undefeated.

"Everyone is running well now," Gram said. "Everyone was packed into position against Western right where we wanted them. Our new motto is 'the pack is back'. Everyone is healthy. We have a lot of confidence and strength going into the league meet." (That was run yesterday, but the results weren't available at press time.)

Harry Couyoumjian led the Mustangs to the victory over Western. The senior runner was trying to better the flat-course mark of 15:01 set last year by former Mustang Brian Turnbull. Couyoumjian clocked in at 15:13, 13 seconds off Turnbull's mark but good enough for a first-place finish.

Steve Sutherland of Walled Lake Western was second to Couyoumjian with a time of 15:20. Northville's Dave Mainowski clocked in at 15:35, good for third. Scott Dayton took a fourth place

finish for the Mustangs with a time of 15:51.

In fifth place was Doug Wright with a time of 15:56 and Clark Couyoumjian took sixth with a time of 15:59. Mustang Ross Grover captured seventh for Northville as he crossed the finish line in a time of 16:05.

Western's Dave Sherwood placed eighth with a time of 16:18. Sherwood's teammate, John McCort clocked in at 16:32, good for ninth. Northville's Steve Bourne finished with a time of 16:37 which was good for 10th.

"Between Dave Malinowski and Steve Bourne, our second and seventh men, there was a time difference of just 60 seconds. That's a good spread. In terms of scoring and attacking other teams, that pack is real good positioning," Gram said.

"Scott, Harry and Dave all have the potential to be front runners while Doug has the potential to be right up near there. Clark and Ross always give us real good positioning and Steve Bourne has worked hard to make the seven man varsity and it's paying off. He knows he has a lot of work to do but he's

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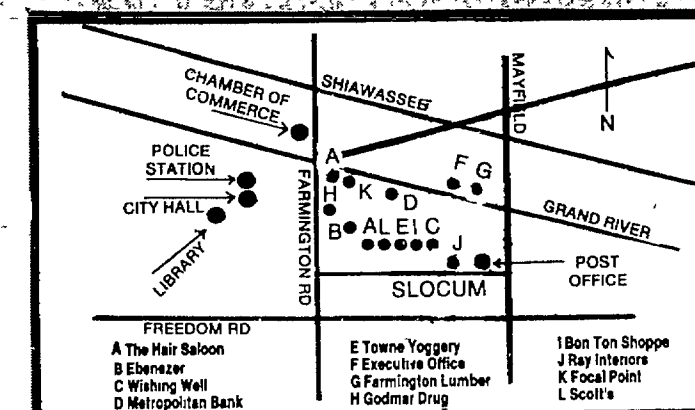

Kevin Swayne got Northville all the scoring it needed against Central. He scored at 18 minutes into the second half to put the Mustangs up 1-0. McElroy got an assist on the play.

Russ Gans added the second Northville score on a penalty shot at the 29-minute mark. "It was a carefully placed shot rather than the usual booming shot that Russ is known for. He placed the ball into the lower right corner and

the goalie dived for it but had no chance," Meteyer said.

"I was pleased with the way the JV played," Meteyer said. "They were a little disappointed because they wanted a win. We led 2-1 until the 15-minute mark in the second half but Central tied the game."

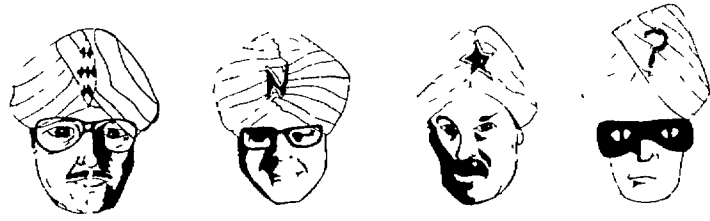
