I would like any toys you want to give me.

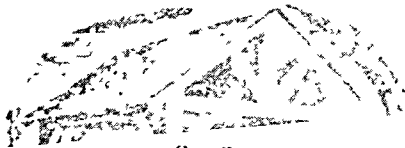
Amy drew pictures of her parents, herself, brother Brian and sister Jenny for Santa.

## North Hills kids walk, school board decides

The request of two Northville mothers to allow their children in North Hills subdivision to ride the bus to Amerman Elementary was denied by the Northville Board of Education Monday night.

In addition, the district may tell residents of Westridge subdivision that their children will no longer be able to ride the bus to school next year.

At the crux of the decision lies the fact that the school district loses money every time a student who lives less than one mile away from school rides the bus.

North Hills subdivision is on the southeast corner of Nine Mile and North Center. Westridge subdivision is on Novi Road north of Eight Mile.

Doria Rico and Anne Holloway asked the school board November 26 to allow their children, who live barely less than a mile from school, to ride the bus. They argued that buses which pass by their subdivision are not full and that

there are no sidewalks in the subdivision on which children can walk.

The board denied their request on the grounds that 1) the district suffers a financial penalty for transporting ineligible students and 2) granting one waiver would lead to a flood of similar requests because most subdivisions in Northville Township and in Novi have no sidewalks.

The board granted students in Westridge subdivision a waiver several years ago.

But Superintendent of Schools Larry Nichols told the board Monday night that the district is losing money by allowing Westridge students to ride the bus. He recommended that residents be informed that bus service would discontinue beginning with the 1980-81 school year.

However, no decision is likely to be made on the Westridge subdivision until spring, Nichols added.

When a district transports ineligible students, the district is not reimbursed for what it costs to transport the student. In addition, the district loses up to 25 percent of the reimbursement for a comparable eligible student, Nichols said.

"An extensive change in the transportation policies of the district would result in substantial economic penalties thus further reducing the funds available for the basic educational program for all youngsters in each school," Nichols said.

Mrs. Rico expressed disappointment at the decision but said she was not really surprised.

"It looks like this winter I'll be driving my kids to school as before. I know it is state law. A lot of people around here have batted their heads against the wall with no success. But it seems funny. Here they are asking us to conserve energy, and we are driving our individual cars to school," she said.

## Early deadlines set for paper

Appropriately, notes Merrifield, the flag first flew Tuesday on National Unity Day. It's a brand new flag and a \$1,000 flagpole, he adds.

## WJR owner gets approval for cable TV

"Thank you, we'll be coming back with cable within a year." With that comment, a spokesman for Omnicom walked away with the city's first cable television franchise Monday.

Northville city council members approved the franchise by unanimous vote — after nailing down several revisions in the document.

Omnicom, owned by Capitol Cities Communications, Inc. — the corporation owning radio station WJR and the Oakland Press — expects to be operational in Northville within two years, with some service arriving earlier, council members were told.

The system is expected "to be turned on in 12 months," Omnicom said.

Approval here represents the fifth franchise won in this area by Omnicom. Earlier the firm received franchises in the townships of Northville, Plymouth and Canton and in the City of Plymouth.

Proposals for franchise in Novi and the lakes area are under consideration. Novi expects to decide Omnicom's proposal in January.

Omnicom spokesman said that to date its franchises encompass about 35,000 homes, about half of which are likely to purchase the cable TV service.

Omnicom's proposal calls for "at least" 35 channels, with one channel dedicated for exclusive use by the public schools here and another channel to be shared exclusively by the city and township governments.

Under the franchise, Omnicom must maintain and operate a fully equipped studio within the Northville school district boundaries — at a location approved by the school board.

This studio is to be provided "with the original construction of the system, within the time limited provided... The studio shall be capable of operation at remote locations, and shall be made available for use by the city and township governments as well as the public schools."

Omnicom said the studio probably would be located in the City of Nor-

thville.

Planned rates to be charged by Omnicom, whose spokesmen have stated that the firm will "make its money" from service charges to customers, call for a \$7.95 basic charge for access to 35 channels. Additional charges are to be made for other channels, such as "movie channel." The latter would cost \$8 per month.

For each additional TV set in a home that is hooked up to the cable an additional fee of \$2 is to be charged.

The cable TV system also is to include a burglar-fire alarm service — a service that is likely to cost \$16 per month, an official said.

The installation fee is to be \$25. Special charter member fees, however, will be offered initial customers, Omnicom said.

Omnicom has promised the Northville council that if in its negotiations with other municipalities, such as Novi, additional benefits are granted, these same benefits will be automatically added to the Northville agreement.

One of the revisions in the now approved franchise increased the fee to be paid the city from 3 percent to 5 percent.

The percentage is off the local gross subscriber revenues. This was first revised to add installation and pay TV revenues in the percentage franchise fee, and has since been revised to raise the percentage from 3 percent to 5 percent, subject to FCC regulations.

Another revision shortened the completion timetable from 36 months to 24 months.

The public library was added to the specific list of locations that are to receive free cable connections. Others are the city hall, fire and police departments, public schools, and other public buildings.

An added section of the franchise deals with the right of privacy. It provides that the grantee is not to monitor subscriber viewing without the consent of the subscriber.

## District chooses Hood operations manager

A new administrative assistant for operations has been named to the Northville School district. His name is William Hood and he has 10 years of experience in building management.

Hood will take over the position January 2, coming from the Huron Valley Schools in Oakland County.

He served as plant engineer there for three years. For seven years previously he worked as an architectural project manager and administrator.

Hood has an associate's degree in architectural engineering from Lawrence Institute of Technology. He was selected unanimously by a panel of five administrators including Director of the Institutions' Special Education Program Leonard Resmierski, Director of Personnel Burton Knighton, Superintendent Larry Nichols, Meads Mill Principal Ronald Horvath and acting administrative assistant for operations Bauman.

It is a toss-up who is happier about the new man.

It could be Resmierski who has been singlehandedly directing a million-dollar renovation of the Annex on Main Street and overseeing construction.

When Hood's appointment was announced Monday Resmierski understatedly commented, "I, for one, anxiously await his arrival."

Happier still could be Knighton who has recently spent time investigating new lockers for the school system in-between his usual duties. Even as he reviewed 46 inquiries for the administrative assistant position and interviewed 20 hopefuls, Knighton was preparing a comprehensive presentation on the relative merits of the DeBourgh versus Superior locker companies (gauge size 13, top and sides of

# Survey reveals 96 students chose private schools

Between 1978 and 1979, 96 students left the Northville Public School system for private or parochial schools and 72 students returned, a new school district study revealed this week.

The Northville Board of Education requested the study in the fall to determine how much truth there was to the rumor that many students were leaving the public school system for private or parochial schools.

The study does not include students in the district who have never attended public school, but only those who have

changed from public to private school or vice-versa.

Most students who transferred between school systems did so during the natural breaks after kindergarten, eighth and ninth grades, the study showed.

Of the 96 students who left the Northville public schools, 23 of them left for parochial school just after kindergarten, Nichols said. Thirty-two students who attended ninth grade in Northville last year left to attend parochial schools this year.

Of the 72 students who returned to the

Northville public schools from private or parochial schools, six of them returned just after kindergarten. Eighteen students who attended eighth grade at parochial school last year returned to Northville for ninth grade.

Forty-one students from all other grades left the Northville school district last year for private or parochial schools.

Excluding kindergarten and eighth graders, 48 students returned to the district.

Nichols promised the school board Monday night to do further analysis on

the results after some board members said they wanted more details.

"I see this as only half the job," Treasurer Charles Peltz said. "I want to know the reasons for discontent. I have a concern that it is going to increase."

"All this reflects is activity in a given school year," Secretary Richard Barron said. "Children who never went to school in Northville don't appear on this survey."

But Nichols argued that the survey does refute the claim that more than the normal number of people are leav-

ing Northville schools.

"The problem I have heard is that a great number of students are leaving the district. This is absolutely not true," Nichols said. "I took the figures from this year and contacted five other districts. This data absolutely does not reflect an exodus from the school district. If we had 200 students leaving and only 30 returning, that would have been a different story."

But Peltz said he wanted to see more data.

"I sense a shift in mood in this community right now...unless we determine we provide a good value in the public schools, it may not be perceived as such," Peltz said.

Vice-President Marge Sliger said she doubted the value of spending extra time on examining reasons for movement between private and public schools. "It is a personal choice," she said. "Every person has his own reasons."

## Board honors Wiley, courtyard renamed

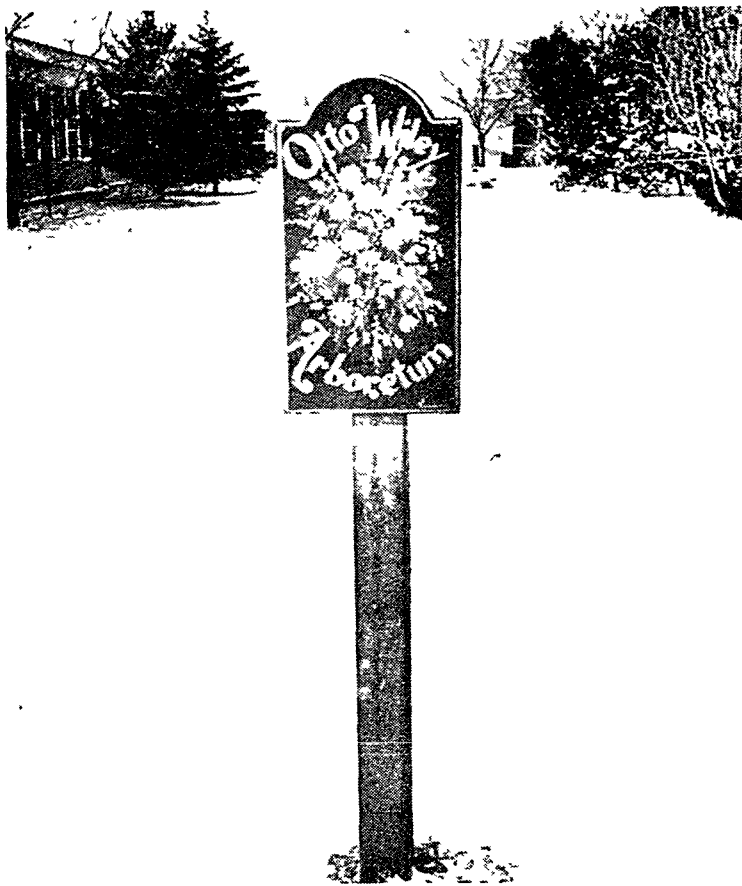

Members of the school district...we...recognize with humble thanks and deep appreciation the service rendered this community by Otto Wiley," the resolution states. "The Board of Education on behalf of the people hereby expresses its appreciation and hopes that the coming years may be filled with happiness and contentment."

Wiley has worked at Northville High School and Cooke Junior High. He officially retires December 28 after seven years as custodian at Amerman.

## City incorporation petition lacks support

If there is any support for the incorporation of Northville township as a city it was not voiced at last week's public hearing.

Members of the State Boundary Commission came to the township hall December 12 to hear comments for and against the incorporation of the City of Northville Hills.

But no one spoke in support of the petition to incorporate, filed November 7, 1977, and only one person, Township Supervisor Donald Thomson spoke against the proposal.

"The main thrust of the petition was to stop possible annexation of the township to neighboring communities," the supervisor said. "And the township board of trustees is currently considering becoming a charter township."

"It is possible that the charter township issue will be placed on the ballot in the August election."

The petition drive for incorporation was led by former Township Supervisor Wilson Grier and former Trustee Mark Lysinger who, along with some 49 others, gathered more than 1,000 signatures.

Though the issue of annexation is all but forgotten, the petition for incorporation must still be considered by the boundary commission.

The hearing panel at last Wednesday's meeting, consisting of three State and two Wayne County representatives, must now conduct an adjudicative meeting to discuss input from the public hearing and make a ruling to accept or deny the petition.

That session, however, will probably not take place until the final months of 1980, according to James Hyde, executive secretary of the boundary commission.

"Because of the large backlog of petitions to be reviewed it will be many months before the commission will meet to discuss this one," he said.

Since the petition for incorporation received no support, verbal or written, Hyde said, it is likely the commission will deny the petition.

Commission Chairman David Calhoun reminded the supervisor, however, that "if we were to approve the petition that ruling would negate any action taken by the township board regarding a charter township."

## Flaughter resigns post

John Flaughter, coordinator of finance and operations for the Institutions' Special Education Program, has resigned to take a job with the East China school district near Port Huron.

Flaughter's resignation was effective Friday.

The Northville Board of Education has approved the hiring of Lorraine Demski to teach first grade at Winchester.

Demski already has started teaching in the district. She replaces Gail Fountain who has become new director of the Nor-

thville Plus Program for the gifted.

Demski taught nine and a half years in the Garden City school district before coming to Northville. She holds a teaching certificate from Wayne State University.

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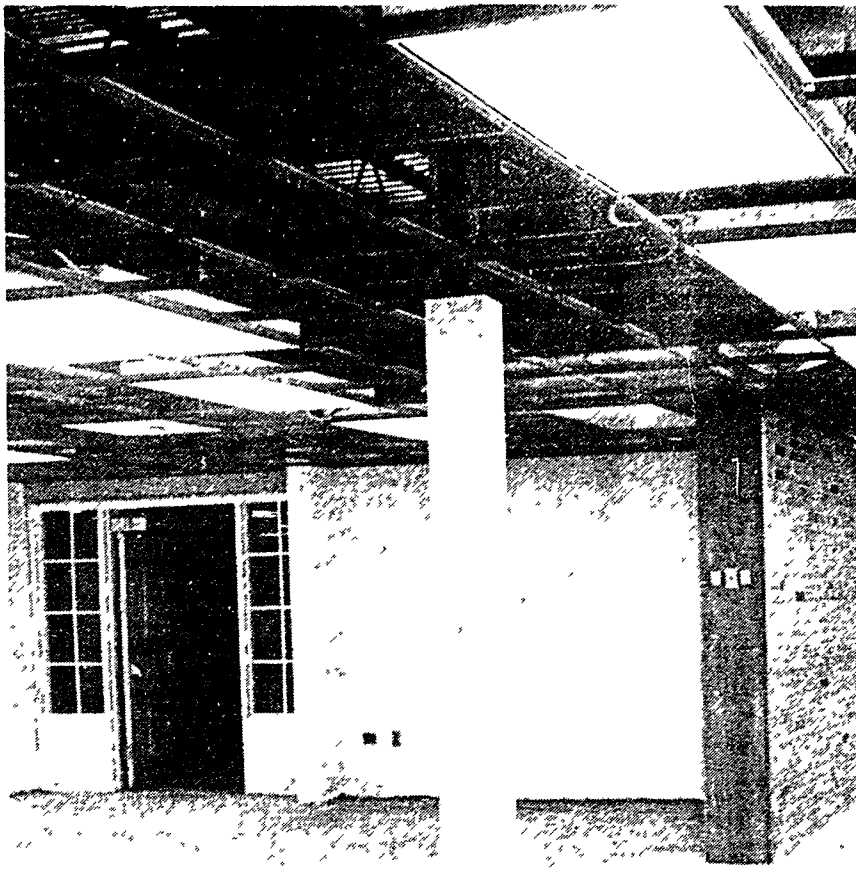
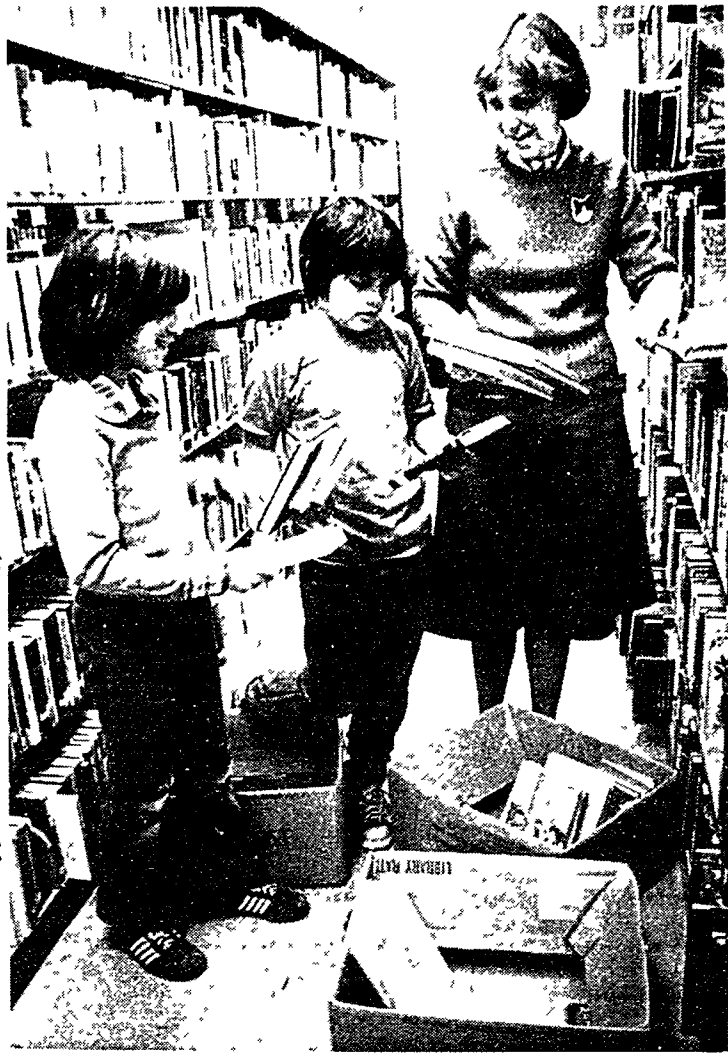

## Three qualify for math finals

Three Northville High School students qualified for the second part of the

Twenty-Third Annual Michigan Mathematics Prize Competition last

Wednesday.

Connie Mao of 42215 Ladywood, John Higgins of 42945 Whitestone Court, and Patrick Lewis of 836 Yorktown Court finished in the top four percent of Part I earlier in the year and so were selected as part of the 1,000 students eligible to compete in the second part of the test.

All three students are seniors. John Higgins is also a National Merit Scholarship semi-finalist. The math competition is sponsored by the Michigan section of the Mathematical Association of America and is designed to foster a wider interest in mathematics in Michigan.

One hundred of the thousand students will win in the math competition and be honored at an awards program at Central Michigan University on February 16. Half the winners will receive scholarships.

The scholarship funds come from donations by the Burroughs Corpora-

tion, Michigan Bell, the Kuhlman Corporation and the Michigan Council of Teachers of Mathematics.

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# Planners split, approve Eight Mile zoning

Dr. Paul Clancy has passed the first hurdle in his effort to build a professional medical office building into the hillside on West Eight Mile east of Taft and the existing gas station and party store.

Northville City Planning Commission by a split vote gave its recommendation for approval to rezone the site from third density residential (R-3) to Professional and Business Offices (PBO) at a special meeting December 3.

Incorporated in the motion for approval was a "memorandum of understanding" proposed by the young dentist who had argued at this meeting and after the public hearing November 20 that a three-suite medical complex would generate less traffic than an apartment. The present zoning would permit an apartment building to be constructed on the triangular site.

Dr. Clancy and his architect, Thomas Kowalski, presented a conceptual site plan to the commission showing a 5700 square foot building with parking on the west side for 38 cars and access at the end of the Eight Mile curve.

The dentist plans to occupy one suite and to have two others in the building that would be leased to physicians.

Commissioner Lesa Buckland in making the motion to recommend zoning approval to city council in-

corporated the applicant's agreement to limit the parking to 40 spaces and the building area to 6000 square feet.

Commissioner Bruce Turnbull who earlier had argued that the commission "ought to be helping those who want to establish their business here" seconded the motion.

Both voted to approve the motion as did Luke Durst, Stewart Kissinger and Chairman C. Thomas Wheaton. Opposing were James Cutler and Charles Freydl. Donald Fee and William Tucker were absent.

During the discussion a main concern was traffic on the hilly strip of West Eight Mile which has presented problems in winter weather. Cutler also questioned Ronald Nino, city planning consultant, whether this might be considered "strip zoning" along Eight Mile. Nino replied he tends to think it could be "close to it."

Pointing out there is a vacant piece of property between Joe's Pantry and the property for which the rezoning is being sought, Freydl predicted that a like request will be forthcoming for it.

From the audience Jerome Mittman, vice-president of Lexington Condo Association, stated his association opposed the rezoning on the basis of traffic. He mentioned that Amerman Elementary located to the east near

Center is seeking an access directly to Eight Mile. Presently all traffic to the school uses Center.

Local resident Marianne Hamell said she regularly drives along Eight Mile and doesn't have traffic concern except

for the trucks. She wondered if the speed limit in the area might be lowered.

Planner Nino who earlier had recommended not granting the zoning change because he felt the site could be

developed under present zoning said he "suspects the limitations imposed (on the applicant) could be supported in court."

Turnbull, speaking on the community's reputation as the "Switzerland of

Wayne County," pointed out that the high school and Allen Terrace as well as a state police post, state mental hospital and, earlier, Maybury Sanatorium all have been built on Northville's hills.

## Limitation legality questioned by council

City council has sent the the Eight Mile rezoning matter back to the planning commission for reconsideration in view of legal complications.

City Attorney Philip Ogilvie, who was expected to attend Tuesday's planning commission meeting, told council members Monday that the "conditional" rezoning recommended by the planners on the Eight Mile property east of Taft is illegal.

Planners recommended that a professional office zoning be granted the applicant — provided that the dental office complex be limited to 6,000 square feet.

Michigan courts, said Ogilvie, do not permit conditions to rezoning.

Councilmember J. Burton DeRusha noted that the planners might not have made their recommendation for rezoning had they known such rezoning is illegal. Thus, council decided table its decision until planners had another look at the rezoning matter.

DeRusha said he opposed the rezoning — with or without the restriction, contending that the property should remain residential.

Councilmember Stanley Johnston, on the other hand, argued that the professional office classification is more suitable for the Eight Mile site. The develop-

ment, he contended, would cause no more traffic problems than development of multiple housing units on the property.

Ogilvie reminded council members that rezoning of the property probably will mean that the vacant land just west of the site also eventually will be developed for professional office.

One means of restricting professional office development, it was pointed out, would be to add a new section to the ordinance, specifically dealing with medical or dental units as distinct from other office uses. Such a recourse, however, would require changing of the city's zoning law.

## Updated criminal code ordinance in limbo

Everyone is waiting. The police chief is waiting, the township board is waiting, the township clerk is waiting.

They are waiting for Ron Bodnar to prove that his newspaper, The Broad-sider, meets the legal requirements for ordinance publication.

The township board of trustees must publish a new criminal code ordinance and members, at their November meeting, passed a motion to publish in The Broad-sider if Township Attorney Don Morgan finds that it is a legal publication according to state law.

The Broad-sider had quoted a price about \$500 less than the cost to publish the ordinance in The Northville Record.

The township clerk's office received a letter from Morgan November 6, which stated, in part "Sec 1(a) of the statutory definition of newspaper requires that a newspaper have a bona fide list of paying subscribers or has been published at not less than weekly intervals in the same community without interruption for at least two years.

"Consequently, it would appear that the Broad-sider does not meet the

statutory definition of newspaper and publication therein would not satisfy the requirements of S691.1051 for publication of ordinances...Therefore, we are of the opinion that the best interest of the township is served by publishing only in a newspaper fulfilling the requirements of S691.1051.

"For the foregoing reasons, we submit that the Broad-sider not be utilized for publishing the criminal code ordinance."

(Bodnar, in a letter to the township clerk, had stated that his publication has been in general circulation in Northville Township since 1975 and on a weekly basis in the township since July 21, 1978.)

Since the communication from the attorney was not on the agenda at the regular meeting December 13, boardmembers were not aware of the letter.

Township Clerk Clarice Sass and Police Chief Ronald Nisun agreed to hold back the communication until the January board meeting.

"My concern was that I didn't want it killed," Chief Nisun said. "I have been

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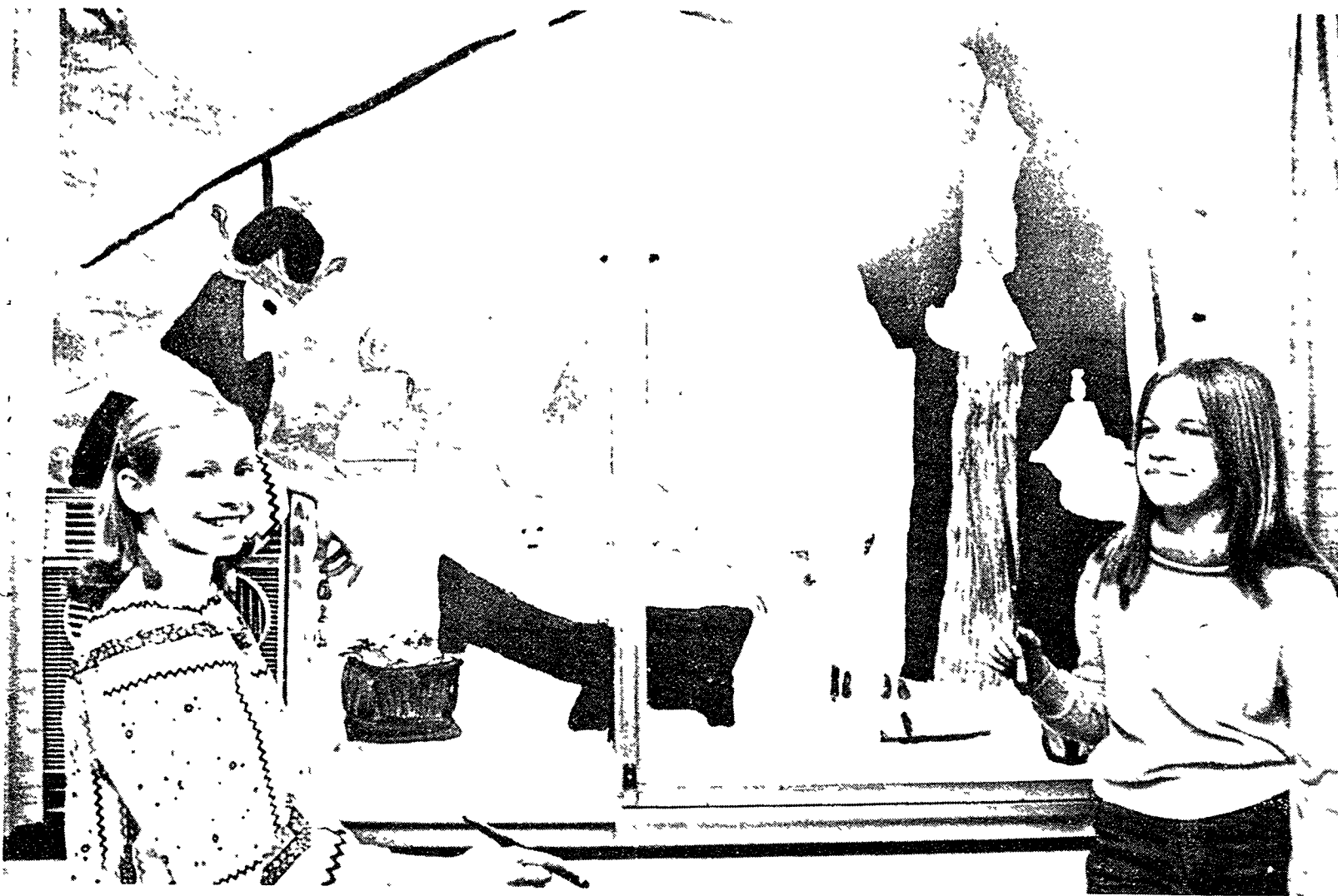

Now the band boosters have two projects in the works which will help raise the balance of the money, Band Boosters President Bonnie Wagner told the Northville Board of Education Monday night.

One money-making scheme will be a 5050 drawing. Tickets will be sold one for \$1 and three for \$2.

The second project will be an appearance by hypnotist James Houk at the high school March 20, with proceeds donated to the band uniform fund.

"We believe with these projects and donations we will be able to pay for the uniforms by May," Wagner told the board.

Uniforms and accessories for 80 band students were ordered this month, Wagner said. The band has raised

\$8,675 during the past few months through direct donations, including a \$4,500 donation from an anonymous benefactor. Money has been raised through the band "Night at the Races," contributions by the Northville Jaycees, the Langfield fund, and pumpkin bread sales at the Christmas walk.

Wagner believes that now that the uniforms are actually ordered students will be even more diligent in raising the needed \$8,164 to pay for them.

"Morale has increased since we saw the uniforms," she said. "Students could actually touch them and see them. They have something to work for now. Everybody is pitching in."

Superintendent of Schools Larry Nichols commended Wagner on her vigor in keeping the uniform drive alive.

"I couldn't be more pleased with the vigor and leadership of Bonnie Wagner and the band booster committee," he said.

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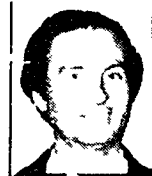
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## Holds holiday workshop

Each mother supervised a special craft or cooking project.

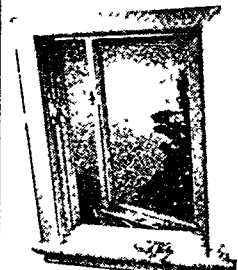

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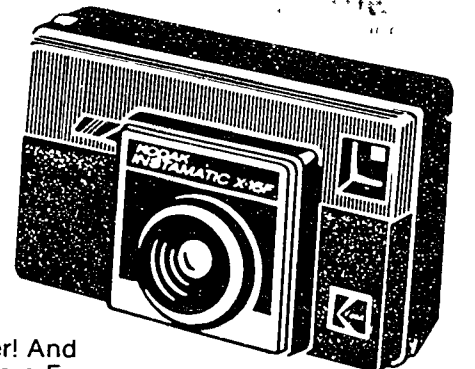
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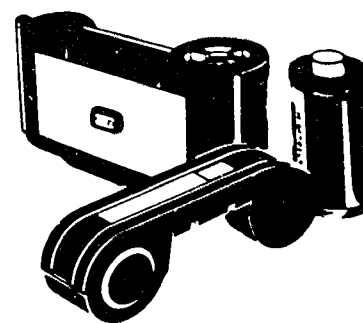

# Township okays plan

Despite opposition from a Plymouth Township official and a local bowling alley proprietor, township officials December 13 approved the project plan for a new bowling facility in the township.

The plan, submitted to the board by the Wayne County Economic Development Corporation, calls for a 48-lane bowling alley to be built on six acres of land on Five Mile adjacent to the Oasis Golf Center.

The proposed bowling facility would be built for the Wil-O-Mac Corporation, which would get financing through low interest revenue bonds issued by the Wayne County EDC.

Those voicing objections to the proposed facility said another bowling alley would only cause problems and was not needed.

"Unfair competition would be created," the bowling alley proprietor said. "We would no doubt lose personnel from our two bowling alleys."

In a letter to the Wayne County EDC, Thomas Law, a Farmington Hills attorney, said his client, the speaker, "would feel compelled to take legal action and contest the validity of processing bonds which may be issued."

Law further stated in the letter, "we are requesting that you hold hearings pursuant to the statute in Plymouth

Township and in the City of Northville."

Township officials, however, did not agree with the arguments presented.

At the township board's regular meeting, following the public hearing on the proposed project, officials unanimously approved the transfer of project jurisdiction to the Wayne County EDC and the project plan itself.

The Northville Township EDC earlier also waived jurisdiction to the county EDC.

The township EDC has had problems getting off the ground and members felt the Wayne County EDC could better handle the project because of its staff and experience.

trying to get this thing published for over three years and, because of our current budget situation, I thought if the board saw this communication they would put the matter aside once again because of the cost of publishing.

"Bodnar told me that he believes he can prove that The Broadside is a legal publication, so I figured it wouldn't hurt to give him another month. We have already waited so long, another month wouldn't make much difference."

Chief Nison said the current criminal code "is obsolete."

"There are some laws in the current criminal code that are now unconstitutional," he said. "And we can't very well prosecute offenders for violating outdated laws."

Morgan told The Record Monday his office was not pursuing the matter further, at least until they hear from Bodnar.

The Broadside's publisher said he believes the state statute Morgan referred to is outdated and that he will proceed in his efforts to prove it is legal to publish the criminal code in his newspaper.

Mr. Kunkel listed the following recommendations as a result of the audit examination:

2. The Water Supply System billing receivable cards should be reconciled periodically to the general ledger control accounts.



Councilman DeRusha asked why Council should not reappoint the above, subject to their acceptance.  
Motion by Councilman Gardner supported by Councilman DeRusha to reappoint William Milne to the Board of Review, John C. Burkman, Mike Allen and Fran Gazlay to the Historic Commission; and Stanley Johnston and John Buckland to the Recreation Commission subject to their confirmation.  
**Motion Carried Unanimously**  
**TAX ANTICIPATION NOTE APPLICATION:** The City Manager explained the Tax Anticipation application which the City may have to initiate since the State has not given us our income tax, small business tax and race track monies.  
Councilman DeRusha asked if the Michigan Municipal League has been sounded out on this.  
Councilman DeRusha asked if we could initiate a law suit next spring against the State.  
The City Manager stated a group of 20 to 25 cities could get together and sue the State.  
Councilman Ayers asked if eventually we would get the money back.  
The City Manager remarked that the single business tax would be open to some question; however, sales tax and income tax is provided for by the State Constitution. The partment could be affected by the State's legislation. Next year's partment money could also be affected. He mentioned we should have the money by the next budget and he is assuming the legislature will act before budget time. The amount to be borrowed will not carry the City through the fiscal year if 70-80 monies do not come in if we receive the money the application can be withdrawn.  
Motion by Councilwoman Ayers supported by Councilman Gardner to adopt a resolution authorizing issuance of Notes in anticipation of operating taxes next succeeding fiscal year.

**OAKLAND CD GRANT HEARING:** Councilman DeRusha mentioned the restrictions make it harder to spend the money in Oakland County.  
The City Manager stated money has been ok'd for Ford Field however, it has not been approved by HUD yet.  
Motion by Councilman Gardner supported by Councilman DeRusha to Publish for Public

Hearing on Monday, December 17, at 8:00 p.m. in the Council Room to receive citizen comments and proposals for use of the City's 1980 Community Development Block Grant funds from Wayne County. The expected amount is \$30,000.  
**Motion Carried Unanimously**  
**Motion by Councilman DeRusha supported by Councilman Ayers to Publish for Public Hearing on Monday, December 17, at 8:00 p.m. in the Council Room to receive citizen comments and proposals for use of the City's 1980 Community Development Block Grant funds from Oakland County.** The expected amount is \$10,000 1979 block grant funds of \$15,000 will also be discussed.  
**Motion Carried Unanimously**  
**TWO-COUNTY STATUS:** Representative Fessler submitted a draft of a bill to allow conversion of the City to one County.  
The City Manager offered the following changes:  
Section 1, line 1 Should be for any city located in more than one county.  
Section 1, line 4-6 Allows ballot proposal at only the first general or special election after the effective date of this act.  
Section 3, line 13. Limits frequency of election proposals to every 3 years - this is too long, and should not be longer than 90 days.  
Section 4, The proposed act does not take effect until the City voters vote in an election to make the act effective.  
The City Manager also commented that Council already has the authority to call an election on any subject which is properly open to voter decision. However, it may be viewed as a technical requirement to have the voters give the authority to Council to call the substantive election.  
Discussion on this followed and the City Manager was asked to contact Representative Fessler with the City's concerns.  
**RECOMMENDATION FROM PLANNING COMMISSION RE MASTER PLAN/BEAL TOWN:** A communication from the Planning Commission advised Council that the Master Plan has been amended to reflect the change in the Beal Town area per Planning Consultant Nino's proposal. A Public Hearing was held on September 18, 1979, and action was taken at a Planning Commission meeting on November 29, 1979.  
Councilman DeRusha commented the Planning Commission had been discussing this and have taken action.  
The City Attorney advised this was for information only.  
**MISCELLANEOUS:** Mayor Pro Tem Johnston advised that the Recreation Commission would have a Proclamation re Honorary Citizenship for the next meeting.  
Councilman DeRusha commented on an article in the Detroit Free Press dated December 1, 1979 re "SEMOG Cuts Quota for New Sewers". The article stated the executive committee of SEMOG endorsed a 5% reduction in the amount of new sewer lines to be built in southeast Michigan over the next 20 years. Northville would be among the areas affected. The article also quoted Michael Gusac, Executive Director of SEMOG as saying that "existing sewer facilities in southeast Michigan are already sufficient to serve the population of the region through the end of the century."  
Councilman DeRusha asked Council to object to the action and SEMOG assuming to be spokesmen for the whole area.  
Motion by Councilman DeRusha supported by Councilman Gardner to adopt a resolution objecting to action taken by SEMOG in the reduction in the amount of new sewer lines to be built in southeast Michigan and to SEMOG for assuming to be spokesmen for the entire area. Copies to be sent to surrounding communities and the communities specifically mentioned in the ar-

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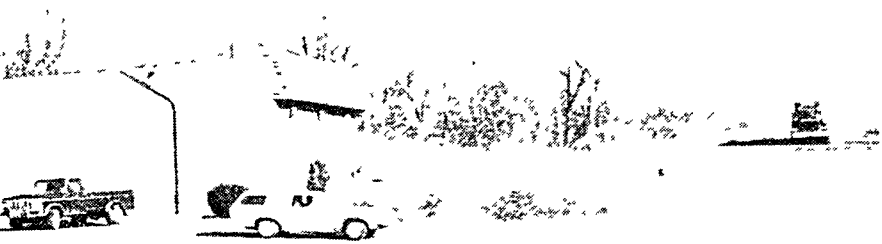

Planners recommend PBO zoning for Eight Mile property right of 'Pantry'

Don't rezone

We have two observations about the Northville (city) Planning Commission's recommended rezoning of the parcel of land on Eight Mile east of Taft:

One, the recommended professional office (PBO) zoning, in our opinion, is a mistake; and, two, we doubt that the planners' proposed conditional rezoning is legal. Therefore, we hope the city council rejects the planning commission's recommendation and retains the present residential (R-3) zoning.

Concerning the legality of the conditional rezoning, obviously no one can be certain how the court would rule on any particular issue. However, previous decisions would indicate that the court takes a very dim view of conditional rezoning. Argument that the court has affirmed conditions in non-zoning matters is hardly supportive of this zoning issue.

Even if there were no legal question involved, however, we would oppose the recommended rezoning. Frankly, we find no more persuasive evidence for rezoning this time than we found for rezoning earlier when it was suggested the property should be developed commercially.

The arguments that "we are already stuck with commercial (service station and pantry store) on the corner," that the police department can resolve any traffic problems resulting from the planned office development, and that the added tax base would be "a heck of a lot better than weeds and brush," are not the least bit persuasive. In fact these kinds of arguments are disappointing to those of us who have come to expect decisions by the commission that are based on sound planning judgments.

Equally disturbing to us is that, after earlier concluding that a residential zoning is best suited for this property and after hearing its own professional consultant more recently affirm that conclusion, the commission would be so easily persuaded by promises of the petitioner.

We believe officials earlier used sound judgment in assigning a residential zoning to this undeveloped land, located adjacent to school property near residential neighborhoods, and we urge the city council to stand firm on that decision.

Vital issue

The charter system of township government has both advantages and disadvantages.

Northville Township officials have participated in heated discussions concerning the charter system recently, nearly adopting the charter system by board resolution on one occasion. It was defeated 4-3.

But township officials are not well-versed on the charter system. They realize this and have made an effort to educate residents as well as themselves on the system by inviting Michigan Township Association representatives to the township hall.

MTA members will visit the township hall, 41600 Six Mile today at 8 p.m. for a public hearing on charter townships, to answer any questions township officials or residents may have.

Since township residents are the ones who would be affected directly by the adoption of a charter system, it would behoove them to attend.

There are two methods of adopting a charter system — by board resolution or by a vote of the people.

Either way, the issue is vitally important to residents of the township. Therefore, we urge township residents to attend tonight's meeting to learn for themselves just how this form of township government would affect them.

6. Loss of local control. Clearly, the people lose the right to vote about many issues.
7. No protection provided against

strip annexation. In fact, a charter township makes us more vulnerable to strip annexation.

My research was conducted in the law library, with specific citations given to support each argument. The most modern amendments in addition to the original charter township law were researched and carefully examined.

Why would Northville Township officials suggest we change to a charter township? What are the advantages of this proposal? We must attend the public hearing and express our opinions.

# Newsbeat

**BRIGHTON**—A restaurant overhanging the water...A multi-story office building...Maybe a billboard... These were some suggested uses from Howell Attorney Timothy Hensick that his clients might make of the property they apparently own in the City of Brighton.

**HOWELL**—A 29-year-old Howell area woman, found innocent by reason of insanity in October of the shooting death of her six-year-old daughter, has been released from a psychiatric center after doctors found she needed no further treatment.

**HOWELL**—A Livingston County couple wants all Sunday hunting in the county halted. And they believe they've found a law which would support their demand should they take appropriate legal action.

**BRIGHTON**—More than 50 interested citizens living within the Brighton school district attended a special open meeting recently to present their views and concerns about the proposed teaching of birth control in the high school and, while all did not choose to speak, practically all factors were presented.

**SOUTH LYON**—South Lyon will have a new city manager by the middle of April, according to a schedule set up by the city council at a special meeting recently. Mayor Joel Allen called the meeting to discuss the selection process. Council will use to find a new city manager. Council earlier voted unanimously to replace the present city manager, Paul Meyer.

**SOUTH LYON**—Taxpayers here may have to pick up the majority of the cost

of the downtown sidewalk project because city council neglected to follow the city code and establish a special assessment district. Council has been advised by its attorney that it cannot charge homeowners or merchants for sidewalks completed last summer.

**LYON**—In order to protect its firemen from financial hardship due to a job-related injury and to protect itself from out-of-the-pocket compensation expenses, the Lyon Township board approved the purchase of disability insurance for its volunteer firemen at its regular meeting recently.

**NOVI**—Financing for capital improvement projects rejected by Novi voters in the November election could become available through the federal government, although competition for the funds is likely to be stiff, according to city officials.

**NOVI**—Parks and Recreation Director Barry Smink has resigned, citing a desire to become involved in a different area of recreation. Smink was the first full time parks and recreation director employed by the city. He was hired in January, 1977.

**NOVI**—Heavy sweaters and other warm apparel will be the recommended manner of dress for students in the secondary schools here as a result of federal building temperature restrictions, school officials have been informed.

**NOVI**—High School students here have requested a traffic signal at the corner of Ten Mile and Taft to alleviate traffic problems created by the opening and dismissal of school.

# Christmas is . . . a tree trimming party

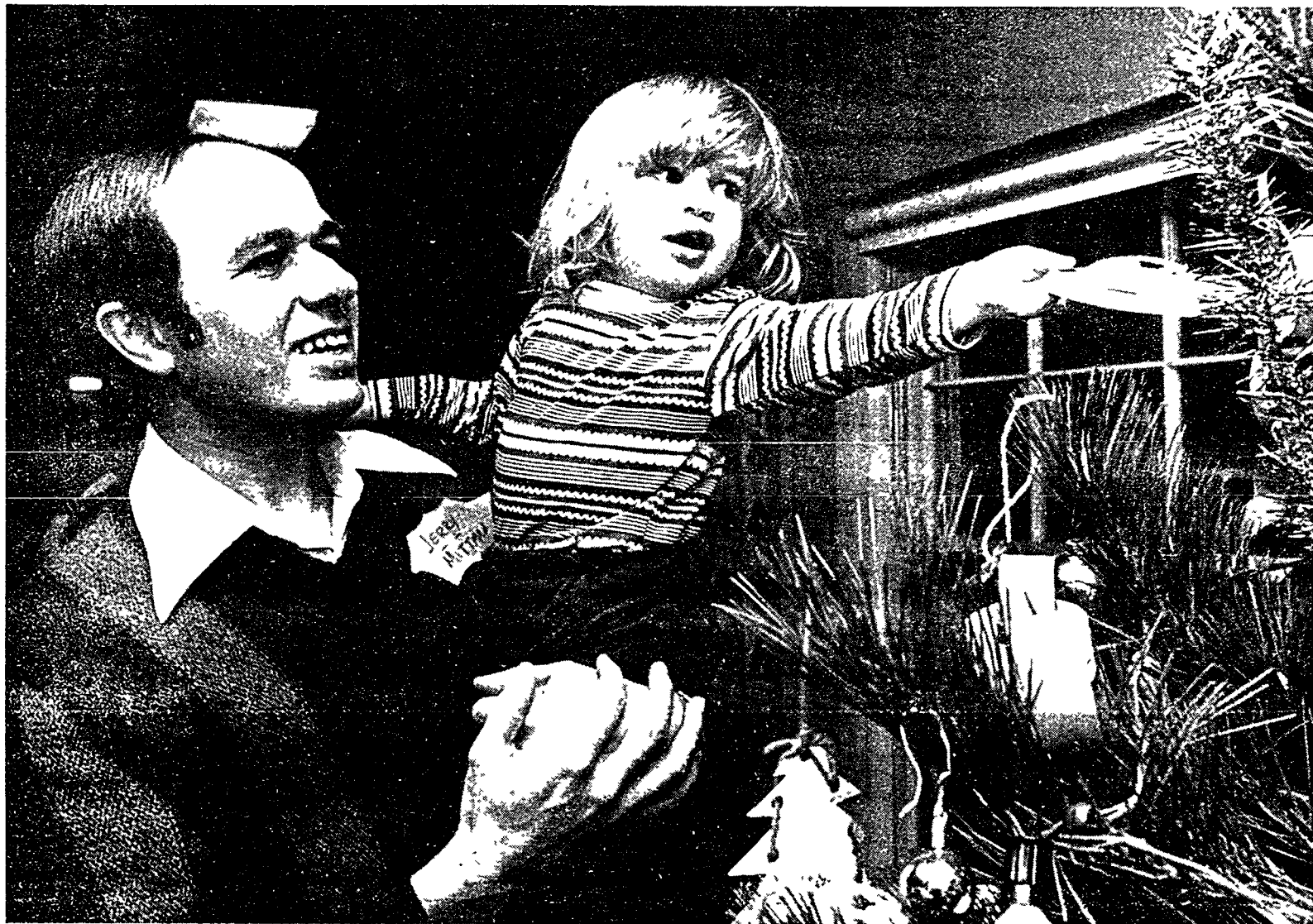

In Our Town

This program offers contact network for women

Fifteen women took time out from busy pre-Christmas schedules Thursday night to learn more about New Sources, called by its originators a plan for women to make positive changes in their lives

Co-founders Shirley Aune and Joyce

Sachs term their program a "network of women helping each other." It is this continuing support network that makes their program different from others offered at colleges and women's resource centers, they stressed at the meeting in Lexington Condos clubhouse

It was hosted by Patricia Dorrian-Sandbothe, a Northville High School English teacher who had taken the seminar and is serving as Northville

coordinator.

"The beauty of the whole program is the network you plug into through the seminars," she told the women attending the open house

"We're not talking about women who have problems, but about women who want direction and need to do some life planning," Mrs. Aune said.

The founders said the program begins with a two-day intensive seminar. The first day participants "get in touch with what's important (to them) and set goals."

"Goals really vary," Mrs. Sachs explained to the group "They can be personal to make you feel better or they can be career goals."

An action plan is formed the second day of the seminar for each participant, they continued, that gives steps to achieve those goals. It includes time management and suggests resource contacts.

The founders compare the resource part of the program and the contacts developed with the "old boy" type of network that they said men long have been known to employ.

"In the past women have had that same type of support network but have used it for personal concerns. Now they are doing so professionally," Mrs. Aune explained to the women who were there from Milford, Farmington and Livonia as well as from Novi and Northville. Three were in the program already and were willing to answer questions.

"You feel better," one reported.

"The women in this network are very giving. I find it stimulating me," said Terry Clancy.

"Your mind gets corralled," explained Mrs. Dorrian-Sandbothe who will be hosting the seminar January 19-20 at the clubhouse. She said that she enrolled in the program "because I knew I wasn't goal setting."

Speaking of the recent death of her husband, she affirmed that this was not the reason she had enrolled. "I would have done so anyway because I need directions." She mentioned that she now has returned to a theatre group in which she formerly acted.

The network presently has 40 women, ranging in age from their thirties to the sixties, the originators said, pointing out that the entire program is new this fall and that previous seminars have been conducted in the Birmingham, Southfield and Farmington areas.

The founders both have masters degrees in guidance and counseling and met four years ago at Oakland University's Continuum Center.

They saw a need for ongoing support from their experience in that school's program, they explained, that began their researching and then developing the New Sources program for women.

"This is for the woman who values her life and wants to do some planning. It is the place to turn to," they told the women attending

Most of the women in the audience were in their forties and fifties. During the informal introduction those who came to learn about the program related their present life situations. One had all seven children grown; another was in process of a divorce; and a third actively was "career seeking."

"This is the time," Joyce Sachs encouraged, "for you to say 'I'm going to do something for myself. I'm worth it.'"

Shirley Aune, who is the wife of Northville High School Principal George Aune, emphasized that the program is not designed to be "an environment for women to wallow in each other's sorrows but a 'moving on' area in which women can feel comfortable and achieve."

They explained that those enrolled in the program and taking the seminar keep records in a notebook supplied and then go into a network.

In small groups of six to nine in the network situation women meet once a week for six weeks. Each talks for 15 minutes at the weekly sessions, reporting how well she is moving along toward her self-set goals. After six weeks the women involved evaluate their needs and decide if they wish to continue meeting.

There also are get-togethers of all the women in the network which the founders say are "energy producing."

The fee for the program also covers a monthly newsletter in which the directors list area activities that might be of interest to network members. It also includes any job openings called to the attention of the directors.

# This witch casts spell in kitchen

I'm an Emily's witch, riding my broom,  
Love and affection, I'll bring to this  
room.  
Pots boiling over, a thing of the past.  
With my kind of magic good fortune will  
last.

I'll keep burnt foods and bad coffee  
away,  
For I'm the good kitchen with witch  
And I'm here to stay!

If you want to brew coffee that brings  
requests for second cups, it may not de-  
pend on the brand of beans in your kit-  
chen.  
If you want to cook and never burn

the recipe, it may depend on what is in  
your kitchen.  
Hanging in growing numbers of local  
kitchens is a bit of black magic called a  
kitchen witch.

She's become a crafty way to cast a  
spell over the kitchen to insure success  
in culinary endeavors.  
At their Christmas craft workshop,  
members of Baseline Questers antiques  
study group took time out from serious  
antiquing to make the little witches that  
are becoming a popular kitchen adorn-  
ment.

More in the spirit of fun than sorcery,  
the members followed instructions of  
Emily Miller to create their own kit-  
chen witches, little cornstalk figures  
with dried apple heads bobbing on  
broomsticks.

Mrs. Miller collected materials with  
treated corn husks and "hair" coming  
from Frank's crafts department. She  
mentions that corn husks from the  
fields could be used but that they would  
have to be soaked first in water and  
glycerin.

If you have scraps of calico on hand,  
she says, the little witch can be made  
for a total investment of about 50 cents.

It could be a holiday project for  
youngsters looking for "something to  
do"

- First peel a crabapple or a yellow  
delicious variety apple, carving out a  
face with prominent nose. Soak in  
lemon juice 45 minutes and string on a  
wire to dry, inserting cloves for eyes.  
("Every time I passed by, I'd give the  
nose a pinch," recalls Mrs. Miller.)

- Attach head to a sucker stick,  
securing with household glue. (Sobo-  
type was used.)

- Twist a pipe cleaner around neck to  
make arms.

- Use light-colored button thread to  
attach corn husks to arms and body,  
forming a hula-like skirt.

- Attach husks to another stick to  
make a broom in the same manner, us-  
ing glue as well as thread.

- Cut a piece of fabric with pinking  
shears four-inches wide by 13-inches  
long and gather along one long edge for  
skirt. Cut a triangle about four inches,  
by four, by six for a head scarf.

- Glue "hair" on apple head, giving  
witch whatever character you wish.  
(Mrs. Miller chose gray hair available  
at Frank's.) Attach kerchief.

- Insert broomstick under skirt.
- Cut from a black piece of material  
a cape triangle, gathering the long edge  
and attaching at neck.

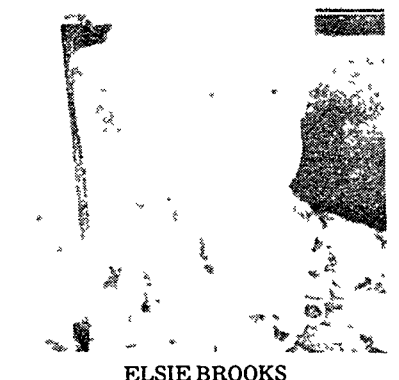
Mrs. Brooks was born November 20, 1879, to Lester and Louella Lyke in Novi Township.

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## Juniors dominate top selections

## All-area girl cagers a talented bunch

Let's call them "the graduates." They're the players who have graduated from selection to the Sliger Home Newspapers' all-area girls' basketball team and have made the difficult transition from high school to the college roundball game.

Among them are Whitmore Lake's Jill Longanecker, a sophomore at Arizona who was named her team's most valuable player last year while averaging nearly 17 points and more than seven rebounds per game; and from last year's Sliger all-area team, Walled Lake Central's Patti Limb, now playing for Eastern Michigan University, and Brighton's Lori Skinner, now applying her hardcourt skills with Northern Michigan University.

It's difficult to predict college stardom, but it seems a safe bet that some members of this year's Sliger all-area team will someday be making their marks on the collegiate level, just as their predecessors have done.

The fourth annual all-area squad, picked by Sliger Home Newspaper sports editors, won't take a back seat to any team in the talent department. And four of the first five players are only juniors.

Heading the first team honor squad are Peg Harte of Brighton, Barb Striz of Whitmore Lake, Chris Magnant of Hartland, Janeen Wiltse of Pinckney and Sandy Snow of South Lyon.

Second team members include Walled Lake Central's Wendy Kilty, Jacque Nixon of Northville, Linda Hock of South Lyon, Tracy Sobkow of Novi and Donna Grote of Howell.

Tapped for third team were Jane Siedlik of Hartland, Tina Kuhn of Pinckney, Amy Rembisz of Walled Lake Central, Cindy Hart of Walled Lake Western and Sandra Hennings of Whitmore Lake.

Fourteen other area cagers received honorable mention in the selections.

They included Lori Giorgio of Novi; Sue Townsend and Melinda House of Northville; Loreen Rugel of South

Lyon; Lisa Gomez and Val Broker of Brighton; Tammi Haas of Howell; Shelly Darrow of Pinckney; Kelli Hunter of Hartland; Janet Wilson, Tracy Grubb and Kris Mellema of Walled Lake Western; and Denise Drefts and Jen Rice of Whitmore Lake.

## First team

One all-area first team member who definitely won't be playing college basketball in 1980 is Brighton's PEG HARTE.

That's because she's only a junior, but Brighton is saying thank goodness for transfers after the Bulldogs received her last year from Livonia Ladywood.

During her inaugural season with Brighton, Harte pumped in 22 points per game to lead her team in scoring while hauling down seven rebounds and six steals per contest.

This year the 5-8 junior also led her team in scoring, but with highly inflated numbers. Harte surpassed the 40-point barrier three times this season while averaging an amazing 31 points per game over the 21-game schedule. She canned 52 percent of her field goal attempts while averaging 10 caroms and 6.4 steals.

This year marks the second season in a row for Harte as an all-area selectee and she was a unanimous choice for all-Kensington Valley Conference honors. Harte will most probably pop up on several all-state ballots.

The only senior on this year's first team is BARB STRIZ of Whitmore Lake. And she's a good one with aspirations to play college ball.

The 5-6 guard led the Trojans to a 20-5 record as Whitmore Lake advanced all the way to the state Class D tournament semi-finals before losing.

Along the way, Striz averaged 15 points a game, seven rebounds and six

steals. Her coach called her the top all-round player in the Tri-County Conference this year. Striz was a second team all-area choice last season.

The Hartland Eagles surprised a lot of people by grabbing co-championship honors with Brighton in the newly-formed Kensington Valley Conference, and CHRIS MAGNANT was a big factor in the Eagles' rise.

A unanimous all-conference selection, the 5-10 junior paced the Hartland attack with just over 21 points per game while snatching more than a dozen rebounds in conference play.

Hartland achieved its most successful season ever for girls' basketball as the Eagles won their district competition, due largely to Magnant's emergence on the hardwood this fall.

When the time came for the coaches around the Kensington Valley Conference to get together and choose an all-league squad, the top four choices were pretty much cut-and-dried. And one of those cut-and-dried selections had to be Pinckney's JANEEN WILTSE.

The Pirates had a rough season against some very tough competition but Wiltse was one of the shining spots on the year. The 5-10 junior was all over on both ends of the floor, sinking an average of 19 points through the hole every time she stepped onto the hardwood on 47 percent shooting and cleaning the glass at the other end with 5.7 rebounds per contest.

Rounding out the all-area first team is South Lyon's talented junior center, SANDY SNOW. The 6-0 junior averaged 10.8 points and 10 rebounds a game this season.

She led her team in shooting by hitting 46 percent from the floor and 69 percent from the foul line. She also pulled down a third of her team's defensive rebounds over the season.

## Second team

The youth movement also was felt in the second team all-area selections as juniors and a sophomore dominated the squad.

The Walled Lake Central Vikings may have been thwarted in an attempt to secure their third consecutive district crown this fall, but guard WENDY KEELTY sure couldn't be faulted.

The author of a 16-plus scoring average this year, Keelty was the sole unanimous choice among first-teamers when the all-Inter-Lakes Conference squad was named by league coaches recently.

Still only a junior, the 5-7 scoring ace helped lead a rebuilding squad to a 5-3 mark in conference play, good for second place in the circuit. She also rack-

ed up 69 steals.

Synonymous with Howell High basketball this season was the name DONNA GROTE. The 5-8 junior forward was the sparkplug of the Highlander offense with 13.9 points per game while, even though outsized in virtually every contest, working hard under the boards for an average of 14.3 caroms.

While the fortunes of the Howell squad weren't all roses this season, Highlander followers can take heart: Grote will be back next season.

JACQUE NIXON of Northville led the Western Six League in scoring average with 15.6 points a game this season. Playing forward and guard, she was a unanimous all-Western Six selection. And she's only a sophomore.

A 5-5 junior, LINDA HOCK served as South Lyon's quarterback on the

Drefts at center and Jen Rice at guard.

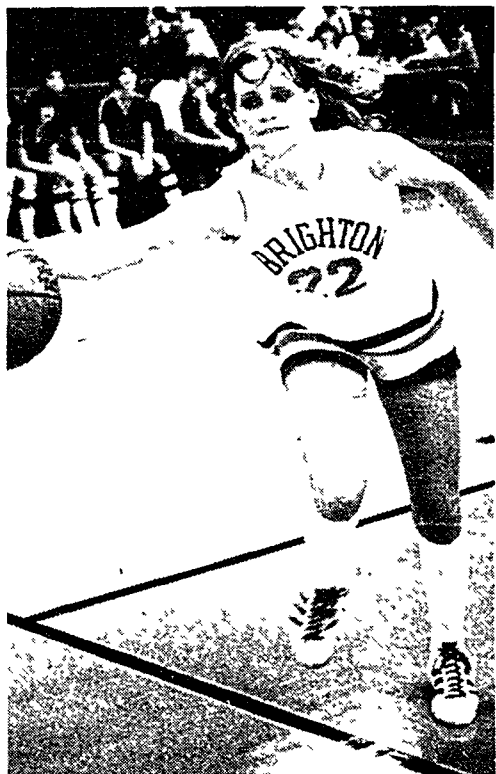
Whitmore Lake carried only two other players on its varsity during the regular season, senior Sherri Housner and freshman Mary Drefts.

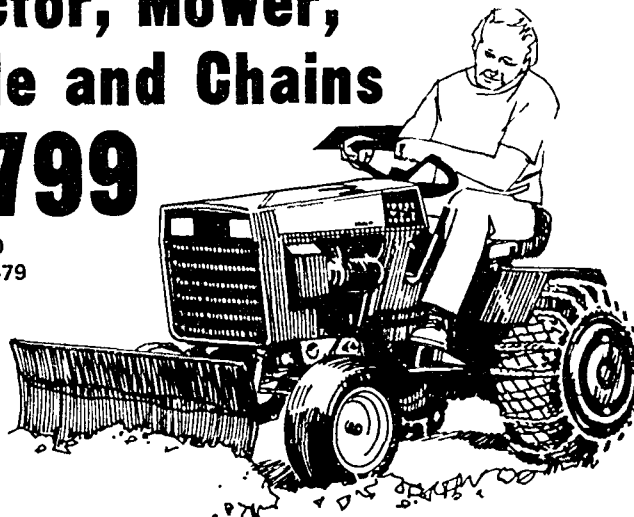

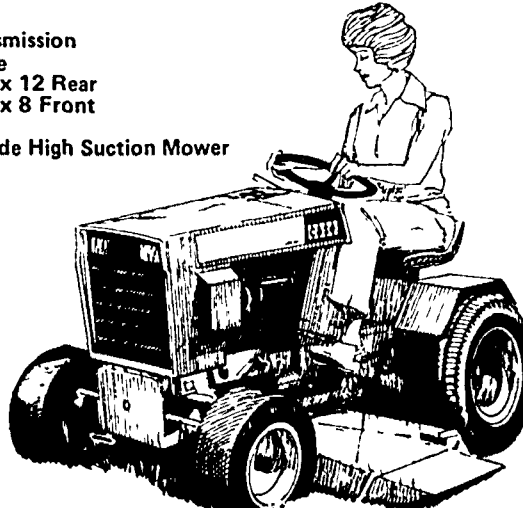

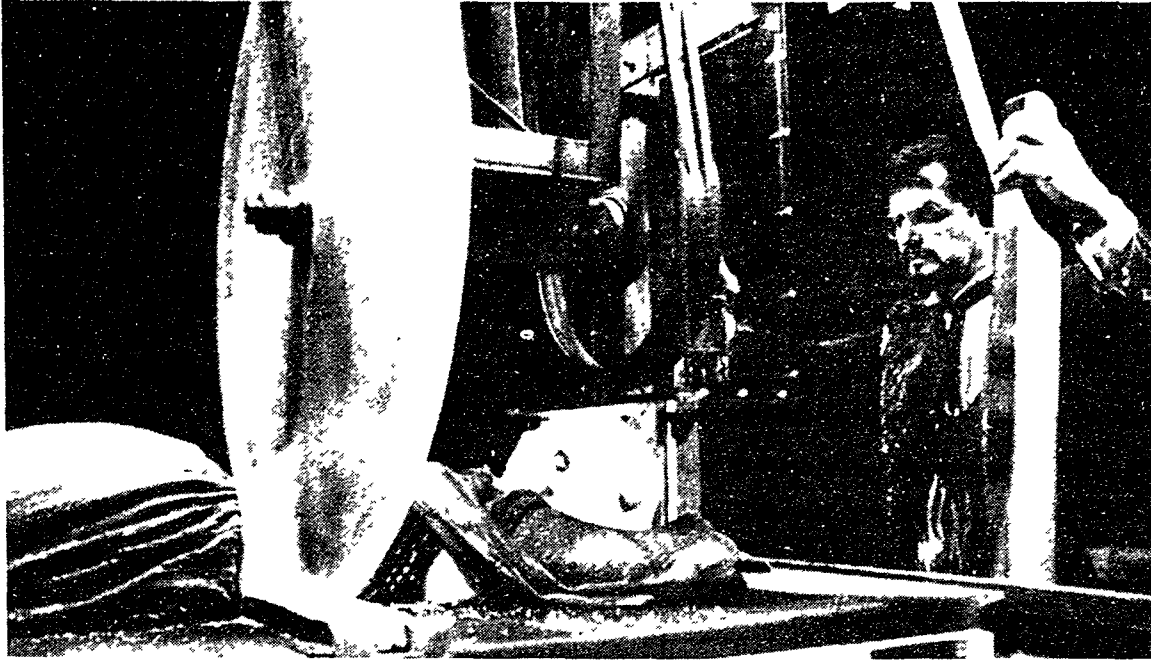
## Blackstone presents magic show

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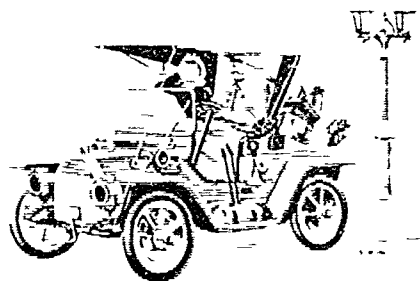
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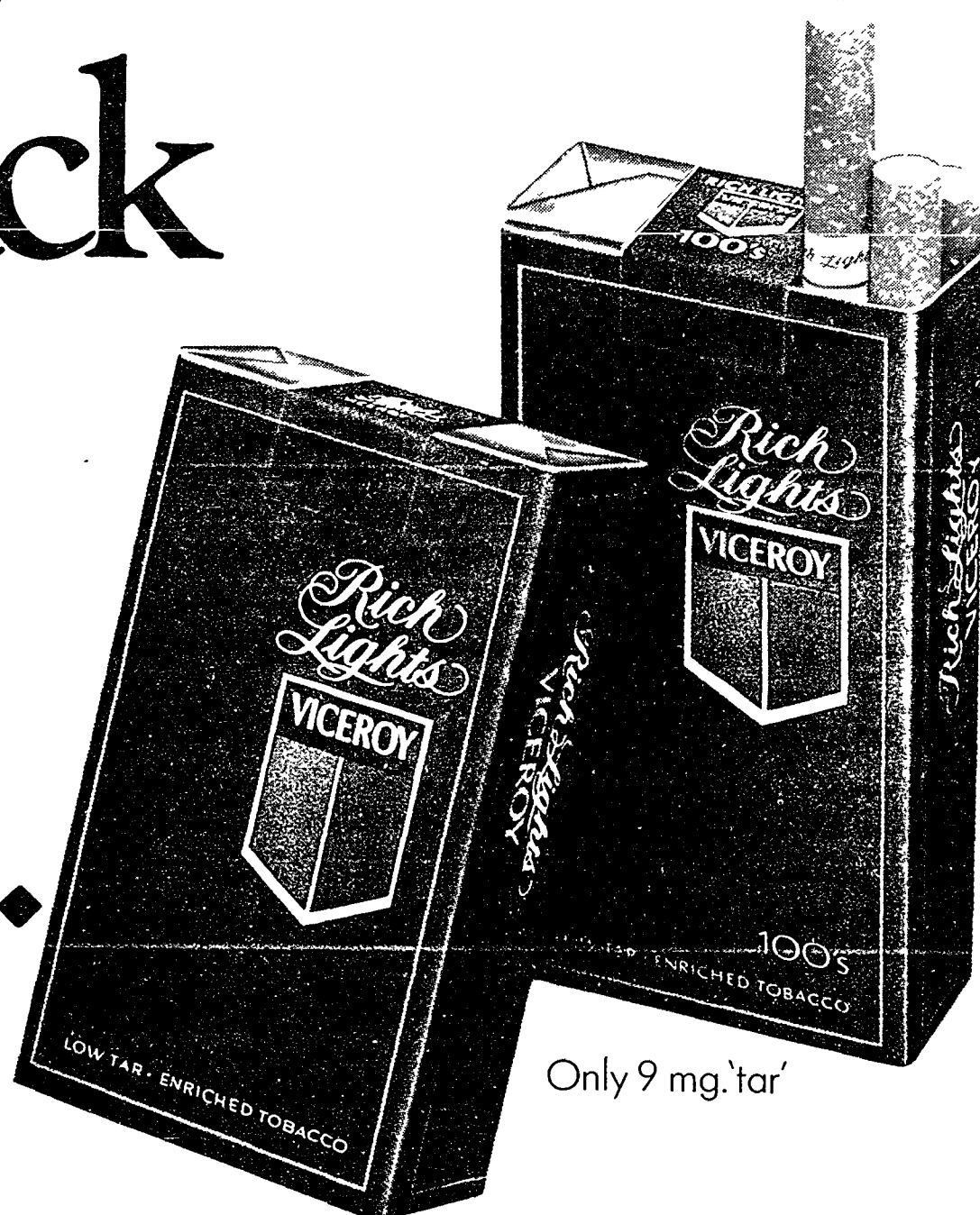
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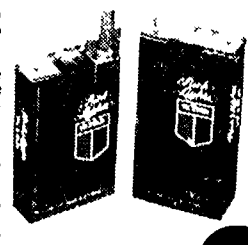
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## Matmen are 10-3 after second week

Brian Mance got the ball rolling by pinning his man at 98 pounds.

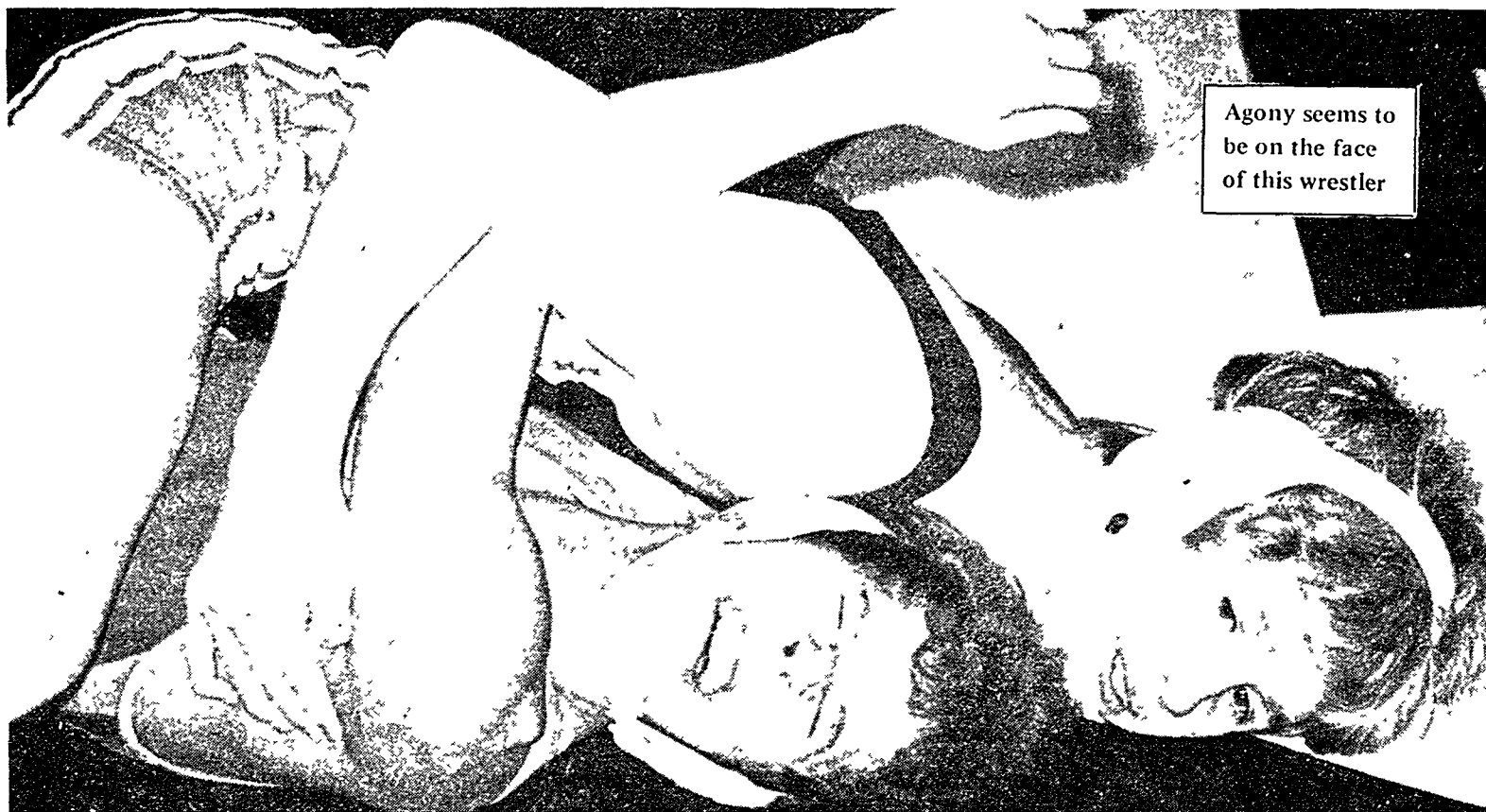
Al Hodgson and Bill Blanchard each won their weight classes by forfeits as the Child squad couldn't provide grapplers at those weights (98 and 105, respectively).

Bob Boshoven did his bit to break the monotony by tying his opponent 2-2.

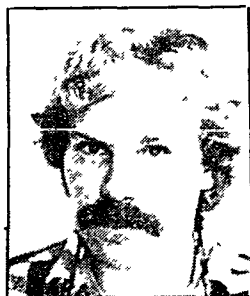
But Neal Young started it right back up again by pinning his foe at 185 pounds. Dan Troher also got heavy and won by a pin at 198 pounds.

## Hoopsters open season with a win

When the Northville boys varsity basketball team finished .500 last year, most people were very pleased.

end of the third period. But Canton was just as persistent and with a minute to go in the game, tied the score at 45-45.

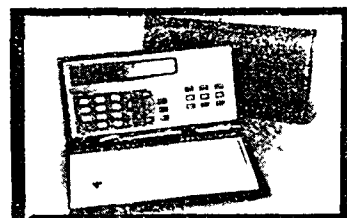
"We came down the court and failed to make a good shot," Lutes said.

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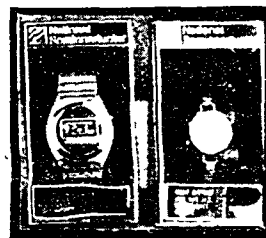
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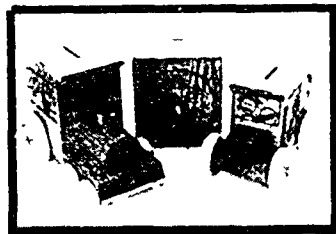
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
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# Cross-country ski areas available

Editor's Note: This concludes the four-part series dealing with cross-country skiing. The first three articles dealt with getting in shape for skiing, purchasing the right equipment, and the proper waxing techniques for your skis. This last article gives information on cross-country ski trails available for your use.

Everything is ready. The snow that fell last night is white, deep and inviting. Your freshly waxed skis stand in the corner begging for use.

After some quick jumping jacks, toe-touches and deep knee bends, the old body is eager for action, also. There's just one problem. Where do you ski?

One of the big differences between cross-country and downhill skiing is the availability of areas to ski at.

Downhill skiers have everything they need neatly packed up for them in the form of ski resorts such as Mt. Brighton and Boyne Mountain.

Skiers get a series of slopes, chair lifts, rental equipment and even ice-making machines all wrapped up in a convenient little package.

Cross-country enthusiasts, however, have a different operation. Instead of long, steep slopes with built in bumps and obstacle courses, the ideal cross-country course is a long, winding trail that goes through beautiful land and

has only the obstacles which nature has provided.

Most cross-country buffs have a distaste for large crowds, expensive lift tickets, long waiting-lines for chair lifts and second-long runs down icy slopes.

For the unimaginative, finding areas to cross-country ski would present a problem. But for those with a little assertiveness and imagination, the possibilities are endless.

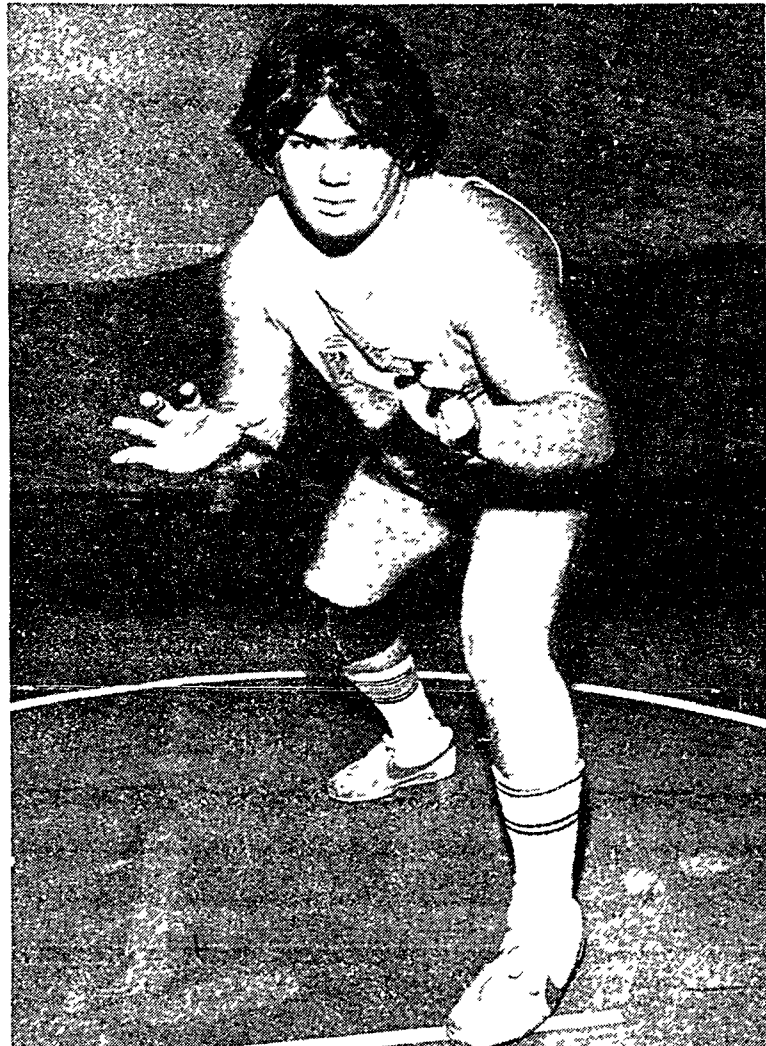
It would be incorrect to say that cross-country skiers don't have the same type of package-resort option open to them. They do.

There are a number of man-made cross-country trails at area parks and golf courses that are manicured and maintained by staff. Some even have resort-like atmospheres with chalets and lounges for vacationing skiers.

One such place is Ken-Mar, located north of Grayling on Rt. 27. Located on Lake Otsego, Ken-Mar offers trails that wind through 140 acres of white birch and hardwood forest. The trail system covers over 18 kilometers and is groomed daily.

Free lessons are offered there by instructors and there is rental equipment available. Skiers not renting equipment must pay a modest trail fee, but guests

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# Tankers sink at Bentley meet

First-year Northville swim coach, Pete Talbot, proved to be a master of the understatement when he summed up the Mustangs' season opener against Bentley.

He said the affair wasn't a classic Northville swim meet. How true. Northville lost 109-62.

Going into the season with the express goal of regaining the Western Six title from Plymouth Canton, the Mustangs had high hopes Thursday at Bentley.

But those high hopes were soon washed aside by the wake of the Bentley swimmers.

Northville failed to take a first in any event in the dual meet. The best the Mustangs could manage were nine second-place finishes out of 11 events.

Dave MacDonald tallied three second places for Northville while Char Ramsey, Tony Nader, Gary Lauber, and Lorne Demrose each placed second twice.

Bentley jumped out in front at the start by winning the 200-yard medley relay with a time of 1:50.3. Northville's team of Lauber, Nader, MacDonald and Demrose just missed winning, posting a 1:50.7.

Ramsey clocked in at 2:00.9 in the next event, the 200-yard freestyle. But it was second best to the Bentley time of 1:58.5.

The best Northville could do in the 200-yard individual medley was Nader's third-place time of 2:19.4. Bentley's winning time was 2:05.3.

MacDonald recorded his second second-place finish while competing in the 50-yard freestyle. His time of 23.5 just missed beating Bentley's 23.3.

In the diving competition, Northville ace Paul Cooper took second seat by compiling a score of 212.66 to Bentley's winning tally of 230.75.

In the 100-yard butterfly, MacDonald notched his third second-place finish by touching the wall at 59.9. Bentley's winning time was 58.5.

Demrose turned the number two trick next as he clocked in at 58.26 in the 100-yard freestyle. Bentley won the race with a time of 52.37.

In the 500-yard freestyle, Ramsey was just behind the Bentley time of 5:25.5, taking second with a 5:37.6 finish.

Lauber took second in the 100-yard backstroke with a time of 1:04.6. The winning time was 1:02.7.

Nader's 1:06.7 in the 100-yard breaststroke was enough to ensure the Mustang swimmer a second-place finish behind the winning time of 1:03.1.

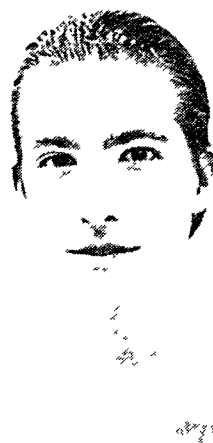

## Area prep hockey not likely soon

For a long time it has generally been accepted that, on the national level, there are four major sports in this country: baseball, football, basketball and hockey. These activities have consistently been the big money-makers throughout the years.

Granted, it would be impossible to ignore the growth of some sports — such as soccer and racquetball — which have shown signs of perhaps becoming major means of recreation (and revenue) in the future. But for the time being, that quartet reigns as king.

On the high school level, however, the scene is a bit different. While football and basketball are the major prep sports, in many cases baseball takes a back seat. And more often than not, hockey doesn't even exist.

This area is no exception to that general rule. In Novi, Walled Lake and Northville high schools, there is no such thing as hockey. What's more, chances are that the sport won't become a reality in the near future in any of those institutions.

The obvious question is, why? To get the answers, we interviewed the athletic directors at all three schools. What resulted was the conclusion that hockey's absence from the high school scene can most accurately be attributed to two major factors — lack of interest and lack of money.

In explaining the reasons for not having a hockey program at Novi High School, A.D. John Osborne first cited a survey taken there just a couple of weeks ago. In that poll, which drew 70 volunteer student respondents, only 11 boys and a girl expressed a desire to see hockey.

"There just hasn't been enough interest," Osborne reported. "I think part of the reason for that is the fact that there are so many limitations in high school hockey. For one thing, the laws say you can only play with one team only, and this has to be somewhat of a deterrent."

"Also," Osborne continued, "you can play 50 or more games in recreational hockey leagues. But again, under Michigan law, there's a limit of 22 in high school."

Osborne further pointed out that cost played a big role in the shunning of the ice sport in schools, citing expense factors like the initial cost of such a program venture in terms of layout and uniforms. "Also, there's always ice time, which is something else entirely," he offered.

"We've rented the Novi Ice Arena before for things like student-faculty games," Osborne said. "But it costs \$55 an hour to do it."

The Novi athletic director said he is aware of the fact that some schools, including Brighton, Howell and Hartland, have hockey programs. But he also mentioned that in every such instance that he knows of, the clubs are supported in name only and team funds are privately raised.

"A lot of people like hockey, and we have a lot of people around here who play it," Osborne concluded. "But we've never had a hockey team, and right now it doesn't look like there'll be one here for awhile."

In Walled Lake, Athletic Director Tom Evans shared the same opinion.

"It seems like there's less and less interest in hockey every year around here," the Central and Western sports head said. "I don't hear as much about it as I did, say, 10 years ago."

"There just hasn't been any kind of demand for it," he emphasized. "In fact, no one's approached me about it in the last three or four years, with the exception of one individual."

Evans, like Osborne, also admitted that the expense of a hockey program would prove troublesome. And especially in the case of Walled Lake. For unlike Osborne's situation in Novi, Evans has had to contend with three school millage failures during this calendar year.

"We've had enough trouble just keeping our heads above water with the programs we have," Evans noted. "Even if the interest was there, we just couldn't contend with it financially at this time."

Meanwhile, Northville High Athletic Director Ralph Redmond also cited the money and interest factors. But he then mentioned a potentially troublesome

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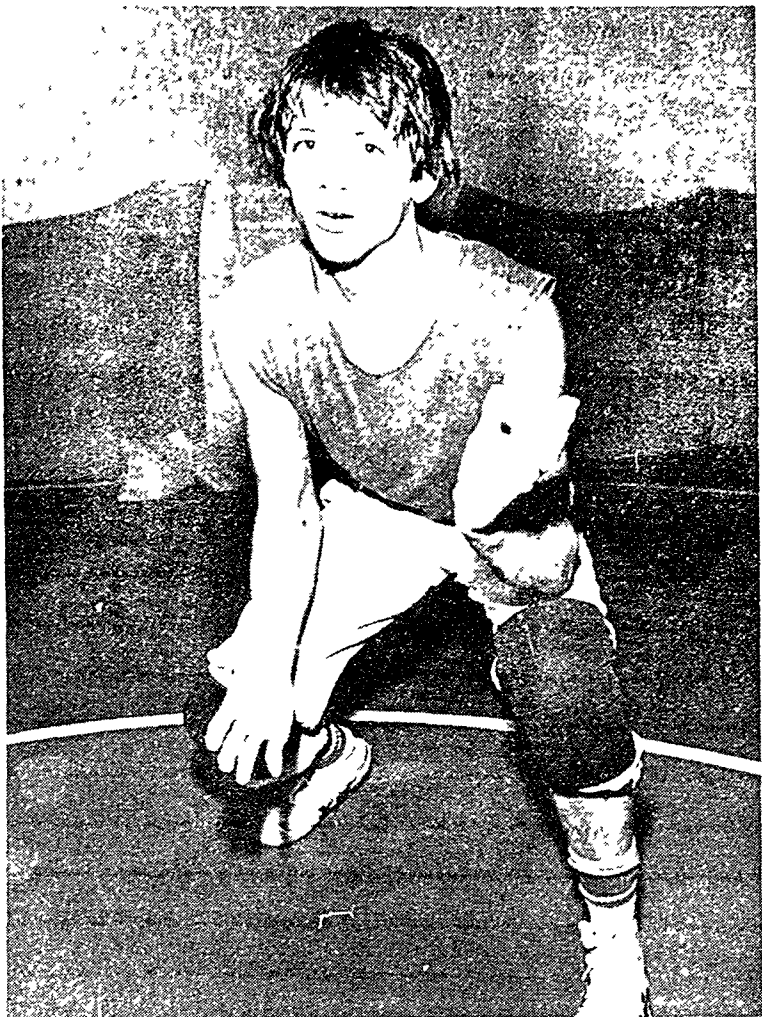

Classes of Mrs. Rondello, Bill Lenz, Gary Hukka and Donna Hicks participated in the sale.

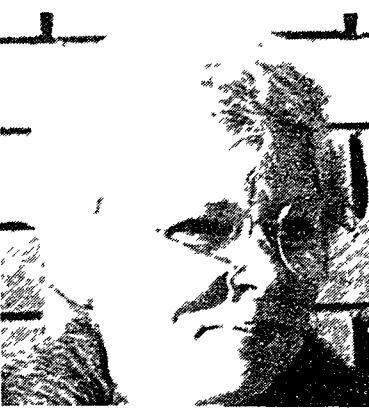
Students sold cookies, candy and Kool-Aid to teachers and classmates, charging between five cents and 40 cents, Mrs. Rondello said.

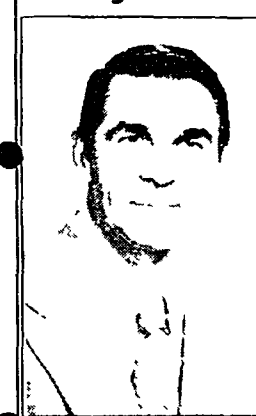

at the lodge ski free. The lodge is set on a hillside four miles south of Gaylord, and four hours north of Detroit on I-75.

One of the big events of the winter is the Ken-Mar Classic race which is slated for February 23.

If traveling north for your skiing pleasure is a bit more involved than you want, there are a number of area trails available.

The area course with the longest trail system is Maybury State Park, located two miles east of I-275 via Eight Mile. There are several loops (trails) available that together total 18 miles.

The loops aren't maintained by park staff. The area is included in 940 scenic acres. The terrain is suited best for

novice skiers as the course is over gently rolling hills. There is a trail fee, pro shop, rental shop and warming area available.

The next largest course is at Kensington Metropark, located six miles east of Brighton on I-96. There are six maintained loops that cover 14 miles within 3900 acres of flat to rolling and hilly area.

The trails are rated for novice and intermediate skiers with a pro shop, rental shop and warming area available.

The Brighton Recreation area, located four miles southwest of Brighton off Teahen and Bishop Lake Roads has two loops that cover seven miles. These are not maintained. In all, the course is made up of 1000 acres that are rated for novice and intermediate skiers.

Hudson Mills Metropark, located 12 miles northwest of Ann Arbor on the Huron River, is made up of 935 acres of hilly, forested terrain that is best suited for novice skiers.

You may be wondering if there are any courses suitable for expert skiers. There are, but these are located a bit north of this area.

The beauty of cross-country skiing is that you are not limited to park courses as downhill skiers are to resort slopes. With cross-country skis, you just plop them down wherever you think it is appropriate, and go.

If you think you are an expert, find some terrain that looks particularly challenging, and have at it.

With cross-country skis there are very few places that you cannot go.

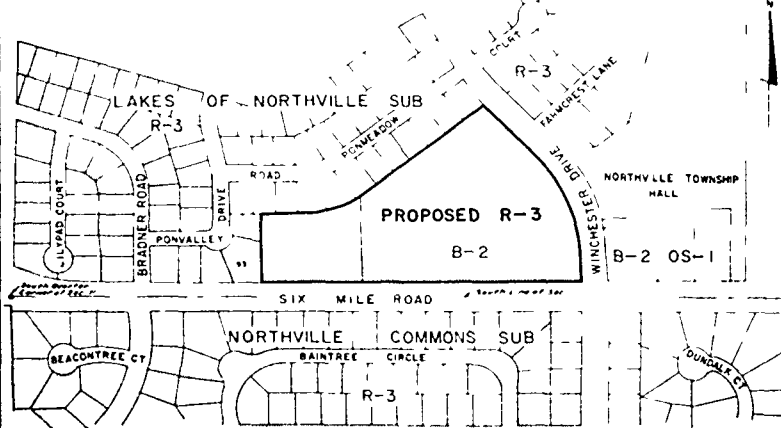

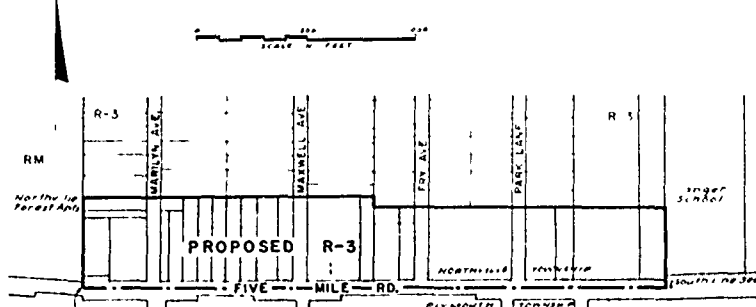

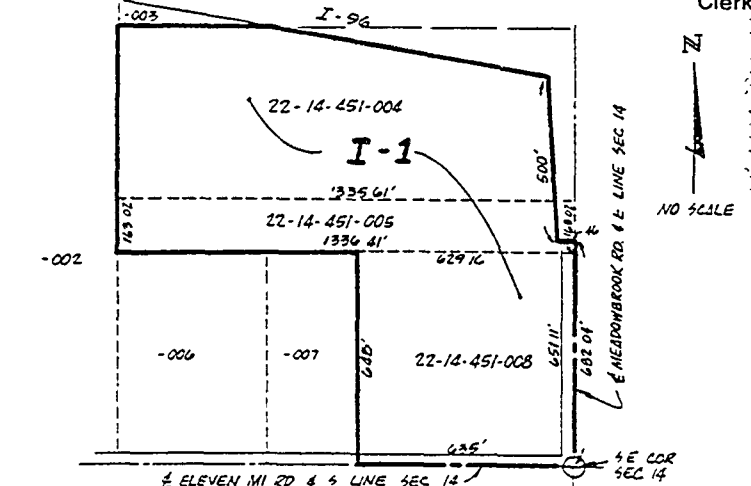

aspect of starting a hockey program that wasn't touched upon by his counterparts — namely, security difficulties.

"People just walking into the arena off the street could cause a real problem," Redmond said. "Some security and game management would be necessary, and that would also be an

expense to deal with."

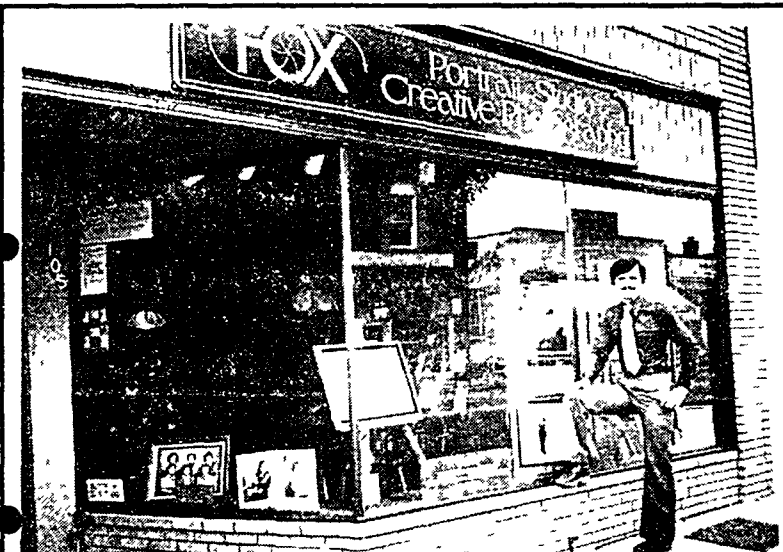
In addition to the other expense hassles noted by Osborne and Evans, Redmond cited the big equipment bill which would accompany a hockey program. "Uniforms, pads, skates and sticks — you add those to ice-time costs, transportation costs and security costs and you've got an expensive situation."

The Northville A.D. said that one alternative to the problem of expensive equipment is to go to more limited pro-

grams, in which players would have to provide their own skates, pads, etc. However, he quickly added, the other problems would remain nonetheless.

"Unless you've got your own ice arena on campus, you really have problems," Redmond concluded. "We just don't see the urging right now...you need a community that will support hockey, and I don't think that's the case at this time."

"For now, it's got to be considered a dead issue."
