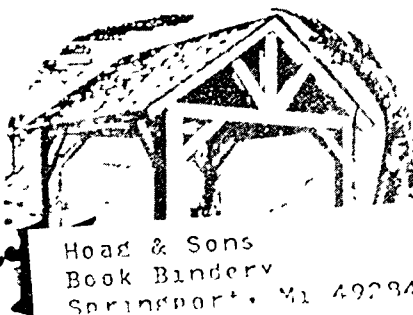

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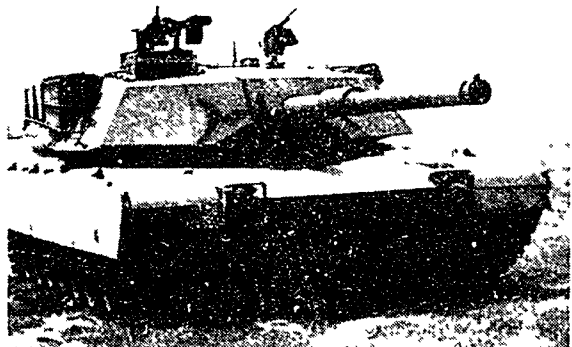

For a new career at age 54

Phillips thanks a tank

'When Bill was laid off
at age 54 from Chrysler
Automotive last fall,
things looked pretty bleak'



Bill Phillips smiles now when he tells you how Chrysler Corporation laid him off last October. For him, unemployment got him the job he'd always wanted.

When Bill was laid off at age 54 from Chrysler Automotive last fall, things looked pretty bleak for the Phillips, 565 Langfield. He was getting older, Chrysler teetered on the edge of bankruptcy. And he didn't know when, if ever, he would be called back.

"It didn't look good," Bill says. "There were bills to pay and five teenagers to support. Because I tried to be honest and told the Michigan Employment Security Commission I had gotten vacation pay, they held up my checks."

Bill refused to become depressed and embarked on a job-hunting program. The weeks went by. His wife Martha typed his resumes. Neighbors came over, offering support. Other neighbors prayed.

Then, two weeks before Christmas, Chrysler Defense Division in Centerline called. The makers of the new XM-1 tank wanted to interview him as a technical instructor on the XM-1's turbine engine.

Two interviews later, Bill had the job, and for the first time since 1974, a secure position.

"It's ironic," Bill says now, crescent shaped blue eyes twinkling. "When I once subbed for a guy at the Detroit Tank Arsenal, I wanted to ride on the M60 tank but it never happened. And now, here at 54 years old, I'm occasionally driving the new super battle tank, the XM-1."

In his new job, Bill teaches Army personnel how to repair and use the XM-1's turbine engine at the proving grounds in Aberdeen, Maryland.

He is clearly thrilled at being involved with the brand new tank's turbine engine. His expertise in turbines started in 1963 at Chrysler, Holley Carburetor, Vickers and Cadillac Gage.

From 1970 to 1974 he worked for Chrysler Automotive in customer relations. Though it wasn't what he really

Planners opt for PBO zone for S. Main

By a split 6-2 vote, Northville City Planning Commission voted April 15 to recommend rezoning of all lots fronting on the west side of South Main from Beal Avenue to the Veterans of Foreign Wars building to professional, business, office (PBO) classification.

The property currently is zoned general commercial (GCD) although the master plan future projection for the area has been changed to show the entire Bealtown area as residential.

The recommendation to city council came after an emotion-charged public hearing with residents themselves differing on which zoning classification they thought most desirable.

More than a dozen residents who live in Bealtown on Main and adjacent streets attended the hearing.

Also present was Carl Follmer of Novi who has been seeking permission to use the house at 424 South Main for a real estate-investment office. The PBO classification would make this possible.

Ronald Nino, city planning consultant, recommended the PBO zoning, giving his report before leaving to address a local meeting of the American Association of University Women who are studying land use.

"The change to PBO (zoning) is more consistent with residential," he stated, adding that, "political realities make residential (for South Main) next to impossible."

Calling the area "a good place to live in," Nino said, "the last thing you want is automobile row, now permitted under existing zoning."

Nino said PBO zoning tends to utilize existing houses for office use and visually ties in with adjacent residential.

He suggested recommending to the city in the best interest (of the area) development and beautification goals.

Longtime Main Street resident Herman Hartner, who said he had just moved to Randolph from 416 South Main, disagreed.

"It's not a nice place to live any more — the traffic's terrific," he told the commission. He suggested that a change to Central Business District (CBD) zoning would be more acceptable.

Chairman Thomas Wheaton said this was not part of the rezoning public hearing consideration, however.

At a request from the audience the commission listed uses permitted under the various classifications.

Under PBO medical offices, banks and utility offices were among those mentioned.

Under CBD food and drug stores, bakeries, hardware stores, department stores, restaurants, furniture and used furniture stores, variety stores, barber and beauty shops, cleaners, movie houses, motels and hotels, doctor and dentist offices as well as churches and fraternal orders were cited.

Under GCD (present use) businesses termed "less intensive" were listed, including such large space users as

PLANTE & MORAN has been rehired by the city to audit Northville's books. The firm, which first took over the job last year, was praised by council for its performance.

AS CITY COUNCIL awaits a revised shared-cost formula for building inspector services, it is considering two other options — hiring its own building official or contracting for professional services with another agency. Presently, city and township share this service.

ESTABLISHMENT of a Northville Arts Commission by the city council appears a certainty. Council directed City Attorney Philip Ogilvie to draw up a resolution creating the commission, while praising Cheryl Gazlay for her work in researching and boosting the arts commission concept.

SALE of the Shriners newspaper here on May 2-3 has been approved as a means of raising monies for the Moslem Temple's burned and crippled children's aid project.

Planning commission's recommended rezoning on South Main came within a hair of outright denial by city council Monday night before the matter was finally tossed back into the planners' lap for reconsideration.

Instead of calling for a council public hearing on rezoning from general commercial to a professional office classification, council tabled the matter and suggested that planners consider development of a brand-new zoning district — something more liberal than professional office and more restrictive than general commercial (CBD).

Council stopped just short of rejecting the recommendation because such a rejection would prevent the matter from being resubmitted for a year.

During their discussion Monday, council appeared to favor commercial uses for the area more like those permitted in the central business district.

And the suggested new zoning district, sort of a modification of the CBD zoning, is seen by council as a potential classification for those areas now zoned general commercial on North Center as well.

Council member J. Burton DeRusha appeared to be the only member who saw the PBO recommendation as having merit. He reminded council that the planners' recommendation was based on existing zoning classifications.

He also noted that a CBD-like zoning necessarily might mean utilization of Yerkes Avenue properties backing up to the South Main lots to accommodate parking.

Nevertheless, DeRusha joined other members in suggesting that a modified CBD zoning be considered for creation and implementation on South Main, from Beal south to within two lots of Gardner.

Park labels get green light

Two areas within the city are destined for park designation as a result of two separate actions of the Northville City Council Monday.

Council voted 5-0 to designate the city-owned land at Base Line and Carpenter as park, and it unanimously approved a rezoning request at Novi Road and Eight Mile that effectively means land abutting some of the rear yards of Allen Drive properties will get the park designation.

Property formally designated as park land cannot be changed or sold for any other use except by a vote of citizens.

Although some citizens argued against the rezoning, which carries with it city permission to build apartments on Novi Road, east of the stream, at a greater density than might otherwise be permitted, council concluded

that the rezoning would be in the best interest of the city and Allen Drive property owners.

Under an agreement with the developer, council will permit the greater density and the developer will give to the city his land west of the stream to be designated as park.

It has been estimated that the greater density will permit construction of two or three additional apartment units.

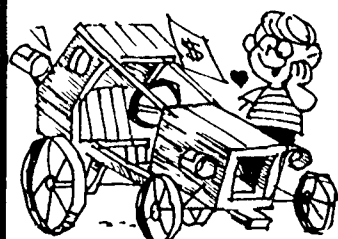
The apartments will be located immediately south of the existing Novi Road apartments. And if the developer is successful in negotiating an agreement with the owner of the existing apartments, both apartment complexes will utilize the same ingress and egress on Novi Road.

Relative to the park designation for city-owned land at Carpenter and Base Line, council concluded that, based on

recommendations of the parks and recreation professional consultant, continued use of the land as open space — for tot lot recreation — is desirable and therefore the park designation is warranted.

Mayor Paul Vernon said he had reached this conclusion the following day after council had tabled the matter and after having more closely examined Ford Field as a potential site for a tot lot for the "Cabbagetown" neighborhood. The latter, he said, appeared to be unsuitable for the kind of neighborhood recreation desired.

He said he had hesitated initially in immediately agreeing with the neighborhood's park designation request because of an uncertainty of whether or not a more suitable location could be found and because of the value of the wooded land at Base Line and Carpenter.



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Zoning is topic Saturday

Zoning will be the topic Saturday at 8 a.m. when township planners meet for a study session at the township hall, 41600 Six Mile.

Currently in the process of updating the township zoning ordinance, planners will discuss roughly the first half of the ordinance, last revised in 1974.

The meeting is scheduled to adjourn no later than 1 p.m.

A new Master Plan of Land Use was approved in December and planners will use the plan as a guide for making changes in the zoning ordinance.

A number of rezoning petitions—some of which were initiated by township planners—may

be discussed, but no action will be taken until the regular meeting Tuesday, April 29.

Public hearings on proposed revisions to the zoning ordinance will be held once planners tentatively agree on the changes.

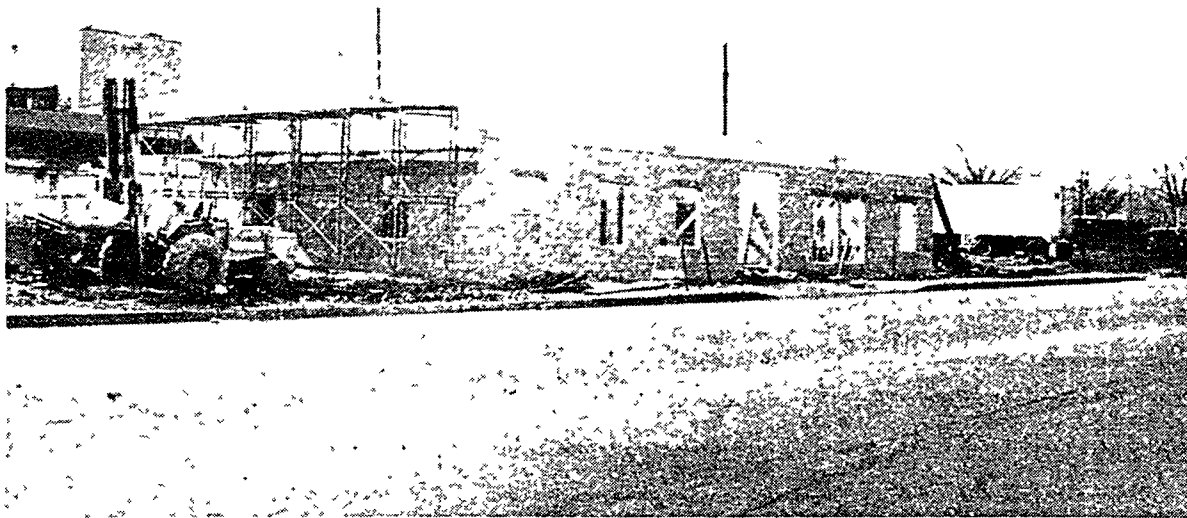
The final recommended changes then must go to the township board of trustees—the body which has final authority.



New look

What a difference a week makes! Just a week after the picture was taken above, the one below was snapped—dramatically showing the rapid progress on the new Down River Federal Savings and Loan building, which is being constructed on the former Dodge dealership property on Hutton between Main and Dunlap streets. Workmen began erecting the roof trusses this week, and brick work was

expected to begin soon. The new building represents the first constructed in the downtown block (between Main and Dunlap) since construction of the former Long Plumbing building on Dunlap, now occupied by Northville Auto Parts, in 1965. The land adjacent to the Down River building, at the corner of Main and Hutton where the car display lot was located, will become small pedestrian park.



Up to \$1,000 reward



The Silent Observer program will pay cash rewards for information leading to the arrest and conviction of persons committing serious crimes in the City and Township of Northville. You can give your information anonymously and still be eligible for a reward.

The program is financed jointly by the City and Township of Northville and the Northville Chamber of Commerce in cooperation with The Northville Record.

How to report information

To report crime information anonymously by telephone, call either police department and give them your information. Then give them a code number forward or backward. The police officer will give you the Silent Observer report number. Your code number is recorded separately from the report, sealed in an envelope and locked in a secure place. It is kept strictly confidential.

Police are looking for a white male, about six feet tall with a medium build in connection with the December 21, 1979 robbery and assault of an elderly township resident.

The 81-year-old woman, who lives on Ridge near Seven Mile, gave police the above description of a man who entered her home—apparently in search of money—while she was sleeping and beat her.

She told police the angry man grabbed her and said he wanted money, then hit her repeatedly in the face and head with an unknown weapon.

The woman, who lives alone, said she then gave the attacker her wallet which "didn't have a penny in it."

The assailant then fled from the house through the back door.

The woman, suffering from a deep cut on the left side of her head and other cuts and bruises, was taken to St. Mary, police said.

Police have been investigating the incident and are seeking assistance from citizens through the Silent Observer Program.

Persons can provide information anonymously and—in certain cases—collect up to \$1,000 for tips leading to an arrests and convictions. (See Silent Observer Program description on this page).

Persons having any information which they think may be helpful to police are asked to call Sergeant Philip Presnell at 349-9400.

City police also are seeking help via the Silent Observer Program.

A black male, approximately five-foot, 10 inches, 140 pounds, with a medium build, a reddish-brown afro and believed to be about 35 years old is sought in connection with the April 8 robbery of Noder's Jewelry, located at the intersection of Main and Center.

Another black male (no other description given) and a black female—also in her mid-30s—about five-foot, five inches tall with a slim build also are believed to be involved, police said.

The three suspects locked the store owner in the restroom in the back of the building and ransacked the showcases, taking an undisclosed amount of assorted jewelry.

Police believe the threesome exited the store shortly after 5 p.m.

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Boy Scouts prepared

Some 30 retarded Boy Scouts will have a chance to learn to "be prepared" like regular kids, thanks to a generous donation by combined Alhambra Caravans.

Boy Scout Troop 1737 at Burger School in Garden City is made up of retarded boys from the Institutions'

Special Education Program run by the Northville Public Schools.

The Alhambra Caravans are fraternal order of Catholic men who raise money to help the retarded.

Four caravans, including Manresa '217 from Northville, donated \$1,050 to the Boy Scouts at Burger school last Wednesday.

"We plan to continue our outdoor activities, and using the generous donation from the Alhambra Caravans to broaden our scouting experiences," said Scoutmaster Michael Dornoff. "We plan on buying some scouting equipment such as compasses, handbooks and cooking gear with the funds. Since we cannot effectively have our scouts solicit funds like most other troops, we rely almost entirely upon organizations such as the Alhambra."

Troop 1737 was chartered in 1979. All the members are severely mentally impaired students who live in institutions. The troop has 30 members, consisting of two 15-boy patrols. Each patrol meets alternate weeks at Burger and the boys get to attend three overnight campouts plus a one-week summer camp.

"Our philosophy and goals are really one and the same," Dornoff said. "We want to provide the unique experience of scouting to boys who might never have had the chance."

The other caravans of the International Order of The Alhambra which participated in last week's donation were Tagus Caravan '147, Barcelona Caravan '143 and Denia Caravan '196.

Alhambra is dedicated to assisting the retarded and provides scholarships for students pursuing a degree in special education.

Restaurant loss is \$2,000

More than \$2,000 in cash was stolen from the Water Wheel Restaurant, 333 East Main April 21, city police reported.

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Kids learn to speak, relax on school forensics teams

According to Irving Wallace's "Book of Lists," people are more afraid of public speaking than of anything else.

But while many adults feel their stomachs flip-flop at the mention of a speech to the garden club or corporate stockholders, Northville forensics students are learning to talk in front of practically anyone about practically anything.

Meads Mill students Leah Higgins and Julie Ellspermann both overcame sweaty palms and quavering voices to practice the art of storytelling. Both girls admit they were frightened of public speaking before they began forensics.

"I wanted to be less nervous about speaking in front of people," Julie said.

"I wanted to get practice, because I was afraid," said Leah. "I think people are afraid of ridicule. You're afraid someone will laugh at you. But with storytelling, you find that even if you mess up part of the story, you can im-

provise. So it gives you ease in other fields, so if you mess up, you won't get nervous."

To an outsider, forensics students seem endowed with a poise and demeanor unusual for their age.

Forensics, teachers say, teaches self-confidence and quick thinking. Students in competition are judged on their voices, enunciation, hand movements, drama, and poise.

They learn to read alone or with others in front of a group, to give an impromptu speech, tell a story or give an oration.

Forensics practice is a demanding four days a week but students think it is worth it.

"I got into it to get over shyness," said Cooke ninth grader Carolyn Dragon, who won first place in the state last year in storytelling.

"I like the idea of telling people my opinion on current affairs," added seventh grader Jim Phillips.

"I got into it because I wanted the exposure, to get over nervousness. The

first time I was really shaking. But now I enjoy it, the reason of experience is diminished. Now I just do it because I enjoy it," said eighth grader Kurt Hoffmeister.

Kurt is one of only a few students who have ever attempted the difficult "oratory" category. With no notes, he has to give a five- to eight-minute oration, word for word, from a script he has prepared and given to judges.

"I like speaking in front of a group of people I've never seen before and act like I've known them a long time," said Tom Yanoschik. "Speaking in general is fun."

Like a sport, forensics involves self-discipline, control and structure in Michigan Interscholastic Forensic Association meets.

But unlike those who participate in sports, forensics students get little recognition. There are no pep rallies for a forensics team even though they are perfecting a skill which they can use throughout their lives.

"I really think that the people involved in forensics are the more intelligent people," said Charles Castillo of the Schoolcraft College speech department. "I have a feeling that nine out of ten people cannot communicate. We have 800,000 words in our vocabulary. You have to learn the vocabulary, so you can think, so you can organize, so you can use language well, so you don't snow people."

Castillo, who teaches speech and public speaking to adults at Schoolcraft, said he has taught some corporate executives and army officers who have been too frightened even to make oral reports.

"They should start teaching speech in second grade," he said. "The attrition rate in my classes, I'm sorry to say, is 60 percent. I have students who are sick, physically sick over making an oral presentation."

In contrast, Northville High School student Kelly Schulz will compete in the state forensics finals May 3 in Ann Arbor. Kelly placed first in serious reading at the regionals last Saturday. Kaye Saurer reached the final rounds of regional competition and received a certificate of merit.

There are not many meets for junior high teams but both Cooke and Meads Mill will compete in the state finals on Saturday.

At Meads Mill, coach Wilma Castillo will send students from her forensics class and team.

At Cooke Junior High, where forensics is an extracurricular activity, the subject is so popular that in February coach Marilyn Freydl had to hold tryouts and select 35 out of 49 students for the team. Some of those students will go to the state meet.

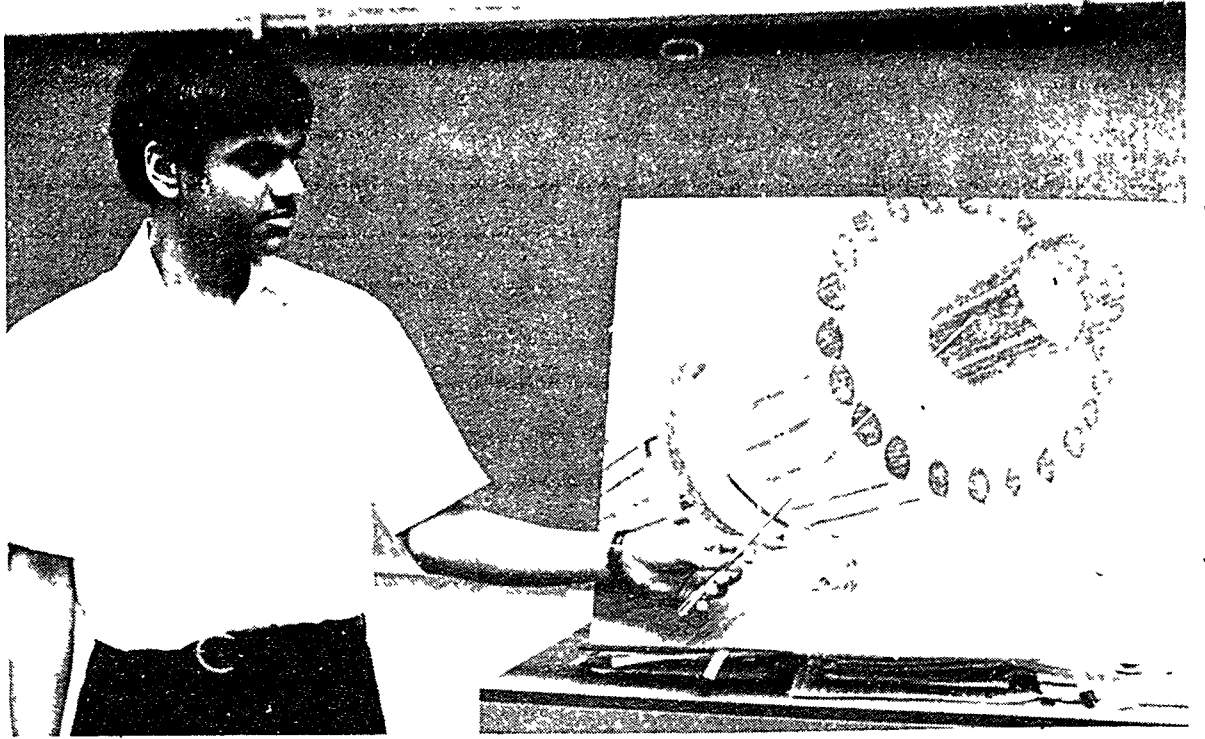

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Dispatchers vote to join union

Township Police radio dispatchers have voted to join the Police Officers Association of Michigan (POAM).

Results of a ballot count March 7 were 4-2 in favor of being represented by POAM — also the collective bargaining agent for township police officers.

POAM will be the exclusive representative of all township police dispatchers for the purposes of collective bargaining with respect to rates of pay, wages, hours of employment, and other conditions of employment.

The three full-time employees work 40-hour shifts, while the two part-timers (one quit since the election) put in about 16 hours a week — mostly on weekends and holidays.

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Commissioners warn students

Summer jobs can have pitfalls

Youths from this area seeking summer jobs should be wary of employers who might take advantage of their eagerness, warns County Commissioners Mary E. Dumas and R. William Joyner as they try assisting young people in their search for work.

The two county lawmakers, both of whom represent Northville, said the majority of employers follow regulations as established by the State Labor Department, but that it's those few that don't who create the problems.

They pointed out that youngsters looking for summer jobs should know the "costs" of the job, or they may end the summer with less money than when they started.

Youths should be particularly careful of jobs that send them away from home. According to the labor department's wage hour division,

responsible for monitoring violations of the wage-hour law, these are the types of jobs where violations most often occur.

They provided a few illustrations from the labor department.

The ad reading: Waiter, waitresses wanted, spend summer in beautiful surroundings, play free tennis, and have access to pool. Such an ad, the commissioners said, sometimes means the young worker also will be doing gardening, be required to play tennis with guests and have to wait on pool-side customers.

"The jobs look glamorous now," the commissioners pointed out, "but a lot of youths are disappointed each summer when — in the middle of that great summer job — they have to write home for money. 'Youths should also watch out for a job that requires what is commonly called a 'pre-employment' agreement. By signing such an agreement they may be signing away some of their rights."

"An employer," they explained, "cannot ask a youngster to place a work bond or surety — or any kind of cash deposit that can be forfeited for failing to work the agreed time.

"Youngster should also avoid employers wanting them to be their 'own company' or act as an independent contractor. This is a common guise to avoid paying overtime which is illegal," the commissioners continued.

Employers in Michigan are required to pay minimum wages of \$3.10 per hour and overtime at the rate of one-and-a-half for hours in excess of 40.

"Pooling of tips is also restricted," they explained. "Some restaurants supplement a cook's salary pooling tips. This can't be done. Tips can only be pooled with persons directly in contact with customers such as waiters, waitresses, bus persons or hosts.

"Employees cannot charge for breakages, shortages or walkouts — people skipping without paying their bills."

"Summer jobs should be both financially and psychologically rewarding," the commissioners added, "and if a youth has a question regarding

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Maybury State Park offers springtime fun

What's your pleasure?
Do you enjoy fishing, bicycling, horseback riding, picnicking or just taking a leisurely stroll through the woods?
If you're a resident of Northville or a neighboring community, these activities are available just around the corner.
Maybury State Park off of Eight Mile in Northville Township currently offers all of these and soon will offer even more.
A 17-acre pond, an organization camping area, a day camp shelter and four additional parking areas are among the park additions completed this spring. And the park "Living Farm" offers a look at just about every type of farm animal.
Two sets of docks have been installed at separate ends of the pond for fishing. Anglers may be trying their luck as early as June, according to Tony Klein, park manager.
"We hope to have the pond stocked with pan fish and possibly some bass next month," he predicted. "At this point we are not sure if any other types of fish will adapt to the conditions."
Some four miles of bike paths throughout the 940-acre park are available to cycle enthusiasts. The old roads which connected the buildings of the former Maybury sanitarium pro-

vide stretches of blacktop twice the width of normal bike paths.
If you own a horse, you are free to ride along eight miles of bridle trails. A horesman's staging area also is offered near the park headquarters off Beck.
The day camp center overlooking the pond is available to groups.
The shelter, completed this spring, has an indoor/outdoor fire place, tables and chairs, restrooms and a kitchen area.
Reservations are required at least one week in advance, Klein said.
Goats, sheep, rabbits, chickens, cows, a donkey and many other farm animals await your visit at the "Living Farm" located near the park entrance on Eight Mile.
Klein said the farm exemplifies the goal of the park.
"The whole idea of this park is to introduce people to the 'natural world' around us," he said. "We are trying to

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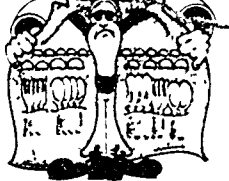

The hours of the park are 8 a.m. to 10 p.m.

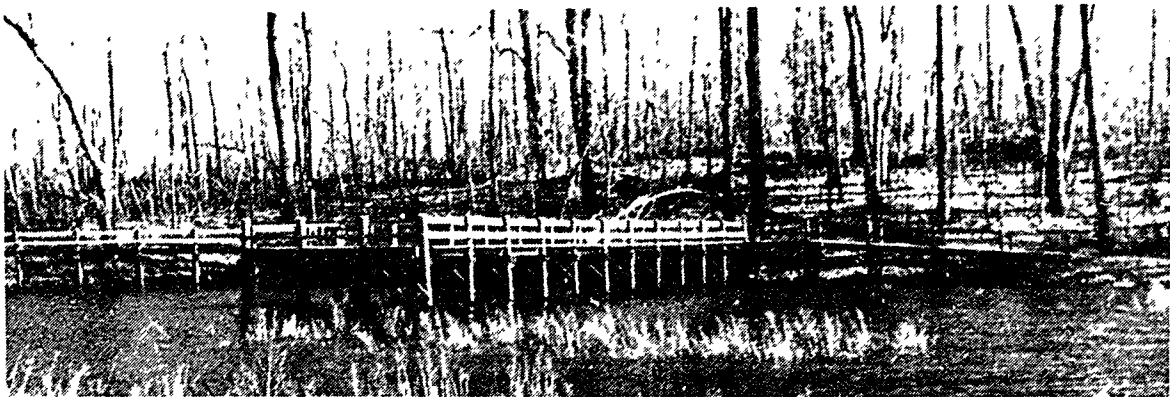
"Contrary to popular belief we are open all year," Klein said. "Cross coun-

try skiing is the major winter sport offered and it is very popular.

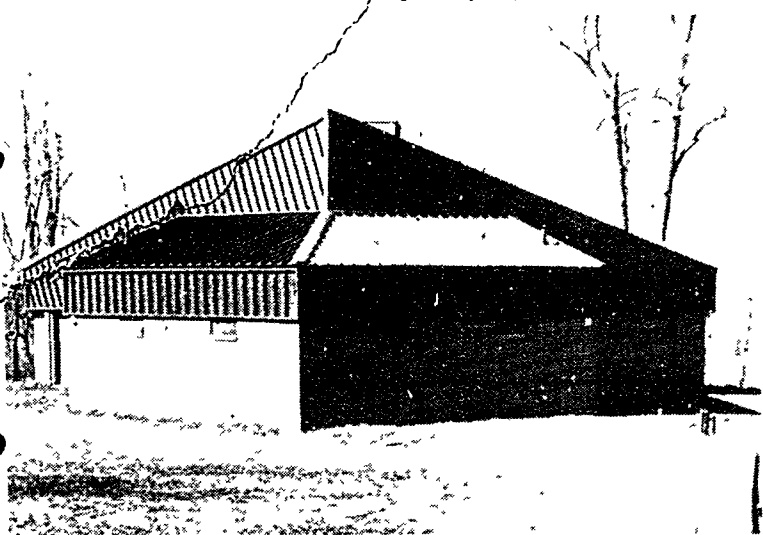
"This winter we had to turn people away because we didn't have enough parking available."

BRIGHTON — "Save Housing" was the message sent out by Livingston County builders. To demonstrate their displeasure with their depressed circumstances, they turned out in force — 186 vehicles strong — in a motorcade from Fowlerville to Brighton. They sent messages to President Jimmy Carter and Governor William G. Milliken via nine-inch 2x4's and then motored with lights on down Grand River.

HAMBURG — Gary Evanko has resigned his job here as assessor to take a job in Dearborn.

BRIGHTON — A proposed shopping center to be located in the Taylor and Hyne Road area of Brighton Township was shot down by the township planning commission.

HAMBURG — Angry over the recent rezoning of 10 acres from residential to commercial, citizens have petitioned for an election on the rezoning in the August 5 primary.

SOUTH LYON — A committee charged with conducting a needs assessment of the South Lyon Community School District was the subject of some heated debate at a recent school board meeting as one side blasted the committee's make-up and another side defended the composition of the committee.

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Council rejects PBO zoning for Bealtown

hotels, plumbing shops, restaurants and bars, nurseries, post offices, mortuaries, car washes, radio-TV stations and bike shops.

Carol Strauch said she and her husband have lived at 327 Yerkes for a year-and-a-half and have been renovating their home. She cited Nino's statements in March when the master plan for the area was updated to residential. He had stated that young residents were painting and fixing up the houses and that the area had not been taken over by the race track as once expected.

The master plan, the commission explained, is a projection for the future while the zoning map reflects the present.

Mrs. Strauch asked why there could not be consideration of "totally residential for the area."

Wheaton responded that he thought he spoke for most members of the planning commission that they "would like to make it residential, but in a real world this is not possible."

He explained that the commission recommends action to the city council and that the "feeling is that the council would not look with favor" on a reduction of tax base to residential.

David Burt of 312 South Main asked the zoning history of the Main Street zoning and was told it received its present classification when zoning classifications were changed in 1974.

James Moffet of 410 Yerkes said he is restoring a home that was purchased from people who had lived there 36 years. Hopefully, he said, the character of the neighborhood would be retained. He questioned where parking would take place for the business areas.

Ray Foulkrod of 402 South Main told the commission he had bought there because of the GCD zoning and "fixed up the house to live in until I can sell. You're going to have a meeting with my attorney in court," he warned, "if you

reduce the value by downgrading the zoning."

Burt also stated present zoning influenced him to buy his house.

"I've put a lot of money in that house. When I bought two and a half years ago, I knew it was commercial and a good investment."

He added that he doesn't think it realistic for the commission to "think the houses are going to last forever." He said his foundation "is falling apart" and also that of others.

Admitting that he "wants to get my office there," Follmer said he doesn't think South Main "fit for residential use."

"Sometimes things are not as bad as you monster up in your mind," Follmer continued, "It's not going to be a high-rise development."

Longtime resident John B. Hinman of 402 Yerkes emotionally told the commission that he has lived in the area since a boy and now is there with his

wife and mother. "They're (those wanting commercial) going to retire and leave and not care what happens."

Hartner objected, replying, "Your're dead wrong if you think I'm trying to make a buck."

His wife explained that they had just moved because "we lived in fear. Last Thursday the very same house in which my friend (Teckla Hamilton) was killed a year ago was walked into by a state mental patient."

(It was learned later the patient is from the Washtenaw Association for Retarded Citizens, not the state hospital. The 26-year-old man told police he left an unattended vehicle, parked nearby while the driver visited a garage sale, because he had to go to the bathroom.)

Wheaton pointed out that the South Main lots in the public hearing (97 through 106A inclusive) have been zoned commercial and have not been developed that way.

Commissioner Bruce Turnbull assured the audience that the city is not just attempting to upgrade Bealtown but all of Northville.

As the hearing was closed, the audience left, many to continue discussion in the corridor not realizing the vote was to be taken at the meeting in session.

Vote to recommend the change to PBO came after Commissioner William Tucker's motion to delay it until the next meeting died for lack of a second.

Tucker and James Cutler voted against recommending rezoning.

Wheaton, Turnbull, Luke Durst, Lesa Buckland, Donald Fee and Stewart Kissinger voted yes.

Tucker explained why he voted as he did, "I don't feel the planning counsel gave enough hard facts and it could be unfair to those who bought there under present zoning."

Tucker said he asked for the delay

because he would like to know if the PBO category actually does decrease values and would like a professional opinion on prices as reflected by the different zoning.

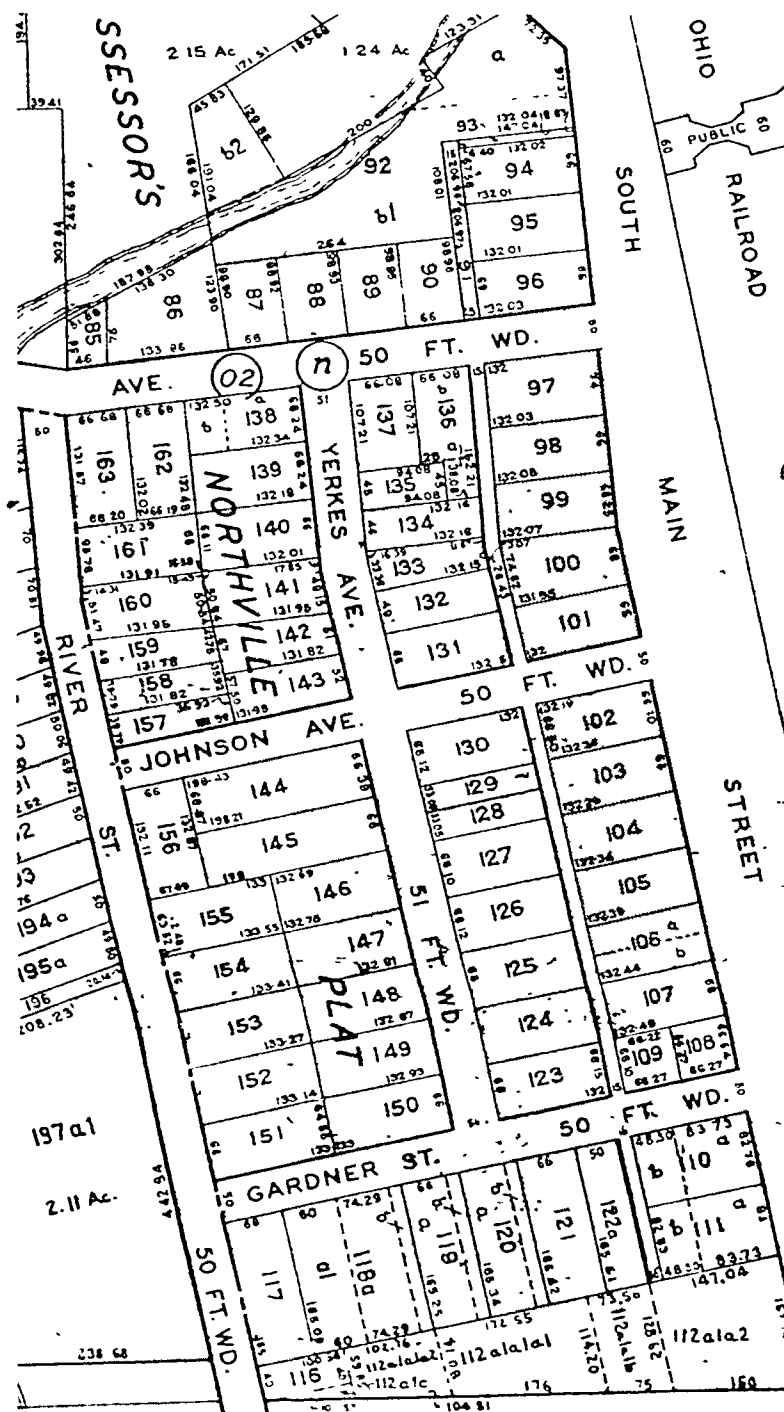
Earlier in the hearing Cutler had been asked, as a local realtor, about prices. He said in downtown commercial zoning could bring \$7.50 a square foot.

As the hearing ended, residents who

live on streets adjacent to South Main seemed to prefer the new PBO zoning while those who live on Main see GCD as more desirable.

Burt called it a "dusty, dirty, loud road, but I want it that way — it slows traffic."

Residents may continue to seek the zoning they prefer when the recommendation comes before the city council, the deciding body.

Members of council are expected to be present at the next planning commission meeting to discuss their proposal with planners.

Upon receipt of the PBO recommendation, Mayor Paul Vernon took planners to task for being "inconsistent" with their own objectives, noting that the commission had, by changing the master plan, projected the area eventually to become residential. It appears, he said, that the commission was influenced by a single request for PBO rezoning.

Council member Stanley Johnston said that, in his opinion, "down the line,

it (South Main) could logically be developed as part of the central business district."

DeRusha cautioned that neither planners nor the council should base their zoning decisions on how those zonings will affect the values of individual properties. He had reference to comments of planners and citizens who wondered if the PBO zoning would hurt the value of those properties now zoned general commercial.

Council member Carolann Ayers, while agreeing with that observation, nevertheless defended the property owners' right to cite potential property value depreciations if the existing commercial classification is changed.

Hospital bed cuts ok'd

A controversial plan to cut 2,500 hospital beds in southeastern Michigan was approved by the State Health Coordinating Council Friday. Still, it will not be implemented for at least 90 days while the state legislature takes a harder look at the document.

"The council approved the plan with conditions and amendments," said a SHCC spokesperson Monday. "We approved it on the condition that there be no implementation of the plan by the Comprehensive Health Planning Council of Southeastern Michigan (CHPSEM) until the state legislative committee looks into the effects."

A hot debate has taken place since January over CHPSEM's plan, which would cut hospital beds in many community hospitals such as St. Mary in Livonia, while leaving most regional

hospitals, such as Henry Ford or University Hospital in Ann Arbor, at full strength.

Opponents of the plan are the Michigan Community Hospitals and Physicians Association (MCHPA). They charge that the plan is biased against community hospitals. MCHPA President Richard Sobota said Monday they are considering some type of legal action to block implementation.

Proponents are the CHPSEM planners and board, who claim that their plan will hold down expanding medical costs and consolidate duplicated services.

In the center of the fray is the state legislature, which first mandated CHPSEM to make recommendations for cutting hospital beds.

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It's kindergarten sign-up time at area schools

The Northville school district is looking for five-year-olds with birthdates before December 1, 1975, to register for school in September.

Registrations are being accepted in all elementary school offices now. Parents should call or stop into their neighborhood school, officials stress.

Each child who is registered will be provided with necessary medical forms. The forms must be completed by a doctor, verifying that all immunizations are up-to-date. Proof of birth is required to register a child in school in Michigan.

The district is encouraging all parents to register their kindergartners in time for kindergarten visitation day.

Visitation days are May 1-2 at Amerman Elementary, Moraine Elementary and Winchester Elementary; and May 8-9 at Silver Spring Elementary.

Councilwoman Ayers asked if the hospital debidding were on the list and if not suggested it be added.

m. County of Oakland requesting our participation in the annual Liberty Bell Award.

Council decided not to participate.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITIZENS: Mr. Lloyd Morgan, Northville VFW, stated he had a bike safety program he would like to discuss.

Mr. Morgan mentioned the VFW will call their program perpetual bike lighting. He mentioned the VFW will, on Saturday, May 17, in the Northville Downs parking lot, mark and identify bikes for safety and also mark them with an electric pen and register with the Police Department. The program will start at 10 a.m.

Mr. Morgan mentioned the Police auxiliary will be cooperating and all bikes will be registered by type of bike and name and address of the owner with the Police Department.

He commented that Senator Geake and Commissioner Mary Dumas were going to participate and he invited the Mayor and Council to help.

He explained the perpetual part of the program is that once a month someone will be at the VFW and anyone can come down there and have their bike marked for identification.

Mr. Morgan stated he would like to ask the Mayor to proclaim May 17 to May 24 as Bike Safety Week in Northville and he would also like to solicit the merchants for support in this.

Mayor Vernon mentioned the Council is aware that the Police Department is active in this area and have had several bike safety seminars.

Mr. Morgan stated everybody could come down on May 17, not just the kids; and he also mentioned the VFW is trying to get support from the newspapers. He commented they would have a triangular reflector for the handle bars and also a 10" stripe on the back.

Councilman DeRusha asked if the iridescent reflectors on the spokes would be available.

It was mentioned these may be provided for sale. The VFW could not afford to give them away, however, they are mainly talking about traffic coming up from behind.

Motion by Councilman Johnson supported by Councilman Gardner to adopt a proclamation to proclaim the Week of May 17-24 as Bike Safety Week in Northville.

Motion Carried Unanimously.

PUBLIC HEARING — Amendment to Title 2, Chapter 4, Section 2-403 of the City Planning Commission Ordinance, of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Northville.

The City Clerk read the notice of Public Hearing as published.

Mayor Vernon opened the Public Hearing and asked for any comments, there being none, he closed the Public Hearing.

Mayor Vernon mentioned that the Planning Commission concurred. This was noted in item 10c of this Agenda.

Motion by Councilman Gardner supported by Councilwoman Ayers to adopt an Amendment to Title 2, Chapter 4, Section 2-403 of the City Planning Commission Ordinance, of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Northville.

Motion Carried Unanimously.

RECOMMENDATION re Public Hearing to consider Amendment to Zoning Ordinance Article 2, Section 2.15 2, Item 1 and Section 2.13 2, Item 1.

The Planning Commission held a Public Hearing on this and recommended to the City Council to adopt the amendment.

The City Manager explained the action that precipitated this. He mentioned the Ordinance was not clear in its meaning and the uses in item 1 is more suitable in PR Zoning Classification.

He also mentioned item 1 eliminates vehicle maintenance uses that are not with a new car dealership.

The City Attorney stated he had a problem with the wording in 2.15 2, Item 1.

Councilman DeRusha stated the way it is worded, bumper shops are being taken out of GCD and transferred into PR-1.

Councilman DeRusha asked if the wording could be clarified.

Discussion on the proper wording followed.

It was suggested Section 2.15 2, Item 1 be worded as follows:

The repair of vehicles and earth moving, construction industry and farm equipment, when said repairs are conducted entirely within an enclosed building.

Motion by Councilman Johnson supported by Councilman Gardner to publish for Public Hearing on April 21, 1980 to consider an amendment to Article 2, Section 2.15 2, Item 1 of the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Northville.

Motion Carried Unanimously.

Section 2.13 2q be worded as follows:

Passenger cars and truck mechanical repairs excluding body repairs when all repairs are conducted within an enclosed building.

Car and truck body repairs when incidental to a new car or truck sales agency and when all repairs are conducted within an enclosed building.

Motion by Councilman Johnson supported by Councilman Gardner to publish for Public Hearing on April 21, 1980 to consider an amendment to Article 2, Section 2.13 2, Item q of the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Northville.

Motion Carried Unanimously.

RECOMMENDATION re rezoning of Benelicki & Krue Property.

Planning Commission held a public hearing on this and recommended to the City Council to rezone from R-1 to R-3 Benelicki & Krue property lying west of the Rouge River.

Motion by Councilman Gardner supported by Councilman DeRusha to publish for Public Hearing on April 21, 1980 to consider rezoning from R-1 to R-3 that portion of property west of the Rouge River legally known as T1N, R8E, Sec 34, Part of SE 1/4, BEG at PT DIST N89-58-45W33FT & S 00-09-00 E 101.16 FT. & S 08-47-15 W 630.36 FT. & S 15-55-30 W 701.28 FT. FROM E 1/4 COR, TH W 499.70 FT., TH S 09-34-58 W 221.36 FT., TH N 87-08-40 E 409.49 FT., TH N 46-55-30 E 134.65 FT., TH N 15-55-30 E 110.04 FT., TO BEG NO. C524.

Motion Carried Unanimously.

CITY LOT AT CARPENTER AND BASELINE: The Cabagetown Association had provided Council with excerpts from past City Council meetings pertaining to this. At the last meeting the Mayor had suggested consideration of Ford Field and asked if any of the Cabagetown people had a chance to look at it.

Mrs. Joanne Kinnely, 743 Horton, stated she had looked at the property and talked to the Recreation Department. She thought there might be some

room, however, when Ford Field was being used for ball games, it was used all the way back to the fence. She stated it was not centrally located and difficult to get to. Her personal objection is the water. She felt it would be difficult with small children unless there was something to keep them from going into the water. The dam is close and the water moves quickly there.

Mr. Totten, 791 Horton, stated he did not feel it was the authority of the Cabagetown Association to talk about what to put in the lot at Carpenter and Baseline. They looked at 505 Grace which they felt might become a lot. They have looked for any other alternate spot such as Long's property and have tried to contact him, however, they think it is doubtful he would be interested. They like the lot on Carpenter because it is in the populated area and not around the pond or water. He mentioned there is nothing at Ford Field that is like the Carpenter area.

Mayor Vernon mentioned the list of petitioners and a conflict of opinions, i.e. some say leave the lot like it is and some say put in swings. He mentioned Council is being asked to dedicate it as a park and he would like to know how they want it.

Mr. Totten stated he did not think that a group of that size would get consensus. The group is asking for a commitment from the City to use the land as a park. He stated it is a pleasant place for the children to play now that they would not want to change it much.

Councilman Johnson mentioned Mark Horning, who is working with the Recreation Department on the Master Plan, could provide a professional opinion.

Councilman DeRusha asked if the people wanted the land dedicated as a park so their children can play on it or because it might be built on.

Mr. Woodruff, 327 Baseline, noted that someone has already tried to buy the park. The Cabagetown Association wants to make sure that the land stays as a non-residence for future generations to use.

Mr. Totten stated it had not come up as a rumor, but rather was noted in the paper. He stated the park in the area at their last annual meeting, and set this as their goal.

Mayor Vernon mentioned Council will be considering the 1980-81 budget soon and may be they will have to increase taxes by 1/4 of a mill, if Council votes the SB 1041. Regarding speed limits in school zones, it was noted on page 3 line 5, the speed limit could be increased or decreased by local authorities within a school zone under their jurisdiction. Since Eight Mile Road is not under jurisdiction of the City it is not the solution to our problem.

REQUEST TO PURCHASE 39' NOW CITY OWNED, 505 GRACE: Communication from Roy and Betty Thomas, 505 Grace asking if they could purchase the thirty nine feet that was part of the original lot and now owned by the City.

Discussion on going out for bids followed.

The City Manager was authorized to get an appraisal and come back with his recommendations for the next meeting.

GOAL TO ALLEN TERRACE RESIDENT COUNCIL: Communication from Bernice Denune, President of the Allen Terrace Resident Council asking for an advance of funds to complete the Beauty Shop at Allen Terrace with the understanding that when funds are available from the Beauty Shop Fund, the City would be repaid.

The City Manager's memo mentioned the fund raising projects the Allen Terrace Residents have participated in and that they need approximately \$800 to complete the beauty shop and get it into operation at this time.

It was recommended that the City loan the amount necessary to complete the project until it can be repaid by the Resident Council, but not longer than December 31, 1980 without interest charges.

Motion by Councilman Johnson supported by Councilman Gardner to advance the money needed without interest until December 31, 1980.

N. HIGH STREET PAVING ESTIMATE: A preliminary estimate of the costs were given as \$24,324.00 by the City Engineer.

The City Manager explained the Leon Bonner court suit and what it entailed. He mentioned Mr. Bonner was suing the City as a result of the vacation of Walnut Street which, the suit claims, denies him access to his property.

In discussion of the paving estimates on N. High Street, the City Manager mentioned it would be difficult to assess the street since it would cost about \$8,000 or \$9,000 per lot. He suggested the City contact Mr. Andrzejewski and Mr. Henrikson to see

if they wish to pursue this. There have been no other requests but the City is being sued on this.

Mayor Vernon instructed the City Manager to contact Mr. Andrzejewski and Mr. Henrikson as to their wishes.

REPRESENTATION ON AREA AGENCY ON AGING: Communication from Livonia re the Out-Wayne County Area Agency on Aging Board of Directors and asking for each participating community to designate one person to serve.

Mayor Vernon suggested appointing Fran Yeakam as the representative to the AAA.

RACE TRACK CITIES MEETING: Communication from Mayor Zervas of Hazel Park inviting all race track cities to meet and review or formulate suggestions for the proposed new State Bill on racing.

Possible meeting dates were discussed.

The City Manager would indicate the 1st, 2nd and 3rd Tuesdays would be preferred and communicate Council is anxious to get together.

1980-81 BUDGET: The City Manager explained he hoped to have the budget done and out by Friday. He suggested meetings be scheduled to discuss it.

Mayor Vernon suggested Tuesday, 15th at 6:30 p.m. prior to the Planning Commission meeting. Could also hold open the 28th and 29th. Also perhaps meeting some night during the week of the 21st.

MISCELLANEOUS: Mayor Vernon noted the Township approved both the Library and Recreation budget.

AMEND ORDINANCE TITLE 2, CHAPTER 11, ESTABLISHING VOTING PRECINCTS: The City Voting Precincts were changed by resolution at the first meeting in January to satisfy the State and County needs, however, to satisfy the City Charter, the Ordinance has to be amended to show the changes.

Motion by Councilman Johnson supported by Councilman Gardner to publish for Public Hearing on Monday, April 21, an Ordinance to Amend Title 2, Chapter 11, City Elections, Section 2-1102, Establishing Voting Precincts.

Motion Carried Unanimously.

DDA: A copy of a letter to the taxing units on the 1979 captured taxes.

The City Manager would recommend to put out for bids now for the paving at Allen Terrace since there is a lot of competition for work.

Councilman DeRusha asked if the Parking Deck restoration were completed.

The City Manager answered some caulk still needs to be done. He mentioned the City is holding an amount of money out to insure completion.

AFSCME: Communication from AFSCME Union advising they are ready to commence contract negotiations for the 1980-81 contract year.

Mayor Vernon stated a bargaining committee should be appointed.

Motion by Councilman DeRusha support Councilman Gardner to appoint Vernon and Johnson to the Bargaining Committee.

Motion Carried Unanimously.

CETA: The City Manager mentioned the City had received official notice of our final allocation from CETA.

SILVER SPRINGS ROAD: It was mentioned the City should take an official stand on the extension of Silver Springs Road.

Mr. Dohany has reinforced his position that he will help pay the costs.

Mayor Vernon directed the City Manager to indicate our interest to the Township and are willing to pursue the matter with them.

Meeting adjourned at 11:25 p.m.

Athletes may get Meads Mill field

Meads Mill Junior High athletes can take heart: they soon may be rid of underwater playgrounds and soggy fields.

The Northville school district is taking bids this week from contractors on how much it will cost to build a proper combination football-soccer field, a six-lane aggregate track and graded softball diamonds.

If bids come in on May 6 under \$100,000, the district will likely start working on the fields right away.

"We want to take advantage of the season and the condition of the (depressed) trade, so we are likely to begin as quickly as possible," said Operations Director William Hood. "We'll probably have to interfere with some of the summer programs; right now we're anticipating the project will take two months."

The district also is taking additional bids on tennis courts, a sprinkler system for the football field and storm drainage for the soggy physical education area on the east side of the building.

Superintendent Larry Nichols said the additional projects, while needed, may have to be put off until more money is available.

Money was the big reason why something was not done sooner at Meads Mill, where the playing fields have been in poor condition since the school was built.

"The project was high priority and part of a \$1 million bond issue last year," Superintendent Larry Nichols told the Northville Board of Education April 21. "We wanted to build a football field, softball diamonds, a soccer field, tennis courts and a community recreation area, a second site for competitive athletics. But the September bids were over \$200,000 when we thought it would cost only \$60,000. So it was back to the drawing board."

Hood told the school board he thought it was important that the Meads Mill project be done. "After all, there were promises made to the community," he said.

Across town at Amerman Elementary, workers took advantage of the mild weather Friday and began constructing an Eight Mile entrance into the school.

They have to prepare the subgrade, put in a drain line, dig out existing dirt to put in approved landfill base then pave the new entrance, Hood said.

Work will take a few weeks, depending on the weather, condition of the subgrade and the availability of supplies, he said. In addition, Wayne County Road Commission inspectors must approve the work.

The new entrance will allow school buses to enter off of Eight Mile and exit onto Sheldon. Currently buses must use the Sheldon drive for both entrance and exit.

Prison property one subject of concern

Township officials are demanding answers from the governor. Their latest request to meet with him — concerning walkaways from Northville State Hospital, future prisons at the former women's DeHoCo site and a possible donation of land for recreation — comes in the form of a letter sent this week.

"Northville Township has been a gracious host for many years for state owned and operated facilities within our township," the letter begins. "We have been most tolerant and patient. Now, we want to be heard."

The communication, carrying the signature of each trustee, also deals with funds allocated for fire services.

"The most current problem is the funds given to Northville Township for fire services provided to state facilities," trustees explain. "The

amount that we should receive is more than the amount apportioned as the state did not allocate sufficient monies. Why not? Northville Township has more state facilities than any other area. Northville Township does not short the state on services..."

Township officials and Senator R. Robert Geake (R), himself a resident of Northville Township, met with Kenneth Frankland, the governor's legal advisor last August, but no action resulted

from the session.

"Having endured the state's repeated designation of township lands for its needs and constantly ignoring Northville Township's requests, we the board of trustees request an appointment with you, the governor, and not with your executive secretary," the letter continues. "We feel you should give us the opportunity to voice in person our aforementioned problems which merit resolution by solid responses from the state."

Trustees have pushed for the erection of a fence around three sides of the state hospital for many months. Some \$160,000 recently was approved

for the construction of the fence, but final approval of the fencing rests with Governor Milliken and the Department of Mental Health.

There have been 75 reported walkaways from the state hospital since the first of January of which 65 have been returned, according to township police.

Sixteen of 28 reported walkaways in March have been returned to the hospital.

(A walkaway charged with the April 4, 1979 murder of an 81-year-old Northville woman currently is being held at the Wayne County Jail awaiting Circuit

Court arraignment May 1).

Inmates will occupy the renovated women's section of DeHoCo as early as July 1. The first regional prison is scheduled to be built on the same 160-acre site within five years.

Officials have asked the state to donate approximately 40 acres of the site to the township for recreation use.

When township officials last met with Department of Corrections representatives they said they "would pursue the idea" but did not make any commitments.

Township officials say they have not heard from the state concerning these issues.

Honored at WMU

Thanks to earning outstanding grades during her freshman year at Western Michigan University, Kalamazoo, Northville's Diane DeChape has been initiated into Alpha Lambda Delta national honor society.

Diane, 19963 Schoolhouse Court, was one of 140 freshmen who had a cumulative average of 3.5 during her first year. WMU's chapter of Alpha Lambda Delta was established in 1962.

Crumpton awaits arraignment

Did Johnny Crumpton commit a murder?

Northville police hope to prove he did. Defense attorney James O'Connell will try to show he did not.

Arrested April 4, 1979, near the home where Northville's Teckla Hamilton was stabbed to death, the 31-year-old Detroit man later was found incompetent to stand trial.

He was sent to the forensic center at Ypsilanti State Hospital.

Following more than nine months of diagnostic testing the 31-year-old Crumpton January 17 was found competent to stand trial for the murder.

The former Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital patient has been shuffled between the Wayne County Jail and the forensic center since that time.

Currently, he is at Ypsilanti awaiting Circuit Court arraignment.

An arraignment scheduled for April 8 was adjourned at the request of Crumpton's attorney, James O'Connell and rescheduled for May 1.

Whether or not the case will go to trial likely will be determined then.

Some persons close to the case believe the Wayne County special prosecutor may offer a lesser plea — perhaps second degree murder.

If Crumpton plead guilty to the lesser charge, the case would never be heard by a jury.

If he plead not guilty — as he has to the charge of first degree murder — under law a trial must be held.

Judge James Garber of the 35th District Court ruled at a preliminary examination March 3 there was not sufficient evidence to substantiate the first two charges brought against Crumpton — breaking and entering of an occupied dwelling and first degree murder in the commission of a felony.

Garber upheld the third charge — first degree (premeditated) murder — saying he felt there was enough evidence presented that a jury could find Crumpton guilty of premeditated murder.



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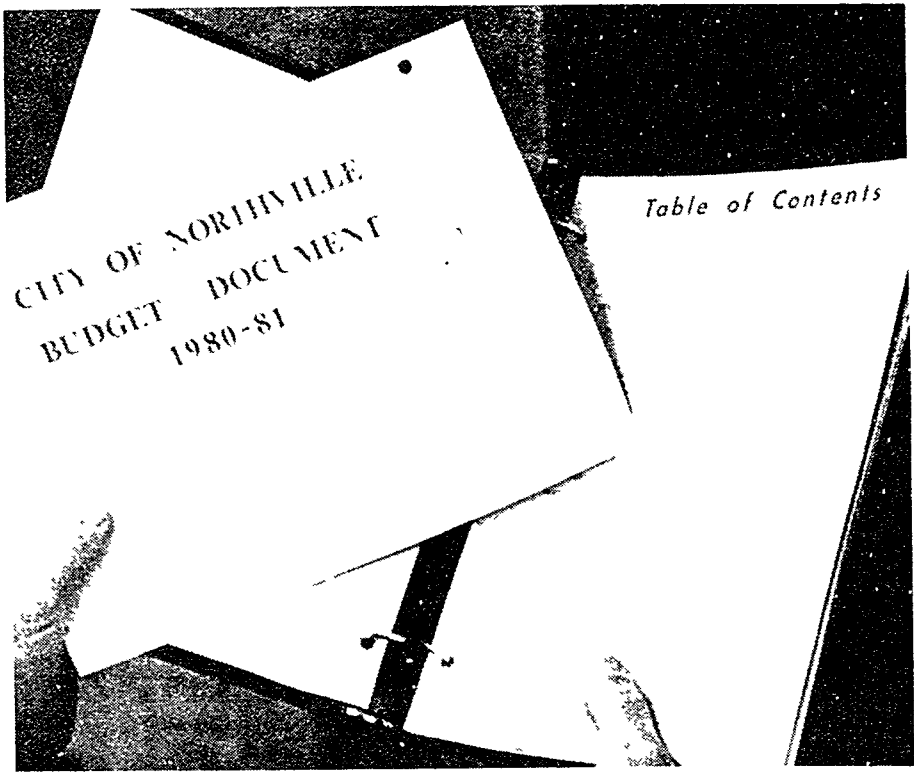

And like the expenditures, the document gets bigger and bigger. The 1980-81 edition has 63 pages, with the manager's promise of more to come before council completes its budget studies this spring. The 1979-80 edition had 55 pages.

But what one man has put together, another can tear apart. And that's what can happen as council faces, perhaps this year more than ever, the difficult task of providing public services while responding to a public outcry for curtailment of expenditures.

Ah, but let us savor Steve's spring delight for a moment longer.

Compromise?

Proposed rezoning of the Bealtown area along South Main to a professional office classification may be a good compromise in the face of disagreement even among property owners in that section of town.

But is it the best zoning? We think not. In our opinion, the area, which is presently zoned commercial, should be returned to its original residential zoning — a use that the master plan of the city advocates.

Apparently, the majority of planning commission members also would prefer the residential zoning but, because they feel city council would oppose such a recommendation, they opted for a lesser change that appeared — until Monday — to have a better chance of approval.

If, indeed, city council is influencing planning recommendations, neither the council nor the planning commission is functioning properly and the public becomes the loser.

We do not advocate that planners and council members become adversaries. Obviously, they must have a working relationship. But we don't think the planning commission should be a rubber stamp of council thinking. Planners' decisions should be based on good, sound planning, not council likes or dislikes.

What makes community history so interesting?

Once upon a time, F. D. Eatherly lived in a beautiful mansion, called "Braeside," in Novi near Base Line and Griswold where the similarly beautiful home of Mr. and Mrs. William Chase now stands.

Eatherly, who made a fortune in lumbering and who became president of the old Union National Bank of Detroit, had his house built here in 1899 at a cost of \$10,000 — an awful lot of money in those days. Eventually, it was purchased from Eatherly by George B. Yerkes, former prosecuting attorney in Wayne County.

Looking at a postcard picture of the house several years ago, the late Ed Yerkes told me a fascinating story, confirmed by the late Charlie Schoultz whose father was Eatherly's chauffeur, about Eatherly and his house.

It seems Eatherly was as shrewd as he was eccentric and rich. Long before insulation became common in house building, Eatherly was an advocate. He sent South for tons of Spanish moss and had the workmen stuff it between the studs behind the siding of his mansion.

The moss helped keep his house as warm as freshly popped toast, but over the years everyone forgot about Eatherly's ingenious insulation. People envied George Yerkes for the exterior beauty of his purchase — not its construction materials.

Anyway, so the story goes, in the spring of 1922 Yerkes decided to have the giant of a house refurbished. He called in Myron Taylor to paint it. And Myron went right to town. Getting ready to paint it, he used a blow torch to remove the old peeling paint.

But poor ol' Myron didn't know about the Spanish moss, and the flame licked through a crack in the siding and ate up the moss as quickly as my youngest daughter eats cotton candy.

In seconds fire raced from top to bottom, and by the time firemen arrived all they were able to save was Yerkes' rolled up Oriental carpet and his cache of whiskey.

wanted to do, Chrysler paid too well for him to give it up. Then, in 1974, the security fell through when the first layoffs came.

"The first layoff was really bad," Martha describes. "We were not getting any SUB (supplementary benefits) payments because we didn't qualify. And it was such a shock. We survived, but I can't tell you how. Maybe it was because the children were younger then."

Bill was called back, but laid off three more times from automotive warranty claims. Then last October, Phillips was notified of another layoff.

"When you are laid off, you just don't know what a shock it is," he says. "Especially for, say, a mid-level executive — this can be an awfully rough shock. And as you get older jobs are tougher to get. Often a smaller company won't hire an older person for one big reason: insurance costs. It's not legal, but it's a fact of life. If an employer has two people, one with half the age and experience of another, the employer will probably choose the younger."

"One of the first things I did when I was laid off was to set up a program, just to keep busy. At the same time, I

sat down and tried to figure out how I could sell myself. I thought, if I've got a handicap because of my age, I'll just have to take a different approach. I took everything I could think of: photographs, letters of commendation, samples of my work and put them into a portfolio."

Bill says he was not depressed during layoff because he forced himself to form a plan, make calls, analyze his abilities and take unemployment as a signal to try something new.

"You should make up your mind that even though you have been with a company for years and years, that maybe there are opportunities to come from being laid off. Maybe you've had a pressure cooker job. Maybe you've worked on ulcer row, and finally you're booted out. It's a shocker, but don't sell yourself short," he says.

"Sometimes things may not be as bleak as you think," Martha adds. "At Chrysler Defense, Bill's age doesn't make any difference. They seem like a good group of people. This job has given Bill another chance."

Bill runs a hand through greying hair. Silver pen and pencil are in the pocket of his blue and white shirt. "I feel right at home there," he says, talking like a technical instructor who's peacefully in love with a turbine engine.

David R. Bell, who observed his birthday Monday, had plenty reason to celebrate.

The 52-year-old Northville resident was the big winner in the State Lottery's weekly drawing Thursday morning. One of eight contestants in the running for prizes ranging from \$2,000 to \$50,000, he came away with the biggie — \$50,000!

What's more, the day after that big win, Bell learned that Burroughs — on strike for the past two months — has settled, which means he can return to his job as an electronics technician.

Bell was keeping a low profile following his lottery bonanza, declining to comment when contacted by The Record.

Good advice for layoffs

Like others his age, Bill Phillips was a victim of an industry that shows little mercy when it is fighting for its survival.

There are ways to handle the shock of being laid off, Phillips says. Here are his suggestions:

- Don't panic, you have a lot more going for you than you think, regardless of age.
- Keep busy! Work around the house for a couple days or more and think. Think of what you always wanted to do

or what you really would like to do.

- After some of the shock has worn off, sit down and list all of your minor and major accomplishments in your field of expertise. Don't sell yourself short on this. What might be minor to you could be a major factor to your future employer. Don't forget hobbies.
- Make up a portfolio of the various jobs and social activities you've been involved with. Include letters of commendation, copies of suggestions you might have submitted, pictures of

yourself involved in various activities, such as Boy Scouts, Little League coaching, Junior Achievement.

- If you are in a bracket where your age could be a problem, sell yourself as an independent consultant. I personally had a bit of luck in this while on layoff. I went to a former supervisor whose company was not hiring, even though he had lots of work. I ended up being hired for a specific period on a purchase order. The department manager didn't even know he could do that until he checked into it. Also, try putting an

ad in a trade journal.

- You're not alone! Form a group, if others are laid off with you. Don't be bashful, have an opening prayer. We all need help, especially during layoff. Get some ideas together, have a list of possibilities or projects like contacting various companies in your particular field.
- Don't be negative and don't be your biggest drawback.
- For the majority of people who believe in God, it's a real test of their faith. Pray!

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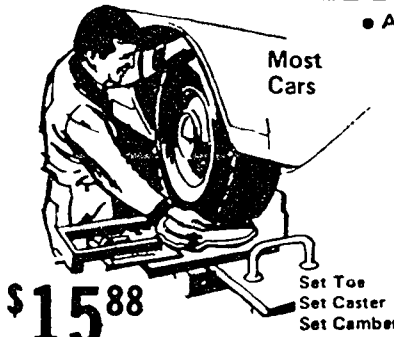
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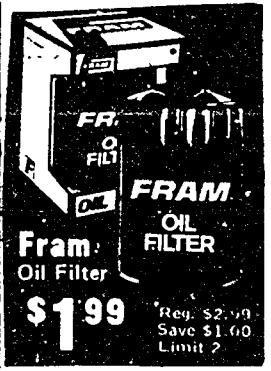
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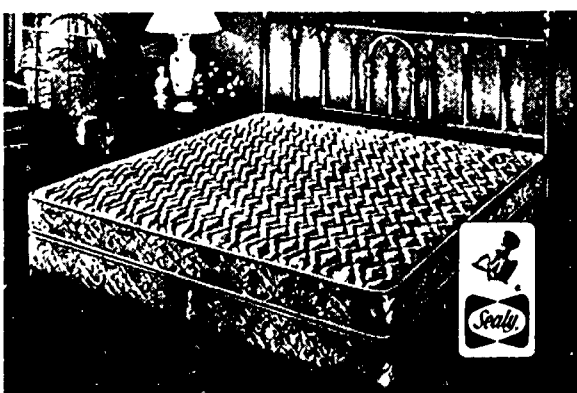


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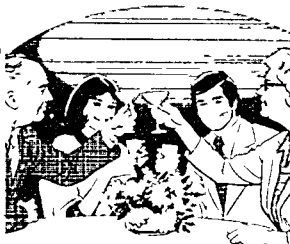
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This class is a hummer at Schoolcraft College

To address young authors

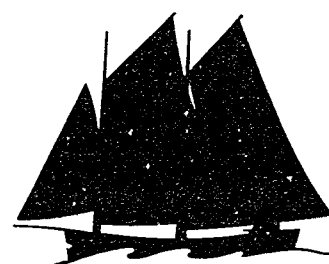
Children's author Alfred Slote will talk to young Northville authors Friday at Amerman Elementary School.

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It's a long way to equality

Both homemakers and working women stand to benefit from the Equal Rights Amendment even though it will not wipe out all discrimination, a panel on women's rights in the 1980s concluded at Schoolcraft College last week.

The panel, sponsored by the Women's Resource Center at Schoolcraft, was made up of Daryl Hafter, associate professor of History at Eastern Michigan University; Glenna Davis, Northville homemaker and president of Homemakers Equal Rights Association; and attorney Jean Wagner of Millar Weinberg Necker Johnson Wagner & Clark in Plymouth.

The women spoke on the history of equal rights and the position of both homemakers and working women in the 1980s.

"In 1923 Alice Paul initiated the Equal Rights Amendment," Hafter said. "She just began something that she could not imagine would still remain undecided in 1980."

The ERA has two more years to be ratified by 38 states before it would become the 27th amendment to the U.S. Constitution. Thirty-five states have ratified it since 1972.

The total text of proposed amendment reads: "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex."

The relatively quiet meeting turned heated near the end when a woman who said she did not want to identify herself challenged the panel on the ERA, saying that equal rights can be gained in other ways and that the ERA would push women into combat.

"The army evaluation indicates women lack upper body strength. They would not be able to carry heavy weapons, cut their way through jungles or throw grenades as far.... Combat is vicious and men would either hurt or pair off with the women," she said.

Her statements brought quick responses from both men and women in the audience and the panelists. Davis said that she did not want either her sons or daughters exposed to "vicious" combat.

In the fight for women's rights, no one has more to gain than the homemaker, panelist Glenna Davis told a Schoolcraft audience last week.

"The ERA is perceived as a threat by many people because it implies change," said Davis, who is a Northville resident and president of Homemakers Equal Rights Association. "Any change that disturbs the family is threatening. So you get people saying, 'I want to stop all that ERA stuff. I want to go back to traditional family values.'"

"I'm for traditional family values; I've been a homemaker for 15 years. But let's look at the way things were. Women could not write a will. They could not earn wages. There was no way a woman could divorce her husband, no recourse for abuse. It was legal for a husband to beat his wife with a stick. He could will away your children if he died. They were not the good old days."

In many states such as Georgia a married woman still has no legal existence, she added.

Davis said while her mother, a nurse, had to battle against a stigma of being a working woman during the 1950s, she has had to battle against the stigma of being "only a housewife."

"I find myself battling those who say because I'm a homemaker I am not intelligent or creative because I choose to stay home."

The work of caring for the next

generation, I believe, is the most important work anyone can do. I am fortunate that my husband makes enough money to support our family on his salary alone. But there are many women who must work, because of inflation, because they are single parents.

"A lot of women are not out 'fulfilling themselves' — they're out there earning 59 cents to every \$1 that a man makes."

Davis argued that only the ERA will ensure equal rights to homemakers in every state and recognize the economic worth of the homemaker.

"The real threat of equality is the fear of equal responsibility," Davis said. "And the main sphere where this is an issue is in the military."

Davis argued that with or without the ERA the United States Congress has the power to draft women, and draft them into combat if it wants to.

"There are women veterans from World War I and II who only recently received veteran's benefits. There were women serving as nurses in combat in Vietnam. It is appalling how women have been treated in the military," she said.

"The two most threatened spheres of influence — the home and the military — are precisely the areas which will stand to gain most by the ERA."

Even with the Equal Rights Amendment, working women will face problems, said panelist Jean Wagner, attorney with Millar Weinberg Necker Johnson Wagner & Clark in Plymouth.

"Beyond women's studies and women's issues there is a whole world of work that doesn't care," she said.

Wagner cited laws which in themselves are not discriminatory but because of past inequities in the system have become so.

"Take the seniority system. In itself it is a valid thing. But because women only recently have been allowed into these jobs, or they must take time out for child care, they are the first to go when cuts are made."

"And veteran's preference laws. There is nothing wrong with the laws, but the plain fact is that women who served in World War I and II were not even granted veteran status until recently."

"And private clubs — these are natural results of men liking to talk to men and women liking to talk to women. But these have been institutionalized. And the importance of these private clubs like the Jaycees, Rotary or the Detroit Athletic Club cannot be underestimated."

"Quotas — there is nothing the matter with striking down quotas — except, how do you overcome the effects of past discrimination without them?"

"Then there are those intangible attitudes that are so much a part of us we don't even realize it. They have been with us since the time we were old enough to hold our first Barbie doll."

"It's going to be beautiful," declares Mrs. Denune enthusiastically.

Earth tones in browns and tans with orange have been chosen for the color scheme.

Kay Lee and Bernice Ebert were named to the beauty shop committee with Mrs. Newton.

Mrs. Newton reports the Christmas bazaar and other projects raised more than \$3,000 for the project.

There's much excitement about it as a beauty shop right in Allen Terrace will be a great convenience for those residents who do not drive, she points out.

Mrs. Newton adds that 18 or 20 beauticians have been contacted and asked to bid on supplying the service. She expects that replies will be in by next week.

It will be a one-chair shop with two dryers; only Allen Terrace residents will be able to use the facility.

Both men and women will be able to have their hair cared for in the new shop. It's to be a unisex operation, they say. However, since most Allen Terrace residents are women, it's primarily their facility.

"We bought the equipment, including a special air conditioner, and Northville Refrigeration, Long's Plumbing and Fisher Electric are contributing installation services," explains Mrs. Newton.

With the wiring completed and the air conditioner in place this week, installation of the ceiling tile was under way. A shampoo bowl and other equipment are on hand waiting to be installed, Mrs. Newton adds.

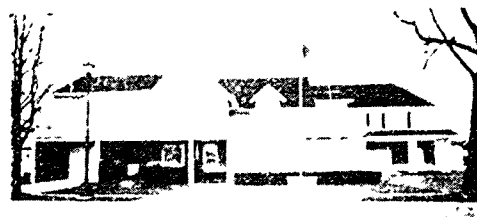
Dr. Herman Koenig,

Six homes open on historic tour

Six homes, ranging from 150 years old to less than a year old, the Witch's Hat Depot, and the circa 1832 brick Presbyterian church are included on this year's South Lyon Area Historical Society's homes tour.

Slated for Saturday, May 10, the tour begins at 10 a.m. and continues until 5 p.m.

After April 15, tickets at \$3 per person are available in South Lyon at Spencer's Drugs, South Lyon Pharmacy, South Lyon Herald, and from Barbara Sellers at the Colonial Acres Clubhouse. Senior citizen and students tickets are \$1.

In Northville, tickets can be purchased at the Northville Pharmacy.

Tickets will also be available on tour day at the Witch's Hat Depot in McHattie Park.

The oldest house on the tour is the Greek Revival home at 24499 Martindale, completely renovated two years ago by James and Peggy Pelky. An imposing corner fireplace wall of California drift stone is one of the outstanding features.

The newest house is the contemporary home built in 1979 by Steve and Fran Showerman at 635 Woodland Drive. It contains many lovely furnishings and period accents but it is the very unusual exterior design which will first attract tour visitors.

Craig and Julie Ellison are the owners of the large two-story double-brick Victorian home at 215 East Liberty. It was constructed circa 1870 and features a country kitchen and charming parlor as well as several antique pieces.

The 100-year-old large cottage Gothic home of John and Joyce Crawford at 203 West Lake abounds with antiques of every type.

The Victorian farm home owned by Michael and Sharon Bechard at 53481 West Ten Mile is circa 1888. Antiques are plentiful and an impressive glass bottle collection is displayed.

The attractive Greek Revival home of Robert and Dolores Seecombe at 56888 Nine Mile is noted for its impressive view of the surrounding countryside. Oil paintings and many international art objects collected during the owners' travels are integrated into the comfortable, charming decor.

The church, built in 1882, has been in continuous use by the Presbyterians and has undergone several remodelings and additions. The church bell which still calls the congregation to worship was purchased in 1885. A large stained glass window faces the street.

The depot, one of only a few of the Witch's Hat design still remaining in the country, has been relocated in the city's park and is ready for visitors, although the museum is not yet completed.

A meeting room for the historical society and for community use is located in the basement.

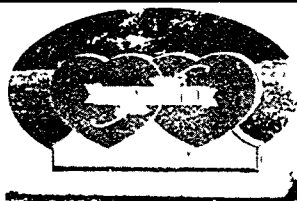

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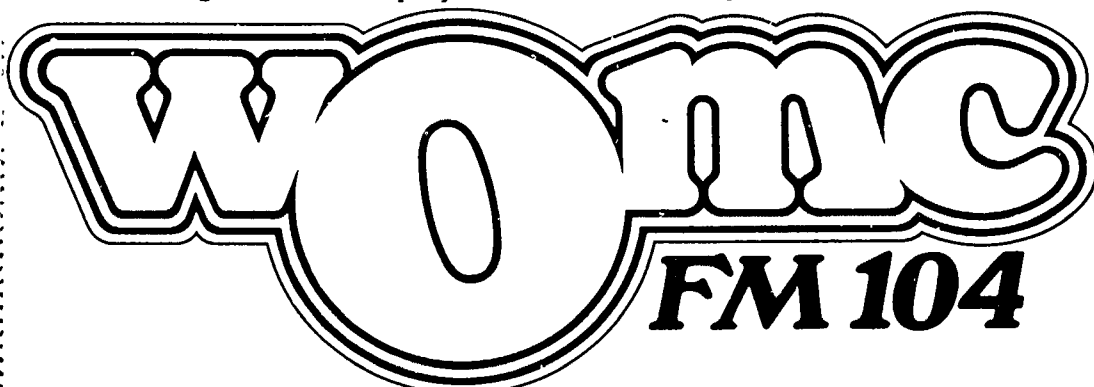

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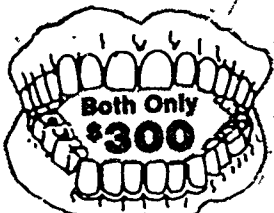

Approximately 1,000 pints of blood are needed every day in the five-county area.

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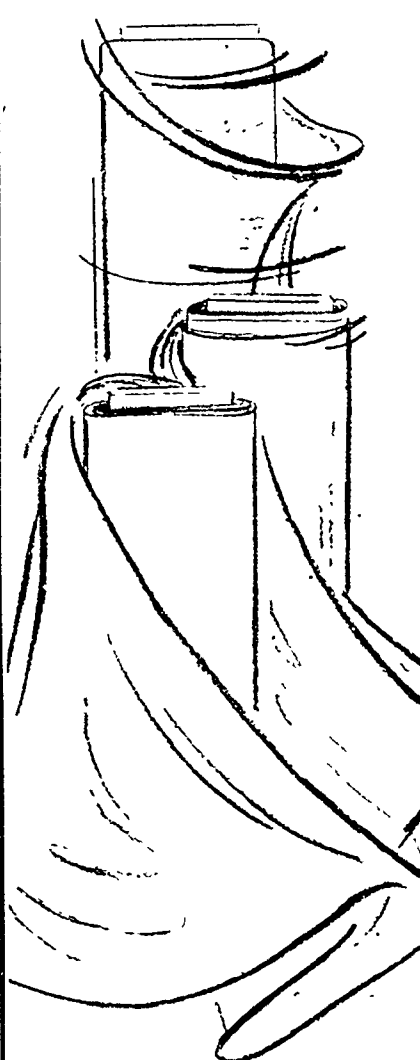
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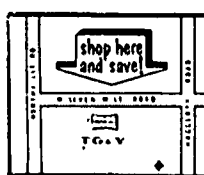

Paula Sherrard looks to fashions for spring

As April showers promise to bring green yards abloom with May flowers, it's time to clean up the barbecue for informal outdoor entertaining.

Richard Benson, certified executive chef in Schoolcraft College's culinary arts program, strongly recommends brochette parties as easy and fun for both host and guests.

Like a shish-kebab, which technically uses skewered lamb, brochette cooking requires only long skewers and "the makings."

"Invite your guests to make their own brochettes," suggests Chef Benson.

"Marinate the meat during the afternoon in a commercial Italian dressing," he continues, listing as good meats, beef (sirloin or tenderloin), lamb, pork, veal or even sea food like shrimp if the budget permits.

The meat chunks cut into 1 1/2-inch chunks should be strung on skewers alternately with cherry tomatoes, small onions, pieces of green pepper, zucchini or egg plant.

Chef Benson, who says he likes to cook outdoors year-round at his double barbecue, suggests a separate skewer that cooks longer with small, redskin potatoes to serve along with the brochettes.

He also shares a recipe for rice pilaf a la (James) Van Vuren, another Schoolcraft certified executive chef.

"Your informal dinner menu could include a spinach salad and fresh strawberry pie a la (Leonard) Stec, Schoolcraft pastry chef," Benson suggests.

"Serve it all with white or red wines," he adds.

RICE PILAF (or herbed rice)

1 C. raw rice
1/2-tea bag opened
salt, pepper, garlic to taste
Pinch of marjoram
1/2 bay leaf
Pinch of thyme
2 C. chicken stock

Combine all ingredients; bring to boil and simmer 20 minutes until tender. Garnish the rice with sauted bacon, celery and onions, raw green onions and pimento.

This recipe serves six. The "success secret" of this recipe, Chef Benson reveals, is the use of the half-tea bag. "It gives it a brown color and distinctive flavor."

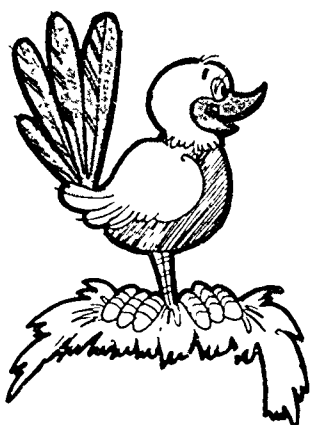

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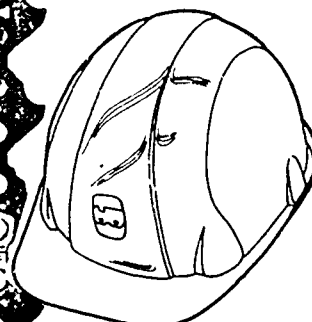
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He's a whiz at making rods; it's a money saver, too



You name it, Bob Dunlap has made the fishing rod

Many fishermen think about building their own fishing rods. Not many do.

Those that do may build one or two. But few build rods with the mastery of Robert Dunlap, a Hamburg resident.

Recently, he finished 22 rods and shipped the last two off to New York. Building rods, of all types, is now not only his hobby, it's a money-making pastime.

"When I build a rod, it's absolutely the best there is," he says. "I won't build a junky rod. My name is at stake."

Normally, one will pay \$30 to \$50 for a rod off the store rack. About the cheapest Dunlap builds is \$60 to \$80.

"I can build a very good fiberglass rod, a 10' to 11-foot steelhead rod for \$60 to \$80 that will knock 'em dead," he says.

"I guarantee the price and the rod," Dunlap asserts.

"I also do a lot of rod repairs. I'd say one-third of my business is repairs."

What does it take to build a rod?

"Patience is a very big thing," Dunlap says. "My wife can't believe it."

A diamond wrap is the most difficult job in making a rod, Dunlap said. He uses up to 12 colors on the wrap just above the handle.

It might take as long as five hours for one of these artistic intricacies. The diamond wraps you see on store rods, which seem intricate, are nothing in comparison, Dunlap says. Most of those wraps he can do in 10 minutes.

His interest in rod building had simple roots. As Dunlap said, "I could not find the type of rod I wanted—a 10-foot steelhead rod."

He bought some books to learn the basics, then began tackling the job about five years ago.

Since then he has built hundreds of rods.

He buys most of his rod blanks from Fenwick in California. But he also uses Lamni-glass. They can't be beat for quality, Dunlap maintains.

Fenwick, he says, has the "best blanks money can buy."

Cost, of course, depends on the type of blank—fiberglass or graphite. Graphite, more sensitive but stiffer than fiberglass, might cost as much as \$260.

"Graphite is a quick reacting material," Dunlap explained. "Although the rod might be quite soft, it still does not produce a big 'C' as fiberglass does. Graphite is one-third faster and tends to snap a thin line."

A fiberglass blank costs from \$8 to \$30, a graphite blank, \$20 to \$260. The blanks come already ferruled, but, Dunlap says, you also can purchase a

one-piece blank. The one-piecer has less utility, because the rod cannot be disassembled.

Dunlap doesn't use varnish on his custom poles. He uses epoxy, because, he maintains, it adds strength to the pole and is more durable.

"I have not touched (repaired) an epoxy-finished rod in five years," Dunlap noted. "I have not replaced a rod tip, and have not had to repair one wrap."

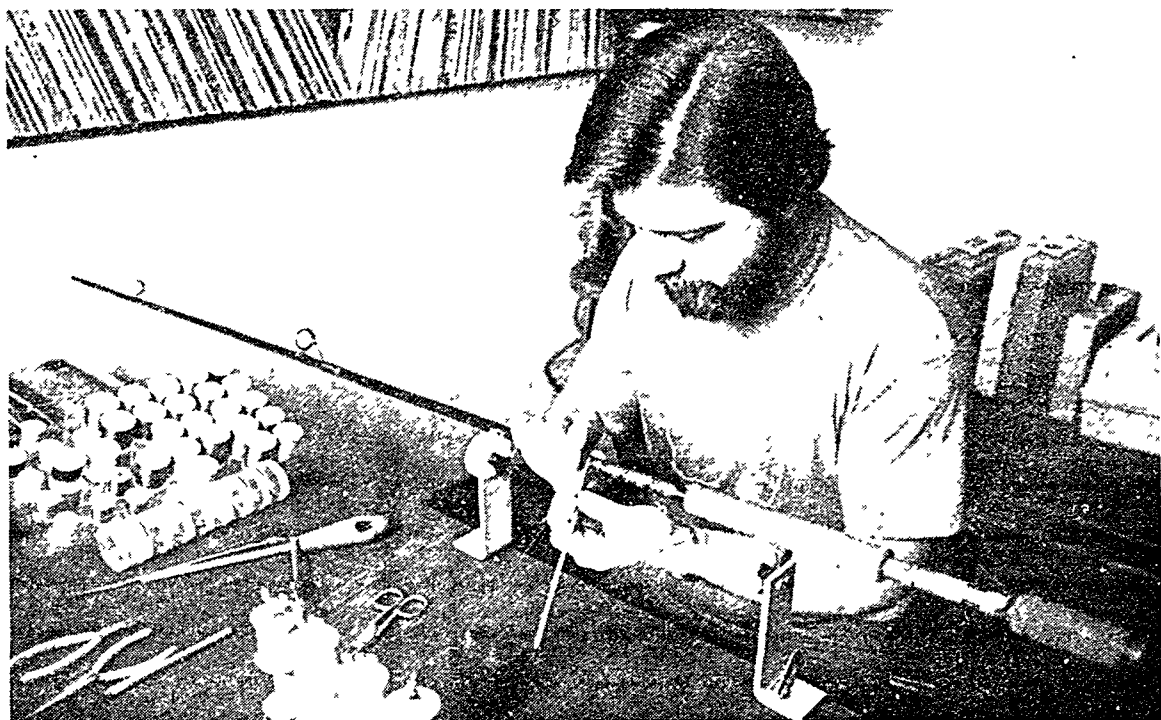
It also involves more time, because the rod has to be turned continuously for up to 12 hours to get the proper

finish. The slower the rod turns, the better finish, Dunlap says.

He prefers foam handles (less cleaning and warmer during cold weather) and Fuji guides (black oxide, stainless steel, light weight and strong).

His pride is an 11-foot, combination fly and spinning rod, with a detachable butt and 16 guides. Dunlap would sell that rod for between \$200 and \$300. But he estimates that if you were to purchase a similar custom rod from Fenwick, it would cost between \$300 and \$400.

"You get what you pay for," he asserts.

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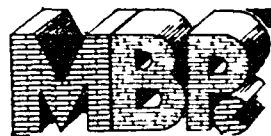
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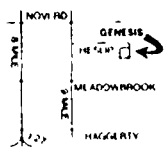
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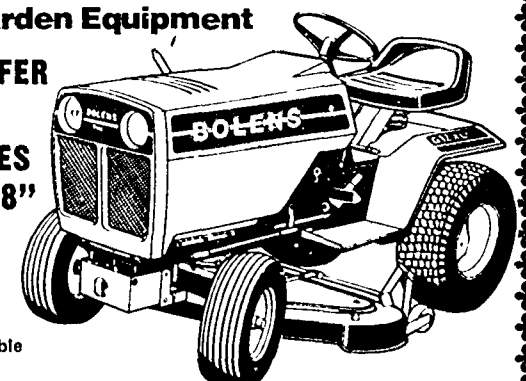
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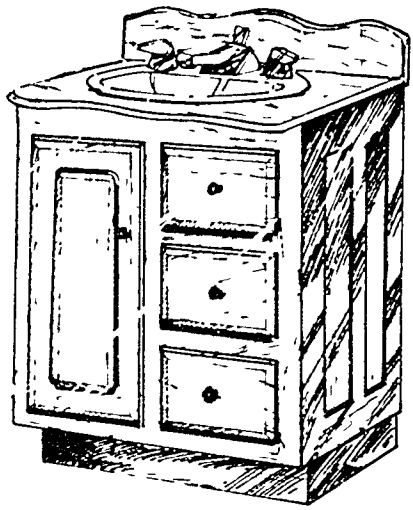
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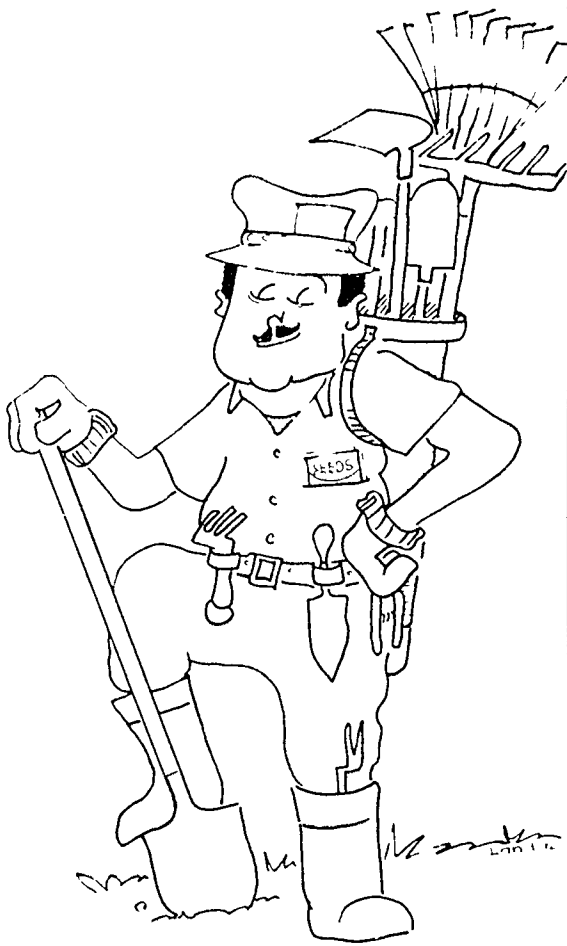
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The 'Intensive Gardener'

Here's some ways to make 'em grow

Intensive gardening enables you to orchestrate your garden production and fulfill your need for recreation and involvement with nature.

The foundation of intensive gardening is fertile, well-drained, biologically active soil. This happy condition can be best reached by regular additions of organic matter, along with mineral nutrients if your soil is inherently poor.

Raised beds, either mounded up and leveled, or boxed in with frames, will multiply and simplify production. Drainage, aeration and ease of weeding are improved.

Because the well-drained soil warms up faster, plants grow more rapidly and develop to their full potential.

The selection of modern, disease-resistant, high-producing

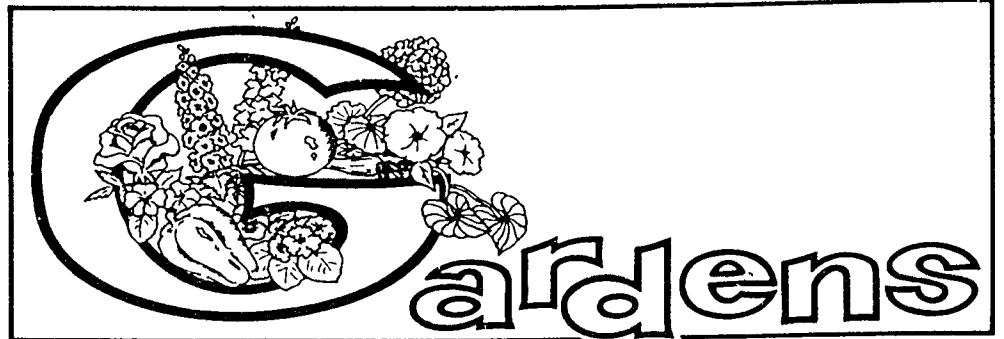
varieties is a key element in intensive gardening.

A gardener in the Sliger Home Newspaper area may have a sentimental attachment to an old variety, but if he or she can specify a more productive and disease resistant modern variety that tastes just as good, do it! Old varieties often are susceptible to diseases and lack the vigor necessary to tolerate insect attacks.

Closely-spaced planting of some vegetables is an integral part of intensive gardening. It's ineffective, though, unless the gardener keeps soil fertility and moisture at near optimum levels.

Gardeners can broadcast seeds by scattering them over beds, or plant them in broad bands. Thick planting is used mostly for small

Plant breeders have been doing some exciting things for coleus the past few years. They have stretched and reshaped the leaves, adding saberlike and heart-shaped ones. They have added ruffles and frills. They have brightened the colors and given us new combinations. They have adapted them to hanging baskets, pots and tubs. They have given them new compact growth habits and varied their tolerance of sun to make them more useful.

The Saber® series have long, saberlike leaves. Plants are dwarf (8 to 10 inches in height), basal branching. The Sabers will tolerate up to three-quarters of a day of full sun, but will not stretch indoors under low light conditions. The Sabers are excellent for hanging baskets or tubs.

The broad, almost heart-shaped leaves of the Fiji™ varieties, with their fringed leaf edges, are reminiscent of lace-edged valentines. They need 80 to 90% shade, but will tolerate 1 to 2 hours of full sun. Plants reach 12 to 14 inches in height. Try the Fijis in window boxes.

Carefree® coleus features unique, deeply lobed, oaklike leaves. This compact, self-branching coleus prefers 80 to 90% shade, but will tolerate up to half days of full sun. Grows 8 to 10 inches in height. Try them for bedding or for patio tubs.

The Wizard™ series is an improvement over the old Rainbow class of coleus. Plant height is 10 to 12 inches. Plants are self-branching; need no pinching. You can plant them where they will receive as much as 4 to 6 hours of full sun. The Wizards will give you lots of color in pots or beds. 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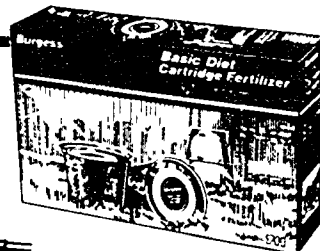

leaves); hard-cooked eggs, chopped; large, fresh, sliced mushrooms; 6 slices bacon, cooked and chopped; 1 very small can sliced water chestnuts; 1/2-C. croutons; 1 lb. chopped parsley. Use dressing of your choice. Red wine vinegar is good. Garnish and serve. This recipe serves six.

FRESH STRAWBERRY PIE

3 C. water
18-oz. granulated sugar
3 oz. clear gel
1/2 lemon, juice and rind
one-eighth tsp. salt
1/2 oz. plain gelatin
1/2 C. water
2 qts. strawberries

Bring water, sugar, lemon rind and salt to boil.

Save part of water to dissolve clear gel (can be purchased at cake shops), add to boiling water and cook until thick and clear.

Add lemon juice and red food coloring.

Dissolve gelatin in water and add to hot mixture.

Fold in strawberries and place in baked pie shells.

Chill and top with whipped cream. This is sufficient filling for three pies.

Chef Benson mentions specific variations that can be cooked on the brochettes:

Cooked pork alternated with cubes of cooked sweet potato and pineapple;
Cubes of liver wrapped in bacon and

alternated with parboiled baby onions and new potatoes;

Whole peeled jumbo shrimp with green pepper, onion, mushroom caps and cherry tomatoes;

Cubes of fish with onion, tomato and green pepper;

Oysters wrapped in bacon with mushroom caps;

Cubes of raw turkey breast with onions, bacon, potatoes.

As another good marinade for meat

to be used 6-8 hours beforehand he suggests a cup of red wine, 3 tbsp. red wine vinegar, 1/2 C. oil, one garlic clove (crushed), small onion (minced), and choice of herb or spices — bay leaf, oregano, marjoram, thyme, fresh parsley, lemon juice.

The brochettes will cook from 10-30 minutes, depending on meat used.

Take the word of Chef Benson: outdoor entertaining is the best kind. He knows — he even has served outdoor banquets for 1,000 in Hines Park.

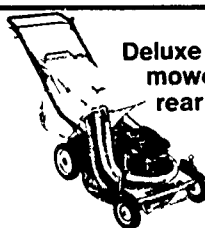


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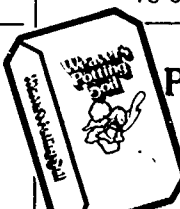
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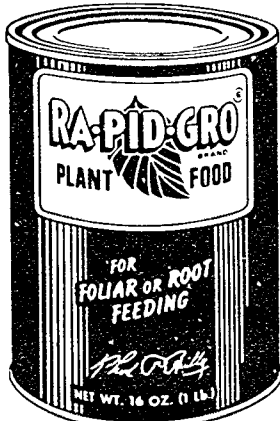
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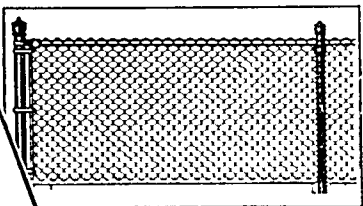


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'Do it yourself' is password today in home improvement

It does not take an economic expert to know that times are hard for the housing industry. With interest rates going up and money becoming increasingly tight, home builders are having a tough time finding work.

But while the economy is inhibiting growth in the housing industry, it is having an almost opposite effect with home improvements, especially with those homeowners who fancy themselves to be do-it-yourselfers.

According to Ron Patterson of Pine Lumber in Brighton, do-it-yourself (DIY) projects are on the upswing. Patterson said the economy has encouraged homeowners to take things into their own hands, so to speak.

Spurred by the tight money and high interest rates, Patterson said homeowners are going to DIY-type work. According to Patterson, the DIY trend began about a year and a half ago and now it is not unusual to find homeowners doing their own home improvements or even building their own homes.

Bob Priestap, owner of New Hudson Lumber, agreed with his Brighton counterpart. Priestap said more people have come into his store to buy all types of home improvement supplies. Because of the hard times, Priestap said he expects more homeowners to improve their present homes rather than buying a new one.

Hardware Retailing, a hardware trade magazine, tagged inflation as a major factor in encouraging home improvements over home selling. The home itself has taken on a new meaning as an investment in the future, according to Hardware Retailing. The magazine went on to say that an increasing number of homeowners are not only repairing as the need arises but they are undertaking remodeling projects as a means of increasing their home's value on the market.

Hardware Retailing adds that because mortgage money remains tight, many homeowners who were in the market for a new home find selling impractical and decide to remodel as an alternative.

Responding to the DIY trend, Patterson said manufacturers are offering kits to homeowners for a variety of home improvements chores. Outside decks and patios are among the most popular home improvements which homeowners tackle by themselves. And, said Patterson, the kits make the job even easier.

"Anybody who can read can put a deck together," Patterson said.

The trend towards the consumer is also being reflected in the advertising budgets of manufacturers. According to Hardware Retailing, manufacturers are going directly to the consumers with their ads instead of relying completely on the retailer to sell the products.

Hardware Retailing magazine stated the DIY trend has grown tremendously in the past decade as a result of the new interest by the homeowners. Hardware Retailing called the home center industry "one of the hottest growth sectors in the American economy."

If the money is not flowing into the housing industry, it seems to be plentiful in the home center business. According to Hardware Retailing, the home center industry has bloomed from a \$2.8 billion per year business in the early 1970s to a \$16 billion per year business today.

Hardware Retailing also pointed out that home center stores not only attracted the customers but the capital investment dollars as well. The number of home center stores has grown from 3,500 in 1970 to almost 9,000.

As part of an effort to meet the needs of the do-it-yourselfer, many home

center stores are offering help to the puzzled homeowner. Home center stores not only have knowledgeable sales personnel but some stores also have signs and produce literature which assist the DIY person in making the right decisions.

One such store in New York specializes in catering to the DIY people, according to Hardware Retailing.

The New York store has signs outlining prices of materials and the store's catalogues not only list the products and prices but also shows the customer how to accomplish home repair jobs.

In giving some advice to the novice handyman, Patterson said he would recommend kits as an easy way to go. According to Patterson, the kit form spells out how to do the job right.

For those with a little more imagination, Patterson said homeowners should hit the books and get to know the materials before starting out on a project.

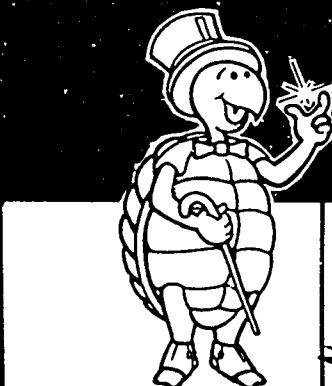

It spoils energy saver

Put a curb on your pool heater

About 40 percent of pool buyers equip their pools with heaters to insure swimmer comfort and to extend the swimming season, according to the National Swimming Pool Institute (NSPI).

Medical authorities agree that 78 to 80 degrees is the most healthful temperature for recreational swimming. If the water is colder, body heat is lost too rapidly, especially if swimming is prolonged.

But NSPI urges pool owners to be aware of the energy-use of their pool heaters and to make conservation measures a habit to reduce energy waste.

"Swimming at home is about the most energy-efficient recreation medium available today," says NSPI Board Chairman Ken Nelson, "especially compared with the fossil fuel consumed in driving to recreation spots."

"And by adopting some simple conservation practices in using their pool heaters, homeowners can make their pools even more of a recreation bargain."

The place to start saving energy, Nelson says, is with the pool heater thermostat.

A child, for example, might feel cold when first entering the pool and set the thermostat higher. His body would soon adjust to the pool temperature, however, and he might even finish his swim before the heater could raise the pool temperature even one-half degree, an increase that could take up to half an hour of heating to accomplish.

If the child left without resetting the thermostat, the heater would unnecessarily continue at the higher level.

Excessive pool temperature is a wasteful practice just like overheating a room. For every additional degree of pool water temperature, the energy requirement is increased by 10 percent, partly because the pool loses heat more rapidly at higher temperatures.

An overheated pool also wastes chemicals, because those used to purify water are less effective at higher temperatures.

For these reasons, NSPI recommends that the thermostat be set at 78 degrees and be locked in place with a set screw.

A second conservation practice, Nelson says, involves taking a practical approach to the swimming season. In technical studies NSPI has found that pool owners save 33 percent or more of their total season energy requirement if they shorten their season by two weeks to a month on each end.

The ends of the season make the greatest demands on the pool heater.

NSPI suggests that before the swimming season starts, pool owners should establish realistic beginning and ending dates for their swimming season.

Based on climatic conditions and the traditional use patterns of members of the family, quite often, this scrutiny of use will show that trimming the season will have little effect on actual pool use, he says. Once opening and closing dates are established, they should be marked

on the calendar and strictly observed.

"Some people continue to heat their pools for weeks or months after they have actually stopped swimming regularly," Nelson says. "It's far better, and cheaper, to turn off the heater

at a predetermined date."

The pool heater should also be turned off when the family goes on vacation, Nelson says, or any time the pool will not be in use for more than two or three days.

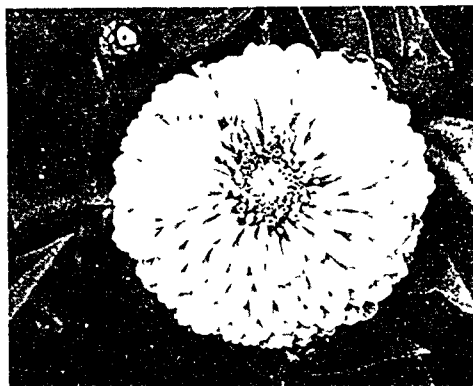
What is it that makes zinnias the number one flower grown from seeds? Could it be the vast choice of plant and blossom sizes, colors and petal conformation? Partly.

The pioneers took such risks, and not only for food gardens. Sprinkled among

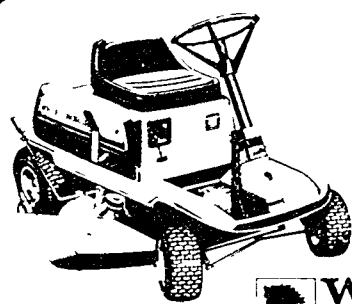
the staples, pot herbs, medicinal and culinary herbs were a few sturdy garden flowers like nasturtiums.

Replacing the T-shirt as the summer's newest top is the polo shirt.

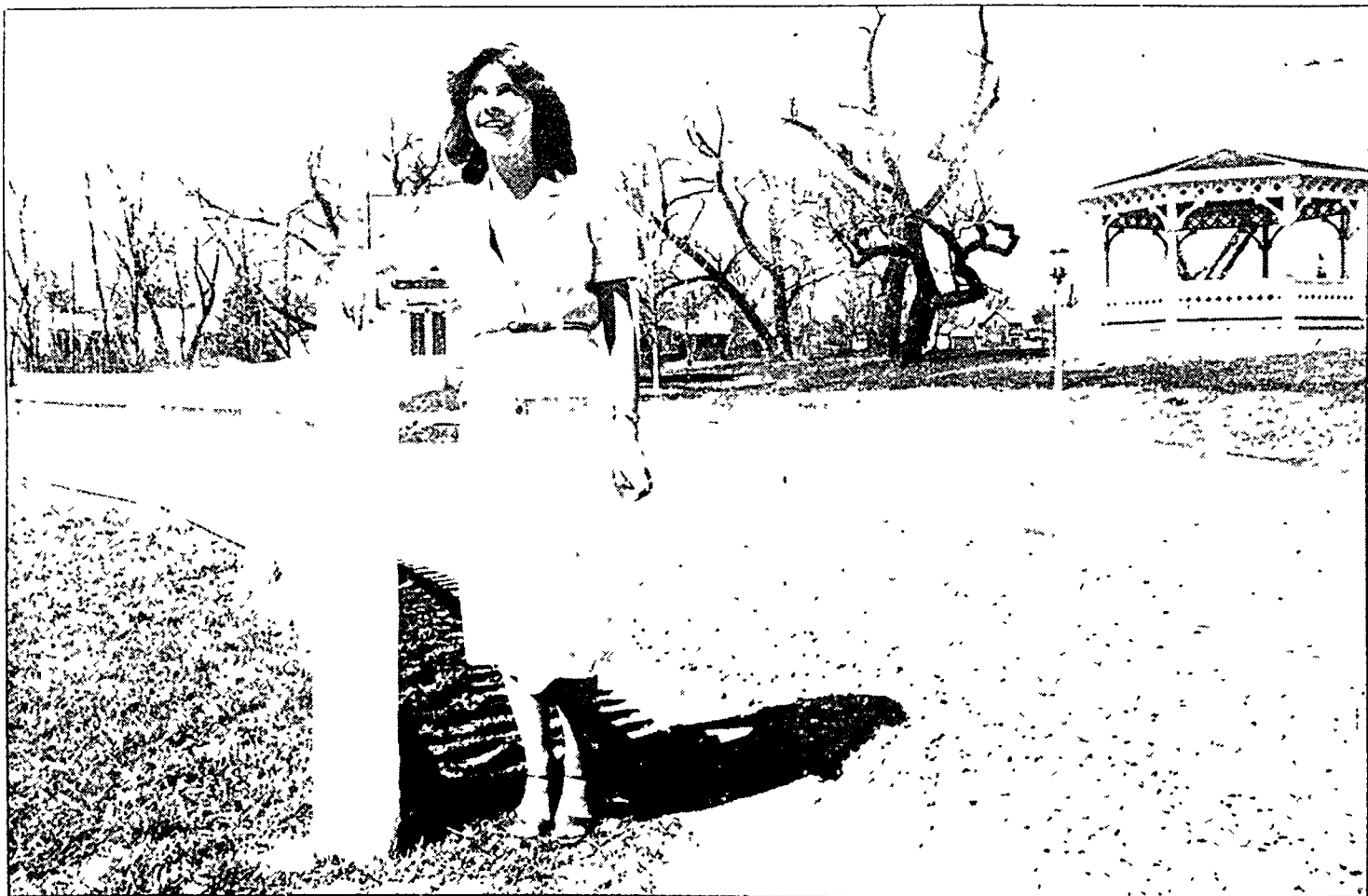

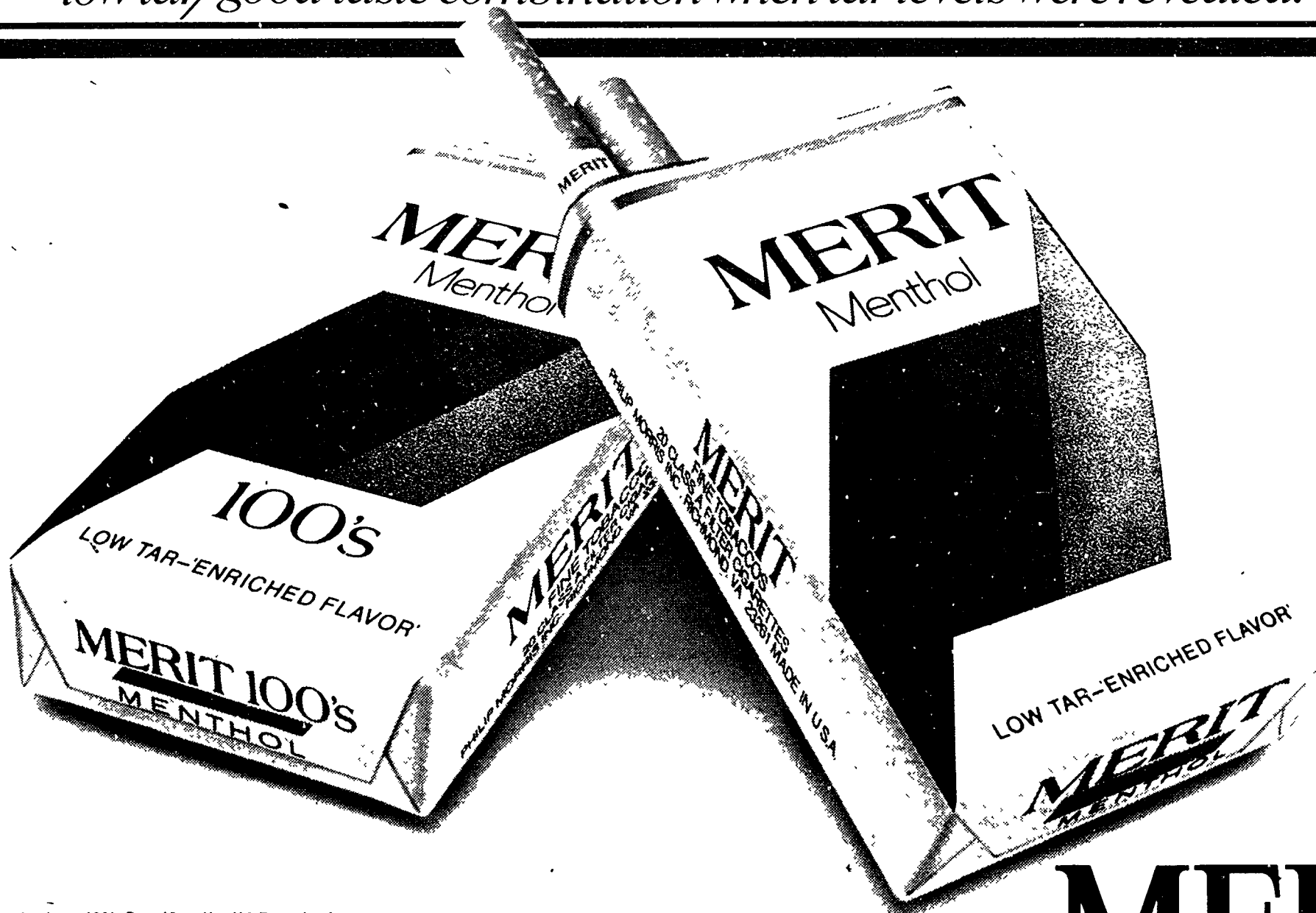

a large crop of nasturtiums, pickle them.

Nasturtiums' fresh foliage, like tiny blue-green upside down Frisbees, is unlike any other flower.

Modern varieties are bred to hold their blossoms above the foliage. Colors include garnet, cherry, pink and cerise in addition to the traditional yellow, gold and cream shades with dark markings.

If you want vining nasturtiums, buy the old-fashioned "single" types. The modern varieties have ornate "double" blossoms and compact, nonvining plants.

Nasturtium seeds sprout best in total darkness so gardeners are advised to be sure to cover seeds to a depth of one-quarter inch.

vegetables that can be eaten as they are thinned; little is gained by crowding plants of larger species.

More and more gardeners are beginning to use inexpensive devices and structures to shelter vegetable plants from the cold. Bottomless plastic jars, canopies or hoods of clear plastic film, sheets of fiberglass and coldframes of used window sash are all effective. These shelters can add a full 45 days to the growing season.

Orchestrating production from the garden requires planning.

While some gardeners never draw a plan, preferring to make up a plan in their mind's eye instead, planning will help the gardener use

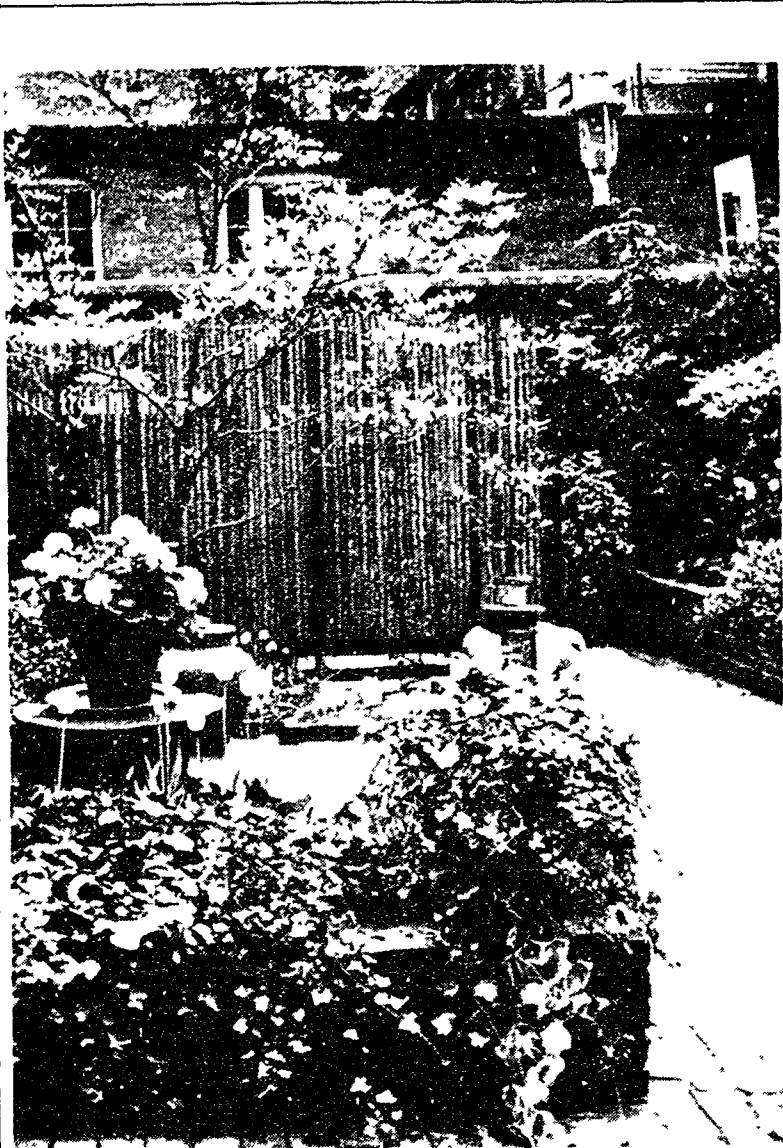
every square foot of the garden to its full potential.


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
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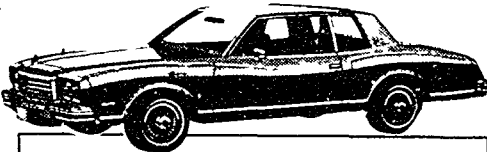
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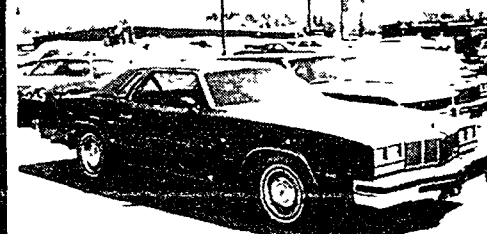
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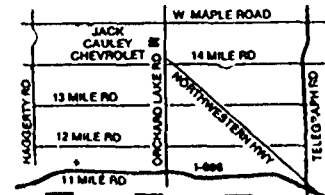
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Soccer team tops after three games

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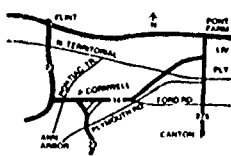

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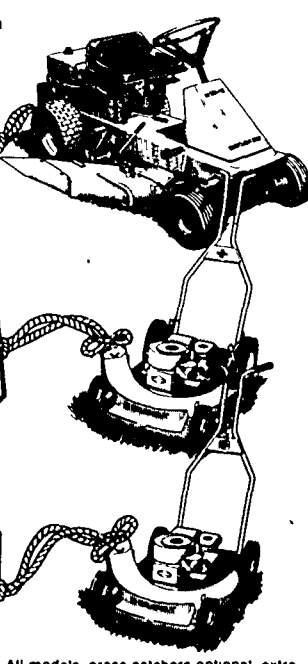
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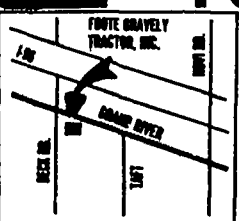
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Boys track team looks good

Harry Couyoumjian met an old foe in Huron's Carl Allen in the 880-yard dash and just beat him, out-kicking him in the final 100 yards to win at 1:59.9, the first time this season he has gone under two minutes in the race.

Grover came back to take a second in the two-mile run, crossing the finish line behind Allen with a time of 10:42.

"I'm very pleased,"

Gabrys said. "Ann Arbor is a tough, big team. I told them (Mustangs) that we have people as good as Ann Arbor's. We proved that as we got some good individual efforts."

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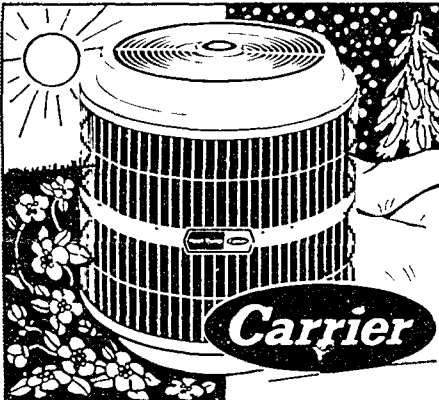
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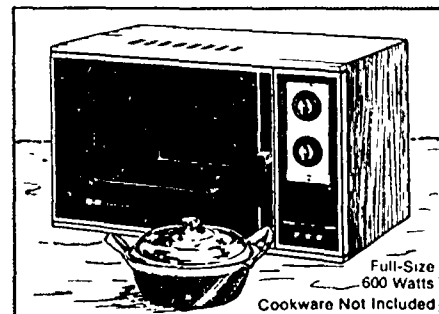
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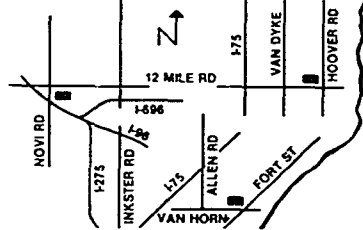

Northville will next compete with Plymouth Canton in the season's first league meet. The Mustangs will host the 4 p.m. affair.

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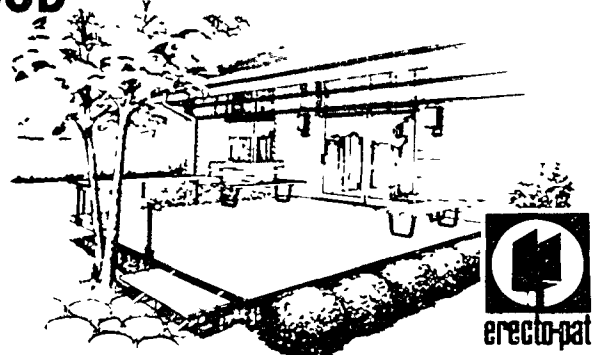
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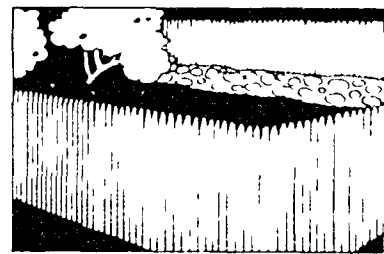
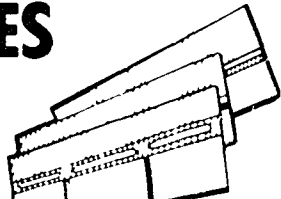
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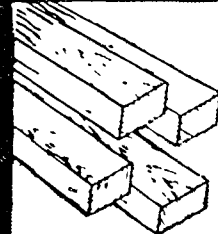
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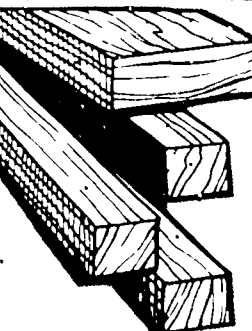
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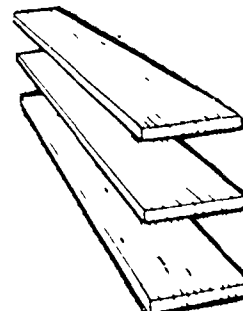
