## Pride grows at renovated NHS

"This building has brought renewed interest in teaching by the staff and more enthusiasm and a better opportunity to learn by the students."

Those were the words of Northville High School Principal Elroy Ellison at the dedication of the newly built high school on Center Street November 8, 1959.

The building, considered at the time to be "the finest facility ever provided for students of the school district," was a \$2 million project involving years of planning by school personnel and citizen groups.

As the city's only public high school, the new building was indeed the district's pride and joy. Approximately 3,000 residents, administrators, teachers and students turned out for its November 8 dedication.

The multi-unit campus style building opened its doors to students in September, 1959. The new building contained three wings with five classrooms each, a gymnasium, auditorium, special unit for administrative offices, cafeteria, library, home economics rooms and art sections.

Student capacity was 900 when the building opened and the enrollment of students in grades 9-12 for the 1959-60 school year was 635.

Total enrollment in all Northville public schools in 1959-60 was 1,700 — which at that time was the highest in the district's history.

As Northville's population increased, the number of school age children also expanded. By 1975, 4,475 K-12 students were enrolled in the districts public

schools. Of those 4,475, 1,579 9-12 students were in the high school.

With an increase in the number of students at the secondary level, maintenance and upkeep of the high school became more demanding, more time consuming and especially more costly.

During the early 1970's, the condition of the high school became an increasing problem. The 19-year-old building was beginning to show its age — floor tiles were loose, the roof leaked and walls needed painting.

However, in addition to the building's general wear and tear from constant use, another problem added to the school's deteriorating condition — vandalism.

In October, 1976, an estimated \$3,000 of damage was done to the high school over one weekend. Smashed windows and spray painted walls, both interior and exterior, brought angry comments from concerned citizens.

Yet, one episode of vandalism was only a small portion of the overall problems besetting the high school.

In November, 1976, Northville residents got their first glimpse of the school during a swine flu vaccination clinic.

Much to the chagrin of school officials, the public was confronted with halls and walls cluttered with scrap paper, floors with built-up wax and cobwebs, broken lockers, smashed windows and walls and doors painted with obscenities.

Also, plastic garbage cans dotted the halls and classrooms to catch rainwater that sometimes cascaded from leaks in the roof.

It was after the swine flu vaccine that outcries against conditions at the high school reached an all time high.

Coaches complained about filthy locker rooms and an unclean pool and argued that the school's condition was an embarrassment to the district when visiting teams played in Northville.

Teachers found that classrooms were left uncleaned for days at a time and that hallways were littered with cigarette butts and paper.

In addition, many students refused to use the restrooms which were gutted from fires and no longer had doors because of the increased vandalism.

As the complaints increased, the board of education and school administration began taking a serious look at the problems.

A tour of the high school one week after the flu vaccine brought angry criticism from school administrators and board members. The general feeling among both groups was that the school's janitorial staff was either "untrained or unwilling" to properly maintain the school.

Then-superintendent Raymond Spear, who said he was embarrassed by the tour, conceded that the poor work habits of custodial employees were at the root of the problem.

After observing one custodian, Spear was quoted as saying that "If she did more than 10 minutes of work, I'll eat it."

J. Michael Janchick, then-administrative assistant for operations, took the brunt of the criticism for the

school's conditions.

However, Janchick, a former Meads Mill principal, who had been hired by the district in July, 1976 to fill the newly created post, contested that the custo-

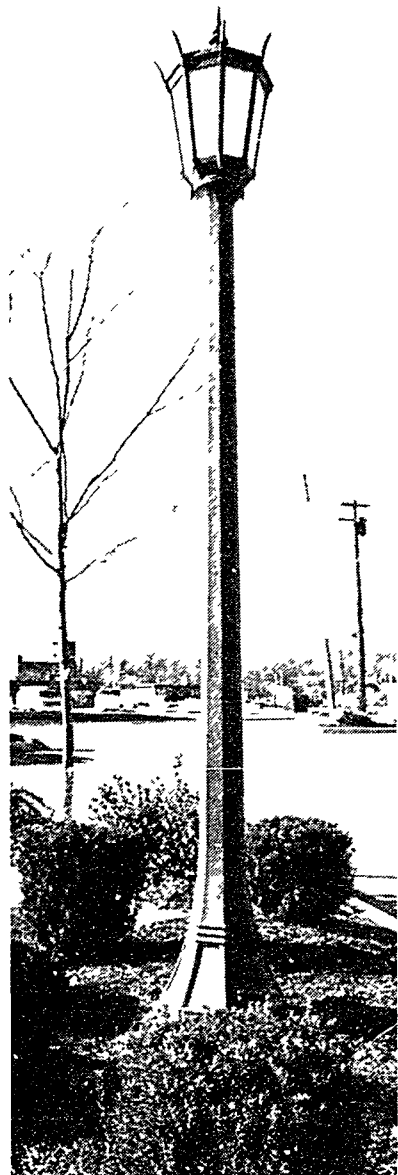
dians were not fully to blame.

By 1977 conditions at the high school began to turn around. Then in March 1978, Superintendent Spear resigned from his post after 16 years as a Nor-

thville administrator to head the DeWitt school system.

After a six-month search, the board

## Mainstreet work ends for season

Mainstreet '78 — the downtown redevelopment program approved for bonding in 1979 — has become a visible happening for local residents who have been stepping around sidewalk gaps and detouring past street excavations for the past several weeks.

"It will all be shut down shortly until spring," says City Manager Steven Walters this week, noting that paving of the parking lot behind Main Street stores across to Dunlap is expected to be completed and usable this week.

As spring breaks, he promises, planters and brick work will be completed in the park areas of the parking lots and along Main Street. There also will be landscaping and regrading along Mary Alexander Court.

Walters points to the corner of Main and Hutton with its planting and bench and to the light fixture in the middle of this parking area as "a sample of what's to come."

The conduits that will take telephone and electric wiring underground have been installed. Walters anticipates that the work by Nanmar Construction Com-

pany, bid at \$148,000, will be completed this week.

Warren Contractors, which is doing non-electrical installation, also is expected to be through with its \$158,356 project before the season's over. Shaw Electric which is installing wiring for the new street lights also is completing its work for the season. This includes such items as outlets in planters for servicing the city street light system.

Walters explains that Edison will be working to place its wires underground, but, because the street lights have been selected especially to harmonize with downtown buildings, their wiring has to be done separately.

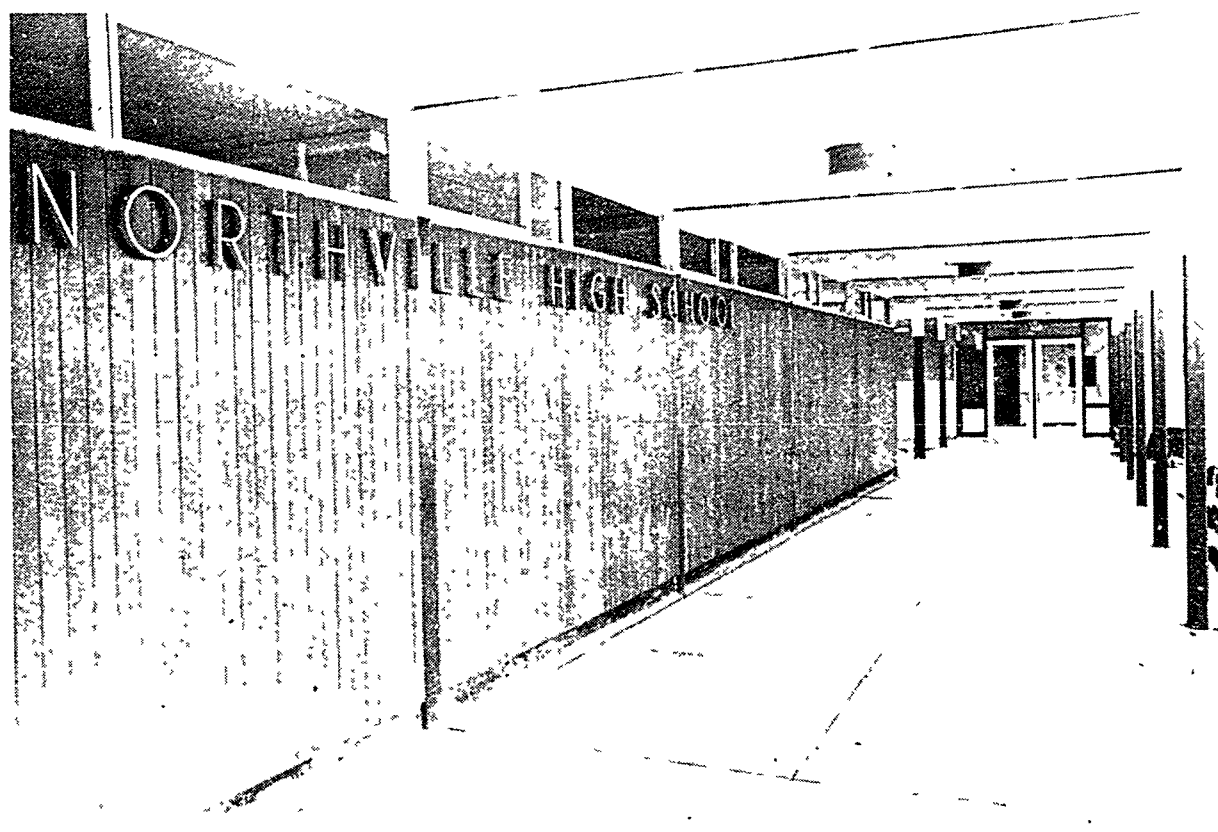
The first of the new lights already has been installed in the parking lot by Stone's Unfinished Furniture near Hutton and Main.

It is smaller at 33 inches for the fixture than the ones that will line Main Street; those fixtures on 12-foot poles will be 40 inches. There will be 103 of the new lights in the downtown area.

## Name's undisclosed

## Business manager selected

Northville Township will step into the future under new leaders atop a wholly revised structure in a mere eight days.

Prospects for the appointment of a Northville Township business manager November 20 are "looking great" according to Richard Henningsen, chairman of the community's Wage and Salary Review Commission that has organized the search for a manager.

"We're in a positive mood," Henningsen said. "The candidate has been picked."

Though Henningsen would not name the candidate, chosen from a field of three, nor indicate whether the individual had accepted a job offer, he did imply that the hiring is not yet final.

"I would choose to keep his name and where he is from a secret until we have the party's assurance that he is willing to come here and do the job," he said. "The announcement should be made at the board meeting November 20 because they have to vote on it yet."

Naming the manager at the regular trustee's meeting that day would put the new form of government in place the same day Henningsen and other newly elected township officials take office.

The decision to adopt a organizational structure utilizing a business manager while de-emphasizing the roles of the township clerk and supervisor was made last spring over the objections of township Clerk Clarice Sass and Trustee William Zapke.

Sass withdrew her name from the primary election contest for her post, leaving Susan Heintz alone in the all-Republican field to assume office.

Zapke lost his primary bid for the supervisor's post to John MacDonald. Incumbent Supervisor Donald Thomson chose not to run for re-election.

After the primary, only one incumbent trustee and one constable retained their elective posts.

Clerk-elect Heintz has served as a trustee since last January when she was appointed to fill a vacancy left by former trustee David Mitchell, who moved to San Francisco on a job transfer.

Shortly after the primary, top vote-getter Richard Allen was appointed a trustee. He filled a vacancy created when Dr. John Swienkowski resigned in a dispute over a suit against HUD dropped by the township board.

The result of all the political activity

leaves Trustee James Nowka as the only board member to retain his current post as the community adopts a totally revised government.

## Subscribe to Record — aid historical society

With the start of a Northville Record subscription campaign this week, the Northville Historical Society stands to benefit financially.

According to The Record circulation manager Jack Kaake, part of each subscription sold during the campaign will be donated to the historical society, which serves both the city and township of Northville.

"It means," explained Kaake, "that each person who purchases a subscription during the campaign will be automatically donating a portion of his or her purchase price to the historical society. The donation is tax deductible."

The annual subscription price remains the same — \$12.

Kaake said the telephone campaign begins this week and will continue for several weeks.

The historical society, whose members include both city and

township residents, is one of the largest and most active non-profit organizations in the community. Begun in 1964, the society was the prime-mover in establishment of the Mill Race Historical Village, recognized statewide for its collection of historically and architecturally significant buildings.

First building moved to the Mill Race was the church building that dates back 150 years. Originally a splinter church of the Presbyterian Church, it served a variety of purposes over the years — including service as the public library and township hall.

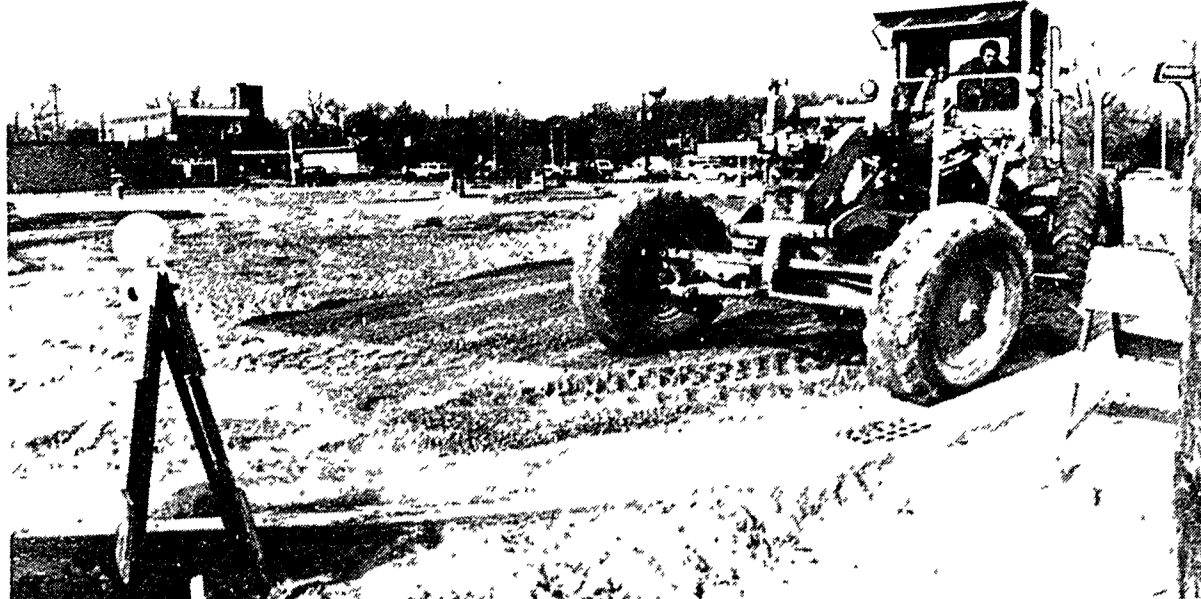
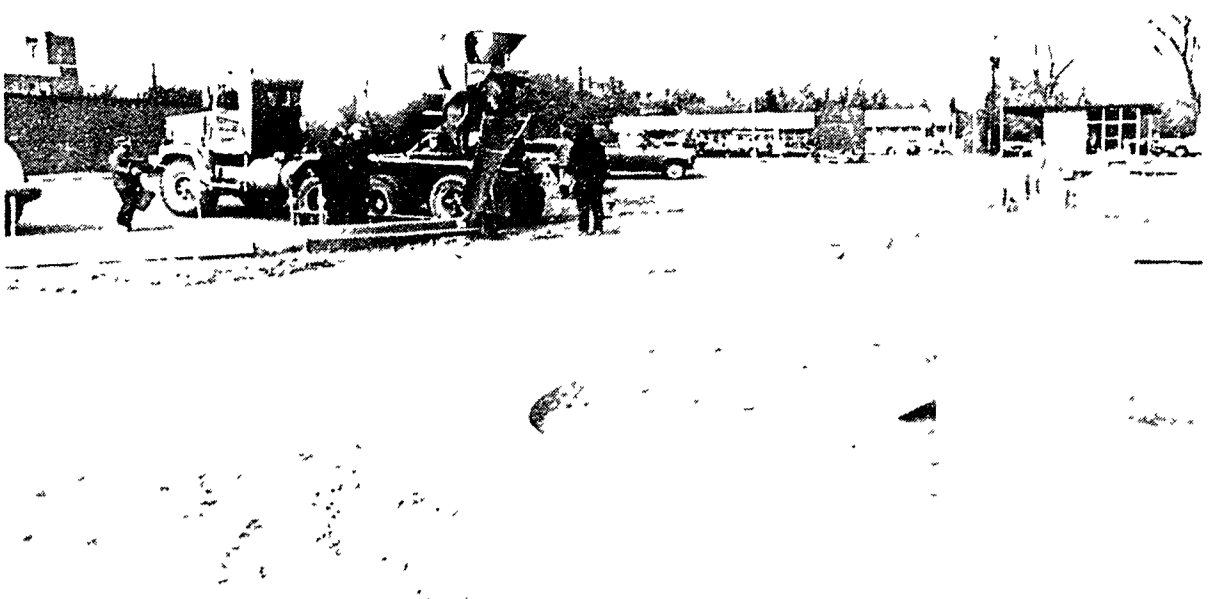
It and the other buildings in the village, which are largely financed by the society through public contributions and fund raising events, are open to visitors interested in the history and architecture of the community.

It also has become the center of activities during the annual Fourth of July celebration here.

# Mainstreet work ending for year

The eight-sided lamps are authentic reproductions of a 1910 fixture made by Westinghouse.

Walters explains they will have high pressure sodium lights to give a softer, slightly yellow glow while consuming less energy than standard lighting. They are made by Herwig, a small lighting firm in Arkansas.

Walters said he originally had hoped to be able to have one side of Main Street done by the time construction had to stop for winter, but says now that the end of the asphalt parking lot program is a good place to finish for the season.

Money of the \$1,600,000 bonding program not spent will be earning interest, he points out. It already has earned over \$130,000, he says, since January, 1980. A good share of this interest earned, however, Walters continues, will have to go to contractors next spring whose bids were based on this year's labor costs.

Firms like Shaw, which has a \$408,000 contract, and Edison, which has a \$129,840 contract, may be working

through the winter to pull the wiring through the conduits.

Almost \$500,000 worth of work has been completed, Walters lists, but not all the work residents have viewed is part of the Mainstreet monies. A Community Development Block Grant for \$151,000 was used to design and bid the program.

A collapsed sanitary sewer on Main, found during the process of televising the sewers, Walters points out, was replaced with water and sewer department funds, as have a main storm sewer across to Wing and a large water main to give better pressure downtown.

A handicap approach has been installed at the city hall entrance with Community Development Block Grant funding. Walters said it seemed like good business to do this work in conjunction with the Mainstreet project.

Private funds representing payment by businesses for paving on their property during the renovations accounts for another \$53,600, bringing the total to approximately \$1,984,000 for the complete program.

The Mainstreet '78 program under

the Downtown Development Authority is financed in the \$1,600,000 amount with the general obligation bonds bearing interest from 6.6 to eight percent due in various amounts through 1994 with first principal payment of \$50,000 due in 1982.

Captured taxes representing property taxes on the increase in state-equalized value of the downtown development district since the adoption of Mainstreet '78 are earmarked for debt retirement.

Walters says he has heard comments about the cement and asphalt patching and is concerned that residents know this is a temporary measure for the winter.

A finished job will be done when underground work is complete and Detroit Concrete Products has done curbing and paving work. The firm's \$378,000 base bid included street front work to come.

The brick and paving work on Main along with the installation of the new lights will be done in much the same way as work progressed this fall, Walters says, with traffic not completely stopped.

"Overall merchants have been very cooperative. I can't think of any who have not been," Walters reports, mentioning that some have offered ideas that have been put into effect. Screening and locations for trash bins, he points out, are a case in point. There will be fewer than planned as the bins are to have compactor units.

A retail store space at the rear of Joe's Little Bar, planned as part of the business' renovation by owner Robert Getzie, already is under construction with the bar building expected to be torn down in the next couple of weeks.

"It's all coming," says the city manager. "You can see the whole theme if you visualize it from the appearance of the corner of Main and Hut-ton."

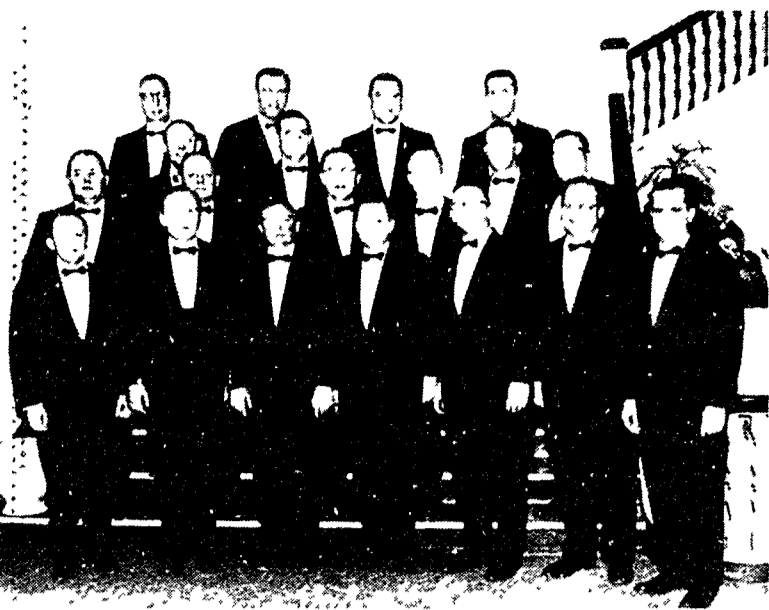

## Lutheran Choralaires to sing at benefit here

The Lutheran Choralaires, an outstanding male chorus that has been singing in the Detroit area for more than 30 years, will be making its first appearance in Northville at 7:30 p.m. this Saturday at St. Paul's Lutheran Church as a benefit for its organ fund.

There will be no admission charge for the concert in the school gymnasium at the corner of High and Elm, but a free-will offering will be taken for the organ fund. Everyone interested in the community is invited.

Jack Westmeier, a Kings Mill resident, is the only Northville member of the 24-voice choir. He is one of the original members and faithfully has been attending weekly rehearsals with his fellow choralaires for more than 30 years. Rehearsals are held at Bethany Lutheran Church in Detroit.

Gerry List is director. The choralaires have an extensive repertoire of both sacred and secular songs.

Their first group of numbers this Saturday will consist of patriotic selections from their recording, "One Nation Under God." While the Lutheran Choralaires have cut several records and some tapes, they are not available commercially but may be obtained from any member.

The middle set of selections in Saturday's concert will feature sacred songs, including "Sanctus" by Franz Schubert, "The Last Words of David" by Randall Thompson and the spectacular "Creation" by Willie Richter.

The final set of songs will recall old-time favorites, such as "Aura Lee," "Seein' Nellie Home" and "Dry Bones."

## Hearing, liquor license, traffic light on agenda

A public hearing on proposed uses for Community Development Block Grant funds will be held at Northville City Council meeting at 8 p.m. Monday.

Based on previous allocations, the city can expect to receive about \$15,000 through Oakland County and \$80,000 from Wayne. City Manager Steven Walters told council at its November 3 meeting that another \$30,000 in the past later was received from Wayne County in a special needs allocation so that about \$125,000 total is to be considered.

At the last meeting the council delayed discussion on the request for a transfer of ownership of a 1980 12-month resort class C liquor license of the Northville Cocktail Lounge (the bowling alley) at 132 South Center.

Action was held until Monday's meeting so that the police report and building department check for violations and fire code compliance would be ready.

The application lists purchasers as A. Malcolm Allen, Donald A. DiComo, William M. Fenkell, Lee E. Holland, Stanley J. Johnston, Ervin E. Kamp, John M. Miller and Linwood Willard Snow.

The license is part of the condition of sale of the business and is for service and consumption of alcoholic beverages in the concourse area of the bowling alley. The state liquor control commission requests the city to recommend approval or disapproval of the

license transfer.

Also on Monday's agenda is the proposed traffic signal at Eight Mile and Taft roads. Wayne County Road Commission engineers have detailed installation plans and given the estimated cost at \$18,300.

Oakland County is being asked to pay for 25 percent of the installation charge and 25 percent of energy and maintenance costs.

The city also is asked to pay 25 percent as Taft is under the jurisdiction of the city.

### It's time to start Christmas mailing

Local residents with friends or relatives living in foreign countries or who mail to members of the armed services stationed overseas are reminded by Postmaster John Steimel that it is not too early to plan for Christmas mailing.

International mail cutoff deadlines for surface packages to Central and South America, Europe, North and Northwest Africa is this week. Friday is deadline for surface parcels to the Caribbean-West Indies.

Other December military deadlines are December 5, letters and priority mail to Mid East; December 8, PAL to Alaska, letters and priority mail to Africa and Greenland; December 12, letters and priority mail to Europe and Far East; December 14, letters and priority mail to Iceland; December 15, letters and priority mail to Alaska, Hawaii, Caribbean-West Indies.

Other regular international mailing deadlines are November 28, air parcels to North and Northwest Africa, Australia, Mid East, Southeast and West Africa.

December 1 is deadline to guarantee Christmas arrival for air parcels to Central and South America and Southeast Asia, for airmail letters and cards to Australia, Central and South America and Southeast Asia; December 5, airmail letters and cards to Mid East.

Other deadlines are December 8, air parcels to Europe and Far East, airmail letters and cards to North, Northwest, Southeast and West Africa; December 12, air parcels to the Caribbean and West Indies.

# NHS gets new lease on life

of education awarded a three-year contract to Lawrence Nichols, then director of secondary education in Livonia.

In June 1978, the high school received a boost when Northville voters narrowly approved a \$1 million bond issue, which provided for maintenance and major repairs of the district's buildings.

With the bond issue approved, the district began making major repairs to the building which included everything from roof reconstruction to locker replacement.

However, improvements take time and the school's problems were far from over.

On November 1, 1978, approximately 55 members of the NHS teaching staff signed a memorandum to Superintendent Lawrence Nichols regarding the "lack of maintenance at the high school."

In the memorandum, the staff argued that "the continuing poor maintenance affects our teaching efficiency, our morale, and more importantly, our health, as well as the health of the students."

Teacher complaints stemmed from the fact that rooms, which were supposed to be cleaned daily, had gone untouched from one day to the next for periods, in some cases, of up to three or four days.

As the year progressed, most major repair work was underway with administrators hoping to complete renovations by the opening of the new school year.

Yet, when school finally opened for the 1979-80 school year much of the work was still unfinished.

The fall of 1979, brought many more headaches to high school administrators and staff members.

On October 8, in the middle of the high school's \$121,000 re-roofing job, a rainstorm caused the roof to come off and rainwater poured into the school.

The Chaffee Roofing Company, in charge of the re-roofing job, had pulled off parts of the roof and put in insulated fill which must cure for three days

before a new roof can be put on.

The morning after the rainfall puddles up to one-inch deep flooded 12 classrooms and offices. Two mathematics classes and a physics lab had to be rescheduled. Rain poured through the roof and down the walls in much of the science wing.

Though damage to the inside of the school was not extensive, it was nevertheless another obstacle.

Within that same month, Michael Janchick, administrative assistant for operations, requested a transfer from his post to a teaching position.

(In January, 1980, the board of education awarded a contract to William Hood to replace Janchick. Hood was formerly school building and plant engineer with the Huron Valley school system.)

In November 1979, NHS faced its biggest problem — a non-functioning fire alarm system.

A state fire marshal official requested that the school repair the alarm system or face evacuation.

To make matters worse, officials discovered that the 22-year-old alarm system had not been working since a short circuit blew out the alarm horns in March of 1977.

Shocked administrators and board of education members requested that repairs be made immediately. After examining the outdated system, it was found that major repairs would be needed and the system would not be completely finished until the following year.

By the end of last year, however, things began to change at the high school. After years of frustration, countless setbacks and a lot of bad press, the high school appeared to have taken a new lease on life.

If the past four years have been grim for Northville High School, the next four years hold a definite promise of being a great deal brighter.

At the start of the 1980-81 school year, most of the major repairs at the school had been completely finished.

School officials reported that NHS had its "smoothest first day" in years and claimed that students as well as

staff members were commenting on how good the school looked.

Just what brought about the changes in the appearance of the high school and in the attitudes of those associated with it, is a combination of many things.

NHS Principal George Aune said he believes one of the major changes to take place is a more positive attitude about the school among students, staff and the public.

With the school looking better than it has in years, a feeling of pride and respect has replaced the former apathy and indifference.

In 1977, Aune instituted a school pride campaign in an attempt to instill in students a pride in NHS.

"We support students who keep the school clean," Aune said. With the vast change in the school's appearance, Aune said students have "tended to be much more responsible."

Part of this attitude stems from peer pressure, he added. Last year a group of students organized a beautification committee and took on the responsibility of painting the restrooms and designing graphics on some of the walls.

Students who have devoted their time and energy into cleaning or painting want to make sure it stays that way, Aune said.

Though vandalism is still a problem, Aune admitted that it is not as bad as it has been in the past.

Aune said he believes that many of the school's problems stemmed from the rapid growth in the Northville district.

"I don't think building and maintenance kept up with the students," he confided. "We had four major additions since the school was built in 1958 and at one time we had 1,500 students in a building designed for 7-800."

Aune added that the voluntary experimental year-round school program implemented in Northville in the early 1970's also contributed to some of the problems as it "interfered with summer maintenance work."

Aune said this year's maintenance and

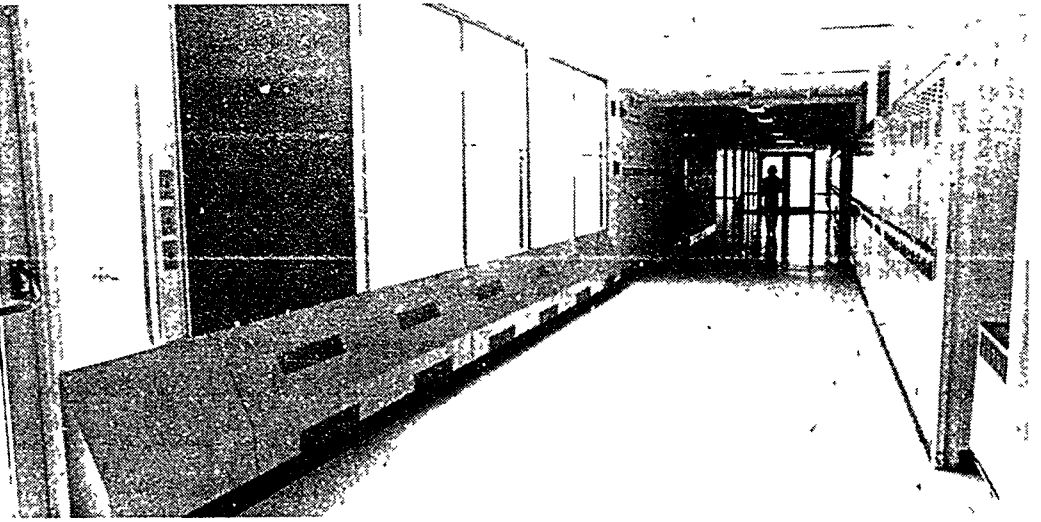

# Renovation renews Mustang pride

Custodial staff has been working on regular schedules to keep the building clean and repair broken or worn-out school property.

"The policy now is that when something is broken or vandalized," Aune said, "it is replaced or fixed immediately."

Ralph Redmond, assistant principal at NHS, said he also believes that "the constant addressing of things," will hopefully alleviate the problems which once plagued the school.

"The kids are appreciating the strides which have been made," Redmond said. "If the school looks like it's being taken care of, then the kids are more apt to take care of it."

Redmond said the teacher and student moral is much better this year. "It's just a better feeling all the way around," he said.

Redmond said the appearance of the school has brought the change in student and staff attitude.

"Before, it looked like a bombed-out shelter," he said. "I think a lot of people thought it was worthless."

Michael Janchick, former administrative assistant for operations and now a social studies and math teacher at Cooke Junior High, said that many of the problems at the high school were not alleviated sooner because there were no funds available.

It was not until the \$1 million bond issue passed in 1978 that major repair work could be done, he said.

The administrative assistant for operations post was created in 1976 and Janchick, the first administrator hired for the job, was put in charge of maintenance and operations.

When public outcry against the conditions at the high school reached an all time high, Janchick became the target

of many of the complaints.

Yet, Janchick contends that many of the problems at the high school were the culmination of years of neglect.

"A lot of things were left broken," he said.

Janchick agreed that the maintenance and custodial staff were a problem, but said that they are not fully to blame for the uncleanness of the school at that time.

"The custodial staff was a problem from the stand point that they didn't have a lot of supervision," he said.

William Hood, who took over as operations assistant after Janchick retired, said custodial apathy may have been a problem in the past but that the attitude has changed considerably over the past year.

With nine custodians working at the school, the halls and classrooms have remained virtually litter free.

Hood, who is largely responsible for making sure that repair and maintenance work gets done, had quite a job on his hands this past summer.

Some of the major repairs completed at the school before the opening of the 1980-81 school year included: installation of terrazzo flooring throughout the hallways; renovation of the auditorium

including paint, seat repair, carpet and lighting repair; complete locker room renovation; interior and exterior painting; new carpet in the Media Center; ceramic tile on the walls; new wood doors on the restrooms and a freshly painted gym.

Hood said the repairs have helped boost the morale of students and staff members. The once dark corridors of the school now have brightly painted walls and a light colored floor. Heating ducts have been covered and old bulletin boards, once a major eyesore, have been replaced with ceramic tiles.

Hood said the school's maintenance staff now tries to repair broken items as soon as possible — hopefully to alleviate some of the past problems.

"For some reason a broken window breeds other broken windows," he said.

In addition to the repairs already made at the school, Hood said the staff is looking into other areas which need upgrading and are examining ways to economize. They currently are looking into solar energy.

"I think we're trying to show students we have pride in the buildings," he said.

"After all, we're all here for the students."

## Police Blotter

### Attacks aide, officer

A Novi Ambulance attendant and a Northville Township police officer are filing felonious assault charges against Kerry Steele, of 47062 W. Main, following an incident at that address Saturday.

Police responded to family members' request for assistance at the suspect's home during a dispute.

Family members told police Steele had been drinking heavily during a family gathering and an argument broke out when he attempted to drive his girl friend home. When the suspect's family attempted to restrain him from driving in his intoxicated condition, they told police, he became violent.

When police arrived Steele was being held down on the front lawn. According to the police report he was shouting and swearing at both the officers and his family.

Family requested that an ambulance be brought to the scene, but Steele refused medical assistance when Novi Ambulance responded to the call.

Police report that Steele was apparently cooperating, so he was released from being held on the ground. According to the report, he then staggered down the driveway, followed by an officer, suddenly turned and struck the ambulance attendant in the face.

He then is alleged to have kicked her in the left thigh. When Officer Michael Panagiotides grabbed Steele and shouted "You're under arrest," the report states, the suspect struck the officer in the jaw.

It reportedly took two officers to restrain Steele. In the ensuing scuffle, Panagiotides reported, he suffered injury to his wrist and fingers. He was taken to St. Mary Hospital where x-rays showed no broken bones.

The ambulance attendant stated her intention to file assault and battery charges, the police report states. Panagiotides is filing charges of felonious assault and battery on a police officer and resisting arrest.

Township police Saturday arrested James Allison, of 16623 Country Club, Livonia, on charges of theft from a stolen auto.

The car, owned by a resident of Livonia, was found by township police at the corner of Norham and Bradner Saturday morning after Thomas Rothermel, who resides on Norham at the corner, called to report property (a pair of socks and a CB radio) laying on his lawn.

Checking nearby cars revealed one with similar socks in the backseat and cut wires hanging under the dash. A license plate check revealed that the car was stolen and the case was being handled by the Wayne County Sheriff's Department, according to Township Police Sergeant Philip Presnell.

Presnell asked Rothermel to keep an eye on the car until the sheriff's office could notify the owner or impound the vehicle.

Rothermel called later in the day to say two men had arrived in a "dirty, old banged-up white Datsun" the report states. After the car owner called and said he had not authorized anyone to pick up the vehicle, police went to the scene and reportedly found Allison inside the car pulling on a stereo power booster.

After first saying he did not own the car but was only looking for a rope, the suspect reportedly confessed on the scene to having stolen it from the parking lot of the Hilton Inn earlier in the

week, Presnell said. Another suspect, standing nearby at the side of the street when police arrived, was identified and released due to lack of evidence against him, Presnell stated.

The arrested man was later released to the Wayne County Sheriff. A lighter and clip Allison identified as stolen from the auto were retained as evidence.

Township police are investigating a breaking and entering at the Highland Lakes club house.

A club house employee reporting for work Wednesday found a light on in the office, the office door and a sliding glass window open and the office ransacked, she told police.

Investigation showed a storage cabinet valued at \$175 broken open, giving access to a petty cash box containing \$189.

Police theorize that the burglars entered through a basement door, using an eight-inch concrete block to knock out metal slats at the base of the door. Damage to the door is estimated at \$50.

Entry to the office was probably made by prying open the lock on the sliding window, the police report states. In addition to the petty cash fund, missing items include four photographs. Other items of value were untouched, police said.

There are presently no suspects in the case.

A McCullough chain saw and a welder were taken from the Highland Lakes maintenance garage, 19442 Gerald, on October 31, township police reported.

Value of the stolen property is estimated at \$1,120.

While on routine patrol, township police observed a broken window and cut screen, apparently the burglars' point of entry. The screen had been cut with a sharp object, police said.

Police are looking for a dark-colored vehicle believed to be a mid-1970's model which was seen in the area at the time of the burglary.

More than \$3,500 worth of tool boxes and tools were reported stolen from John Mach Ford, 550 West Seven Mile, on November 1, city police said.

Burglars apparently entered the business by breaking a garage door window on the south side of the building, police said.

Police are questioning several suspects in connection with the theft.

A Northville resident told police she found part of a broken straight pin in a Bit 'O Honey candy bar which her son received on Halloween night.

The youth had gone trick or treating on both sides of Welch between Reed and the city limits, on both sides of Horton between Welch and Maplewood and on Reed between Maplewood and Welch, the mother told police.

The youth was not harmed as he discovered the pin before eating it, police said.

Christopher Michael Burkhart, 18, of Plymouth was sentenced October 28 to 2 1/2 to 15 years in prison by Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Victor Baum.

Burkhart was found guilty of breaking and entering an occupied dwelling with intent to commit larceny, in connection with two burglaries which occurred the night of June 24 in the township.

Home-like atmosphere sought

# Providence residents housed in brand new quarters

Living is easier for those at Our Lady of Providence Center with the completion of a new housing complex recently. Ground was broken for the three buildings in the complex at the Catholic school for mentally handicapped

children and young adults in April, 1979. Dedication of the A.G. Apartments (named for the school founder, Aloysius Guarella) was October 19. The buildings were blessed November 2.

The 16 young adults making their homes in each building were moved in

before that time, however. Their move from dormitories in the main building into the sleek new housing was accomplished in late September and early October.

The new buildings (called One, Two and Three for the convenience of

residents needing to distinguish the nearly identical structures) are designed to give the young people as unrestricted an environment as possible.

Sister Marie Antoinette explained that an effort has been made to make the apartments "as home-like as we can" in line with the school philosophy of providing the exceptional youngsters with skills leading to a full and happy life.

Each building has two apartments separated by large double doors. On opposite sides of a wide hall are two bedrooms with a shared bath. Two occupants are assigned to each bedroom.

Individual dining and laundry rooms serve each fully carpeted apartment. Fully equipped kitchens and recreation rooms, complete with large color televisions and quality stereo equipment, are also available to apartment residents.

Nuns quarters and an office are centrally located for proximity to all rooms. In addition, the central building has a sickroom with hospital bed in the event any resident falls seriously ill.

Each structure has its own heating and air conditioning facilities.

Interior design throughout the complex, though related, is largely individualized with furniture styles and colors varying widely. Art selection in the apartments also differs — all in the

pursuit of a pleasant, home-like atmosphere for the residents.

Sister Marie Antoinette said some parents looked at the new structures and exclaimed that they didn't have such things at home, while one of the girls said it looked like a hotel and asked to see the bell for calling room service.

Although the new buildings are designed to give residents more independent living, that was not the sole concern behind construction of the new housing units.

"The fact that we've added three new buildings doesn't mean we can accommodate an increased population, either," Sister Marie Antoinette noted.

The dorms previously used for resident housing are being converted into

living space for nuns, she explained, and the old kitchen and dining area remodelled into sorely needed classrooms.

The A.G. Apartments are located directly behind the main school building and chapel, arranged as three sides of a square completed by the main building.

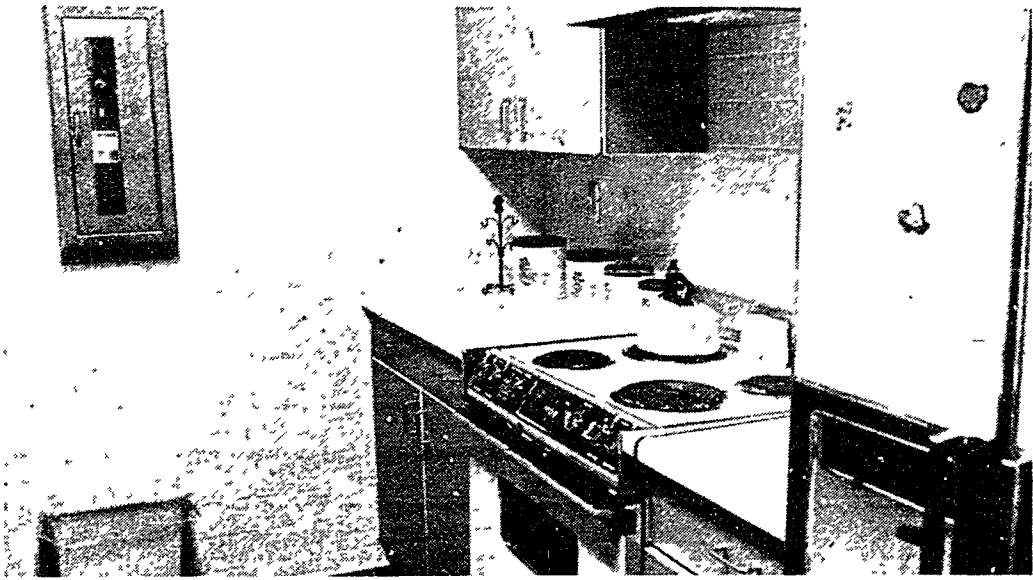
Back entrances to the apartments open on the courtyard and play area.

The new structures face underdeveloped property behind the Center and the sister said landscaping of this area, which still shows signs of the recent activity, will begin as soon as possible.

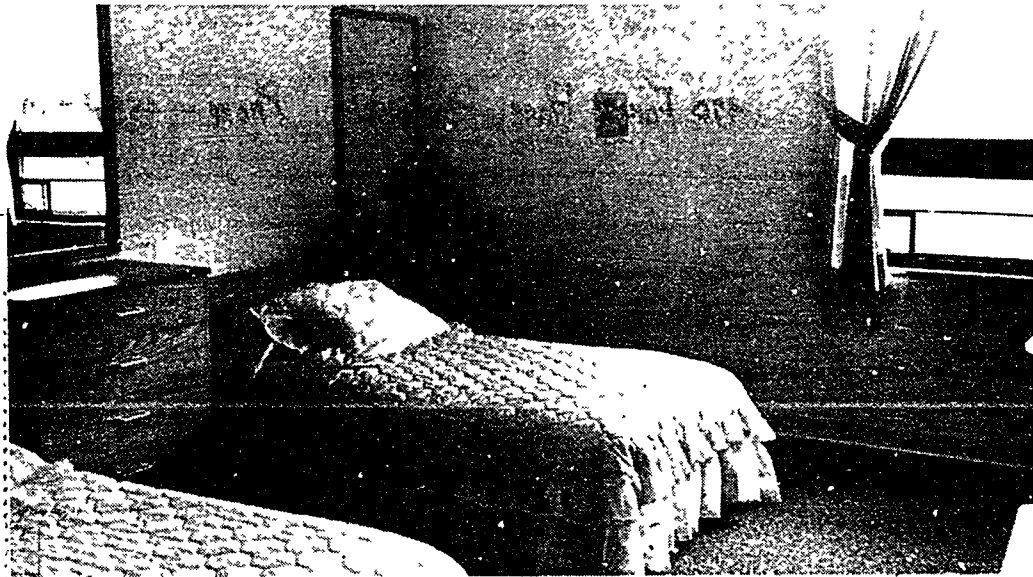
For now, she noted, the children are anticipating winter and the opportunity to sled down the mounds of dirt left by construction crews.



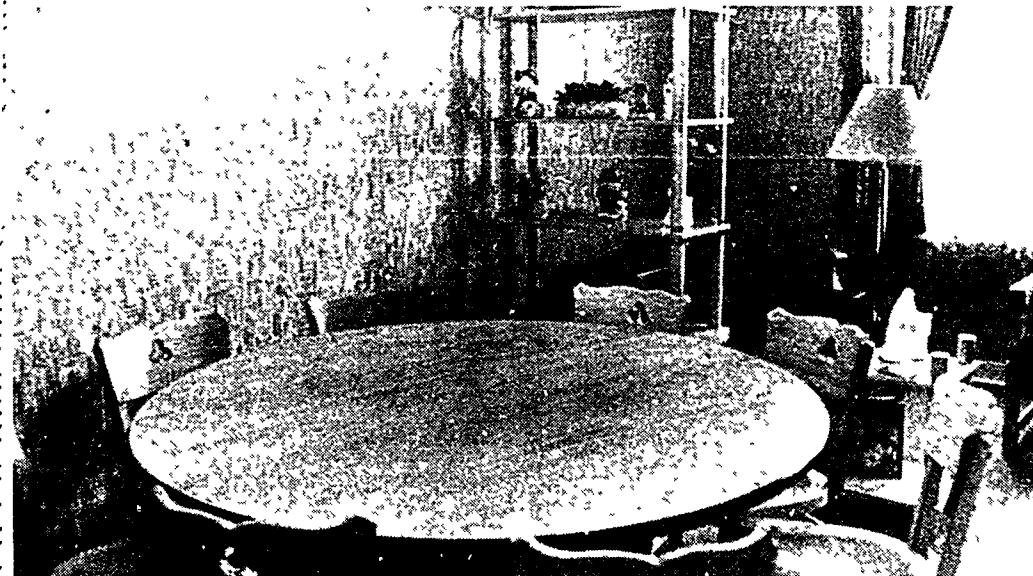
Exteriors of the three new buildings are identical

### Tisch defeat misinterpreted

With the three tax proposals on the November ballot all going down to defeat it is possible that Governor Milliken and our state legislators might believe that taxpayer-voters are satisfied with the present tax structure. We hope not.

In a letter to the editor this week a local resident points out that on the basis of early returns approximately 46 percent of the voters voted for Tisch Proposition D. He wonders if it might not have picked up the added five points needed to win if the vast sums had not been spent by opponents urging its defeat. It's highly possible.

We agree with the letter writer that Kathleen Straus' statement is without validity. She suggested, following last week's defeat of the Tisch amendment, that "we have been oversold on the fact that there's a tax revolt in Michigan."

The mistaken conclusions of

Ms. Straus and others of her persuasion are, we suspect, the foundation upon which new taxes and fees may be built in the next few months.

Unless we are grossly deceived, the defeat of Tisch hardly suggests a majority of people are satisfied with spiraling taxes. Quite the contrary, many of the anti-Tisch people here with whom we have spoken indicated they voted "no" to give the legislature one last chance to develop a fair tax structure to finance fat-free services. The message we heard, "enough is enough," applies to all levels of government — local as well as state.

Thus, rather than listening to the likes of Ms. Straus, lawmakers ought to be listening to their constituency. If they listen, they will begin paring before considering any new taxes. They would be well advised to follow the lead of our own local legislator, Jack Kirksey, who returns to Lansing pledged to "no tax increases."

## We're proud of our voters

With 73 percent of Northville Township registered voters joining the astounding 77 percent of city voters in going to the polls last Tuesday our community is well above the national average — estimated in the fifty percent.

We join election workers in calling the turnout "fantastic." It speaks well for the community, especially when there were no burning local issues. Praise also is due polling place workers who efficiently processed the 6,018 township voters and 3,016 city voters as they punched ballots and pulled levers. The consensus was that the lines never were too long; even the morning rush was handled well.

## Exciting wait

We're satisfied with the progress to date on Mainstreet 78, although like many residents of the community we're anxious to see it completed — not because of the inconveniences construction causes but because we find the downtown project so exciting.

It's like an unopened gift beneath the Christmas tree. We

can't wait to see what's inside.

But this "gift" will go unwrapped through the Christmas season, teasing us with little hints here and there through most of 1981 before our anticipation is finally satisfied. We're convinced when opened this package will have been well worth the wait.

man knows players and people. He can organize a first rate football program for Michigan State if he is given half a chance.

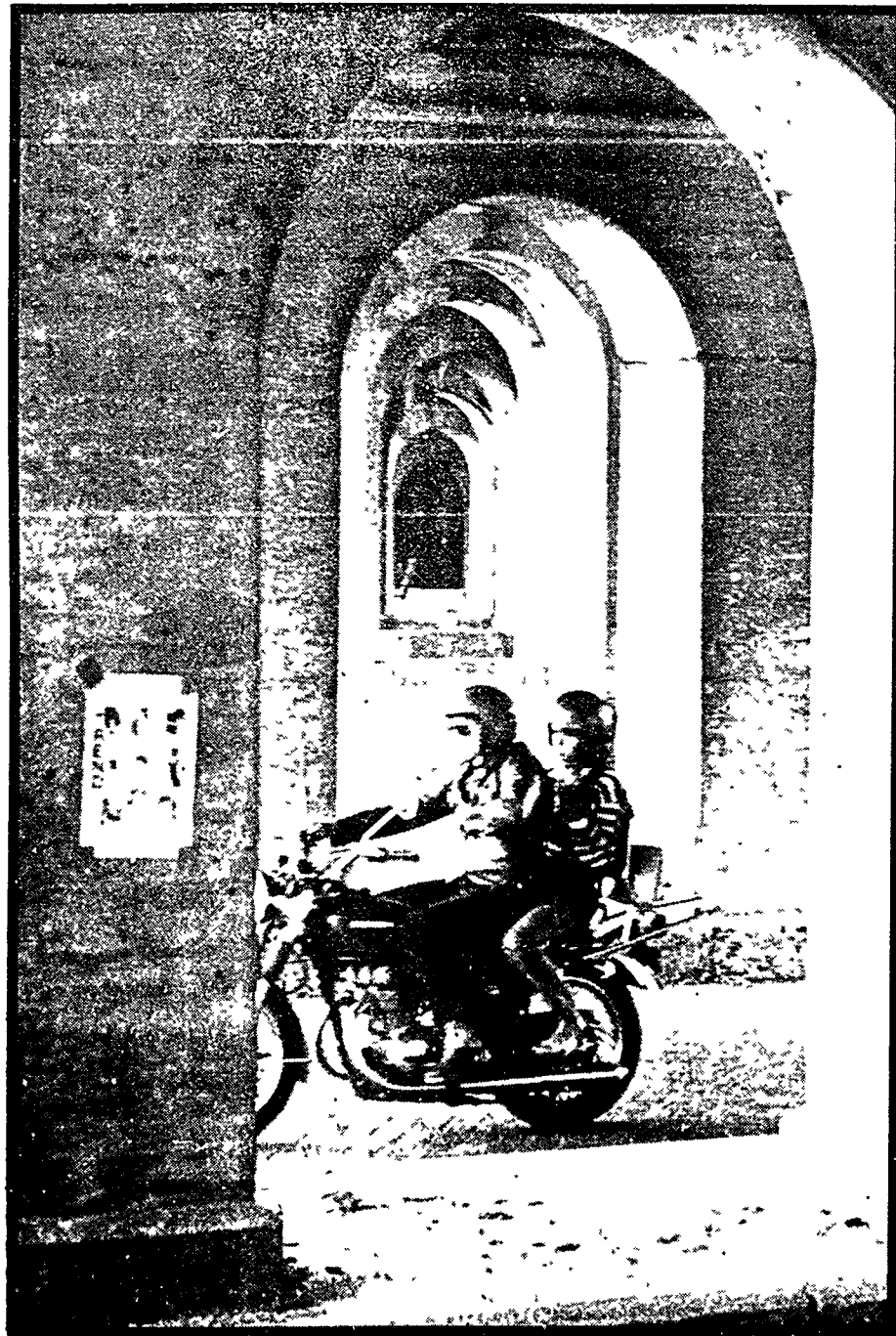
What this takes is an aggressive recruiting program and a first rate coaching staff. If the university provides Muddy with what he needs (Go Green, lots of Green), he will succeed.

Like most, we measure success in terms of victories and next year, wait for next year, it will be MSU 21, U-M 3. And then—Roses!

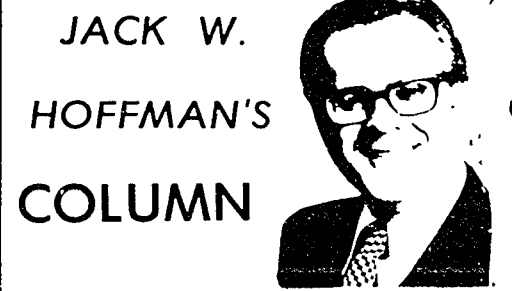

# Legislators should examine defeated tax proposals

To the Editor:  
This is an open letter to Governor William Milliken and all state legislators written the day after the election.

Yesterday the voters of Michigan rejected the Tisch Amendment, the Smith-Bullard Amendment and your own Proposition C.

On the surface it appears that the majority of the electorate is satisfied with the tax structure as it now is constituted. The writer, however, feels that those in power should not be too quick to come to this conclusion.

It must be remembered that based on results as of early Wednesday morning, November 5, approximately 46 percent of the voters were dissatisfied enough with the tax structure to vote for Proposition D. The total raw numbers are not in as of this writing but 46 percent translates into some very large numbers of unhappy people.

In addition, approximately 25 percent voted for Proposition A, and another 25 percent voted for Proposition C. These voters were also expressing their disapproval of the current tax structure although they voted for a tax shift

rather than a straight tax cut. The writer has no way of knowing how many voters cast their ballots for more than one of the three propositions. However, it is probably very safe to assume that well above 70 percent of the electorate are dissatisfied with the current tax structure.

## Area Newsbeat

**HOWELL** — Livingston County judges are in line for salary increases as a result of recent action by the county board of commissioners.

**HAMBURG** — A Hamburg man accused of breaking and entering and felonious assault in connection with a June hostage taking waived preliminary examination.

**HOWELL** — Taxes for Livingston County residents will increase following a decision by county commissioners to levy millages for the five-county parks program and the courthouse restoration project.

**GENOA** — John Latson, his father and his grandfather before him have owned and farmed land in Genoa Township for nearly a century. Needless to say, he was shocked when he learned that the Southeast Livingston Joint Utility Board was eyeing his property as one of seven possible sites for a wastewater treatment plant.

**HOWELL** — Adoption of a \$12 million 1980-81 school budget which included \$190,000 in program cuts was met with pessimism and some criticism.

**MILFORD** — Michael McDonald has learned to cope in the four years since he lost his legs in a train accident. That's why he doesn't anticipate major changes in his life, even though a jury recently awarded him \$7 million from

the Grand Trunk & Western Railroad as compensation for negligence in the accident.

**MILFORD** — Plans by the Agnew Machine Company to construct a 24,000 square foot manufacturing plant here appear to be in trouble because the company is unable to wait until December for the village council to deliberate on plans for an industrial park in the village.

**MILFORD** — Donald Sharp, a Walled Lake school teacher and a former Huron Valley Board of Education member, is ready to fight a Huron Valley decision to drop driver's education.

**NOVI** — Anyone driving through Novi would never guess that the construction industry has been one of the major victims of inflation and soaring interest rates. "There's no question about it," said Building Official Earl Bailey. "There's very little going on in the way of residential construction, but we've got plenty to keep us busy in the way of commercial and industrial development."

**NOVI** — Novi and Farmington Hills have joined forces to establish a "task force" that will pursue the widening of Twelve Mile from Orchard Lake Road in Farmington Hills to the Beck Road interchange with I-96.

**NOVI** — Groundbreaking ceremonies for the Novi Sheraton Motor Inn, located on the west side of Novi Road opposite Twelve Oaks Mall, have been held and earth balancing operations for the \$8.5 million facility already are underway.

**WALLED LAKE** — J. Michael Dornan, Farmington Hills' 29-year-old assistant city manager, was unanimously selected as Walled Lake's city manager during a special city council meeting. Dornan is slated to assume responsibilities as the city's chief administrator November 17.

**WIXOM** — Wixom is still one of two communities under consideration for construction of a major ethanol refinery. But it's beginning to look as if Wixom may no longer be the prime location for the proposed facility.

**SOUTH LYON** — A grievance by 16 middle school teachers has been denied by the school board. Teachers claim they do not receive a 30-minute duty-free lunch period each day at the school as stated in their contract.

**SOUTH LYON** — School Superintendent Jack Meeder has denied that he signed away the gas and oil rights of the 40-acre Griswold Road property and further denied any wrongdoing while assisting the school board in the purchase of the property.

## Michigan Mirror

An Ingham County Court judge has ordered the state, by the beginning of the year, to ease its prison overcrowding problem.

As a result of a lawsuit filed by East Lansing attorney Zolton Ferency, Judge Ray Hotchkiss ordered the state to expand its 11,738 inmate capacity of its prisons by moving its least dangerous prisoners into temporary housing and by using prison space where no inmates now are kept.

The order also requires the state to reduce its inmate population to 12,013 by January 1.

As of October 22, state prisons held 13,140 inmates while another 1,968 were residing in halfway houses and alternative corrections facilities or programs.

Hotchkiss said prison population could be better controlled through the use of alternatives to maximum security cells.

He suggested that if the population goes above the 13,013 figure, consideration should be given to increased use of parole, liberalized standards for revoking parole and expanded use of halfway

houses and other community alternatives.

He added, however, that in no case should a prisoner who would likely constitute a menace to society or public safety be paroled early or allowed to remain free following any parole violation.

The Hotchkiss order also blocked the state from housing prisoners after January 1 in county jails which don't meet national standards for prisons except to cope with a "serious prison disturbance" when jails could be used for a maximum of 60 days.

The judge called the order "realistic and reasonable" and would not involve any massive expenditure by the Department of Corrections.

Perry Johnson, director of the Department of Corrections, said the court order was evidence that the state has a serious crowding problem that cannot be further delayed. He called the order only a short-term solution to the overall problem.

"The solution offered in this order cannot control the problem indefinitely, they only gave us breathing room to take the steps that must be taken to resolve the problem in the future," Johnson said.

Attorney General Frank J. Kelley agreed the prisons are overcrowded but even with the ruling, the state still will need expanded correctional facilities.

Kelley emphasized that the state needed new prisons for both dangerous, hardened criminals and for lesser offenders. He said he also appreciated the "quandary the court found itself in with regard to the problem."

Ferency said the court decision could have a positive impact on prison reform simply by providing a manageable inmate population. He added, however, that simply reducing population was not in itself a reform step.

Ferency concluded the case was unique because it marked the first time a state has undertaken by itself action to correct overcrowding problems without a federal court ordering a reduction.

ministration of Meals on Wheels Program October 1 after separating from joint Detroit-Wayne County Area Office on Aging earlier this year.

A consortium of 34 out-county communities had been ordered to split that area's nutrition programs with the county's office on aging for 90 days until further hearings could be completed.

Dante DiVitto has been acting director of the county program for the past year and director since its inception seven years ago.

Last month Wayne County Commissioner R. William Joyner (D-Plymouth) announced he had obtained a confidential report documenting instances of senior citizen meals being sold on street corners and meals being delivered to seniors who have been dead for months.

He has demanded a full hearing and investigation by the county's human resources committee.

The report was prepared by Detroit Deputy Health Director George Gaines and was based on evidence, Joyner stated, obtained by JoAnne Klocke, in

charge of Detroit's meals-at-home project in Highland Park, Hamtramck, Harper Woods, Grosse Pointes and Detroit.

The report of violations in delivering meals, with drivers selling them on the street, stated that lack of adequate monitoring of the program and enforcement by both the out-county grantee and the State Office on Aging.

In the division of administration of senior citizen program funding, a federal Title III grant for Senior Citizen Information and Referral in the 34 Out-Wayne County communities recently was awarded to Downriver Citizens Office, Incorporated, the Redford Township Senior Citizens Department and the Romulus Help Center.

The grant of more than \$73,000 will allow all three agencies to provide information and referral services to the elderly and do more "outreach" work, according to Faye Ross, senior citizen advisor at Redford Community Center.

The Redford center at 12121 Hemingway in Redford Township will service Northville, Northville Township, Plymouth, Plymouth Township as well as Canton, Dearborn Heights, Garden

City, Inkster, Livonia, Redford, Wayne and Westland.

An 800-462-8666 toll-free number is available for calls for information since October 18.

Ms. Ross says that the network program being developed under the grant will enable them to refer seniors to hobby and craft groups, travel opportunities, community garden plot

programs and social groups as well as to use staff expertise on health and welfare programs, including nutrition, home repair and tax assistance for seniors.

A comprehensive directory of all senior citizen services within 34 communities is planned and will be ready for distribution in March, 1981, says Ms. Ross.

# Treasurer lists goals for township

"Monetary restraint" and "fiscal responsibility" are the bywords of Richard Henningsen as he prepares to take the reins as Northville Township's new treasurer November 20.

The Republican's primary victory over incumbent Lee Holland sent him into last week's election unopposed. Henningsen will return to the office he occupied from 1976-78.

Currently chairman of the Township Wage and Salary Review Commission, he said he expects the new team of leaders on the township board, along with a new business manager form of government developed by the commission, to pay dividends in the form of a smoother running operation.

His first task, he said, will be to assess the township budget in light of new monetary restraints on the part of

state and federal government.

"There is a lot of talk about cutbacks, and in this economy there are going to be cutbacks, but I haven't heard anything solid yet," he said. "By the end of the year, I expect to be able to document where we stand and let the community know. That is one of the first, if not the very first, tasks facing us."

He pledged the new government would be "as fiscally responsible as we can" and said "payless paydays" are a curse he intends to avoid by careful planning.

Although the current economic scene is bleak, Henningsen is also going into office with an eye toward brighter days.

"If the economy turns around, we're going to be faced with a lot of building, a lot of things like Super Sewer we're

going to have to make decisions about," he said.

If and when that time comes, Henningsen said he hopes to see more interest in township government from the citizenry. He pledged the new government would find people to serve on committees and commissions who "are responsive and will attend those meetings and give us the quorums we need."

Overall, he said, his goal is to see to it that "we are giving the citizenry of the community what they pay for — good services at a reasonable cost."

Henningsen, 45, has 23 years financial experience with General Motors Corporation. He earned his B.S. in accounting at Bowling Green State University.

He and his wife Ann, township residents 10 years, have four children.

Magazines form basis for Mr. and Mrs. Santa decorations

The little alley off of Main Street, beside the First Presbyterian Church, often is overlooked by the casual passer-by. Its route is seldom taken by those hurrying to and from work and it is devoid of the normal traffic passing through the city.

Yet this alley, as inconspicuous as it may seem, bears the name of one of Northville's oldest and most dedicated citizens. Since 1974, a sign has stood at its entrance in appreciation of a "truly grand lady" — Mary Alexander.

Mary Alexander Court was named by the city in recognition of the dedicated service rendered by Mrs. Mary Alexander during her almost 30 years as city clerk — from 1934-61.

Next Tuesday Mary Alexander will be celebrating her 90th birthday. And once again, the city will show its appreciation for the former clerk, when they proclaim November 18 "Mary Alexander Day."

Yet the woman receiving all of these honors is modest and unassuming about her accomplishments and has been throughout her life.

"I'm really not much of a reminiscer," said the tiny woman at her home in Wishing Well Manor.

"I've lived here all my life and I've seen a lot of changes," she said, "but that's about it."

Born in Germany in 1890 to William and Hilda Kunkel, Mary came to the United States when she was still an infant.

"I don't remember where I was born in Germany," she confided, "because I was only a year old when we came over."

Her father, looking for work, brought the family to America and ended up settling in Ypsilanti.

However, only two years after their arrival in the states, William Kunkel died — the victim of a train accident.

"My father was a section hand on the railroad," Mrs. Alexander recalled. "One day he was pumping down the track on a handcar when an outgoing train hit him."

After her father's death, Mary's mother went to work to provide for Mary and her sister.

"My mother worked at home," she said. "She took in washing just to keep us together."

It was after the ninth grade that Mary decided to go to work fulltime and around 1906 she left her family and moved to Nor-

Calendars are \$2.50 and are available at Gifts by Marison and Northville Camera shops in Northville.

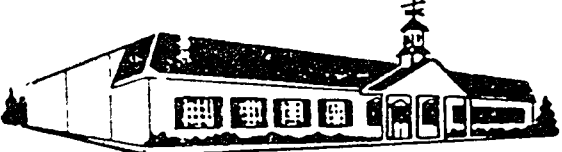

On November 17 the film will be shown at 10 a.m., noon and 2 p.m. on the upper level of the Waterman Center on campus. An evening screening will be held at 7

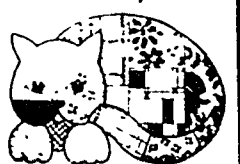

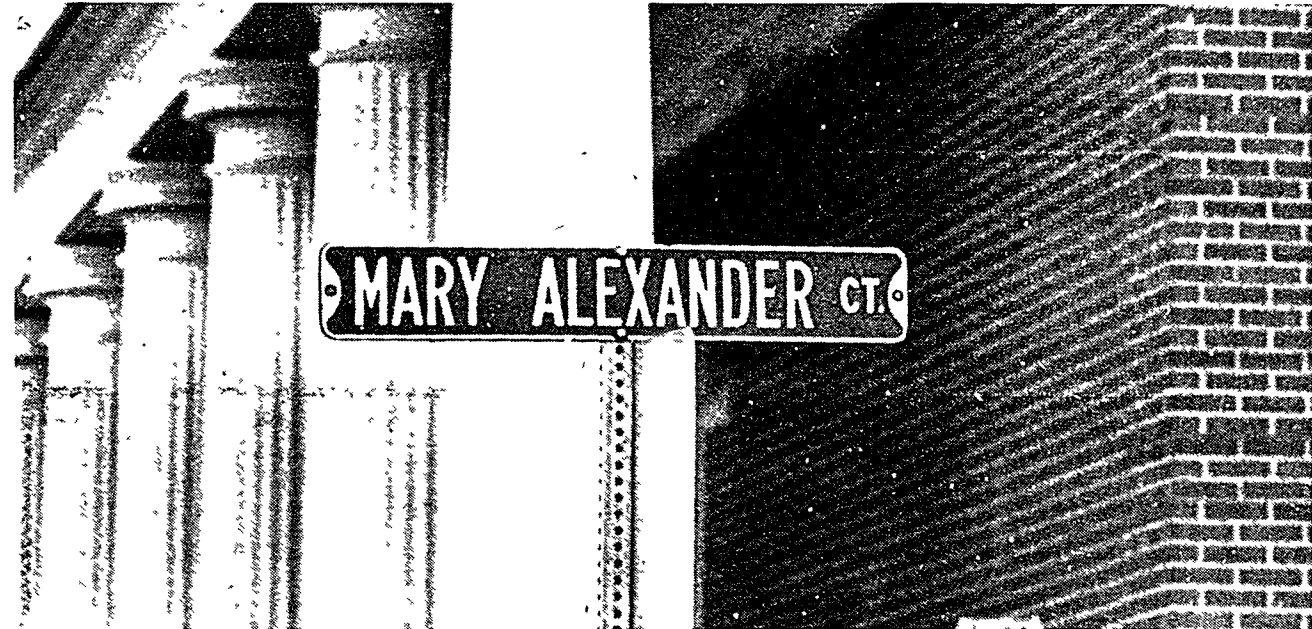

## City honors 'grand lady'

thville. Upon her arrival in Northville, Mary found work as a secretary.

Hazel Yerkes of 319 Hill said she first met Mary about 1910 when the former city clerk was secretary to the president of the old Stimpson Scale Company.

"It was a small town then," Mrs. Yerkes said. "It was easy to get to know everybody."

The friendship which developed between the two women has lasted for more than 70 years.

"She has always been a very loyal and true friend," Mrs. Yerkes said.

In 1913, Mary married Paul R. Alexander, a practicing dentist in Northville. They had two daughters Frances and Louise.

"After we got married we lived in an apartment up over the shoe store," Mrs. Alexander said. The family later moved to a house at 220 Linden.

However, on June 4, 1934, Paul Alexander died at the age of 46. Dr. Alexander, who was at that time one of Northville's most respected citizens, died after an appendectomy operation.

Five months after his death Mrs. Alexander went back to work — only

this time for the city.

She began her long career as village clerk about 16 months after her husband's death. When the village of Northville incorporated as a city, the clerk's post became appointive. Mrs. Alexander, who was working as a secretary for the city, was chosen for the clerk's position by the city council.

For 10 consecutive elections over a period of 20 years, Mrs. Alexander was re-elected as village clerk — always unopposed.

Howard Burkart was village president when Mrs. Alexander began her career. Throughout her 27 years as clerk, she served under the administrations of Arthur Nichols, Elmer Perrin, Adelbert Hohn, Forrest Doren, Carl Bryan, C. E. Langfield, Claude Ely and A. M. Allen.

For a quarter of a century Mrs. Alexander recorded all the births and deaths in Northville. And from 1934-54 she managed City Hall alone. In 1954, an assistant city clerk was appointed.

"She was the most wonderful person to work for," recalled Lillian Duerson of her friend Mary Alexander.

"She was always fair and always honest."

Mrs. Duerson worked with Mrs. Alexander as assistant city clerk from 1957-61.

Throughout that time the two women became close friends and Mrs. Duerson said she has many fond memories of their days together at city hall.

"I remember how she loved to listen to the baseball games on the radio," Mrs. Duerson said. "She would always have it on during baseball season."

"She was so nice to work for," Mrs. Duerson recalled. "If I made a mistake she'd just smile and say 'That's okay, it's no life and death matter.'"

"Oh, she was quite a gal," Mrs. Duerson said, "a truly grand lady."

In 1961, after 27 years as city clerk, 800 meetings, and nine mayors, Mrs. Alexander retired. She was 71.

Upon her retirement, the city presented her with the Claude Ely Award at a dinner held in her honor.

Mrs. Alexander said she worked until she was 71 because "I didn't have to stop at 65 — I wanted to keep working."

After retiring, Mrs. Alexander spent time traveling and visiting relatives and friends. One relative who often visited her after she retired was her brother-in-law Edgar Eisenhower. He was the brother of former President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

After World War II, Edgar's daughter Louise and her husband lived with Mary for a short while.

On September 5, 1972, the Northville City Council paid tribute to Mrs. Alexander's many years of service by voting to name the alley off Main in her honor.

On April 1, 1974, the street was officially dedicated by the council as a public thoroughfare.

Reflecting upon her more than 70 years in Northville, Mrs. Alexander said that it is the people that have made her life here so enjoyable.

"The people have been very nice to me," she said. "I still have a lot of friends here — even among the young folks. My children's friends are my friends, too."

"I've enjoyed all of the people I've met and I've enjoyed my family ... that's about all I can say."

On November 18, the friends and family of Mrs. Mary Alexander will gather together at 220 Linden (where Mrs. Alexander's grandson Ronald Angove now resides) and celebrate the 90th birthday of a truly grand lady.

## St. John's class studies alcoholism

Aware of the problem of increasing alcoholism, St. John's Provincial Seminary at 44011 Five Mile is offering a course on "Alcoholism Education" beginning November 20 under the direction of Rose Teresa Izzo, SC.M.A. Oriented to family members, ministers and counselors, the course will continue for 11 weeks excluding holiday periods. It may be taken for credit or audited.

It is designed for people interested in helping others with the problem of alcoholism.

Sister Izzo states the course will include a three-part study of alcoholism and its effects — what it is, who is the alcoholic, what is the role of the family members or counselor-minister in intervention, referral and treatment of the alcoholic; what responsibility the counselor-minister and family have to familiarize themselves with the literature and kind of therapy available to the substance abuser and his/her

family.

A former in-patient staff member of St. Joseph Hospital Alcoholism Treatment Center in Mt. Clemens, Sister Izzo is a counselor, adjunct faculty members at St. John's Seminary, and part-time instructor at Macomb County Community Resource Center.

Like other courses at St. John's, Alcoholism Education is a two-credit course, meeting only two hours once a week. The fee is \$50 per credit hour, or \$25 per audit hour. Students may register by calling academic affairs, 453-6200, extension 68 or 71.

Students of the course, states Sister Izzo, will work through their own attitudes about drinking and drinkers. The course, she explains, is designed to provide a basis for understanding the problem of alcoholism in society and give factual information about the effects of alcohol in the body, providing a perspective on the problems relating to alcohol use.

There will be identification of different patterns and customs related to alcohol use.

"It is to sensitize students to the problems and needs of special groups and to provide them with ministerial 'tools'

to help meet the needs of the alcoholic and his-or-her family," Sister Izzo outlines.

Objectives, she says, can be adjusted to meet needs of participants.

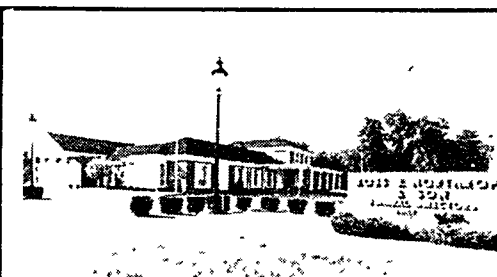

## Hypnosis of witnesses — new tool for police

For centuries, myths and mysteries have shrouded the dark art of hypnosis. For many people, the very word 'hypnosis' conjurs up images of magicians in dimly-lit music halls drawing power from some strange force to change men into fools or unsuspecting pin cushions.

But more recently, the use, and indeed the image, of hypnosis has been revolutionized. On the psychological front, experts have recognized that it is really a myth that human beings can be forced to do act against their will under hypnosis. However, hypnosis' use in behavior modification programs is thought to be instrumental in their success.

But despite the success of the 'hypnotic revolution' in psychology, a battle rages over the use of this technique by criminal investigators. Police, FBI and other investigators have been hypnotizing witnesses who consent to have their memory 'refreshed' in an attempt to dig up 'buried' or 'suppressed' information relating to a crime.

In the face of objections from civil rights lawyers and defense attorneys as to the validity of testimony given under hypnosis, the technique has been used to gather information in over 300 cases in Michigan alone in the last five years, according to Lieutenant Ronald Beauchine of the Michigan State Police.

The Oakland County, Livingston County and Washtenaw County Sheriff's departments have all used this investigative technique in a variety of cases ranging from child murders to rape or arson, according to detectives from all of those departments.

For the police, there are certain ground rules as to who may be hypnotized, how they may be hypnotized and how they may be treated once under hypnosis, Beauchine said.

Witnesses are the only candidates for hypnosis, and each person must be scrupulously screened to make sure that they have no mental or emotional problems which could be triggered by hypnosis, said Beauchine.

The questions to be asked during the session have to be pre-formulated since leading questions like "Do you see the blue, shiny gun?" instead of "Do you see a weapon?" are likely to provoke a biased response, Beauchine said.

However, Dr. Martin T. Orne, national expert on the use of hypnosis from the University of Pennsylvania, stresses that although the police may not intend to ask leading questions, they often do so unintentionally just because of their position as the prosecution.

In addition, Orne points out that hypnotized subjects will do their utmost to give information, whatever the caliber, just to please the hypnotist. Hypnotized people are also very prone to suggestion and are likely to want to confirm what they sense is expected. Orne, who testified against the use of hypnosis on witnesses in the Ann Arbor VA hospital murders case in 1977, insists that witness can 'create memories' and even lie under hypnosis.

And Mike Moran, Ann Arbor civil

rights attorney who acted as the defense counsel for the two Filipino nurses accused of the VA murders, claims the police often try to make the witness' memory comply with their own memory or knowledge of the crime.

Whatever the objections from the defense, Beauchine insists that the police hypnotist is only told the bare facts about a case so that he or she is not influenced in helping to form the questions or in asking them.

In addition to the rigorous screening methods and carefully picked questions used by the police, Beauchine noted that a tape recording is always made of hypnosis sessions and later made available to the defense attorney who can scrutinize it to make sure that the session was conducted properly and ethically.

In the VA murder case and in the People vs. Scott Weise, in which Weise was accused of killing the caretaker of his father's church, Orne viewed the video tapes of the hypnotized witnesses.

In the VA case, Orne said that leading questions had been asked, while in the Weise trial he testified that, based on certain medical criteria, the witness had never really been hypnotized. It was Orne's refutations of the hypnosis testimony in both these cases that helped acquit the accused parties of the killings, Moran said.

However, Beauchine said that as long as the correct procedures have been followed, many courts accept information given under hypnosis as valid evidence. However, for the most part, Beauchine pointed out that the police only use hypnosis to gain pivotal leads which will provide them with other, perhaps more conclusive evidence.

For example, this kind of short-cutting was used in the landmark Chowchilla case in California in 1977. Here, a bus-full of children were kidnapped, taken to the desert and buried in the sand. Fortunately, they were able to dig their way out, but afterwards bus driver Ed Ray, who had been knocked unconscious could remember little.

The Svengali Squad (SQ), Los Angeles' hypnosis squad which spearheaded the use of hypnosis, in criminal investigation in this country, hypnotized Ray who recalled all but one digit of the license plate of the kidnapers' white van. On locating the van, the police found other evidence that led to the conviction of the kidnapers.

Dr. Martin Reiser, head of the SQ, recently announced that hypnosis produced new information in nearly 80 percent of the 350 cases in which it was used by the squad from mid-1975 through 1978. Reiser further calculated that 66.4 percent of the information was considered valuable.

Likewise, Beauchine said that the technique's use in this state has been very successful leading to new information in at least 60 percent of the cases and to convictions in 10 percent of the cases. Beauchine added that hypnosis has proven successful for investigative departments in Israel, Hong Kong and Canada.

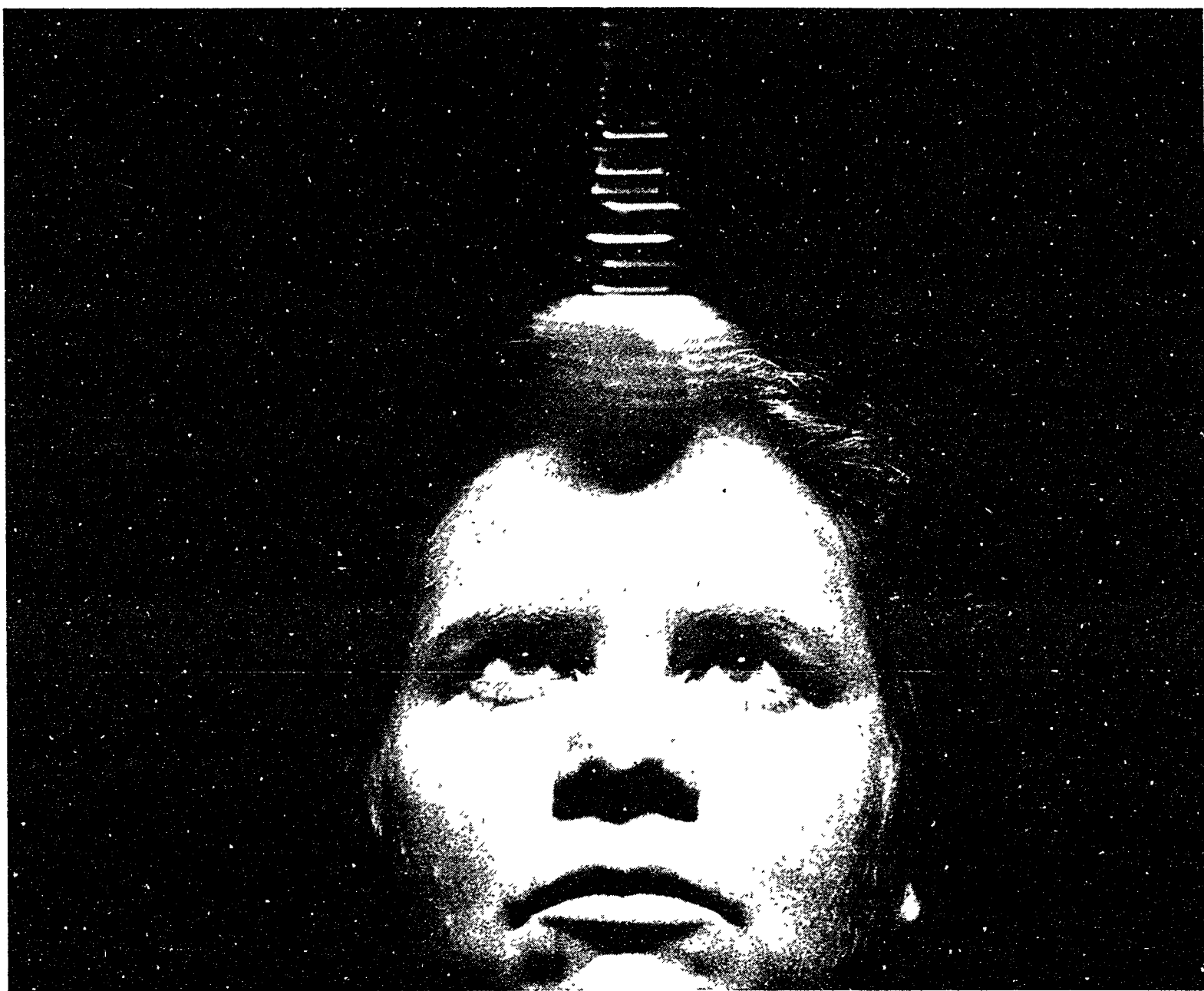

With the development of the International Society of Hypnosis (ISH) and the Michigan Society of Hypnosis (MSH), Beauchine said that police departments all over the state are trying to establish ground rules and ethical practices for the use of hypnosis in criminal investigation so that the information recalled will be more acceptable to the courts and to defense attorneys.

"The ISH has been formed since 1977, and the MSH is currently in the making," Beauchine said. "We'll be adopting by-laws and forming committees which will establish a code of ethics and training standards."

Police hypnotists will also have to take refresher courses to keep their hypnotic skills sharp, Beauchine said. Many of the detectives from the 200 police departments using hypnosis in

the United States travel to Los Angeles to receive their training from Reiser at the Los Angeles Law Enforcement Institute (LALEI), a school separate from the city's police department.

Beauchine noted that although Dr. Donald Rosse, clinical psychologist for the state police, is trained in the use of hypnosis, both he and Lieutenant Gary Powell have attended the LALEI for training.

Like many other officers across the country, Beauchine said that he and Powell attended four and five day training sessions during which time they learned how to place a subject under hypnosis. "First we learned the law as far as the use of hypnosis is concerned," said Beauchine. "We were also warned about the pitfalls of interviewing a hypnotized subject. After this, we were taught how to actually place a per-

son under hypnosis—it isn't very hard to do this."

The most common method for hypnotizing a witness, according to Commander Charles Anderson of the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department, is called 'voice induction'. Here, the subject is coaxed into an extremely relaxed state by a soft persuasive voice and the removal of external, distracting stimuli such as bright lights and noisy fans.

Some subjects are taken back on a 'time train'. In such cases, the witnesses 'board' an imaginary 'train' in time, and 'travel' back to one week, one day, one hour, one minute, one second before the crime actually occurred. They are then told that the 'train' is coming to a halt and that the image they have before their eyes is to be frozen and described in detail, said

Anderson.

Descriptions given by the witness can then be used to locate the suspect. Usually, if the suspect is found, the police look for other evidence to add more substance to the prosecution's case in court. At the present time, the courts have made no specific judgement on the use of investigative hypnosis, side-stepping the issue until a really demonstrative, clear-cut case comes before them.

For example, in the People vs. Tait, 1977, Mason County, the court of appeals reversed a circuit court decision because the police used hypnosis on the principal prosecution witness without telling the court, according to defense attorney Tom Carlson. Carlson said that the court was more concerned with

the non-disclosure by the prosecution of the fact that hypnosis was used.

Information given under hypnosis by the witness changed his testimony in this case, Carlson said, adding that the witness recalled seeing the defendant move his hand toward his gun and was provoked to shoot because of this. This had not been recalled before the session, said Carlson.

Carlson also noted that the prosecutor himself conducted the session and stressed that he did not believe that he was properly trained to do this.

"The court reversed the decision because of the non-disclosure part so they were really side stepping the issue of the use of hypnosis itself," Carlson said.

But the case is still pending, and Carlson said he would like to see the tape of the hypnosis session analyzed by psychiatrists and psychologists before the testimony is accepted by the court.

However, David Mendes, former public defender for Washtenaw County and the defense attorney in the Weise trial, believes witnesses who have been hypnotized should not be allowed to testify in court at all. Mendes bases his on Orne's opinion that hypnosis has a tendency solidify previous uncertainties in the mind of the individual and that hypnotizing a witness could change the memory, or the evidence.

"It's (hypnosis) use like adding or deleting phrases from a written piece of evidence which could significantly change the outcome of the trial," Mendes said.

Mendes, now a teacher at the New England School of Law, added "I don't believe that witnesses who've been hypnotized should be allowed to testify in criminal trials. One of the lawyer's best

tools is his constitutional right to confrontation and cross examination of the witness. I should be able to say, 'Isn't it true that you were not very sure of such a thing?' Before the hypnosis, he is not very sure. After the hypnosis, he's absolutely sure. What's changed? His memory? The suggestion? Personally, I'd like to ban such witnesses from even testifying."

From the civil rights side of the issue, Moran stresses that there should never be a time when hypnosis is used without a court order or without someone present to represent the accused. This is not current procedure, according to Beauchine.

"I know the police think that hypnosis is the greatest thing ever. And they should too. They probably think it's the greatest thing since forced confessions because it's pretty much equivalent to that," said Moran.

"In fact, hypnosis is even more dangerous than forced confessions. At least a person who has been forced to confess can come back later and present evidence in court that demonstrates that fact. His mind hasn't been altered. He's just been placed in a very difficult situation. But a witness whose memory has been altered by the hypnotic process has no recourse afterwards."

On the other side of the fence, Beauchine said "Testimony given under hypnosis is like any other testimony. If a person changes their mind later, they can come back and say so."

The revolution in investigative hypnosis is well under way. Federal and state courts across the country are handing out judgements on its use. And although many battles have already been won, many more have yet to be fought before one side or the other is victorious in the overall war.

# Legislators push to raise revenues

Unable to balance the current year and the upcoming new fiscal year budgets, Governor William G. Milliken and legislative leaders have turned their attention to ways to raise new revenues.

With the current year budget \$150 million short and the new budget short by more than \$500 million, areas are being targeted to increase state revenues by at least \$100 million per year.

The legislature, particularly the house, has hoped to delay action of the new budget for the fiscal year beginning October 1, but word from New York City bonding houses indicated the state would be unable to borrow short term funds without a new budget completed.

Legislative leaders began the final push to finalize a budget prior to the general election recess. House members, all facing elections this year, would have preferred delaying the budget until after the election so a drastically pared down budget could not become a campaign issue.

Besides pursuing the revenue increases, decisions have been made to retain nearly intact the state's general assistance program.

The governor had proposed eliminating the general assistance program coupled with the creation of a \$90 million state-supported jobs program. Under the program, any employable person who refused to work would not qualify for benefits.

Milliken also backed off his proposed \$40 million aid package to distressed cities. He agreed to postpone the

program, a top priority in the state-of-the-state message and original budget message, for one year.

Areas being looked at as possible producers of additional income tax exemption on military pay, placing an income tax on capital gains and an expanded lottery.

Milliken said he would favor any combination of the proposals in order to tide the state through the current budget malaise.

Members of the senate Democratic caucus gave their tentative approval to pursue legislation increasing the taxes to produce the necessary income. They, however, do not face re-election this year and would naturally be more willing to vote to increase taxes as they would not have to face voters for yet another two years.

The governor tentatively has agreed to retain the general assistance program along with increased sanctions for failing to accept work while initiating a public works program.

As currently envisioned, \$31 million could be shaved from the general assistance program, down from the \$144 million first demanded by the governor and about \$94 million under a revised recommendation that included the jobs program.

The house has begun work on the senate passed version of a \$4,771 million operating budget. It is expected the house will approve the spending level at much the same as the senate and members of a joint senate/house conference committee will be responsible for prng about \$250 million from the total.

John Van Sicklen didn't quite manage a title in his first year as Walled Lake Central's head football coach. But he accomplished virtually everything else.

Van Sicklen said that his Walled Lake Central team would restructure its offense and defense this season in an attempt to revitalize a club that had skidded to a 3-6 record — not to mention a winless Inter-Lakes Conference mark — the year before. And that's exactly what transpired.

Van Sicklen's prediction that the I-L race would be a two-team affair between the Vikings and perennial conference powerhouse Livonia Stevenson was scoffed at by many, but he and his talented players made that forecast a reality.

As a result, Van Sicklen is our choice

as the Sliger Home Newspapers' area Coach of the Year.

Perhaps the Orchard Lake resident's

biggest accomplishment this fall was reviving an offense that the year before could have been described as comatose. The 1979 Vikings managed 84 points all season long; this year they possessed a brutal ball-control offense and that total nearly doubled to 160.

Central's defense — the team's strong point in a weak season the previous year — also improved under the rookie coach. The Vikes cut their points allowed from 168 in '79 to 154 this season.

Now Van Sicklen and his fine coaching staff find themselves facing another challenge. Central will have to find replacements for four all-league performers who will be lost to graduation, all of whom were key factors in a revived offense.

Whatever happens between now and next fall, though, you can bet that the Vikings will be taken much more seriously when the 1981 campaign is upon us. And Van Sicklen can take a lot of credit for that.

## South Lyon Lions' roar is the loudest

After winning its fourth consecutive league championship and compiling an 8-1 overall record, the South Lyon High varsity football team has been named the 1980 Team-of-the-Year by Sliger Home Newspapers.

The Lions won their second consecutive Kensington Valley Conference (KVC) championship in 1980 with a perfect 5-0 league mark. In 1977 and 1978, South Lyon captured the Southeastern Conference crown.

South Lyon, under the direction of coach Dan Skatzka, has not lost a KVC contest since coming to the league in 1979. And Skatzka is four-for-four, coaching his team to four consecutive league championships in his four seasons with the Lions.

Defense is the name of the game for South Lyon. Spearheaded by a tough defensive front four and aggressive linebackers and defensive backs, the Lion defense stifled their opponents' scoring efforts to a tiny average of 5.2 points per game.

The defense consistently set up the offense for scores by providing good field position and nabbing a season total of 14 interceptions.

Skatzka likes to point out a statistic that makes his team look very good. In third quarter play during the season, the Lion defense gave up no points while the offense put a total of 55 points on the score board. Play like that practically eliminates a second half comeback by opposing football squads.

And the Lion offense could put the points on the board. Averaging 21 points per game, South Lyon's powerful running game maintained ball possession while grinding out the clock and opposing defenses. South Lyon ball carriers rambled for 2,339 yards to its opponents 1,447.

South Lyon's only loss came on September 12 when Clawson kicked by the Lions, 3-0, in a tough defensive battle.

But South Lyon came back after the loss and won its remaining seven games.

Harrison, who also coaches the Meads Mill football team, missed a week of school due to the injuries, but recently returned to work.

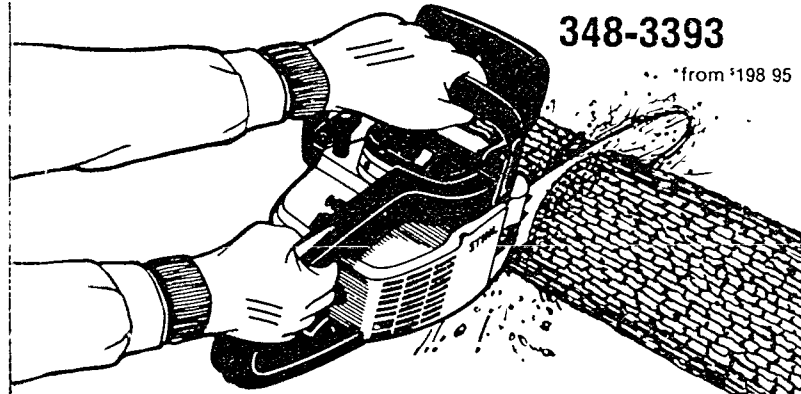

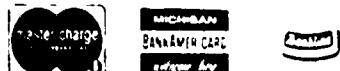

**Patriots' 6-0 record is best ever**

A 58-8 thrashing of Belleville recently culminated Meads Mill Junior High School's best football season ever.

The Patriots posted a 6-0 mark surpassing the most successful season — 3-3 — a Meads Mill grid team has ever had.

The Patriots dominated their opponents throughout the season scoring

142 points, while allowing only 26.

Harrison gave much of the credit for the unblemished record to his assistant coach Jeff Webber.

"He did an exceptional job shaping the team," the head coach said. "I was really proud to have him with me."

(Webber handled the head coaching duties in the final game of the season, after Harrison was injured in a traffic accident).

In addition to Craske, Quinn and Sylvestre, several others also contributed to the Patriots' scoring. Norm Estigoy ran for 51 yards and

one touchdown and Mike Hayes had 24 yards and one touchdown.

The awesome defense of the Patriots was led by Dave Wilson and Craske who had 22 first hits apiece.

Other standouts include Jim Ziegler, 20 hits, Hayes with 16, Todd Deal with 14 and Quinn with 13.

# Cagers dump Mott, lose to Western

Now 5-11, the Mustangs were scheduled to play Belleville yesterday.

Senior RAY HUNERT was one of only two area players to make the Sliger All-Area squad as a junior. The offensive center produced running room up the middle for teammate Charley Ginster and helped lead W. L. Central to a 4-1 record in the Inter Lakes Conference, good enough for second place. The 6-0, 170-pound Hunert should be a big plus for Central next year.

Offensive tackle JOHN ACKLEY was the power lineman for Northville. Coach Dennis Colligan called Ackley the "most consistent player on the team."

Ackley at guard and Norton at tackle paved the way for the Northville running game, which produced six victories in nine games.

The 6-1, 205-pound senior also centered punts for the Mustangs and served as the third defensive end, starting four games both ways for Northville.

South Lyon's third offensive unanimous All-KVC selection, DAN BERGIN, helped Janes produce running room for backs Mike Morgan and Pat Carducci.

The 5-11, 188-pound senior center helped the Lions secure their fourth straight KVC title and earn a regional ranking of seventh.

## RECEIVERS

The second of two juniors to be named to the Sliger All-Area team, PETE THOME grabbed just about everything Milford quarterback Dave Monroe threw in his general direction.

The 5-8, 140-pound split end, an All-Inter Lakes selection, always seemed to get open and make the impossible catch.

Voted most improved by the Northville coaches, flanker BRIAN PRATT made the big catches for the Mustangs this year. A 6-0, 160-pounder, the sturdy senior was Mustang quarterback Dave Greer's prime target when 6-7 split end Dave Ward drew two defenders — which was most of the time.

Pratt hauled in 11 passes for 170 yards, one touchdown and one two-point conversion for the Mustangs. Coach Colligan also praised Pratt for his "excellent blocking" which made the option successful.

## DEFENSIVE BACKS

South Lyon's Tim Garrett grabbed

four interceptions and one fumble recovery, to lead the Lion pass defenders.

The 5-10, 160-pound senior was among several Lion All-KVC unanimous selections this season.

Last year Garrett received an honorable mention from Sliger sports editors.

Free safety RAY SAILUS led the Novi Wildcats in interceptions with eight and twice caught breakout runners to save touchdowns. The 5-8, 145-pound senior was named All-KVC on both offense and defense this year and received a Sliger All-Area honorable mention last year.

A split end on offense, Sailus caught nine passes for 116 yards for the Wildcats.

Second-year starter GARY KUCHER is not very big at 5-6, 140 pounds. But Northville Coach Dennis Colligan calls him pound for pound the "best football player on the team."

At strong safety for the Mustangs, the senior picked off two passes and recovered one fumble. He also played cornerback at various times throughout the season.
