Students pick Reagan for president

Anderson takes second on ballot ahead of Carter

While Northville voters stood in line yesterday waiting to cast their ballots for their favorite or not-so-favorite candidate, Cooke and Meads Mill junior high students were celebrating the victory of their candidate — Ronald Reagan.

Reagan was the top vote-getter in straw vote elections held at both junior highs, with John Anderson coming in second. President Carter proved to be the underdog with the fewest number of votes in both elections.

Students at both junior high schools have spent the past few weeks vigorously campaigning. Posters and bumper stickers line the walls, buttons can be seen on sweaters and jackets and display cases are jammed with campaign paraphernalia.

Cooke's registered student voters cast their ballots on October 31. The school held registration earlier in the month and only those registered were permitted to vote.

Under the direction of social studies teacher Cy Nichols and other members of the social studies department, the school was divided into four precincts.

According to Nichols, the eighth graders had the largest number of registered voters with the ninth graders having the "poorest representation."

Approximately 70 percent of the Cooke student body voted last

Friday. Of that 70 percent, 56.4 percent cast their vote for Reagan with Anderson taking 36.2 percent.

Only seven percent of the votes cast were for President Carter.

According to Nichols, more than half of the students vote as a reflection of their parents.

However, he said most of the students are aware of the issues and understand the party platforms.

He noted that one of the most unusual aspects of Cooke's Election '80 took place in the third precinct.

Of the 90 voters in that

precinct, no one cast a vote for Carter and Reagan and Anderson tied.

Approximately 60 percent of the Cooke students also voted in favor of Proposal B — which would lower the legal drinking age to 19.

Students at Meads Mill cast their ballots Monday during class. Under the direction of the social studies department and its chairperson Brenda Irish, a punch card ballot system was set-up for the election.

The results of the Meads Mill election were similar to the election at Cooke. Reagan captured

the lead with 250 votes, Anderson took second with 126 votes and Carter trailed at the end with 81.

However, Carter was not the lowest vote-getter at Meads Mill. Former President Richard Nixon received one write-in vote.

The Meads Mill students also voted for a Second District Congressional candidate. Republican incumbent Carl Pursell proved to be the favorite capturing 315 votes. His Democrat challenger Kathleen O'Reilly received 108 votes.

Rezoning may get occupant for 'Friendly'

As Northville City Council Monday approved rezoning of property on North Center to Central Business District (CBD), it apparently paved the way for a new occupant for the vacant Friendly Ice Cream building at 331 North Center.

Four Livonia physicians, council was told, are planning to open an obstetric and gynecology clinic there after making substantial renovations to the building. Purchase, however, hinged upon the CBD rezoning which would permit such use.

The General Commercial District (GCD) zoning that is being changed did not.

The applicants were told by the council that the city has been about to place a lien on the property as the required acceleration and deceleration lanes never had been installed at the driveway.

City Manager Steven Walters said installation of Randolph Drain initially had been the cause for the delay, but that later the firm had been in financial difficulty.

After he estimated cost for the curb cut between \$1,500 and \$3,000, Stuart Tompkins, attorney representing the physicians, said that should present no problem.

The public hearing held for the rezoning to CBD included two segments that would have contained businesses with nonconforming use. The CBD zoning would make the gas station at Main and Wing and the funeral home on Dunlap nonconforming.

Ray J. Casterline II stated he objected to any change that would make his business nonconforming as it was pointed out that a business then could not expand or, in case of fire, could not rebuild.

Casterline emphasized that his business is a third-generation one in the community and that he has no objection to any progress except that he does not want the nonconforming use designation.

In the motion made by Councilman J. Burton DeRusha following the public hearing, property bounded by Randolph, Center, Dunlap and Wing (including the clock shop, funeral home and American Legion post) and another block bounded by Main, Wing, Dunlap and High (including the gas station)

were omitted from the recommendation.

Mayor Paul Vernon commented that by referring this property back to the planning commission, council was not ruling out changes in the future. The planners originally recommended the CBD zoning as Consultant Ronald Nino felt it made more acceptable use of the property.

At present, the omitted lots remain GCD.

Council during discussion wondered if there had been consideration by the planners of a Professional, Business, Office (PBO) zoning for the lots on Wing from Main to Dunlap. Most still are homes occupied as residences.

Council member Stanley Johnston noted that parking could be a problem as the houses cover most of the lots.

With the deletions, the motion to rezone the rest of the property in the public hearing along South Center from Randolph to Rayson on the east side and to the Lake intersection on the west to CBD passed unanimously.

In other action council approved the contract with the University of Michigan for a master plan update at a cost of \$4,000. It is to be done by graduate students in the school of urban planning.

Council also voted to request the planning commission to hold a public hearing to rezone the north 259 feet of the scout building property on Cady which is to be occupied by McNally-Lincoln Engineers who will conduct private business there as well as the city's engineering. Rezoning from R1-B residential to Professional, Business, Office is recommended by council.

Walters told council that the new zoning would be a straight-forward approach to the new situation, which is a use combining public and private office operation.

Councilmembers questioned whether the rear portion of the lot, not included in the recommendation, would not be in effect "landlocked" if it remained a residential buffer.

Walters said it would not as the city owns the front access portion.

Repairs for a retaining wall on North Center (constructed by the city when

Unable to progress

Absenteeism snags township groups

A review of Northville Township records shows absenteeism on boards and commissions to be an annoyance to other members and a hindrance to the groups' effectiveness.

A review of minutes for one year for the township Economic Development

Corporation (EDC), Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA), Planning Commission and Board of Trustees shows few meetings with attendance by all members.

In a letter to members last April, EDC chairman Larry Sheehan noted: "no meeting due to lack of quorum present...unable to conduct any business, thus the revised bylaws and nomination and election of a Treasurer not approved."

Sheehan urged members to attend the next EDC meeting, and the following month, six of the nine members attended. At the most recent EDC meeting, however, there was lack of a quorum again.

The November 14, 1979 minutes of the EDC read: "Larry Sheehan waited until 8:15 p.m. for other members of the EDC to attend. As no one else attended, Sheehan welcomed Dolores Field, the new and only other member in attendance and updated her on two items the EDC was involved with."

A meeting was scheduled six days later, November 20, 1979. Sheehan wrote in those minutes: "Our effectiveness as a community was foiled once again by lack of attendance to

comprise a quorum."

Two EDC members resigned last year, another submitted his resignation last week. The EDC has nine members.

In June, 1980 a letter by Sandra Wals, chairman of the ZBA to Board of Appeals members said: "attendance...is important. Delays in the start of the meeting and cancellations of meetings because of lack of quorum casts shadows on responsible total government. (Besides embarrassing your chairman.) Please call...if you find it necessary to miss a meeting in sufficient time to make other arrangements."

Township voters elect four trustees, one supervisor, one clerk and one treasurer to the board of trustees.

The township supervisor appoints members to other township committees or groups, if the township board resolves to establish them.

Michigan law requires that each general law township meet "at least once every three months". The Northville Township Board of Trustees meets regularly once a month throughout the year.

Since October, 1979, two township trustees have resigned and two others

were appointed as replacements.

Of the 12 regular meetings held since October, 1979, half showed all board members in attendance. In all, the township board has met 28 times since last October, according to the records kept by the township.

His letter of resignation was received by Larry Sheehan, chairman of the EDC at the group's last meeting.

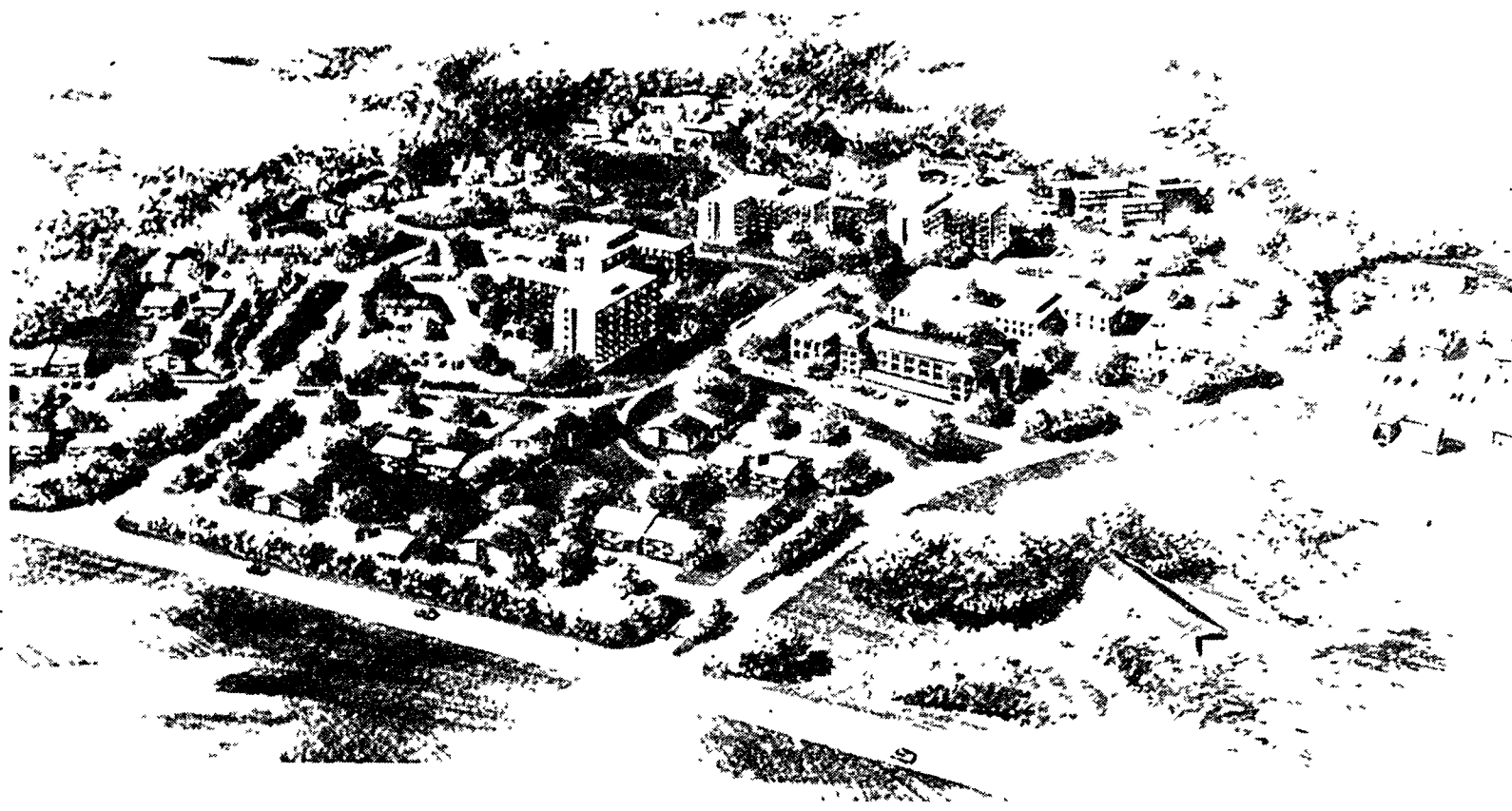
Littell said lack of time prompted his resignation, according to Sheehan.

County groups argue over village

A meeting last Wednesday between the Wayne County Economic Development Corporation (EDC) and the Wayne County Ways and Means Committee on a proposed elderly village at the former county child development center (CDC) revealed a \$2.3 million difference in appraisal of the land.

The county EDC has appraised the land at \$2.7 million, but the Wayne County Bureau of Taxation estimated the value of the land at \$5 million for the 101-acre parcel.

The bureau appraised each acre at \$33,000, noting its increased value by being recently rezoned to residential multiple elderly (RME).

In contrast, the county EDC had appraised each acre at \$14,400 and deducted \$800,000 for demolition of

some buildings on the site and \$2.2 million for roadways and utilities.

"We have to be careful," Robert FitzPatrick, director of the county EDC said. "If the price becomes restrictive, private developers won't be interested in the project."

The county EDC wants the county to transfer title of the property to them. Once that is done, FitzPatrick said the EDC "would be in a position to enter detailed negotiations with some of the nationally recognized private developers who have expressed an interest in this project."

FitzPatrick said the EDC would use "creative financing in developing the site. Hopefully, we'll get tax free bonds and maybe federal dollars to improve the site and work with developers."

Potential income from the project,

once developed, is \$1.3 million annually for the township, county, schools, and Schoolcraft College, said FitzPatrick.

The county auditors suggested the site be sold outright on a cash basis "at a price more consistent with the valuation established by the bureau of taxation."

The auditors also said the public improvements and demolition costs be borne by the developer. A third suggestion said a lease purchase agreement should only be considered if a 25 percent down payment is made, with the balance to be paid within 10 years, including interest at the "prevailing

rate."

The county planning commission wanted to know if the proposed elderly village would enhance or jeopardize the development of the remaining land in the former CDC.

They said they were also concerned about who would be responsible for police and fire protection, health and recreation services and who would be responsible for completing the project if a developer defaulted.

After two hours of discussion, the item was sent to the county public works committee, which is to resolve it within 30 days.

Kensington farm, food available

The Kensington Farm Center and restaurant in Kensington Metropark near Milford are open daily this fall.

Animals at the farm include cows, sheep, goats, pigs, chickens, rabbits, ducks and geese, and each animal group lives

in a fenced enclosure which contains a small animal barn for shelter. Baby animals are kept in the ground floor of the old barn.

Dave Moilanen, farm manager, stated that hours at the farm are daily 9 a.m. to dusk through

November 15.

In addition to the public hours, the farm is open to school and civic groups for farm center tours.

The farm center restaurant is open daily 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. starting November 1.

Plymouth cable tv operating

Ted Turner, chairman of the board of Turner Broadcasting Systems who owns the Cable News Network, Channel 17 "Superstation" in Atlanta and the Atlanta Braves and Hawks, assisted officials in activating Omnicom Cablevision's local access network in Plymouth October 30.

Omnicom holds franchises in Northville and Northville Township as well as Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Canton Township, Westland and Hamtramck.

The system in Plymouth will be extended to other areas as Omnicom plans to institute a communications system that will link all participating communities in Western Wayne and Oakland counties.

At the champagne ceremony last week in Plymouth Mayor Mary Childs and John Raines, president of Omnicom, officially activated the system at Plymouth City Hall.

At the ceremony there were two large cables — one marked "City" and the other "People" — and Turner, Childs and Raines officially attached the two.

Those attending saw a video display program demonstration of how messages are typed into the system and onto the local access channels.

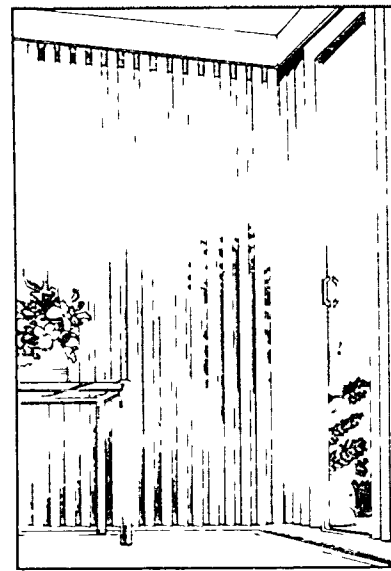

Shopping plan for Griswold, Eight Mile dropped

Plans to develop a convenience commercial shopping center at Eight Mile and Griswold roads apparently have been abandoned.

Richard Walker of the Weatherford-Walker Company verified October 27 that the company has decided to withdraw a rezoning request that would have paved the way for development of the convenience center on the north side of Eight Mile near the Griswold Street intersection.

"Our approach in development has always been to cooperate with the local community," said Walker in confirming plans to withdraw the request.

"I'm very disappointed because I felt

it was an excellent site. But it's obvious that residents in the immediate area do not want the project and we decided to withdraw the request instead of following through with something which does not have the support of surrounding residents."

The proposed convenience center at Eight Mile/Griswold has been the target of considerable debate practically since it was first proposed in May 1979.

Residents of Novi's Country Place Condominiums have led the opposition to the proposed convenience center, claiming it would ruin the residential character of their neighborhood as well

as adding to traffic problems at the Eight Mile/Griswold intersection.

Additional objections to the Weatherford-Walker center have been expressed by the Northville City Council through Mayor Paul Vernon. Noting that Northville is in the midst of a downtown renovation project, Vernon has asked Novi planners to reject the rezoning request on the grounds that development of convenience centers will impede Northville's plans by drawing business away from the downtown area.

He said that Northville has rejected rezoning requests for other convenience centers on Eight Mile west of

Novi Road for the same reason.

Plans for the Eight Mile/Griswold center were announced by Walker last May. The center was to have included a Kroger's Food Store, Perry's Drug Store and an A.C.E. Hardware Store.

Novi's Planning Board has delayed a decision on the rezoning request pending a decision on location of convenience commercial centers in the revised master plan.

The Weatherford-Walker rezoning request was scheduled to come back before the planning board for a decision on November 19, but has been taken off the agenda with the withdrawal of the request.

Vernon said Monday that Weatherford-Walker's decision to withdraw the rezoning request does not mean the convenience commercial center issue is closed.

"As long as Novi continues to show a convenience center at Eight Mile and Griswold, it's still very much an issue," said the Northville mayor.

The planners are scheduled to consider revisions to the proposed master plan at a special session Wednesday, November 12, at 7:30 p.m. in the Novi Public Library.

Walker said the decision to withdraw the rezoning petition does not mean the Eight Mile location is not an excellent

site. "I don't think the Eight Mile center would have detracted from Northville's downtown area because Northville offers comparison shopping and we offer convenience shopping," he said. Walker added that he felt development of the Eight Mile center would have brought about re-engineering that would have improved traffic concerns on the road.

"Typically, our projects are welcomed by the community, but the people were obviously opposed to this site," he said. "We didn't feel it would be in the best interest of ourselves or our clients to pursue this location any further."

Novi residents oppose convenience shopping in land use plan

The proposed locations of convenience commercial shopping centers stirred considerable opposition as an estimated 350 residents packed the Novi Middle School South cafeteria October 22 to offer input on the proposed revision of the city's master plan for land use development.

The hearing was attended by Northville area officials concerned about Eight Mile development.

The hearing was closed after Novi Planning Board members heard approximately four hours of testimony regarding the proposed master plan. The planners have slated a special session for Wednesday, November 12, to review the public input. The meeting will be held in the Novi Public Library at 7:30 p.m.

Planning Board Chairman Donald Gleason noted, however, that the planners may or may not take action to adopt the plan at the November 12 session.

The tone for last week's hearing was set by Lois Hoffmeister, co-chairperson of the Novi League of Women Voters (LWV), who said that the LWV "for the most part approves of the commercial areas plan and in general accepts the concept of 'convenience centers,' particularly those designated in the master plan for the currently less developed areas of the city."

"We prefer to see the community develop around known centers with appropriate planning for buffer zones and traffic control," said Hoffmeister.

The LWV spokesperson went on to say, however, that the one important exception to that position is the proposed site of a convenience center on Eight Mile at Griswold.

"We object to this site proposal because we believe it is not the best possible use of local land in a currently residential area," she said. "It also violates our position on cooperative planning with neighboring communities."

Additional opposition to the proposed convenience center at Eight Mile and Griswold was expressed by Northville Mayor Paul Vernon, Northville Township Supervisor Donald Thomson and Country Place Condominium Association President Arlen Schroeder.

Noting that Northville currently is in the midst of a downtown renovation project, Vernon said the Northville City Council was unanimously opposed to the Eight Mile/Griswold site because it would draw business away from downtown Northville.

"Sufficient commercial areas already exist to service the Eight Mile corridor," said Vernon. "Additional commercial development will only lead to empty stores or bring undesirable uses to fill up available retail space."

Thomson reported that Northville Township also opposes the Eight Mile/Griswold center. Development of a Meier's Thrifty Acres on the southwest corner of Eight Mile and Haggerty Road (approximately two miles from the Eight Mile/Griswold site) should be sufficient to meet all the retail needs of residents in the Eight Mile corridor, he said.

Schroeder also emphasized the availability of existing retail centers in downtown Northville and on Seven Mile in opposing the Eight Mile/Griswold location. "To establish the need for a convenience center," he said, "there must first be an inconvenience."

Schroeder also expressed concern that the proposed Eight Mile/Griswold center could be the first step toward commercialization of the Eight Mile corridor. "We don't want our rural, residential setting on Eight Mile to be afflicted with the same sort of commercial blight which has destroyed Orchard Lake Road," he said.

Vernon and Schroeder also cited traffic problems with the Eight Mile/Griswold location. The Northville mayor said that the Wayne County Road Commission had denied the city's request to erect a left-turn sign at the intersection due to concerns with traffic movements on the Eight Mile curve.

Support for the Eight Mile/Griswold location was expressed by Richard Walker of the Weatherford-Walker Company which has proposed development of a center on Eight Mile that would include a Kroger's, A.C.E. Hardware and a Perry's Drugs.

Walker said the major tenants have completed market surveys which establish the need for a convenience center at the location.

Additionally, Walker said the Eight Mile center would not detract from downtown Northville which is comparison (rather than convenience) in nature. He also said that engineering associated with development of the center could aid the traffic situation and that the center could reduce the potential for strip commercial development on Eight Mile.

Although most of the discussion at last week's hearing was directed at the proposed convenience center at Eight Mile/Griswold, further opposition was expressed to proposed convenience centers at Ten Mile/Beck Road and Thirteen Mile/Novi Road.

Larry Christoff, president of the Echo Valley Subdivision Association, said residents in western Novi were strongly opposed to a convenience center at the Ten Mile/Beck Road intersection as proposed on the revised master plan.

Comparing the convenience center concept to the Edsels and Pintos, Christoff said residents "don't need 10 acres of cement to go buy aspirin, a carton of milk or a screwdriver."

Christoff also said that convenience centers throughout the area were "either dying or dead" and referred to several existing centers in Livonia, Northville and Novi which are plagued by empty stores.

"The center at Ten Mile and Meadowbrook was a mistake and now you're about to make another one by putting it on the master plan for Ten Mile and Meadowbrook," said Christoff.

The proposed center at Thirteen Mile/Novi Road (on the existing flea market property) was questioned by Martha Hoyer, who said she did not believe Novi should have commercial development so close to the (Walled Lake) lake shore.

EDC, planners discuss projects

Two proposals for use of land surrounding Lake Success in Northville Township were discussed by the Economic Development Corporation and the planning commission last week.

A public hearing to rezone to industrial from multiple family on nine acres was held by the planning commission.

About three acres of the land is water, the other 5.83 is located north of Wallis and west of Silver Spring Drive. Owner of the parcel, Jack Doheny, is proposing to build about 50,000 square feet of warehouse space, with the section by the lake as a picnic area for employees of the warehouse tenants.

Northwest of Doheny's parcel is land that may be developed as the Highland Pointe condominiums by Pulte Corporation, if the corporation exercises its option on the land and pending approval of its plan by township authorities.

Doheny assured the planning commission during the public hearing that "there won't be any fumes. I expect to duplicate some types of units (warehouse and storage) like I have now."

Doheny said his proposed use for the land would be "an excellent buffer" between condominium development and an oil company nearby.

Commissioners will discuss the item at their November meeting, after township consultants review the proposal.

Doheny has approached the township EDC for financial assistance in developing the parcel. Scheduled to be discussed at last week's EDC meeting, the item was tabled for lack of an EDC quorum.

Doheny is asking the EDC for \$1.2 million for the project.

The township planning commissioners viewed a recreation proposal for the condominium development.

The first site plan by Pulte was rejected by the commission last spring.

The Highland Pointe development would be located on 60 acres north of Highland Lakes, south of Eight Mile, east of Griswold and west of Silver Springs. The developers are planning for 64 buildings, with four condominiums to a unit.

Commissioners were encouraged by the proposed recreational area, which included a soccer field, picnic shelter by the lake's dock, two basketball courts, hopscotch, and three tot lots, tied together by a meandering walkway throughout the development.

Willis Martin, vice president of land development for Pulte, said the recreational facilities would be for condominium residents only and plans would include space for a future clubhouse and pool if residents wanted them.

Martin said they expect to present a new site plan, including the proposed recreational facilities, at the November planning commission meeting.

Supervisor, clerk note future township goals

Northville Township's new supervisor plans to keep a "watchful eye" on growth and commercial development in the community.

John MacDonald, a 46 year old attorney in private practice with offices in Wayne, also expects to see more "harmony" on the township board. Hopefully, there will be no more infighting," the Edenderry Drive resident said.

MacDonald has placed priority on storage space for an ambulance to service the township.

"We're going to work that out soon," he said. "It will probably be located on the Child Development property off Six Mile."

MacDonald is a former township trustee, planning commissioner and member of the zoning board of appeals (1972-76).

Susan Heintz, who is the new township clerk, foresees "no large changes in the near future" for the clerk's office.

"Best thing I can do is learn the day to day intricacies of the job. There will be a reorganization of staffing once the business manager comes in."

"We'll have to take a serious look at the budget; we may have to redo it", she noted.

"I'm for slow growth and aggressive planning," the 33 year old resident of Iron Gate Court said. "Residents here are very vocal about growth. There is a big area of discussion now about community development. I think the zoning ordinance is too broad (in defining) for commercial uses."

Heintz has a B.A. in political science from the University of Michigan and has lived here since 1971. She is a member of the Northville Historical Society and the Northville Republican Club.

City contracts with McNeely-Lincoln for engineering

An engineering services agreement between McNeely and Lincoln Associates and the city which will provide engineering services to the city and offer a lease arrangement of the scout building as part of the compensation was passed unanimously by city council Monday.

At previous meetings the council had considered the arrangement with the firm at the suggestion of City Manager Steven Walters. McNeely and Lincoln Associates have been the firm working on the Downtown Development Authority (DDA) Mainstreet '78 renovation project.

will have a civil engineering and land surveying office in the building which will be the firm's headquarters for all work.

Harold Penn's firm, which has been serving the city, does not have a surveyor, he said.

When the arrangement was proposed in September, Walters told the council it offered an opportunity to improve the city's overall engineering services and give a sound financial use for the scout building.

Walters and council members working on the DDA had lauded the quality of the firm's work.

receive the equivalent of \$750 per month in engineering or land surveying services without charge based on an hourly fee schedule. However, the city is not required to use the entire amount each month and may keep a running balance.

The firm is responsible for building modifications, which must be approved by the city, for utilities and janitorial service and for insurance.

The new agreement terminates the city's association with H. W. Penn Engineers which serviced the city since 1961 and before that since 1956 as Laporte and Penn.

coln attended Monday's council meeting.

Council member Carolann Ayers, pointing out that three council members of the five (Stan Johnston, Mayor Paul Vernon and Dewey Gardner) also are members of the DDA, said she felt this created an unusual situation.

This, she said, was the first time she had met the firm's owners and noted that "if it were not for these circumstances (that they are working with the DDA) I doubt that they would be recommended (without interview)."

She stated she feels the DDA has to be "careful" in its operation.

It was pointed out that the recom-

mendation to retain McNeely and Lincoln Associates had come from the city manager, not the council members of DDA who said they were unaware of it until Walters proposed the idea at a council meeting.

Johnston said he did not understand the reason for the discussion, as, "We have seen the fine work they do."

Council member J. Burton DeRusha came to Ayers' defense, saying the same question of the majority of council serving on the DDA had come up when Wallace Nichols was on the council. He stated he is satisfied with the general integrity but had been concerned before that three members serve on the DDA.

Hopefully, he said, in the future never more than two will be appointed.

Council member Gardner stated that in some cases members were on the DDA before going on council.

Mayor Vernon declared the DDA had no advance knowledge of the city manager's recommendation. He said the suggestion that there may have been collusion with the DDA is disturbing.

Walters said he felt responsible as it had not occurred to him that there could be this situation.

Johnston said he felt "you have to trust your fellow council members."

But Gardner stressed that "we are not on the DDA as councilmembers."

PINCKNEY — It took four millage elections over a span of 16 months but the Pinckney Community Schools voters finally came through. They voted to waive the Headlee roll-back and return the operational millage to the 24 mills supported in the 1978 election.

BRIGHTON — Motions and counter motions have flooded a suit brought against Brighton Area Schools by two band students fighting a five-day suspension for drinking during a marching band trip to Washington, D. C.

HARTLAND — At least 150 people crowded folding chairs into Hartland Township's old fire hall at the planning commission's public hearing on a Kmart Corporation rezoning request for a 33-acre site at M-59 and Old U.S. 23.

WALLED LAKE — J. Michael Dornan, Farmington Hills' 29-year-old assistant city manager, was on the brink of becoming Wall Lake's next city manager going into this week's city council meeting.

WALLED LAKE — The balance of Wall Lake's contingency fund, an area of the city budget covering miscellaneous items, has been more

than cut in half during the past two months. The 1980-81 fiscal year budget, which began July 1, allocated \$52,810 of the city's funds toward that item.

LYON — Although it took no action, the Lyon Township board did a little comparison shopping as it examined the new rates of the South Lyon ambulance service and compared them against Novi and Fleet ambulance service.

Kirksey proposes new calendar

A "creative educational calendar" that would allow Michigan school districts flexibility in arranging school calendars was introduced by Jack Kirksey, state representative from Northville and Livonia.

The state representative has proposed that the school year remain at 180 days, as it now does, but the plan would be to give school districts "broad discretion in setting their school calendars."

"Right now there are compelling reasons to take a look at this proposal. The cost of oil, gas, heat, electricity and labor are rising every day, but these costs are unrelated to what our children learn. By implementing this calendar, we might be able to close schools during the coldest months and save considerably," Kirksey said.

"We would also be instructing our students in energy conservation and the need to respond to a changing economic climate," he added.

Districts could adopt a four day school week, a year round calendar, or another different system that meets escalating costs but maintains a high standard of education, Kirksey said.

The state representative and former high school principal said districts with disproportionately high transportation and operational costs could run more economically.

He noted that test scores in the states of Colorado and New Mexico have actually improved in districts that opted for a four day extended school week.

"Community approval has gone hand in hand with the measured success of students," he noted.

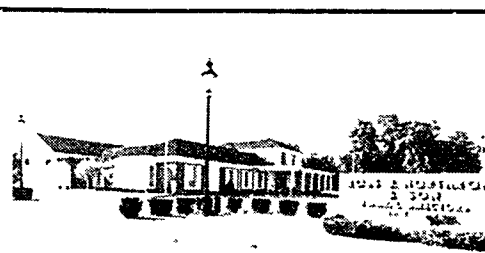

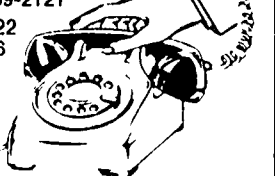

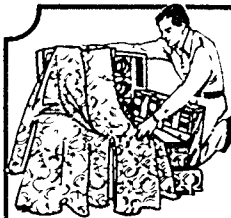

It is good news indeed to learn that Del and Ila Black have decided to buy Brader's department store.

The community will miss Aaron and Lottie Gellerman, owners and operators of Brader's for the past 17 years. But it would have been doubly-bad news to have lost both Brader's and the Gellermans.

The Blacks are particularly well-suited to take over the operations of the general store-like Brader's. They're Northville born and raised and like the rest of us, they've shopped Brader's,

too. So they know what "the Brader tradition" means to the community.

What's more, it must come as most welcome news to the Downtown Development Authority — well into its public improvement program of streets, sidewalks and parking lots in the central business district — to learn that downtown will not lose a valuable business place.

So for The Record, it's farewell and good luck to the Gellermans for a job well done; and congratulations to Del and Ila for keeping a part of old Northville intact.

What about public's right?

The idea that a community must have progress and development to stay alive and viable undoubtedly is true most of the time — but for a town with families that go back two and even three generations there also should be a third consideration — preservation.

Preservation usually means maintaining or restoring buildings, but preservation also can be saving of a site. In this instance, we are thinking of the familiar "Hay castle" setting at the top of Rogers Street. It was difficult to believe that the turreted brick house had to be moved because it did not contain sufficient area to meet specifications for the planned Ole Village Subdivision. It is still more difficult

to believe that the majestic pine trees which flanked the house had to bow to the saw.

Are more restrictions needed to preserve sites? Granted that developers who spend large sums to grade property, build roads and sidewalks and bring in utilities have rights, but don't those who live in a community also have some? Residents adjacent to North Beacon Woods who saw that land along Eight Mile ravished thought so — and so did the judge. But it took their civil suit (instituted after the township proved unresponsive) to prove this. Perhaps, as the city begins an update of its master plan, this would be a good time to look at site restrictions. In the township a new slate has promised to watch all development.

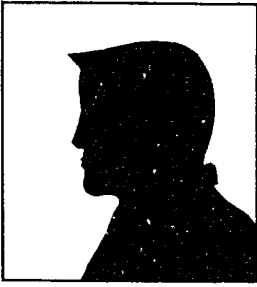

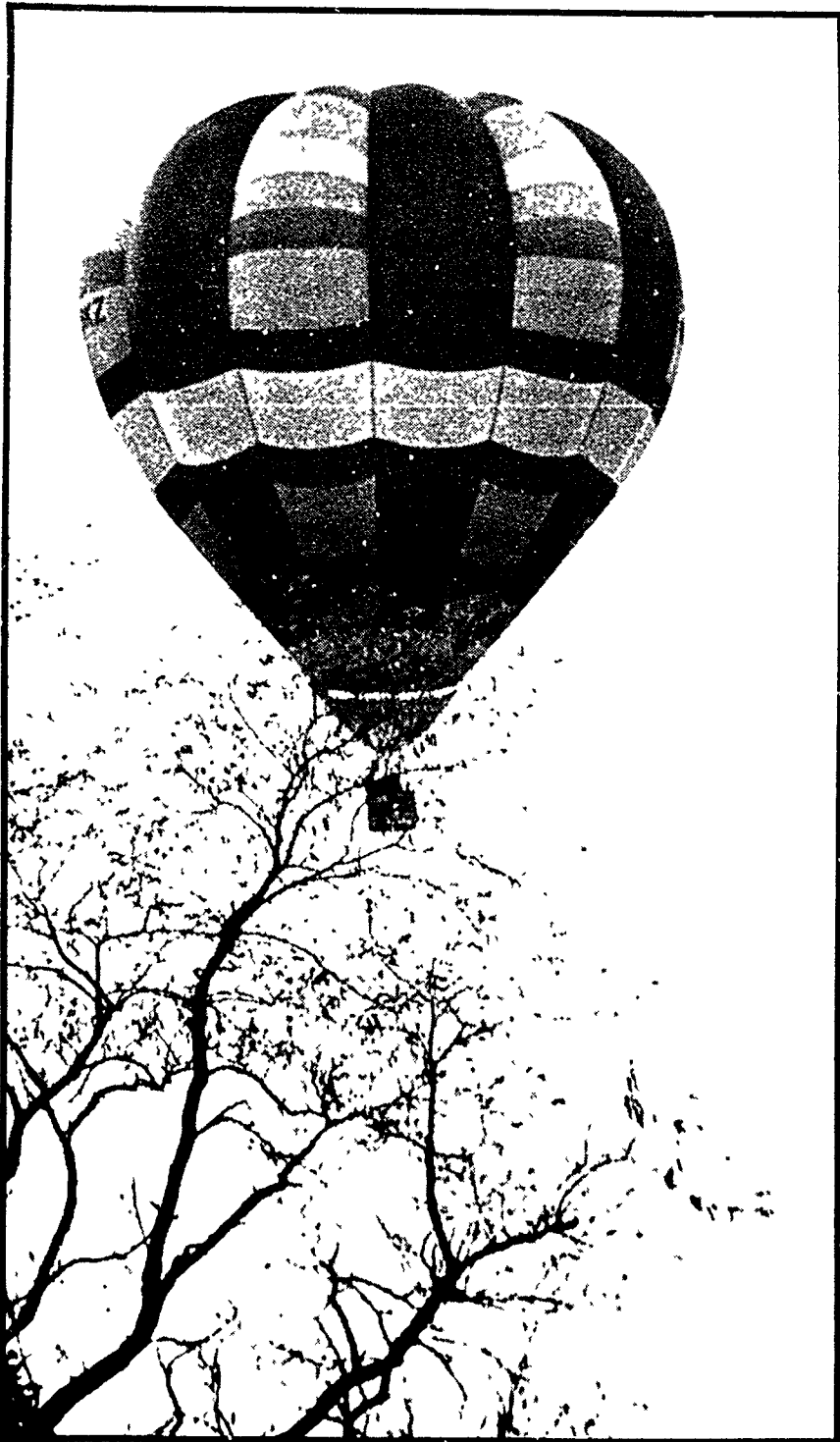
Unscrupulous politicians have little to gain from an informed, active electorate and much to benefit from the cynicism and apathy that keeps me from the polls.

If you think Bob Tisch had no reason to complain that public officials misused taxes to fight his amendment, you failed to see the mountain of materials put out by government and its bureaucracies.

And sadly, among the chief transgressors were this state's universities, including the University of Michigan where I was graduated a lifetime ago.

In a four-page supplement to Michigan Today, a publication for alumni, U-M pretended to make an impartial analysis of the Tisch proposal. Although nowhere in the publication did it say "Vote No" on Tisch, only a Buckeye might not recognize the purpose of the publication. And to add insult to injury, U-M had the audacity to include a footnote saying the supplement was produced by the university's state and community relations office with non-tax dollars. I wonder who pays the salaries of the community relations' staffers?

The list of officials and organizations misusing tax money to fight a proposal placed on the ballot by taxpayers goes on and on.

Had the tax-supported propaganda machinery campaigned to defeat Frank Kelley, I wonder if the attorney general would have been as permissive.

Come to think of it I wonder how many law students could have been educated to recognize unlawfulness, how many state policemen could have been hired to make some arrests, or how many jail cells could have been built to house election law transgressors with the misused taxpayers' money in yesterday's election?

Precinct job mixes work, friendliness on election day

At 6:30 a.m. on election day, a line had formed outside precinct one and three at Moraine School in Northville Township. Even the election workers were surprised after about 101 residents had cast their votes one hour after the polls opened at 8 a.m.

At 11 a.m. the city reported 395 ballots cast in precinct one. Estimates from precincts two and three, located in Oakland County were not available at press time.

The township reported a total of 1,760 votes for all 10 precincts, averaging about 35 to 40 voters per hour.

"The mood is quiet, but everyone seems to know what they are doing," Rosemary Palarchio, precinct three chairman said. "It's taking them about five minutes to vote."

Looking at the 15 people in line, she noted: "This is a lull."

During the next half hour, close to 30 voters would enter one of five booths in the precinct, guided by Rosemary and her five precinct workers.

Carrie Konrad explained how to use the punch card system, Gail Harrison checked voter's registration, Jennie Reisinger wrote up the voter's list, and Diane Ramsey collected ballots for the box.

"This is terrible," one woman said whose turn to vote was next. "I still haven't made up my mind."

The school principal announced daily events over the gymnasium public address system while an angry voter told an election official it was no one's business when his birthdate was.

Tommy, a couple's young son, munched a doughnut with the workers while his parents voted. A precinct worker explained that "one out of 100" will actually complain of invasion of privacy when asked for their birthdate.

The first spoiled ballot of the day was brought to the worker's table and the voter given a new one.

"By the end of the day, it's all forgotten," Rosemary said. She was up by 5 a.m. and expected to be home last night by 9 p.m.

"It's a long day," she said. "But we bring in dinner and take turns and go in the lounge and eat. Everyone is very cooperative."

As chairman of the precinct, Rosemary supervised the workers and didn't stay in any one place too long.

"We've got terrific workers," she said. "It's going smoothly."

Precinct workers are responsible for making sure the voting devices work properly, voters are registered and they get the opportunity to vote promptly.

"The punch card system is really fantastic," Rosemary said, waving to a friend across the gym. "It's a time saver."

She introduced Fran Mattison who has worked in elections for 40 years and is chairman of precinct one.

Rosemary moved to Northville 10 years ago and worked elections as a precinct worker before becoming precinct chairman.

"That's how I got involved," she said. "I guess it was a sense of civic duty, but it was interesting and something for me to do. And I got to know my neighbors."

Greetings and comments on every subject from weddings, funerals and new grandchildren were heard, but nothing about the voting issues and candidates.

"We can't talk about that," Rosemary said. "Besides, I think everyone is all talked out." She called to a young man in line from her neighborhood who now works for a state senator.

At 9:30 a.m. about 120 had cast their votes and a line had formed at the precinct three table again.

"It will be like this all day," Rosemary said, walking back to the table.

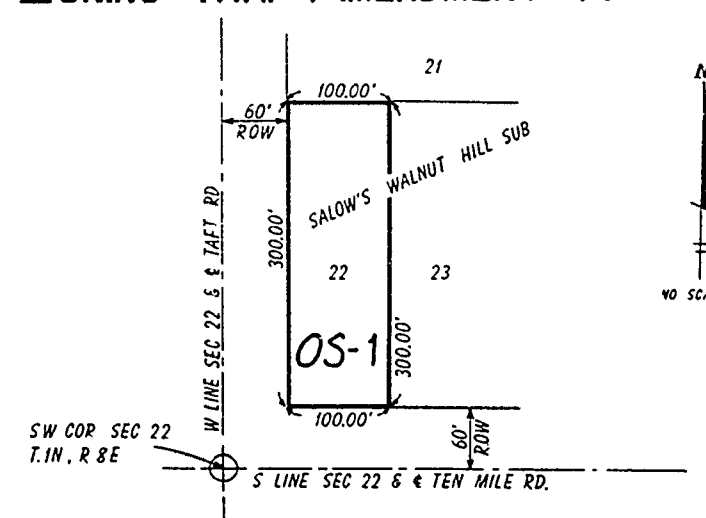

Of those 28 meetings, and not including the six regular meetings when all members were present, at least one and sometimes two, board members were absent.

In "A Manual for Township Government", a township official's guide by Joseph Parisi, he says no statute empowers the township board to compel attendance of elected or appointed township officials. (A charter township board can compel attendance.)

However, Parisi adds: "Any person who takes an oath of office to serve the people should realize that he or she is pledging to be constantly available to them. ... A township official is closer to

citizens....there is an extra degree of obligation. If an individual is not willing to do this, then he or she should not take the job in the first place."

The township planning commission meets the last Tuesday of each month, in addition to special meetings, or review sessions at the request of a petitioner.

Since August 1979, all planning commissioners attended five meetings. Out of 31 meetings (including study sessions, reviews, special meetings, etc) held since August 1979, an average of one or two planning commissioners were absent.

The township added two members to the planning commission this spring, creating a nine member commission.

Dedication to teaching brings her honors

For most of us, the largest part of our early lives was spent in classrooms. For years we struggled through spelling tests, arithmetic and word games, only to discover that there was more to come. As we got older, we progressed from multiplication tables to pre-calculus and from Dr. Seuss to John Steinbeck. And upon our graduation from high school, we patted ourselves on the back for a job well done.

However, the vast knowledge which we obtained by the age of 17 or 18 was certainly not done alone. To look back on those long, hard schooldays there is

really only one person who is remembered most clearly — the teacher.

Ah, the teacher, that strict disciplinarian who forced you to stay after school and wash desks when you were caught chewing gum in class, yet believed you when you said the dog chewed up your book report.

The teacher was also the one who gave you "tons of homework" when all you wanted was to play outside and "made" you give a speech in front of the whole class even though you were scared stiff.

As time wore on, we realized that teachers were people, too. And suddenly we began to respect these individuals who gave us all of this knowledge. Their dedication and unselfishness inspired us to do better — we set goals, took risks and strived for things we never thought we could obtain.

For Pat Dorrian Sandbothe, teaching has been a way of life for 33 years — and for 25 of those years she has taught in Northville.

For most past and present Northville High School students, Mrs. Dorrian Sandbothe is best known for her English and creative writing classes and most notably her "grueling" humanities course.

However, she is also known for her devotion to learning, her demand for quality education and her dedication to her students.

In recognition of Mrs. Dorrian Sandbothe's long-time work with high school students and her dedication to the education of young people, the Northville Business and Professional Women's Club has selected her as the 1980 "Woman of the Year."

This award, only the second one given out by the BPW, is awarded to either a business or professional woman for outstanding community achievement.

And the outstanding achievement which Mrs. Dorrian Sandbothe has given to the community is best reflected in her students.

Though Sophocles, Homer and Dante may not be regarded as typical readings in the high school curriculum, they are of most definite importance in Mrs. Dorrian Sandbothe's humanities class.

"My rule is that I teach loud, fast and hard," said the longtime educator.

"Some people would interpret that as rigid, but when students walk out my door I expect them to know what I have taught them."

Mrs. Dorrian Sandbothe first began her teaching career in 1947 after receiving her bachelor's degree in English from Siena Heights College in Adrian. Her master's degree is from the University of Michigan.

Before coming to Northville, she taught in Davison and Mancelona. Throughout her long teaching career, Mrs. Dorrian Sandbothe has always taught English — and always at the high school level.

While at Siena Heights, Mrs. Dorrian Sandbothe said she discovered that elementary level teaching was not for her.

"I didn't like coloring and clowns," she said. "I just wasn't comfortable with it."

However, she soon found her niche with students 15-years-old and up.

Mrs. Dorrian Sandbothe has long been regarded as one of the bulwarks in the NHS English Department. She has taught Honors English, Creative Writing and Novels, an elective course focusing on American and world literature.

Her work with creative writing students brought her statewide attention in 1976 when she was chosen as the Michigan Creative Writing Teacher of the Year — the first Northville teacher ever chosen for that honor.

the college-bound student and that this year alone there are 108 students enrolled in the course.

"Many students stay away from the course because they hear from others about how difficult it is," she said.

into her teaching. An avid traveler, she said it is much easier to explain to students what the Hagia Sophia looks like when you've seen it.

She said she spent this past summer in Europe and "fell in love with Vienna" and has also traveled to Japan, the British Isles, Greece, Istanbul and other countries.

Other than traveling, Mrs. Dorrian Sandbothe said she enjoys the theatre and has done some community theatre work.

Though she has not been in a show in three years, she said she did spend one summer with the Greenfield Village Players.

However, she said that her first love has always been teaching.

"When I came out of high school I was going to be the great American writer," she said.

But she found that teaching writing was more gratifying — especially at the high school level.

Mrs. Dorrian Sandbothe said that in spite of her many years of teaching she is able to recall many of her students.

"I can even remember where some students sat," she explained.

She said some of her former students have dropped by to see her and that she enjoys hearing from her former pupils.

Though she never had children of her own, she said she often regards her students as her children.

"I think of myself as Mr. Chips," confided Pat Dorrian Sandbothe — Woman of the Year.

At that time, she was picked for the state's highest award in creative writing for the consistently successful performance of her students in the annual Michigan Arts Festival.

Reflecting upon that award Mrs. Dorrian Sandbothe said she believes now as she did then, that "it's the kids who should have been given the award."

However, creative writing is not the only successful program to Mrs. Dorrian Sandbothe's credit.

Approximately 12 years ago, Northville High School implemented a humanities program under the direction of Pat Dorrian Sandbothe and other teachers.

The program, which started out as a one-semester course, expanded after three years into a two-semester program.

Though the course is an elective and only offered to seniors, it has proven to be successful.

In a graduate follow-up survey conducted by the Northville Public Schools for 1979 NHS graduates, results showed that the humanities course was regarded as one of the most helpful to graduates.

Approximately 308 surveys were sent to 79 graduates with about 163 returned. Of those surveys returned, an estimated 80 percent of the graduates were either full or part-time college students.

Advanced composition and humanities were regarded by graduates as the most helpful courses and courses which should be required.

Mrs. Dorrian Sandbothe explained that the humanities course is mostly for

However, those students who think of it as difficult are probably doing B-work, she added with a smile.

The humanities program actually got underway after NHS teachers examined the humanities courses in an Ann Arbor high school, she said.

However, starting a new program is never easy and Mrs. Dorrian Sandbothe said there were a few things to iron out before the course was implemented — namely supplies.

"I wouldn't allow it (humanities) to be taught until they had materials," she said.

Yet, supplies are no longer a problem. Students enrolled in the course are not only exposed to a vast amount of literature, history and music, but are also introduced to the world of art — covering everything from cave drawings to the pop art of the 1960s and 70s.

Mrs. Dorrian Sandbothe said she has brought some of her own experiences

Town hall's next speaker Terry Hekker retorts in her book, "Ever Since Adam and Eve," that she doesn't know much about feeble-minded girls but, "I've had an eight-year-old and I wonder how much Ms. Friedan would pay him to clean her place."

Billed as the "champion of the profession of

housewifery," Terry Hekker will discuss her views at Northville Town Hall at 11 a.m. November 13 at the Plymouth Hilton Inn in the second of four lectures in the current 1980-81 season.

Critics are hailing the mother of five as the new Erma Bombeck for her ability to inject humor in her defense of the "world's second oldest but most obsolete profession—housewifery."

Her message that homemaking and motherhood haven't gone out of style will be given along with a common-sense view of feminism.

She mentions that her husband "got into more

trouble for referring to women as 'girls' than he did for referring to sanitary landfill as 'garbage' as he ran for public office."

Because she seriously feels a "good cause is being given a bad name," Mrs. Hekker is writing and speaking out.

"They could grow up and become priests and say mass on the altar and we could grow up and become nuns and clean the altar."

Monumental myths mask morbid reality



Rape: Yes, it does happen to people in your neighborhood

Rape is something that happens to other people.

You read about someone being sexually assaulted. You hear about a friend of a friend who was attacked.

But the reality of rape doesn't become clear until it happens to you or someone close to you.

And, yes, it could happen to you.

According to the Michigan State Police Uniform Crime Report there were 1,754 rape offenses reported in Wayne County and 266 in Oakland County in 1979. And there were more than 4,000 incidences reported throughout the state last year.

But there are many rapes which are never reported.

In fact, the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) believes that rape is the most under-reported of all crimes — that the occurrence of sexual assault is enormously larger than it appears on the surface.

Assuming that most rapes or rape attempts are not reported by women due to embarrassment, shame or the feeling that somehow they were at fault, the FBI estimates that the incidence of rape actually is 10 times greater than reported.

If that is true, then rape is the most frequently committed violent crime in America: more rapes than aggravated assaults or even simple robberies.

This would mean it is 30 times more likely a person will be raped than murdered.

Despite the great number of rape incidences, the mythology surrounding the crime continues.

Mythology puts the focus on the sexual nature of the attack, rather than danger to the victim.

In reality, women (and men) are killed before and after a sexual assault. In reality, people are forced to participate in perverse sexual acts against their will and under the threat of further abuse.

The possibilities of becoming pregnant, contracting venereal disease or a parasitic infection are very real.

Also very real to victims is the horror and fear of the possibility of death that they experience.

Studies indicate that 85 percent of rape victims are so afraid of death and injury that they never make any attempt to defend themselves.

Some of the myths on rape and sexual assault include:

MYTH — Nice women don't get raped.

FACT — The rapist looks for a kind and trusting person, one who is vulnerable and non-aggressive.

MYTH — Rape is an act of sexual passion.

FACT — Rape is an act of humiliation, degradation and assault done with an enormous amount of hate. The results of a recent study showed that 90 percent of group rapes were planned in advance and 59 percent of rapes committed by a single man were planned.

MYTH — A woman cannot be raped by her husband.

FACT — Any act of sexual intercourse to which the woman does not consent is rape.

MYTH — The rapist is a sexually unfulfilled man.

FACT — Doctor William Prendergast of the New Jersey State Prison states that all of the rapists that he has studied had available sexual relationships. Sixty percent of the men in another doctor's study were, in fact, married and led normal lives at home.

MYTH — Most rapes occur in dark alleys or to women who hitchhike.

FACT — More than one third of the rapes are committed by a man who forces his way into the victim's home, and over half of all rapes committed occur in a residence.

MYTH — The rapist is a stranger to the victim.

FACT — Forty-eight percent of the rapists in one doctor's study were known to the victim (either casual friends or relatives).

MYTH — Black men rape white women.

FACT — In 93 percent of all reported rape cases both the man and woman are of the same race. However, white men attack black women more often than black men attack white women.

Unfortunately, the mythology is present in all segments of society. As a result, those who are supposed to be helping a rape victim — friends, hospital personnel, police officers, etc. — may say things that increase the victim's feelings of guilt.

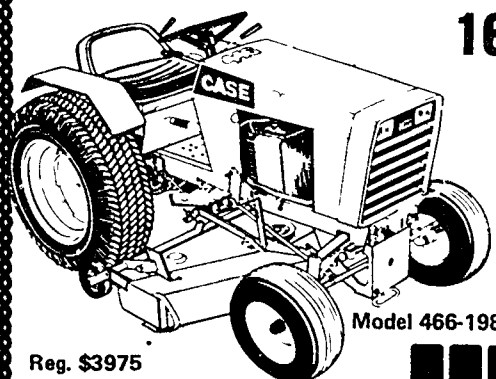

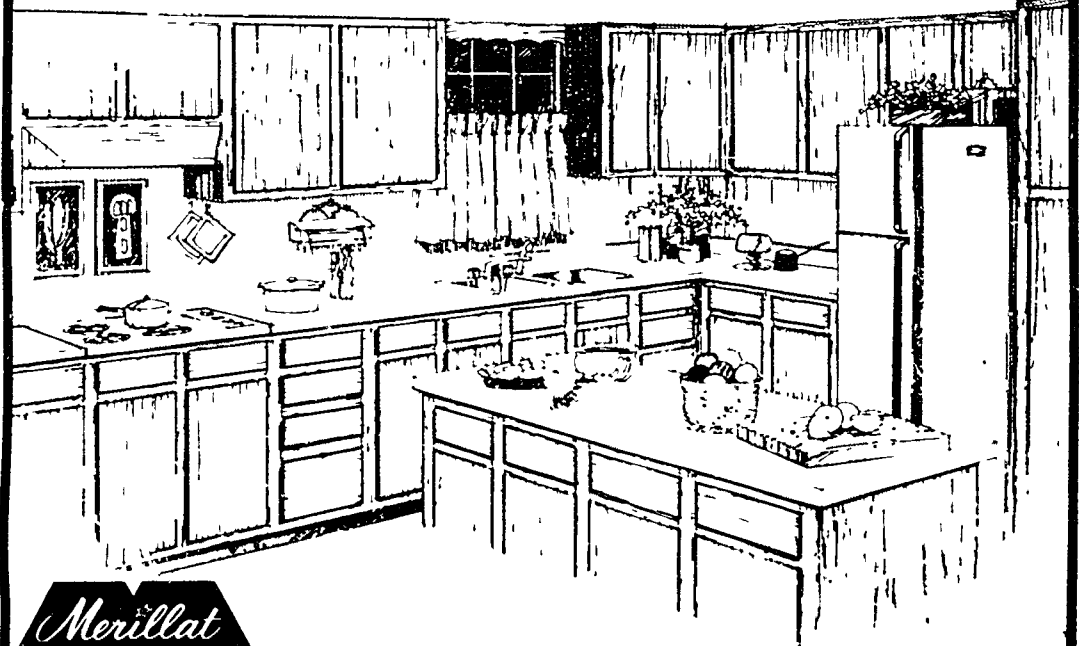

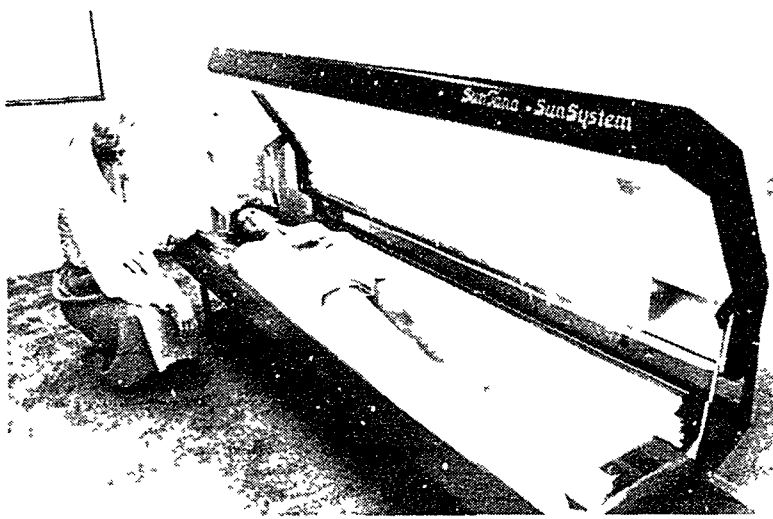

THE COMMUNITY EDUCATION Department of the Brighton schools will offer a four-week course to prepare persons for the new real estate salesperson license examination as administered by Educational Testing Service. 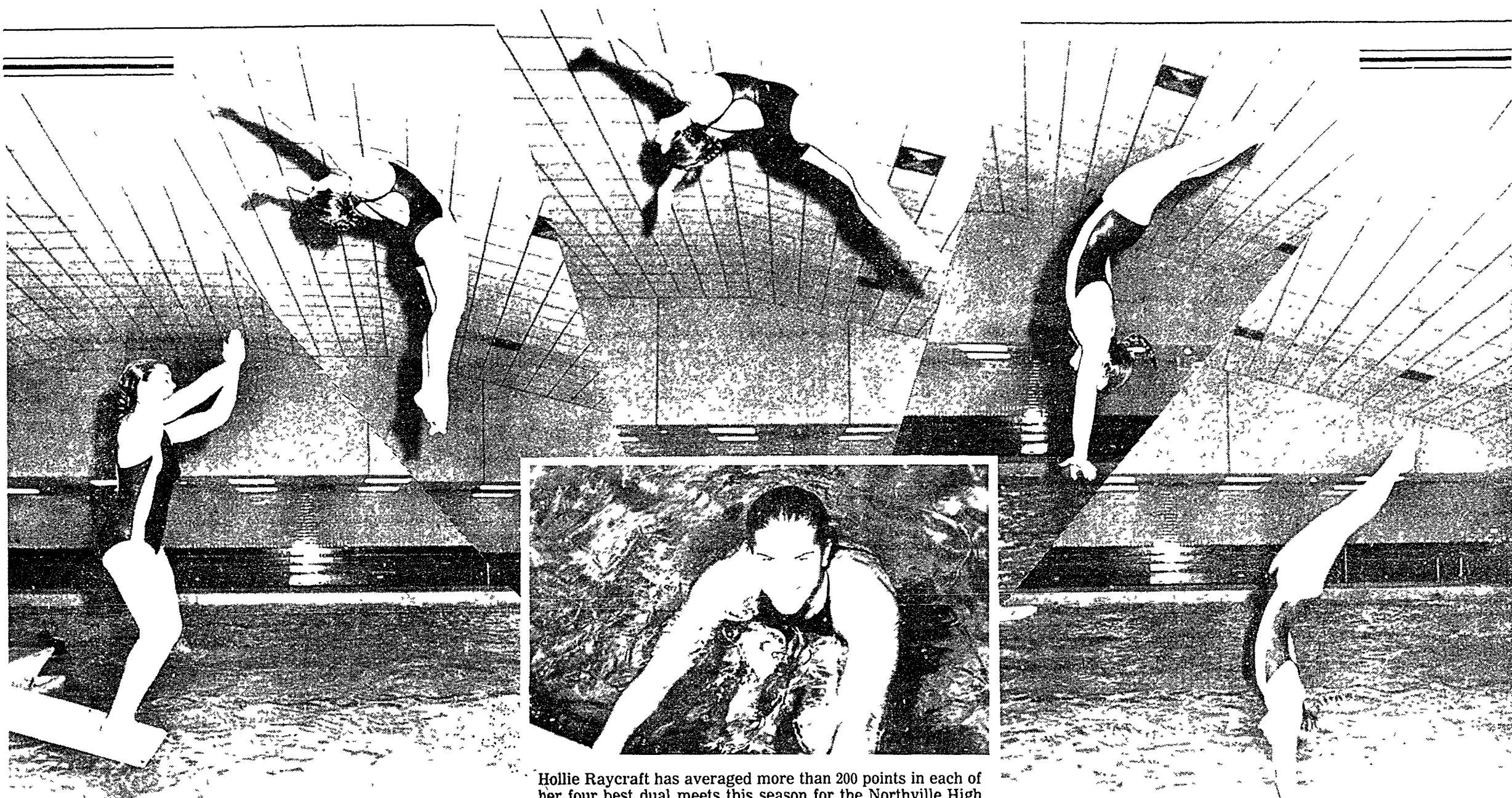

The lucky blue suit isn't going to be enough to pull Gene Wagner and his understaffed basketball team through many more ball games.

It's going to take a few breaks and a lot of hard work.

But without a few more players the Mustang cage crew is going to be hard-pressed to win even a few of their five remaining games.

With a squad of eight, sometimes seven and sometimes as few as six players Wagner must recruit stragglers from the halls just to scrimmage in practice.

Employing a method popular in Iowa — where professional women's basketball games attract more fans than men's — Wagner has corralled a few boys who are not participating in Northville High sports this fall to scrimmage against his girls in practice.

high school athletes has grown by leaps and bounds.

But Wagner's problem goes even deeper.

Not only can he not find new players, but some of the sophomores and juniors who played for the team last year have not returned.

Wagner lost a couple of girls to other sports and some had other commitments," says a disappointed Wagner. "I don't know where the rest of them are."

Then to make things even worse, two of the players who came out for the team have quit during the season.

Only by bringing up Tracy Wilkinson from the junior varsity squad and adding Karen Sledz after the cross country season ended has Wagner been able to keep an eight-woman roster.

(Of course on Thursday nights one of the players cannot make it because of another commitment, leaving the frustrated coach with only seven.)

Part of the problem may be a lack of ability which inhibits some girls from trying out for the team.

Having not played organized basketball before, a girl may feel embarrassed or inadequate because she is not as good as the others.

But take heart girls, you are not alone. Just recently girls basketball became a part of recreation and junior high school sports programs.

And Wagner is hoping this will produce many more experienced players for Northville teams of the future, just as the extensive Northville recreation soccer program has done for both boys and girls high school teams.

"We are about three years behind other communities in building these types of programs," Wagner said earlier in the season. "I think in a couple of years we will have a solid program and be right in the thick of things in the Western Six."

Meanwhile, Wagner is hoping the blue suit is good for a few more wins.

And first-year varsity coach Wagner says it has helped.

"A couple of the girls who played against boys in practice have improved steadily throughout the season," he said. "After facing a boy in practice the girls are much more effective against their female opponents in a game situation."

The lack of players is a mystery. Particularly in view of the fact that girls basketball has been one of the fastest growing sports in the country.

Ouch!

Wildcats stun Mustangs 21-6 in final contest

Northville coach Dennis Colligan is eating his words this week.

"The rivalry has diminished. It isn't like it used to be," he said prior to Saturday's Northville-Novi contest.

Well, somebody forgot to tell the Wildcats.

After ripping Redford Union 34-8 a week before, the Novi gridders came to the Mustang stadium flying high and stunned the listless Northville squad, 21-6.

Two injuries in the first three plays of the game — a knee injury to starting tailback Steve Cornalino and an ankle injury to lineman Scott Armstrong — didn't help Northville's offense attack.

But Colligan was making no excuses.

"They simply beat us up front," he stated. "Their defensive line manhandled our offense. They were ready, we weren't."

Wildcat signal-caller Mike Rentner amassed 149 yards in 12 carries and accounted for the majority of Novi's scoring, scampering 65 yards for a touchdown and sprinting 25 yards for a TD on another occasion.

"He played extremely well," Colligan praised. "I have a lot of respect

for him. He had a good, solid performance."

The Colt offense accounted for 213 total yards, while the defense held the Chargers to 100 yards.

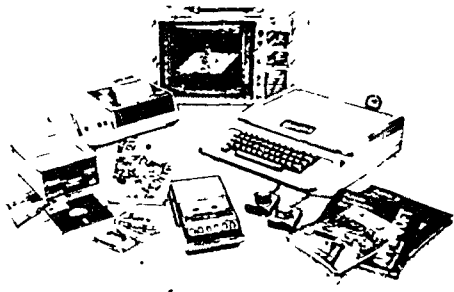
Cited for their defensive efforts were Mike Dewan, Doug Hartman, David Iafolla, Phil Pendelton and Mike Goslee.

The next home volleyball match is scheduled for this Friday at 7 p.m. at the Schoolcraft gym.

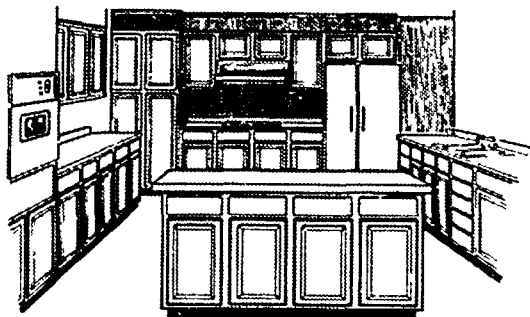
