## May election on South Main is possibility

An election in May to determine if city voters want to share the cost of resurfacing South Main is a distinct possibility.

City council will decide an election date probably at its next meeting.

Council conclusion that an election is a necessity if the resurfacing is to become a reality followed the report of the city's bonding consultant, Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone.

Basically, the report suggested that the city could use its anticipated street fund monies but that it would tie up these city monies for a considerable length of time and leave the city with little revenues for any other street work.

"You could issue Motor Vehicle Highway Fund bonds with provision for early call for redemption of the bonds," said George T. Stevenson of the bonding firm. "That, however, would probably make the marketing of the bonds very difficult, and it would almost certainly be necessary to offer underwriters a substantial discount on the bonds in order to market them."

Given these restrictions, council has informally decided to take the matter to voters.

It has authorized City Manager Steven Walters to discuss with the Wayne County Road Commission the feasibility of developing a contract prior to the election.

According to Walters, it is possible that the city could expedite the resurfacing by persuading the county to begin engineering before the election so that, if the voters approve the GO bond proposal, the project could be completed yet this year — perhaps late next summer or fall.

Actually, the city very probably could finance its 40 percent share of the project with its projected revenues, but the county has indicated that for the next year or two it does not have sufficient monies to fund its 60 percent share. Thus, it is asking the city to fund the entire project, with a contractual agreement by the county to repay its share advanced by the city.

The only other alternative, according to the county, is to delay the project until the county has sufficient monies to budget resurfacing. Meanwhile, the city would have to be satisfied with periodic patching of the roadway.

South Main, from the southern city limits to Griswold, is under the jurisdiction of the county. The remainder of Main Street (through the downtown area) is under the jurisdiction of the city.

According to the road commission, which admits the roadway is badly in need of major overhaul, the project is not a priority one since other county roads are in even worse shape. Under the present county schedule, it may be five years or more before resurfacing could begin — unless the city decides to finance the project.

Pressed by city officials and the Northville Chamber of Commerce to do something immediately, the road commission came up with two plans:

— Reconstructing the existing roadway, including inside and outside curbing at a cost of \$1,435,000.

— Resurfacing the existing pavement and constructing curbing on the median island side only, including drainage, at a cost of \$350,000.

## 'Why weren't we told?' citizens ask

A number of township residents are boiling mad.

A small amount of "assisted housing" has been approved for Swan Harbour Apartments, currently being built on Seven Mile and a second proposed development, Northridge Apartments' Phase III, has applied for a subsidy loan under federal housing programs for some 16 units of the 96 proposed.

Citizen outcry erupted at a regular meeting of the board February 14.

Though the subsidy housing is by no means low-income — tenants must earn between \$13,000 and \$20,000 — some residents are vehemently opposed to federally financed housing.

The main issue, however, is not the housing itself but rather that the residents were never told about it.

"Why wasn't there a public hearing," a Highland Lakes resident asked the board. "We have no objection to new apartments in our subdivision, but why weren't we told that some of them were going to be subsidized?"

"There is an extreme concern over this type of housing and what it will do to our property values," the resident said.

Township Clerk Clarice Sass, who along with the supervisor, was told of the possibility of subsidized housing more than a year ago, told the resident, "This board cannot say to a developer how he should finance his project."

"We have no say of how they get their financing."

Trustee Bill Zapke said that the clerk and Supervisor Don Thomson both knew about the assisted housing long ago.

"The supervisor could have called for a public hearing last April and he didn't," the trustee charged.

The supervisor, though admitting he was aware of the possibility of such housing, says he received no communication of the method of financing except on one occasion in December, 1978 at a meeting with the developers.

The board, at the recommendation of

## 'Birthday plates' stir confusion

Charles Deamud, new manager of the Northville Secretary of State office for driver's licenses and plates, couldn't have come on the scene at a more confusing time.

Ever since he arrived at the office at 42357 Seven Mile in Northville Mall shopping center with A & P, the beginning of February, Deamud has been busy explaining the new vehicle licensing system which will result next year in license plates expiring on the owner's birthday.

Because the system is in motion to take effect on birthdays in 1981, license plate fees vary by birthday this year.

But all passenger cars, warns Deamud, need tabs by March 31 this year. Commercial vehicles and trailers must have the tabs by the end of this month.

Most large commercial vehicles, motorcycles and personalized plates are not included in the new birthday registration.

Deamud points to a large sample license plate in the office on Seven Mile to show how the two tabs given automobile owners are applied. The lower left corner of the rear plate will have the owner's birth month while the lower right corner will have the date.

From now on, explains Deamud, everyone will have his or her birth month on his plate.

"At least it's not your birth year," commented one purchaser.

Michigan is changing to year-round vehicle registration based on birthdays to eliminate lines every March and reduce cost of operation.

"If you forget that you're to buy your plates on your birthday," Deamud says, "you will be reminded with a renewal notice 45 days prior to that birthday."

For this year, and this year only, fees are staggered with some for less than a year and others for longer.

"For example," says Deamud, "if your birthday is in February, this time you are buying a plate for 10 months to last until your 1981 birthday."

April is the break-even month. Those born in other months will pay more or less than a year.

Deamud replaces Mary Spearman as branch manager. She has been transferred to Ferndale. Deamud was responsible for setting up the dealer plate office in Livonia when special offices to handle dealer plates were instituted in the area. Deamud previously had been in the Redford Township office and lives in Redford.

He's interested in building community awareness of the Northville office and offers to speak to any civic groups about the sometimes-confusing new plate sale.

Residents can take heart, it's only a one-year problem — if you can remember your birthday.

## Senator chides opponent

# Hospital fence plan triggers rift

A citizens advisory council at Northville State Hospital and State Senator R. Robert Geake are on a collision course over the senator's bill for erection of a fence around the hospital.

Geake insists the fence is needed, the council is on record as opposing it — although one local representative on the council no longer shares the council's position.

Creation of the citizens advisory council took place before last year's murder of a Northville woman, allegedly by a hospital escapee. A patient advocacy council, it was created, in the

wake of earlier disclosure of patient mistreatment at the Plymouth Center for Human Development, to promote quality care of mentally ill patients.

A local representative on the council is Russell Amerman, retired superintendent of Northville schools.

Following the murder when local citizens and officials voiced collective alarm about the hospital escapee problems and when Senator Geake proposed the protective fence, the advisory council officially strongly opposed the fence in a letter to the director of the Department of Mental Health, with a copy to the governor.

Subsequently, Amerman reversed his position and informed the council that he no longer shared its opposition to the fence. Amerman, who says that while the fence is generally opposed by professionals involved with mental health, many lay people like himself now see it as a satisfactory means of protecting neighbors of the hospital and of allaying their fears.

"Frankly, I don't think the council had any business opposing or supporting the fence in the first place," he says. Other committee members agree — but the formal opposition, written in July of last year, still stands and some of its members continue to speak out against the fence. Geake wants the council to rescind its letter of opposition.

Replying to a critical letter written to him by council member Beverly McAninch of Plymouth, Geake said, "If you truly believe, as you wrote to me, that your committee 'has no role in deciding what will or will not be done in regard to a fence' then I would urge you to take yourself out of the controversy by rescinding your letter of opposition..."

In her February 11 letter to Geake, McAninch said the fence would be ineffective, that escapees from the hospital are "very few in number," that they are not dangerous to neighboring homes — most of which were built after the hospital's establishment, and that the senator should stop wasting taxpayer money by sending her statistical data about the number of hospital escapees.

Geake, who insists patients at the hospital are potentially dangerous to neighbors, wrote McAninch:

"Your comment about homes near the hospital having been mostly built after the hospital was established surprises me. Does this mean that you believe the state has no responsibility for the safety of citizens who build homes on land they have purchased if they were careless enough to buy near a state hospital? Does it mean that citizens should naturally expect to have patients invade their yards and homes and steal their property, occasionally

assaulting them, because the hospital is nearby?"

The senator then noted that the house in which the murdered woman lived was built in 1929 — 23 years before establishment of the hospital.

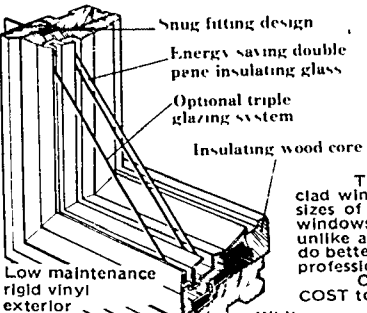

## Legislators predict rough school year

Education faces an austere year ahead, area legislators told the Northville Board of Education last week.

U.S. Representative Carl Pursell, State Senators R. Robert Geake and Doug Ross, and State Representative Jack Kirksey met with Northville school administrators for breakfast Friday to discuss state and federal bills about education.

Pursell told the administrators that the federal education budget probably will rise about three percent, while Geake said the state education budget probably will rise five percent.

But the lawmakers had most concerns about tax limitation amendments, the public employee strike legislation, and the comparative weakness of education management when compared to teachers' unions.

"There are clearly a lot of issues but the proposed Tisch amendment would have the most profound affect on local education," Ross said.

Robert Tisch is hoping to get his tax limitation proposal back on the ballot for the November election. It is more drastic than the current Headlee amendment and would limit property assessments to increases of only two and a half percent a year.

Because school districts are paid for by local property taxes Ross said the Tisch amendment would have serious consequences if passed.

"It would be devastating," Ross said. "There would be no way to keep up with inflation. Apply two and a half percent annual increase over a decade and your buying power would be cut."

Ross called for school boards to muster an early fight against the Tisch amendment.

The biggest concern of Pursell was what he called "power politics of education."

"Educational power politics is on the side of labor and the school boards are coming out the losers," he said. "With all due respect, if school board members think they are running the school district they are naive."

Pursell said while teacher's unions grow more powerful and federal money is allotted for specialized programs instead of general fund, school management's position is losing ground.

"You're left holding an empty bag," he said.

Geake and Kirksey said the package of five bills legalizing public employee strikes have passed the house and now await action in the state senate.

"The governor's position is critical. He has supported the concept of public employee strikes if there are sufficient sanctions," Kirksey said.

The package of bills, which would legalize teacher strikes within certain perimeters, is in the senate labor committee.

"I give it a fifty-fifty chance to die in the senate," Geake said. "If there are no major teacher strikes this spring it may die."

"I think a bill will pass for certain and if there is not much change from the house version the governor will sign it," Ross predicted.

Kirksey said the Michigan Education Association, AFL-CIO and other groups are lobbying heavily for the package in the senate and in Governor William Milliken's office.

The Michigan Association of School Boards is against the legalization of public employee strikes.

## Swienckowski to serve as recreation liaison

Township Trustee John Swienckowski will serve as the board liaison to the Northville Recreation Commission until his term expires in November.

The board last Thurs-

day named Swienckowski to replace David Mitchell, who recently moved to San Francisco.

The board also must name a member at large, but tabled any action until the next meeting.

Board members are considering adoption of a policy limiting the number of years a person may serve on a board or commission, in an attempt to prevent the same people from serving year after year.

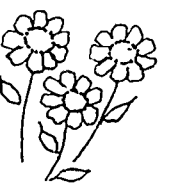

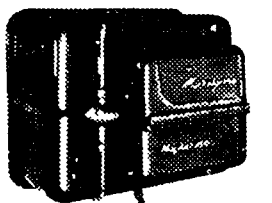

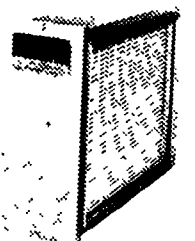

# High schools to teach 'life-role competencies'

"There (should be) a major emphasis on establishing a closer tie between the subjects taught in high schools and the skills one needs to have in order to function as adult..."

Northville students soon may get a helping hand by learning "life-role competencies" at school. Educators say that though students are forced to grow up quickly in this society, they are not actually ready to handle adult roles when they get out of high school.

So the state has given Northville and nine other school districts \$7,000 grants to plan how to merge instruction in four "life-role competency" areas into the regular curriculum.

"We want to broaden our responsibility from just giving students preparation for higher education," said Assistant Superintendent for Instruction Nancy Soper. "This grant will help students gain meaningful experience and skills they need for successful transitions from high school to the adult world."

A state committee has set down four "life-role competencies" which the district must try to integrate into the regular classroom.

The competencies are: personal and family management; civic and social responsibilities; aesthetic and humanistic appreciations; and

employability and occupational skills. If students are taught to be competent in these areas at an early age then they will bridge the gap from high school to adulthood more easily, stated a Michigan Department of Education proposal.

No new curriculum will be introduced into Northville's school system without study, Soper told the Northville Board of Education February 11.

"This is rather timely to study where we are, where we are going and how we are going to get there," Soper said.


Though the board voted to accept the need for it.

"The writings on this really indicate what education is all about," said Treasurer Charles Peltz. "But these are the things we should be doing on an on-going basis."

"Will our students benefit from this?" Trustee David Llewellyn asked. "Definitely," Soper replied. The "life-role competencies" study is only part of a larger state proposal to improve high school instruction in Michigan.

The state wants to identify those

students who need academic help by tenth grade so they can catch up to their fellow students by the time they graduate. The proposal also stressed providing options besides college-prep at high school and working with businesses to make the high school-job market transition smoother.

## Two more planners named in township

Beginning in April, the seven men currently serving on the township planning commission will have to make room for two women.

The township board February 14 named Dorothy Gay and Pat Wright as the eighth and ninth members of the commission.

The appointments are a result of action by the township board of trustees in July, 1979, expanding the current seven-member commission to nine.

Though the vote to add new members was not unanimous — Clerk Clarice Sass and Trustees Bill Zapke and John Swienkowski were opposed — the motion to appoint Gay and Wright was passed 7-0.

The two new commissioners' terms will expire December 1, 1982. Wright, active in the

## Eddie Stinson

# The 'dean of the flyers' built planes in Northville

Eddie Stinson, some say, spent more

hours in a plane than any other pilot of his time.  
It is estimated that Stinson, who

became known as the "dean of the flyers," in his 14 years of flying, traveled some 1,500,000 miles in the air.

Stinson, who thrilled many with his daring stunts, was known not only for his flying, but for the planes he built,

beginning in Northville in 1926.

Stinson, with 15 men formed the nucleus for the Stinson Aircraft Company, which was a pioneer in the field of cabin planes.

The Stinson plant, located in one of the buildings which made up the industrial park at the south end of Cady — at what is now Main — in the late 1920's, was the birthplace of the popular Detroit Stinson aircraft.

The airplanes were built at the plant, hauled through town to the test field on what was the Starkweather Farm on Six Mile near Beck, where the wings were attached and the planes tested.

The first outside aid to reach an area in Florida stricken by a hurricane in May, 1926, was delivered in a Detroit Stinson built in Northville.

It carried some \$500,000 in gold for the relief of the afflicted and homeless.

In the spring of 1929 Stinson moved his company, which now employed some 250 men, to the city of Wayne.

Stinson died in a plane crash over

Chicago, January 26, 1932.

But his company, purchased by the Cord Company, built a number of the planes used in World War II.

While Stinson had his manufacturing business in Northville, he drew many famous fliers here.

Among them, Ruth Elder and George Haldeman, whose transoceanic flight attempt ended in a crash in the middle of the Atlantic.

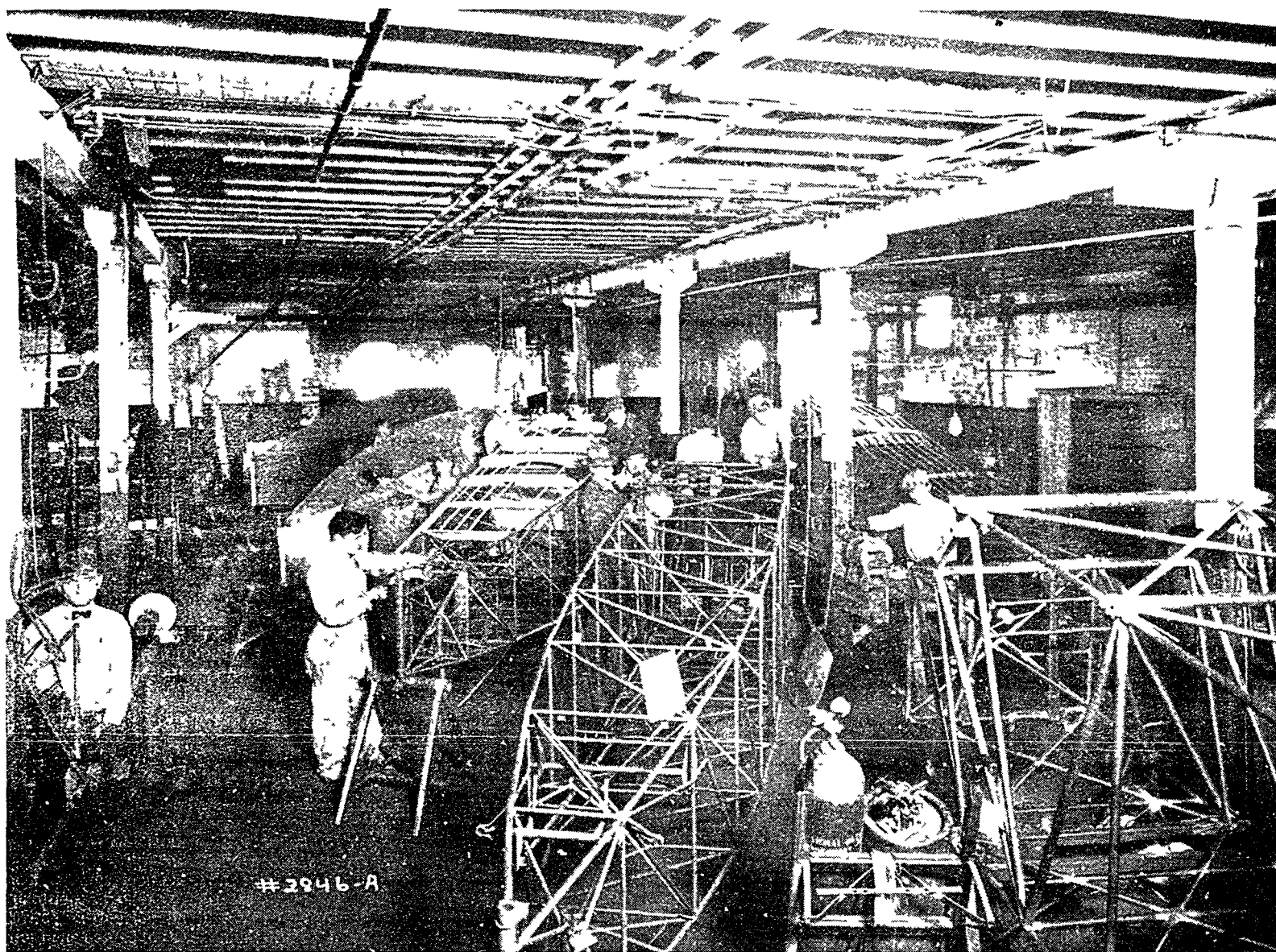
The fliers were rescued by a Dutch freighter.

The "Pride of Brunswick," which carried Schlee and Brock in their trip around the world reportedly also was built at the Northville Stinson plant.

The Stinson Aircraft Company building was demolished in the spring of 1936.

The car wash at Cady and Main and Belanger, Inc. on Cady now stand where the plant once did.

But even though the "dean of the fliers" and his plant are gone, their memories remain.

## Deadline's March 15

### Here's another 'shot' reminder

Any Northville student in ninth through twelfth grade who has not had a measles shot since 1968 or a rubella (German measles) shot since 1969 will be excluded from school after March 15.

"I urge people to re-examine their records," said Health Consultant Marie Robertson. "People are sending back replies saying their children don't need the vaccines. But if they were given before 1968 they will not be accepted by the Wayne County Health Department."

Robertson said there will not be another mailing to Northville homes before the exclusion notices take effect. "People did not read the literature accurately," Robertson said. "The vaccines before

1968 were not adequate. Doctors thought they were but children kept coming down with measles."

Parents who already have sent in records should double-check them, Robertson said. If they have questions they should call her at 349-3400, extension 273.

Students can still get immunized free at clinics to be held February 27 at Meads Mill, February 28 at Northville High School and February 29 at Cooke Junior High.

The Wayne County Health Department requires all ninth through twelfth grade students to be immunized against measles, rubella, tetanus, diphtheria and polio.

## In township

### Optional stages offered developers

The option to develop a subdivision in stages is open to local developers under a new ordinance amendment adopted last week.

Township board members, at their regular meeting February 14, unanimously approved the amendment to the lot averaging section of the township zoning ordinance.

The section, which formerly denied developers the right to record portions of an approved preliminary plat, now reads:

"a plat which utilizes the advantages of the Lot Averaging technique may, following approval of the Preliminary Plat-Stage II, be developed in stages, subject to the provision that no stage taken together with previously developed stages, shall produce a total lot area amounting to less than the con-

ventional subdivision minimum lot area of the zoning district multiplied by the total number of lots developed."

The amendment, proposed by Elro Corporation, developers of the proposed Hills of Northville Subdivision to be located at the northwest corner of Six Mile and Sheldon, also gained the unanimous support of township planners and Wayne County planners.

At a public hearing December 10, 1979, there were no objections to the proposal and George Vilcan, township planning consultant, said the move would benefit the developer without taking any control from the planning commission.

"It gives (the developer) great flexibility and tremendous protection," he said. "It is a real safety valve."

## HS teacher gets tenure

Northville High School teacher Carla Tibble has been granted tenure by the Northville Board of Education.

Tibble, a home economics and speech teacher at NHS, was evaluated four times during her two-year probationary period. The move to grant her tenure was approved unanimously at the board meeting February 11.

Tenure takes effect April 17. Tibble taught five and a half years in Flint, and New Berlin, Wisconsin before coming to Northville. She has a masters degree from Eastern Michigan University.

In other personnel decisions, the school board approved a contract between the district and former operations manager Michael Janchick.

The settlement contract between Janchick and the district covers the time between the end of his administrator's contract with the district and the beginning of his teacher's contract.

Janchick requested reassignment to the classroom October 22. He took vacation time, then was assigned as a permanent substitute teacher. Starting January 4 he was assigned as a full time social studies teacher at Cooke Junior High.

The district also hired Mary Newberg as a special education teacher at Arman. Newberg taught in Taylor, Michigan before coming to Northville. She has a total of 10 years teaching experience.

Newberg has a masters degree from Wayne State University in special education.

# Geake, Kirksey defend reorganization proposal

A state-mandated Wayne County reorganization plan has been praised by State Senator R. Robert Geake (R-Northville) and State Representative Jack Kirksey (R-Livonia) as a reasonable method for the voters of Wayne County to "adopt a sensible form of government."

The two lawmakers' comments came in response to criticism of the legislature's action by Wayne County Clerk James Killeen.

Killeen called the reform measure "a lousy bill" passed to "be unenforceable, to have no effect." He also took issue with a provision allowing a five-man apportionment committee to divide the county into charter commission districts based on the 1970 census.

"Anticipating objections to the use of the 1970 census data, the Senate-House Conference Committee stipulated that the two charter choices drafted by the charter commission would have to be identical except for the manner in which a county executive would be chosen," said Geake.

"As a result, a majority of the charter commissioners being from Detroit will be prevented from drafting a proposal favoring an appointed county manager."

Voters will be given a choice between electing a county executive or having a county manager appointed by the 27-member board of commissioners.

Geake, who served as a member of the joint conference committee, pointed out that since all voters in Wayne County will have an equal voice in making that selection, "there is no advantage to waiting until the 1980 census figures are available to select a charter commission."

Kirksey indicated that the legislature went as far as it could go without calling for a constitutional amendment.

The Michigan Constitution requires that the sheriff, county clerk, county treasurer, register of deeds and prosecuting attorney shall be elected to four-year terms with the duties and powers as provided by law.

"We wanted as much reform as possible without having to go through the lengthy and costly process of amending the state constitution," Kirksey said.

"I am confident that a governmental system with one chief executive, accountable for a balanced budget, will resolve the financial dilemma that Wayne County government is no in."

Kirksey was responding to Killeen's criticism that the bill "protects political interests" rather than reform the county's fragmented government.

Under the state's reorganization

plan, the members of the Wayne County Board of Road Commissioners would be appointed by the county executive subject to approval of the 27 county commissioners.

The present system provides for the road commission members to be appointed to three year terms by the county board with the commission having its own operating budget and being virtually accountable to no one.

"This has created a serious labor relations problem," Geake said. "The road commission, with its earmarked funds, has given cushy contract settlements to its employees that are higher than either state or City of Detroit employees receive for comparable work. This sets a precedent that the board of commissioners has to face during contract talks with unions representing Wayne County employees."



# School staff down, reflecting student dip

Northville counted 185.3 full-time-equivalency K-12 teachers in February, the school district reported last week.

The district's second semester staff count reflected the cuts which were made last spring to combat declining enrollment and a tight budget. The count is down 21 teachers from last year.

Staff for the Institutions' Special Education Program is at 109, down from 118 in September and 126 last year.

The school district will recommend staff levels for fall when they make enrollment projections in April, said Burton Knighton, assistant superintendent for administrative services. If projections are low, some staff may receive layoff notices.

Though enrollment in the K-12 program rose 22 students since

September's count of 3,854, enrollment in the ISEP program dropped 43 students since the beginning of the year to 476, said Burton Knighton.

The district will allow the number of ISEP staff to drop through attrition. But Knighton warned if enrollment drops further the district might have to start laying off ISEP instructional aides.

February figures show there are 70.6 full-time-equivalency K-6 teachers and 83.8 teachers in grades 7-12.

There are 20 full-time-equivalency K-12 special education teachers, 3.4 librarians, six counselors, one director of the gifted program and a half-time director in movement education.

In the ISEP program there are 60 full-time-equivalency teachers, 22 teaching support staff and 27 non-teaching support staff.

## Remodeling progressing well

# June occupancy seen for Annex

The second and third floors of the Annex building on West Main will be ready for occupancy June 1 and the \$1.2 million remodeling project will be completed in July.

Those dates came from architects who are supervising the elaborate reconstruction on the Annex to make it especially fit for the Institutions' Special Education Program's needs.

"The project overall has moved very well," ISEP Director Leonard Resmierski told the Northville Board of Education at its February 11 meeting. "We had a great bit of luck with the weather."

The remodeled building will have an elevator for the handicapped with a loading zone outside so that orthopedic buses can unload wheelchair patients without lowering a ramp, Annex Director Beth Flack said. There will be a soundproof training area for the deaf-blind students and a special room for the emotionally impaired with an

observation window and a padded room.

A dining room will be equipped with an island-type cafeteria line so the handicapped can serve themselves. And there will be a sink area where they can learn to wash dishes, a vocational area to learn about home living, a workshop and a sensory perception training area.

The ISEP staff picked out the colors and textures which are best for "trailing" (so students can touch the wall for guidance as they walk).

This year the ISEP school has been housed on the first floor of the Main Street Elementary school. Flack said though they have managed to teach students there, it has been a tight squeeze.

"There is no staff training room and no office," Flack said. "The hallways have been our training centers and our gymnasium."

# Terminal cancer victim takes his life with gun

The suffering ended last week for George Longert.

The 66-year-old terminal cancer patient, who reportedly told his wife he was "going to end it all" and if she didn't get out he would "take her with him," February 14 took his gun and shot himself in the stomach.

His wife, Marion, after hearing her husband's threats, had gone to a neighbor's and called township police, who were outside the house when the shot was fired.

They found him in the bedroom, lying on his back holding the nine-millimeter semi-automatic pistol to his head.

During a struggle with an officer, the gun discharged in Longert's left wrist. He was taken to St. Mary Hospital where he died of hemorrhagic shock less than three hours later.

Mrs. Longert told police that while her husband was a patient at St. Joseph Hospital — he was released February 4 — he requested that no life-support devices of any kind be used to prolong or save his life because of the cancer.

Longert had been released from Hendry Convalescent Center in Plymouth four days prior to taking his life.

Township police took two rounds of ammunition from the residence, 15421 Robinwood, at Mrs. Longert's request.

They also found a loaded rifle in the attic.

## Our Opinion Walkaways

We understand the professionals' objection to erection of a fence at Northville State Hospital but from the standpoint of safety, for both patients and neighbors, the fence proposal, in our opinion, is sufficiently beneficial to offset the potential patient-staff demoralization that it might produce.

Despite beefed up security measures at the hospital, escapes or "walkaways" continue to occur. According to data compiled by the township police department, 27 escapees were reported in the month of January. Of these, 21 returned but six were still at large at month's end.

And despite arguments to the contrary, we tend to agree with State Senator R. Robert Geake that some of the patients at the hospital are potentially dangerous — even though they may not be formally classed as forensic (criminal) patients.

Frankly, we have grown tired

of the clinical excuses by mental health experts who downplay community responsibility. Promoting patient care at the expense of neighborhood safety is the mark of irresponsibility; it suggests to us that the professional mentality may need some readjustment.

Hopefully, Governor William Milliken soon will sign into law the appropriations bill that will finance the fence. If he does not do so, however, mental health experts may find that in winning a battle they have lost a war. Public support of mental health programs is essential and any erosion of that support, however small, could prove to be far more costly than the fence.

If we read the public's attitude correctly, fence or no fence, the hospital can expect continued close monitoring of the escapee data, and its "experts" most assuredly will be held accountable for any future problems that may occur.

## Nips secrecy

A year ago we took the State Liquor Control Commission to task for callous disregard of the public's right to know something about persons seeking liquor licenses in their communities. Transfer of a liquor license had been approved by the township board without public discussion even though the board, at the time, knew only the name of the applicant.

Since the board had no information and appeared not to care, The Record tried to obtain information about the applicant. Repeatedly, however, the liquor commission refused to disclose even the address of the applicant, insisting that such information is "confidential."

How then can an intelligent appraisal of an applicant be made by the local governing body? the commission was asked. "That's not our problem," was its reply.

The commission saw nothing

wrong with its secrecy policy. But at least one legislator did.

Recently, State Senator Doug Ross, who represents the Oakland County section of Northville, introduced a legislative amendment that would force disclosure of the name, home and business addresses, and home and business phone numbers of liquor license applicants to facilitate local review of new and transfer licenses.

The bill is now on Governor William Milliken's desk for his signature.

Meanwhile, we trust that the township board will no longer hastily approve liquor license applications...that it will review all such applications thoroughly and in public...and that it will do so after and not before investigation by the police department. To recommend approval before police investigation is an invitation to trouble.

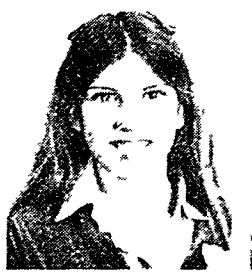
## Hurrah!

I am in favor of a closed campus policy for high schools. In particular, the closed campus policy at South Lyon High School should not be changed.

Besides the fact that a town the size of South Lyon couldn't possibly absorb the masses of students that would hit it in the short amount of time allowed for lunch, many other factors are involved.

An open campus would make it almost impossible for the administration to control the influx of non-students onto the campus.

This would lead to an increase in drug and alcohol traffic. In South Lyon, there is a trespassing ordinance for the area that would have to be enforced to keep former students, students' friends and others from entering.

The safety factor also is important. In South Lyon, police were concerned with the safety of pedestrians

If a student leaves the school building under a closed campus policy and is involved in an accident, then the teacher of the class that he or she should be in is held responsible.

If, however, there is an open campus policy in effect and the student leaves, then his parents and he himself take on the responsibility.

The biggest question which will arise out of the situation will not be whether or not a student will be able to eat at McDonald's, but rather if he can accept the responsibility of going, eating and returning from there within the 35 minutes allowed for lunch at the high school.

Certainly, most 15 to 18 year olds could handle the situation. And surely the students at South Lyon High School are no different than students from other schools with an open campus policy.

Class attendance also would suffer if an open campus policy is initiated. Students might leave intending to return after eating lunch but get detoured and not return for their afternoon classes.

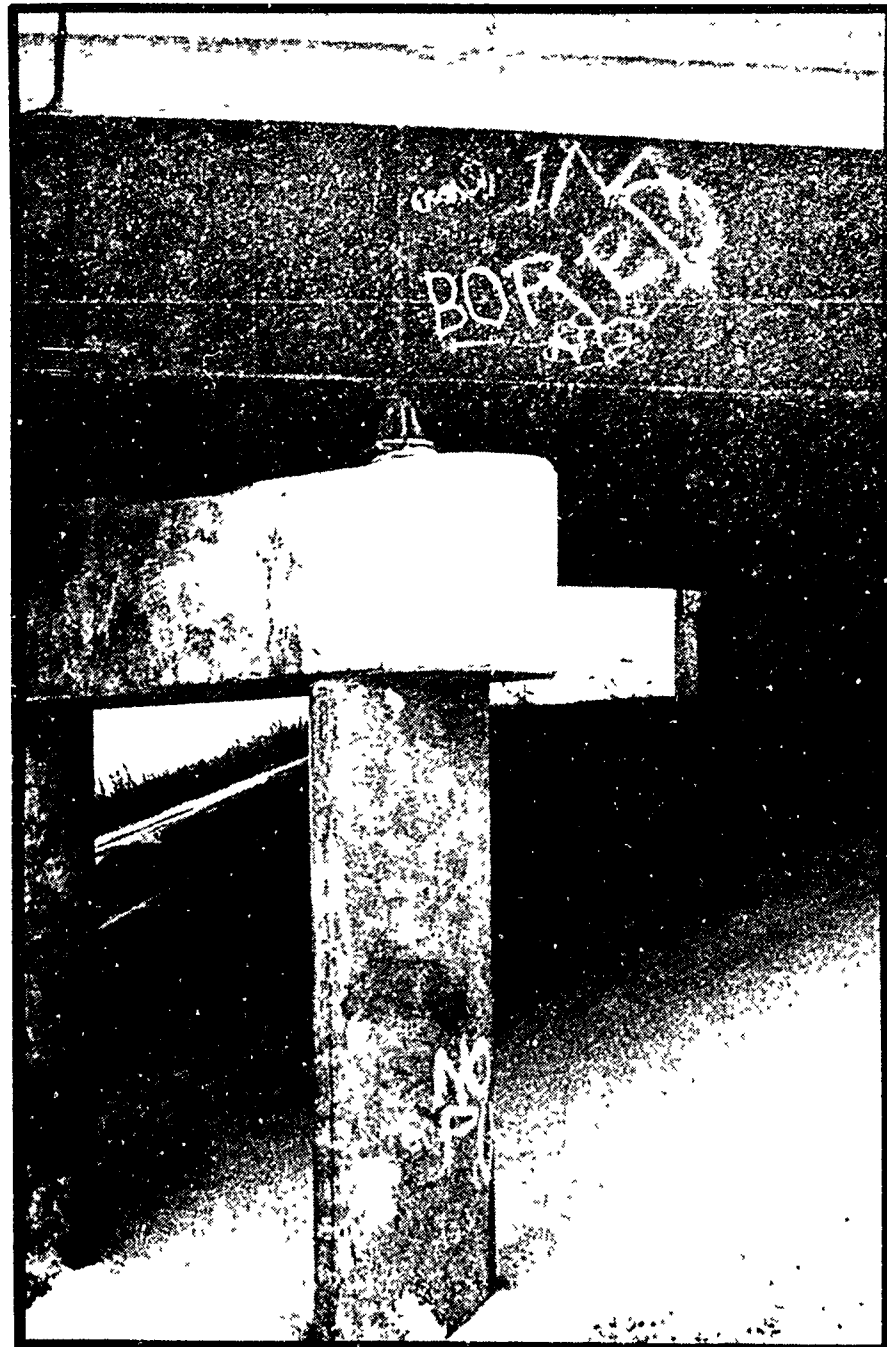
A school's lunch program could be affected, too. The amount of food wasted because of the difficulty in determining the number of students buying lunches each day would prove costly. The price of lunches might increase.

And it was here that the phrases, "Everybody wants to get into da act" and "It's da condishuns dat prevail," were popularized.

### Seeks petition help

To the Editor:

I would like to apprise your readers of our petition drive to repeal the Single Business Tax and to reduce the Personal Income Tax.

We have thousands of petitions out, but we need 229,000 signatures by mid-May to put this proposal on the November, 1980 ballot.

The proposal will repeal the Single Business Tax outright, will forbid the reintroduction of either the inventory tax or the franchise tax, and will replace it with the old corporate income tax at a 10 percent rate with a \$50,000 deduction of these profits. Only corporations will pay, as before, and only those that have profits of \$50,000 or more. The \$50,000 will be indexed to rise with inflation.

The proposal also will cut the personal income tax to 4.4 percent immediately, to 4.2 percent in 1984 and to 4 percent in 1986. It will raise the personal exemption to \$1,800 and will index this to rise with inflation. Further, all retirement income will be banned from taxation by the State of Michigan.

## Park Gardens sewers top priority in 1980

The Park Gardens sewer project — for the third consecutive year — is the top priority for anticipated community development grant monies, township officials announced last week.

At the second of two public hearings February 14, township board members earmarked some \$85,000 of the \$99,000 they hope to receive in 1980 for construction of the badly needed sewer system near Five Mile.

The remaining \$14,000 will be set aside for township planning costs — most likely to pay for publishing of zoning ordinance currently being revised.

But even if the monies expected in 1981 — an additional \$85,000 — are received the township still will not have enough money to complete the project.

"We won't have enough monies unless our allocation is increased," Township Engineer Bill Mosher said. "We will attempt to get some consideration from the EPA and we might be able to get an 80 percent grant."

At the first block grant public hearing January 17, Mosher said the township will need approximately \$600,000 to complete the majority of the project.

This would include the enlargement and rehabilitation of the Northville Forest pumping station; the building of

a pumping station at the lowest point of Park Gardens (southeast corner); and the construction of a collector sewer on Five Mile.

These monies do not include the building of sewers in Park Gardens.

The grant monies, if received, would cover some \$471,000 leaving about \$130,000 yet to be paid for the Five Mile work.

More than likely residents of Park Gardens will end up paying for the completion of the sewers through special assessments.

Mosher assured residents in attendance that the value of their homes would increase "as much as the assessments, at least."

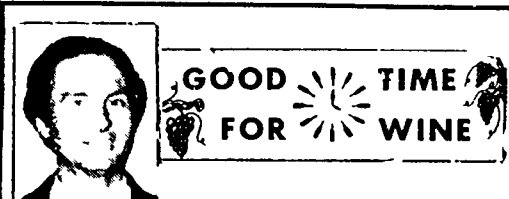
But at least one homeowner in attendance was not satisfied with the engineer's statement.

"This meeting is nothing more than an appeasement," he charged.

Mosher said the collector sewer pipeline and forced main, "hopefully will be completed sometime in 1981."

Other sewer construction likely would not even begin until 1983, the engineer said.

Only some \$29,000 of the grant money has been spent, although more than \$300,000 has been committed to the township for the Park Gardens sewer project.

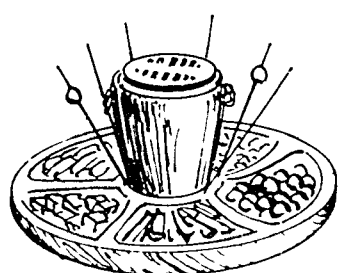

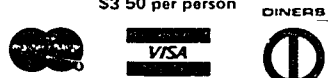

**THE FIRE** that destroyed a minimall, the Penniman Avenue Shops in downtown Plymouth, early Sunday morning was a heart-breaker for Northville's Police Chief Rodney Cannon. Representatives from the Dalby Corporation, developers of the apartment complex, likely will be in attendance as will county representatives involved in processing federally subsidized housing applications.

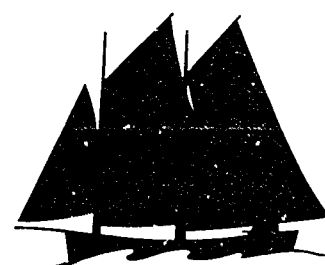

Margaret Zayti, downs recording secretary, Sherryl Comiskey, Downs secretary, and Richard Frederick, publicity director, also welcomed the visitors.

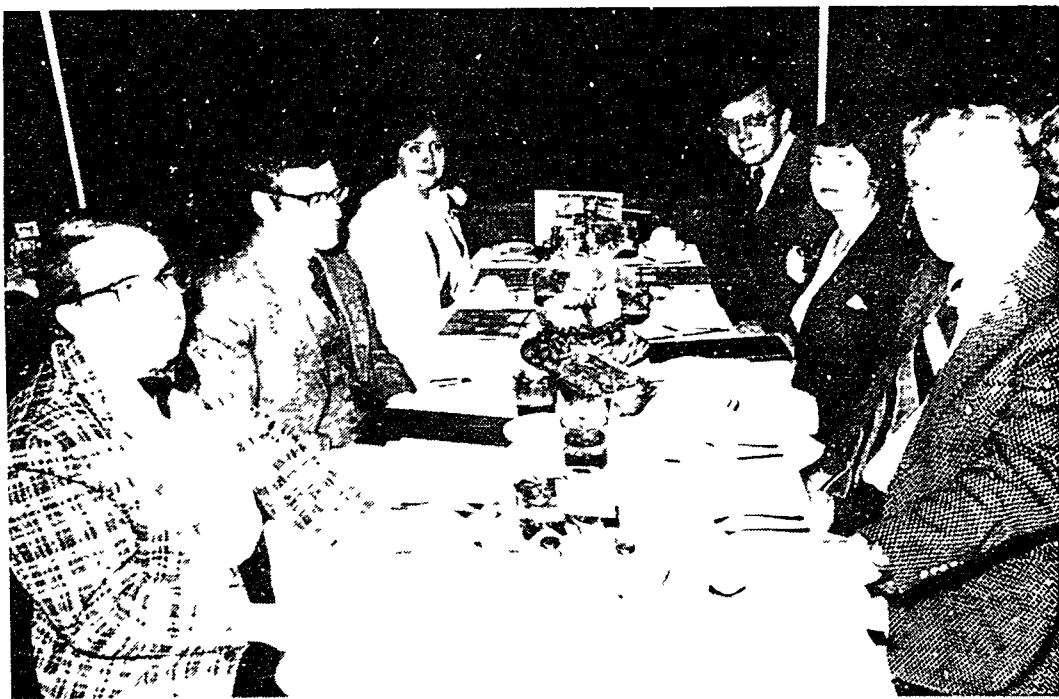
Mrs. Benoit related that ever since the escape "letters have been pouring into the house. It's so fantastic," she said, "that it makes me feel like saying

draw them, her mother bought an art primer on how to draw horses.

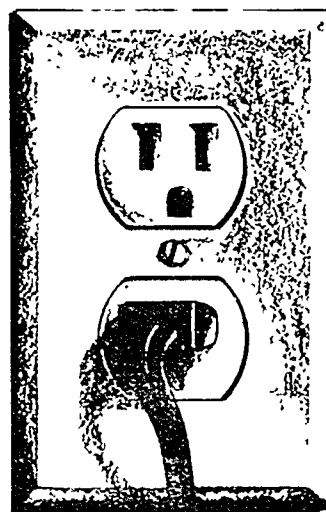
She later had art classes in school.

# Displaced homemakers finally get help

She let George do it.

Mostly because George insisted. And because that's the way she always thought it was supposed to be.

George brought home the bacon and paid the bills. George wrote the checks, took out credit cards in his name, handled the banking and investments, made out the taxes, and, when they were young, told Martha "not to worry her pretty little head about such things."

In return, Martha felt she was holding up her end of the bargain by staying home to raise three children, to cook and clean and entertain George's business associates in their attractive suburban home.

But Martha never anticipated the next thing George did—never dreamed that her life would change. One day, after 28 years of marriage, George announced he was leaving her for a younger woman. A professional woman, who never stayed at home to cook and clean, who was independent and exciting.

And soon, a confused, embittered woman, who had filled her time with luncheons and bridge clubs since her children had grown, found herself forced to take a job at K-mart to make ends meet.

Martha is not a real person but her unforseen plight as a "displaced homemaker" is shared by an estimated three to seven million American women between the ages of 35 and 64.

They are women who, having devoted their lives to homemaking, find that the rules of the game changed when they weren't looking. That, having lost their sole source of support through divorce or widowhood, they have no marketable skills to support themselves.

And—despite the pervasive myth of the cradle-to-grave American welfare state—many of these women fall through the cracks of the system.

A displaced homemaker is usually ineligible for social security because she is too young, ineligible for Aid to Families with Dependent Children if there are no minors in the family and she is not physically disabled, and ineligible for unemployment insurance, since unpaid labor in the home "doesn't count." And part of no employer's group, she cannot afford health insurance either.

In harsh reality, only 14 percent of divorcees are likely to receive alimony, according to the state Department of Labor. And despite laws against age and sex discrimination, the older woman finds it tough to compete with younger, better educated people for jobs in a tight market.

The forgotten person in today's world

of work, a victim of changing social values and economies, displaced homemakers have more things working against them than any other segment in society, according to Pat Babcock, director of the Michigan Department of Labor.

Often, the major thing working against her is her own lack of self-assurance and know-how to tackle a new life after years of security in the home.

It can be a frightening experience to find yourself suddenly alone in the cold, cruel working world, counseling experts say, and many displaced homemakers must first work through feelings of grief and lifestyle shock before they can begin to assess resources they may not realize they have.

"As she becomes displaced, the woman asks, 'What did I do wrong?' Really, it's a societal problem. That's frustrating, with all the lip service given to the glories of being a homemaker," says Glenna Davis of Northville, Michigan chairperson of Homemakers Equal Rights Association (HERA) and past chairperson of Michigan National Organization for Women's homemakers task force.

She will speak in Brighton at 7:30 p.m. tonight on homemakers and the women's movement, at the Livingston County NOW meeting in Room 20 of Brighton High School.

The Equal Rights Amendment is "overwhelmingly important to the homemaker. We need the ERA even more than the professional women who have other support sources. Homemakers have only the mythical right to support (by their spouses)," she said.

The quiet plight of these women is gaining wider recognition with recent state and federal legislation for counseling and training centers. Michigan has established three such pilot centers in Grand Rapids, Marquette and in Macomb County. Many area colleges and universities also have women's centers or career counseling open to older women thinking of re-training.

"No situation is hopeless. There are always resources—but if you're depressed you won't be motivated," says Margaret White. The Howell office director of Child and Family Services of Michigan, Inc., which offers counseling, sees many depressed displaced homemakers.

She offers these tips for women who find themselves displaced from their role in life:

- Don't do anything impulsive—like moving or selling your house—until you think it through. You can make foolish decisions in grief.

- "Use" friends who have used you all your life, as an effective support system. Talking out your feelings is important.

- If you're not coming out of depression after a time, move toward finding professional help. There should be no stigma about getting someone to help in reassessing your strengths and options.

- There are fewer work opportunities for older women, it's true; but you have to go out and look for them. "This is a fantastic opportunity for community education programs," White said.

Many community colleges, agencies and organizations often offer seminars and workshops on topics such as career choices and personal goal reassessment which can be helpful to displaced homemakers. Area programs for women include the following:

- Women's Resource Center of Livingston County, Jane Pollack, director, holds regular Widows Together and Divorce Support Network meetings on relevant topics; (517) 548-3525.

- Women's Center and Career Center at Student Activities Center, Highland Lakes campus, Oakland Community College, (313) 363-7196.

- Soundings, a non-profit center for continuing growth of women in their middle years, is currently conducting a 12-week program for displaced homemakers in conjunction with Washtenaw Community College; Gerry Brown, director, (313) 665-2606.

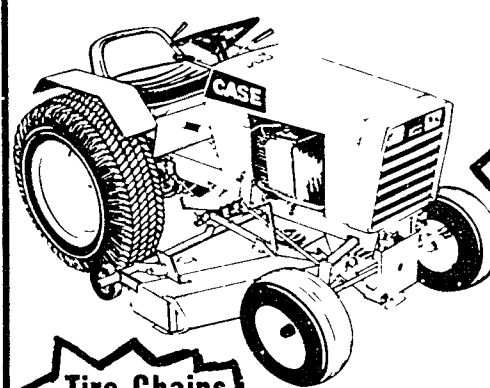

## Wrestlers win Districts

Bill Blanchard and Steve Morgan have survived the second test of state champion worthiness.

Both qualified for the upcoming regional competition by winning their two matches at the district wrestling meet Saturday at Ann Arbor Huron High School.

Blanchard (112 pounds) was seeded first and won his first round match against Bob Pryszbicki of Livonia Churchill 9-7. The match wasn't as close as the score would indicate, as Blanchard made a late-match mistake that resulted in the Churchill grappler earning an easy five points. But the outcome was never in doubt, according to Coach Gary Emerson.

Blanchard's second-round win was at the expense of Brighton's Jim Buck. Blanchard pinned him at the 1:32 mark.

Morgan (145 pounds) was seeded fourth in the meet at his weight class. He proved the seed was an understatement as he downed Frank Hadish of Walled Lake Central 7-2 and Bob Price of Plymouth Salem 9-4.

There were 19 teams entered in the district meet and the top four wrestlers at each weight class will go on to one of four regional meets.

Blanchard and Morgan will travel to John Glenn High School Saturday, February 23 for the 11 a.m. meet.

The top wrestlers in the regional will then go to the state meet at Lansing the following Saturday.

Other Mustangs had shots at qualify-

ing for the regionals. Dale Presswood (132 pounds) won his first-round match by pinning Livonia Churchill's Yong Kim. But Presswood fell to the same fate in the second round, being pinned by Brighton's Tony Lafata.

Vilas Allen (138 pounds) topped Steve Borleo of Milford 7-4 in the first round, then lost a tremendous three-period struggle to Jerry Valchine of Plymouth Salem. Allen was pinned as he made a last-second desperation plunge.

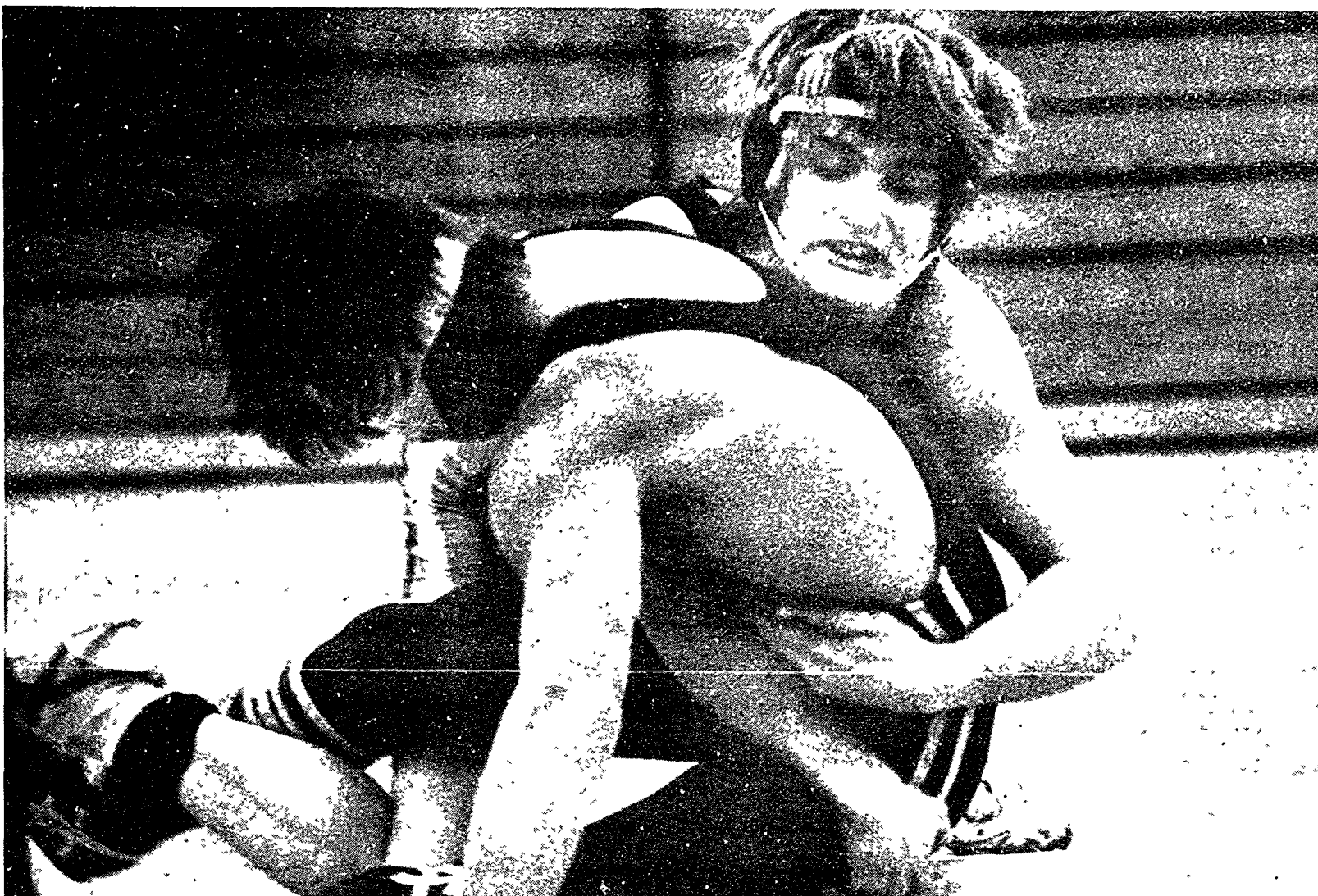
Heavyweight Vince Candela pinned Walled Lake Western's Bob Westcott in 10 seconds in the first round of action, but was whitewashed 8-0 by Greg Gattoni of Plymouth Salem in the second round.

Brian Manse (98 pounds), Jack Wallace (105 pounds), Paul Raczowski (119 pounds), Don Lucas (155 pounds) and Rob Savegeau (167 pounds) all wrestled, but dropped first round decisions.

"Bill has the best chance at the regionals," Emerson said. "He will be the first seed at his weight class which means that his first opponent will be the fourth seed, which is always better than wrestling the second or third seed."

"I look at Steve as sort of a darkhorse. He has a lot of strength and is knowledgeable. He isn't as experienced as Bill but he could do some things."

Morgan has a 15-6 mark heading into regionals while Blanchard will sport a 34-1 tally.

## An arrow to me

Well, it seems as if the biggest arrow belongs to me.

In last week's Sidelines column, I thought it would be cute and Valentiney if I were to dish out hearts and arrows for good things and bad things I saw in the Northville sporting world. My arrows missed their marks.

My first arrow went to "whoever has final authority on hiring coaches at Northville High School." I wrote that it was shameful indeed that Northville had only one woman coach, and that being a JV mentor. I asked why there weren't more, for either boys or girls teams.

Look at how Valentine red my face is. Uta Filken, forgive me.

Uta is the girls tennis coach at Northville. She is one of the area's best. And she is a woman. I have no excuse for forgetting her other than I was lost amidst the furor of journalistic headhunting.

It also turns out that Northville has a new JV girls track coach who is a woman. I am truly embarrassed.

But at the same time encouraged.

Athletic Director Ralph Redmond informed me all of the coaching openings are posted well in advance of the selection date for coaches. He lamented the fact that very few women are interested in the positions. He said that he even works with Schoolcraft College Athletic Director Marvin Gans in trying to bring qualified coaches, male or female, to Northville from Schoolcraft.

So far the response hasn't been encouraging. For instance, there is a new girls JV softball team this year. Redmond posted the coaching position and only one person indicated an interest. He is Joe Blake, Northville's varsity golf coach. He is also the new JV softball coach.

Redmond said that if it came down to picking either a man or a woman (equally qualified) for a girls-sport coaching position, it would go to the woman. That is because the woman would be a positive role model for the girl athletes. That's great.

My second arrow went to "whoever decides to allocate funds for uniforms for Northville school sports team." Mr. Redmond was able to respond to that barb as well.

The case in point being the Meads Mill Junior High School swim team, and, it turns out, the Cooke Junior High School swim team, and the boys varsity swim team, and up until this year, the girls varsity swim team — each member of which had to furnish trunks.

I questioned why a school could afford to spend as much as it does on football equipment, and then couldn't foot the bill for swim trunks.

A logical question, with an equally logical answer.

Each coach lets Redmond know during budget planning time exactly what his team will need by way of equipment. Redmond then makes his budget out accordingly.

None of the swim coaches (Meads Mill or Cooke) asked for trunks. That's why they had to swim a marathon for pledges in order to buy their own.

Now if a coach wants swim trunks, he should ask for them in his budget.

There is another reason why swimmers have purchased their own trunks. Many swimmers prefer owning their own trunks for sanitary reasons; much like using your own gym shoes.

Redmond said that for the varsity swim teams the school foots the bill for warm-up suits and that in the future the school may buy the teams their own trunks with the understanding that the athletes will keep them.

My last arrow went to "the Meads Mill basketball player who set a fire in another school's locker room." I said that the team hadn't played because the athlete who set the fire hadn't been named.

So much for unsubstantiated sources.

The incident occurred at the beginning of the basketball season. The player readily admitted his wrongdoing, is making amends, and the team never missed one of its 12 games.

The whole affair should never have been mentioned last week. The moral is, for any would-be reporters (and one is now reporter), always, ALWAYS, check the facts before writing them for publication.

You'll save someone else a lot of needless embarrassment and you'll save yourself a lot of self-contempt.

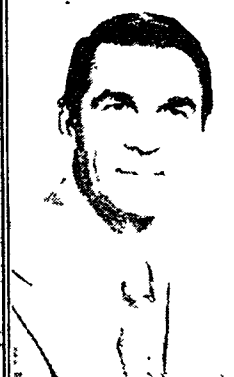

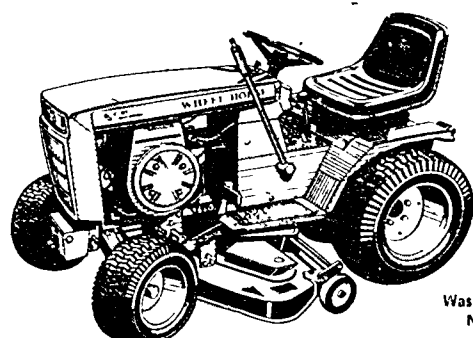

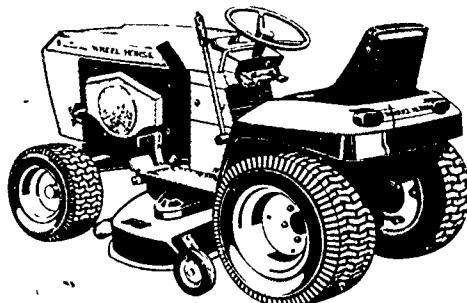

## Bates no grumpy ump

Paul Bates is good, and he knows it. His declaration of his ability is almost a challenge to any others in this area who are in his line of work. This is the reason that Bates may just reach the top.

Bates is an umpire. At 19 he is a young umpire, but one determined to forge a living out of his training.

And training he has. The Northville resident recently returned from the sunny clime of Daytona Beach, Florida where he participated in one of two umpiring schools in America.

Bates was trained by and at Harry Wendelstedt's "School of Umpiring."

Wendelstedt has been a National League umpire since 1962. His school, along with one run by another major league umpire, Bill Kinnomin in St. Petersburg, Florida, is the primary feeder system from which the minor leagues get their officials.

At the end of each approximately five-week school, 15 students from each of the two are "presented" for evaluation by officials from The Umpire Development Association. If they pass the week-long evaluation, they are hired for the minors.

Bates started on January 2 with a class of 117 prospective umpers. Only 99 finished. Some didn't have what it took to interpret the rules while others couldn't handle the mental discipline required under Wendelstedt.

Bates could. He wasn't picked as one of the select 15, but he was among the 25 asked to return again next year. Most of the 15 are second-year students.

Wendelstedt told Bates that he had to work on his positioning, his aggressiveness and his experience. As for

knowledge of the rules, few of the 99 knew more than Bates. He aced the test at the end of the program, with only four others finishing higher.

As for positioning, aggressiveness and experience, Bates is taking care of that now.

If you drive past the snow-covered diamonds of Northville, and see a man crouching at odd angles where home plate should be, or dashing from first to second, as if he were getting into position for a close call at the sack, well, that's what he's doing. Professionals need to practice.

By saturating every high school, college and semi-professional league in the area with his credentials and willingness to work, Bates hopes to gain the experience needed to make the minors.

And what do the minor leagues have to offer him besides one day a shot at the majors? Try little pay, no free time, constant travel and the prospect of little or no family life.

Most umpers work from 12-18 years in the minors before they are deemed good enough to officiate at the top. A minor league ump can look forward to a base pay of \$300 a month with \$700 in expense money. The majority of those umpers who have good family lives are umpers no longer. That is why they have happy families.

Bates wants to give it a shot. He is willing to make the sacrifices. He will try to work as many as 31 games a month this spring and summer in order to gain the experience and the \$650 that Wendelstedt's school costs.

So if your team takes the field this summer and one Paul Bates is behind the plate, rest assured. He's one of the best. And if you don't agree, you're out.

# Fighting for pay hike as tough as fighting crime

It's tough to get a raise these days. Just ask Township Police Chief Ronald Nisun.

Chief Nisun, a police officer in the township for some 14 years and chief since 1970, is asking for a pay increase which would put his salary some 15 percent above his lieutenant's wage.

The other command officers recently received substantial raises following the settlement of a new contract for the police officers' union. Lieutenants will be paid \$23,400 plus overtime pay as of April 1, the start of a new fiscal year.

The chief is asking to be paid \$26,910 next year.

Chief Nisun currently earns \$21,985,

receiving no overtime pay. He says he is just asking for a fair increase.

"I think with my responsibilities I should make a little more than I am making," the chief told board members last week at their regular meeting.

"I am only making \$600 a year more than my lieutenants and as of April 1 they will pass me," he explained. "My salary is considerably below any of the chiefs in surrounding communities."

Cornelius Quinn, negotiator for the police officers, spoke in chief's behalf.

"This situation happened because the chief stepped back when the other command officers were bargaining for increases," he stated. "He could have

fought for an increase at that time but he said 'don't push it' and agreed to wait until now."

"I think it is a shame that there isn't more communication," Quinn stated.

Trustee James Nowka and Treasurer Lee Holland cited budget problems as the reason they would not support a raise at this time.

Holland said he felt the upcoming budget hearings would be the appropriate time to discuss the request.

"I am not prepared to discuss that decision tonight," he said. "I feel justice will be done at budget time."

The chief, however, did receive support from other board members, who agreed to give him \$1,515 from the contingency fund as well as discuss an additional increase for next year at the budget hearings.

"He runs the biggest full-time department in the township," said Trustee John Swienkowski. "It is an unfair

situation and I think the problem has to be corrected."

The executive board — consisting of Supervisor Donald Thomson, Clerk Clarice Sass and Treasurer Holland — will meet February 24 and March 2 to discuss the upcoming budget, and a meeting of the full board is scheduled for March 10 at 7 p.m.

## 'No boundary change'-board

A Northville couple cannot get school district boundaries changed so their children can continue to attend school here, the Northville Board of Education decided February 11.

Mr. and Mrs. Richard Berryman, 20216 Rippling Lane, bought a piece of property in Northville Township north of Five Mile and west of Bradner, at the end of Elk on Phoenix Lake.

The lot borders the Northville school district but is located in the Plymouth-Canton district.

The Berrymans want to build a house on the property but their two children, ages 16 and 14, don't want to leave the Northville schools.

The school board told the Berrymans that they could not change school district boundaries because they would be bombarded with similar requests.

But the board encouraged the Berrymans to apply for tuition status for both their children.

Board policy already states that a junior in high school can attend 12th grade here by paying tuition.

By the time the Berrymans would build a house on their property, their son would be a junior.

The district has no policy for allowing younger children to keep attending Northville schools on a tuition basis. But trustees encouraged the Berrymans to reapply for tuition status for their daughter.

"I think this can qualify as an exception," said Trustee Chris Johnson.

The Berrymans said they still plan to petition the Wayne County Intermediate school district to ask if the school district boundaries can be changed.

The family has to have the approval of both the Plymouth and Northville districts to change the boundary. Treasurer Charles Peltz said that Plymouth would probably not want to give up a tax-paying lot to Northville.

The Berrymans expressed disappointment that students who live in Northville Township cannot attend Northville schools. School district boundaries are different than city or township boundaries. Several students who live in Novi and Salem Township attend the Northville Public Schools.

Twenty-five girls from this area are head-over-heels for gymnastics, and they'll show it at the first Flip-a-Thon staged by the Livonia Family Y Twisters.
