## Downtown filming tied to improvement

The white station wagon with camera on top focused on downtown last Thursday and Friday.

The wagon with video technician Carl J. Hildebrand on top was completing four days of filming.

The tape-filming might have given the appearance that the business community with its blocks of stores, some dating back to Victorian-era, would be in a documentary feature.

Not so. The downtown is going on tape, but for legal reasons.

Actual work marking the beginning of the Mainstreet '78 project begins this month and with installation of underground wiring, a Southfield-based company called Legal Tapes, Incorporated, moved in to tape the four square blocks that will be part of the downtown improvement project.

As Hildebrand captured on half-inch video tape the buildings, beginning with the former Methodist Church (now the Open Door Center) at Dunlap and Center, he also described their existing condition, noting any damage.

The fee of \$1,200 for the service gives proof of condition before

## Seeks to restrain low cost housing

# Township files injunction

Northville Township trustees have followed through with their decision made in April to seek an order restraining HUD from going ahead with plans for Northridge III subsidized rental housing development.

At a special meeting Monday night trustees were notified officially that the request for a court order was filed Friday by Donald Morgan, township attorney, to restrain the defendant (HUD) from dispersing funds for the Northridge III housing.

It was filed against Moon Landrieu, secretary of the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

It would enjoin HUD from funding or any activity to expedite the project. A request for a permanent injunction was also filed.

Basis for the request was that the Housing Assistance Plan (HAP) previously established under Wayne County regulation correctly designates projects and that HUD is not in accord with the plan.

Angry residents presented a letter containing three pages of signatures of those opposing the federally assisted rental housing proposed under Northridge III in April.

Trustees stated they were "shocked" after a March 26 meeting at which the Regional Clearinghouse Review Committee of SEMCOG voted unanimously to support the Northridge III proposal which calls for up to 16 of 80 rental units to be available under the rental subsidy program.

The Wayne County Development Block Grant office also gave a favorable review for the project.

Since the county and SEMCOG both recommended the subsidized housing, trustees felt it is highly unlikely HUD would turn it down. Therefore, they voted to take Friday's action.

## Hospital staff asks stepped up security

## Group home plans stir citizen concern

The recent assault of an attendant at Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital has triggered an employee demand for increased security.

Just after 5 p.m. on May 23 a 25-year-old female attendant was assaulted while walking in the hallway of C-building on her way to lunch, according to state police.

Charles E. Windham, Jr. of Detroit has been charged with aggravated assault. Currently, the 38-year-old patient is being held at Wayne County Jail awaiting trial on the misdemeanor charge July 3 at the 35th District Court in Northville.

Hospital attendants want action taken to resolve what they feel is a "very dangerous situation."

More than 200 hospital employees May 30 signed a memorandum to John Reynolds, hospital director, outlining what they feel is a "fair and just solution."

The angry employees wrote, in part, "We the undersigned personnel feel that the hallways of this hospital are very unsafe after 4:30 p.m. and on weekends."

The employees said they would like to see:

— Safety officers assigned to the halls at all times.

— All personnel receive training in aiding and/or calling for help during an emergency situation.

— It made clear that all hospital personnel are expected to help in an emergency situation that occurs — by calling for help and physically aiding the person in trouble.

— All doors and open areas are checked before and after meals.

— Staff members receive instruction as to what legal action they can take in the event a staff member is attacked by a patient and injured.

Reynolds, faced with significant staff cutbacks — 111 employees must be laid off by June 30 — due to the state's severe financial problems, said the requests of the employees are being answered.

"This is a thoughtful, positive and constructive memorandum," the director said in his response statement. "The writers not only expressed concern for their sister employee but also for the well being of the total hospital staff and the prevention of similar or related incidents now and in the future."

Reynolds said security is being tightened in the hallways, a safety training program is underway, and the

A group home for mentally retarded residents has been purchased in Northville Township.

Also, a duplex on First Street in the City of Northville is being considered for a second group home.

The township home, located on Meadowbrook just off Seven Mile, was bought by a medical doctor from Detroit June 1 and currently is being checked by the Department of Social Services to insure that it meets all standards.

"The home, if approved, wouldn't open until September," said Laima Starwas, director of the Northville placement unit. "We have not begun to interview possible clients yet."

Six residents will occupy the home, which is one of seven the placement unit plans to open in the Western Wayne County area — which includes Northville, Northville Township, Livonia, Plymouth, Plymouth Township and Westland — this summer.

Some 17 homes are scheduled to open within the next four months in an area which also includes Canton Township and Sumpter Township. Four homes in these two communities will be occupied sometime this month, Starwas said.

The Northville Township home is a contract home — an existing dwelling which will be converted — as opposed to an Alternative Intermediate Services (AIS) home which is a newly constructed barrier-free residence.

Community placement units such as the one at the Northville Residential Training Center hope to place approximately 1,200 of Michigan's 270,000 retarded residents in group homes or other living arrangements in the community this year.

The goal, Starwas said, is to provide them with an opportunity to become a functioning part of society.

"The emphasis on 'normalization' of mentally retarded persons does not mean that residents of the group homes will become what we know as 'normal,'" Denise Horvath, educational-recruitment coordinator for the Northville placement unit recently stated. "It simply means that a normal environment will serve as a major factor in encouraging and developing 'normal' behavior."

Opposition to group homes has arisen in almost every community where placement of mentally retarded persons has occurred.

The home proposed in the city is a duplex at 385 First. City Manager Steve Walters said yesterday the city has received a form from the state advising "that it is going to happen."

Only input requested from the city, Walters said, is whether there is another home, or application for one,

## Oldest school gets new name with old theme

Northville's oldest school building has been renamed.

The old high school on Main Street, most recently known as the Annex, will henceforth be called Old Village School following Board of Education action Monday.

The new name was selected from a list of 17 suggestions by a seven member committee composed of representatives from the board, the community, the school staff, central office administration and the Historical Society.

The building has been undergoing renovations, which are, though running slightly behind schedule, soon to be completed. It will then house the Institution's Special Education Program (ISEP).

With the anticipated opening of the structure approaching, the committee was formed in May to rename the building.

A meeting May 30 determined that community suggestions would be solicited and that the new name should reflect both the historical nature of the structure and its continued use for education.

With seventeen suggestions at hand, the committee reconvened June 17 and selected Old Village School because the

## City, township at odds on when to settle up debt

City and township agree that the former owes the latter \$ 32,190.72.

But the two governmental bodies are nowhere near agreement on how and when the funds should be paid back.

The township wants the money — which it has included in the 1980-81 budget — this year, while the city would like to pay it over a longer period of time.

The sum is owed the township because of an error discovered recently in allocating court costs during past years.

City Manager Steve Walters, Township Treasurer Lee Holland and 35th District Court Judge James Garber thought they had worked out a compromise and presented their proposal to the city council and township board.

Under this plan the township would receive approximately half of the monies by the end of the fiscal year — March 31, 1981.

Six percent interest would be charged on the unpaid balance commencing January 1, 1980, and each monthly payment thereafter would include accumulated interest.

City council members approved the proposal June 16, but the township, just three days before, had rejected it.

Trustees stood firm in their position. "It is going to be very rough if we don't get those monies this year," warned Clarice Sass, township clerk.

"Why can't they include this in their budget?"

The city, however, also is in a tight financial position and argues that it cannot afford to pay the total sum this fiscal year.

"We (the court) made a mistake," Judge Garber told trustees. "But we cannot 'tolate the law to return the city money to the township.'"

At their meeting last week city council members discussed the possibility of taking out a loan to pay the township. But Walters said they legally could not borrow funds to pay this debt.



## Pranksters leave police with unclaimed statues

Cement and ceramic statues may add a touch of class to your lawn or garden, but Northville police really have no use for them.

Currently, a dozen or more items — including statues, flower pots and other home landscaping pieces — are being held at the police station awaiting a call from the owners.

Graduating seniors

from Northville High School are believed to be the culprits of a prank which involved the theft of 16 statues and other landscaping pieces June 8.

City police were contacted and told the items were scattered on the south side of Baseline near East Street — near the high school property — and some on the lawn near the high school gym.

The items included lions, elves, negro boys, swans, a fire hydrant, a fountain boy and a cement hitching box.

While some of the statues have been claimed by the owners, many items remain at the police station.

Anyone who is missing any of these items is asked to call the police at 349-1280.

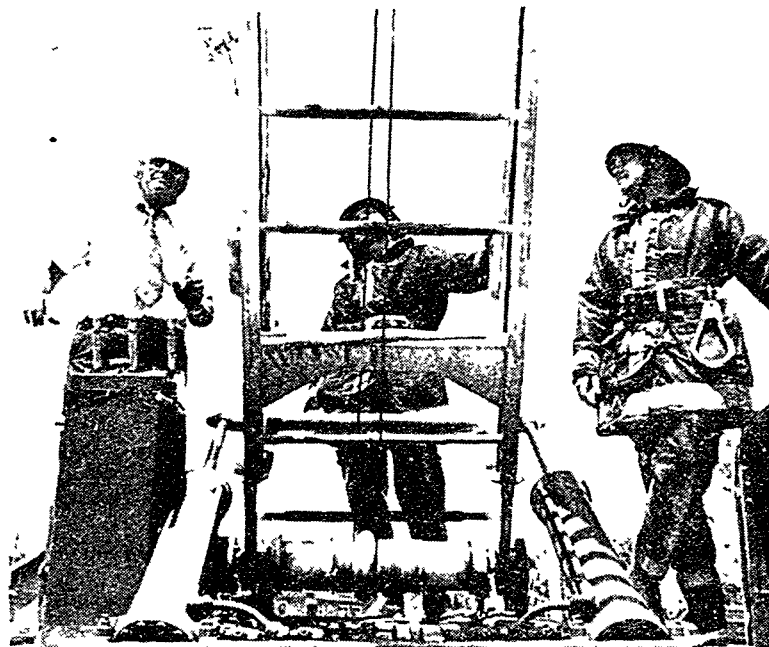
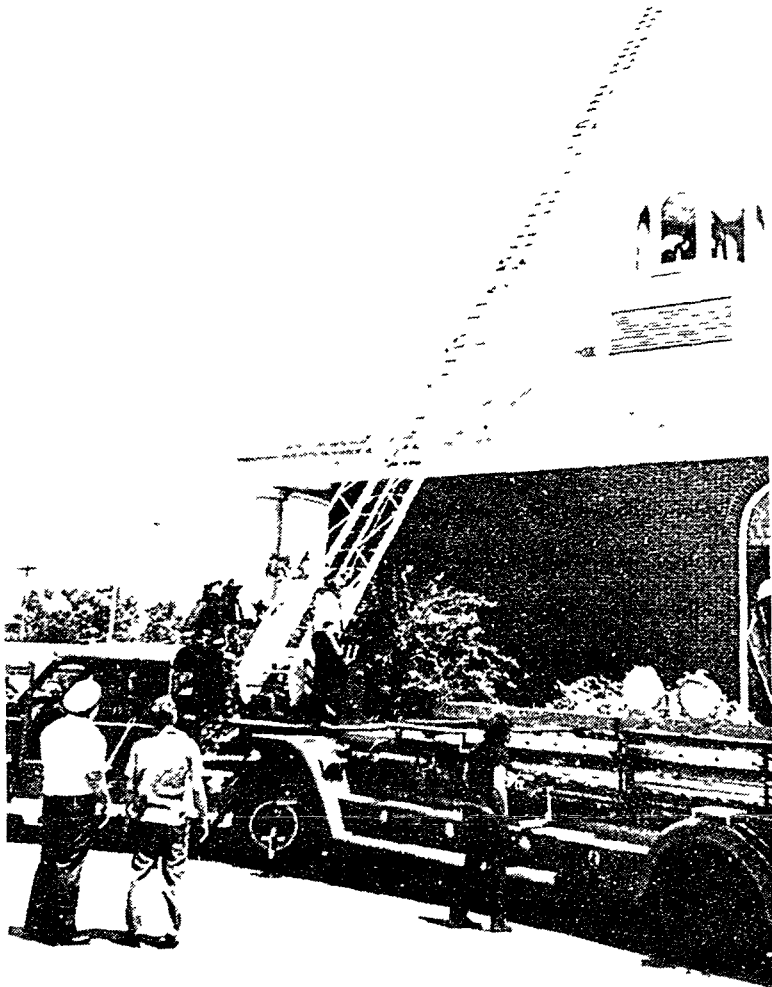

## Summer school classes to begin July 7, 14

Summer school programs offered through Northville Public Schools begin July 7 for junior high and high school classes and July 14 for elementary programs.

The program offers the following classes this summer:

**Elementary:** July 14 through August 15, Monday through Thursday mornings. Review classes in mathematics and reading for kindergarten through sixth grade students and a readiness program for kindergartners and first graders are both \$25 per class.

An enrichment program for third through fifth graders is also available at \$35 per class as well as tutoring to provide individual assistance under the direction of a classroom teacher at \$7 per half-hour session.

**Junior High:** July 7 through August 15, Monday through Friday at Northville High School. Classes included in

this new program are English (10:05 a.m. to 12:05 p.m.); Mathematics Skills (8-10 a.m.); and Social Studies (8-10 a.m.). These classes cost \$37.50 each.

**High School:** July 7 through August 15, Monday through Friday at the high school. Offerings include Typing I (8-10 a.m.); Work Study (time to be announced); Composition (10:05 a.m. to 12:05 p.m.); Individual Reading (10:05 a.m. to 12:05 p.m.) and Practical Writing (8-10 a.m.).

The high school schedule also includes a Reading Lab (8-10 a.m.); United States History I (10:05 a.m. to 12:05 p.m.); Basic Math (10:05 a.m. to 12:05 p.m.); physical Education (8-10 a.m.); American Government (8-10 a.m.) and Community Service (time to be announced). Each class costs \$37.50.

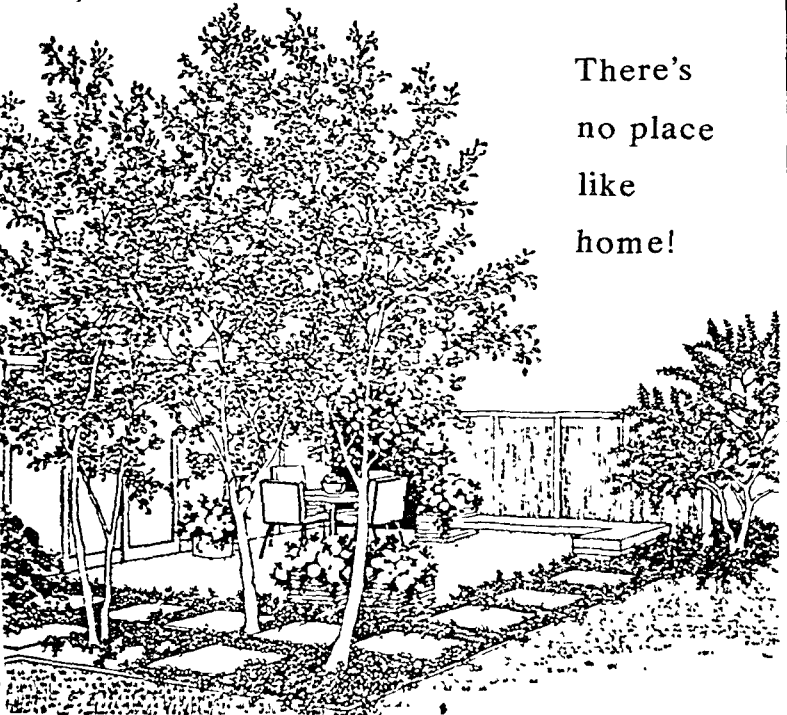

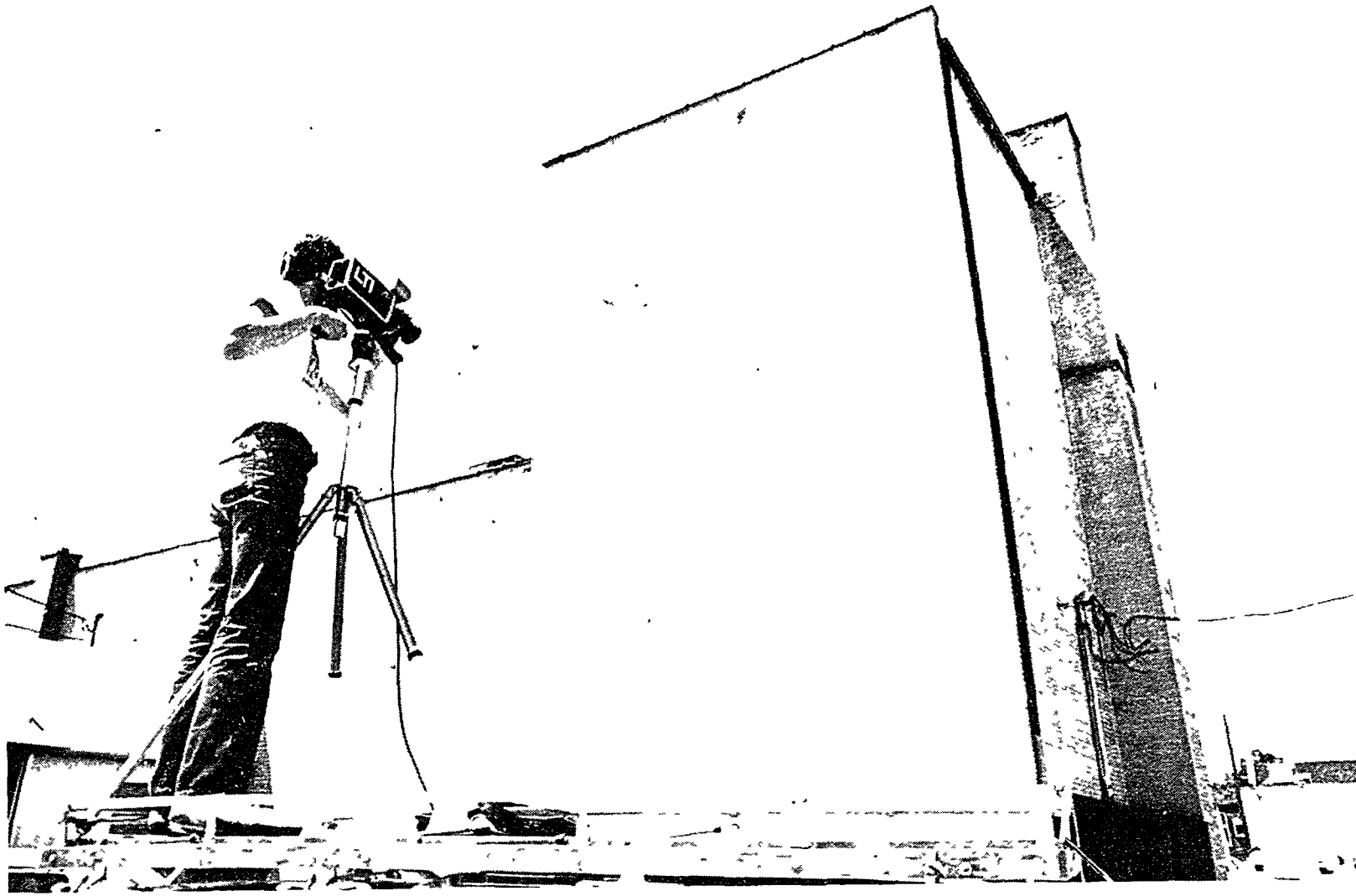

## 'Printed Word' invites browsing

Tired of antiseptic bookstores where employees sit high behind their cash registers while you struggle through maze-like aisles trying to find your favorite author?

Wouldn't your search be more enjoyable if classical music wafted through the air, and a hot cup of coffee was in your hand instead of shopping bags?

And then, after you have found the book begging to be read, wouldn't it be nice if you could sit down in a comfortable chair and skim through it while finishing your drink?

There is such a creature, you know. And it's located in Northville.

The Printed Word is located at 139 Cady Street, next to the parking structure. It has been there since February, when owner Marje Stormont opened the business.

But Cady Street is one of those quiet little avenues all towns have, that people know of but rarely walk down. With this in mind, The Printed Word will, in about a month's time, move to new quarters at Mary Alexander Court.

The Cady Street shop is a small, bright room with shelves parked against the wall, where books from all areas of interest stay.

From Gothic Romances and mystery novels to beautiful, hard cover editions of art books and best sellers.

There are books for kids and teenagers and on Saturdays beginning

in July. Stormont will hold Story Hours for children.

Books for kids will be read to them and perhaps even punch and cookies will be available.

This is the first business Stormont has owned. She said that it has been a learning experience.

"I learned how to do a lot of things with this store," she said. "Things like putting up shelves, painting and basic carpentry to filling out forms and applying for licenses. I've learned a lot about dealing with people to get started."

Before going into business for herself, Stormont worked for Claire Kelly fashion shop as a salesperson.

Running a bookstore is not as easy as it may seem.

"I learned really quickly that I couldn't order just the books that I like to read. Not everyone has my tastes," she said. "Now I think there is something here for everyone. One of the hardest things was trying to figure out what would sell. I have a lot of 'self-help' books that I thought would go, but they haven't."

Some may question the logic of opening a bookstore in an area where there are already two bookstores in town plus a library, not to mention the bookstores located in 12 Oaks Mall.

"This area is expanding like crazy," Stormont said. "Northville,

Plymouth, Novi, the locale is really growing. I thought, and still do think, that there is room for bookstores. I know the readers are out there."

One of the features Stormont stresses is that her store will place special orders for customers.

"Some bookstores, the chains, will tell you that it takes from four to five weeks to get a book on special order.

Nonsense. I can have it for them by a week."

For high school students, Stormont carries numerous Cliff Notes and other reference books.

The Printed Word is open Monday through Thursday from 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., on Fridays from 10 a.m. to 7:30 p.m., and on Sundays from noon to 3 p.m.

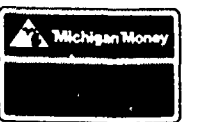

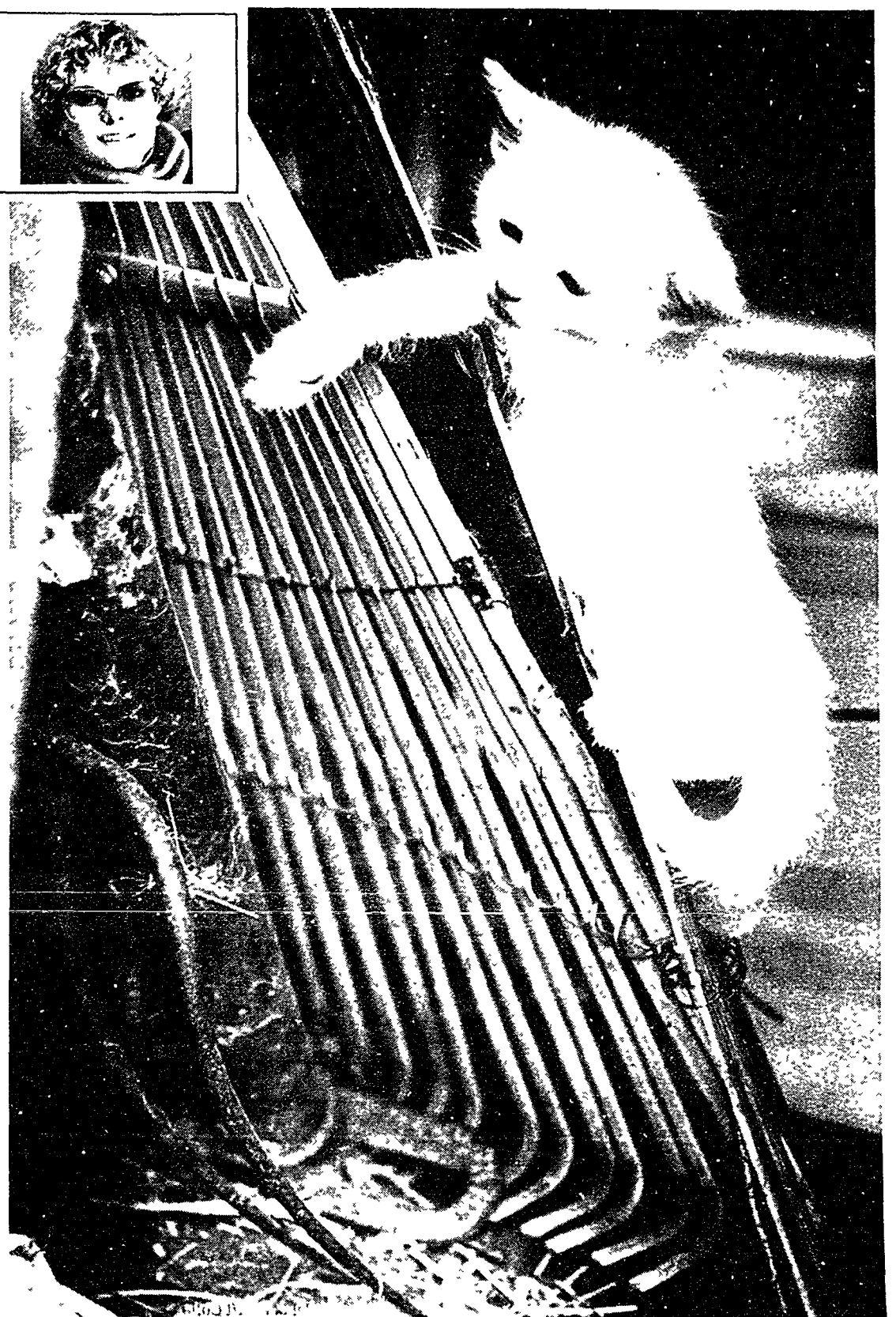

### Community band on the road

The Northville Community Band is to be at the Gazebo in downtown Brighton Sunday, June 29, 7:30 p.m. Under the direction of Robert Williams, the band has established itself as one of the most successful groups of its type in the metro area. The 62-member symphonic band is a cross-section of community life. Adult members pursue a wide variety of careers during the week but return to their music each

Wednesday evening. Some possess degrees in music while most gained their musical experience while in high school and college. Most have been inactive musically for a number of years before joining the band. "One of our clarinet players hadn't played in a band for 25 years," reported the band's founder, Jane Francoeur. ## Low bidders win

### Award Allen Terrace paving

Driveway and parking lot paving for Allen Terrace senior citizen housing development was given to low bidder B & B Asphalt Company by unanimous action of city council June 16. The firm was low at a price of \$54,545 and, City Manager Steve Walters told council, was recommended for work done in an Arbor. He said work would begin in about two weeks and would take two weeks to complete. The firm was low among 11 bid-

ders. Bids ranged from the \$50,000-range to a high of \$114,525. Other low bids accepted by council were for a Department of Public Works vacuum jet rodder and truck from Jack Doherty Supplies, \$74,900; five ton dump truck chassis, \$17,485, and chassis for 25-yard packer, \$22,516 and \$750 for axle extension if needed, all from Ed Rinke Chevrolet. As council accepted the low bids, it also viewed a capital outlay projection

prepared by Walters. It was pointed out that such items as the Jet Vacator are at cost plus eight percent interest, making the actual cost projection about \$90,000 rather than \$74,900. Both air conditioning bids for city hall were rejected on recommendation of the city manager as they were higher than anticipated. The board received and approved the request from Fire Chief James Allen that bids be waived and an order placed with

Motorola for radios and base station approved in the fire department budget as the city has a contract with Motorola for maintenance. # Firecode problem hampers plans

The state fire marshal's refusal to grant an occupancy permit to Northville school district's Annex building is hampering administrative planning for next year, the board of education learned Monday.

Superintendent Lawrence Nichols said the problem with the Annex, renamed the Old Village School Monday, is the only hindrance to completion of space utilization plans for the 1980-81 school year.

Nichols said a meeting with state officials in Lansing tomorrow (Thursday) is the next step in the district's fight against the fire marshal's interpretation of a firecode rule governing schools attended by handicapped students.

Until the problem is resolved, the district cannot move the Institution's Special Education Program (ISEP) back into the structure remodeled, with a state grant, to house it.

Meanwhile, Nichols said, three preschool nurseries, the Northville Montessori Center, a private school and another Montessori school are awaiting responses to their requests to lease space from the district.

Other possible uses for the space already have been rejected, at least for

next year, Nichols said.

A request for 6,000 to 7,000 square feet of space in Main Street Elementary School for a psychological clinic was turned down when it was found that extensive remodeling would have to be done to make it suitable. The request would have occupied up to two floors of the school.

Administrative hopes to move a portion of the ISEP presently housed in Livonia's Taft school into the Main Street school have proved unfeasible, the superintendent said.

Since such a move would reduce the district's lease payments to outside systems, it still is seen as desirable and may be possible in the 1981-82 year due to declining ISEP enrollment, he said.

Novi Co-Op Nursery School presently leases one room in Moraine School and Nichols said that lease will be extended.

Northville Montessori Center has been guaranteed the single room it occupies at Main Street but its request for two additional rooms cannot be honored until occupancy of the Old Village School is allowed.

Two other preschool groups that have requested space have been told they must await resolution of the Old Village School problem, also, Nichols said.

Leasing space unused by the district

to outside programs is one method commonly used to relieve the strain on increasingly tight school budgets statewide.

Tomorrow's informal meeting with legislators, representatives of the state and county boards of education and the

fire marshal may clear up the picture somewhat, Nichols said.

Construction is near completion, though a little behind schedule, and if the fire marshal is convinced to allow it, the ISEP could move into the Old Village School this summer, he added.

## Council appoints arts commission

Northville now has an official arts commission with 11 members.

At its June 16 meeting Northville City Council unanimously approved recommendation of Councilmember G. Dewey Gardner to name all 11 applicants to the city's new fine arts commission and to appoint Cheryl Gazlay acting chairperson.

The council originally had expected to have a five-member commission, but Gardner said he felt there was no need to limit the size as "all applicants are well qualified in a wide range of areas, including music, theater, dance and weaving."

Mrs. Gazlay, who had researched the need for such a commission at the request of Mayor Paul Vernon and set up guidelines for its establishment, was appointed to a three-year term.

Also named to three-year terms were Gary Laura, Phelps Hines and Sarah Denning. Laura, who teaches at Schoolcraft has been assisting with Marquis Theatre promotion; Hines, a long-time resident, also is a commercial artist; Denning is on the staff at Greenfield Village.

Appointed to two-year terms were Gloria Teeter, Heather Fee, Vestus Spindler III and William Harmon. Teeter and Fee are hand weavers; Spindler has been active in community playhouse productions and has taught English and art; Harmon is chairman of the art department at Farmington Harrison High School.

Named to one-year terms were Linn Henderson, Kathy Zasuwa and Larry Williams. Henderson has been involved in live theater productions at the Marquis; Zasuwa is a weaver and has a background in art history and design; Williams is a member of the Northville Community Band and has a music background.

At the meeting the council also "reluctantly" accepted the resignation of Donald Fee from the planning commission with thanks for his service. In his letter of resignation Fee gave expanded duties at work and commitments to a growing family as reasons for the resignation.

Fred Joels was named to succeed Fee on the planning commission for a three-year term. The council also reappointed Stewart Kissinger to a full term. He had been appointed to fill out

the unexpired term of John Genitti and had indicated a willingness to continue.

In making the appointment of Joels the council accepted his resignation from the zoning board of appeals and unanimously appointed John Swallow to complete his term which expires July 1, 1982.

To comply with the Out-Wayne County Area Agency on Aging request that at least 50 percent of the board of directors be 60 or more years old, the council changed the appointment of Frances Yoakam to the board to that of alternate, and, at her suggestion, named Berneita K. Ebert as the city's representative to the board.

Yoakam, director of Allen Terrace senior citizens housing, said the new appointee's "expertise will be of utmost benefit to the new agency" as she has a BA degree in education and an MA in vocational and educational guidance from George Washington University, Washington, D.C., and also a MSW (clinical) from the University of Michigan and was employed by the federal government in Washington, including the Department of HEW for nine years.

She was employed for 12 years as a psychiatric social worker.

The council also approved unanimously recommendation of five members to Omnicon TV Advisory Committee as representatives of their respective groups. They are Nancy Soper, Northville Public Schools; David Heinzman, Schoolcraft College; Yoakam, Allen Terrace; Police Chief Rod Cannon, public safety.

The council was notified that Danny Collins and Nelson Schrader are unable to continue as members of the Downtown Development Authority. The council decided to defer action on the authority's request for replacements to the terms which will expire September 30, 1982, to give opportunity for consideration.

While notifying the council of her resignation from the Northville Library Advisory Commission, Councilmember Carolann Ayers said she would continue to serve as ex-officio member from the council but feels "it is time for someone else" to be named to the commission.

Clerk Joan McAllister was instructed to advertise for persons interested in serving.

## Brickley will attend Pursell's fund-raiser

46200 North Territorial in Plymouth from 3:30-5:30 p.m.

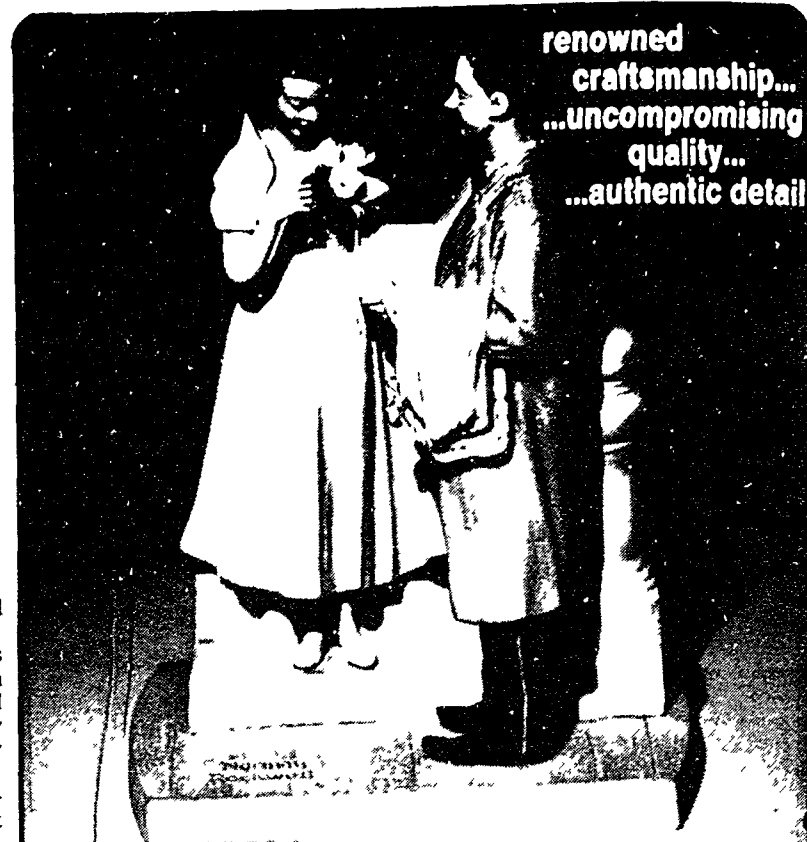

within 1500 feet.

problem of unsecure doors also is being dealt with.

Reynolds said the staff cutbacks initially were to be implemented gradually through September. But in May he was told the layoffs must be completed by the end of this month.

"The hospital census currently is quite high," the director said. "The cutbacks will make things very difficult."

"The direct care staff will be reduced by 10 percent," he explained. "Certainly, many of the niceties will have to go. At times we will only have enough staff to maintain mass supervision."

## School results

Official results of the June 9 school board elections, as reported by the board of canvassers, were delivered to the Northville Board of Education Monday.

No changes from the unofficial results reported earlier were noted.

Christopher Johnson and Gerald Munro were elected to the board with 427 and 185 votes respectively.

Ronald Barnum lost in his bid for election with 180 votes.

Voters could choose two candidates, so the total vote of 797 exceeds the total of 547 voters who made the trip to the polls.

A breakdown by precinct shows the 209 votes cast in the Sixth Precinct as the largest. Of these, 120 went to Johnson, 46 to Barnum and 40 to Munro. There were three write-in votes in the precinct.

Precinct Four registered 197 votes — 105 for Johnson, 54 for Munro and 38 for Barnum.

Precinct One, 160 votes — 85 for Johnson, 41 for Barnum, 33 for Munro and one write-in.

Precinct Three logged 92 votes — 47 for Johnson, 24 for Munro and 21 for Barnum.

Precinct Five, 71 votes — 41 going to Johnson, 17 to Munro and 13 to Barnum.

Precinct two had the fewest votes cast, 68 — turning up 29 for Johnson, 21 for Barnum and 17 for Munro with one write-in.

Five write-in votes were cast, with Raymond Stephens receiving two of them. Single votes were cast for Gus Kaselemis, Andrew Sambrone and Wade Deal.

The 3.3 percent voter turnout (547 of over 15,000 registered voters) was one of the lowest in years.

Johnson and Munro will be sworn in to four year terms July 14. New board officers will also be elected at that time.

Johnson will begin his second term and Munro his first. Board Vice President Marjorie Sliger did not run for reelection and attended her last meeting Monday.

## Schoolcraft taxes fall

For the first time in Schoolcraft College's 15-year history, the school's tax rate will be reduced.

But before residents tear up this year's property tax bill in jubilation, they had better take heed that the small Schoolcraft reduction from \$2.06 per \$1,000 of assessed property value to \$1.93 won't necessarily mean a lower property tax bill.

Inflation has increased property values in Livonia, Plymouth, Canton, Garden City, Clarenceville and Northville K-12 school districts, which comprise the Schoolcraft College district.

The Schoolcraft tax rate reduction, say college officials, would only lead to a smaller tax bill for the homeowner whose assessment hasn't gone up.

The Schoolcraft levy is a small portion of the total property tax bill which includes city or township, county and school district levies.

"They (taxpayers) aren't going to feel it because they're getting an increase (in the tax base) at the same time someone else says they're getting a (tax rate) reduction," said Kenneth Lindner, Schoolcraft vice president of finance.

"At the same time, we're reducing

our levy, we don't have anything to do with what they're doing with the base."

The biggest jump in the value of Schoolcraft's tax base since 1964, nearly a half billion dollars, means Schoolcraft will receive 13.7 percent more property tax revenue for the 1980-81 school year than this year, even with a reduced millage.

The college anticipates \$5.4 million will be raised through the property tax for operating and debt retirement for 1980-81. For the 1980 budget year, \$4.8 million was raised with a higher tax levy. The college's budget year runs from July 1 to June 30.

The SEV (state equalized evaluation) in the community college district was \$2.3 billion for 1979-80. It's estimated at \$2.8 billion for 1980-81. In accordance with the Headlee tax limitation amendment, an inflation factor of 11.3 percent was applied to a rollback formula which reduced Schoolcraft's operating millage from 1.77 mills to 1.68.

The college's debt retirement levy was lowered from 0.29 mills to 0.25.

Lindner said the tax limitation amendment, adopted by voters two years ago, is not having the impact its proponents anticipated.

Some think it's incomplete

## Township master plan okayed

The Master Plan of Land Use for Northville Township is far from perfect in the eyes of Wayne County planners.

Although the commissioners last week approved the document by a 5-3 vote, at least some of the members said they feel it is incomplete.

Kenneth McLarty, township planning commission chairman, and William Bohan, vice chairman, June 18 attended the regular meeting of the county planners with William Mosher and Claude Coates, respective township engineering and planning consultants, to defend the document which took them more than two years to complete.

Also in attendance were Township Supervisor Donald Thomson and Township Trustee Susan Heintz.

County planners in a letter to the township dated January 25 criticized the plan — which was finalized in December, 1979 — saying they felt it "did not appear to reflect the language of the policy goal" because it did not specify when and how the township plans to limit office, convenience, business and industrial uses within its boundaries.

Township planners responded in March with a seven-page letter explaining the purpose of the plan and how it is used.

McLarty restated the township planners' position at last week's session held at the City-County Building in Detroit.

"I categorize our difference as one of

form rather than substance," McLarty stated. "We believe this document should be used along with the zoning ordinance and subdivision regulations which we have in the township."

"We never intended for it to stand alone."

Following lengthy discussion of some of the county planners' major concerns — each addressed by township representatives — one county commissioner offered a substitute motion to accept the township plan as a supplement to the 1973 plan.

McLarty asked the commissioners to reconsider.

"We are in the process of updating our zoning ordinance," he said. "If you deny this plan we have to go back some 15 months and start over."

County planner Joseph Evanski supported the township plan as updated.

"We can call it anything we want but a master plan is a master plan," he said. "I don't see any problem with (the plan) the way it is."

Commissioner Evanski then called for a vote on the motion to approve the master plan.

In other action, county planners unanimously approved a request to rezone approximately 65 acres of land located at the southwest corner of Six Mile and Sheldon from R-2 (single family residential) to R-3 — a higher density single family zoning.

(In this case the county's action is merely a recommendation to the township board of trustees which makes the final determination on rezoning petitions.)

## TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE WAYNE COUNTY, MICHIGAN ORDINANCE NO. 66

An ordinance to protect the public health, to provide for supervision and control over the public water supply, to provide for administration, to establish fees, to prohibit certain cross-connections and to provide penalties.

### THE TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE ORDAINS:

PART I. Pursuant to the Safe Drinking Water Act, being Act No. 399 of the Public Acts of 1976, and Act No. 246 of the Public Acts of 1945, the Township of Northville for the purpose of protecting the public health, providing for supervision and control over the public water supply, prohibiting certain cross-connections, providing for the administration and fees applicable to regulating and inspecting for the elimination and prevention of prohibited cross-connections, and providing penalties the Northville Township Cross-Connection Ordinance is adopted. This Ordinance does not and is not intended to supercede other laws or ordinances governing plumbing or the public water supply system, rather the intent is to supplement such other controls.

PART II. This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited, amended or repealed as "Northville Township Cross-Connection Ordinance."

PART III. Section 1. The following definitions shall apply when the following terms are utilized in the Northville Township Cross-Connection Ordinance:

(a) "Backflow" means water of questionable quality, wastes, or other contaminants entering a public water supply system due to a reversal of flow.

(b) "Safe air gap" means the minimum distance of a water inlet or opening above the maximum high water level or overflow rim in a fixture, device, or container to which public water is furnished which shall be not less than 2 times the inside diameter of the water inlet pipe, but shall not be less than 1 inch and need not be more than 12 inches.

(c) "Secondary water supply" means a water supply system maintained in addition to a public water supply, including, but not limited to, water systems from ground or surface sources not meeting the requirements of Act No. 399 of the Public Acts of 1976, being subsections 325.1001 to 325.1023 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, or water from a public water supply which in any way has been treated, processed, or exposed to any possible contaminant or stored in other than an approved storage facility.

(d) "Submerged inlet" means a water pipe or extension thereto from a public water supply terminating in a tank, vessel, fixture, or appliance which may contain water of questionable quality, waste or other contaminant, and which is unprotected against backflow.

(e) "Water utility" means the Township of Northville and the Township of Northville Water and Sewer Department.

(f) "Public water" or "public water supply" means the water or water supply system of the Township of Northville Water and Sewer Department.

Section 2. A connection with a public water supply system shall comply with existing laws, ordinances, and rules including:

(a) Act No. 266 of the Public Acts of 1929, as amended, being subsections 338.901 to 338.917 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

(b) Northville Township Cross-Connection Ordinance.

(c) Rules regulating acceptable protection against cross-connections adopted from time to time by the Board of Trustees of the Township of Northville.

Section 3. Prohibited cross-connections are the following:

(1) A cross-connection shall not be made between a public water supply system and a secondary water supply.

(2) A cross-connection shall not be made by submerged inlet.

(3) A cross-connection shall not be made between a public water supply and piping which may contain sanitary waste or a chemical contaminant.

(4) A cross-connection shall not be made between a public water supply system and piping immersed in a tank or vessel which may contain a contaminant.

(5) A backflow shall constitute a prohibited cross-connection.

(6) A reasonably foreseen potential backflow shall constitute a prohibited cross-connection.

Section 4.

(1) A user of public water shall obtain written approval by the water utility or authorized inspection agency of any proposed corrective action or protective device before using or installing it.

(2) The total time allowed for completion of the necessary corrections shall be contingent upon the degree of hazard involved and include the time required to obtain and install equipment. If the cross-connection has not been removed, after a reasonable period of time, the water utility shall physically separate the public physically separate the public water supply from the on site piping system in such a manner that the 2 systems cannot again be connected by any unauthorized person.

Section 5. When a secondary water source is used in addition to a public water supply system, exposed public water and secondary water piping shall be identified by distinguishing colors or tags and so maintained that each pipe may be traced readily in its entirety. If piping is so installed that it is impossible to trace it in its entirety, it will be necessary to protect the public water supply at the service connection in a manner acceptable to the department of public health.

Section 6. A private water storage tank supplied from a public water supply system shall be deemed a secondary water supply unless it is designed and approved for potable water usage.

Section 7. The employees or agents of the water utility and the employees or agents of the Wayne County Public Health Department as may be designated from time to time by resolution of the board of Trustees, of the Township of Northville shall be the persons authorized to inspect and enforce this Ordinance, and shall be defined as the authorized inspection agency.

Section 8.

(1) The employees or agents or the authorized inspection agency shall have the right to enter upon any property served by a connection to the public water supply for purpose of inspecting the plumbing system or piping systems for cross-connections.

(2) The owner, lessee or occupant of any property served by public water shall promptly furnish to the employees or agents of the authorized inspection agency all information which may be requested concerning the plumbing system or piping systems on such property.

(3) The refusal to permit entry as provided in (1), above, or to furnish information as provided in (2), above, shall prima facie constitute the property as containing prohibited cross-connections.

Section 9. The Township of Northville Water and Sewer Department may discontinue water service to any customer, user or property served by or containing a prohibited Cross-Connection. Public water supply to such discontinued customer, user or property shall not be restored until the authorized inspection agency shall certify a prohibited cross-connection no longer exists and until all charges and fees of the public water supply and of the authorized inspection agency have been fully paid.

Section 10. Any water outlet which could be used for potable water purposes and which is not supplied by public water or by an approved potable system shall be labeled in a conspicuous manner as "WATER UNSAFE FOR DRINKING". The owner, lessee or occupants of property upon which such a water outlet is located, or any of them, shall be individually responsible for creating and maintaining the presence of such label.

Section 11. The owner, lessee or occupant of property inspected for compliance with the provisions of this Ordinance, or any of them, shall pay to the Township of Northville a fee for such inspection in accordance with a Schedule of Fees as may from time to time be adopted by resolution of the Board of Trustees of the Township of Northville.

Section 12. Any person, whether partner, officer, director, manager, owner, corporation, trustee or other person or legal entity, who shall be found guilty of violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$500 and the costs of prosecution, or by imprisonment not to exceed 90 days, or by both such fine plus costs of prosecution and imprisonment. Each day that violation of this Ordinance is continued or permitted to exist, shall constitute a separate offense, punishable upon conviction in the same manner as hereinbefore prescribed.

Section 13. This Ordinance shall be effective on and after July 25, 1980.

PART IV. The provisions of the Northville Township Cross-Connection Ordinance are intended and declared to be severable so that invalidity of any clause or section shall not cause of the remainder to be invalid.

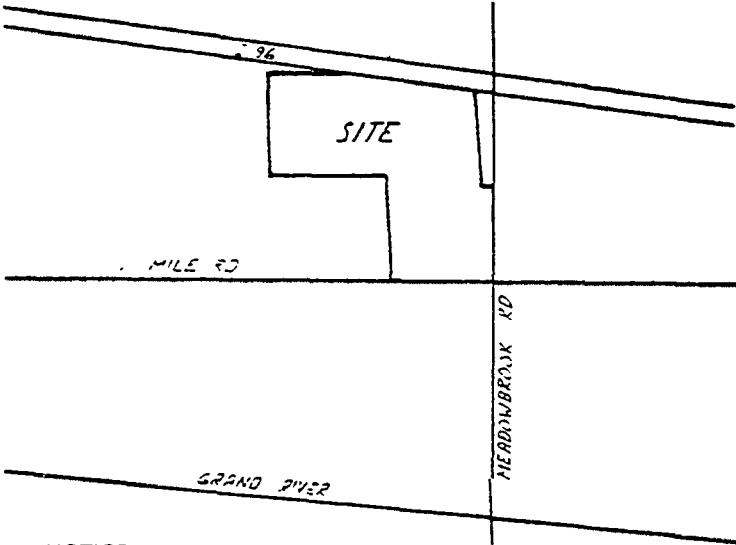

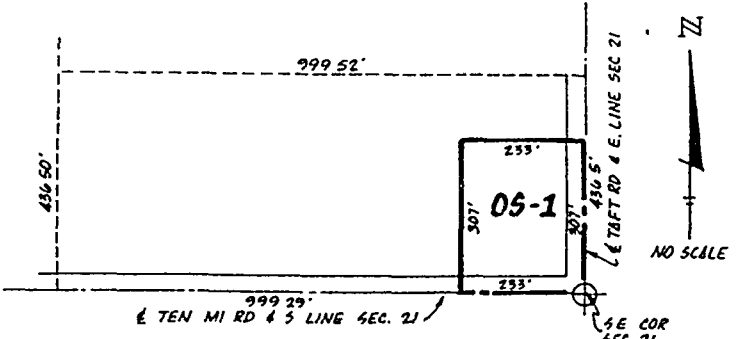

## She teaches painting in classes for prisoners

Shirley Ford's painting classes have a way of dwindling in size. By the end of the 16-session course, the number of students usually decreases from the original 15 to about half.

But that's not all bad. Her students are inmates of the Detroit House of Correction, and the reason some of them drop out of her class is because of an early release from the institution.

Mrs. Ford likes to think the reason many of them receive an early release is because of their excellent behavior.

She has been teaching painting and drawing at the short-term prison on Five Mile Road in Plymouth Township for three years. She is there from 6-9 p.m. every Monday and Wednesday.

"I usually lose two after the first class when they decide it is not for them," she said. The others drop out at their residency at Dehoco ends.

"It's exciting, challenging and rewarding. The men come in hostile and uptight. I try to slow down the extrovert and cultivate a trusting rapport with the withdrawn. Once they're inter-

ested, they bring in a photograph of a child or relative, or find a picture in a magazine, and begin painting." Shirley is a portrait painter. Her students do portraits, landscapes, still life and seascapes.

She feels it is important to get there early to set up a display of their works and to get out the supplies.

"I WORK ON a one-to-one basis. At first, they don't talk to each other." She looks forward to the time when they start looking at each other's works, offering suggestions and making comments. Once a comfortable communication is established, they relax and begin to enjoy the class.

Written tests at the end of the course include a brief resume of the student's assessment of the classes.

"This one was 58 years old," explained Mrs. Ford, as she went through some of the test sheets.

"He was very disruptive at the first class — talked so fast, he didn't make

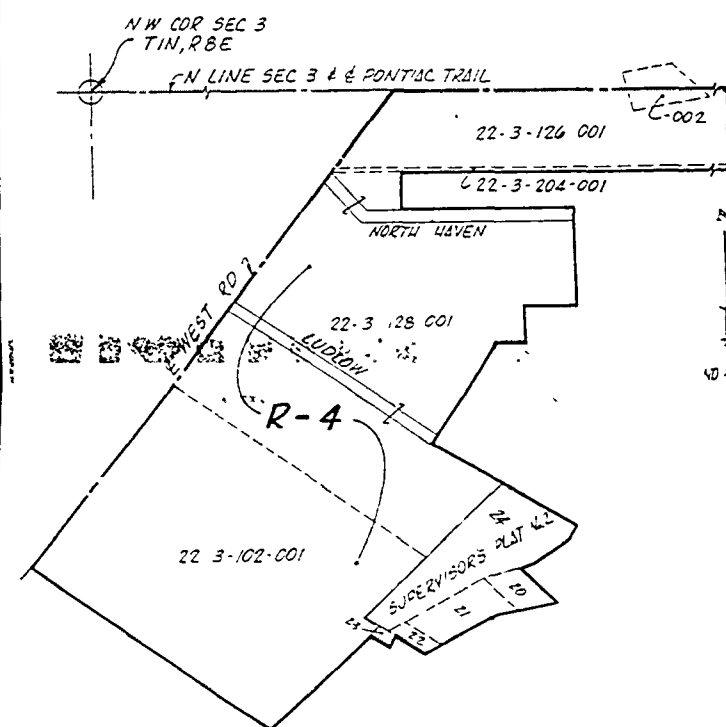

Council: don't keep 'em waiting

Elected local officials who spend hours, usually with little or no compensation, processing the business of government at home base often decry the apathy of residents who attend meetings rarely, usually only when a matter concerns them personally — or who don't appear at all but criticize.

Perhaps if those who do attend, but who also have busy personal schedules, could have their business near the top of agendas that often are cumbersome there would be bigger audiences.

A case in point was the last meeting of Northville City Council on June 16. Gary Laura, Phelps Hines and Cheryl Gazlay all were

in the audience because of their interest in volunteering for the city's new arts commission — item No. 24 on the agenda which was reached more than three hours after the meeting began at 8 p.m. If appointments have to be allotted a certain place on the agenda, after bids, building reports, sewer credits, etc., there is no problem if there is no audience.

But when citizens are present for specific business, couldn't the agenda be changed by the clerk if she is aware beforehand — or couldn't the presiding officer advance the item as a courtesy? To do so would indicate that the visitors are welcome and acknowledge that only those dealing with routine business may want to hear it.

Why leave town?

High cost of gasoline and the depressed economy should not deter local citizens from enjoying a Fourth of July outing. You can celebrate the nation's birthday by remaining in town and taking advantage of the annual birthday party staged by the Northville Jaycees and the Northville Historical Society.

We hope it works

Although we are still not entirely convinced the planned "business manager" approach to running Northville Township is the best solution to a nagging problem, we are inclined to agree that it is a step forward. Certainly it cannot be as bad as what now exists.

Provided the manager is allowed to manage, unencumbered by petty splits on the township board itself, he or she will have the potential of restoring order in the township hall. Answerable only to the township board — and ultimately, of course, to the citizens — the manager presumably will be given administrative control over all township employees and thereby eliminate the separatism that gives rise to uncoordinated, expensive jealousies.

At last, the township is to have a single "boss" — we hope.

Given the township board's decision to adopt this new organizational structure, we applaud its related decision to reduce to part-time the functions and salaries of the elected supervisor and clerk. They are to retain their statutory responsibilities but the day-to-day operations of their departments are to be handled by the professionals who have been doing much of the work anyway.

If this reorganization is to be successful, however, it is imperative that specific job descriptions be provided employees and that all employees, as well as elected officials, be fully informed as to who is answerable to whom.

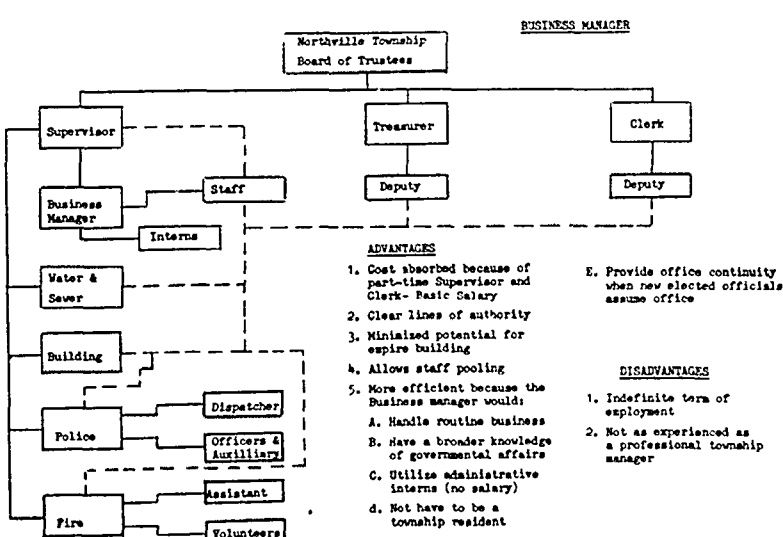
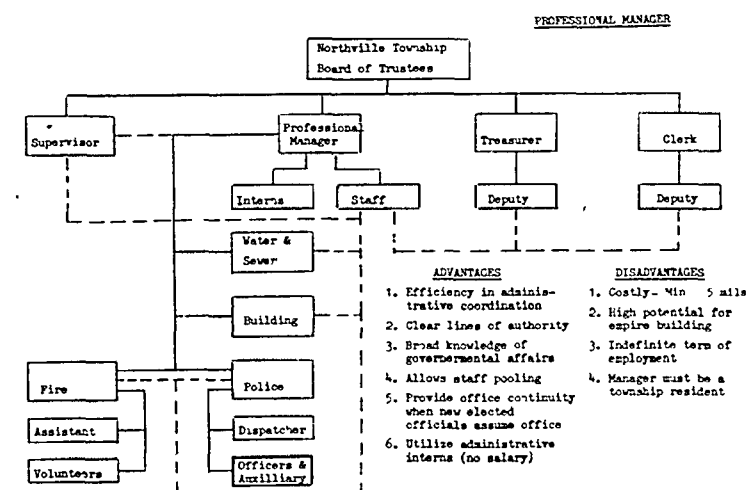

# Here's structures township citizens eyed in their study



A number of different organizational structures were studied in depth by the special citizens committee that recently reported its findings and recommendation to the Northville Township Board on how best to set up a new governmental structure. All of them are shown above, beginning with the present structure. In all of the organizational charts, including the "business manager" approach chosen by the township board, the elected members of the board remain the final decision makers. As part of the planned reorganization, the jobs of supervisor and clerk are to become part-time positions — much as has been the case in past years for the township treasurer (see related editorial on the opposite page). As indicated above, committee members saw the disadvantages of the "business manager" approach as two-fold: (1) Indefinite term of employment, and (2) Not as experienced as a professional township manager. A less experienced manager, however, is expected to be less costly, it has been pointed out.

building is the oldest in the system and was built when Northville was a village. The name was suggested by Mike Allen, former mayor of Northville, who represented the Historical Society on the committee.

The board of education approved the committee's recommendation Monday.

sense. He painted six pictures the first night. Finally, with patience, his painting became slower and so did his speech. He did one or two a night and then one every two weeks.

"The time came when he sold some drawings," Mrs. Ford said. "He had developed a style. And see what he wrote!"

As the bottom of his test paper was, "I've learned how to be patient. New Life." His teacher wiped the tears from her eyes as she repeated, "New Life."

"ONE OF MY students was a young

man who was a natural artist. We developed his technique — the eyes and the skin tones. Several of his paintings were sold and when he was released, he went back to school. He's still painting."

Some of the other critiques of the art classes revealed why Mrs. Ford finds it all very rewarding. Pat McAlinden, director of treatment at Dehoco, said with a smile, "She's on cloud nine when she reads some of these." He also expressed enthusiasm over the results of the classes.

The men expressed their feelings. "I learn to concentrate on objects and reproduce what I see. I find it

helps my mind to create its own beauty. Learn to blend color and draw portraits and to capture still life."

"Listen to teacher, now I learned it pays to listen. Improved confidence."

"I've also gotten great enthusiasm from starting a project and completing a finished product with your help. Furthermore, it has helped me to sharpen my comprehension to the point of being able to accept constructive criticism. To distinguish between the two, constructive and destructive. So at the same time, I also found something

more about myself."

"Helped me bring out something I thought that I really couldn't do and, thanks to the teacher, I'm going to take another course when I get out. Thank teach for your helping bring out something in me."

"I, (name deleted), have learned how to draw and a great deal of patience and wish the classes was not over. Miss Ford is very nice teacher."

"As sketching has always been my weakest point, I feel that having gained this knowledge and skills, plus the acknowledgement of my artistic gift which comes from God

Almighty Jesus Christ, is the best contribution that this art class has afforded to me after Ten (10) years abstention from art endeavors of any kind altogether."

Shirley Ford is very discreet about her students' backgrounds, maintaining a rigid attitude of disinterest in why they are in Dehoco. To her, they are individuals with undiscovered potentials.

She did say that the writer of the last class assessment had been a promising artist but hadn't touched it for 10 years. His pastel portraits of a turbaned, bearded man and beautiful young women showed this talent.

WHAT BECOMES of the prisoner's art?

Some pieces are included in art shows and sales sponsored by the Prisoners Accelerated Creative Exposure (PACE). These shows have been in churches, shopping centers, the Renaissance Center and the Roostertail Restaurant in Detroit.

The artist receives 75 percent of the sale price and PACE the other 25 percent. A show is being planned somewhere in downtown Detroit during the Republican Convention in July.

Some works are sold individually by the artists. They are always on display Sundays during visitors' hours at the prison.

"Many of them are so proud and so pleased with their works, they take them all home with them when they go," said their teacher.

THE STORY OF how a Farmington

housewife, mother, Brownie leader and garden clubber ended up spending six hours a week at Dehoco was explained by Shirley Ford.

Although she started out with no formal training, she has been painting and drawing all her life.

"I love to paint people, either in oils or pastels," she said. Her paintings have been sold in many parts of the United States and one of her portraits is in the Concordia Archives in St. Louis.

As a teen-ager, she worked for a florist and learned flower design. She worked for Hudson's and set up displays, and backgrounds. After her marriage to Blaine Ford and the birth of her daughter, Lynn, Shirley Ford continued using her talents as a volunteer in church work, 15 years in Girl Scouting, hospitals and other service organizations.

Fourteen years ago she started as a volunteer at Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital, working with young adults. After two years, she became a member of the staff and is activities coordinator of N Building in the Harold Center for Young Adults.

She plans weekly outings and in-house activities. For the trips to the art museum, bowling, roller skating, the zoo, Greenfield Village etc., the patients must earn good behavior points to participate.

The art classes at the prison facility are part of the prison program, which has been sponsored by Schoolcraft College since 1971. Pat Google, coordinator for the program, is full of praise for Mrs. Ford's work. "Shirley has done a beautiful job."

# Graduation: View from field is different

From the grandstand, one commencement exercise looks pretty much like any other.

Last week's event at Northville High School is no exception.

Pomp and Circumstance, caps and gowns, marching and speeches.

As expected.

From the grandstand. On the field, however, there is a different story.

From the stands, everything blends together in a crowd of blue and white caps and gowns. A visitor with no stake in the proceedings might be forgiven for thinking it dull.

But on the field, there is a distinctive flavor to the event, governed by the understandable high spirits of the graduating class of 1980.

A little quiet eavesdropping reveals it.

The graduates gather early in the parking lot by Amerman Elementary School to receive last-minute instructions from counselors and teachers — who appear to be more nervous than the students.

"Okay, we're going in by couples this year, remember, by couples," calls class adviser Douglas Dent, hustling up and down the line.

"Now, you people at the front are going to be on the outside of the row (of seats) so you're going to have to be sure you position yourselves or you're not going to be able to lead your class out."

"Now do you see what I meant when I told you you have to go up front?"

As they line up to march onto the field the adviser and counselors keep throwing last-minute instructions at the graduates, repeating them again and again because it is difficult to tell if they are sinking in — the same look of nervous anticipation reigns over each face, regardless of what is said.

The mass of students begins to move forward, down the stairs and through



the gate, onto the track and comes to a halt.

Were it a military unit, the commander would be reporting that they are staged, awaiting further orders. Part of the class is on the track, while the file snakes through the gate, up the steps, all the way back to the parking lot.

Dent waves his arm to start the band. Waves again. And again. No music.

"Hey, let's go," a student shouts. Random conversation drifts up and down the line.

"Are we supposed to...?"

"That's what I thought we were supposed to do."

"Let's whistle 'Bridge Over the River Kwai.'"

"Stupid cap. I can see I'm going to have to hold this thing all night."

"One good wind and you're a goner."

"What's happening up there?"

"Do I look as silly as you do in that thing?"

"I can see us all start jogging now."

"Hi ma!"

"Hey, you with The Record, take my picture!"

Dent finally gets the band's attention, the music starts and the line starts moving again.

When the movement reaches the stairs, there is more talking.

"Here we go."

"It's gravitation day guys."

"We're going in by couples? What does that mean?"

As the end of the line goes through the gate, it becomes apparent that there are considerably more boys than girls, and the boys are not happy about it.

"Oh, BUMMER! Looks like I don't get a girl to walk with."

"Hey Dave, let's be a couple."

They walk through the gate arm-in-arm, but straighten out when they reach the point where they can be seen from the grandstand.

The chatter is to continue throughout the ceremony.

As each student approaches the stand to receive a diploma, he or she stops beside Assistant Principal Ralph Redmond to hand him a slip of paper, with the student's name on it the way they want it announced on the public address system.

Gowns do not have pockets, so retrieving these bits of paper becomes an exercise in comedy at times.

Slips are produced from blue jean pockets, which requires lifting the gown above the waist, or from shoes, or from under caps. Shirt pockets are particularly troublesome.

Most slips carry middle names, which become objects of fun as the students hear each other's full names and contrast them with nicknames.

As each name is called, the seated graduates erupt with shouts to friends, jesting references to middle and nicknames, suggestions about what to do on stage.

Those seated on stage erupt with

laughter at the call "I want to kiss Dr. (Barbara) Campbell (assistant principal)." Eventually, a student brings up a dozen red roses and gives them to

her. From the stands, the caps and gowns seem uniform — blue for boys, white for girls, tassels glistening in

the sun. From the field, it is hard to ignore

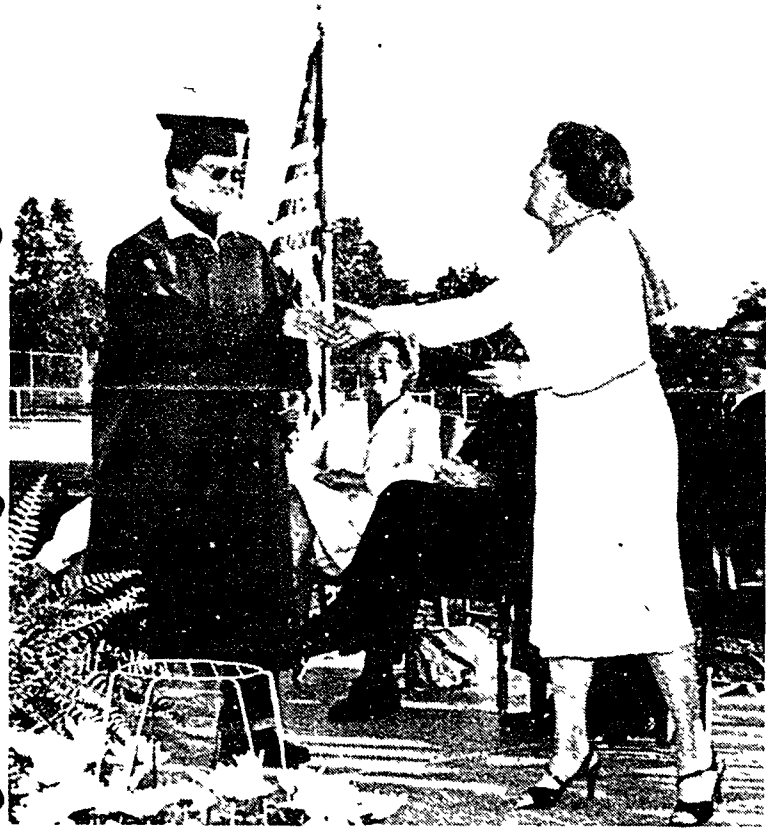

## This grad spells relief: B-o-a-r-d o-f-e-d-u-c-a...

At least one Northville High School graduate must have found not only joy, but intense relief, in receiving his diploma with his classmates.

To some extent, Andrew Przekop participated in commencement only by the grace of the board of education.

The board voted 4-3 June 9 to overturn a decision by Principal George Aune and Superintendent Lawrence Nichols to drop Przekop from a mathematics class due to excessive absence.

Przekop needed the credit for the class 'o complete graduation requirements. Had the decision to drop him from the class been upheld, he would have been barred from the June 16 commencement exercises.

High school policy says a student can be dropped from any class in which he accumulates more than eight absences. If the ninth or 10th absence is a truancy from class, the drop is almost mandatory.

In Przekop's case, a late May truancy from his second period mathematics class was the 10th absence and the machinery was set in motion.

When teacher Paul Osborn reported Przekop truant from class, the high school administration enforced the policy. Nichols upheld the decision following the student's appeal in early June.

But Andrew Przekop, and his parents, thought the decision was unfair in light of extenuating circumstances and appealed to the school board.

The board agreed to hear the appeal at its regular June 9 meeting, instead of at a special meeting, only due to the rapid approach of graduation.

Przekop's truancy occurred on "senior skip day" — the day of the senior prom. Seniors traditionally cut classes that day, despite the school's prohibition.

Andrew's truancy that day was his 10th absence, his mother told the board, only because he accompanied her on a trip to Florida early in the semester, amassing nine excused absences.

The student said Osborn had told the class, primarily composed of seniors, that he did not expect to see many of them attending on skip day.

To his mind, he said, that meant Osborn would honor the skip day by not reporting truant.

Aune and Nichols, however, argued that both the student and his parents were notified by letter and in conferences that any additional absences would result in his being dropped from the class.

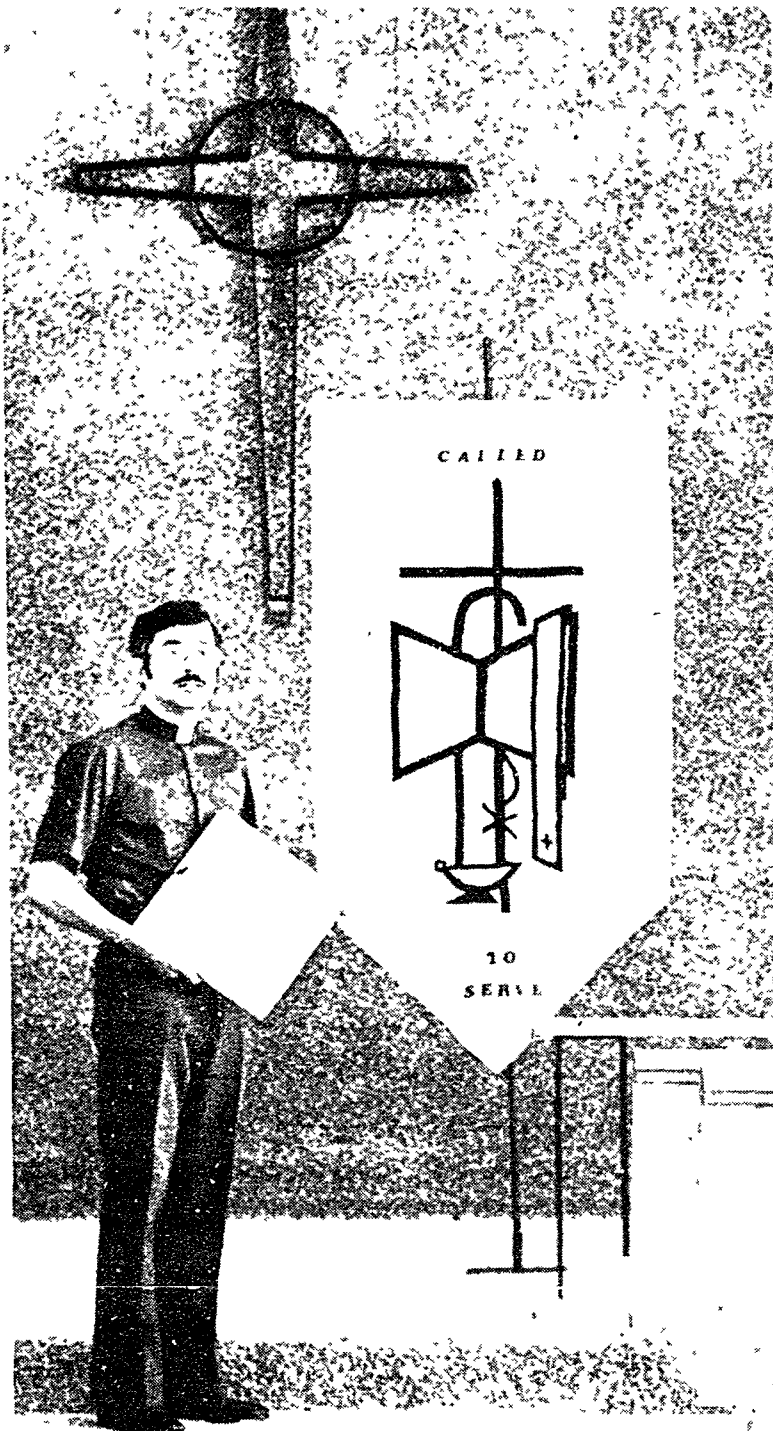

Andrew's father agreed that the student's decision to cut the class may have been a poor one, especially since he attended all his other classes that day and spent the hour he was truant reading a magazine in the library.

To be dropped from the class and denied graduation, however, was too severe a punishment for the crime, Mr. Przekop argued.

Aune stood firm, insisting that students know the policy and if they decide to cut class they should know there will be a price to pay.

Board statements revealed sentiment to uphold the administrative decision until Aune, in response to a question, reported that only one student was reported present at the class in question.

That report seemed to sway some undecided votes toward the student's side of the dispute.

Trustee Christopher Johnson made the motion to overturn the administration's action, stating that he felt the

policy was not intended to harm a student who was earning a B-plus average and was only truant once.

Johnson was joined by Trustees Douglas Whitaker, David Llewellyn, and Charles Peltz in the 4-3 vote. President Karen Wilkinson, Vice President Marjorie Slinger and Secretary Richard Barron voted to uphold the drop.

The decision came just in time for the student to take the final examination in the class, which he had kept up with despite the additional nine days lost while he was barred from the class.

Andrew Przekop graduated with his peers June 16. When Assistant Principal Ralph Redmond called out "Andrew Alexander Przekop, III" last Monday night, the other students gathered on the football field cheered.

The student, wearing gag sunglasses with little ducks at each corner of the blue plastic frames, was greeted on the reviewing stand by Aune, Nichols, Wilkinson and Slinger.

All welcomed him with laughter and smiles.

# Students create award to honor retiring custodian

Joseph Bell got a big surprise Friday the 13th.

Considering the date, part of the surprise was that it was so nice.

"I didn't know anything about it. It was a real surprise. I'm still kind of

mad I didn't fall to it. I just got back Thursday night (the 12th) from fishin' up in Lake Michigan and the wife told me I was supposed to go up to the school Friday at 2:15."

Bell, who retired as a custodian at Cooke Junior High school June 1, was tricked into going back to the school on the pretense that he was to see the kit-

chen help and maintenance workers who, he was told, wanted to give him a little retirement gift.

When he got there, Cooke principal John Longridge told him the students were assembled in the gymnasium and, since it would probably be the last assembly Bell could attend, invited him to come in and see the kids.

"Well, I'm a little hard of hearing, you know, and this kid, he's standing up there talking and I slowly start to catch on, you see?" he explained. "Then he says, 'Mr. Bell, come up here please,' and I thought 'Oh, oh. I nearly had a heart attack right there.'"

What it was all about was the new Student Council Mr. Joe Bell Good Citizenship Award, a plaque with space for the name of a deserving student's name each year, to hang in the school corridor in perpetuity.

Longridge says all the students loved Mr. Bell. The teachers and staff also appreciated him as a hard worker who wasn't afraid to take on a little extra job to make their days easier.

When kids get a little out of line, it is most often the custodian who catches them. He's usually the one who gets to see the results, too. After all, he's the one who has to fix any damage that's done.

So one would expect that the custo-

dian would be the one to come down hard on kids caught doing something untoward.

"I wouldn't turn 'em in to the principal," Bell says, however. "I'd see some kid doing something and I'd say 'C', mon, don't do that. I could turn you in, but I don't want to have to do that."

"I'd try to steer them right." Most of the time, he and Longridge agree, it worked.

"They did listen. I'd say 90 percent of 'em straightened out."

That approach to discipline, appealing to the student's better nature, was the reason the Cooke student council chose to make the Joe Bell award one acknowledging good citizenship.

The feeling students had for their custodian was expressed best when the award was presented. The full class burst into a standing ovation.

"I didn't think they were ever going to stop clapping," Bell said, shaking his head. "Those kids..."

Doris Bell was pleased to see the appreciation given her husband, but explained that she is not too surprised that the kids liked him.

"He's always had a feel for children. He talks to them, they understand each other," she said.

The Bells celebrated their 43rd wed-

ding anniversary last Thursday. They have three children, all of whom graduated from Northville High School.

Daughter Linda now lives in Miami, Florida. Carol, now Mrs. Eversole, lives in Dexter and has two children, Billy and Jason.

Son Joe lives in Northville, and accounts for the third grandchild, Tracy. Save Linda, the younger Bells live near where they grew up. Joseph and Doris came to Northville from Dexter 30 years ago. They live at 539 Grace Drive.

Retirement concludes 14 years working in Northville schools, beginning with two years at the high school before moving to Cooke.

Bell says he has no special plans for retirement as yet — just fishing and the garden.

But he still has one job left undone at the school.

He has the plaque in his home until September. Then, Longridge told him at a staff party Thursday, he has to take it back to the school and hang it in the hall.

"I'll hang it up, oh yeah, I'll hang it. I mean, the surprise and applause, the award, I couldn't have got anything better than that, could I?" Bell said last week. "What could be better than that?"

For a man with the love and concern for kids Joe Bell has? Nothing.

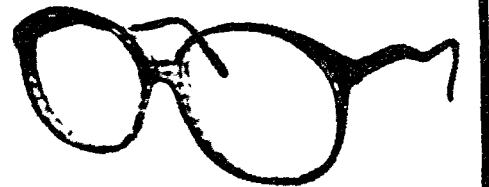

Moving to the bedroom, a king size pecan-wood bed and matching-size electric blanket are among the listings. Then there's an eight-piece white bedroom set for \$125.

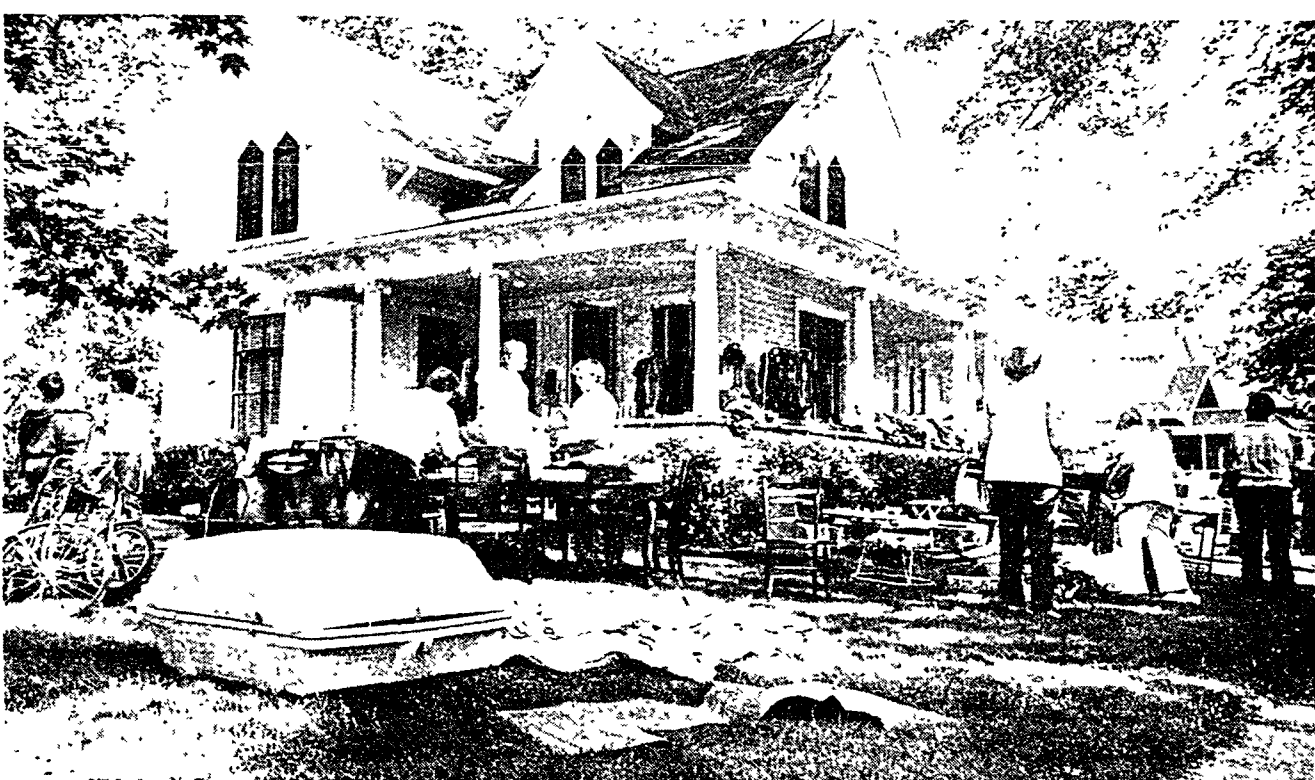
Drapes are for sale on Pine Hill Circle in Brighton while both a bed and shag carpeting are noted in a 10-family sale in Howell.

# Onion growers are crying on their way to the bank

If you have a dry storage area that averages 35 to 45 degrees Fahrenheit during the winter and never freezes, you should be growing onions for storage.

A few years ago onions were so cheap and readily available at stores that few gardeners grew bulbs for storage. Now, many people store surplus onions and would squirrel away more if they only had the space to grow them.

Onions for bulbs can be planted so close together that the bulbs crowd each other when they mature. Three pounds of onions can be harvested per square foot of bed, but the average would be close to two pounds.

This heavy production pushes onions up to seventh place among vegetable crops, based on value per square foot of garden.

The best storage onions are the medium-sized hard-bulb varieties. They have narrow tightly-wrapped necks and many layers of dry skin. The Bermuda and most Spanish types have soft bulbs and are not suitable for long storage. Catalogs and seed packets will identify the good storage varieties.

Storage onions decidedly are a cool-season crop and require more than 100 days from seed to harvest. Consequently, they grow best in the northern states where summers are conducive to good onion growth. However, gardeners in mild climate areas have

the option of planting special varieties in late summer for spring harvest.

Southern and western varieties of onions have the inherent ability to form bulbs as days grow longer. Northern varieties, conversely, won't bulb until after mid-summer when days are shortening.

By far the most reliable route to storage onions is through seeds. Through seeds, the gardener can be sure of a variety that will give him or her the color, flavor and "storability" that he or she wants. Onion plants can often be purchased in bunches, but

these usually are of the large, soft Spanish type preferred for slicing.

Sets are the fastest but least economical way to produce onion bulbs. Sets are small onion bulbs produced by planting seeds of certain varieties very thickly. The bulbs mature at small sizes and are held in cold storage until time for spring planting.

Red onion sets usually are of the 'Red Wethersfield' variety; white are 'White Ebenezer' and yellow-brown are 'Ebenezer' or 'Australian Brown'.

In northern areas sets will produce passably good storage onions but mostly are favored for their quick production of large scallions.

Champion onion growers usually start onion seeds early in flats of heat-pasteurized soil. To pasteurize soil for seed flats, place shallow pans of soil in an oven preheated to 140 degrees, no higher. After 45 minutes remove and cool them down before planting seeds. Cover seeds with vermiculite or pulverized sphagnum moss.

Onion seedlings will tolerate light frosts and should be started 10 to 12 weeks prior to the average frost-free date.

Onions are such heavy feeders that potash and phosphorous fertilizers are usually applied in addition to moderate amounts of manure or other nitrogen sources.



## Give Time to the Annual Vine

The annual vine can perform annual miracles. They can dress up a barren wire fence, twine a vine around the empty birdfeeder, or add a rustic note to trellis, wood fence or downspout.

Annual vines receive far too little attention. Even though many of these cost-conscious annual plants are easy to start from seed, bloom continuously and are favorites of nectar-loving birds, few of them are seen in the average landscape.

Annual vines have delicate tendrils, which attach themselves to the structures on which they climb. The annual vines do not have the tearing habit often associated with their perennial counterparts. They will not damage brick, mortar or wood.

Uses for annual vines are varied. Decorate a barren wall in matching colors, shade a patio overhang with a mural of texture and flowers, or set annual vines against brick or stone fences to soften lines.

Vines need not always climb. The graceful twining of the annual vine is equally beautiful when displayed cascading downward from hanging baskets or window boxes.

This year try the new and very well bred annual vine 'Susie' thunbergia for all-season display. 'Susie' thunbergia, a 1980 introduction from Pan-American Seed Company, flowers in yellows, bright oranges, maize and white, all with a dark eye. The heart-shaped, medium-green foliage takes a decided back seat to the cascades of flowers 'Susie' provides during the warm months ahead.

'Susie' can be trained to a low trellis or fence. The vine will climb gracefully to a maximum height of six feet. All 'Susie' thunbergia requires is average garden soil, some protection from searing heat and occasional watering for maintenance of moderately moist soil. Still another advantage is the tolerance of this annual vine for very light shade.

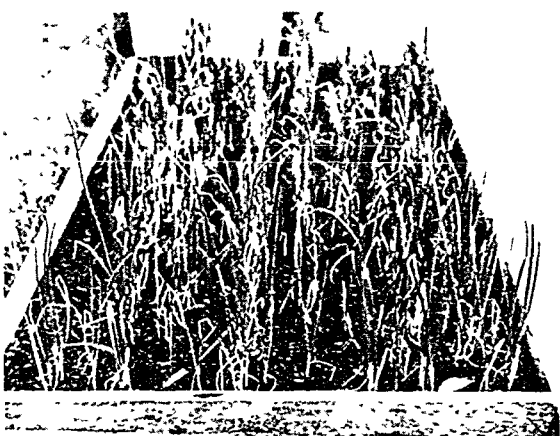
Let the vine flow downward from window boxes, or plant hanging baskets for a vertical scape of color. If a fence is part of your home vegetable garden, add 'Susie' along with the pole beans for beauty and a feast.

'Susie' thunbergia is very easy to start from seed. Plan 4-6 weeks for seedling growth before outdoor planting. When night temperatures have risen to 50 degrees the started plants may be planted in their ultimate location.

Transplant shock can be avoided if seeds are started in Jiffy-7's® or Jiffy-9's®, the peat pellets which nurture seedlings from sowing to ultimate garden location.

'Susie' can also be purchased as a started plant at many garden centers and greenhouses, often in flower. Place the started plants about three inches away from the support on which they will grow. If no trellis is available, twine, string or netting will provide adequate support for vines to climb to their ultimate height.

## Green Machine

# Turn it on and it's liable to take over

A few plants of summer squash in your garden can turn out valuable food like a production line.

Once switched on by summer heat each green machine can produce two to three squash per week for eight to twelve weeks.

Maybe that's why summer squash places high in the ranks of valuable vegetables... number five and climbing!

A single plant can produce 16 to 36 fruits averaging one-half pound each. At 40 cents per pound the gardener and his family are eating \$ 3.20 to \$ 7.20 in squash per plant each season. That's up to 80 cents per square foot.

But most everyone plants too much squash, even experienced gardeners. Three or four hills of two plants each are plenty for the average sized family. Even one or two too many squash plants can force the gardener into deliberately harvesting fruits at baby sizes. This isn't very efficient.

With just the right number of squash plants in your garden you will have to program your production more carefully. One way to increase the value is to force vines to produce before the midsummer glut slices squash prices.

Increased heat, improved drainage, increased carbon dioxide and optimized levels of plant nutrition can all work together to give the gardener squash two weeks before his neighbor.

For warmer, better-drained soil, start by making hills or low mounds. Dump four buckets of sand and manure in a pile, dig it in and level off a hill about the diameter of a garbage can lid.

The soil within this raised area will warm up faster and drain better. Also, the mound will keep feet off the area where squash roots are concentrated.

Compaction from a person's weight can squash the air and life out of soil.

Now, here's a secret that will assure the gardener valuable early crops of squash. Increased levels of carbon dioxide and heat early in the season can hasten maturity. You set the stage by incorporating organic matter and sand. Then, you make hoods or canopies by stretching clear plastic over arches or tripods of wire or wood.

The canopies trap and concentrate heat and carbon dioxide.

The gardener must, however, faithfully open a little chimney in the top of the canopies each morning in order to prevent plants from cooking. And don't forget to roll or pin up the edges of the canopy slightly to admit bees for pollinating the

blossoms.

Another key to maximizing squash value is to harvest fruit at larger sizes. Because modern squash hybrids are slow to develop tough seeds and hard skin, there is no need to harvest fruits at baby sizes.

Wait until they weigh one to two pounds, but no longer. Leaving large fruits on the vine will effectively prevent new fruits from forming.

Summer squash is just as popular as it is valuable. One reason is that the gardener can use squash for salads, finger

foods and dips. Also, surplus squash can be frozen and stored, or used in numerous dishes from soups to bread.

Each hill of squash can spread to cover nine square feet. That much space could accommodate another kind of vegetable which, in a small garden, could be a real bonus.

So, if you plant squash prudently, there should be no more plaintive mid-summer cries of, "Will somebody turn off the green machine!"

## Germans from Russia to convene July 7-13

What do a local area historical society and the national Republican Party have in common?

Both will hold their national conventions in Michigan next month for the first time in history, says Henry Felker of Plymouth, president of the Detroit area chapter of AHSGR.

"A week before the GOP convention convenes in Detroit, our parent organization — the American Historical Society of Germans from Russia — will be assembling in Dearborn at the Hyatt-Regency Hotel.

Germans from Russia, he explains, trace their ancestry to the 1700's when the German princess, Catherine the Great, invited Germans, especially farmers to settle in the then uninhabited parts of Russia.

Eventually, these Germans were forced from their homes by the Communists and sent to remote sections of Russia, including Siberia.

"Besides providing an opportunity to meet old friends, next month's convention allows participants to research their family histories in the vast collection of data assembled by AHSGR.

"Hundreds of families and friends have been reunited by utilizing these materials," he emphasizes.

Local area residents, especially those with German ancestral links to Russia, are invited to call Felker at his Plymouth home, 459-6675, to learn more about AHSGR, the convention and the new metropolitan chapter headed by Felker.

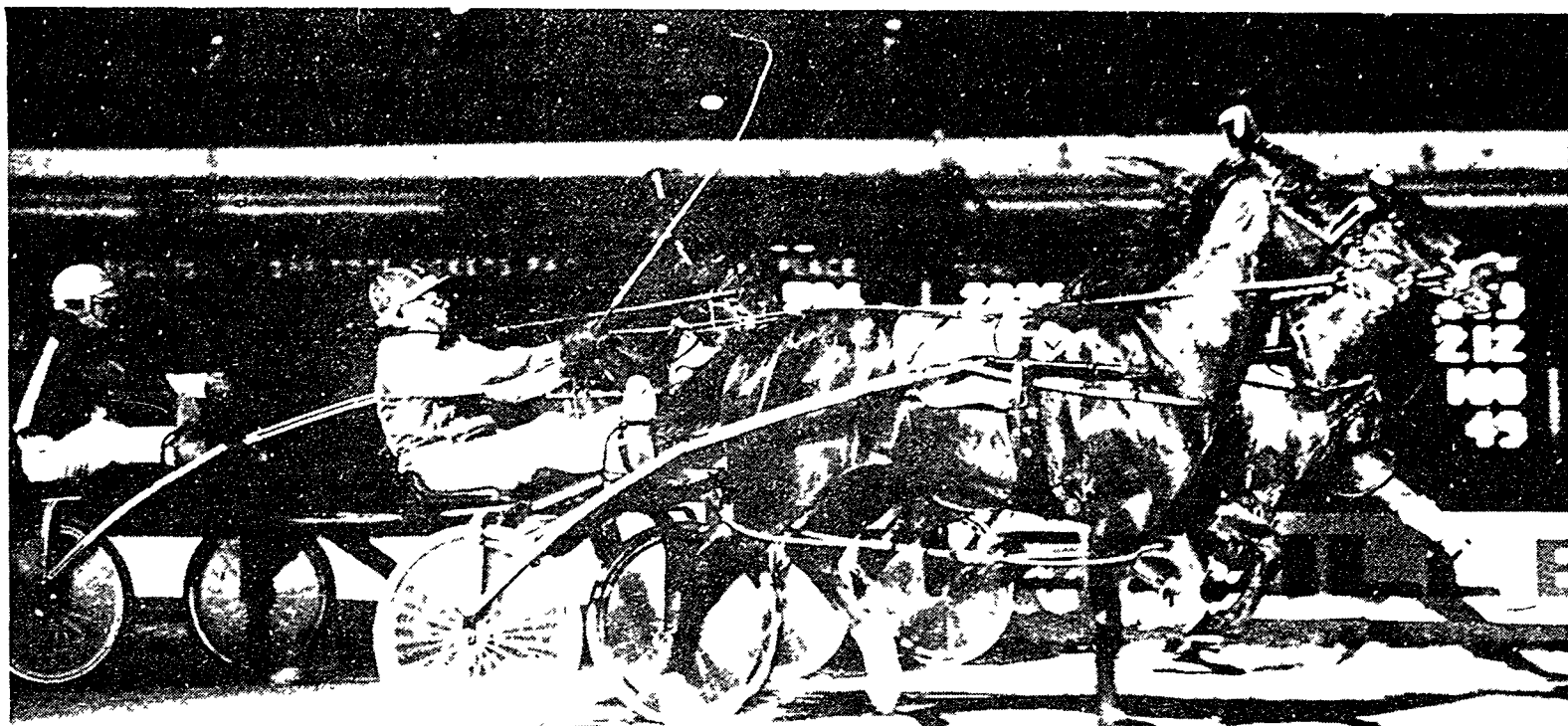
Western Six competition and 7-2 overall. He hurled 53 innings, recorded 61 strike outs, and finished the season with an earned run average of 1.96.

## Master Skipper leads in Ohio Stakes

Most people would agree that an investment of \$8,500 which has returned \$26,000 and has a chance of returning up to \$150,000 soon would make good horse sense.

Northville's Ruth Cole thinks so. That's why she spent the initial sum two years ago to purchase an Ohio standard bred yearling named Master Skipper.

Master Skipper was the 80th horse sold out of 81 available at the Ohio auction two years ago.

The three-year old has earned \$26,000 to date (11 races) and is the leading point horse in the Ohio Sire Stakes,

which has a purse of \$150,000.

There are two more races to be run in Stakes competition before the August 23 finale at Scioto Downs.

The first is at Northfield in Cleveland on July 3 and the second is an August 2 race at Scioto.

Master Skipper has 16 points to date, while the second place horse, Steady Cloud, has 11.

Steady Cloud was named last year's Ohio horse of the year and had earned \$128,000 to date.

Every trotter sired in Ohio is eligible for the Stakes competition, but the

finals on August 23 will pit only the top eight after the season of qualifying point races.

Things didn't look all that rosy for Master Skipper when Cole first bought the horse.

As a two-year old, it raced only four times and earned \$4,800.

It was discovered that the horse had a virus and was treated with laser-beam therapy and turned out to pasture for five months.

Since then the horse has come on strong and has earned \$22,200 in seven races.

Master Skipper's latest race was last Saturday's Peter Houten Memorial Invitational. The horse finished sixth out of a nine horse field.

According to Brad Cole, the horse's trainer, Master Skipper broke behind the gate, and didn't get started until he was almost 20 lengths behind the leaders.

With a strong show, Master Skipper finished only six lengths behind.

According to Cole, this was an impressive showing because the Master Skipper ran against some of the best horses in North America, with each having earned over \$800,000.
