

Five stately maples stay

Five trees that provide shade on Wing between Dunlap and Randolph were spared "the saw" perhaps permanently Monday as Mel Anderson, owner of The Clock Shop at 132 West Dunlap, began protests to Mayor Paul Vernon and city officials.

At first it appeared that Detroit Edison had the right to insist that the trees be removed as new lighting and wiring for the Downtown Development Authority was to be installed.

The city was cooperating with the Edison request to take down the five trees, three of which are considered by experts as "exceptionally nice" maples.

City Clerk Joan McAllister said the trees are in city right of way and that Edison threatened to withhold services if the trees remained because they are higher than street light poles.

Both Mayor Vernon and Councilmember Stan Johnston who were contacted Monday morning as DPW Superintendent Ted Mapes also came on the scene protested the

planned action. Plans to remove the trees were placed on "hold" until ways to save the them could be investigated.

"It would be a crime to take those trees out of there. Two are big, beautiful trees — we'd be creating a void that would be counterproductive (to DDA project)," declared Johnston who also is a member of the DDA commission.

Neither he nor Vernon, they said, knew of the planned cutting in advance. Clerk McAllister confirmed that there had been discussion but that it was informal, following the last DDA meeting.

At that time, she said, it was commented upon and the decision made to replace the trees with "good sized ones, probably costing \$400 each with DDA funds."

Part of Monday's confusion, she said, resulted from Edison's erroneously obtaining permission from Anderson. This is not necessary as the trees are in the city right-of-way. Anderson said he had given permission only to trim the trees.

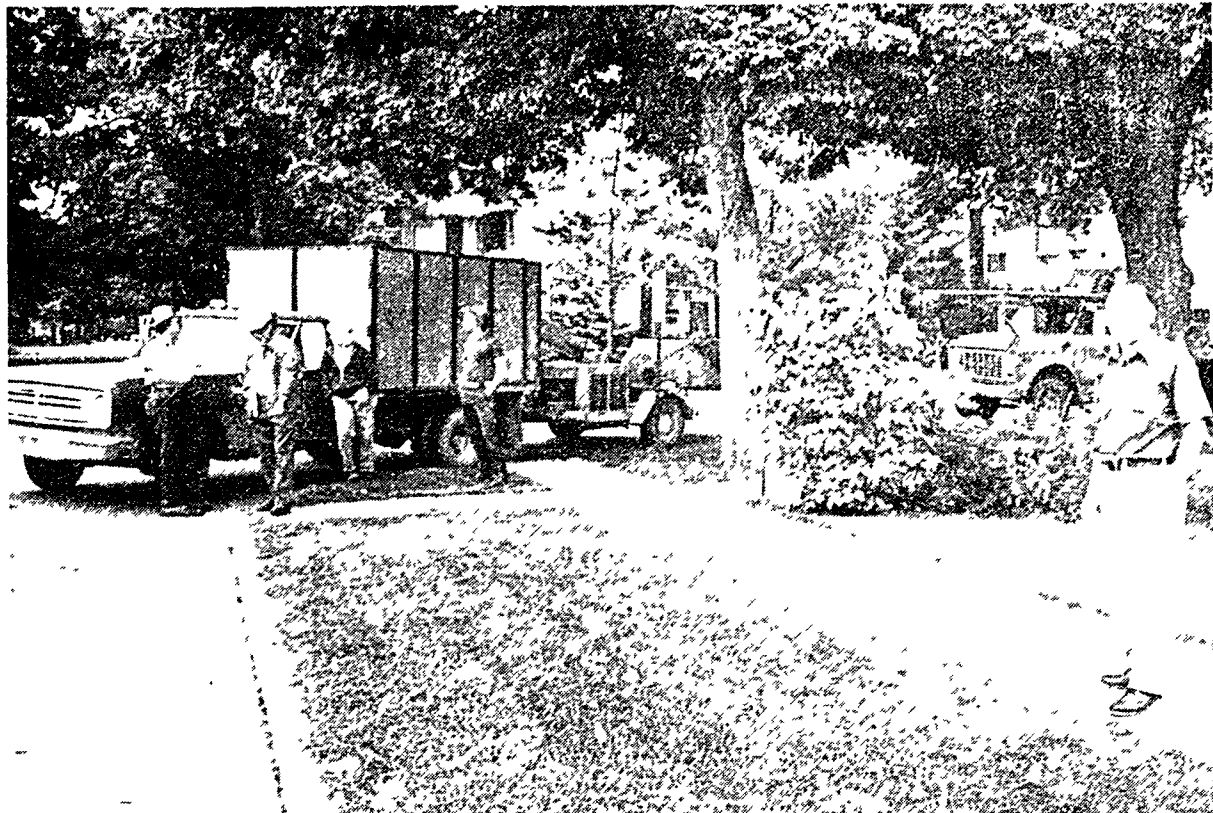
A concerned Anderson said Monday, when trucks and tree cutting equipment arrived on the scene, that he did not know his legal rights but declared he would go to court to get a restraining injunction if necessary. He also stated, "I will be glad to give right of way through my property to Edison if another route could save the trees."

Mapes later Monday confirmed that "everything's on hold." He said Edison will be looking into possibility of using higher poles for the new lighting.

He agreed with those trying to save the trees that "you never can replace those" and stated that three are exceptional maples.

"I'm sure something can be worked out," he said.

It now appears the trees will stay. Anderson offered right of way through his property to Dunlap to allow the wires to by-pass the trees and the offer reportedly is being accepted.

Preschool appeals to council

Asks to use Cady 'home' temporarily

As she presented a petition with about 150 signatures to Northville City Council Monday night, Linda Smith, president of the Northville Cooperative Preschool, made an eloquent plea on behalf of the 52 youngsters currently enrolled that the preschool be allowed to continue to occupy the Scout-Recreation Building until it can find other quarters.

The cooperative, 34 years in existence and one of the oldest in the Detroit Metropolitan Council, moved to the building from the Presbyterian church when the Scout-Recreation Building on Cady Street was completed in 1962.

It has occupied the building, expanding its program, ever since.

The city is considering using the building as engineering headquarters for one of two firms making application at the last council meeting. City Manager Steven Walters had been negotiating with McNeely and Lincoln Associates to occupy the building and also had a similar proposal from Harold Penn Engineers, the firm that long has furnished city engineering services.

He stated Monday night that the cooperative pays only one-fifth of the cost of maintaining the building, reported at \$5,500 for last year.

In the petition from the cooperative, it was pointed out that the preschool had applied to use the facility in a letter to the city last May. It has made similar application for several years, operating without a formal contract.

Inasmuch as it had not heard otherwise, Mrs. Smith and others in the audience stressed to council, it had begun the fall term with commitments to three teachers and to parents. The petition stated the preschool had no indication that it could not continue until last week's Record and a call from the city manager.

Mrs. Smith explained that moving a preschool involves much more than it used to. Relocating, she said, means relicenseing with the state which last June made its regulations much more stringent in Public Act 116. The relicensing process itself, she said, normally takes several months.

The Kerr House adjacent to the Scout-Recreation Building, she said, does not meet specifications of two egresses from each level. In addition, new regulations — more strict for preschools than for public elementaries — stipulate materials that may be used. Kerr House materials would not be acceptable. At most, 15 children could be accommodated in Kerr House.

State regulations, she continued, rule out most church buildings. Usual church basements are not acceptable.

"There are 1,400 alumni within the community," Mrs. Smith told the council, saying, "We need the Scout-

CBD rezoning angers citizens

There was standing room only in Northville city council chambers September 16 as angry residents came to let city planners know they did not want to see their homes become part of the Central Business District.

Under a proposed rezoning, several lots on North Wing and Randolph would be changed from R-1b (single family residential) to CBD along with a large area currently zoned General Commercial District (GCD).

Ronald Nino, city planning consultant, followed Chairman C. Thomas Wheaton's opening remarks by explaining to residents the purpose of the proposed rezoning.

"This was initiated because city does not have the land to offer to potential businesses," he began. "It is generally felt, given the goals of the city, that we ought to rethink what is desirable in the downtown area. Perhaps GCD is inappropriate for city of Northville."

"It (GCD) is the heaviest type of commercial use," he continued. "And it has somewhat of a negative impact on the adjacent residential area. The residential area being considered for CBD is relatively small."

But this "relatively small area" is what the audience was concerned about.

Bill Stockhausen of 218 Dunlap presented a petition signed by numerous residents, opposing the proposed rezoning.

He also read a letter explaining his opposition.

"We've heard it said by several people that the interior portion of this block north of Randolph would be good for commercial expansion and parking because it is 'vacant,'" the letter read in part. "On the contrary, there are many trees, a little creek and small wildlife present and living there."

"If these things were removed, covered over and chased away and a parking lot put in, the land would truly be vacant," he continued. "We think that this undeveloped land is pleasant to the eye and represents 'God's zoning plan.'"

In his letter, Stockhausen went on to list several reasons why the rezoning proposal should be dropped.

They included:

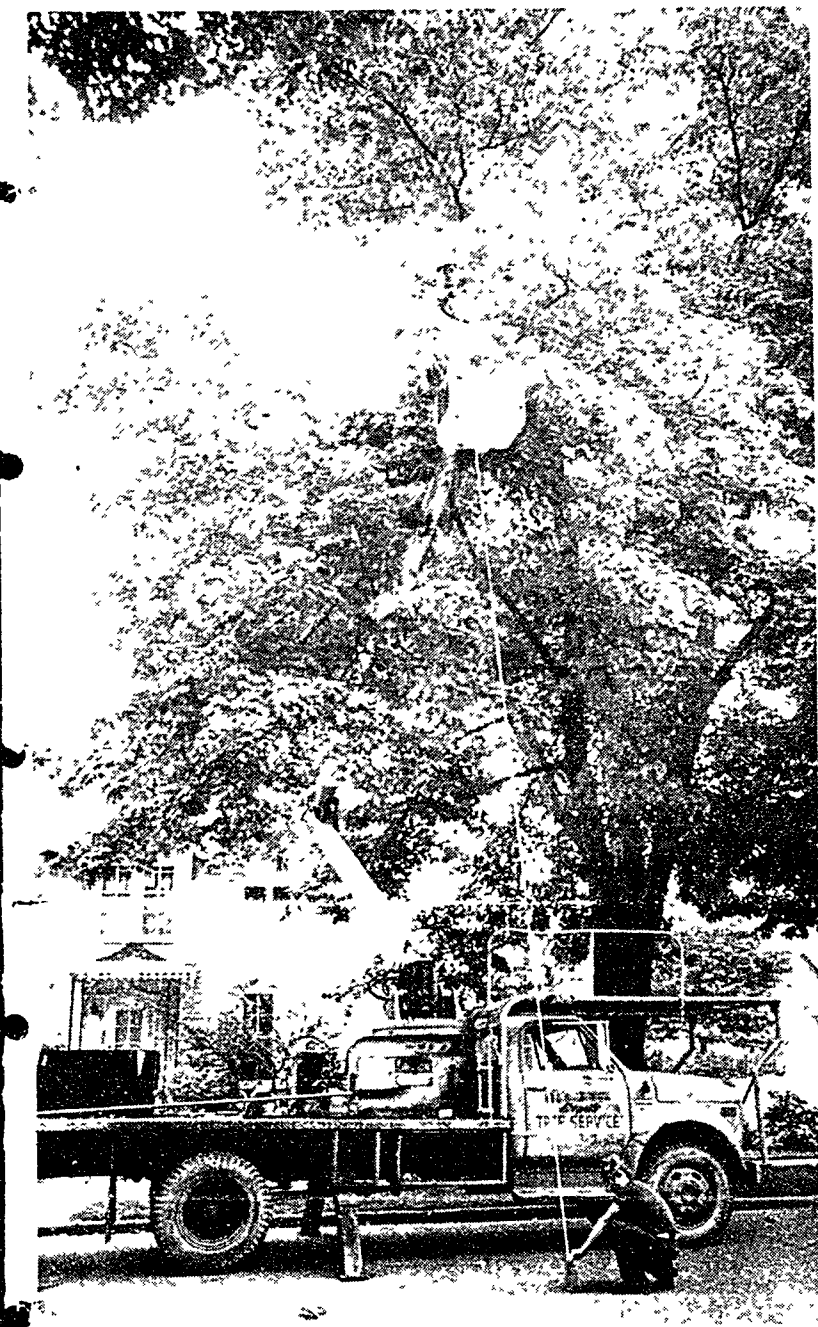
- It is not in holding with the city master plan.

- A portion of these properties is already a buffer and a change in zoning would bring about the need for a new buffer.

- There is no need to have additional residences zoned commercial in an area where there are existing commercial properties not being used for commercial purposes.

- The overall need for additional commercial zoning in the downtown area is questionable.

Traffic increases, buying still lags

Sales are still too slow to suit new housing promoters, but if increased traffic through model homes is any indication, Northville seems to be heading out of its housing slump.

According to Paul Sanderson, a member of Southeast Michigan Builders' Association and of Impact Marketing, traffic through model homes here spurted when interest rates fell in July and August, traditionally the slowest time for house sales in the year.

Sanderson, whose Impact Marketing firm is promoting homes in the Beacon Woods North, Quail Ridge and

Whisperwood subdivisions here, said although rates have bounced back and forth, the traffic through model homes has continued.

Of the 163 lots in Beacon Woods North, 26 have been sold during the last nine months, said Ken Fowler of Impact Marketing. Although no homes sold during the month of May, Fowler reports sales increased by 20 percent during August (three homes were sold). Homes in Beacon Woods begin at \$134,900.

"In August, traffic through the models was up 46 percent and sales were up 20 percent," Fowler said. "Usually August is a slow month for houses. The public buys in January and February so they can move in the spring or summer. But considering the market, many are saying let's buy now in case the rate goes up again."

Sales are improving at Northville Colony Estates south of Six Mile, too, reports Beverly Green, salesperson for the development.

There were five houses sold this year and the last four were sold since August 1, she said. The average price for a home there is between \$90,000 to \$104,900.

"We don't think the interest rates will ever get carried away like it did (last spring) again," Fowler said. "But they will continue to climb slowly until the new short term mortgages are established."

"I think the market will improve," Green said. "We've had a lot of traffic through here the past few weeks. Next week we're expanding our hours."

The new mortgages are only one reason Fowler and other new home marketers think people should buy now

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Budget cuts hurt

Hospital staff pickets for help

Members of the Michigan State Employees Association (MSEA) at Northville State Hospital staged an informational picket line last Wednesday "to alert others to the need for more funds in the Department of Mental Health".

MSEA members stressed the picket was not a strike and they were walking on their own time. Two MSEA members were at the entrance passing out literature last Wednesday in pouring rain.

According to the MSEA paper, state budget cuts are hampering the effectiveness of hospital employees. The employees association said some wards now have two nursing staffers for 33 to 40 patients which means patient care and safety are jeopardized.

The paper cites "numerous staff injuries" during the past year as a result of the cuts and increased work for other hospital employees who have to assist the nursing staff.

"Not only is it an employee hazard but there is the possibility of more patients walking away," said a woman who called The Record but refused to identify herself.

"The picket was effective," said Wardell Polk, Detroit spokesperson for MSEA. "We had a significant number of employees supporting the picket, members or not. In all, there were 60-65 people from various shifts on the line. There were no more than 20 at once," Polk said.

"There is no question about it - there is a need for increased funding," said John Reynolds, hospital director. "The picketing reflects a concern of all of us (at the hospital). They (MSEA) are doing it in a very appropriate way."

"With reduced staff and as the hospital population is going up, we're

very concerned about the cuts," the director noted.

Reynolds said the staff is doing the best it can under the circumstances.

"We are hoping we get some consideration because we're in human

services," Reynolds said. "But we won't get any more money than we did before."

The hospital has to develop methods to reduce its population and look toward community programs to help people

stay out of the hospital, Reynolds said.

"The cuts should be elsewhere than in direct patient care," Polk said. "The public should put pressure on their legislators to get these changes to come about."

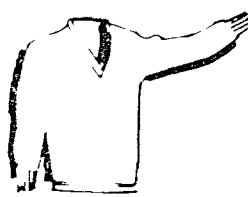

informational picketing by the union employees, said the entire hospital was "very concerned about budget cuts as the hospital population goes up." Record photo by Steve Fecht.

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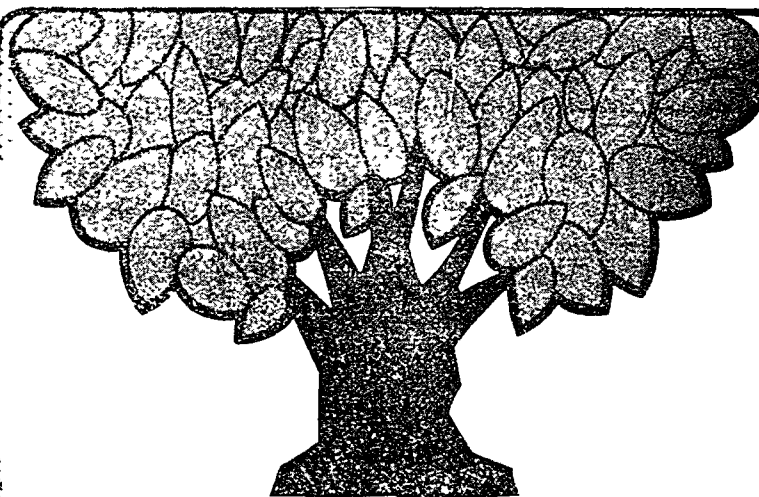

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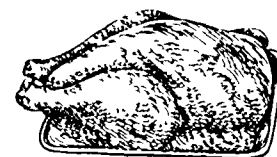
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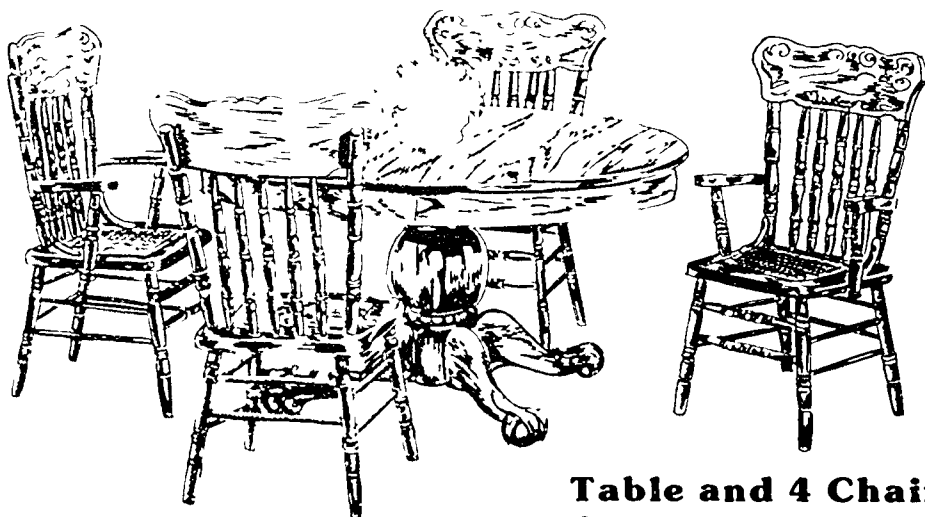
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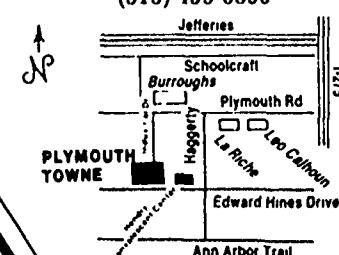
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Onstage at Marquis

'Man of LaMancha' rates applause

Warranted applause has followed all six performances of "Man of LaMancha" at the Marquis Theatre as the new Performing Arts Guild makes its first appearance on its stage. The musical continues at 8:30 p.m. this Friday and Saturday and concludes with the 2:30 p.m. Sunday matinee. The production is professional from

its staging, opening with a dungeon in Seville of 1597, to its direction, music and acting.

Whether one chooses to depart thinking of the musical's hit song, "The Impossible Dream," well sung by Vestus John Spindler III of Northville, as Don Quixote, or whether the evening evoked thoughts of Cervantes' original novel written to ridicule chivalry — it was enjoyable.

The restored theater lends itself well to the production for which no microphones were used. Yet words of such songs as "Dulcinea" (sung to the serving girl Aldonza, played by Jeri Lynn Holden, whom Quixote evvisions as his lady) come across clearly.

Former Northville resident Daryl Egeland, now of Farmington, plays the faithful Sancho, a part he has played professionally many times. "I Really Like Him," he sings, to explain why he follows Quixote.

Several other local residents are in the cast. Last weekend Vince Ventura stepped into the role of Jose while Leonard Kaminski took his previous part of Tenorio, one of the muleteers. Richard Schrot took the part of the padre while Sonja Glenn was a prisoner.

Effectively sinister in the black garb of the Inquisition were Northville residents Heather Ann Capote, Paula Folino and Natalie Simpson.

Lighting and sound effects aided in creating the mood desired for the first musical by the Performing Arts Guild, a non-Equity company which arrived at the Marquis by way of Wayne State University. The guild is managed by MFA and Ph.D. theatre students from WSU and the Hilberry Theatre there.

Bill Ward, managing director and one of the founders, said he and two other WSU graduates read an article about the Marquis while they were seeking a home for the Performing Arts Guild. Marquis owner Inga Zayit liked the idea when approached and agreed to have the performances at the theater.

Performances will be scheduled every other month. "Man of LaMancha" will be followed October 31 through November 8 by "Dracula."

If the acting company can continue with the quality exhibited for the production of "Man of LaMancha," it should build a regular audience. While adapted in staging and concept to the much smaller stage of the Marquis, the musical here compares well with the "Man of LaMancha" performed several years ago at the Fisher Theater in Detroit, creating much the same mood many remember.

The two-act musical moves quickly along, hastened by songs now familiar, including "It's All the Same" and "Golden Helmet of Mambriño" — sung when the deranged hero mistakes the itinerant barber's shaving bowl for a golden helmet.

dumpster bids

Northville city council prepared for winter at its September 8 meeting by awarding its salt contract to Morton Salt Division in Chicago for the low bid price of \$18.96 a ton with a minimum of 45 tons.

Low bid of \$3,067 was accepted for a dump box to be supplied by F. L. Jursik Company of Highland Park.

Northville Record bid for 300 copies of the city ordinance at \$2,740 was accepted over Drake Printing Company of Ferndale, which bid \$2,725, as council stated the transportation cost involved would be higher than the \$15 difference. If the bid included charters, it came to \$3,225 at Drake and \$3,101 at The Record. City Manager Steven Walters said the supply of charters on hand seems adequate and with Clerk Joan McAllister advised ordering only the ordinance.

The Spanish novel by Cervantes was published in 1605 and has been called "the best novel in the world." Cervantes was a contemporary of Shakespeare; both died in 1616. The tale was written as a satire to ridicule books on chivalry.

The Don of LaMancha had read so many novels that he donned a rusty suit of armor and with his neighbor as squire (Sancho) went forth on the many adventures.

The production at the Marquis is an enjoyable way to hear the story. Evening performances are \$7 and matinee is \$4. This Friday's performance is earmarked as a benefit for Schoolcraft Foundation and is tax deductible. Last Friday's was a benefit for the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation.

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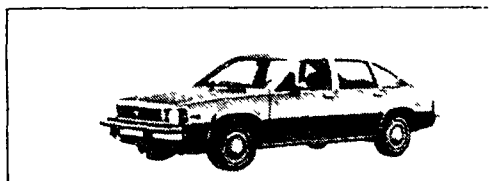
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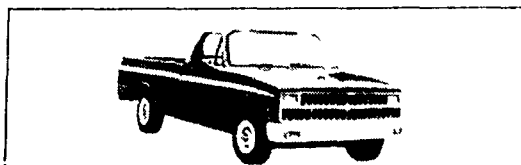
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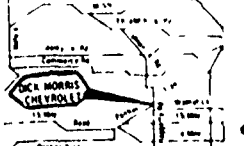
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Center reaches out to public

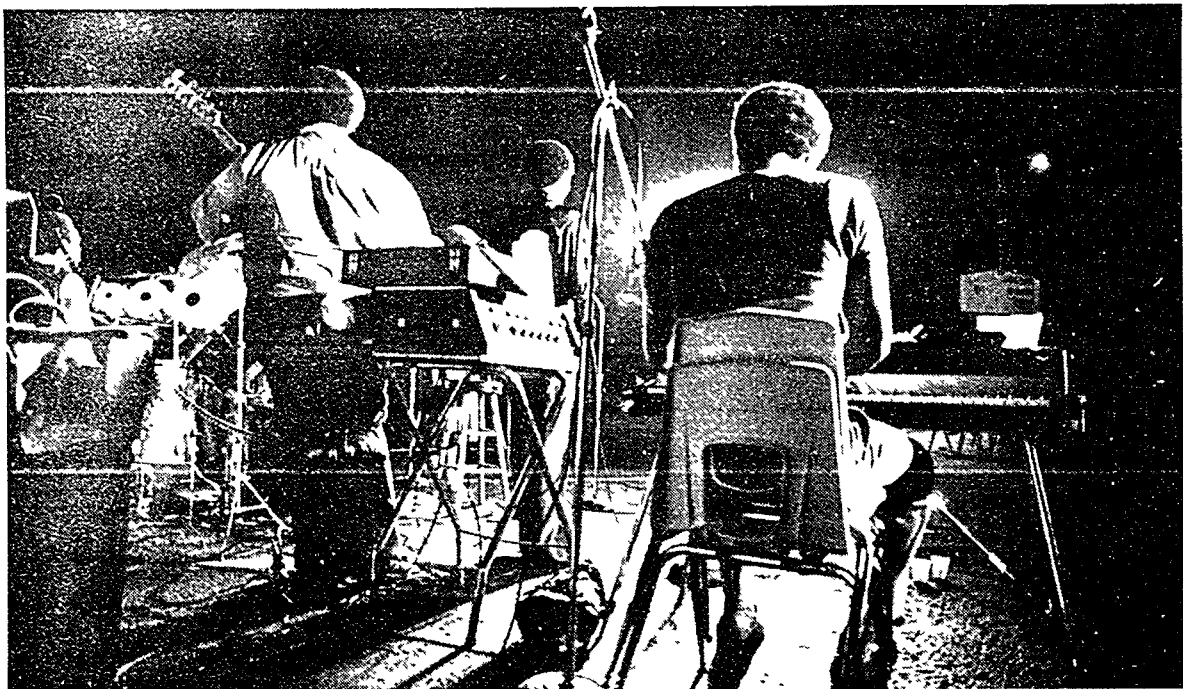
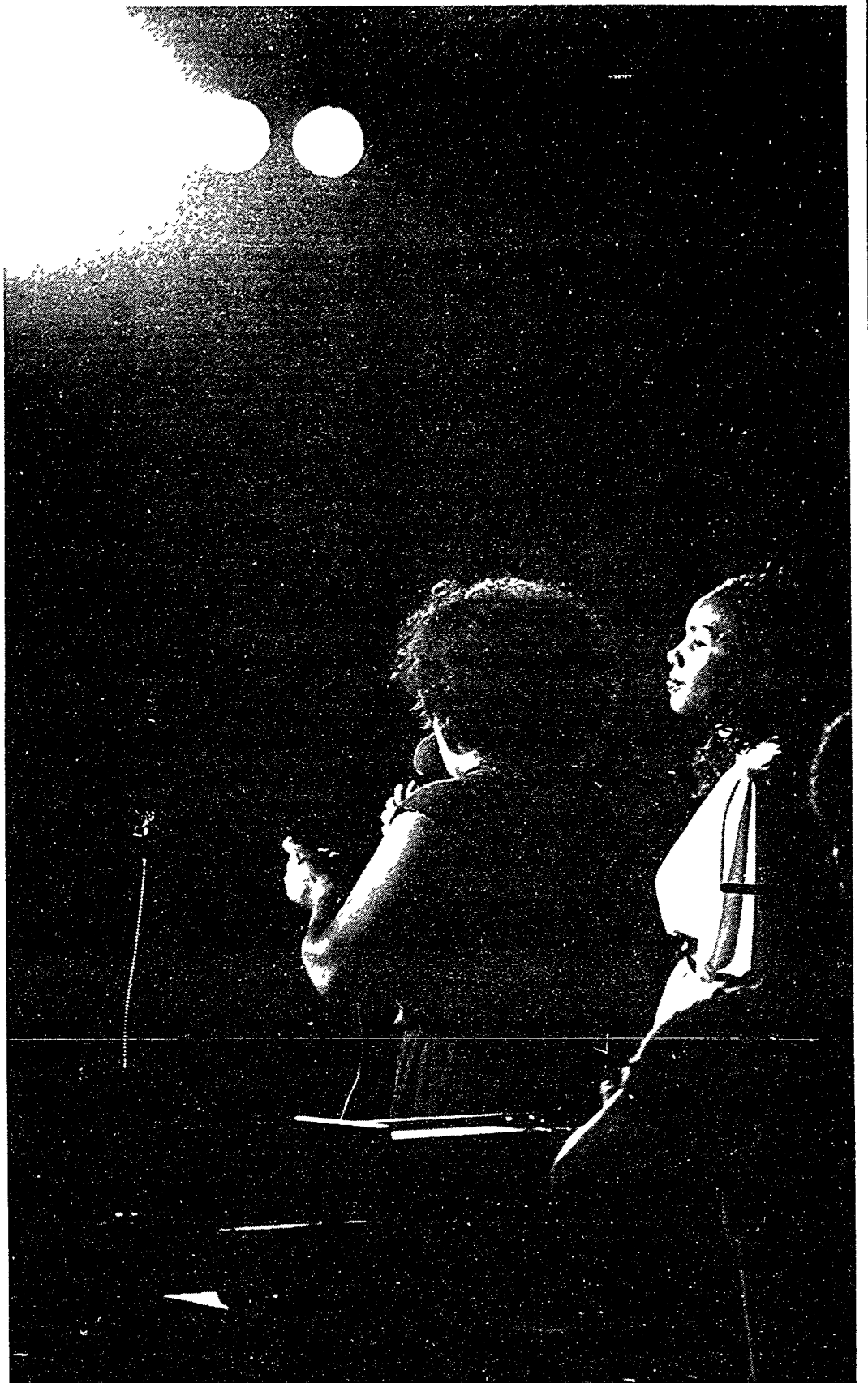
The Outreach Center has its own seven-member group, "The Book of Life," which performs during services at the church. It is more "progressive" in style, says Quinlan.

Quinlan explains that the concerts and the Outreach Center in general are for anybody who has a need. It could be the need for counseling, fellowship, information or anything, he says.

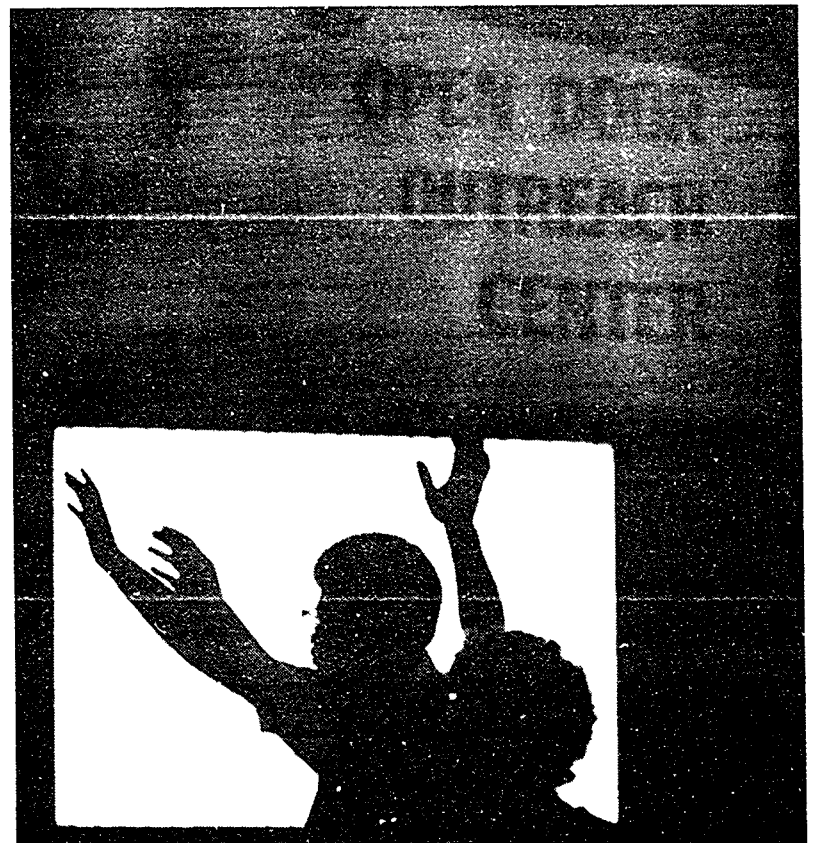
"Lots of people come to us with a need," says Quinlan, "We even had one guy who needed help with his car. His battery was dead."

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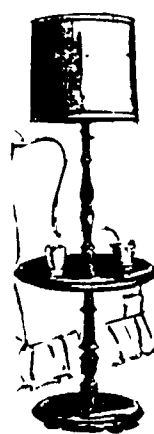
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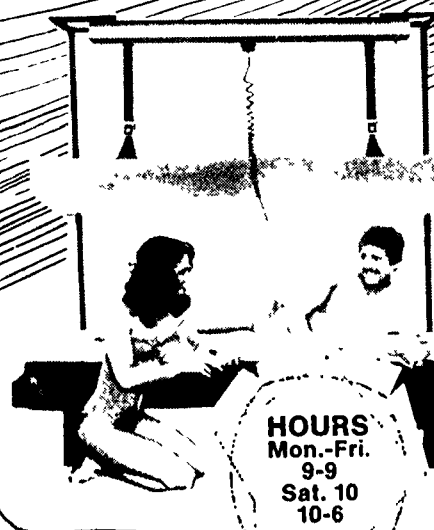
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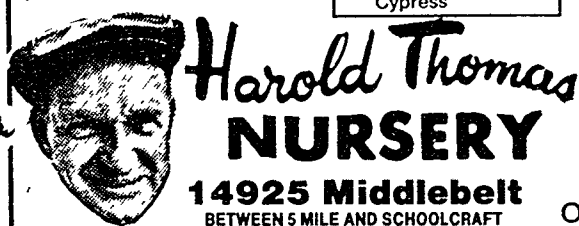
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Physical fitness retreat planned

Most people will admit that when it comes to physical fitness their bodies could use a little help. But, too often, it just doesn't seem worth the work.

Exercise routines simply leave some people cold; daily regimens of calisthenics or jogging either sound unappealing or apparently can't fit into the busy schedules of mothers, housewives, businessmen and working women.

Compounding the fitness dilemma are tendencies to develop habits of frequent dining out, picking up hamburgers and french fries from the corner fast-food stand or skipping meals altogether.

Certainly the cost of joining a spa or exercise salon seems too expensive to even consider as a solution to the ever-present problems of achieving weight distribution.

For local women, however, all is not lost. Exercise doesn't have to be work, good nutrition doesn't have to be difficult and weekend retreats to spas don't have to be expensive.

That, at any rate, is what Jody Adams believes. As director of Novi's Creative Fitness program, Adams is organizing a weekend retreat slated for late September that she believes could help some area women get on the road to improving their figures and overall physical fitness.

Adams' program has the backing of the Novi Community Education Department and the retreat will be held at St. John's Seminary in Plymouth from Friday, September 26, to Sunday, September 28.

All sorts of activities are planned to keep participants busy, including classes on aerobics and yoga, a lecture on stress management, a bread making session and activity choices, such as golfing, jogging, hiking and playing racquetball and volleyball.

Meals will be provided and both single and double rooms are available. Prices for the three-day retreat range from \$51 for five meals and sharing a double room to \$60 for six meals and single-room accommodations.

A parcours will be offered on Saturday, says Adams, explaining it is a French concept that combines running with other types of exercise. During a parcours, she says, participants run for a short distance, stop at a checkpoint for a quick exercise session, and then run on to the next station.

That eclectic approach to physical fitness is what makes Adams' program different from most, according to Sue Irwin of Novi, who also teaches the Creative Fitness classes offered in cooperation with the community education department. Creative Fitness classes include elements of several types of exercise, notably yoga and aerobics, along with exercising to music.

But, lest any have visions of instant weight loss, Creative Fitness isn't all fun and games. It also takes dedication.

However, Adams is hoping women who participate in the weekend retreat at St. John's Seminary will find the routines aren't as tough as they may have expected and will also discover that exercising is really not time-consuming.

There is a religious atmosphere about the program, as well, with prayer and meditation receiving much emphasis from Adams, who has taught the classes for three years in Novi.

The cornerstones of the Creative Fitness program are achieving a healthy body, mind and spirit, Adams says, and she credits her personal fitness and the success of the program to a deep religious faith.

"If you try to do something on your own, very often you fail," she explains. "But if you pray to the Lord for guidance, He helps you."

Since Adams began teaching the classes three years ago in Novi, the number of women who participate in the program is up from 17 students originally to more than 200. Adams has trained more than 20 women as teachers and substitute teachers. And she's had requests to start new programs in Walled Lake, Milford and even Hartland.

Although the September weekend in Plymouth is the fifth such Creative Fitness retreat to be offered, it marks the first time one has been available locally. Instructors in Adams' program are trying to appeal to women who have not participated in Creative Fitness workshops or weekends before.

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Local EDC sends to township

Elderly funds advised

The Northville Township economic development corporation last week agreed unanimously to recommend spending \$100,000 of Innovative Grant funds on development of the Wayne County Elderly Village project.

Further, the planning commissioners prioritized the spending of the funds among three township development groups.

The recommendation will reach the township board at its regular meeting October 9.

The commission recommended giving Zuchelli, Hunter and Associates \$45,100, Vilcan Leman and Associates \$37,300, and township engineering firm, Mosher Associates, \$17,600. Some of the money already has been spent on preliminary research and presentations.

The urban economist group of Zuchelli, Hunter and Associates will

find ways to finance the elderly village project and set up a process to select a developer. They will also assist in securing private financing commitments. So far, the group has spent \$10,500 in preliminary work on the project.

Planning consultants, Vilcan, Leman and Associates, Inc., will set the standards for developing the project. The consultant group has so far spent \$30,500 on plans and development of the project.

The township engineering firm of Mosher Associates will take a boundary survey and locate and evaluate underground facilities.

Each group will return 10 percent to the township for its administrative fees.

The proposed Elderly Village will be located on the property of the Wayne County Child Development Center at Five Mile and Sheldon.

The township has so far approved a special zoning for the site, RME-elderly residential, and accepted federal community development funds. The county, which owns the land the proposed project is on, threatened to squelch the elderly village project if the township did not accept another year of community development funds.

Once built, it is estimated the village could return as much as \$1.2 million in property taxes to the township and provide for hundreds of local jobs.

The Wayne County Economic Development Corporation is planning now for the transfer of land from the county to the county EDC, said Robert FitzPatrick, EDC chief.

The county EDC, which has been involved with preliminary plans for the village, is also conducting a private appraisal of the land. County auditors also are reassessing the buildings and property on the site.

Nothing was found missing and the suspects apparently were scared off by the home owners.

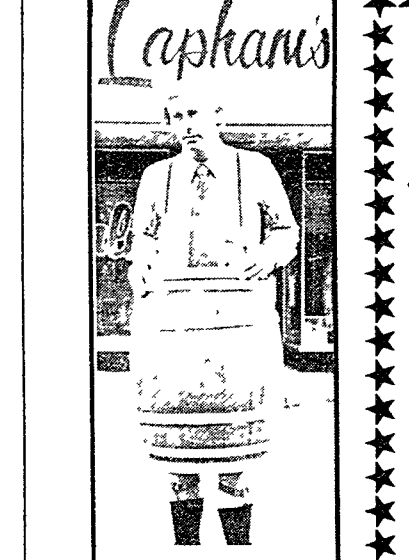
A small car was seen leaving the area on Beck.

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City slashes budget items

Aware that it may be taking another look at the budget as early as November, Northville City Council unanimously passed budget revisions Monday night to trim expenditures in line with decreased revenues.

Revisions to the present \$2,118,932 budget, discussed at last week's council meeting, were recommended Monday by City Manager Steven

Walters and totaled \$47,842.

Walters pointed out that the department-by-department decreases become "fairly substantial" when applied to the police department which had trimmed \$3,400 from auxiliary budget and \$19,200 from the regular police overtime wage budget as well as \$18,000 from the police operating budget.

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Preschool programs under way for new school year

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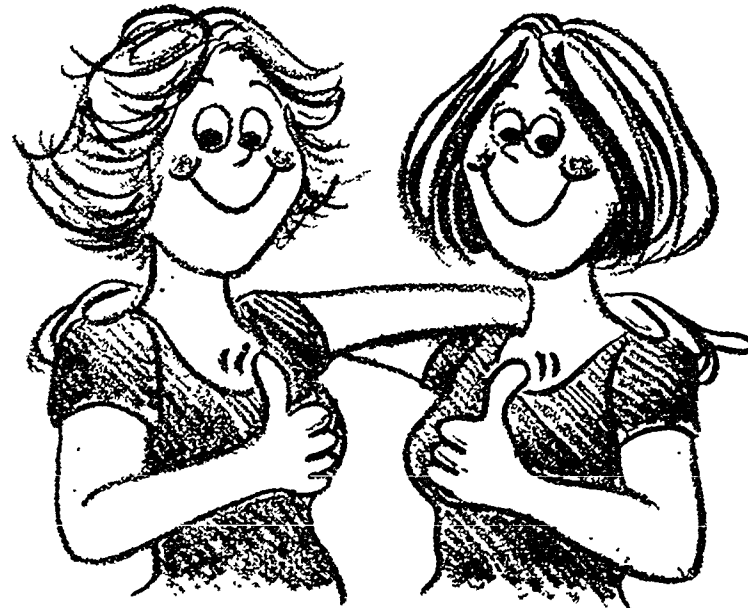
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Demick given house approval

Debate over the permitted use for a house at 410 North Center has been put to rest, at least temporarily.

Applicant James Demick of Detroit was granted conditional approval of site plan, architectural and landscaping under Professional, Business and Professional (PBO) use by a 4-2 vote of the city planning commission September 16.

Member James Cutler, whose real estate office is located directly south of the house, abstained — member Fred Joels and Vice-Chairman Lesa Buckland were absent.

Members Stewart Kissinger and Charles Freydl opposed the motion for approval.

Voting in favor of Commissioner Luke Durst's motion were members William Tucker, Bruce Turnbull and Chairman C. Thomas Wheaton.

Conditional approval did not come without some opposition from commissioners and members of the audience whose businesses are located near Demick's home, however.

"You are going to have a problem with the water draining onto other properties," Cutler insisted, "if this plan is followed."

Dr. Joseph Sinkwitz, a dentist who conducts his practice in the professional building at 418 North Center, voiced another concern.

"The parking there now is minimal at best," he stated. "Shoppers from Chatham and other businesses are spilling over onto the professional building parking lot as it is."

"If you approve this plan you are going to invite a lot of similar uses and create an inadequacy of parking spaces."

Chairman Wheaton attempted to resolve the drainage problem by suggesting to the commission that

Demick be required to insure that the elevations along the south lot line should be such that the water would drain into the catch basin behind his building.

In response to the parking concern, Wheaton said that Demick had met the requirements of the ordinance and that was all that was necessary.

Other conditions which must be met include:

—The posting of a performance bond to guarantee that landscape improvements are completed.

—A written statement that the building will be used for non-medical business purposes.

In other action city planners gave unanimous approval to the revised site plan, architectural and landscaping for the new building for Joe's Little Bar, 157 East Main.

Planners' main concern was the rear extension of the building, which, on the original plan, was indicated six feet too far.

The plan, which recently was okayed by the Historical District Commission, conforms to the original Downtown Development Authority (DDA) plan, planners said.

Cutler, who was absent at the last planning commission meeting, asked Wheaton if he could abstain from voting on the matter since he did not receive a copy of the updated plan and therefore felt he did not know what he was voting on.

The chairman was not receptive to the request.

"I do not know that I can use your absence from last meeting as an excuse to abstain," Wheaton stated. "I suggest that you vote your conscience."

The voice vote was unanimous, Cutler remaining silent.

Program to accent coping with patients

For Northville residents who live in the immediate vicinity of Northville Psychiatric Hospital, a community program called "Dealing with the Mental Patient Outside the Hospital" is being planned by area residents and the hospital training department.

A tentative date for the first program has been set for October 14 and 16th. The planning committee for the program hopes to eventually provide the program on a regular basis for residents. The program will begin each night at 7 p.m. and end at 10 p.m.

The goal of the program is to provide the community with information about mental health and information about patients in the hospital. The hospital staff will share strategies about

avoiding confrontation with patients, discuss residents' fears and anxieties about mental illness, and show non physical ways to cope with a patient who may confront them.

"We do not want to give residents the idea that they will be expected to handle mentally ill patients the way our trained staff can," said Kate Davis, training director at the hospital. "The goal is to inform and educate."

Ms. Davis, along with Friends of the Hospital members and residents, Glenna Davis and Ellen Louis, are planning the information program.

The first program will have room for 16 pre-registered participants. Further information on registration will be available next week, the committee said.

Joyner has served on the county board of commissioners for three years. He is past executive vice-president of the Michigan Jaycees.

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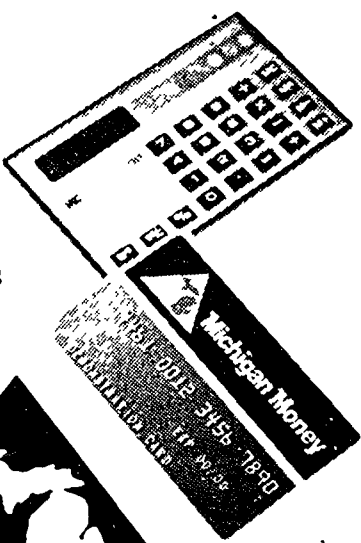

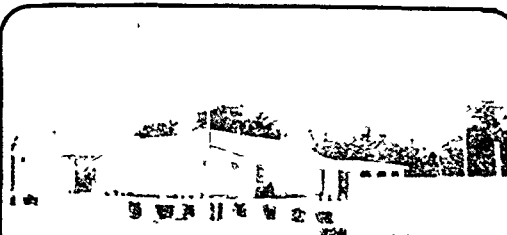

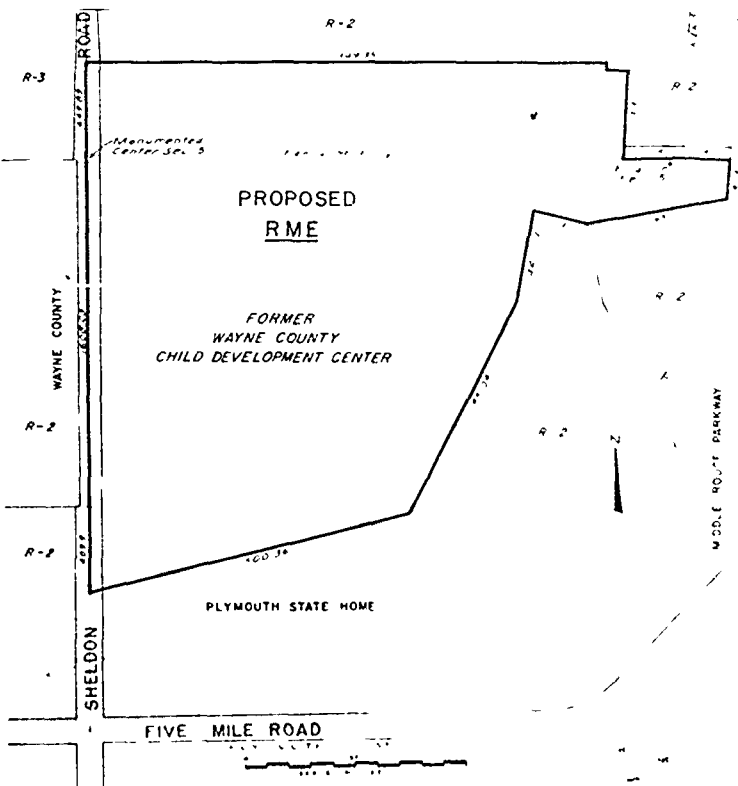

Our opinions

Tree saver applauded

Monday one man figuratively threw his arms around five of the city's trees, including two or three maples experts call "exceptional," and apparently has saved them from the saw. Mel Anderson, whose clock shop is located at Dunlap and Wing, was concerned Monday morning when workers arrived to cut down the five trees on Wing in the block between Dunlap and Randolph.

He recalled being asked by Detroit Edison for permission to trim the trees as some towered higher than new lines being installed to service the Downtown Development Authority project and to avoid dwarfing new street lights. But Anderson was certain he had not agreed to cutting them down. He got busy, calling city hall, Mayor Paul Vernon (who said he was unaware of such Edison plans) and this newspaper.

Council member Stan Johnston, also a member of the DDA, personally hurried to the scene and told DPW Superintendent Ted Mapes to put the project "on hold" until it could be investigated. It developed that when Edison had stated it was "necessary" to cut down the trees the city was planning to replace them with good-sized trees — that still would have taken years to become as large as those that grace the streets of fine old homes.

By the end of the day, Edison had found a new path for its lines that avoids the trees. While Anderson may have been acting in part because he knows the value of having shade trees along his property, we have to think it primarily was because he loves trees. He made the alternate route possible by offering to give a right-of-way through his property. Thanks, Mel.

Delay it!

Now 34 years old, Northville Cooperative Preschool presently is fighting for its existence. Parents admit in the petition presented Monday to city council that they cannot afford to pay the co-op's way in the Scout-Recreation Building and still keep fees reasonable. They are asking time to relocate — not an easy matter in days of stringent state regulation.

Let's hope the council will "think young" and grant the delay, even if it only means letting the cooperative finish the

current school semester in the Scout-Recreation Building while seeking other quarters.

We are well aware that council members, faced with some serious budget problems, are obligated to carefully weigh city costs. At the same time council members must consider the obvious unfairness of eviction of a long-standing tenant that, in the absence of any prior notice from the city, made some costly commitments to continue its program in this municipal building.

No taxes!

Contrary to what some people believe, the store front construction and improvement occurring in downtown Northville is not being paid with tax dollars. Owners of the buildings are

footing the bills — as it should be.

Part of the confusion may be the signs recently erected at the entrances to the downtown area, signalling the start of the Mainstreet 78 improvement project aimed at pumping fresh vitality into the central business district. Mainstreet 78, which voters pledged to back with their taxes if need be, involves only public improvements, however. These improvements include improved municipal parking lots, landscaping, underground wiring, etc.

We're pleased a number of businessmen have decided to supplement the public improvements with improvements of their own. These private sector improvements — planned or already underway — suggest Mainstreet 78 is indeed providing the stimulus that was intended when it was launched.

So as you notice work on downtown buildings you can be assured that this work is being financed by private dollars, not your tax dollars.

The second item is that of local engineering service. I have great respect for City Manager Walters' competency and I grant that he has, as usual, expressed some reasonable points of view. However, other factors deserve considerable weight. I have in mind the many years of dedicated and faithful service of Mr. Harold Penn. I can remember the years when the city employed a larger, out-of-town based,

engineering firm and the problems and frustrations were numerous. With the employment of Harold Penn, a local man who has to live for years with his problems as well as his successes, the overall service to the city on a dollar for dollar basis was greatly improved.

I think that over the years Mr. Penn has done an excellent job for the city. Some of his many varied assignments have not been without problems, but I also believe at times he has been the "fall guy" for others.

I hope the city retains the valuable services of this Christian gentleman of high integrity.

WSU appoints Rahimi computer science head

Mort A. Rahimi of 45742 Fermaugh has assumed his new position as chairman of the Department of Computer Science at Wayne State University.

Rahimi, who officially began his new duties August 25, also will serve as a professor of computer science in conjunction with the chairmanship.

Rahimi came to WSU from Michigan State University where he was a professor of computer science and director of the Artificial Language Laboratory there.

The Artificial Language Laboratory, founded by Rahimi in 1972, has won international recognition for its work in the development of computer-based communication aids for the handicapped.

Rahimi said the language laboratory was implemented in the Northville Public Schools in 1975. Most of the computers, which are devised to help the handicapped communicate, are housed at Moraine Elementary School.

Rahimi explained that work with the Artificial Language Laboratory will continue at WSU and that the college has set up two new laboratories for that purpose.

The new chairman holds B.S. and M.S. degrees in Mathematics from MSU and a Ph.D. in Computer Science from the University of Iowa.

The publication is indexed by subject in alphabetical order with the sponsor of the bill listed and a one or two sentence explanation of the legislation included.


"I publish this type of information about every six months to provide my district with more detailed information on what the Legislature is working on," Geake said.

Recreation Building, but if we can't have it, we need time to relocate."

In response to the question of where the 52 preschoolers live asked by Mayor Paul Vernon, she detailed that two-thirds are city residents, most of whom live in the Historic District. Many of these children and their mothers walk to the Scout building, she added. Almost

all of the remaining one-third are township residents, she said.

Mrs. Smith and Judy Whitmore, vice-president of the cooperative, who were there with 15 other parents, stressed the value of the preschool program and its lower cost in comparison with other preschools in the area.

A kindergarten readiness program has been one of the cooperative's main focuses, they told council. The

cooperative, they said, also recently expanded its program to include toddlers. Mrs. Whitmore told The Record that it had been necessary to take a loan to meet state requirements for supplies for the new program.

Mrs. Smith told council the cooperative could appreciate the financial situation of the city with the building and said the cooperative would be willing to take on all maintenance and pay slightly higher rent, but admitted it could not pay its way.

"We do benefit the community if not moneywise for kids and their families," council was told.

Vernon agreed, saying, "I don't think any of us disagree, but the city is faced with tightening its purse strings and we as the governing body are going to have to make a lot of unpopular decisions from where we stand."

"The Scout building has been perfect — for safety and protection to the kids," summed up Carol Emsley for the cooperative.

Mrs. Smith and others stressed that the preschool offered programs not available otherwise, including the new toddler program and acceptance of hyper-active youngsters.

The petition stated that "we are committed to a quality program currently for 52 children. Those 52 children have no viable alternatives for this school year at this late date."

It conceded that "Northville Cooperative Nursery agrees that the new use of the Scout-Recreation Building will be productive for Northville. However, the plight of the

Northville Cooperative Preschool is clear. We desperately need the help of the City of Northville in relocating on such extremely short notice."

Walters said he had been exploring possibility of relocation in a public school and had been told rooms are available but Mrs. Smith said she had not been able to make contact with anyone by Monday who could give specifics.

If fees were the same as the \$150 at Moraine Elementary, stated as the charge for a room for another nursery, she said that the cooperative could not afford this sum as the one room could only serve 14 children by state regulations. They specify 35 square feet for each child three and over and 50 for each under two.

The city manager recalled that the building was constructed in part by public subscription and then was dedicated to the city to administer.

No action was taken by council Monday as Walters stated a short delay would not change the engineering firms' offers. In his memo to council he suggested that perhaps the delay could be until mid-October. He pointed out that delays could cost approximately \$800 a month under the projected revenues from the engineering use of the building.

Mayor Vernon pointed out to the parents that "we have not given you an eviction notice. It's proper not to take any action tonight. We're aware that there is a need to see it (the cooperative preschool) preserved."

homes now.

Another has to do with rising prices. Most salespeople will say to potential homebuyers that while interest rates may slide up or down, the price on the homes will never get cheaper.

"Builders are constantly forced to raise prices," Fowler said. "Tradesmen just got a 22 percent increase in pay over the next two years. The builder is forced to increase prices just to break even."

"If a builder can close his books after the one year inspection on 10 percent profit, it's called a sweet deal," Fowler noted.

Fowler says people should think of their home investment as "cash on the table." A new home will yield the buyer better dividends than an older one, Fowler said, because the builder puts "forced inflation" into it.

"In a normal market, a new home will go up 15 to 18 percent, while an older home will go up eight to 10 percent," Fowler noted.

An older home is one that was built in

1976-77, Fowler said.

"Used homes are a better buy right now," said real estate broker Joann Bryngelson of Northville. "There is still a backlog of homes on the market, but there is more push for used homes than new ones. You don't have to spend as much money on new drapes, landscaping and furniture."

Bryngelson notes an improvement in home sales since spring when mortgage rates were in the high teens.

"I think people realized rates won't go below 12 percent and they can't rent forever," she said. "There are new directions in financing like the new three to five year mortgage. Those will allow people to buy homes and stabilize the market. It's a realistic look at what might happen to the housing market over a 30 year period."

"Homes are still a good investment no matter what the interest rate is," Green said.

"The interest rate can always be adjusted (by waiting for a drop or with one of the new mortgages), but you only get one shot at the price of the house," Fowler said.

State police winners

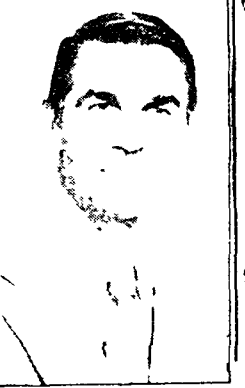

— The people have no guarantee that in time if the property were zoned commercial the residential flavor (primarily Victorian) wouldn't be destroyed.

Loud applause followed the reading of the letter and other audience members voiced similar objections.

Ray Casterline had another concern. "I object to being taken out of a zoning which is conforming and put into a non-conforming use."

Following a few other residents' objections, Chairman Wheaton reminded the audience of the purpose of the hearing.

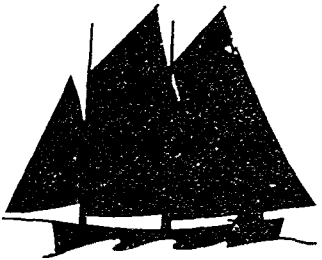
"We are not wholeheartedly convinced that this is the way to go," he stated. "We are here tonight to hear your thoughts. We want to know how the community feels."

But when Wheaton initiated action to close the public hearing one audience member objected.

"I think it is interesting that we have an exploratory hearing and don't let everyone speak," charged Ken Harrison. "If there isn't anyone in favor of this proposal I think it is obvious how the vote should go."

Planners let Harrison speak, then closed the public hearing.

Suburbanization: 'pull in gangplank'

There are no sounds except the distant twitter of a bird and the occasional chirp of a cricket.

On the gravel road, there is no traffic, no horns, no tires screeching, no engines roaring, no screams of police sirens.

And there are no tall buildings here, no monuments to so-called progress. There are monuments to nature—tall oak trees, majestic pine trees, flowering apple trees, an open field, a blue lake and gently rolling land.

It has some of the earmarks of a revolution.

People become angry, they pound their fists on podiums, they file lawsuits, they threaten recall elections, they circulate petitions, they shout and point fingers at elected officials.

In many municipalities in western Oakland County and parts of Livingston County, there is a new wave of the suburbanization process.

Tens of thousands of residents have moved into areas described by professional planners as "semi-rural" communities where the living is slower, it's quieter, there are open spaces and a country atmosphere.

This new wave of residents, most of whom have taken possession of homes in the semi-rural townships in the last decade, are electing municipal officials who will protect their new found communities from the suburbanization process which resulted in densely populated cities which circle the City of Detroit.

"I think there is a different attitude in many communities that is different from that displayed by elected officials in the older suburban areas in the '50s and '60s," said Willis Bullard Jr., an attorney and a candidate for the full-time supervisor's post in Highland Township—a municipality in the northwestern section of Oakland County which has experienced 100 percent increase in population in the last decade.

The population of many cities in the suburbs ringing Detroit appear to have moved even further from the city in an effort to recapture small town attributes that are rapidly vanishing in megacity of Detroit.

Preliminary figures from the U.S. Census Bureau indicate that most of the older suburbs in Oakland County have

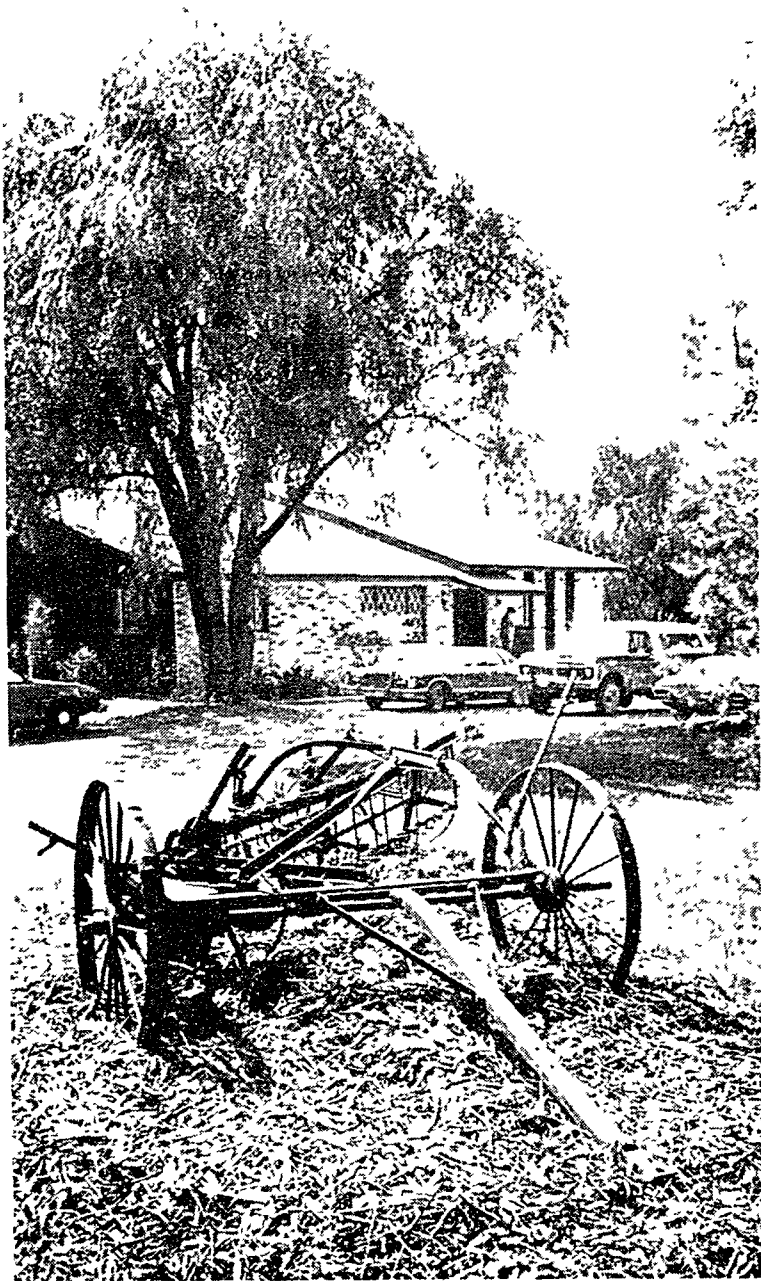

lost population while most of the townships further away from Detroit have experienced a dramatic increase in population.

The result has forced many formerly rural communities through some wrenching disputes and controversies about proposals from developers who want to construct shopping centers and office buildings to provide services for this new influx of residents.

Legal fights,

community upheavals

In four communities in western Oakland County, a new attitude of citizens toward growth has resulted directly in court fights to prevent what some residents are saying are mistakes made by communities '50s and '60s immediately outside the City of Detroit.

In White Lake Township, hundreds of citizens have shown up a public meetings to fight the creation of a K-mart shopping center. That township's population has jumped from 14,311 in 1970 to an estimated 21,366 in 1980.

K-mart officials have argued that the township itself is nearly large enough to support such a center, but citizens vehemently oppose the center, arguing they moved into White Lake Township to get away from shopping centers and major retail centers.

In Highland Township, immediately to the west of White Lake, the township and a group of citizens were successful in preventing the development of a 270-acre project along M-59, a major road connecting Pontiac and I-75 in Oakland County with US-23 and I-96 in Livingston County.

A major reason for citizen opposition to the project was the possibility of a dense subdivision, apartments, office buildings and a commercial center.

In Milford Township, hundreds of citizens formed an organization to battle the Huron Clinton Metropolitan Authority and a corporation which wanted to construct an amusement park in the park.

That township is now being named as a defendant in a lawsuit from a group of Milford businessmen who have claimed that the township's land use policies are a violation of U.S. Constitution and is a violation of the U.S. Civil Rights Act.

The group filed the lawsuit after the township's board denied a zoning request which would have allowed them to construct homes on lots roughly one acre in size, condominiums and a bank on the fringe of the Village of Milford.

The businessmen allege that the township's requirements for large lots in most areas zoned for single-family homes make it impossible for residents with moderate incomes to live there.

Hundreds of residents of the township registered strong protest to the development, arguing it would adversely affect the rural lifestyle in the area and would cause property values to drop.

Several hundred residents, along with township officials, were also successful in preventing the construction of a large natural gas pumping station near residential lands. The opposition ultimately forced Michigan Consolidated Gas to construct the plant in the township's industrial area.

In Lyon Township, the township's board is opposing a large residential project bounded on the north by 10 Mile Road and the South by Nine Mile Road.

The township's board turned down a rezoning request which would have allowed the developer to construct some 1,100 homes in a 500-acre on lots roughly 10,000 square feet in size.

In Northville Township, community officials say two narrow defeats of annexation efforts which would have combined the township with the City of Northville were partly due opposition to the urbanization process which in some cases produces unwanted homogeneity between communities which want their own identities.

Communities described as semi-rural by professional planners often are involved in rezoning disputes. Rezoning

petitions—a formal request to change the permitted use of a piece of land—are often the center of controversies because of a awareness of many new citizens

Suburbanization: 'pull in gangplank'

Residents want different lives

"It's called the 'Last Man In Syndrome' or the 'Pull In The Gangplank Syndrome,'" said Todd Kilroy, a consulting planner for White Lake Township and the City of Walled Lake.

Kilroy is describing what he believes is a phenomenon seen in many communities (but not the already urbanized Walled Lake) and it is labeled similarly by local officials and residents.

In essence, the syndrome is an outspoken attitude toward new growth. Residents who move into an area to get away from the hectic existence of urban life and do not want other people to do the same because the new resident will contribute to a re-creation of the same environment found near Detroit.

Other municipal officials and professional planners see the so-called resistance to new growth as a natural result caused by the lack of sanitary sewers, municipal water, poor soils and other municipal services.

Whatever the public stance toward growth, the new urban process, which has produced an estimated growth of over 200,000 new citizens in formerly rural areas along the I-96 corridor, is directly caused by a wish to experience small town life to its fullest extent.

Gerald Luedtke, the head of his own planning consultant firm in downtown Detroit conducted a survey of eight rural townships in Livingston County to discover why people have moved into the areas.

"People listed they country atmosphere, rural lifestyles, quietude, recreation opportunities, natural amenities like swamps, forests, woodlands, open fields and bodies of water; historic architecture; proximity to urban centers; social life; and the

advantage of doing commercial and retail business with people you know as reasons for moving into these areas," said Luedtke.

"People go to a great deal of expense and time to live in a semi-rural setting on a five-acre lot...they think nothing of driving for one to two hours and getting home at 7 or 8 p.m....this is a phenomena in many urban areas," Luedtke added.

"I think these communities are very discerning. They have seen what has happened in the Warrens, the Sterling Heights, the Livonias and the Troys, and they want to avoid the same spoilage of the land that has often been allowed to happen in those areas," he said.

The extreme costs of land and gasoline have made these new residents keenly aware of what they have and what they want to protect.

"Many are mortgaged to the hilt and spend a great deal of money on gasoline just to live in a quiet, rural setting," said Brandon Rogers, executive vice-president of Parkins-Rogers & Associates, and the planning consultant to Milford Township.

"It's no wonder they are keenly concerned about the development of the community in which they live," Rogers added.

In many rural communities, the so-called cost of living may be higher, but vacation costs are trimmed because most residents taken advantage of what is nearby.

"I was recently talking to man who travels a lot and works in Detroit. He told me that when he comes home on the weekend, his car stays in the garage...he barbeques, swims and does some boating right at home. For many people, they don't have to travel up north because they live in a vacation spot," said Willis Bullard, a trustee in the township.

What's future for country gentry?

The cost of a gallon of gasoline has resulted in a shift in attitudes about the value of the rural life, according to Rogers.

"I see a movement back into the city and the suburbs. Some people call the process, 'in-filling'. Areas in these suburbs close to the city are being developed for housing, and many people are deciding to fix up their houses rather than building new homes further away from the City of Detroit," Rogers said.

Stanley Woodhouse, the consulting planner for Lyon Township and the Village of Milford, says that there is some movement by some communities to work with developers to acquire needed tax bases and still preserve the natural aspects of their communities.

"Because of the way our property tax system works, it becomes necessary for some communities to be realistic about new development, and instead of

rejecting them, they are making an effort to work with them to develop a balance between commercial, industrial and residential lands," he said.

The City of Novi may be an excellent example of what many communities may be want to hold as a goal.

According to Charles Cairns, planning consultant for the city, the existence of major state freeways and the recent construction of the I-20 Shopping Mall has catapulted the city into an urban center.

Despite the dramatic growth—an estimated 200 percent growth in the last 10 years—the city hopes not to become a blighted area.

"We are very keenly aware of planning, and we want to preserve the qualities of our residential areas as much as possible. We know we are already on our way to full urbanization, we want to protect the quality of life as much as possible," he said.

The jerseys were the same. But were the players underneath the shirts the same ones who fumbled away the game at Westland John Glenn a week before?

"We had Ward open on the same pattern a number of times during the game, so when we had the ball on their five-yard line and figured they would be keying on the run, we took advantage of it," Colligan explained.

The score came with seven minutes, 49 seconds left in the game.

But the Chargers were not about to lay down and die.

Churchill engineered a drive and moved into Northville territory as time was running out.

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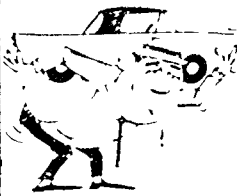
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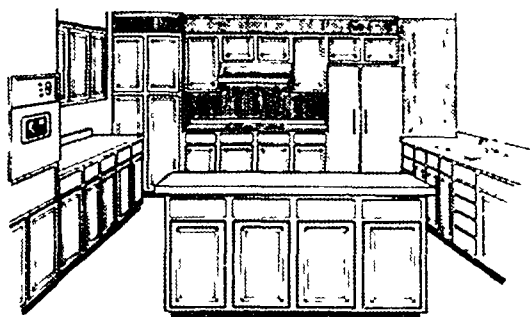
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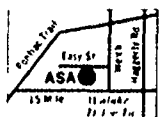

Boosters get two goals for the price of one

Soccer players and field goal kickers are aiming at the same goal this fall when playing at the Northville High School football stadium.

The goal in both soccer and football is, of course, to score points and win the contest.

But the physical goal that they are shooting at is a dual-purpose construction which serves both as soccer goal and football uprights.

The Northville High Booster Club undertook the project last year, when it was learned that the soccer team would be sharing the stadium with the football squad.

"Booster club members John

Starcevic, Ed Perpich and Bill Greer spearheaded the project," said Northville athletic director Ralph Redmond. "They considered purchasing new combination goals, but they were quite expensive, so they set out to build one themselves."

The base, which serves as the soccer goal, had to be purchased, but with the help of Huff Welding, the club members took the original goal posts and welded the cast iron piping to the goal, making a few adjustments to insure that the goal mouth was 24 feet wide and the uprights were 23 feet 4 inches apart.

"Rather than spending anywhere from \$1,500 to \$2,000 plus installation for a new set of dual-purpose goals, the boosters spent a little more than \$500," Redmond said.

The new combination goals were installed the weekend of the football team's four-way scrimmage, ready for use — or so everyone thought.

When the rains came that weekend the south end cement base sank some eight inches into the ground.

"Fortunately, we were able to get it repaired before the opening game," Redmond said.

Mustang fans also are viewing a new scoreboard at the stadium this fall.

The school system, pep club and Boosters combined efforts on this project, Redmond said, to replace the old scoreboard which had "just about outlived its use."

"The wiring and circuitry were not really adequate any more," Redmond said.

The new system, which includes underground wiring and other up dated equipment which the old board did not have, cost about \$6,000, he said.

The original scoreboard had been brought over from Ford Field, formerly the site of home football games.

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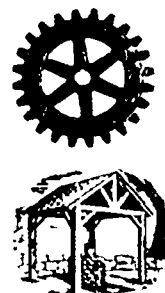
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Kickers stunned by stubborn Stevenson squad, 5-0

One of only three contestants missing fewer than five games, Tom Campbell of 48000 Eight Mile walked off with first place money in last week's football contest.

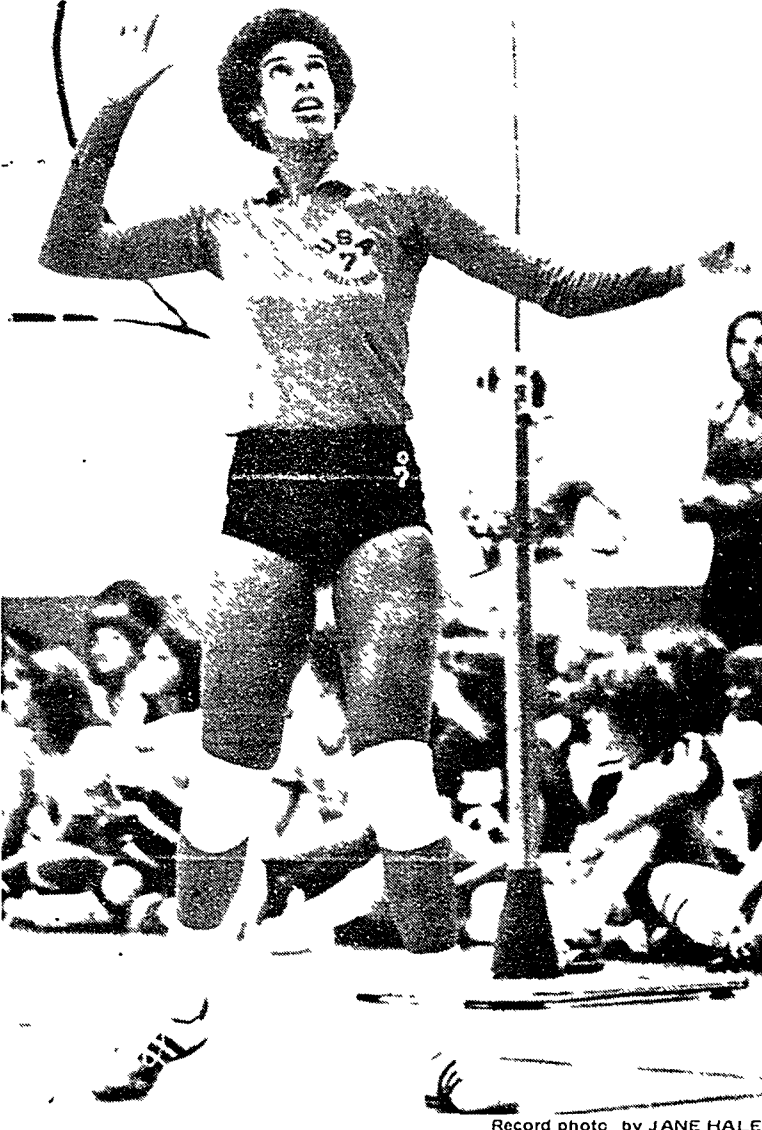

Twelve contests submitted entries containing six errors. All the others had seven errors or more for the 20 games listed.

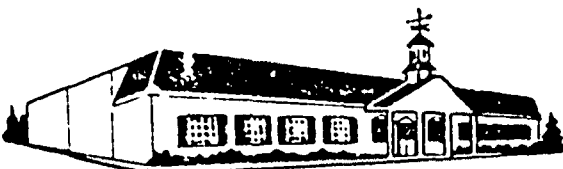

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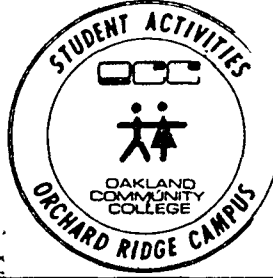
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Northville finishes seventh

Some 188 high school varsity runners competed in the 15th running of the Schoolcraft meet, including 121 men and 67 women, as well as 101 non-varsity runners.

Chris Strome of Wayne Memorial finished first with a time of 15:39.5 and led the list of the All-Invitational team.

Couyoumjian was the lone Northville runner to make the team, while

according to Gans, Dayton just missed the cut.

Finishing second to North Farmington was Plymouth Canton with 117 points.

Westland John Glenn was third with 127 points, Farmington fourth with 130, Wayne Memorial fifth with 138, Livonia Franklin sixth with 157 and Northville.

Ladywood was first in the girls competition with 34 points, while Livonia Stevenson finished second with 78.

Redford Union, Bishop Borgess, Livonia Churchill and Novi claimed third, fourth, fifth and sixth places respectively.

Gans said because the meet was such a success, it will be held on the Schoolcraft campus from now on.

"It is much more convenient for the participants with rest rooms nearer and much less confusion," he said.

In addition to its win over North Farmington last week, the Northville cross country squad also beat Walled Lake Western, 25-32.

Couyoumjian posted his best time this season — 16:26 — finishing first, while Dayton took second with a time of 16:53 and Seth Swallow finished fourth at 17:26.

The next best finisher for Northville was Jim Williams at sixth with a time of 17:45.

The Mustang squad has some injuries which have hindered the team, but Gabrys said overall the team is pretty healthy.

"We are retooling and changing our practices around a little," he said. "We have to make some mid-season adjustments."
