## Citizens blast subsidized housing

It was standing room only Saturday and Monday as Northville Township residents tried to scuttle three subsidy housing projects here.

Their heated, often emotional opposition to the Seven Mile projects may spell doom for the second and third of the developers' plans — but the first, according to Township Attorney Donald Morgan, appears firmly entrenched.

In the wake of Monday's "non-meeting" following the settlement day proceedings, Supervisor Donald Thomson Tuesday formally indicated the township's opposition to a proposed Housing Assistance Plan change, and Trustee Susan Heintz met with angry citizens to assess their specific objections and to draw up a battle plan.

Supervisor Thomson also has called for a formal board meeting on Friday at 7 p.m. to continue the housing discussion.

At the conclusion of this week's settlement day proceedings, the supervisor informed citizens that the ensuing housing discussion would be informal since, under the law, only settlement matters could take place.

Already boiling, citizens, who had hoped after last Saturday's meeting that the board might take some formal action Monday, grew even angrier. And township officials as well as the housing plans became targets for sharp criticism.

The first of the subsidy housing plans, Swan Harbour — a development of 264

apartment units on Seven Mile near the entrance to Highland Lakes, already is well under construction and the contract for subsidizing rents of 53 of the apartments reportedly already has been inked by HUD.

Despite repeated advice by Morgan that there is next to nothing the township can do to stop Swan Harbour, citizens — primarily those in adjacent Highland Lakes — urged township officials to seek an injunction against the development.

Their major objections appeared to be a fear that subsidized rents will attract "undesirable" tenants, the apartments might become a future township slum, and that subsidized housing will

adversely affect adjacent property values.

Township officials already have formally opposed Swan Harbour and the second proposed development, Northridge Phase III — an 80-unit development of which 16 units are earmarked as assistance units. HUD has approved the first and is still reviewing the second.

The third proposed development, also adjacent to Highland Lakes, calls for 191 apartment units — all of which are pegged for subsidized senior citizens housing. Public hearing on this proposal has been set for Monday at 8 p.m.

Morgan advised citizens that while

## Township officials take lumps, too

What happened or didn't happen prior to advent of subsidy housing here is drawing as much citizen criticism as the housing itself.

In recent meetings, the board in general and Supervisor Donald Thomson and Clerk Clarence Sass in particular have come under heavy fire.

At Monday's meeting, as TV camera lights played over the packed township hall, it was Clerk Sass who found herself being buffeted from all sides.

She was accused by citizens of trying

to "railroad" Thomson — specifically because, apparently, she had usurped the role of the supervisor.

Citizens referred to the disclosure that the clerk had been designated by former supervisor Wilson Grier as the "contact" for block grant matters several days before Thomson took office.

Thomson insisted he had not authorized nor did he know that the clerk had approved the application for subsidy housing for Swan Harbour.

Pressed by citizens for an explanation, the clerk said she had taken the letter of application from Thomson's desk, with his knowledge and consent, and had given it her approval because the site plan had been approved by planners.

She confirmed that letters she had written were not shown to the board and that the public had not been told about the application or her approval of it.

But she insisted she acted properly,

that Thomson was aware of the application, that she had "absolutely not" usurped the supervisor's role, and that her approval letter was not given surreptitiously.

Thomson also came under fire for having met in a Novi restaurant with the developers of Swan Harbour. He has admitted doing so, as has the clerk, but he insisted he did not then or later approve of subsidy housing and that he was not told an application would be made.

He refuted allegations by Sass and Trustee William Zapke that he had met with the developers in April, stating that the only time he met with the developers was in February — long before the application was sent to the township — "and I can prove it."

Gordon Ruttan of the Wayne County Block Grant program admitted that normally his agency would deal with the supervisor, but that in this case it did not do so because it had been informed by Grier that all correspondence and telephone calls should be directed to Clerk Sass.

Citizens were unimpressed when Sass saw some advantage in the existence of Swan Harbour, noting that it gives the township some "clout" in fighting additional subsidy projects. There is no "guaranteed clout," citizens argued. And they shot down the clerk's suggestion that her motive for approving Swan Harbour was to provide housing for local senior citizens.

Swan Harbour, citizens noted, is not designated for senior citizens. But Sass argued that non-designation does not mean they cannot live in the apartments.

The clerk said she and her family had been subjected to intensive harassment over the housing issue and that telephone calls had become so abusive she had been forced to remove her children from the community out of fear for their safety.

## Recreation funds sought by township

A proposal to increase township millage by .5 mills for five years will appear on the ballot of the May 20 Republican presidential primary, if there is one.

Township trustees March 13 voted unanimously to place on the ballot the proposal for an additional half mill which would be used "exclusively for operating, maintaining and improving and for providing capital expenditures for recreation services for the Township of Northville."

Trustees debated whether another proposal, which calls for .5 mills for five years to be used for fire department services, should also appear on the May 20 ballot or should appear in place of the recreation proposal.

"We know we need this (recreation

## Accident claims life of 59-year-old resident

Clarence Orville Ayotte died March 12 at Crittenton Hospital in Rochester.

The 59-year-old Northville resident would have died sooner, but he was kept alive so that his kidneys and eyes could be used to help others.

In a fall March 1 from a ledge between the Winners Circle Bar and Northville Square, Ayotte of 301 South Center suffered severe head injuries from which he never recovered.

Ayotte and a friend had visited the bar and had a few drinks, the friend told police.

The friend offered to drive Ayotte home because he felt he had had a few too many. But when the two men reached the car, parked in the alley near the ledge, they found Ayotte had locked his keys in his car.

The friend told police Ayotte reached for the door handle, slipped and fell backwards, over the ledge to the ground, eight feet below.

He was knocked unconscious. Novi Ambulance transported Ayotte to St. Mary Hospital and he later was taken to Crittenton.



## Boat family safe and living here

It's a long way from Saigon to 626 North Center Street in Northville — approximately 11,900 miles.

And for the 13 member Bui family it was a trip that began in September when they fled their home outside of Saigon to escape the Communists.

With the impending arrival of the Communists the father, Bui Noi, sold his thriving bicycle accessory shop which had employed some 30 people. The money was used to buy passage for his family on a boat leaving the country.

For nine days they drifted without food in the Pacific Ocean until they came ashore in Thailand. There the family stayed in a refugee camp until placed by the Sister Lomina O'Sullivan of The Arch Diocese refugee settlement office.

Now Novi residents are doing their best to show their adopted Vietnamese refugee family that they are among friends — even though they are half way around the world.

Novi has welcomed the family which includes Bui Noi, 45, his wife Phan Thi Bui, ten daughters and two sons. The children are Bui Thi Nga, 21; Bui Thi Thuy, 19; Bui Thi Thuy, 17; Bui Dhy Khien, 15; Bui Kinh Doanh, 13; Bui Thi Hanh, 12; Bui Thi Thu Huong, 10; Bui Thi Huyen Trang, 8; Bui Thi Kim Tuyen, 6; Bui Thuy Phuong Uyen, 4 and Bui Thanh Huyen, 3.

For the past week Novi's adopted Vietnamese family has been kept busy with physical, dental and optical exams, completing required immigration information and generally getting settled.

The elder members of the family had their first English lesson Monday.

The father and two elder daughters have a temporary job lined up making pins for the Lions Club which will employ them until their English enables them to find permanent positions.

Soon the school age children will be attending the Northville Schools.

The Bui family arrived at Metro Airport March 7, several weeks before they were expected by their Novi hosts.

"On February 26 we were asked whether we would consider sponsoring

the 13 member family. The next day we agreed, confident we had several weeks to get ready," reported Stephanie Amelio, who is helping to coordinate the "adoption" process.

But several weeks turned into several days when the sponsors found a home for the family in Northville on Tuesday, March 4, and learned the family was in flight and would arrive in Detroit on Friday.

"We had to get 13 beds, 13 pillows, 26 blankets, pots, pans, towels, toothbrushes, everything," Amelio said. But the residents of Novi came through.

Churches and civic groups donated all the furnishings for the five bedroom home. Faith United Presbyterian Church stocked the home with groceries. A car has been donated to the family. The Goodfellows with the cooperation of Brader's Department store outfitted the family's 13 pairs of feet.

"It has been a real community effort. People have been working together and it's been beautiful," said Carol Anne Donnelly, a coordinator from Holy Family Catholic Church.

Language has been somewhat of a barrier since none of the family knows English. However, the family's eldest daughter has been living in the Detroit area and her husband has acted as an interpreter during the family's initial introduction to the country.

Amelio reported that snow has been a novelty for the family. It also has given them a bit of cabin fever.

"During winter we are used to hibernating inside, but they are used to moving outside year around," Amelio said.

The father is somewhat nervous about how the family is going to pay its bills, she reported.

However, Donnelly said the family is very westernized because it comes from Saigon and is adapting as well as can be expected.

"When they got in from San Francisco we thought they would be exhausted, but they told us they were 'too happy to be tired,'" Donnelly said. "They are so appreciative — they just can't believe the generosity of the American people."

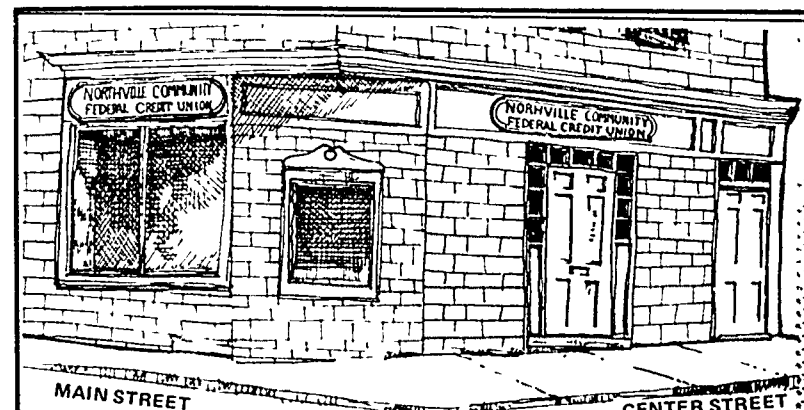

## Burglars flee with pricy fur

A full-length mink coat worth approximately \$2,000 was taken from a Beck Road residence sometime between March 6 and March 8, township police reported.

Burglars apparently entered the home through a basement window which had been broken with a brick, police said.

The occupants of the residence did not notice the coat was missing until a few days after they had the window repaired.

Nothing else is believed missing, police said.

A Northville man suffered minor injuries in a two-car accident on Six Mile east of Northville Road March 13, township police reported.

Paul Hibbeln, 45000 Thornapple received minor cuts and bruises when his vehicle, traveling eastbound, was hit by a westbound car driven by Gloria Paterson of Livonia.

Police said the westbound car went out of control on the snow-covered icy road, crossing into the eastbound lane and striking Hibbeln's vehicle.

Ms. Paterson and her passenger, son Kevin, were not hurt, police said. No citations were issued.

A Novi man was hurt March 14 when his vehicle, traveling northbound on Haggerty, was struck by a southbound vehicle attempting to turn onto east-bound Eight Mile.

Richard Porter sustained minor injuries in the accident, which occurred when Reginald Easley of Farmington Hills turned his vehicle in front of Porter's, police said. Easley was issued a citation for failing to yield to oncoming traffic.

# NRTC plans \$2 million renovation

Bids will be taken in March for a \$2.3 million renovation of Northville Residential Training Center with target date for the completion of repairs January, 1981.

The state and the Comprehensive Health Planning Council of Southeastern Michigan have approved the plan which will bring the training center, located on the grounds of Northville State Hospital, up to federal standards.

There will not be any construction of

new buildings, said James Hunt, director of the center. Instead, the money will be used to "provide an environment that is less institutional in appearance" and to repair floors, windows and the roof in two of the buildings which house some of the 166 the mentally retarded residents.

Two buildings, J Building and K Building, will have the following improvements made: repainting, resurfacing of tiles, improved lighting, repair of windows, new floors and ceil-

ings, new furnishings, draperies, repair of mechanical and electrical systems, roof, door and toilet fixture replacement and masonry work.

In addition, partitions will be put up in the dormitories so each resident has his or her own room.

All the repairs are necessary to meet Intermediate Care for the Mentally Retarded (ICF/MR) standards. ICF/MR is the federal agency which inspects Northville Residential Training Center every six months to see that it

meets standards.

The Center has until 1982 to bring its facilities up to standard. If it does not it will lose all federal funding for its facilities.

Federal funds provide less than half the state budget for running institutions for the mentally retarded in Michigan. In 1979 the state allocated \$78.8 million for institutional care and the federal government allocated \$56 million to Michigan's institutionally-housed mentally retarded.

# Representative Kirksey honors architect Sachs

A resolution of special tribute was presented to one of Livonia's outstanding citizens March 7 at a breakfast in honor of State Representative Jack Kirksey (R Livonia-Northville).

Architect Melvin Sachs, who with builder Calvin Shubow, has developed a revolutionary construction design concept, received the resolution from Kirksey, who had introduced it in the legislature.

"I think it is appropriate that the legislature recognize and commend Mr. Sachs for his work in the development of an energy efficient building system," Kirksey said.

"The system, U-FORM, is an integrated energy and cost efficient building construction concept that many energy experts believe may prove to be the construction industry's solution to soaring costs, the energy crisis, our tight money market and increasing unemployment."

Kirksey announced that the system recently was selected for an \$87,000 grant from the Department of Energy so it can be integrated quickly into the construction marketplace.

The system, he said, was selected for the highest award at the Eighth Annual World's Fair for Technology Exchange in Atlanta.

U-FORM is a new kind of pre-insulated reinforc-

ed concrete wall that uses story-high prefabricated panel forms with hollow cores that easily are filled with reinforcing steel and concrete at the site,

Kirksey explained. "It will pump new blood in the construction industry at a time when it is needed most."

# Most students meet immunization deadline

Somewhere between last week and this, 272 Northville students were immunized against measles, rubella, tetanus, polio and diphtheria in time to avoid being excluded from school.

That left only 30 students who were excluded from classes Monday because they did not have proper vaccinations. And it was expected that by today all students would be off the exclusion list.

"We did pretty well and I was very pleased," said school health consultant Marie Robertson. "It was hectic but I guess most parents decided we meant business so they took our warning seriously."

Last week the district warned 302 ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth graders that they would be excluded from school as of March 17 if they did not have immunizations required by the Wayne County Health Department.

On Monday, 30 students were either turned away from class or stayed home

because they didn't have immunizations.

Six students at Meads Mill Junior High, six at Cooke Junior High and 18 students at Northville High School were excluded Monday.

Robertson said all 30 of the students were contacted Monday and had arranged either to get the shots by Tuesday or had obtained waiver forms which would allow them up to four weeks to get the proper vaccinations.

"By Wednesday, we expect all students will be off the exclusion list," Robertson said Monday. "The ones remaining on temporary waivers will have four weeks to bring in the information, when we must submit our final report to the Wayne County Health Department."

The district sent about eight letters to parents between September and February telling them their children had to have the immunizations or be excluded from school.



# Six Mile, Sheldon rezoning petition opposed

A proposal to rezone 16.33 acres of land at the northwest corner of Six Mile and Sheldon from residential to commercial currently is being considered by the township planning commission.

Currently zoned R-2 (single family residential), a local developer, Elro Corporation, who owns some 300 acres surrounding the site, is attempting to change that zoning to B-2 (general business).

A second rezoning petition — to rezone 150.43 acres from R-2 (single family residential) to R-3 (also single family residential) but provides developer with opportunity to build a greater number of units per acre) also is under consideration.

Though only six township residents showed up at the March 11 public hearing concerning the two petitions, all adamantly opposed the developer's proposal.

A greater number of residents have expressed similar sentiment at master plan and other related hearings.

Elro representatives, who have submitted plans for a subdivision (Hills of Northville) proposed surrounding the

16-acre site, claim this plan would greatly benefit the township.

"We think there are many more advantages than disadvantages to this site," Jeffrey Orley, Elro spokesman said. "We feel that this is a good location and it is well within the text of the master plan."

Residents are concerned that if Elro were granted the rezoning there would be nothing stopping the corporation from developing commercial at that site as well as at Six Mile and Winchester, where Elro owns a small parcel of land currently zoned commercial.

"Change the old zoning or the master plan but don't do both," pleaded C. Thomas Lee, a resident who consistently has opposed all proposals for commercial development on Six Mile. "We don't want commercial centers at Sheldon, Winchester and Haggerty. We don't need it."

The size and character of the commercial development were also concerns of the residents.

"Is this going to be a convenience center or a major shopping center?" one resident wanted to know.

"In my opinion this community has no need for a shopping center?" Elro originally submitted a petition to rezone 18 acres to commercial, but later altered the acreage to 16.33.

William Bohan, planning commission vice-chairman, took Orley to task over his statements relating that the Sheldon site is preferred for commercial development over the Winchester site.

"The configuration of the Sheldon site is better, we feel," Orley responded. "Winchester is not as major an intersection."

At previous public hearings on the master plan, Orley has praised the merits of the Winchester site.

Township planners have not agreed on the location of convenience shopping locations on the master plan map since talks began more than two years ago.

Planners designated (by a 4-3 vote) that the Six Mile intersections of Haggerty, Sheldon and Beck were desirable locations for commercial development.

Planners will review the public comments and could take action on the petitions at their next regular meeting March 25.

# Millage request to appear on ballot

millage) and I think this is the time to go for it," said Trustee James Nowka. "I would like to see it (recreation proposal) on the ballot because I think it will pass," he predicted. "But if the ballot is cluttered (with two proposals) it won't."

Trustee John Swienkowski supported the idea of putting the proposals on separate ballots, but was concerned about. "What do we do if it fails?"

In preliminary budget recommenda-

tions recently submitted to the trustees by the Township Executive Committee — Supervisor Donald Thomson, Clerk Clarice Sass and Treasurer Lee Holland — a trimming of all township departments' budgets was recommended.

The joint services — library and recreation — were not dealt with in this proposal. The township portion of the library budget likely will be \$59,838 or a 4.6 increase over last year's contribution.

The recreation budget, however,

presents a problem for trustees since some \$7,000 in CETA funds contributed to the recreation department by the township are no longer available and the township finds itself in a very tight budget situation.

In a budget proposed by Northville Recreation Director Edward Kritz, the township would contribute \$60,816. But trustees more than likely will have to cut back their contribution.

Supervisor Thomson said the recreation budget will be discussed at the next

budget study session Sunday, March 23 at 9 a.m. at the township hall.

Under the executive commission's recommendation the fire department budget would be cut by more than \$9,000 from the 1979-80 budget. The department would receive some \$21,000 less than Township Fire Chief Robert Toms' budget request.

The question of whether or not the township will seek the .5 mills for fire protection in August — at the presidential primary — remained unanswered.

## Schoolcraft composer

# He's all wrapped up in music

Robert W. Jones of Schoolcraft College is a composer.

You might say he has a "passion" for his art — which happens to be the title of his new major work to be premiered in Plymouth next month.

When Bob Jones isn't writing music, he is teaching music or he is performing music.

But when is he not composing? Almost never.

"It's taken a tremendously coordinated effort," Jones said.

Take "Passion." Originally conceived more than a year ago as a piece for a community chorus, it has been written specifically for the Schoolcraft Community Choir and the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra.

"I discussed it with Marilyn Jones, (a Schoolcraft colleague but no relation) who directs the choir, and with Wayne Dunlap, then conductor of the Plymouth Symphony.

"Next came funding which we secured through a grant through Dean Ron Griffith of the college's community services

"Finally, the writing, with the heavy composing compacted into last August, sandwiched between the close of summer music school and the start of the fall semester.

"It's not something you can set aside once you're into it. Concentration is a key factor in composing and you've got to gear your thinking to be able to do it well.

"I've learned my lesson with 'Passion,' no more biggies while school is in session."

Jones' work will be performed April 20 in the Plymouth Salem Auditorium. Dr. Marilyn Jones will be guest conducting that Sunday.

Other Joneses are involved. Bob's wife, Anne, wrote 10 poems for the work based on its biblical text. Dave, Marilyn's husband, did the copying and Christopher, Bob and Anne's 17-year-old son, will be playing string bass with the orchestra.

"The Jones 'Passion' is based on the Gospel of St. Matthew from the Last Supper through the burial of Christ in the tomb of Joseph of Arimathea.

It's uniqueness is that it portrays

Christ's passion from the vantage point of view of the women involved.

Bob Jones joined Schoolcraft as resident composer in 1969. He has produced 30 pieces since then, including "Mass in Motion" in 1974, "Pilgrimage," a Bicentennial opera in 1976, and a ballet, "Burning Tree," written with Schoolcraft English instructor Ralph Kelley in 1976 for the Plymouth Symphony.

A faculty recital this summer will consist solely of Jones compositions including a new violin sonata he is writing.

A native of Chicago, Jones earned bachelor and master degrees in music at California's University of the Redlands. He also took post-graduate courses at the University of Minnesota where he was a teaching fellow.

But according to him, Schoolcraft really has been his only teaching post and generally he likes the combination of teaching and composing.

With roots from a large city, Bob and Anne enjoy living in Detroit's Rosedale Park. Their daughter Gwyneth, 15, like her older brother, attends Waldorf High

in Indian Village.

"We weren't sure either of the children would be attracted to music, but they've both gotten interested within the past two years," Jones said. "Gwyn is a violinist, and Christopher, of course, plays string bass."

Wife Anne also is a musician and joined her husband in a recent performance to benefit the college's new grand piano.

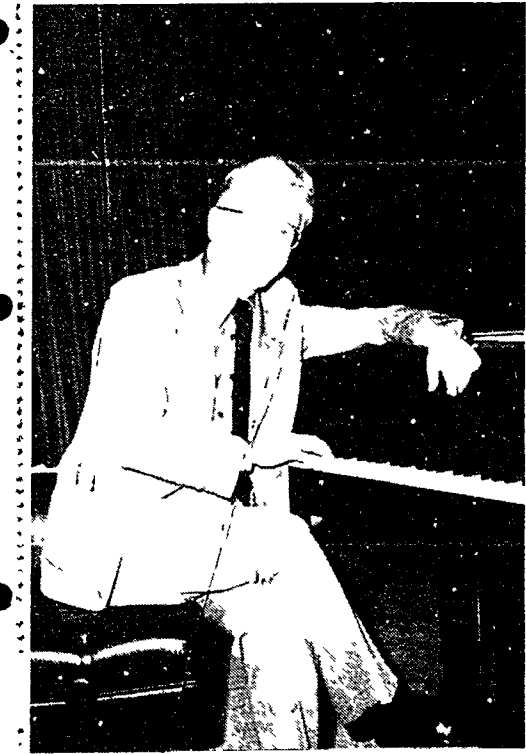
She prefers prose writing, according to Jones, and currently is devoting her efforts as a feature editor of a weekly suburban newspaper.

On the other hand, Bob has little time for anything other than music. Even his hobby as a model railroader has taken a side track.

Besides composing, teaching, and performing, he is organist at the First Presbyterian Church of Plymouth.

What's ahead for Bob Jones? Hopefully, a sabbatical leave for the winter semester in 1981.

"I plan to use the time to clean up some shorter musical works and to complete a music appreciation textbook for community colleges."

## PTA parents question school board

The Northville Athletic Booster Club's offer was only one topic discussed at the question-and-answer meeting with the board and school administrators Thursday night when the board of education met with the Northville PTA.

Other topics discussed on the snowy evening among the 47 people present included school class size, substitute teachers and school district policy.

Here is what board members and school administrators had to say:

**ON THE HIGH SCHOOL MATH PROGRAM:** This year there was a staff cutback and one calculus class could not be offered at NHS. Novi High School offered it but by that time most students had made other arrangements. Superintendent Larry Nichols said he did not know if students who took calculus at Schoolcraft College were reimbursed by the district for it, but said if the district does not offer the course, it will pay for a college class if it will be used toward high school graduation.

**ON SCHOOL SECURITY:** The district is establishing a written policy on school security which will be inserted in next year's student handbook, Nichols said. Schools are locked by custodians when a school building is not in use. If the building is in use, one or two doors are left open but gates are usually locked in the hallways. When locked, doors set off a silent alarm to police when opened, Nichols added.

## High school to install \$11,000 alarm system

A multi-zoned, comprehensive \$11,000 fire alarm system will be installed at Northville High School during spring break April 3-14, the school district has announced.

In addition, the district has purchased 50 fire extinguishers so one can be kept in a safe place in each classroom. As soon as the alarm system is installed the high school will hold at least some of the 10 state-required fire drills before June.

Institution of all of the above measures will bring NHS up to state fire code.

The Northville Board of Education agreed to spend an additional \$5,000 on the fire alarm system at its meeting March 7 on top of \$6,000 already budgeted for the project last fall.

The recent lack of visible progress of this job was caused by the fact that job analysis in January indicated a much larger financial outlay than had

been originally anticipated in November," Superintendent Larry Nichols told the board.

Electricians from Gillis Electric Company traced the entire fire alarm system with school personnel in January and determined that it would cost \$7,615 plus extra costs to install a new system. An additional \$3,000 already has been spent on inspection and preliminary electrical work, Nichols said.

Operations Manager William Hood said he had checked with other school districts and learned that Gillis worked "expeditiously, there were no problems during or after the completion of the work (and) approvals of the electrical inspector were routine..."

Installation of the new fire system and other fire-safety measures were required by the state fire marshal last November after he found the alarm had been broken for three years.

## Athletic boosters give helping hand

The Northville Athletic Booster club will meet soon with the facilities committee of the Northville Board of Education to determine what maintenance and beautification projects it can help with at Northville High School.

The arrangement came Thursday night at a meeting between the Northville PTA and the school board at NHS.

"We believe that the appearance of facilities is an underlying factor for improving school spirit," Booster Club President Ed Perpich told the board. "How can the Northville Booster Club work with the school board and administration to help with the task of improving school facilities?"

Superintendent Larry Nichols suggested that the club meet with the facilities committee to coordinate efforts.

"In my opinion, the clubs of Northville who have come forth to help us is one of the most encouraging parts of my position," Nichols said. He said the band boosters, student beautification committee and garden clubs have all stepped up to offer help in improving the deteriorating physical condition of the high school.

Operations Director William Hood told the group the status of school district maintenance.

He said \$700,000 of a 1978 million dollar bond issue has been spent on repairs. About \$400,000 of this has been spent at NHS on roof repair, a new floor, ceiling tiles, painting of the hallway and auditorium renovations, all of which were priority projects.

In addition, \$100,000 allocated in last year's budget for capital improvements has bought new sewing machines,

stoves, band instruments and projectors for the high school and other schools, Hood said.

Radiator covers were installed and painted during the last two weeks.

"I believe that the students are going to back up the improvements at the high school," Hood said. "They have the right to attend a good school, a clean school."

A hundred and thirty employees of Plymouth Center for Human Development are leaving their cars home and coming to work in company vans to conserve gasoline.

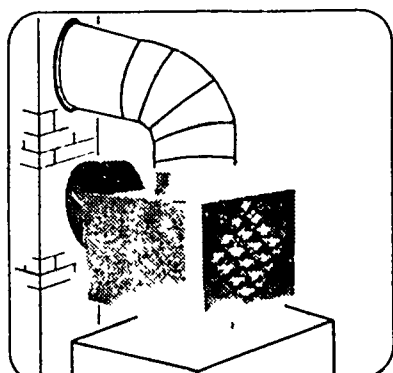

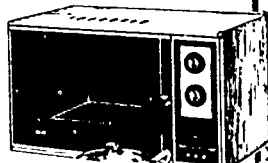

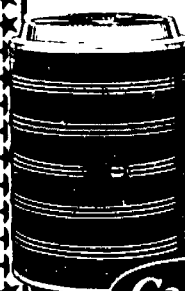

### THE CITY OF NOVI ORDAINS:

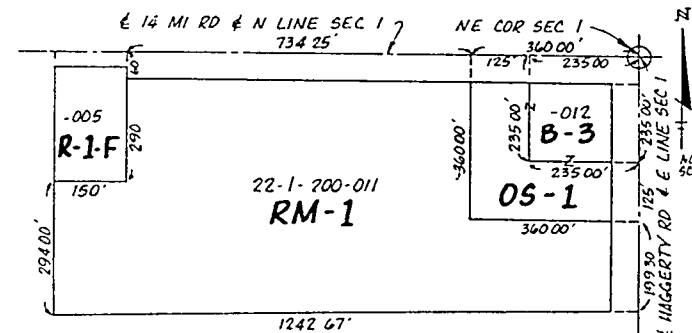

News from Lansing

'Chrysler loan doesn't risk state funds'

The saying that used to read, "What's good for General Motors is good for the country," should now read, "What's good for Chrysler will be good for the State of Michigan."

For that very reason, I supported the Chrysler assistance package which would allow the state to provide financial assistance to the nearly bankrupt Chrysler Corporation.

The legislation, which Governor Milliken proposed and will sign, is in the form of two bills.

The first (House Bill 5475) would allow the state to loan up to a maximum of \$75 million from the state funded retirement system — teacher pension fund, state employee pension fund, etc.

The second (House Bill 5501) permits up to \$150 million to be loaned from the state's common cash fund.

Protection clauses have been written into these bills to ensure that no more than \$150 million be loaned to Chrysler. For example, if \$75 million is taken out of the retirement fund only \$75 million could be deducted from the "common cash" fund. Likewise, if the decision was made not to use the retirement fund, then all \$150 million could be taken out of the "common cash" fund.

Let me emphasize that there is no risk involved in making this loan to Chrysler because the loans are well secured. The Constitution of our state mandates that the State Treasurer be custodian of all retirement funds and make all investment decisions for state monies. Within the state's legal framework the state is authorized to invest public funds and also sets forth the conditions and limitations of those investments.

The Investment Advisory Committee established in 1969 reviews the state's investments, goals and objectives of

each of the retirement funds and submits recommendations on the same.

These Michigan laws, supported by pertinent sections of the Internal Revenue Code and numerous court cases, reinforce the necessity for the highest standards of prudence in carrying out our trust responsibilities for public funds.

The standard of prudence that the Department of Treasury endeavors to apply for investments is that of a reasonable man entrusted with the funds of others. The Department of Treasury consistently applies a test of reasonableness to all investment decisions and would also apply this to a Chrysler loan.

In addition to these statutory and constitutional safeguards, the loan will be guaranteed by Chrysler's Trenton Engine Plant worth approximately \$270-\$280 million. That plant is soon to be converted into a four-cylinder plant as opposed to its current six-cylinder format which is more in keeping with automobiles necessary for the future.

The major argument I have heard against these bills is that we may be setting a precedent of government intervention in the free enterprise system. But in my mind, those opponents are simply playing a game of semantics.

I am voting in favor of a "social loan" for the social good of Michigan.

I much prefer loaning funds of no more than \$150 million to bail out Chrysler now instead of incurring inestimable long-range costs which could easily and probably far exceed \$150 million.

It is the difference between loaning \$150 million to help Chrysler survive and paying out millions of dollars more than that in unemployment compensation to more than 160,000 Chrysler workers and related suppliers. The only difference is that we will get the \$150 million back with interest. The

unemployment costs would never be returned.

Some opponents to this legislation argue that in light of some of the recent Chrysler recalls that these loans are not

being made as the result of the high cost of government regulation as Chrysler claims, but poor management decisions on the part of Chrysler executives.

I don't think we have the time to con-

sider who is at fault for Chrysler's current situation. We need instead to decide what to do about that current situation before it becomes worse.

What we have proposed to do is bail

out one of our most important employers and forward them a loan with no risk to state funds.

A special loan for the social good — I support it.

## Our Opinion

### Sweet talk turns sour

When it was revealed last fall that Northville High School had been breaking state law for three years, endangering every student's and teacher's life by not having a working fire alarm system, only Trustee Chris Johnson stood up to express anger and disbelief at the oversight. The rest of the board hurriedly approved \$5,000 to fix the system and said no more about the embarrassing topic.

In the same vein, things that should have been explained when teacher Robert Williams was transferred last summer, during the teacher's strike, when repairs ran into disaster at the high school; these were times when the public wanted to know what was going on and the board kept its harmonious silence.

We are not suggesting that board members and administrators are not concerned. In private they seem well-informed and hold interesting and individual opinions. But a community member who raises an uncomfortable issue at a school board meeting will find he faces a homogenous, polite board in which individual members — and indeed, Mr. Nichols himself, seem hesitant to state unvarnished facts or pose blunt questions which may have undesirable answers.

The school board should get along with the superintendent and his administration. They should respect the school board attorney's opinion. But we believe it is more important that they really listen to the voters and speak out on public concerns. That is their job. They can only do this if they are more interested in getting to the truth than they are in peace and quiet because the truth is not always going to be calm or funny or fine.

"We hear reports on areas where apparently remarkable progress is being made while ignoring other more relevant fundamental issues," Barron said at the superintendent's evaluation Saturday.

Let's hope Mr. Barron continues his candid comments and the other board members, Mr. Nichols and his staff take the cue and become less afraid of public controversy.

## Cookie defense

Twenty-five cents, a quarter not as big as a Girl Scout cookie, is causing "some confusion" throughout the community as Northville Girl Scouts are in the midst of their annual cookie sale that funds local troop activities as well as the Huron Valley Council's camping and other programs.

The quarter is the amount that the local shortbreads, mints, sandwich and peanut butter cookies cost over what is being charged by adjacent Livonia scouts in the Metropolitan Detroit Council. Their cookies cost \$1.25 a box. Northville scouts are taking orders at \$1.50 a box.

Northville Board of Education Trustee Richard Barron hit the nail on the head last week when he criticized the fact that the school board's "present dialogue always goes in a positive area and that doesn't serve the board or community well."

Superintendent Larry Nichols has done a good job in the 18 months he has been chief executive officer of the school district, we agree.

But we believe that he, his staff and the school board could do a better job if they would give more credit to the community and start talking more candidly about the problems the school district faces.

There is something unrealistic about a meeting where never is heard a discouraging word.

As we read it, the community of Northville is vitally interested in what is going on in the schools. People want to know the progress the school district is making. But they also want to know — and have a right to know — the problems.

As administrators, Mr. Nichols and his staff are quick to point out the positive steps the school district has taken. And the board seems quick to chime in when there are praises to be sung.

But when conflicts come up the public continually gets the impression that harmony at all costs is more important to the board than resolving a prickly issue if voices must be raised.

At the March 8 meeting two mothers told the board of problems their children were having at Moraine school. One mother read an entire list of suggestions to improve the reading program in the elementary schools and volunteered to help institute some of the suggestions.

The board listened, smiled, told her they appreciated her comments and suggested she make an appointment to see Nancy Soper, assistant superintendent for instruction. But no one bothered to look at her list or speak with her after the meeting. She went away, frustrated.

Obviously, the Northville price is not a competitive one, but is based on need for income to support the local program. There are differences, too, in the amount received by the Huron Valley Council from United Way and other contributors.

Camp Linden and other recreational assets of the council are a prime plus for local camping. We hope the current cookie sale won't crumble because of the twenty-five extra pennies. Consider it a special contribution to insure that more Girl Scouts can enjoy summer camping and other Huron Valley programs.

### Teachers' right to strike?

#### YES

From 1965 (the year Michigan teachers gained the right to organize and bargain collectively) until the present there has been considerable debate regarding how to resolve impasse and reach agreement at the bargaining table. I believe the answer lies in equalizing the power of each party in the bargaining process by granting teachers the right to strike.

Why must power be equalized? Because each side must have power to force the other side to compromise and come to an agreement. Said another way, the alternatives to not settling a contract must be so distasteful for each side that they force an agreement of the parties.

Currently, the boards of education wield most of the power in the bargaining process. Boards may unilaterally set the terms and conditions of employment at impasse, fire striking teachers and bring about legal suits that may result in fines of jail

sentences for teachers. Teachers essentially have two options: to work under unilateral terms and conditions of employment or to engage in an illegal strike which puts their jobs in jeopardy.

In my experience, the alternative to the strike — working without a contract — is worse than a strike. We have only to look at the loss of morale, undesirable effects on students and general upheaval of the school community in West Bloomfield during the 1976-77 school years when teachers worked without a contract to prove my contention.

Legalizing the right to strike would even out the power at the table and force the parties to come to agreement without the problems the unequal power now creates.

We all are rightly concerned with a positive climate in schools. For the climate, tone or atmosphere of the district is an element which promotes or inhibits the learning situation in the classroom. Obviously, then, we should look with a jaundiced eye at anything which creates a negative climate.

Since strikes create a very negative climate in schools, all parties should recognize the merit in eliminating the strike as a pressure tactic during the negotiations process. The strike strategy is too destructive, too disruptive, too demoralizing and too often creates irreparable damage to the educational process.

However, a ban on strikes by teachers is not viable in the absence of alternative and effective procedures other than strikes to assure equitable treat-

ment of employees.

We must have the conviction that, after a negotiating confrontation, opposing interests can and will be accommodated by agreement.

The future of a sound educational system largely is dependent, I believe, upon the institutional forms which are created to channel conflict, to make a confrontation of opposing interest possible, and to facilitate the reconciliation of those interests by agreement.

There needs to be a better understanding all around about the many conflicts of interest, long-existent but recently high-lighted, which have to be channeled and reconciled in the operations of our school systems.

there is little chance of stopping Swan Harbour, blocking the other two projects is quite possible. Gordon Ruttan of the Wayne County Block Grant program, an agency that along with SEMCOG and HUD approves or disapproves subsidy housing applications.

Given the existence of Swan Harbour and township plans for subsidized housing in the Wayne County Child Development and prison property area, HUD probably would be influenced by township opposition to any other subsidy housing projects, the two officials suggested.

Here, briefly, are some of the observations by citizens:

—If acceptance of block grant monies means the township must accept subsidized housing perhaps Northville should opt out of the program.

—Since HAP plan inconsistencies have been noted, township board

members should oppose the subsidy proposals in court on those grounds.

—Township officials failed to notify citizens of the Swan Harbour subsidy plan and therefore are prime targets for recall.

—Northville Township is being forced to accept more than its "fair share" of subsidized housing.

—Contrary to Clerk Clarice Sass' contention, local senior citizens do not have priority for subsidy housing and that the units are likely to be occupied by "outsiders."

—Supervisor Thomson is being "railroaded" by the clerk.

—Thomson shares guilt with Sass for meeting secretly with the Swan Harbour developer.

—Township officials are not responding adequately to citizen complaints and, instead, are being subjected to "dog and pony" show meetings.

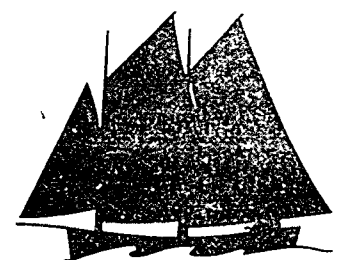
## She's charity chairman

# Everything turns up at unique resale shop

Most successful emporiums are imprinted indelibly with the personality of their owners. The Treasure Mart in Ann Arbor is such an institution.

For 20 years come April owner Demaris Cash has made the resale shop on Broadway — located "a lunch stop away" from the Gandy Dancer restaurant in Ann Arbor's landmark train station — a reflection of her beliefs.

The store containing two floors of "junk that someone else will love" has a reputation in Michigan that links the Treasure Mart to Mrs. Cash as Neiman Marcus is tied to Stanley Marcus.

Word has gotten out that "any time you're in Ann Arbor it's the place to stop."

Who knows, you might find a pair of gold bracelets from Tiffany or a quilt stitched by the mother of the first governor of Minnesota.

Both items found their way to the resale store and now are the possessions of Mrs. Cash.

But because the store has gained the reputation for having "finds" of this caliber, it has been sought out by customers who may be housewives, University of Michigan staffers or celebrities.

"Every time Helen Hayes plays in the area," Mrs. Cash confides, "she comes in the shop but she puts her finger on her mouth to indicate we're not to welcome her — she doesn't want to be identified. She wants to shop."

A recent shopper was Mrs. Johnny Cash. Her husband was performing in the area and they were staying at the

Marriott in Ann Arbor.

"The taxi driver told her, 'It's the most interesting shop in town' and apparently she thought so because she stayed two-and-a-half hours with the taxi meter running and bought \$8,000 worth," Mrs. Cash relates.

When Mrs. Cash last week told a joint meeting of four area Quilter antiques society chapters, "It's a pure joy to handle things for people," there was no doubt she meant it.

She enthusiastically displayed a tableful of items that had found their way to her store. A metal sewing bird whose beak years ago held folds of cloth for the home sewer was recognized as "very collectible."

So was the Faberge spoon with glasswork bowl resembling a cathedral window.

"Greenfield Village would like this," she observed, holding it up for light to flow through the fine piece of jewelry.

Members of the host Station VI chapter, Base Line, Silver Springs and Plymouth's new Antiquarian chapter gathered in Northville's Mill Race Historical Village for the program.

They admired beaded purses, chatelaines worn about the housewife's waist, a skating lantern — and tried to identify a corn husker, a brass earphone and brass holders that years ago were attached to a woman's belt to hold up her skirts.

But 20 years ago such a variety was not finding its way to the shop just opened in the building it still occupies.

Mrs. Cash recalled for the Quilters how she, the mother of two young daughters, one discovered to have muscular dystrophy, also had a dependent mother and was facing the possibility that her husband Travis might be unable to work.

"I asked the Lord what I could do to earn a living," she said.

The answer came as a result of one of her frequent trips to a surplus store that

had three lighted display cases, "a tremendous bargain."

As she kept telling friends about them, one suggested she open a resale shop and offered to bring her accumulations from years of travel with her husband, an Army colonel.

With Grace Bigley, a partner for many years, the store was painted and readied for opening. (It now is owned by Mrs. Cash, her husband and daughters after Mrs. Bigley, who was bookkeeper, wished to retire, Mrs. Cash explains.)

One of the first requests was for a crystal chandelier.

"Now that is not an item that usually finds its way to a resale shop," Mrs. Cash related, "and I had to have it in a specified time."

"I said, 'Lord, do you know if there's a chandelier anywhere?' and the next day a man from Detroit came in wondering if we could sell his chandelier."

"It was just what Lou McKush of Northville was seeking and he later bought a mirror from me, too."

As the Treasure Mart became a mecca for antiquers and browsers Mrs. Cash saw a need for a resale clothing store and opened The Tree a block away with Loretta Brown.

"All my clothes come from there," she announced, patting the beaver collar of her suit.

Noting that her grandfather operated a country store in Rebelsville, Pennsylvania, Mrs. Cash remembered, "He greeted everybody by name and we try to do the same."

Today, Mrs. Cash remarks, the Treasure Mart is asked to empty about

three houses a week. People still also bring in individual items to be sold on consignment.

"Young people just love oak because it's so practical," she told the Quilters. She suggests saving anything hand blown or hand painted and anything with the maker's mark or label.

Choicest items, of course, are more rare. But a Gobelin tapestry came into the store from Hungarian refugees.

The quilt with fruit and floral design was part of a household shipment.

"When we saw the workmanship, I called the owners to say they must have made a mistake including it. They said they did not want it and were pleased it was going to a good home. That's how I learned its origin."

Mrs. Cash was offered \$5,000 for it but has promised to "give it back to Min-

nesota where it belongs."

The bracelets repose in a purple satin-lined box made for them. The Tiffany inscription also bears the location of Union Square. That is how Mrs. Cash dates the bracelets exactly to 1870. The famous firm was there a year and then moved to Fifth Avenue, she told the Quilters.

The owner of the resale emporium sparkles as she relates the many "finds" from her shop. If she didn't confess that "I'll be 75 in August," no one would believe she was at the mid-seventy mark.

She has no thought of retiring. "I hope sincerely to drop dead on the Treasure Mart floor," says the lady who calls herself the "Queen of Junk."

The faith that she says has always guided her may make it so.

## Girl Scouts explain why cookie prices differ

A sale price difference between cookies sold by the Detroit Metropolitan Girl Scout Council and those sold by the Huron Valley Girl Scout Council is causing some confusion in this area.

Northville is among the communities particularly affected by the price difference as it borders Livonia, a part of the Metropolitan Council that is selling boxes of cookies for \$1.25. The Huron Valley Council, of which Northville is a part, is selling the boxes at \$1.50.

To help explain the price variation, a statement has been issued by Gail Slusser, assistant executive director of the Huron Valley Girl Scout Council:

"The box price of

cookies is determined by individual councils, not the National Girl Scout Organization. This per box figure is based on that particular council's costs and needs.

"Based on our needs, the Huron Valley Girl Scout Council's board of directors voted to sell our cookies at the price of \$1.50 per box during the 1980 cookie sale.

"We regret the problems this price difference may be causing, but would like to remind the public that the price paid for the cookies is not a competitive product price, as much as it is a donation to Girl Scouting in the community."

Profits from the cookie sale in the Huron Valley Girl Scout Council are us-

ed to supplement income from United Way, camping fees and other contributions to provide a high standard of service to the girls themselves in the form of council-sponsored programs and facilities.

Cookie funds also subsidize camp operating fees and maintenance costs, thus allowing the council to keep girl and troop camping fees low, she points out.

In addition, the direct troop profit exceeds that of surrounding council areas, thus directly supporting individual troop activities. Questions about the Huron Valley Girl Scout Council may be directed to the council office at 483-2370.

## Plant some T.L.C. on your plants

Houseplants, like children, need tender, loving care—but not too much. Overwatering or overfeeding can cause indigestion just as it does in babies.

"You have to feel your plants before you water them," says Irene Raney. "You can't just water everything automatically once or twice a week and expect them to do well."

And she ought to know because growing plants, both indoors and out, is her business. Irene and her husband Ray are the owners and operators, with assorted members of their family, of Raney's Plants and Produce at South Lyon.

Irene explains that merely feeling the soil for dryness is not enough of a test if the plant is potted in a pot or dish that doesn't have drainage.

"Use a stick or a pencil to dig down into the soil to see if it's dry all the way through," she cautions. "It's a little like testing a cake for doneness."

But once you have determined that a plant needs water, be sure to water it thoroughly. The dryness of homes heated by furnaces in the winter make watering even more necessary.

Many plants such as African violets or bulb-type begonias should be watered from the bottom.

"Be careful not to over fertilize, too. The salts from the fertilizer should be washed out between feedings."

Irene suggests using fertilizer every fifth or sixth watering as about the right spacing. She explains that in this manner, the plants that require watering more often also are fertilized more frequently without overdoing it.

If houseplants develop yellow leaves at the bottom that dry up and fall off, they probably need feeding.

Peters, a bright blue concentrated fertilizer that's soluble in water, is Irene's favorite brand for feeding her plants. And she notes that a very small amount goes a long way, just as the instructions say.

One of the questions most frequently asked by customers at the greenhouse is "what kind of plant will grow well in a bathroom with no window?"

Irene's stock answer is none. She suggests they forget about trying to grow a plant there or else leave the light burning all day.

For a dark corner of the living room, she says a grape ivy or philodendron will probably do fairly well.

All plants need light, either natural or artificial, and they just won't grow luxuriantly without it. Even plants that have red leaves contain chlorophyll and need light to grow.

Light striking the plant activates the chlorophyll within the leaf. The chlorophyll sets the plant to work combining water and carbon dioxide from the air to produce the sugars and starches that provide energy for the plant's life process.

As a waste product from water and carbon dioxide, plants give off oxygen vital to man.

When you hear that plants thrive on

human company, you can believe it. They do, but it may not be your presence they crave but the carbon dioxide you exhale.

Some plants like geraniums and chrysanthemums require plenty of strong, straight-from-the-source sunlight. Others prefer their light in more moderate doses.

Cyclamen, primroses and African violets like the weak sun of Michigan from November through February but they do better the rest of the year if they are in a partially shaded spot.

African violets, for example, like a north window where they can get a good light but not the direct sun in order to provide those blooms that are so much admired.

If you're still nursing your holiday poinsettia, even if it's lost most or all of its leaves, there's still hope that it may live to see another Christmas. If treated right it may even produce another batch of bright red leaves for you.

You can cut those bare branches back now and new green leaves will start to appear in a couple of weeks. Or you can wait until all danger of frost is past and cut your plant back before setting it outside or repotting it.

Poinsettias do well in a draft-free location where they get at least four hours of direct sunlight a day. Night temperatures of 50-65 degrees are ideal

and day temperatures of 68 degrees or higher are just right winter and summer.

They should also be fertilized every two weeks during spring and summer but not during the rest of the year.

When the plants are brought in, before September frost, they must have at least 14 hours of uninterrupted darkness each day for approximately 40 days before they will flower.

For Christmas blooms, place plants in a closet or dark corner of the basement from late afternoon until morning each day from the latter part of September through October.

Maybe your special love is cacti which do well without much care.

Irene, whose favorite plants are these native desert species, says she has brought cacti home from Arizona in a paper sack.

"We just didn't have room for the plants in their pots so I just dumped them into a paper bag and they lived even though it was two weeks before we got home."

"Sometimes I've had cacti around for six months before I've had time to pot them up," Irene admits.

Most important for cacti is a porous soil which provides good drainage. They like to be well dried out before another watering and, of course, they like warmth and sunlight.

Good soil, the right amount of water, fertilizer and sunlight are the best prescription for healthy plants.

Impatiens and begonias, both for hanging baskets and bedding plants, are two of the Raney's most colorful best sellers.

Irene recommends impatiens for people with shady yards or a north porch where they want to put up a hanging basket.

Wax begonias, which produce small colorful flowers, like to be a little on the dry side and should go several days between waterings.

White flies and fungus, which cause problems for most plant growers, can be handled by spraying with a mixture of fungicides and insecticides. She recommends that purchasers read the labels on commercial products carefully to see which spray will do the job best.

"Anyway, why do people seem to believe that flowers should live forever?" Irene asks.

"We should be able to buy a plant for the table as a touch of spring and just throw it out when it's done blooming or it begins to look bad," Irene says. "That's the way it's done in Europe."

Most plant lovers would reply that their plants are like pets and they feel sad when they don't do well or they have to part with them.

The running probably is most beneficial to the distance men because more than any other runner, this athlete has to be able to tick off miles like most of us tick off sidewalk squares as we walk down the street.

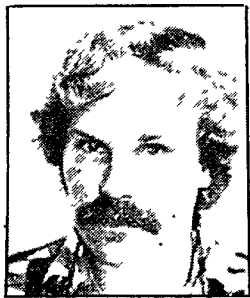
And if the Northville track squad is to tick off wins this season, the distance men had best put this time to good use because how they fare this year probably will be a good indication of how the team as a whole fares.

## Winter in review

It was a season of contrasts. Either the teams did very well or they did not-so-very-well. There was no middle ground.

Perhaps the biggest surprise of the winter was the Northville girls gymnastics team.

In the past the teams considered one or two wins fulfillment of a quota and were satisfied. But something happened this season.

It was a combination of things. A relatively weak schedule, veteran gymnasts who had worked in the Northville program and finally gelled, and Paula Broderick.

The result was an 8-5 record, the team qualifying for regional competition, and one girl, Paula, going on and placing in two events in the state meet.

Veterans like Amy Missel, Holly Raycraft, Anita Hodge and Sheri Robins had gone out for the sport in the past and finally saw the fruits of their labor. Each gave solid, win-producing performances regularly.

Paula is only a sophomore and is the kind of athlete that a coach can build a team around.

The wrestling squad was the only conference champion. The grapplers had a 16-6 dual meet record, won the league meet, qualified a handful of athletes for districts, two for regionals and one for state.

Steve Morgan and Bill Blanchard went to regionals. From that fray Blanchard emerged as a champion at 112 pounds and went on to take eighth at state.

Coach Gary Emerson has a thriving program and is trying to make it grow even larger by recruiting as many young kids as he can.

A good athlete can enjoy moderate success in the sport without a strong background of wrestling knowledge, but the truly great grapplers are the ones who started young, who know the moves instinctively by time they reach the upperclass level, and can thus finesse when they can't overpower.

Emerson is trying to build that instinct into his youngsters now.

The basketball team didn't win the league title, and it didn't get past the second round in its district playoff tourney.

All it did was post the best mark a Mustang cage squad has had since 1975. At 12-8 the team didn't set the world on fire, but it did give the promise of better things to come.

The key players are all underclassmen. Dave Ward will be back to man the center position, and while Mike Wagner, Bob Crisan, Russ Gans and Craig Wisbiski are graduating, their place will be filled by seven top JV players who have height to trade for the others' experience.

Youngsters like Doug Eaker, Tim Wagner, Steve Handley, Tim Malinowski, Tim McLaughlin, Willie Newman, and Rod Kurzawa are more than eager to wear varsity colors.

Eaker, Wagner and Handley are each over 6-feet and growing.

And with the likes of Dave Greer, Kevin Swayne, Gary Kucher, Greg May and Ward returning, the Mustangs should be potent.

The swimming team was once the mantelpiece of Mustang winter sports. But for the last two years it has fared less than well.

New coach Pete Talbot recorded a 3-10 dual meet mark this season, but a number of Northville tankers proved that they were excellent swimmers.

Dave MacDonald could always be counted on for a win in the 50-yard freestyle, and he just missed qualifying for state competition in the event.

Tony Nader was another consistent winner for the Mustangs. He did qualify for state, in the 100-yard breaststroke, and while he didn't finish as well as he would have liked, he is only a junior and has another whole season in which to claim titles.

Gary Lauber, Char Ramsey, Pat Cahill, John Zimmerman, Lorne Demrose and all the rest gave it their all, and that is the most anyone can ask of an athlete. Winning and losing, as cliché as the saying is, isn't everything.

Divers Paul Cooper, Gary Beason, Matt Wright and Dale Fisher all qualified for regionals. Each could have been the number one diver on another squad. Cooper was especially tough, consistently scoring in the 200's.

The foursome were a solid point block for Talbot and his charges.

The volleyball team had perhaps the roughest time of it of all the winter teams.

Even though the swim team's record was poor, the tankers were in the thick of each meet.

The spikers, on the other hand, were in but a few of their matches, recording a 3-9 season tally.

That isn't so much a reflection on the girls' talents or desire to win. It is more a matter of height, or lack of it.

Northville's team was small, much smaller than most of its competition. Which translated into points for the other side.

Kim Kurzawa, Pam Metz, Gerri Grzena, Lori Westphal and Kim McGuire fought hard each match, but could only do so much against giants.

But all of that is gone with the snow, as it were. On to thoughts of baseball, track, soccer and softball. The sporting world goes on.



The senior half-miler is being counted on to turn in another sterling season for the Mustangs.

He currently holds the school record in the 880-yard run with a 1:57.1.

Couyoumjian also will compete in the 440-yard dash.

Handling the long distances will be Seniors Ross Grover, Steve Bourne, Dan Whitaker, Tom Allen and sophomore Scott Dayton.

All five were members of the Northville league champion cross-country team last fall.

Besides Couyoumjian, in the middle distances Senior Doug Wright will be a mainstay in the 440, with Clark Couyoumjian, Erich Nowka, Mike Kramer and Greg Spaman likely to see duty.

The sprints will be in the hands of relative newcomers. Sophomore Chris Dimitroff will shoulder most of the burden, with Junior Scott Robins also in the thick of the fray.

Northville coach Ed Gabrys also is toying with the idea of using Spaman, Kramer, Nowka or Pat Letarte in the sprint events.

Last year's super hurdler, Senior Rob Marzoni, will not compete this season due to work commitments.

# Broderick 11th at State

Sophomore Paula Broderick competed in the Class A State Gymnastics Meet last weekend. She placed in two events; the balance beam and the floor exercise.

Broderick, one of the prime reasons the Northville gymnastics program picked up this year, led the team to an 8-5 mark, the first winning season in the high school's history.

Broderick, one of four Mustangs to qualify for regional competition, was the only one to score high enough to go on to state.

In the floor exercise Broderick scored an 8.6, which earned her 11th place. The winning mark was 9.2.

On the beam the spry sophomore scored a 7.7 to place 18th. The winning mark was 8.45.

"She did the best she could on the beam," Northville coach Jack Townsley said. "It was the one event that was scored low all tournament. She slipped once and fell once which meant an eighth of a point deduction. If she

hadn't slipped and fallen she would have scored an 8.5, which would have been enough to win. Just an eighth of a point between winning and 18th place. Even the winner slipped."

Townsley said that nerves were a big factor in the competition, but that Paula was able to handle hers better than most.

"Everybody was nervous. She did well, as well as anyone who is nervous can," he said. "There is such a thin line between execution and falling."

"The floor exercise was the best she's ever done in that event. The problem is that everyone does well on that. If you are a good gymnast you are a good tumbler, and each event had the 50 best in Michigan in it."

The state meet took place at East Kentwood High School in Grand Rapids last Friday and Saturday.

The high school season is ended for Broderick, but she has qualified for the nationals on the private club level, and will compete in those soon.
