Waste oil spills into pond

On the weekend of September 26-28, waste oil spilled into the Middle Rouge River and flowed into Waterford Pond, leaving three inches of oil on parts of the pond and at least 70 fowl oilsoaked.

A report filed last week Tuesday by Stuart Oil Company manager Glenn Doyle told Northville City Police that approximately 500 gallons of waste oil were released by vandals sometime over the weekend of September 26.

"Unknown subjects entered plant area and opened a valve to a large above-ground oil storage tank letting the oil run along the ground into a sewer," the report said. The suspects apparently entered the property through an opening in the fence on the

north side of the property, police said.

Waterford Pond is located east of the C and O Railroad tracks and north of Six Mile in the township. The Stuart Oil Company is located on Railroad in the city, north of Seven Mile.

An attorney for the oil company, Anthony Dean, said although no link has been established, the company is "proceeding on the assumption that the oil came from our tank."

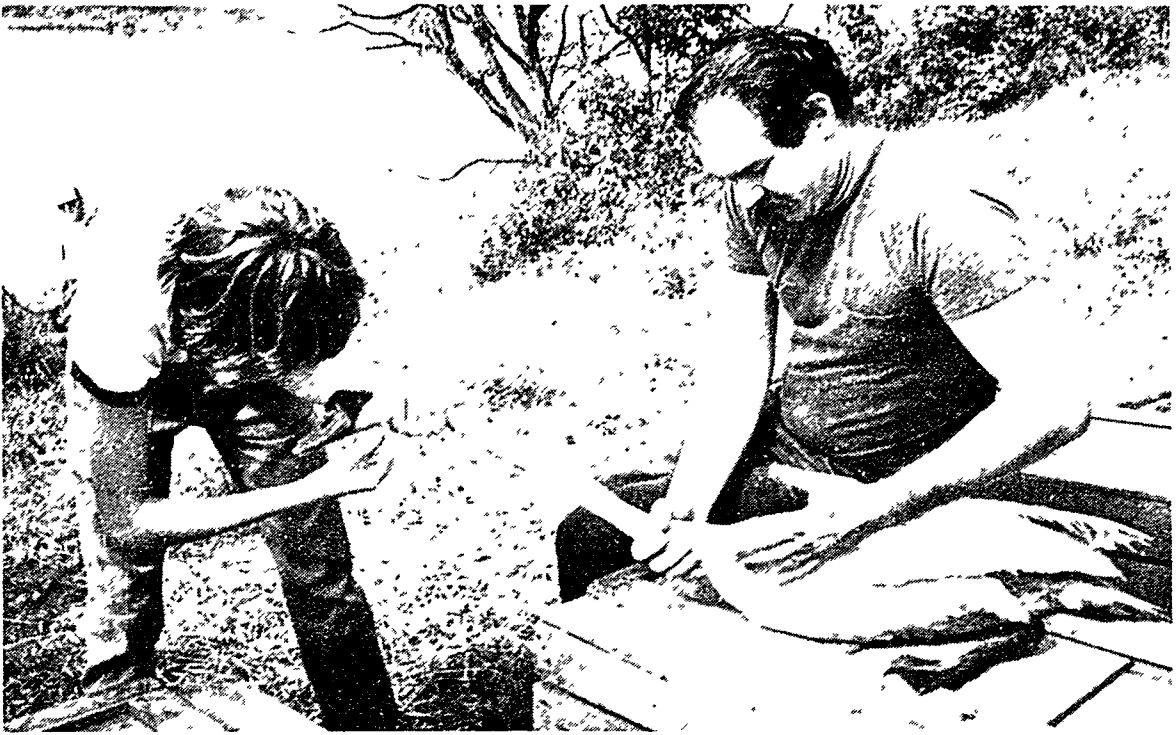
"Until we prove through laboratory tests (what happened) we can't cite anyone," said Warren Hutchinson, supervisor of the criminal investigation unit of the Environmental Enforcement Division of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR). "We have a good idea, though (where the oil came from). We feel comfortable with what we've obtained as evidence."

The two to four-acre pond is a nesting site for Canadian geese and ducks. By Friday, 70 geese, six ducks and two swans were at the Pontiac Humane Shelter, being cleaned of the oil by water and mild detergent. Dr. Richard Wojciechowski, of the shelter, expected a "high mortality rate" among those fowl that were brought in, but on Monday morning, none of the wildlife had died.

Volunteers had brought in an additional 13 birds over the weekend and a spokesperson at the shelter said the new arrivals were expected to survive, also.

Wildlife officials could not say how many birds had died as a result of the oil spill.

Bills contain more than water charge

Aware that they are being used as an example for the media by the Detroit Water Department as suburban communities charging substantially more than the amount levied by Detroit for its water; both Northville Township and the City of Northville this week are scheduling sewer rates as agenda items for board of trustees and city council meetings.

City Manager Steve Walters Monday told the council that he feels the publicity has been an attempt on the part of the City of Detroit to make its frequent increases "appear less significant."

Both city and township officials feel the rates are fiscally responsible.

Detroit has sent out a table of proposed wholesale rate increases that will hike effective December 1 the existing 2.64 cents cost per thousand cubic foot the city and township now pay.

New city rate will be 3.20 while the township will go up to 5.50.

Township trustees Thursday will receive a recommendation for a proposed charge of 91 cents per 1000 gallons from Walter Holinoty, superintendent of the township sewer and water department.

The township currently pays 53 cents per 1000 gallons. The new charge would merely pass along the 38.2 cent increase. Service charges based on meter size (\$2 for residential) would remain the same.

Since the Detroit water charge simply brings water to the boundary of the city, Walters points out that amounts have to be added for the local system, including repairs and maintenance, billing and records, capital improvements and repair reserve.

The city's water bond debt service (7.1 cents of each dollar charged) is included in the bills that are sent every other month.

Both he and township engineer William Mosher stated that the charges have to be "substantially higher" than Detroit's to keep the city fiscally

responsible. Mosher said that some communities that appear to have lower water rates can be in difficult financial straits.

Walters pointed out some communities assess millage to cover water main construction, making it appear that the community is paying less for water. (Walled Lake, which has its own wells, levies a three-quarter mill ad valorem tax giving residents an income tax deduction.)

Walters stresses that the city's entire debt structure for water lines is included in the rates.

He feels that the city's water tower, which permits bringing water at less than peak times, is responsible for the smaller percent increase upcoming to the city.

Township Supervisor Don Thomson announced last Friday that the township is completing negotiations with the City of Plymouth to purchase its unused reservoir at Six Mile and Beck.

Mosher said the \$24,000 purchase price for the reservoir sitting on three acres is a "bargain" for the township: it originally cost Plymouth \$270,000.

The township, he continued, will have to spend some money on the reservoir for a needed pump. Originally, he added, he recommended the purchase "against the day when Detroit would have difficulty delivering water. With two million gallons stored in the reservoir, we would be in good shape."

With the prospect of a substantial rate increase ahead, Mosher said he will be studying recommending making it functional now in order to obtain a lower rate water from Detroit at off hours.

Walters points out that the city has a three-step system in charging for water. There is a base rate of 90 cents for the first 5,000 gallons; then \$1.62 for the next 9,000; and 97 cents for everything over 14,000.

"This was done as a 'cushion' for senior citizens who are small users," he

Mainstreet '78 accelerates

If you aren't aware of the hammering, re-routing signs and torn up streets in downtown Northville, your ears are probably thanking you. By now, however, most downtown workers and visitors can see the progress on Mainstreet '78, an improvement project totaling thousands of dollars.

Work is smoothly progressing, according to construction sources.

Traffic has been effectively re-routed through most of the major streets in town, said Jack McNeely of McNeely and Lincoln Associates.

"Maybe in the dim, distant future we would have to completely close off a street," McNeely said, "but so far traffic is moving freely and everything is going well."

Work is now completed on conduit installation in the northeast parking lot downtown and on a storm line on Center Street at Mary Alexander Court.

Contractors have started work on storm sewer construction in town center and relocation of the Dunlap-Hutton intersection. Curb and gutter construction will also begin in the northeast parking lot downtown. A street lighting system for the northeast parking lot is also scheduled, as is construction on a screen wall.

Nanmar Construction is doing the utility duct installation work. A City of Northville firm, International Contracting Company, was subcontracted.

Joint meeting set

Township hall crowded from start, states report

A special joint meeting to discuss possible expansion of Northville Township Hall is planned for October 15 at 8 p.m. between the Northville Township Board of Trustees and the planning commission.

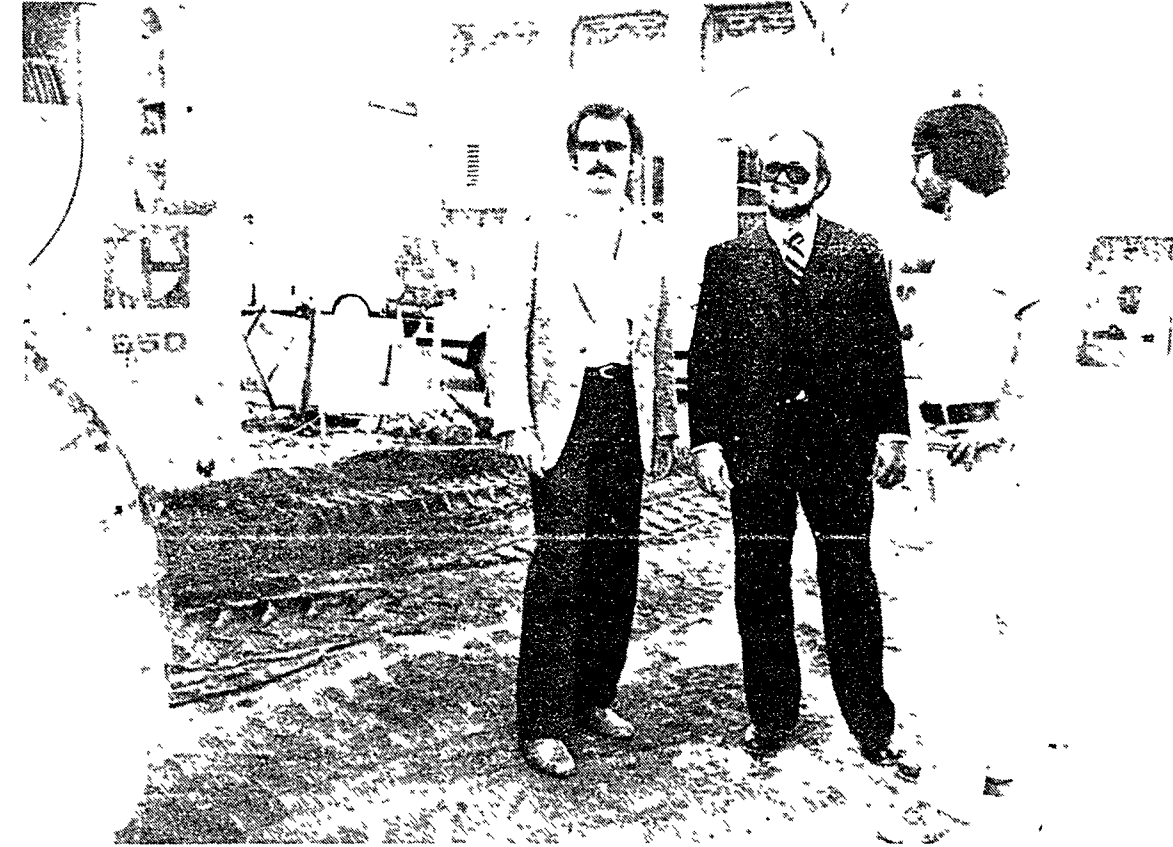
A presentation by Claude Coates, a township planning consultant, will outline to the trustees and commissioners the space needs for administrative, police and fire functions of the township.

Although an analysis has been drawn up by the planning consultants, township officials said the presentation is for discussion purposes only. No costs have yet been attached to the expansion, if and when it occurs, officials said.

"From the beginning, an overcrowded situation has existed" stated planning consultants in the analysis of the 13,631 square foot (including the fire department apparatus room and the police security garage) building. The hall was occupied in 1978.

Noting that the township administrative building has an "unusual configuration...which creates an abundance of non-usable space", the analysis report stated that recommended standards "should be viewed as guidelines for future needs."

Recommended space for the administrative department, which currently works from 193 square feet of space, is 900 square feet. The capacity space would include a 250 square foot office for the soon-to-be-hired township manager and a 200 square foot conference room adjacent to the

manager's office.

The report noted the most critical requirement for the clerk's department is a 600-foot election room for equipment storage.

Also recommended in the report is the addition of a receptionist. "As the township grows, the need for a receptionist will become more apparent," the report stated. In all, recommended space for the clerk's office is 2,060 square feet.

The building department area would be increased by 503 square feet, up to a total of 1,900 square feet. If a Community Development department is formed, a total of nine people would staff the combined Building-Community Development Department.

"Growing responsibilities will dictate the need for the formation of new departments", stated the report. Among those would be a purchasing-finance department, a personnel department and a data processing department — all requiring a total of 2,105 square feet.

The report addressed itself to "potential departments" including a recreation department and an assessing department. Guidelines for the recreation department include 890 square feet for five employees. The assessment department would have 990 square feet and five employees.

The analysis said the police department would "upon ultimate development" employ 54 persons, including 42 officers. Recommended space for police is more than 2,300 square feet, not including the 1,400 square feet for clerical and records

storage.

The fire department would occupy a total of 10,630 square feet, including two fire stations, office space for administrators, special facilities for

round-the-clock firefighters and the present square footage of the fire apparatus room.

The township meeting hall is located at 41600 Six Mile.

**OPEN HOUSE** will be held by the Northville City Fire Department from noon to 4 p.m. Saturday at the fire station on Main in observance of National Fire Prevention Week. Visitors can view equipment and see a fire safety film while enjoying refreshments. There will be home fire safety training for children who will receive a certificate for taking part.

**TIVOLI FAIR** last Friday and Saturday at Northville Downs broke all previous records, bringing in just over \$7,800 for the Northville Historical Society, President Robert Daniel reported Monday, as he thanked the community for its response to the fair that is a major fundraiser for Mill Race Historical Village restoration.

**THE TOWNSHIP** is seeking applications from area residents for a community service officer post, a position being created with CETA funds, Supervisor Don Thomson announces. It will pay \$5.25 an hour with application to be made at the Wayne County office, 2345 Merriman. Thomson says the township is seeking someone to police ordinances and he has been told by the county that funds have been allocated for the post.

# Arts Commission offers prizes

Northville's newly formed arts commission is sponsoring a logotype competition to find a symbol with which the new group can be identified.

"It will symbolize the goals and activities of the commission and identify it when used on letterheads, labels and other material developed by the commission," says Phelps Hines, a commission member helping with the contest.

The logo or trademark shall be designed to be reproduced in one or two colors and shall contain the words "Northville Arts Commission" in the design, contest rules stipulate.

They also specify that artists should give consideration to the fact that the insignia may be used in many sizes from one inch to two feet — and should be recognizable immediately.

Designs are to be submitted on illustration board 9 by 12 inches in two colors, or in black with a screened area.

Entries with artist's name, address and telephone number must be in the commission's hands by November 15.

The winning entry will receive a \$100 prize. Second prize of \$50, and third and fourth prizes of \$25 each also will be awarded. All entries become the commission's property.

Entries should be submitted to the commission at city hall, 215 West Main.

Northville City Council unanimously passed the new

commission's proposed by-laws and rules of procedure at its September 22 meeting.

The by-laws adopted state that the purpose of the new organization is "to involve the entire community in all phases of the arts."

Members may be residents or employees of either the city or the township.

The need for such a commission earlier was researched by Cheryl Gazlay at the request of Mayor Paul Vernon. She served as chairman during the organization after reporting to city council that Northville was one of the only communities in the area without an arts commission.

The 1980-81 program and budget of the new commission also were approved by the council.

The program includes an "Artists in the Classroom" project available once a month to all local schools without charge. Artists are available to go to a school, demonstrate and explain their talent.

Programs also will be available to groups at minimum charge.

A community-wide art fair is being planned to coincide with the completion of Mainstreet 78. Also planned are film and jazz contests.

The budget of \$635 includes procuring a listing of all registered artists in the state, use of rental equipment for education programs, set-up funds for the art fair and funding of the logo contest.

# Food rezoning tabled

Township planners last week referred a request to rezone a parcel of land north of Seven Mile for a fast food restaurant to the township planning consultants for review.

The petition was to rezone to commercial a parcel of land just north of Seven Mile and between the railroad tracks and Gerald.

Commissioners cited possible traffic problems in entering the restaurant from eastbound vehicles. The first entry to the restaurant is designated about 130 feet from the railroad tracks at Seven Mile.

Residents at the public hearing criticized the traffic situation.

"It would be an impossible situation there," said Jerry Chesnell of Maxwell Street.

"Whenever a train goes by now, traffic backs up all the way to the bank," said Irving Benson, a Highland Lakes resident. "It won't work to have it there."

"The problem isn't only with westbound traffic," said Bernard Baldwin, commissioner. "It's from the east and traffic stacks up there. Then what happens if a train comes?"

Township planners are expected to render a recommendation on the request at the next regular meeting October 28.

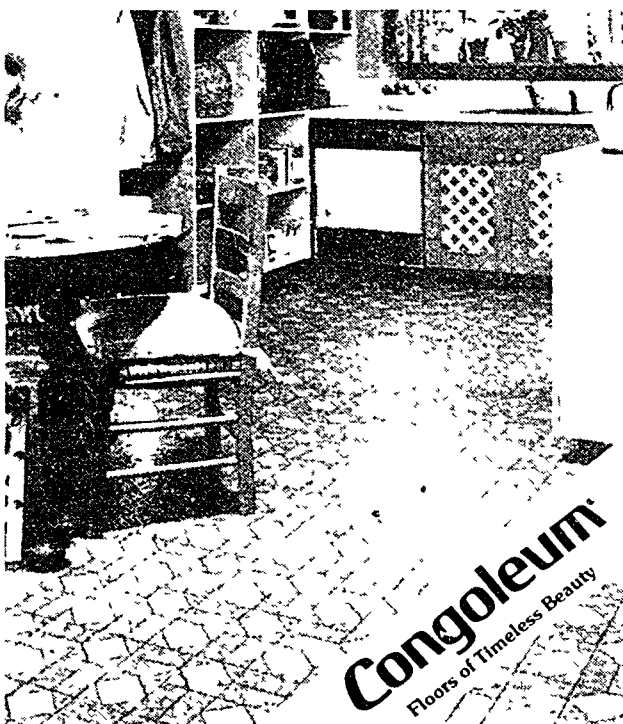

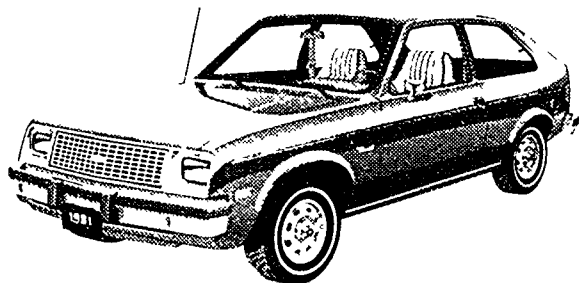

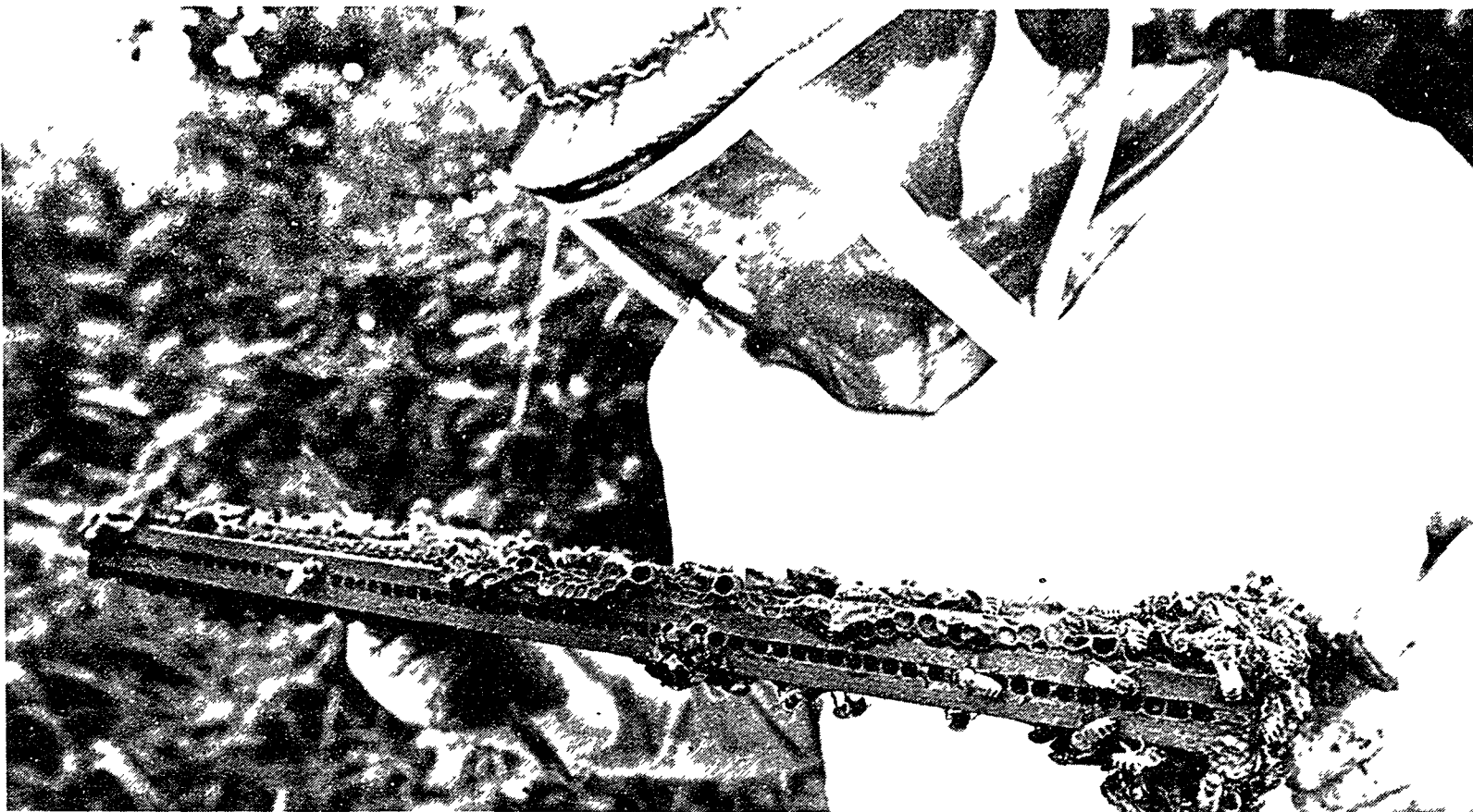


One insect you don't want to get angry is the honeybee. That's going to happen, though, when you take the honey out of the combs.

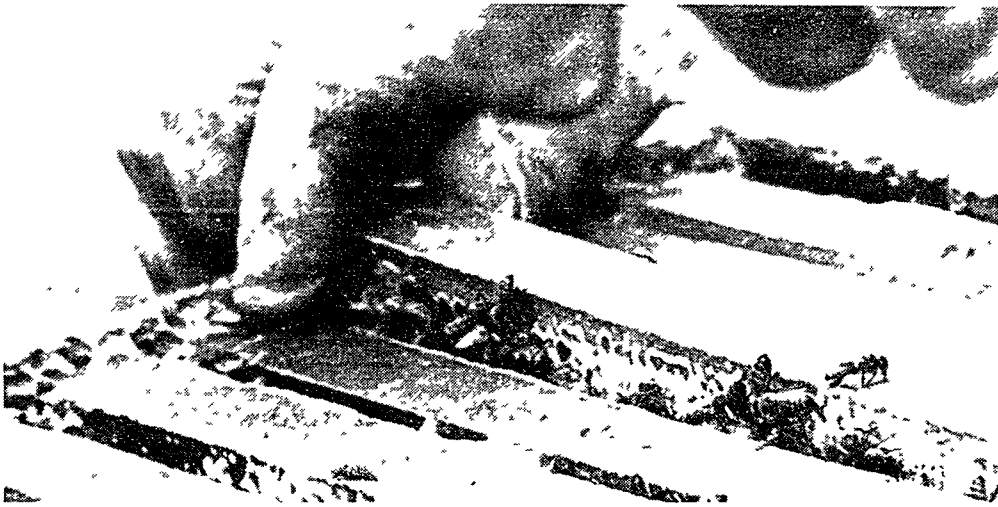

Since honey is the result of pollination, weeds, flowers and anything a bee can pollinate are necessary. According to Homer, if all honeybees were gone, food production would drop 80 percent. Phil Donahue, who is credited with making last season's Northville Town Hall series a sellout.

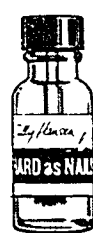

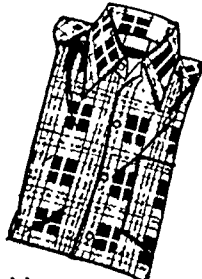

## Township boy's death remains a mystery

The recent death of a 13-year-old Northville Township resident has left the boy's parents, friends and county medical examiners mystified.

That is known. But what caused the "normal, healthy youngster" to stop breathing has not been determined.

Stephen returned and said "he felt dizzy," a sister told police.

He went to lie down on his bed. His mother's attempts to wake him a few hours later were unsuccessful.

The youth was pronounced dead at St. Mary Hospital at 11:02 p.m.

A doctor at St. Mary told police there were no signs of trauma, no bruises and no visible injuries to the boy's body.

Following an autopsy performed by Assistant Wayne County Medical Examiner Doctor Hareesh Mirchanda, he told police the boy's death may have been caused by a seizure disorder, but that the official cause of death will not be known until results of the toxicology report are completed.

Township police are calling it a "natural death" pending further information from the examiner.

Parents told police their son was not being treated for any illness and was taking no medication.

Teachers and administrators from the junior high school said Stephen was a good student and did not have any disciplinary problems.

# RME zoning suggested to township by county

The final step in creating a special zoning district for an elderly village in Northville Township may be taken by the township board of trustees tomorrow night following an endorsement from the Wayne County Planning Commission October 1.

The proposed rezoning to RME (elderly residential) for the old Wayne County Child Development Center site was also given a unanimous endorsement by the Northville Township Planning Commission last week.

The proposed elderly village plan was recommended by the township Economic Development Corporation (EDC) at its meeting last month.

The endorsement by the planning commission followed a public hearing at which residents commented on the proposed project.

Dolores Field, a resident on Six Mile, and also a member of the township EDC, said she objected to six-story

buildings in the proposed development. "I think the project is fine, but I don't think we should have six-story buildings in the township," Field said. "Only in the proposed RME (residential elderly) district could there be six story buildings," said Kenneth McLarty, commission chairman. "There is very little land here that could hold a development like this one (the proposed elderly village)."

An attorney representing the Northrop family that owns 29 acres north of the training center site said the family had no objections to the rezoning request.

"I represent the family and am here to tell you that the Northrops will file a rezoning petition for that land," said James Dritsas, attorney. "It (the land) doesn't lend itself to other use than multiples." The acreage is currently zoned R-2 (one family residential).

The township meeting will begin at 8 p.m. Thursday, October 9.

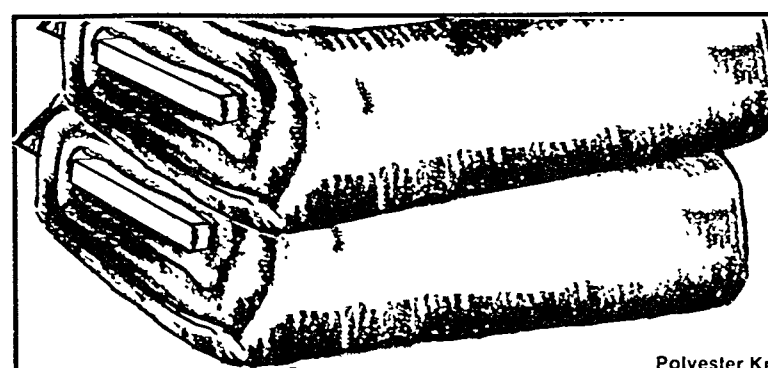

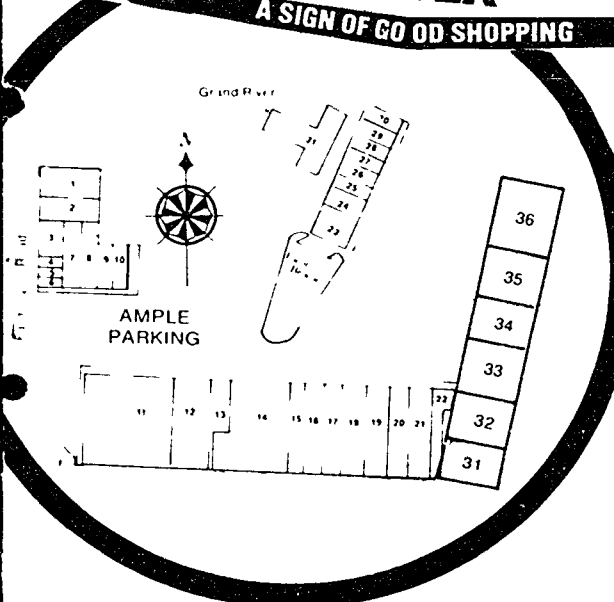

## Phoenix facility near capacity, says director

The Phoenix Correctional Facility will most likely finish phasing in inmates within the next month or so, according to Lloyd May, facility superintendent.

"Right now we have 158 residents," May said. "The phasing in is a slow process, but within a month or so we will be at capacity."

The Phoenix facility is on the site of the former Women's Division of DeHoCo. Following extensive renovations that cost \$3.8 million, the former 50-year-old prison has been converted into a medium security facility for "community correction failures" who stay for a short time before returning to their homes.

"No one has left us, we have had no

problems with our security system," May said.

About 190 prison employees, including a custody staff of 118 officers, help run the correctional facility.

The facility is beginning to plan programs that will involve offenders in academic and vocational programs, May said. All of the programming takes place within the fenced area, he added.

Volunteers have scheduled special events which include a film on astrology from Cranbrook Institute and activities from Greenfield Village.

The correctional facility will eventually hold a maximum of 320 inmates from five counties, including Wayne, Washtenaw, Macomb, Monroe and Oakland.

## Weed ordinance scheduled for trustee discussion

The Northville Township Board of Trustees will discuss whether to institute a weed control ordinance at its meeting at 8 p.m. tomorrow at township hall.

The issue first came up last summer when residents of Rippling Lane and Highland Lakes Condominium Association disagreed about the plant growth behind some homes on Rippling Lane that was condominium property.

However, the dispute apparently has been settled, according to Irving Benson, secretary of the condominium association.

"It's all been resolved," Benson said. "We sent out a letter and 75 percent of the Rippling Lane residents agreed to it."

The association forwarded a letter to the township building department describing the agreement. The condominium association has cleared two paths to Silver Spring Lake for Rippling Lane residents and will keep the pathways clear of weeds. The rest of the area will remain natural.

"I'd be surprised if they (the trustees) pass a weed ordinance," stated Troy Milligan, township building inspector. "It would be difficult, unless the ordinance was subdivision by subdivision."

Township Supervisor Donald Thomson had noted previously that a weed ordinance, like other township ordinances, would be difficult to enforce because the township lacked an ordinance officer.

### Church hosts voter meeting to explain issues

What does the Tisch tax plan really promise? What would the Smith-Bullard proposal do? What exactly is Governor William Milliken's 'compromise' tax proposal?

Representatives of all three plans will appear for a panel discussion in Novi at 7:30 p.m. next Tuesday.

Sponsored by the Novi Faith Community United Presbyterian Church, the meeting will be held at the Holy Family Catholic Church, 24505 Meadowbrook, Novi.

Each speaker will have 10 minutes to present the basic points of each proposal. The audience will then have the opportunity to ask written questions of all three panelists. The meeting is free and open to the public.

Each proposal could have a great impact on property owners, school systems and consumers in the state, according to church spokespersons. They briefly described what the tax proposals are:

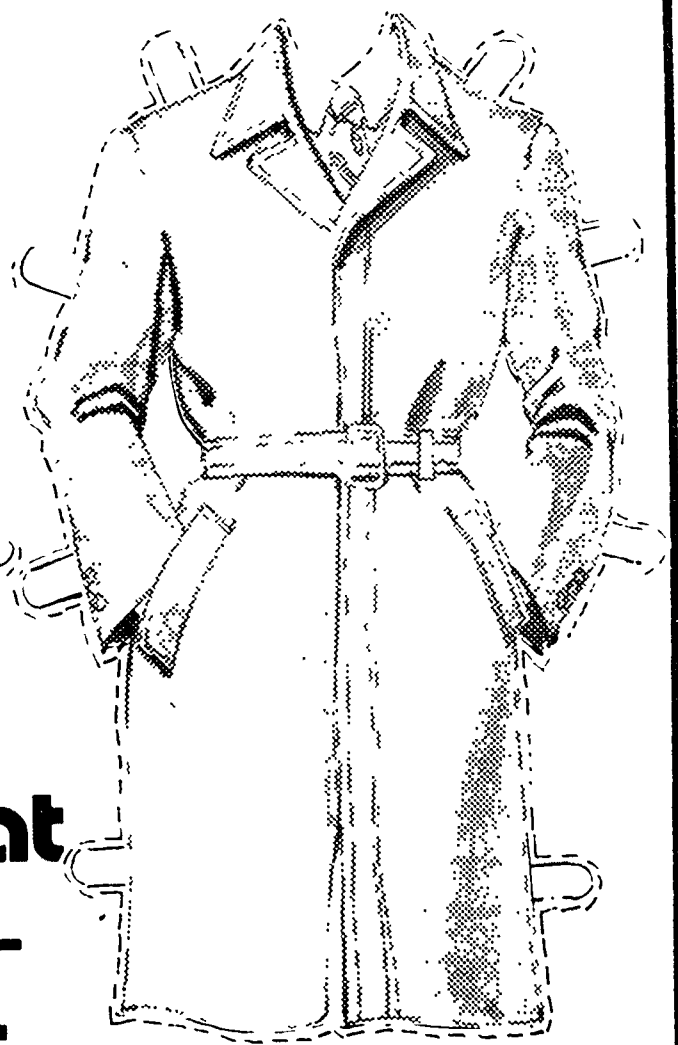
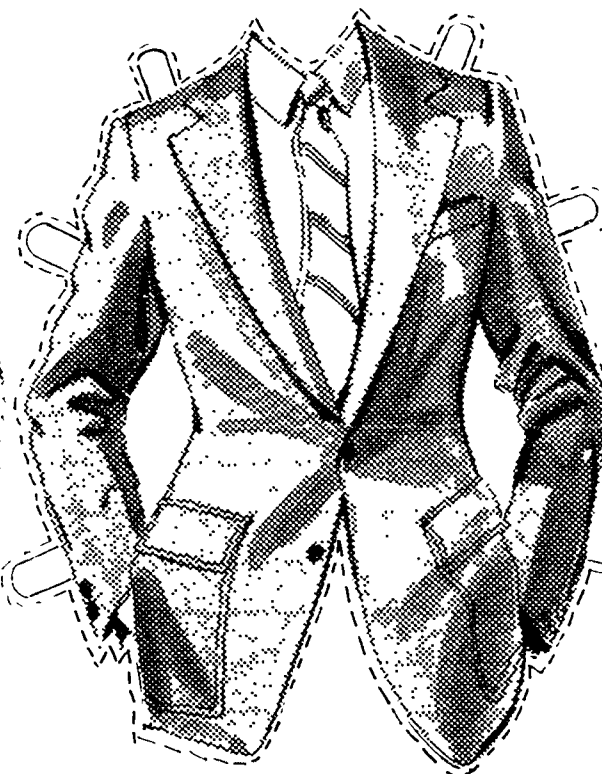
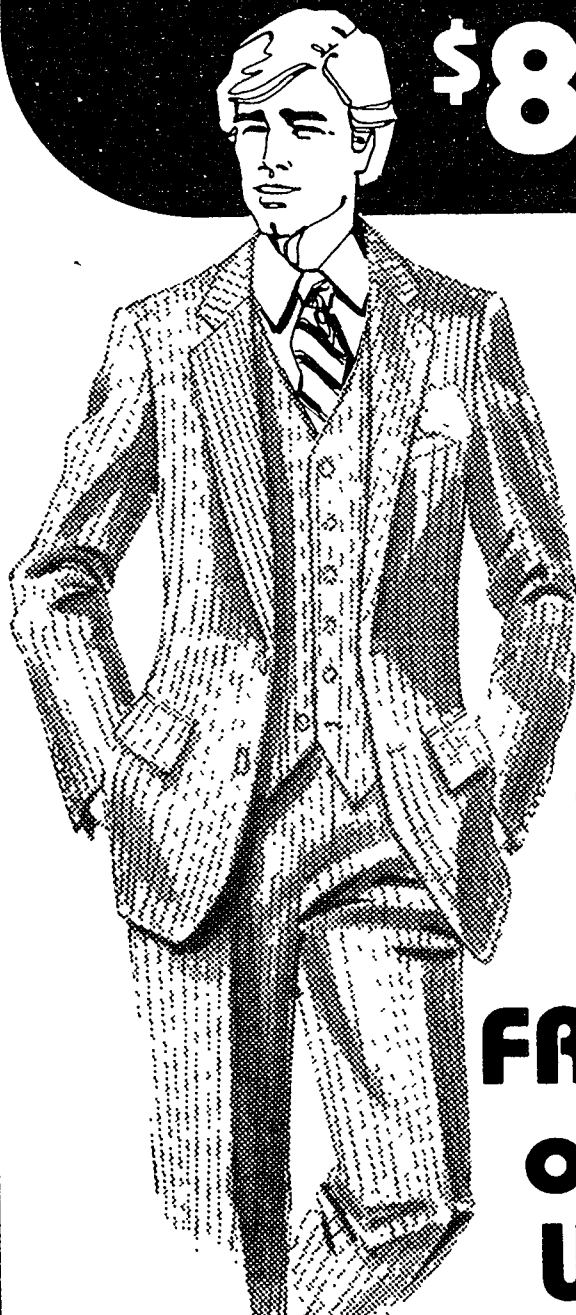
— Proposal D: "The Tisch tax plan, which would roll back assessed property values to 1978 levels, then cut by half. This would result in approximately a 60 percent decrease in

property taxes. The state would be required to make up some of the lost local revenue to each community, but could not levy any new taxes without 60 percent voter approval. Opponents say passage of Tisch would spell disaster for state government, but sponsors say the state government could cut off some fat.

— Proposal A: "The Smith-Bullard plan would remove that part of agriculture and property taxes that pays for local school operating costs. Property taxes would be lower, but the state would be required to enact new taxes to pay for school system costs. Opponents say the net result would be increased overall taxes. But sponsors argue that the advantage is an eventual equality in educational opportunity throughout the state.

— Proposal C: "Governor William Milliken's plan would exempt the first \$7,100 of a home's value from property taxes, then replace the lost revenue by increasing the state sales tax to 5.5 percent. Opponents fear the increased sales tax would hurt business. Proponents say that Michigan homeowners would benefit from the small property tax savings."

# Waterford Pond clean up is laborious and expensive

"We're asking the clean-up crew and residents to notify us if they find any dead fowl," said a district biologist.

Birds are in their migrating cycle and duck hunting season began Saturday, said Dick Elden, a district biologist for Michigan DNR. "Mostly big migrations don't stop at small ponds," Elden said. "We're hoping we've scared most of them away so hopefully none of them will stop here."

"There might be a potential problem with ducks seeking shelter at the pond to escape the hunters," said Tim Jaski, a water quality control specialist with the state. "But with all the clean up

activity here, we won't get a whole lot of visitation."

Aquatic life showed no signs of damage, Jaski said. The water control specialist said a heavier concentration of oil was in lily pads and cattails, but those would grow back next year "as good as ever." However, one federal wildlife biologist said there were several dead muskrats by the pond shoreline.

"It's too soon to tell how long the clean up will take," said Elden. "If we're lucky, maybe two weeks."

Environmental officials said the pond could be recovered. Although northern winds blew much of the oil towards a shoreline where it could be mopped up

easily, some remains in the cattails in the middle of the pond.

"That has to be cleaned out by hand," Jaski said. "The cattails have to be cut and the oil mopped up with absorbent pads."

"A slight amount got into Phoenix Lake," Jaski said. "Less than 10 gallons of it, if that. We caught most of it by the dam and quiet streams."

Volunteers from Greenpeace, the Michigan Duck Hunter's Association and the Dearborn Naturalists Association were at the pond assisting with cleaning the fowl. Other volunteers walked into the Pontiac Humane Shelter and offered to help, said Dr. Wojciechowski.

"Considering the conditions, we really appreciated all the volunteer help," said Hutchinson. If you want to contribute hay, straw or feed, call the shelter at 1-646-6110. Residents who find wildlife in distress should call the shelter.

Dean, the attorney for the oil company, said it was "difficult to estimate on a difficult job like this" how much the clean up cost would be.

"We're trying to find out how long and expensive it will be," he said. "We're cooperating in every way we can with the environmental agencies."

Bob Williams, supervisor of the crew from the waste disposal company, said

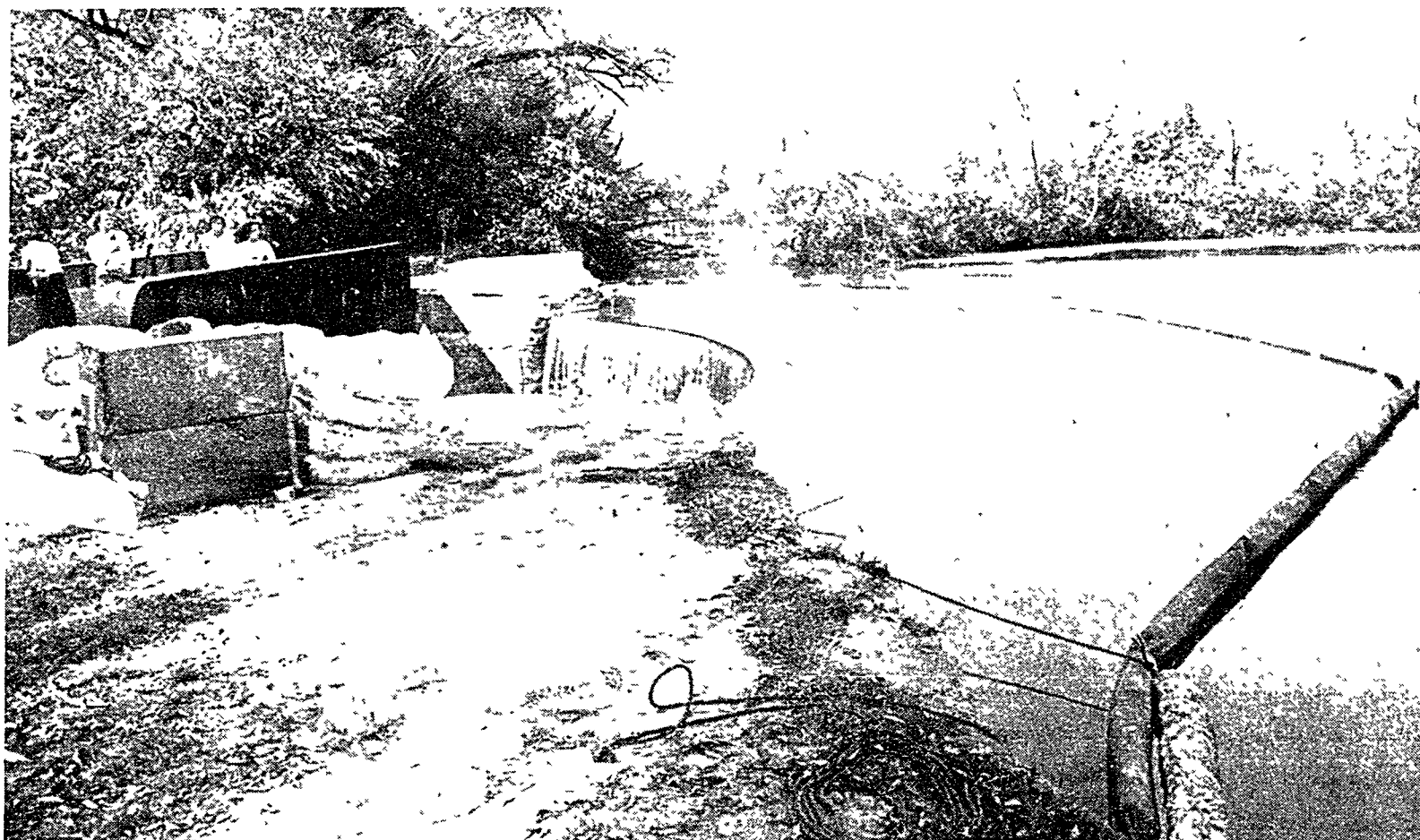
it would take three weeks and \$100,000 for mopping up the oil alone.

The DNR is pursuing the spill as a criminal investigation, Hutchinson said. The investigative agency can switch to a civil case if not enough substantive evidence is obtained from a criminal investigation.

Under the criminal penalty section of Act 245 (which prohibits the polluting of ground and surface waters), a

minimum penalty of \$2,500 to a maximum of \$20,000 per day could be charged. A civil penalty could cost an offender \$10,000 per day.

Currently, there are no provisions for jailing people under Act 245, Hutchinson said. However, a corporation, a responsible employee of the corporation, or an individual outside the corporation could be arrested for violating the act, he said.

## Property tax cut recommended in Oakland

A recommendation to reduce the Oakland County property tax rate from 4.90 mills to 4.7031 mills was submitted to commissioners last week by Daniel T. Murphy, county executive.

Residents in the City of Northville north of Baseline and between Beck and Novi roads are in Oakland County.

Murphy suggested the cut in the proposed 1981 county budget, which must be approved by the beginning of the county's fiscal year, January 1.

The anticipated expenditure level of the 1981 county budget is set at \$96,258,340.

"The modest tax cut I am proposing continues a trend started last year," Murphy said. At that time the county cut the rate from 5.01 to 4.90 mills.

"The cut is made possible by the Headlee Amendment and by the Tax Reduction Fund we established earlier this year," he said. "This cut will enable us to meet the obligations forced upon us by state and federal law, and will not require us to lay off workers or cut services which the citizens have requested."

"Also," Murphy added, "we have held the budget increase to 10.5 percent, compared to an inflation rate of 11.3 percent. To stay below the inflation rate, we have to cut 113 positions from initial budget requests."

Murphy said the only new positions in the budget are three required by the Michigan Legislature's action creating a new District Court Judge for the First Division of the 52nd District.

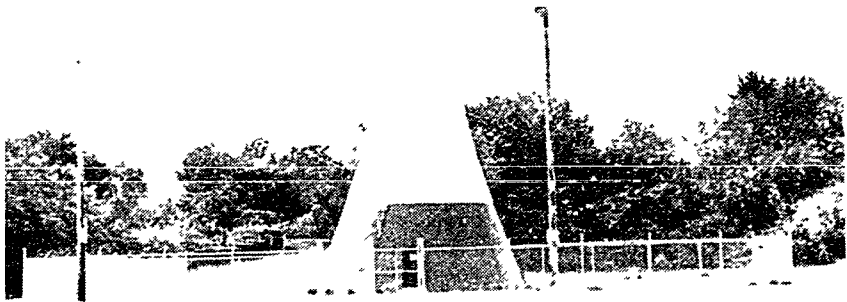
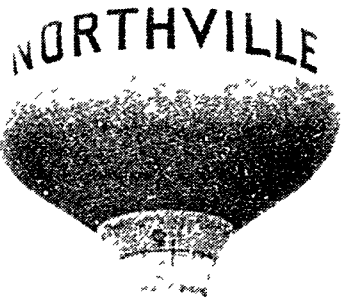

## Our Opinions



### Hurrah for students

Yeah, Mustangs! Northville High School looks great this fall, and there's a feeling of pride emerging that reflects well on students, school system and community.

From classroom and corridors, to the gymnasium and pool areas the school has been refurbished during the past year and students have been "protecting" the new look by policing their classmates — at least that's the word that's coming out. Whatever, with cooperation of school administration and staffs, of band and booster groups, and, most of all, of students good things are happening.

The water tower, usually a first target for graffiti, now is freshly painted in the school colors of orange, black and white — and is without blemish. The paint job was a project of Pep Club with paint purchased by the high school athletic department. Students, Assistant Principal Ralph Redmond confirms, put in a good number of hours on the project after getting city permission. It all was done without fanfare.

Homecoming on October 17 should be a good time for returning students as well as the community to be aware that there is a "new look" in which all can take pride.

### Cooperation is needed

Vigilance is needed, Northville City Council commented Monday night as Mayor Paul Vernon reported that our neighboring City of Novi is considering adopting a new master plan revising present zoning of property at Eight Mile and Griswold for a convenience shopping center. On behalf of the city Vernon spoke at a Novi hearing against the rezoning — which appears to be in the offing because a developer is proposing an impressive plan for the property.

Vigilance and cooperation both are needed for communities to grow wisely and avoid becoming "commercial jungles" — a term used appropriately at Monday's council session. Borders of communities are vulnerable areas because, no matter how carefully a governmental unit may plan, its work can be undone by the city next door.

Novi already has extensive commercial areas at Ten Mile and Meadowbrook. Eight Mile and Haggerty is destined for like development. At the edge of Novi

on Novi Road at Allen Drive is a Northville convenience center. Residents of Country Place condominiums adjacent to the proposed site, Vernon reported, spoke against commercial development, stating they already have shopping near and that they also use Northville's downtown.

A public hearing to consider the adoption of the new master plan for Novi is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. October 22 at Novi Middle School. Vernon is hoping that Novi will take an area-wide view, looking at adjacent Northville and Northville Township's growth plans. He's asking the township also to take part in the discussion.

"We should all work toward consolidation of our planning efforts in the future so that total community development will be reasonably consistent with our mutual goals," he stated. We couldn't say it better. Good area-wide planning and continuing vigilance are necessary to preserve the pleasant country living residents moved here to enjoy.

Pet owners also find a wide variety of activities to participate in with their pets. Dog owners can enjoy training, showing, hunting, chasing sticks or Frisbees, swimming, walking and all sorts of other activities.

Cat owners can show their animals or just enjoy them stalking around the yard, or sitting in their laps when reading or watching TV.

Nine times out of 10 pet owners are not as healthy as non-pet owners, but this is usually due to neglect on the owners' part to do something about their pets' health and welfare.

Since animals are unable to communicate their discomforts, pet owners either have to learn to detect symptoms of illness themselves, or avoid pet diseases by seeing to it that their pets are properly vaccinated, cleaned and groomed regularly.

Providing fresh water and a clean place for a pet to sleep, properly exercising the pet so it doesn't get bored and roam the neighborhood where it could be exposed to rabid animals and maintaining a proper diet not only benefit the animal, but also protect the owner's health.

Pets that are not properly cared for develop common problems, some of which are transmitted to their owners. Animal hair irritates sinuses. Many people are allergic to animal fur.

One way to prevent or alleviate this problem is to diligently vacuum and brush the furniture, the

Animals also offer companionship to people, especially the elderly and those living alone. They are always there waiting at the end of the day.

Take a minute and think how much enjoyment your pets give you and make sure you are providing them with the things they need for an enjoyable life.

Then, there is the threat of the favorite family pet catching ticks or fleas. These common pests linger in the house and can be impossible to get rid of.

The little parasites jump off the cat's or dog's bodies and nest in furniture, rugs, clothes and are even transmitted to the owners. Fleas and ticks also cause skin irritations and rashes which are uncomfortable and hard to get rid of.

A legitimate warning that pregnant women should heed is to avoid cleaning cat litter because it can contain the eggs of the parasite causing toxoplasmosis—a disease which can produce birth defects.

In the long run, the fact that pet owners aren't as healthy as non-pet owners depends on the care owners give their pets.

# Geake agrees with citizen on need for fiscal reform

To the Editor:

This is a copy of a letter being sent to Neil Winters in reply to his open letter to me.

Dear Neil, thank you for your letter last week urging greater fiscal responsibility on the part of the Michigan Legislature. Although you kindly indicated that you did not require a reply, I am writing this because your thoughtful letter deserves an answer and also because, as The Record noted editorially, the frustration and despair you expressed is shared by a large number of people today.

I certainly agree with you that the current recession with the corresponding reduction in state revenues provides an unprecedented opportunity for eliminating unwanted and unneeded state programs. Thus we have been able to get rid of the mandatory school breakfast program, reduce general assistance (welfare) payments by 15 percent, and cut back the entire state budget by 10 percent.

Most of the new programs which have expanded the state bureaucracy during the eight years I have been representing you in Lansing were introduced and voted into law by the majority (Democratic) party members and opposed by Republicans.

This is why I am bothered by the tendency expressed by you and so many others to "vote against every incumbent running for office." Although I am not on the ballot for re-election this year, many capable incumbents are. Many of the men and women who represent and vote for

exactly the responsible fiscal policies you demand are standing for re-election this year. The problem is that they are still in the minority.

Clearly, things will never get better until the voters learn to distinguish between public officials who support their views and those who do not. Keeping good people in government is just as important as throwing the bad ones out.

In specific response to the points in your letter, as your representative in the State Senate:

1. I have not voted for, nor do I plan to vote for, increased taxes on liquor or cigarettes.

2. I have not voted for, nor do I plan to vote for, increased taxes on capital gains.

3. I have not voted for, nor do I plan to vote for, an increase in the state sales tax or the personal income tax.

4. I have not voted for, nor do I plan to vote for, any tax increases at all now, or in the foreseeable future.

The Michigan Legislature has now recessed for the coming election. You have seen all of the fiscal responsibility (or lack of it) that you are going to see before you have to go to vote on November 4. At that time it will be up to you and the other citizens of our community and our state to decide which public officials you want to keep and which you want to replace.

Choose carefully, for it has been rightly said that in a democracy we all get the kind of government we deserve.

## Weed ordinance not necessary

To the Editor:

The proposed "Weed Control Ordinance" (for Northville township) can be expected to provide only trivial benefits at substantial costs unjustly assessed.

It would provide improved view of a lake owned by someone else at the expense of the owner rather than the viewer. My view of the lake is blocked by new houses; shall we have an ordinance for their removal?

Hay fever relief seems implied by ragweed removal. Not so. 1. Ragweed pollen is carried great distances, say 25 miles, so local removal can not be expected to give much benefit. 2. Hay fever patients are often allergic to more than one kind of pollen. Grasses, trees and roses are frequent offenders. The ordinance ignores them; its aim is cosmetic not health.

One man's weed is another man's cherished bit of nature. The red sumac, nominated for extinction, brightens my scenery in autumn, filters the noise of road and neighbors in summer, and in winter helps shield my evergreens from

wind and salt spray from the road.

Besides the poorly chosen specific victims, the ordinance proposes unselective environmental denaturation, permitting nothing to grow above 12 inches. That would take out the wild raspberries and gooseberries from which my wife makes jam that I enjoy — and the big daisies that decorate our table. No new trees could grow up to replace losses or give firewood. But where trees already have grown and made mowing impractical, the choice becomes bulldozing or weed-killers; "Agent Orange," suspected birth defect inducer — an unwise requirement in a community with women of childbearing age.

The dubious benefits would go almost only to the bulldozer and sod folks. Since parks and farms would be exempt, the costs would be borne almost exclusively by people who live in Northville rather than Detroit precisely to have a big lot on which to get a little closer to nature — or because they have grown old living here and may be too old to cut weeds. Thus, the proposed ordinance is unfair as well as unwise, and that flagrant discrimination is making some of us natives very restless tonight.

# State Legislature recesses; budget not accepted

The legislature recessed until after the November general election with election year pressures causing postponement of a full-year budget for fiscal 1980-81.

The state began its new fiscal year October 1 with only a 90-day continuation budget which will allow for current spending for the first quarter less approximately 10 percent.

The continuation budget in effect hands over virtually all authority to spend about \$1.1 billion during the period to the Milliken administration.

Governor William G. Milliken agreed to a continuation budget after meeting with legislative leaders who told him Republicans — members of his own party — simply would not support the revenue measures he endorsed in order to fund his \$4.7 billion general fund spending recommendations for the new fiscal year.

The decision of not writing a budget forced Management and Budget Director Gerald Miller to scrap plans to go to New York to get approval from bonding houses to borrow \$500 million in short term notes to cover early cash disbursements, such as school aid and revenue sharing payments to units of local governments.

Without the completion of the full year's budget, a bond for the short term money was impossible to obtain.

Instead, the state will borrow from pension funds, probably around \$100 million to make the first payments.

Milliken called the continuation budget an unprecedented action, saying other failed attempts to approve budgets were solved with temporary

authorizations of not more than several weeks.

"It means the legislature will have given the executive the unprecedented authority to further reduce spending. 'We're going to see more drastic cuts, and they're going to be tough,'" he said not elaborating where the cuts will be made.

While the continuation budget proposed to simply appropriate a bulk amount of money without specific authorization for specific programs, the measure creates a new special legislative committee to confer continuously with the budget director on allotments.

The bill also directs the budget director to meet weekly with the House and Senate appropriations and taxation committees.

Capital outlay projects would be continued, but no new projects would be started.

The upcoming election was a factor in the failure to get a full-year budget, Milliken said. He added the uncertainty about the economic situation was another factor.

Although the department of management and budget and legislative fiscal agencies estimate the deepest of the recession has passed, some are worried another downturn would occur.

Others hope revenue estimates will have increased enough by the time a full-year budget is approved so the proposed revenue measures will not be needed.

The governor and leaders have agreed to add \$125-160 million in revenues through new lottery games,

higher cigarette taxes, revised controls on liquor prices and new taxes on military pay and capital gains.

Before leaving for the fall recess, members of the Senate took a parting shot at the House of Representatives for not completing the budget. They complained also about turning over their powers of appropriating money to the executive.

Interestingly, though, no member of

the Senate is up for re-election this year as they are in the middle of four-year terms.

## Bills contain more than water charge

explains. In effect, it places the cost of the system in the middle bracket.

Walters took a typical family of five's bill (family with three children) and broke down the monthly cost. The bill for a two-month service period for 30,000 gallons would be about \$35.80 for water and a like amount for sewer.

Walters commented that sewer charges usually are within a dollar of the water charge.

The water cost in terms of each dollar charged is broken down at 39.6 cents to Detroit for the supply; 4.7 cents for local system utilities (electric costs to operate); 21.4 cents for local system repairs and maintenance; 20.6 cents for capital improvements and major repair service; 6.6 cents for billing and record keeping; and 7.1 cents for water bond debt service.

"In other words," he told council, "the city pays Detroit 39.6 cents out of every water dollar to furnish water at our city limits, and spends the remaining 60.4 cents to operate and maintain the local water distribution system."

The percent increase from what the basic water cost from Detroit, therefore, for a family is a 326 percent increase. For such industry as Ford Valve plant, Walters computed, it is 378 percent.

Because the six bills sent out yearly include all costs of the system, there is a visible difference. The city council also has provided for creation of a surplus (\$51,900) to provide for such emergencies as a main collapse.

In the township Mosher also pointed out that a reserve was begun several years ago upon his recommendation, noting that the township's current water and sewer restricted fund now is over \$1 million.

"But it will melt like snow in spring," he declared, "when we get into the Super Sewer."

Most of the township's water users are in newer subdivisions where developers bore the cost of installing water and sewer. The only old development to which the township supplied water was Park Gardens where wells had gone bad, he said.

Township water bills also go out every other month. They include a \$2 per month service charge.

## Hills are alive

## Autumn paints countryside with color

The bright red, yellow and purple hues of autumn draw many people like a magnet to the highways and byways at this time of year. The average lower Michigan resident dreams of a trip "up north" where he or she can be dazzled by the jewel-like tones of the forests as fall turns inevitably to winter.

But, if you reside in this area you are among those blessed with being able to take a beautiful color tour within a 25-30 mile radius of home.

Take time this weekend to get out and look around and store up enough memories to last until next year's nature extravaganza.

Color in the Huron-Clinton Metroparks that serve Oakland, Livingston, Washtenaw, Wayne and Macomb counties is expected to be at its peak by October 12 and we're lucky to be located right in the middle of that lovely area.

We recommend that you begin and end your tour by visiting Kensington Metro Park located off I-96, just west of New Hudson.

Begin there by picking up a metro

park map at the main information booth, and there to watch the wild deer feeding at various park areas.

The map shows all the "little and big" roads in an area as far northeast as Port Huron and as far southwest as Tecumseh.

In addition, the map has detailed insets of each park in the 'metro' system, showing the layout of the park roads, many hiking trails and descriptions of facilities.

You could easily pack a picnic lunch and spend the day at Kensington, investigating the various picnic areas, most of which have walking trails along the lake or through the woods.

In addition, to the gorgeous color provided by sumac, Virginia creeper, dogwood, sassafras, aspen, oak and ash, there are plenty of spots that offer panoramic views of the colorful sailboats that inhabit the lake each weekend.

Get out on the water yourself by taking a leisurely ride on the Island Queen which departs every hour from noon to 6 p.m., Saturdays and Sundays, from the boat rental dock on park road two.

Of course, you may want to take a hike at the nature center, after you stop to feed the Canada geese and the swans. Take the trail around Wildwing Lake. It's lengthy, but interesting, and offers several overlook points that give the hiker a real expanse of color viewing.

Time the end of the day at the park so that you'll be going south down park road two just at sunset. Turn into the winter sports area and drive slowly around the traffic circle, stopping long enough to watch the family of deer which graze there nearly every day just as the sun goes down.

Continue on down road two, slowly, keeping a close watch for deer because

they are there in abundance. They are also easier to spot now that the tree foliage is less dense. There's another popular grazing spot across from the Baywoods picnic area where a whole herd can often be seen munching grass.

If you want to see more deer, turn right on park road three which deadends at the Spring Hill area and drive back slowly, keeping a lookout along the hills and valleys to the north.

Should you not wish to spend the day at the park, you might just drive through, stop at the overlook opposite the park office on the north edge of the park for a beautiful view southward.

Proceed to Buno and go west to

Labadie. It takes you north for a mile or so through rugged, tree-thick country to the south side of the General Motors Proving Grounds, one of the highest spots in this part of Michigan.

Turn west along Stobart and wind your way south along Kensington Road to the high point just north of Buno. Pull off the road for a short time and enjoy the panoramic view which extends south, east and west for miles.

Turn west on Spencer, cross the US-23 freeway to old US-23 (Whitmore Lake Road). Here you can choose to go north to tour Parshallville with its quaint water-powered grist and cider mill or south to the scenic recreation areas south of Brighton.

If you go north to Parshallville, continue on Linden to Fausett and cross over the freeway again on Fausett. Do a little jog north on Hartland Road and turn east on Germany to Tipsico Lake Road. It's, beautiful, wild country through there with a winding route around several small lakes before the road brings you back eventually to M-59. From here you can go west back to the US-23 freeway or just keep wandering slowly southward along Pleasant Valley Road back to the I-96 freeway.

Should you opt for the southern route at the Old US-23 and Spencer intersection, follow Spencer west into downtown Brighton. At the main traffic light in Brighton go west along Brighton Road toward Chilson, but turn south on Bauer, about two miles out of Brighton.

Bauer provides a winding route to Bishop Lake Road and the Brighton State Recreation Area. Just after you turn west on Bishop, watch for a turnoff on the right. There's a nice pond here where the reds and yellows of autumn are reflected for perfect color slides.

Wander through the area until you pick up Chilson south to Winans Lake Road. This is a beautiful area featuring large new homes and scenic viewing spots where you can get out and look or just enjoy the color as you drive through.

Winans Lake Road takes you back east to the US-23 freeway and home or you can pick up winding M-36 west for a drive to the Pinckney Recreation Area. If you take the westward route, be sure to take Livingston County Road D-32 from Gregory to Pinckney through Hell.

This rugged stretch is short but

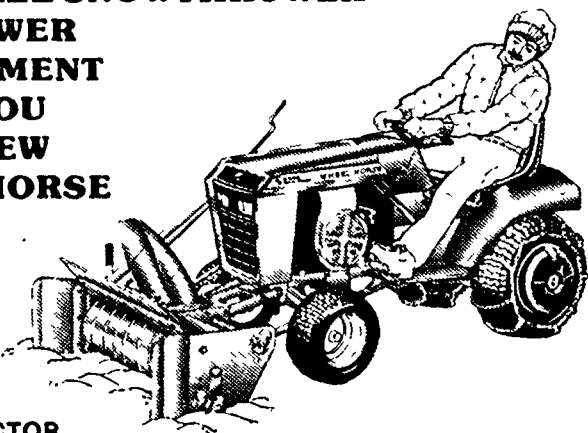

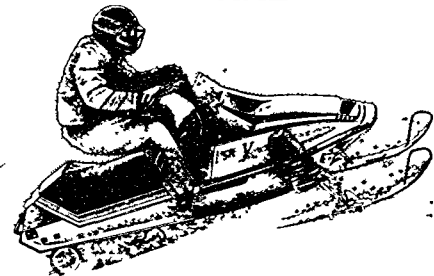

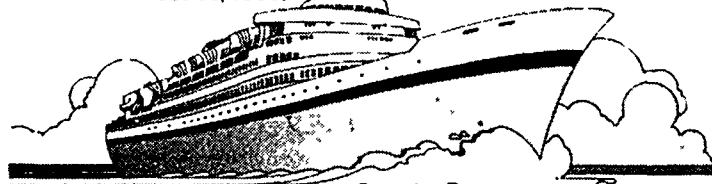

plentifully supplied with good vistas.

If you're still not tired of drinking in color and storing it in memory or camera for winter enjoyment, take the Dexter-Pinckney Road to Hudson Mills Metropark.

It's definitely time to stretch your legs here and get closer to the color.

Color begins early here with red and orange flowering dogwood, staghorn sumac and red maple. Bitternut hickory and elm provide early yellow hues and the deep color of red oaks and purplish white oaks are bright here until late October.

You should walk the Acorn Nature Trail in this peaceful park to enjoy the area to the fullest.

On the way home, follow Huron River Drive through Dexter-Huron and Delhi metroparks back to Ann Arbor and the freeway system or cover the area as I like to by turning left, then right along the interesting roads until you are either hopelessly lost or near enough to home territory that you can smell it.

Remember, with a metroparks map, you will be able to choose the right route even in unfamiliar territory since all the roads are listed.

Whether you try these routes, or take some old favorites of your own, don't miss the opportunity to view Oakland and Livingston and Washtenaw counties now in their most beautiful dress.

# Mustangs crack Canton wishbone, 21-0

*'Defense was the name of the game' — Colligan*

A new "Orange Crush" defense has emerged.

But this time the stinging defensive unit has no connection with the Denver Broncos of professional football.

The Mustang defense resembled the stubborn, sticking tacklers of the Broncos Saturday night completely shutting off Plymouth Canton's offense in a 21-0 Western Six Conference win — Northville's second league triumph in three outings.

The hungry Northville gridders ruined Canton's homecoming, crushing the highly-touted wishbone offense before it could get started.

The fired-up defenders allowed only 68 yards rushing and 17 yards passing.

The closest Canton came to the end zone was a drive which went to the 25-yard-line of Northville. And that came when the Mustang reserves got some playing time in the fourth quarter.

"Defense was the name of the game," said Mustang coach Dennis Colligan. "I really was thrilled with the defense."

"(Junior defensive tackle) Vince Candela did a super job for us and (Dave) Ward and (John) Ackley as defensive ends did an exceptional job containing the quarterback," Colligan praised. "If the defense continues to play like they did Saturday we will hold our own in every ball game."

The Mustang offensive unit, though it didn't gain impressive yardage, also demonstrated some talent.

Northville was stopped the first time it got the ball, but following a Canton

fumble on the 30-yard line, recovered by Dave Greer — Mustang quarterback who doubles as defensive back — the Mustangs scored their first touchdown.

Greer scampered around end on the option and went 10 yards for the TD.

Northville's second touchdown also was scored just after a Canton fumble.

Canton coughed up the pigskin near the 30-yard line and the Mustangs pounced on it. Four plays later Greer connected on a 23-yard toss to senior Brian Pratt to put Northville up 13-0 at the half.

"Three Canton defenders followed the main receiver (Dave) Ward into the end zone leaving Pratt open," Colligan explained. "It was an alert play by both Greer and Pratt."

The "Orange Crush" defense held Canton again in the first half, forcing another turnover, Mustang Joe Millen recovering on the five-yard line.

Fullback Bob Thomson burst through the line on a dive for Northville's third touchdown.

The Mustangs went for the two-point conversion to make up for the extra point missed in the first half, Scott Spaman scoring on the option.

Colligan substituted freely in the fourth quarter and praised his reserves' performance.

"They really did a nice job holding them," he praised. "We got a lot of kids in and had a chance to watch some of them under game conditions. I wanted to win this one big to give the team a confidence boost and it worked out well."

Mott golfers burned up the fairways in their triumph over Northville with scores of 36, 37, 38, 39 and 44.

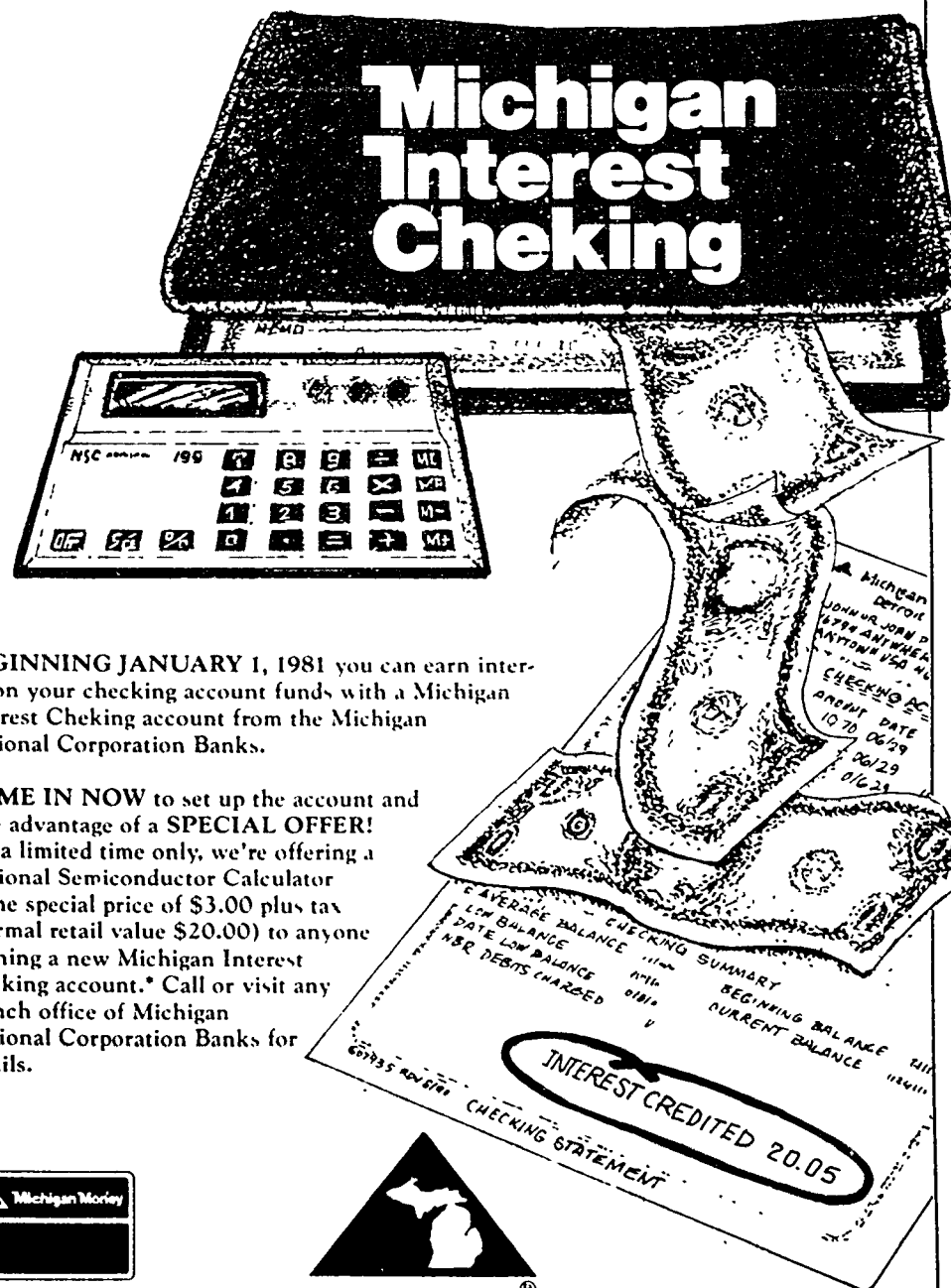

The varsity will travel to Mott for a 7:30 p.m. contest Friday.

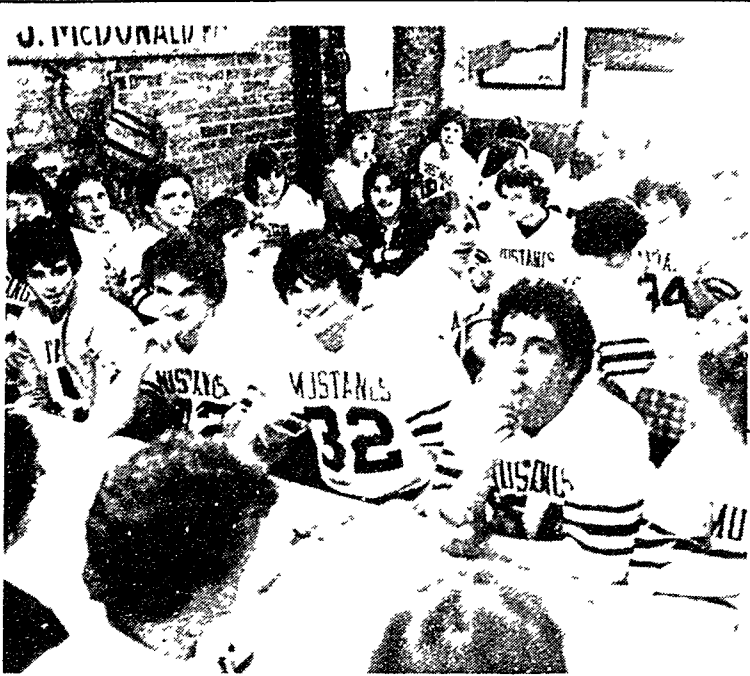

Five contestants missed only seven games, while 10 others missed eight.

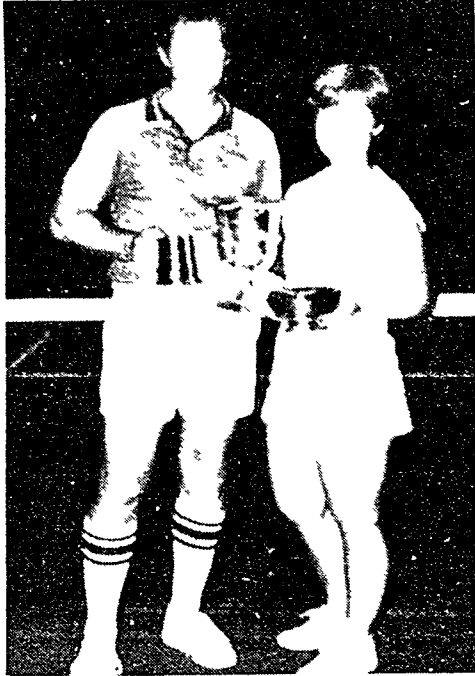
